Snow Conditions Appear Ideal for Annual Event

Silver Valley Committee members have their fingers crossed—weather conditions seem to be perfect for the 27th annual Tawas winter sports carnival to be staged this week-end.

While business at the valley has been poor since the start of the current season because of the lack

of snow, ski slopes now have a good base and a topping of five to six inches of new snow. Last season, a thaw spoiled carnival activities.

James Campbell, winter sports chairman, said that all facilities would be in operation for the annual outdoor carnival. New snow last week sparkled on pine trees at the winter sports park last Saturday and Sunday as crowds of outdoor enthusiasts reached a season peak.

Festivities this week-end will be complete with selection and crowning of a winter sports queen and various indoor and outdoor activities.

The festival starts Friday night with the annual stag fish fry to be held this year at the Barne's Hotel. This event is one of the most popular of its type in Northern Michigan and always draws a good crowd of business, industrial and tourist leaders from throughout the state.

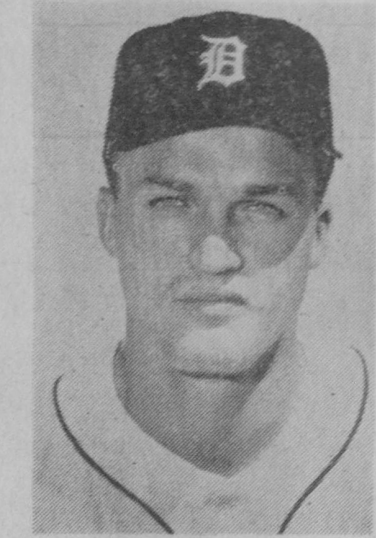

T. S. 'Ted' Dimmick Sells ET Business; Moves to Arizona

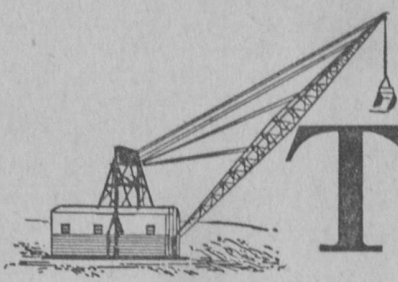

Isosco's Child Care Costs Zoom With 108 Cases

An appropriation of \$8,396 was transferred into the county's child care fund last Thursday by the board of supervisors to meet the ever-increasing cost of caring for wards of the probate court.

This action came at the request of Probate Judge William McCready, who pointed out that a specific allocation from Isosco was required in order to be eligible for state funds. The state reimburses 90 percent of the first \$2,000 expended and 50 percent of all expenditures above \$8,396.

According to records in the county clerk's office, a total of \$8,571.88 was expended in 1964 for child care. This money had been appropriated to the fund as required.

The new probate judge pointed out to supervisors that many children had been removed from homes of negligent parents during the past year and that they were now wards of the county. Recent expenses have risen to more than \$1,000 a month.

"I expect to impress on these

negligent parents that they are responsible for their children and where there is an ability to pay, they will be reimbursing the county for the expense of caring for children in foster homes," said Judge McCready.

He said that the problem being experienced by Isosco is nationwide, inasmuch as a recent survey indicated that 58 percent of all crimes reported last year were committed by persons under 19 years of age.

Mrs. George Rose, juvenile officer of the court, reported that 108 juvenile cases had been processed in probate court during the past year. There are 46 active cases at present.

Perchville Program Nearly Complete

A full week-end of activities is being planned February 19-21 during the second annual Perchville Festival to be held on the ice of Tawas Bay.

One of the top features will be awarding of a Polaris snow-traveler to some lucky visitor. Authorization to purchase this unit at a cost of \$750 was given at last Thursday night's meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

This year's event will coincide with the visit of the Michigan Outdoor Writers Association, which is to hold its convention here that week-end.

Ice at the bight of Tawas Bay will again come to life with snow-traveler rides, airplane rides, snow plane rides, sleigh rides, a skating rink, plus races and games for children and adults.

Several hundred dollars worth of prizes will be given throughout the day on Saturday and Sunday.

The Saginaw Bay Snow-Plane Rescue Squadron's 1965 championship race, which is viewed annually by thousands of people, will be one of the highlights Saturday.

