Warns That Many Farm Workers Not Getting SS Credits

cording to Paul M. Ellifritz, social Association, a past president of security district manager in Bay the Midland Kiwanis Club, a past City. "Farm wages are reported only once a year," he explained. "For this reason, some farmers forget to keep a complete record of the wages they pay their work-

Mr. Ellifritz listed two rules that determine when farm wages must be reported for social security.

1. If the worker is paid a total of \$150 or more in cash wages during the year or 2. If the worker works some part

of 20 or more days during the year for cash wages figured on a time basis, by the hour, day, etc. The amount paid does not matter.

To be sure a record of wages is available at the end of the year, Mr. Ellifritz advised farm employers to keep a list of their employees. Each time a payment is made, it should be shown on the


If total wages are less than \$150 for the entire year and the employee did not work 20 days, no social security tax is due on that worker. "Keeping a record during the year takes the guesswork out Effective February 1, Carlton J. of reporting," said Mr. Ellifritz.


