New Park Aide at Tawas Point

Clifford Norman, 46, an eight-year veteran of the Michigan Department of Conservation, arrived Monday to take over his new job as assistant park supervisor at Tawas Point State Park.

Working under Park Supervisor Raymond Prosch, Norman will have charge of the work project which gets under way this spring at Michigan's newest state park.

Norman comes from Muskegon State Park, where he had served nearly five years as a park ranger. A native of Kirksville, Missouri, he came to Michigan in 1948. He had been a foreman for the conservation department before switching over to the park division.

Norman and his wife, Isabelle, are the parents of three children, Patricia Marie, 17; Gregory C., 16; Pamela June, 14. Mrs. Norman and the children are to move here soon.

Work is expected to start around March 5 on the new park construction. Some heavy equipment has been moved to the site by contractors.

Propose Limit on Fish Nets in Great Lakes

An Inisco Sportsmen's Club resolution asking certain restrictions on commercial fishing nets has been adopted by Region Two of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and is to be presented before the forthcoming state convention.

The resolution asks the state legislature to establish a limit on setting commercial fishing nets at a minimum of 14 feet in water depth or one-quarter mile off any shore line of Lake Huron not presently covered by law.

The resolution notes that, at present, fishermen are allowed to set nets upon and close to shore lines of the Great Lakes. The resolution termed this as being an "encroachment upon the well being and welfare of all the people in the State of Michigan."

It is proposed, however, to allow setting of nets close to shore during the yearly smelt fishing season in early spring.

Lawrence J. O'Neil, director, District 14, MUCC, and Allen J. Paulson, president of the Inisco Sportsmen's Club, both of East Tawas, said that the resolution met with good reception at Sunday's Higgins Lake regional meeting.

"It appears as though the measure will receive support throughout the state and we are now preparing petitions to be circulated for presentation to the state legislature," said O'Neil.

Many complaints have been heard in this area in recent years concerning the setting of commercial fishing nets along shore. Resort owners have complained to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce that nets set along shore cluttered swimming waters, hindered use of pleasure craft during summer months, all detrimental to local uses and by the important tourist industry.

"Michigan waters are used and belong to all the people of the State of Michigan; the setting of commercial fishing nets constitutes a hazard to property owners, boats, water skiers, water bathing, in-shore fishing and infringes upon all concerned, both private and public," states the resolution.

An able assist in organizing was given by Richard Kendzioriski, state representative of the Michigan AFL-CIO Council.

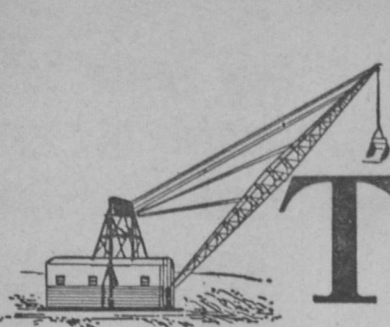
Participating were delegates from various locals in the area.

Weather Again 'Sour' for Perchville Festival

Some like it hot, some like it cold, but the Tawas Chamber of Commerce is still looking for the day when an outdoor event planned here receives a little help from the weatherman.

For the second year in a row, Tawas Perchville Festival was just about wiped out by poor weather conditions. Last year, it was a thaw which caused chamber officials to moan; last week-end it was cold weather and a high wind which caused all the trouble.

Chamber officials were happy about attendance at the two-day event—it attracted many more people than last year's wash-out—but just about the entire outdoor program had to be canceled because of extremely cold weather or gale-like winds.

The affair got under way with good attendance at Friday night's dinner for visiting members of the Michigan Outdoor Writers Association, who held their winter convention at the Holland Hotel. Prize-winning MOWA outdoor movies shown at the East Tawas Elementary Unit Friday and Saturday evenings were enjoyed by large crowds. Profit from admissions went into coffers of the chamber of commerce.

Kicked off to such a good start, the week-end program almost ground to a halt Saturday morning when the area was hit by a blizzard. In spite of the cold weather, chamber officials estimated that several thousand persons drove their autos out on the ice at Perchville during the day.

Saturday afternoon's program was blessed by sunshine and speed races of the Saginaw Bay Power Squadron were run as scheduled. Hundreds of youngsters enjoyed free Sno-Traveler rides provided by Bud Mann of Higgins Lake.

About 150 persons attended Saturday night's MOWA banquet at the Holland Hotel, followed by presentation of awards to winners of the organization's outdoor movie contest.

Arthur Ziehl, one of the committee members who worked so hard to prepare the chamber's program, said he was out on the ice before 7:00 a. m. Sunday "and it looked as though we were finally going to get a break in the weather." This was not to be, however, as a high wind began to blow out of the southwest and it continued during most of the day.