A committee is to be on the ice all day Saturday to select a girl

Cederberg's Liaison Officer to Visit Isosco

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg has announced that his district liaison representative, Walter Nakkula, will be at the Isosco County Building on Thursday, February 11, between the hours of 2:00 to 4:00 p. m. to confer with any residents of the county having problems in which the federal government is involved.

This is the first of periodic visits Congressman Cederberg's representative will make to this county as part of the congressman's plan to keep in touch with the citizens.

The Bay City congressman has been assigned to the senior Republican position on the appropriations subcommittee on military construction. This subcommittee handles all defense appropriations involving acquisition of land and construction of military projects, not only in the United States, but also this country's military installations around the world.

News Stands Asked to 'Police' Smut Peddlers

East Tawas Council Monday night asked news stand owners and magazine distributors to cooperate in a program which would eliminate smut literature from the local market.

A film, "Citizens for Decent Literature," was shown during the meeting by the Rev. Fr. Arthur C. Mulka, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church. Letters protesting obscene literature were also read from area ministers urging the council's support in the program.

It was emphasized by the film that such literature in the hands of impressionable youngsters could very well lead to extreme consequences. This has been the case in many communities, it was stated.

Police Chief Donald Docking re-

ported that he had inspected several news stands in the Tawas and found that two "national newspapers" of the sensational type contained obscene literature and pictures. Councilmen were of the same opinion when a sample magazine was placed before them.

Emphasizing that they were not seeking to censor what was being read, councilmen appealed to the reasonable decency of local merchants and magazine distributors to police their own news stands.

City fathers warn, however, that East Tawas' ordinance covering obscene literature would be enforced if steps were not taken to correct the situation.

In other business, City Assessor Deloise (Dewey) Durant was au-

Tawas Trailers Moves Into Modern Factory Building

A dream of two years' in the making has finally come true for owners and employees of Tawas Trailers, Incorporated.

After operating out of three different locations since its establishment here in March 1963, Tawas Trailers is now in the process of setting up its production line in a brand new building.

"We hope to be back in full production sometime this week," states B. J. (Ben) Tarnosky, president of the firm. "It is sure going to seem good to get into a nice warm building."

This thought was echoed during the break period last Friday by employees of the firm, who were clustered around an oil drum wood stove used to heat a warehouse which has served as the firm's temporary location since early October.

Until this week, the former warehouse of the old Anderson Coach Company plant had served as the assembly line for Tawas Trailers. (A travel trailer served as the firm's office.) Built of concrete blocks with a concrete slab roof, the building lacked a central heating plant and temperature has hovered around 36 degrees inside the structure for several weeks. When sun melted snow on the roof, water poured through in a regular torrent.

No one was complaining, however, as the building has served a useful purpose since the fire October 6 which destroyed the firm's former location and most of its equipment. It was the only building available in the area for temporary quarters.

Starting last Friday, the firm shut down its production line and

began moving equipment into its new 60 by 216-foot concrete block building at Tawas Centre.

Construction on the new building started three weeks after the disastrous fire. Owned by Truman Barbier, East Tawas businessman, the \$45,000 building is being leased by Tawas Trailers.

"With this clear span working area, we will finally have enough room to set up an efficient production line," stated Clyde Montgomery, vice president of the firm. "The new building offers plenty of room for storage of material right along the production line. This should save many steps."

Ronald Korthals, secretary-treasurer of the firm, pointed to four huge overhead oil furnaces which, he said, offered zone controlled heating in the building. Offices, storage rooms and restrooms are located along the wall fronting on US-23. Two huge doors are located on the south end of the building and smaller doors are located along the side for delivery of materials. James Campbell had charge of constructing the building for Barbier.

Adequate work room will be somewhat of a novelty for the

firm. When first established, its production line was located in a 40 by 100-foot building formerly occupied by Huron Rustic Furniture Company in Tawas City. Its later location in the old coach company building, measuring 60 by 300 feet, had plenty of space but was not as compact as the new building and harder to heat. Roof supports in the old warehouse made it difficult to set up a convenient production line.

Prior to the fire last fall, Tawas Trailers had employed 35 persons. Today, there are some 17 employees and this number will grow when the new production line is set up.

