

Tiger Player Set as Banquet Speaker

George Thomas, utility player for the Detroit Tigers, will hit the winter banquet circuit next month when he is a principal speaker at the Silver Valley winter sports banquet.

Announcements that Thomas had accepted an invitation to take part in the annual winter carnival was made this week by O. E. Ostrander, program chairman.

Thomas and Neal K. Fenkell,

director of group sales and special events for the Tigers, are scheduled to take part in the banquet Saturday, February 6, at the Holland Hotel.

Signed out of the University of Minnesota in 1957 by the Tiger organization, Thomas progressed in the Tiger farm system and made the grade with the parent club in 1961. As the Tigers moved out ahead in the early weeks of that season, Thomas was an infrequent participant and was released to the Los Angeles Angels on waivers.

He had been in only 17 games for the Detroit team. With the Angels, he got to play in 79 games, filling in at shortstop and third base when not on picket duty and he wound up with 13 home runs, 59 runs batted in and a .274 batting average.

Thomas spent the first four months of the 1962 season in military service and, although he played with the army team at Fort Lewis, Washington, he had difficulty readjusting to major league competition when he rejoined the Angels in August.

To bring him back as a utility man, the Tigers gave up Paul Foytack, veteran pitcher, and Frank Kostro, rookie infielder, just before the trade deadline June 15, 1962.

Invest \$4,750,000—

Consumers Power Co. Announces Expansion

Consumers Power Company will invest \$4,750,000 in its Bay City division during 1965 on projects to expand and improve electric and natural gas service.

Bay City Division Manager Louis A. Vaupre announced today (Wednesday).

SOME \$3,000,000 will be invested in projects to strengthen and expand the electric transmission and electric distribution systems serving division customers.

Transmission line projects are those involving high-voltage installations; such as, the projects to extend new 138,000-volt power supply to the Alpena area which is due for completion this year. Distribution projects concern the system which brings power at lower voltages to individual customers.

Vaupre said that the company plans to construct an office and service center at Rose City to provide a more central dispatching point for personnel serving in the central and northwest areas of the division.

He said the new Rose City facilities would serve as headquarters for crews now located at Mio, West Branch and Hale and that some, but not all, employees at Tawas City and Standish would also be assigned to the new center.

The division manager said the company would thus combine a number of scattered operations to

"improve flexibility of crews assigned to maintain good electric service in the general area."

The company expects to add 1,650 new electric customers to its lines in the Bay City division.

Gas department projects will require an investment of more than \$700,000. Mr. Vaupre said, and miscellaneous projects, including construction of office facilities, will require an additional \$575,000.

EXPANSION to the west wing of its present Bay City division service center at 4141 East Wilder Road, adding 5,000 square feet of office space, was also announced. This would provide room for certain departments now housed in the company's downtown Bay City office building.

The company would continue to occupy the downtown building, however, maintaining the sales floor and customer service offices which have been there for many years.

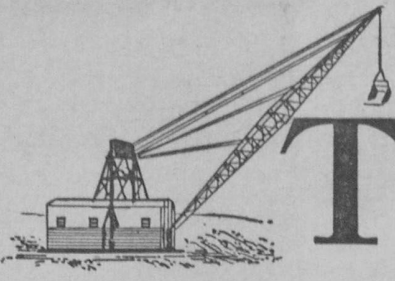
He said the division projects were part of Consumers Power Company's general 1965 expansion program, in which the company will invest more than \$92,000,000 during the year throughout its 66-county service area.

Vaupre added that the company had invested more than \$4,000,000 in Bay City division projects during 1964 to keep pace with the growing needs of its customers in the area.

US-23 Sewer Extension Wins Board Approval

Authorization to obtain engineering on proposed sanitary sewer extensions along US-23 south from Mathews Street was given Monday night by the Tawas City Water and Sewer Board.

Two sets of petitions signed by property owners on each side of the highway, which requested such action by establishment of a special assessment district, were read and placed on file.

The first petition, signed by

nine individual property owners on the lake side of US-23, was circulated by David P. Wyatt. The second petition, signed by 10 property owners on the river side of US-23, was circulated by Millard Peck.

