Enlarged Feed Grain Base Covers More

A new farm feed grain base may be established under the 1965 feed grain program for farms which did not plant feed grains in 1959 and-or 1960 that meet eligibility requirements, Grant Bessey of the Iosco County ASCS Office announced today.

To be eligible for a new farm feed grain base, Mr. Bessey said the operator must expect to receive 50 percent or more of his livelihood in the current year from the production of agricultural commodities on the farm, must have had at least two years experience in the production of feed grains in the last five years, have adequate equipment for the production of feed grains and neither the owner nor the operator may have an interest in any other farm for which a feed grain base has been established.

Interested producers who can meet these requirements should contact the County ASCS Office not later than March 1 and file an application, Mr. Bessey said.

A farm for which a new farm base is established will not be eligible to participate in the 1965 program. However, producers will qualify for price support loans and purchases by planting within their feed grain base and maintaining the conserving base.

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

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