"Our 1965 model Tawas Brave travel trailers have met with excellent reception by dealers and the public during several recent shows and we are looking forward to a good year," stated Korthals.

The Braves have come a long way since the spring of 1963. Because of a low ceiling in the first location, trailers had to be moved outside for final assembly. Now, less than two years later, Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, has a modern new home and prospects of good business.

Spicer to Make Engineering Survey in February on Proposed Sewer Lines

Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw is to start mapping plans for proposed sanitary sewer extensions along US-23 south from Mathews Street sometime during February.

Approved last week by the water-sewer board, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz told the Tawas City Council Monday night that many changes had been made in property along US-23 since the project was first considered in 1950 and that plans prepared in 1953 would have to be revised accordingly.

Property owners on each side of US-23 to the river bridge have petitioned for establishment of a special assessment district to finance cost of the project. Originally, only those property owners on the lake side had requested sanitary sewer.

Bublitz told councilmen that the state now requires a 40 percent grade for sanitary sewer, rather than the 30 percent when plans were approved nearly 12 years ago. As a result, the line could not reach the bridge at this new grade as it would be above ground.

"Spicer Engineering hopes to be able to work this problem out with the state," said Bublitz.

The city superintendent also said that the DPW and engineering consultants were going to give serious consideration to crossing Tawas River so as to form a direct line to the disposal plant, rather than to connect with existing sewer

er in the vicinity of Mathews Street.

Requests for easements are to be sent to each property owner along the lake side. Legality of those on file are to be checked by City Attorney Alf C. Watson.

While installation of these two lines poses some problems, Bublitz emphasized that installation was very important to those living along US-23 and the entire community. He pointed out that it was the last major area of the city not already served by sanitary sewer and that complaints had been heard concerning pollution of the river and lake by faulty septic tanks.

In other business, the council approved paying \$18 to election board workers for the February 15 primary.

Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants, East Tawas, was required for the coming year as city auditors.

City Treasurer Ruth Albertson presented her third quarterly report on city finances.

A report from the joint East Tawas-Tawas City Water Board indicated that Tawas City would be allowed to increase its quarterly payment to \$4,450 in order to eliminate a larger payment at the end of each year. The water board owes an addition \$1,700 this year because of an increased amount of water used. Actual cost to the city is 21 cents per thousand gallons. Officers re-elected to the joint (See CITY COUNCIL, page 8.)

School Board in Preliminary Budget Talks

Preliminary consideration of a 1965-1966 budget was discussed at Thursday night's meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Operating expenses for the 1964-1965 year will total \$570,440, of which \$330,701 represents salaries of teachers.

An exploratory budget presented by Supt. Reynold Mick showed a total income of \$586,350. He explained that this was only a "guesstimate," however, as there is no definite figure to use for state aid.

Receipts from taxes probably would be \$243,000, based on a levy of nine mills against a \$27,000,000 valuation of the school district. Using one proposed formula, the school would receive state aid of \$286,250 based on 1,650 pupils.

"We may get more or we may get less," said Mr. Mick. "However, we do have to start planning for next year."

The tentative budget included consideration of one additional English teacher and one additional grade teacher. It also included proposals for salary increases.

Mrs. Norman Payea and Secretary Walter Niles are to meet with representatives of the school faculty to discuss salary proposals for the coming year. Action on salary offers is to be taken in February.

The budget submitted by Mr. Mick also took into consideration a new roof for the Tawas City general purpose room; tar and chips for the parking lot at the high school; driveway at the Tawas City Elementary Unit; parking area at the East Tawas Elementary Unit; replacement of two rooms of furniture at the Tawas City unit; continued painting of rooms at the East Tawas unit; repaint old rooms at the Tawas City unit; repaint cornices on the high school building.

Other items of possible consideration included toilet facilities at the football field. Costs on this are to be obtained by Trustees Donald Deering and Walter Champion, as well as information on a track and additional seating at the football field.

In other business, the board authorized installing a physical educational program in the elementary grades during the second semester, under direction of Mrs. Arlene Brown.