This narrow strip of land between the lake and river has been of concern to the city for years, insofar as the lack of sanitary sewer is concerned. Because of the shortage of space along US-23 and the depth required, the sewer line on the lake side would have to run across private property at the rear of homes in that area.

On the river side, the available property along US-23 narrows just beyond Vic and Zel's Restaurant. That problem can be solved but, because of the depth required, it is doubtful if the line could reach as far as the river bridge.

In any event, property owners signing the petitions have requested prompt action. Water board members indicated they would like nothing better than to provide sanitary service to that area, as it is one of the last sections of the city not serviced. Another reason is that many complaints have been heard in the past concerning operation of private septic tanks in that area.

Both petitions stated the belief that the problem should be handled locally rather than to have action by the state.

While this was the first petition received for sewer on the river side of US-23, engineering was obtained in 1953 for sewer on the lake side. Petitions were received as early as 1949-1950 on the project, but the proposed line ran into a stumbling block when the required easements across private property were not obtained.

The matter has been turned over to City Attorney Alf C. Wajson to plan the proposed special assessment district. After new engineering is obtained, a hearing is to be held.

Wildlife Sanctuary Closed to Public

According to notification received last week by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Jameson Wildlife Sanctuary in Wilber Township will be closed in 1965.

"Due to the extreme pressure of predators, we found it necessary to donate all our birds to the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary, Michigan State University. We are continuing our feeding of the wild ducks and deer visiting the area," states Russell Jameson.

The sanctuary will be closed to the public effective at once.

Jameson Wildlife Sanctuary is one of the beauty spots of Iosco County. Located on Silver Creek in Wilber Township, Jameson purchased the property several years ago from the late Lewis Rodman. It included the site of the old Rodman mill.

The Saginaw industrialist and his wife are very interested in the preservation of wildlife and, when they constructed their new home overlooking the old Rodman mill pond, they established their property as a game refuge.

Jameson is a top-notch photographer and his color movies of wildlife have been enjoyed by many.

REV. HERON FILLS TEACHING POST AT TAWAS AREA

The Rev. Allen Heron, pastor of Hemlock Road and Reno Baptist Churches, has been hired on a temporary basis as an English instructor at Tawas Area High School. He is teaching classes formerly handled by Lawrence DeBeauvoir, who resigned effective January 1 to join a Cadillac television station.

Mr. Heron will teach for about three weeks until Mrs. Lois Fuerst, now a member of Whittemore-Prescott Area School faculty, takes over her new position here. She has been hired to finish out the semester.

Frank Kemmis, 21, a June graduate of Michigan State University, has been signed to complete the school year as a teacher of United States History. He succeeds Ronald Wiltse, who resigned to become principal at Brown City.

Kemmis, a native of Lansing and graduate of Lansing Eastern High School, majored in history at MSU.

Annual Reports Due from County Offices

Real estate mortgages recorded in Iosco County during 1964 had a total value of \$5,111,694. This compared to \$4,882,734 in 1963.

According to Register of Deeds Albert H. Buch, revenue stamps were placed on deeds for land valued at \$5,385,000 during the past year, as compared to \$5,054,000 during 1963.

There were 2,291 chattel mortgages recorded in the office and 481 releases. Receipts of the register of deeds office was \$12,017.50 during 1964.

This information, along with reports from other county offices, is to be read at today's session (Wednesday) of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Svoke, a native of Ironwood, joined the state police as a trooper in 1939 and was first assigned to White Pigeon.

