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

(Continued from page 1.) the instructors. After two meet ngs and considerable discussion, the majority of members of the staff decided this would not really alleviate the burden of the extra time that the effective English teacher must spend outside the school hours in correcting themes, every day, every week all the school year. Teachers felt that the best help would be an extra free period during the day and a limited student load. An extra English nstructor would be required.

Elementary teachers felt that they need some time during the day away from the children; that s, a quiet time to themselves. They suggest a duty-free period at noon. This would possibly require three people at the East Tawas unit and two at the Tawas City unit. Elementary teachers, who presently supervise during the lunch hour, feel that a duty-free noon hour would make it possible for them to return to the children in the afternoon refreshed and

ready for work. Alexander said that the reports presented to the board were "our answers to your questions." He said that the answers should not be construed to be a demand for pay raises. If the recommendations were followed, it would bring pay for extra work up to the average paid in other schools.