"We now have the facilities at each elementary unit and it would only be a matter of scheduling," said Mr. Mick. He felt it would be a better utilization of the staff and believed that as many youngsters as possible should participate in the program.

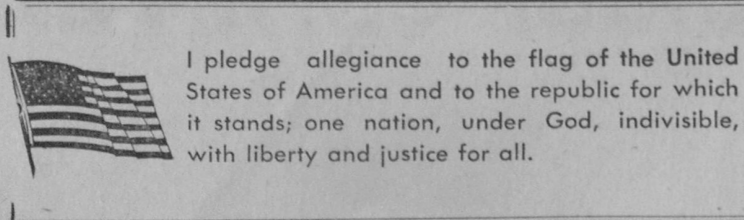
MINOR HURTS

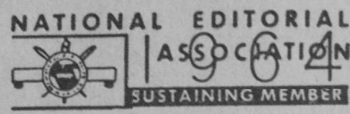

Free Vaccination of Calves in Infected Herds Stopped

Livestock farmers will be interested to know that regulation 142, which stipulates that calves in a brucellosis infected herd may be vaccinated at no cost to the owner, has been amended and the free vaccination provision in the regulation has been removed. Therefore, effective February 15, there will be no more free vaccination of calves in brucellosis infected herds of cattle in the State of Michigan.

Marvin Davenport, county extension director, advises that beef and dairy livestock owners continue to maintain their vaccination program against brucellosis. "A let down now could prove disastrous," states Mr. Davenport.