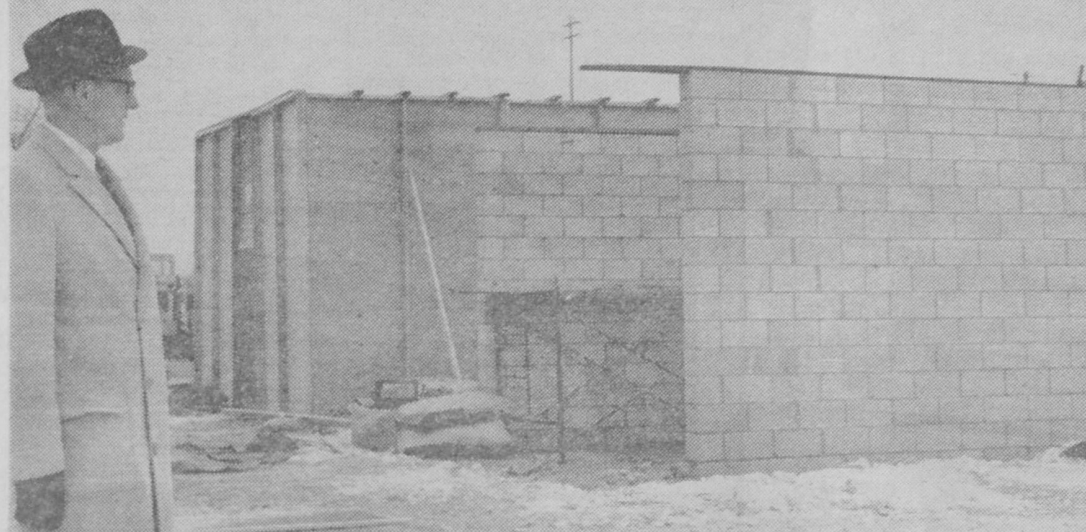
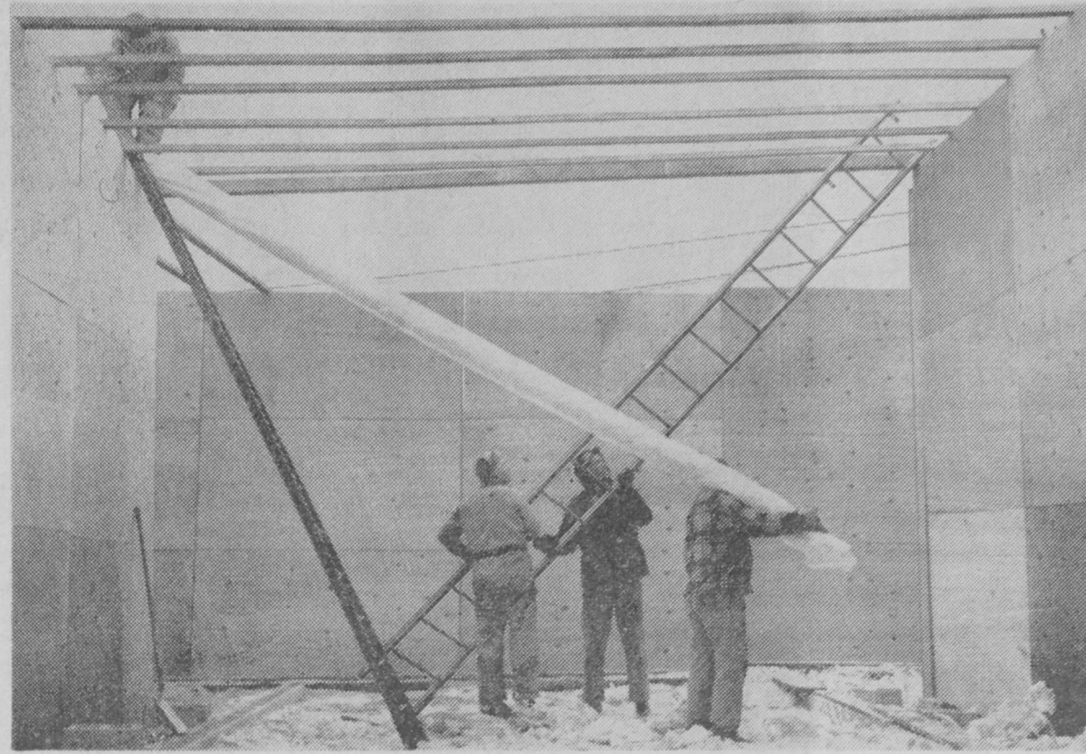
His career also took him to posts at East Tawas, Gladstone, Gaylord and Mt. Pleasant.