"Someone estimated last year's attendance on Sunday at 10,000 persons. If that was the case, then we had 15,000 persons coming on and off the ice last Sunday," said James DeWise, chamber president. Spectators were not braving the

cold weather as they stayed right in their cars. "You could hardly get them to roll their windows down to register for prizes," said DeWise.

Mrs. Fred (Beverly) Hall of Mt. Morris was crowned queen of the Perchville Festival on a wind-swept stage. She and her husband have spent five week-ends fishing here this winter and she was selected Saturday to reign over the carnival.

Judge's Salary Request 'Dies' in Committee

A salary increase requested by Iosco's new probate judge, William H. McCready, was denied last Wednesday by the board of supervisors.

McCready had requested the board to increase his \$6,000 annual salary by \$2,500. The present salary is based on a formula established by the state using the most recent decennial census as the determining factor.

The new probate judge based his request on the fact that population has increased in Iosco since 1960.

Prosecuting Attorney J. Richard Ernst stated that a state statute provides that salaries of probate judges of Michigan shall be uniform according to the decennial census formula. He said, however, that the salary could be increased but not decreased during a term of office, except it could be decreased by lowering all salaries throughout the county building.

Salaries of other elected officials may not be increased during a term of office. Last September 16, prior to the general election when McCready defeated Paul Harvey for the probate judge post, salaries of all county officers were increased to the \$6,000 level of the probate judge. This change was effective January 1.

On request of Chairman Henry Oates, the board's salaries committee studied McCready's request and brought in a recommendation of a \$1,000 increase. There was no support to the motion and it "died" in committee.

In other business, Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda Township asked the board's judicial committee to study the possibility of preparing a resolution to the state legislature requesting a property tax exemption for widows.

County Extension Director Marvin Daventon addressed the board relative to proposals for a district 4-H Club agent and a district resource development agent. The matter was tabled until the March session for further study.

The sheriff's department was authorized to sell stolen property recovered by that department but not claimed by the original owner. The property would be sold at public auction.

The board authorized purchase of a two-way radio at \$636 and a new boat at \$939 for use by the sheriff's department. Money for these purchases is to come from last year's 1964 marine enforcement fund balance.

Salary of Mrs. Richard Depuydt, register of probate, was increased \$400 a year effective March 1.

Wrecker Lost in 25 Feet of Water

A Townline Road man lost his home-made wrecker Saturday while attempting to remove a car from the ice of Tawas Bay. Investigating state police said that a station wagon driven by Ronald Chamberlain of Saginaw became stranded when he drove over a crack in the ice. The incident took place at 5:00 a. m. while Chamberlain was on his way to a fishing spot about two miles off shore from M-55.

Merl Miller of the Townline attempted to remove the vehicle and the wheels of his wrecker dropped through the ice. A mechanical winch was removed before the vehicle plunged into about 25 feet of water. With assistance of a second wrecker, Chamberlain was able to remove his station wagon.

Prosecutor Takes Issue With State Auditor Gen.

Iosco County's new prosecuting attorney, J. Richard Ernst, has taken issue with recent recommendations of the state auditor general's office and has advised the county board of supervisors that it acted properly in operation of Old Orchard Park.

In its report on the examination of records and accounts for 1963, Attorney General Billie S. Farnum's office directed that Old Orchard Park fund be removed from under the direct control of the board of supervisors' conservation committee and that control and operation of the park be placed under the county road commission.

The auditor general also directed that county road commission establish rules and regulations governing use of the park by the public and submit them to the board of supervisors for its approval.

According to the state, the county park was established under provision of Act 90 of the Public Acts of 1913. The property is leased from Consumers Power Company by the county for \$1 a year.

"The auditor general's report fails to note Act 156 of Public Acts of 1917 which provides that any city, village, county or township may operate a system of public recreation parks and playgrounds," Ernst told the board of supervisors last Wednesday.

He said the law also provides that local political subdivisions may acquire, equip and maintain land, buildings or other recreational facilities; employ a superintendent of recreation and assistants; vote and expend funds for the operation of such a system. "The act of 1917, enacted some four years after passage of the act cited by the auditor general, appears to clearly provide an alternative authority for the operation of county parks," said Ernst. The act was recognized May 1944 by Attorney General Herbert J. Rushton as an alternative method for operating such a park. It was the opinion of Ernst that

the county board of supervisors may properly designate its conservation committee as a recreation board for the operation of county public recreation facilities; further, that the operation of Old Orchard Park is a proper function of such recreation board.