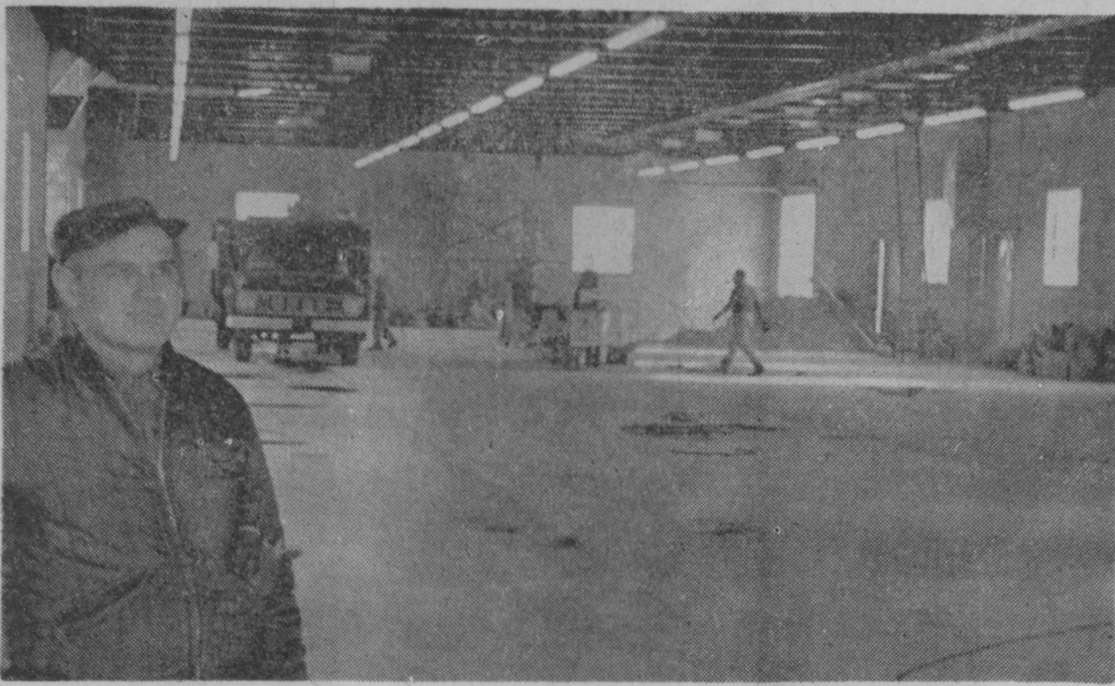

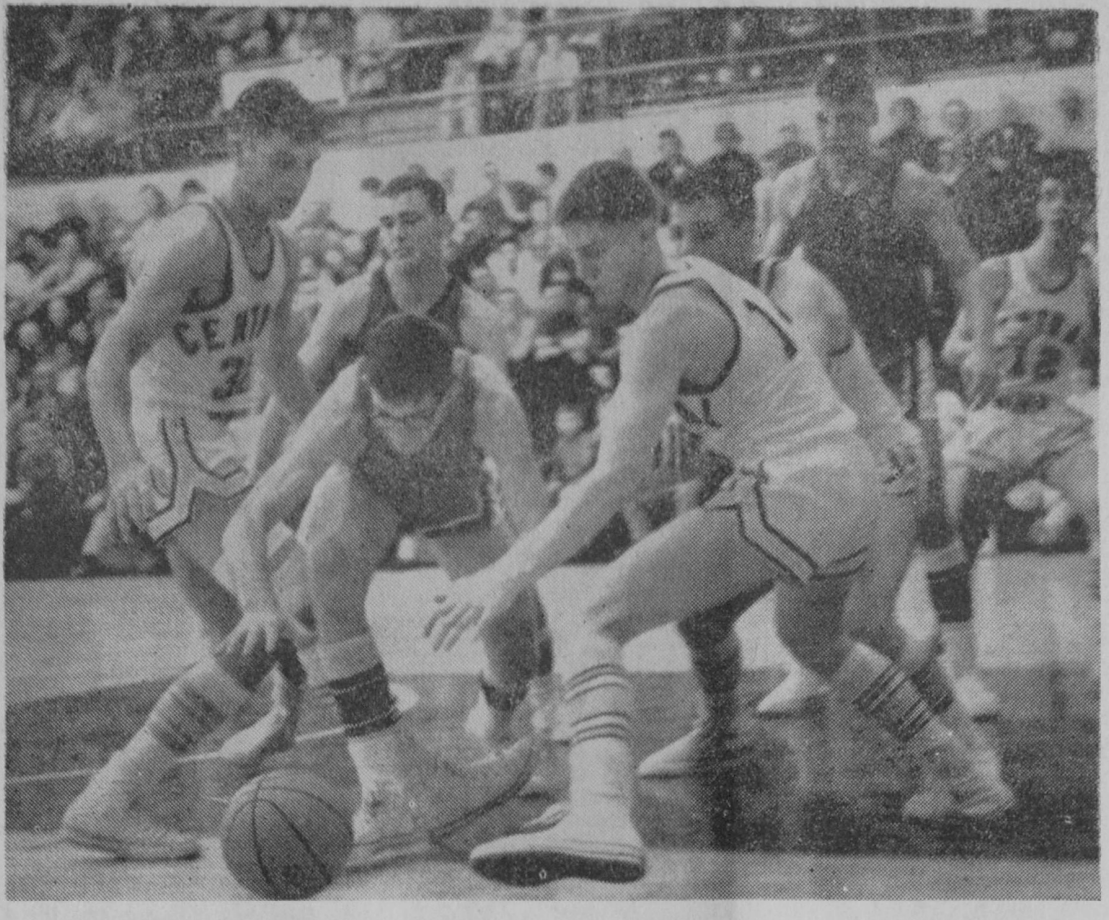
Lightning struck at Standish for the second year in a row as the Braves salvaged a win in the last seconds of the game, 52-51. The score was identical to that between these two schools last year and the game was nearly a carbon copy of that previous tilt.

Central battled Tawas to a standstill in the first half, although both teams had one of their poorer nights as far as ball handling and shooting were concerned. A break one way or the other could have sent either of these supercharged teams into a scoring orbit, but as it turned out, the game was a cliffhanger throughout.

It's Girl Scout Cookie Time—Feb. 5 Date Set

It's girl scout cookie time! On February 5, junior, cadette and senior girl scouts will be out taking orders for their well-known five kinds of cookies. The delivery of the cookies ordered will be made between March 26 and April 5.

Mitten Bay Girl Scout Council depends on United Funds, community chests and council campaigns for its operating budget. However, the cost of operating, maintaining and developing camps is paid for by proceeds from the cookie sale. Although the major profit from each box of cookies sold goes into the camping fund, troops do receive five cents for each box sold. In addition, one cent per box goes into the camper fund to enable girls who cannot afford the entire fee to attend camp.