Spica Heads D&M's Reorganized Huron Wood Preserving Division

A general reorganization in the management of Huron Wood Preserving, Tawas City, is announced this week by William J. Pinkerton,

executive vice president and general manager of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, parent company of the wood treating firm.

Eugene Spica, formerly manager of Ottawa Equipment Company, becomes manager of the entire Huron Wood operation, including concrete block manufacture and sale.

William Groff will continue to manage the wood treating and aggregate departments under Spica's direction. Arnold Bronson becomes acting manager of the automotive division of Ottawa Equipment Company.

Reorganization was necessitated by the general expansion of Huron Wood Preserving into the concrete block and aggregate business.

Work is now under way on constructing a new block plant in the D&M yards which would be capable of producing 750,000 concrete blocks a year.

A 60 by 40-foot building formerly used as a woodworking shop has been converted for use in the new operation. A Besser block machine is to be moved here from Millersburg (Big Cut) sometime within the next two weeks. Concrete slabs have already been poured for the 17-ton machine.

A crew of five men is presently engaged in constructing a 51 by 90-foot concrete block building which is to be used as a kiln in the curing process. It includes a boiler room and five 13 by 50-foot curing rooms, all heated by steam.

The kiln building is to have a capacity of approximately 7,000 blocks a day. Some five or more men would be employed in the operation.

Campbell Named to Hospital Post

James Campbell, 46, of East Tawas has been named assistant to the administrator of Tawas Hospital. This announcement was made Monday by Sister Rose Helene, SSJ, hospital administrator.

Campbell, who resigned recently from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, will have charge of purchasing, personnel and maintenance at the hospital.

There are about 105 full and part-time employees at the hospital with a total annual payroll of approximately one-half million dollars.

After arriving here last August, Sister Rose Helene said that she had found the hospital needed additional supervision and management, especially in the field of preventative maintenance and evaluation of jobs and salary schedule.

Only a minimum amount of maintenance has been performed on the hospital since its construction in 1952-1953.

On her recommendation, the board of directors hired Campbell as administrative assistant.

Campbell came to the Tawas area in 1954 after having been employed at Detroit by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad for eight years.

A native of Grand Rapids, Campbell attended Aquinas College after graduation from high school. In October 1940, he entered the National Guard as a sergeant and came out as a captain in January

2 Young Men Nominated to Service Schools

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg announced Monday that he has nominated two young men from Iosco County as candidates for United States service schools.

Feeder Pigs a 'Growing' Business on Iosco Farms

Raising feeder pigs in Northern Michigan is not a million dollar industry—yet, it has a good, solid start of becoming a big industry. In 1963, 6,000 were sold and in 1964, almost 7,000 "little squealers" headed for the feedlot to be sold by Southern Michigan swine lots.

According to Marvin Davenport, Iosco County extension director, Iosco County swine raisers contributed over two thirds of the nearly 7,000 feeder pigs consigned to the monthly sales at Hale. Twenty-five consignors did the job.

Ogemaw County had 21 consignors but only 1,021 feeders were consigned by them. Oscoda County has only 10 swine farmers participating which yielded 1,160 little porkers that average 40 pounds at sale time.

"The 12 sales held on the first Thursday of each month throughout the year averaged 573 pigs per sale. With strengthening prices and shifts from other farm income sources, there should be almost 10,000 feeder pigs sold through this cooperative sale by 1966," Davenport stated.

Those producers consigning to each 1964 sale had their 40-pound pigs bring them \$10.34 on the average. Higher quality pigs generally bring more.

Anyone interested in the feeder pig program will find banks and other loaning agencies interested in sound feeder pig producing programs. Proper budgeting, selection of acceptable breeding stock and efficient feeding and housing make up the basis of a sound feeder pig producing program. Cooperative Extension Service, Federal Building, East Tawas, has information for those interested.

Sign-up for 1965 Feed Grain Program To Begin February 8

Sign-up for the 1965 feed grain program, which is basically the same as in 1964, will be from February 8 through March 26. The program is voluntary; combines corn, grain sorghum and barley in a single base; participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre payments and price support loans; offers producers another opportunity to reduce the grain surplus while maintaining or improving feed grain income; will also exert a stabilizing influence on feed grain prices.