The auditor general also took issue with the use of \$3,660 of Old Orchard Park fund receipts to purchase property adjacent to the county jail and county building grounds for parking lot purposes.

Prosecuting Attorney Ernst advised the board of supervisors that the 1917 statute implicitly authorized such expenditures. The auditor general had directed the prosecuting attorney to issue a formal opinion as to whether or not the Old Orchard Park fund be reimbursed from the general fund for the purchase of the above stated county property. Ernst felt that the money was properly expended and told the board to take no action until overruled by a higher authority.

Henry Oates, chairman of the board of supervisors, ordered various county committees to review other recommendations from the auditor general's office and make corrections where necessary.

Twenty-three persons attended Monday night's meeting of a steering committee which is presently considering a code of ethics for parents and teen-agers in the Tawas area.

A general discussion of the several types of codes for teen-agers and the basis for such use was held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit. Chairman Walter Champion had charge of the meeting.

The group is to meet again March 22 and members are to bring to this meeting an introduction to a code of ethics stating the purpose for which it should serve.

William Tracy, county school superintendent, was directed by Champion to edit the introduction from a sample code used by Kenosha, Wisconsin, and distribute to all present and other members of the steering committee. This introduction is to serve as a reference point on developing a local introduction to a code of ethics.

Adult and teen-aged members of the group are to develop from two major references the ideas to be incorporated into a local code. It is hoped that some specific progress can be reached at the March 22 meeting and a rough code of ethics be formulated from the report of the subcommittees of teen-agers and adults.

D&M's Shop Busy With Boxcar Work

Work of a 10-man crew at the Detroit and Mackinac Railway shops is now on display in front of the general offices in Tawas City.

The road is now in the process of upgrading 100 boxcars purchased in 1947 and presently out of service because of defects. The third car to undergo heavy repairs was completed last week.

E. V. Goodman, general superintendent of the D&M, said Tuesday morning that he was very pleased with work on the first three cars and it is hoped that the project may be expanded to the repair of many more cars.

In charge of the project is Joseph Daugherty, who replaced Goodman as superintendent of mechanical maintenance. Daugherty came here January 1 from the Pennsylvania Railroad, where he had been a car foreman.

Also employed in the crew are welders, carmen and helpers. Goal of the project now is to repair two cars a week.

This heavy construction includes installation of new bolsters which form the main support at each end of the car, new heavy angle iron on the bottom of the car, complete renewal of wooden floors and lining.

This is the first time any such heavy repair work has been attempted at the Tawas shop in recent years. Body bolsters are being fabricated by the Pullman Corporation at its Hammond, Indiana, shop.

As a result of such work, cars are much stronger than when originally constructed and are capable of carrying heavier pay loads. The road has also found that it can repair its own cars much more eco-

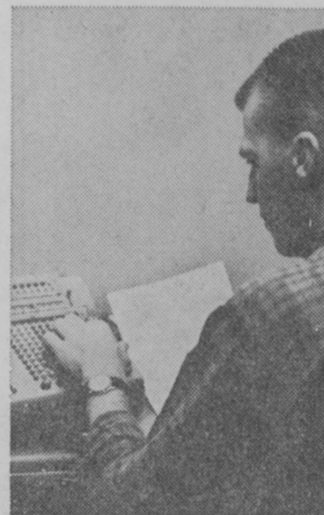

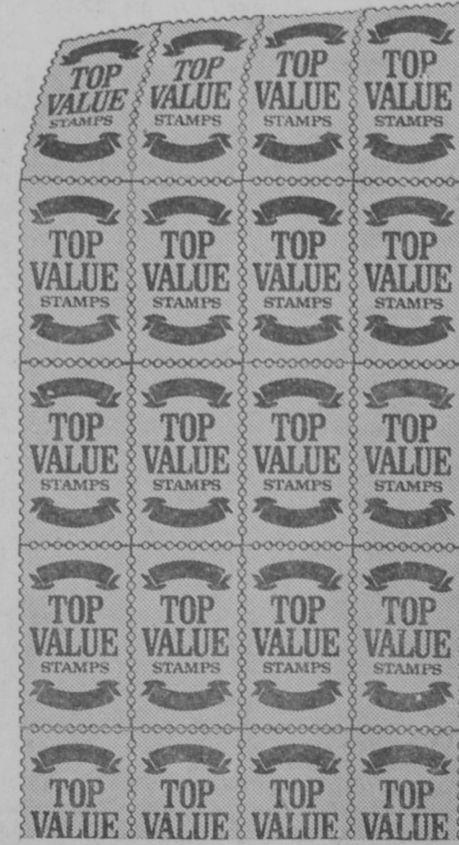

Records of the two teams during the season were five wins and two losses for the eighth grade and four wins and three losses for the ninth grade.