This coming summer, cookie profits will subsidize budgets for all camps including troop cabins so that fees can continue lower than actual cost, pay insurance and upkeep for camp building and contents, furnish equipment necessary for day, troop and established camps and round up, rebuild Chipmunk Grove Unit at Camp Oak Hills, extend water lines to units at Camp Wigwah Trails, build latrines at Camp Alleba.

Profits from last year's cookie sale were used to subsidize all camp fees; provide troop camp tents, files and equipment; provide tents and equipment for troop camp core staff at Wigwah Trails; build four latrines at Camp Wigwah Trails.

This council-wide project will benefit all members of the organization through the complete camp program provided for all girls seven through 17 years old. Last year, 38 percent of this council's girls had a camping opportunity.

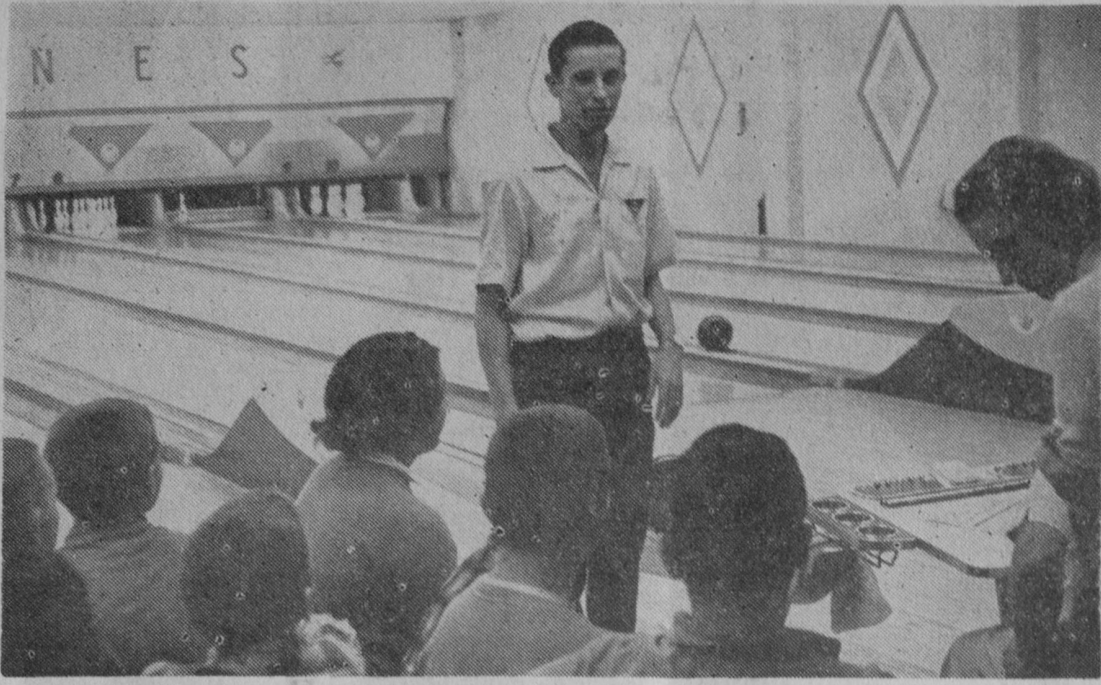

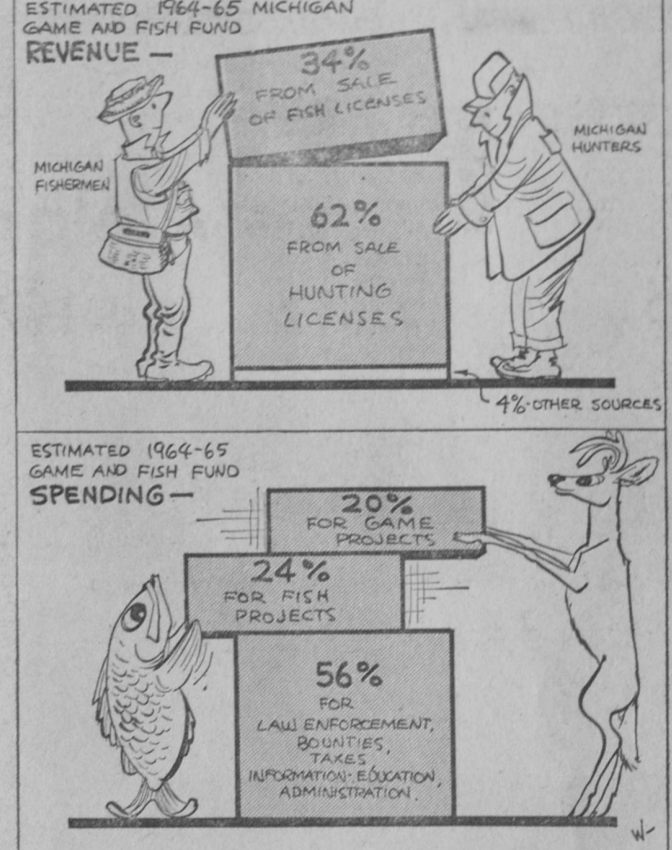

Anglers Pay Less, Get More



For every dollar anglers pay into Michigan's game and fish programs through license fees, hunters ante up \$2. On the other side of the coin, a bigger chunk of these incoming monies is spent on fisheries programs than game work. In short, fishermen are getting more than their money's worth. In a move toward better balance, expected to hike annual revenue some \$700,000, the Conservation Commission has approved a series of fishing license changes for the Legislature's consideration in 1965. As proposed, the annual resident license fee would be raised from \$2 to \$3 and broadened to cover wives of licensed resident anglers and Great Lakes fishermen. By extending the license requirement to the Great Lakes, needed funds would be collected to finance planned development of sport fishing in these waters. Another change calls for doing away with the \$2 trout stamp to provide greater flexibility in spending fish program funds. Also sought is a five-day license, costing \$2 for resident and out-of-state fishermen alike. This would attract the once-a-year fisherman, particularly the non-resident who may not fish now because of the higher annual fee.