Participation of more than a

million farmers in each of the 1961, 1962, 1963 and 1964 programs will result in reducing the feed grain carryover stocks from 85 million tons down to about 58 million tons.

To participate in the program, producers need to reduce their total acreage of corn, grain sorghum and barley by at least 20 percent of their total base. Notice of base, yields and payment rates have been mailed from the Isoco ASC County office.

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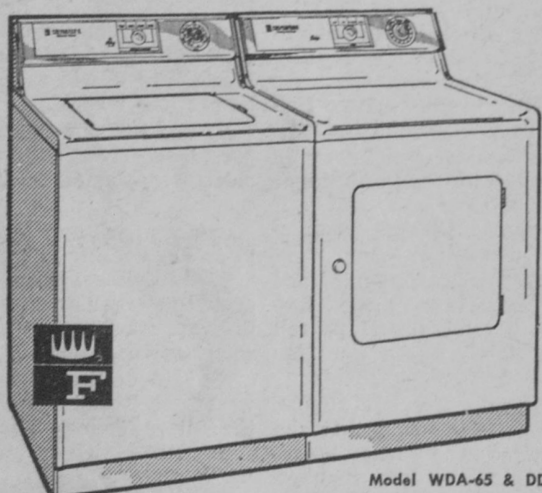
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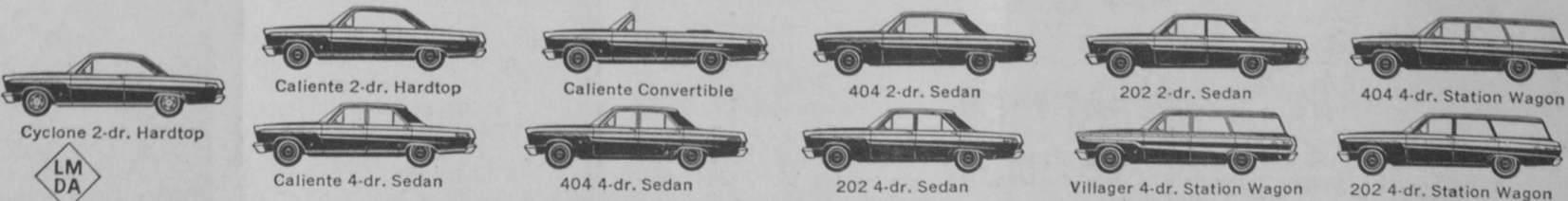

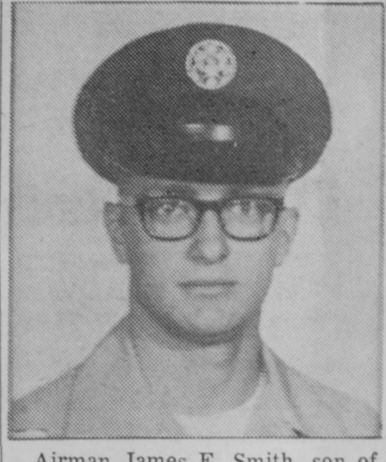
Donley drove in the gymkhana sponsored by the Huron Motor Sports Club during the Tawas Tourist Festival last August.