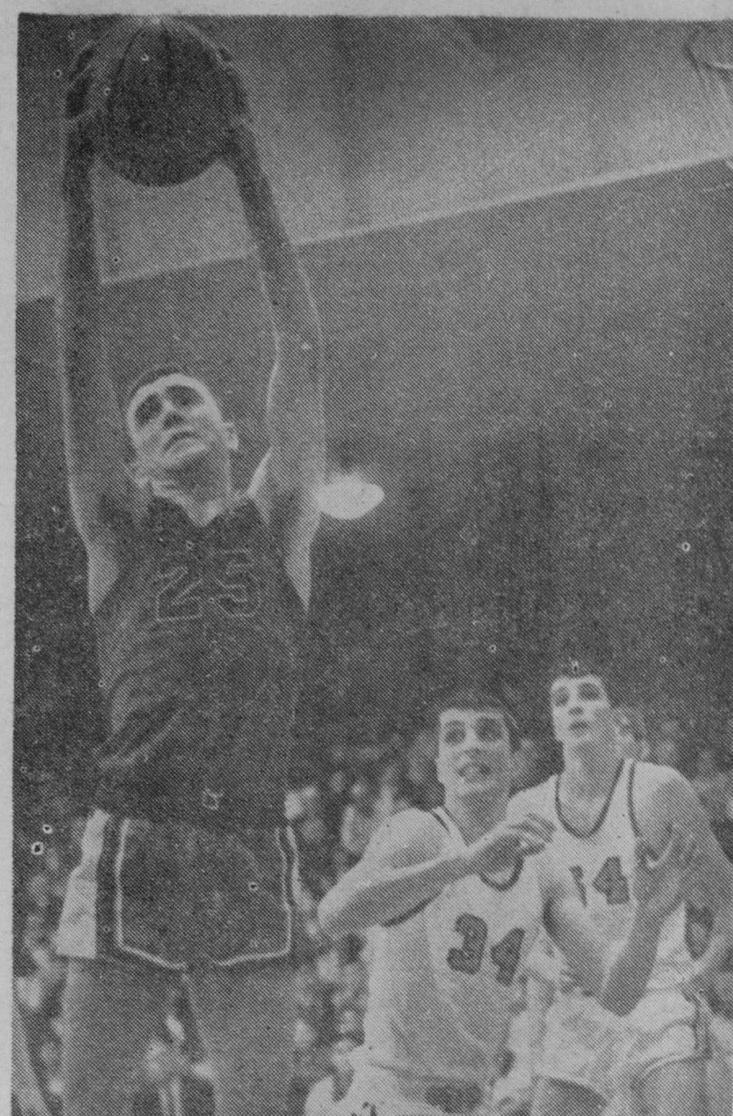
Uninjured in First Street Bridge Accident Sat.

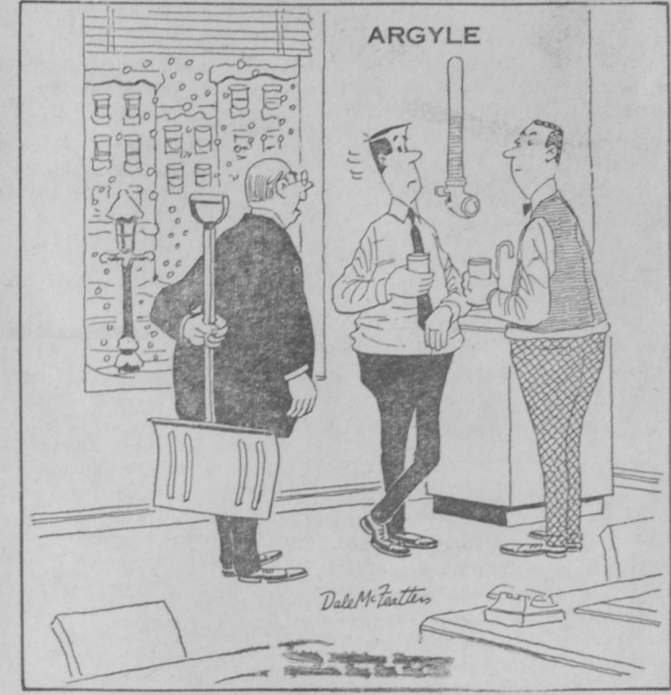
West Branch, which defeated Tawas last Friday night, drew a bye and the opening game March 2 finds Oscoda meeting Tawas.