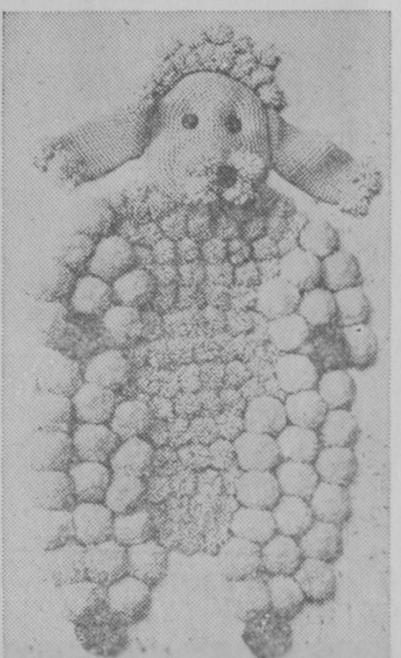

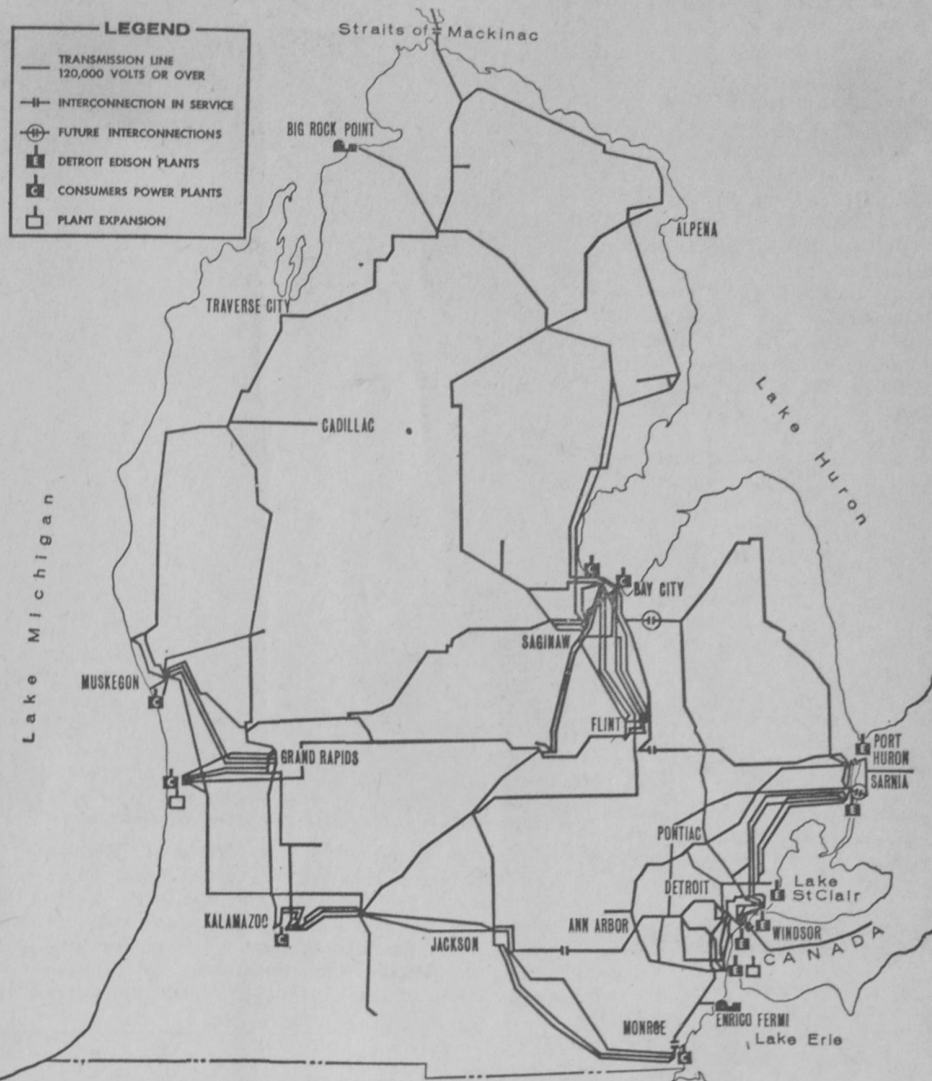

Board Hears Report on Co-Op Training Program

Eleven "hand-picked" students are participating in the cooperative training program being conducted by Tawas Area High School and local businesses this year. According to a report at Thursday night's meeting of the board of education, school authorities were very selective in placing outstanding students this year in order to get the program off the ground. Robert Reasner, who directs the program, said that the school had only scratched the surface in its first effort toward offering on-the-job training of students. This vocational education and guidance program offers additional education opportunities to students and also proves to be an asset to local business. It provides a means of training young people to take a meaningful and responsible place in the community. It provides a resource of skilled or semi-skilled personnel to fill future employment vacancies as well as furnishing seasonal or emergency help. Under the program, a student is released from a portion of his school time in order to have the opportunity to work in a local business. There, the student receives the necessary guidance and training in order that he might have the opportunity to develop skills and abilities required to take a responsible place in the organization. Wages are paid to the student and also received credit in school, providing he makes satisfactory progress. Securing dependable students who wish to participate in the program, especially boys, is one of the principal problems encountered by the school. Reasner said that the program should be designed to encourage participation of those students who would not go on to schools of higher learning. Ernest W. Jordan, principal, has suggested that a testing program be developed to determine vocational interest of students. Tests are given to those students who plan to attend college and Jordan said there was no reason why a test could not be developed to determine vocational potential. The representative stated that the firm may ask the tax commission to establish valuation of its dams on the Ausable River. Supervisor George Blust reported that the county planning commission was coordinating publishing of a new advertising brochure for Iosco in conjunction with local chambers of commerce. Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda has been named as Iosco's representative to the National Association of Counties. An additional appropriation of \$3,100 was transferred to the county airport fund. The acting auditor general also directed special attention to certain statutory and accounting requirements in connection with the operation of Old Orchard Park, the county treasurer, county clerk, county road commission, register of deeds, regional library, county airport, social welfare board and sheriff. Green directed all audit exceptions to the attention of Henry Oates, chairman of the board of supervisors (in a separate letter), and also to the attention of the individual county agencies involved. He further requested that action be taken to clear all audit exceptions and that a report be made to him on the action taken.