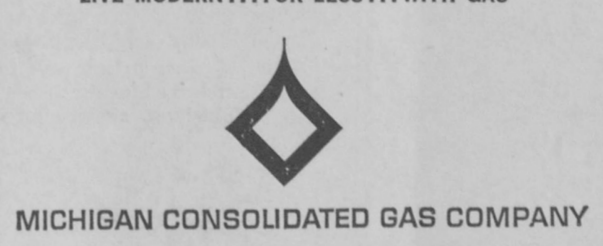

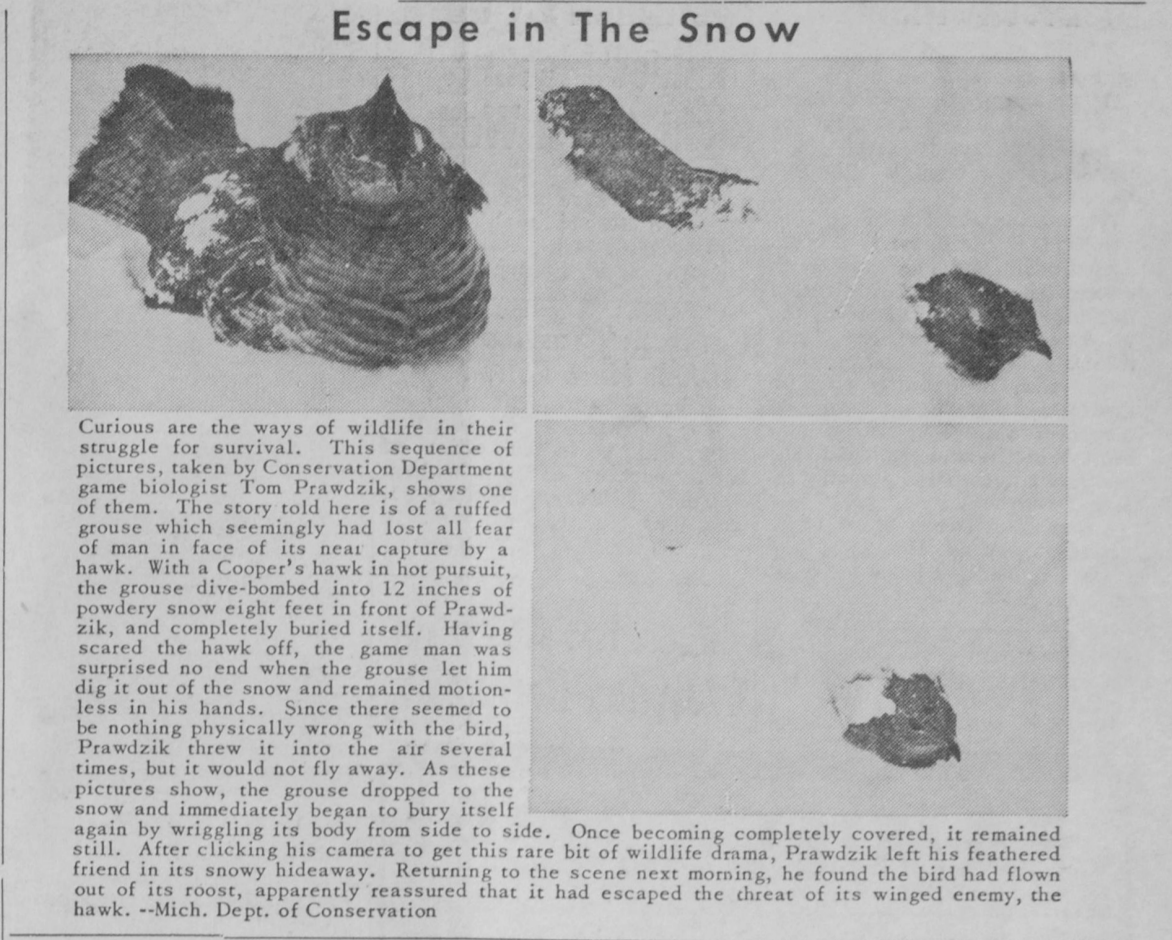

Escape in The Snow
 Curious are the ways of wildlife in their struggle for survival. This sequence of pictures, taken by Conservation Department game biologist Tom Prawdzik, shows one of them. The story told here is of a ruffed grouse which seemingly had lost all fear of man in face of its near capture by a hawk. With a Cooper's hawk in hot pursuit, the grouse dove-bombed into 12 inches of powdery snow eight feet in front of Prawdzik, and completely buried itself. Having scared the hawk off, the game man was surprised no end when the grouse let him dig it out of the snow and remained motionless in his hands. Since there seemed to be nothing physically wrong with the bird, Prawdzik threw it into the air several times, but it would not fly away. As these pictures show, the grouse dropped to the snow and immediately began to bury itself again by wriggling its body from side to side. After clicking his camera to get this rare bit of wildlife drama, Prawdzik left his feathered friend in its snowy hideaway. Returning to the scene next morning, he found the bird had flown out of its roost, apparently reassured that it had escaped the threat of its winged enemy, the hawk. —Mich. Dept. of Conservation

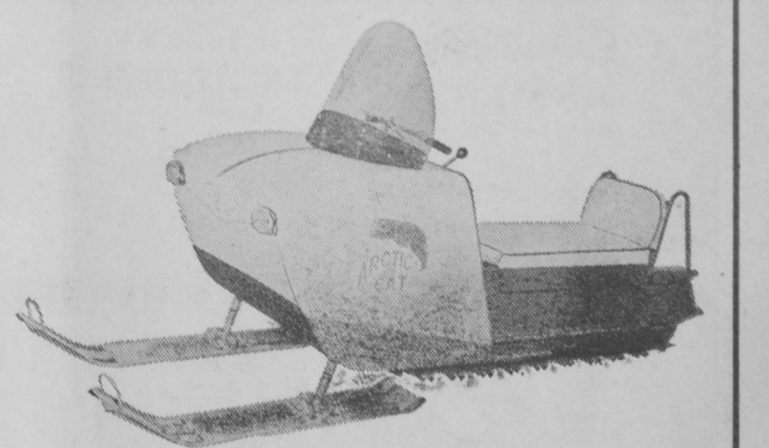

Warns That Many Farm Workers Not Getting SS Credits

"A great many farm workers do not get credit for their work," according to Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City. "Farm wages are reported only once a year," he explained. "For this reason, some farmers forget to keep a complete record of the wages they pay their workers."

Mr. Ellifritz listed two rules that determine when farm wages must be reported for social security. These are:

1. If the worker is paid a total of \$150 or more in cash wages during the year or

2. If the worker works some part of 20 or more days during the year for cash wages figured on a time basis, by the hour, day, etc. The amount paid does not matter.

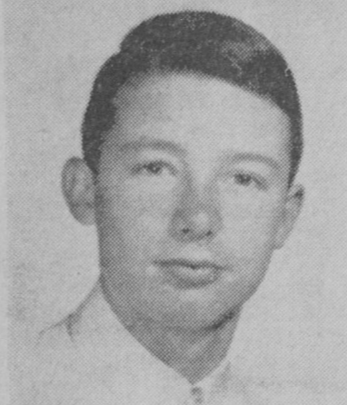
To be sure a record of wages is available at the end of the year, Mr. Ellifritz advised farm employers to keep a list of their employees. Each time a payment is made, it should be shown on the list.

If total wages are less than \$150 for the entire year and the employee did not work 20 days, no social security tax is due on that worker. "Keeping a record during the year takes the guesswork out of reporting," said Mr. Ellifritz.

The farm employer then pays only the taxes that are due and the worker get full credit for his labor."

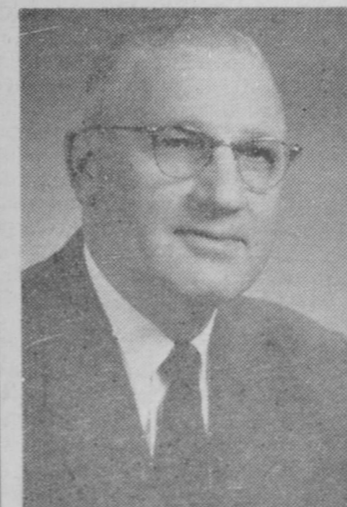

Bunny Bonanza



Rabbit hunting is stirring a lot of excitement these winter days at the Conservation Department's 3,000-acre Rose Lake wildlife research center near East Lansing. And that's a mighty good sign of shooting success on bunnies in other parts of southern Michigan. Generally, as cottontail kill goes at the wildlife center, so goes the rabbit take elsewhere in the southern region. This season, Rose Lake hunters are bagging bunnies at the center's record pace of 1957. In light of this, Department game men say there is a fine chance the region's current harvest will finish near that year's kill mark of about 1.3 million cottontails. Besides at Rose Lake, rabbit hunters can look for top action between now and the season's March 1 closer at southern state game areas which are also managed by the Department and open to the public.
