Romney Coming for Festival

Fireworks, athletic events, a band concert and prizes highlight the third annual Michigan Tourist Festival which opens Thursday in the Tawas.

Two major changes have been made in the festival program. King's Exposition and Circus will be located on US-23 on the lot between Midway Drive-in and the Kroger Store. This will be one of the most entertaining shows ever in this area, featuring four free circus acts each day at 2:30, 4:30, 7:30 and 9:30 p. m.

Most important change is due to the announcement from Lansing that Gov. George Romney will attend the festival on Saturday. The governor, city and chamber officials will conduct the drawing for the trip to the New York World's Fair. This drawing will take place at 1:00 p. m. at the King's Exposition location. The pony and saddle will be awarded at 5:00 p. m.

Governor Romney is to arrive at Isosco County Airport at 12:45 p. m., where he will be welcomed by local officials. He is to proceed directly to the drawing and then be taken on a tour of the new Tawas Point State Park.

This year's event has received considerable state-wide publicity. Representatives of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce made two television appearances during the past week and the festival has been featured in several newspaper articles.

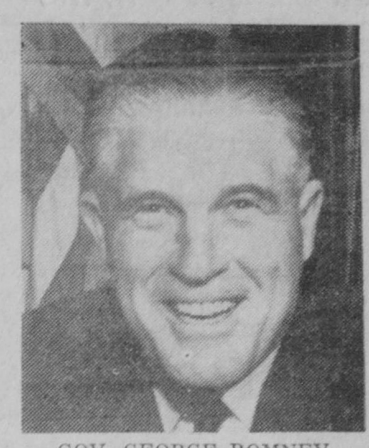
Added to the festival program are two fireworks displays over Tawas Bay, one on Thursday and another Saturday, each display beginning around 9:00 p. m.

Break Ground July 21 for Medical Care Facility

Ground-breaking ceremonies for Iosco County's new medical care facility will be held Wednesday, July 21, 2:00 p. m., at the site located at the corner of Harris Avenue and North Street, Tawas City.

Approved by voters last summer, the structure is to be completed about 11 months from now.

C. S. Everett, chairman of the Iosco Board of Supervisors' welfare committee, said that invitations were being sent to representatives of a number of federal and state agencies.

"A general invitation to attend this event is also being extended to all residents of Iosco County," said Everett.

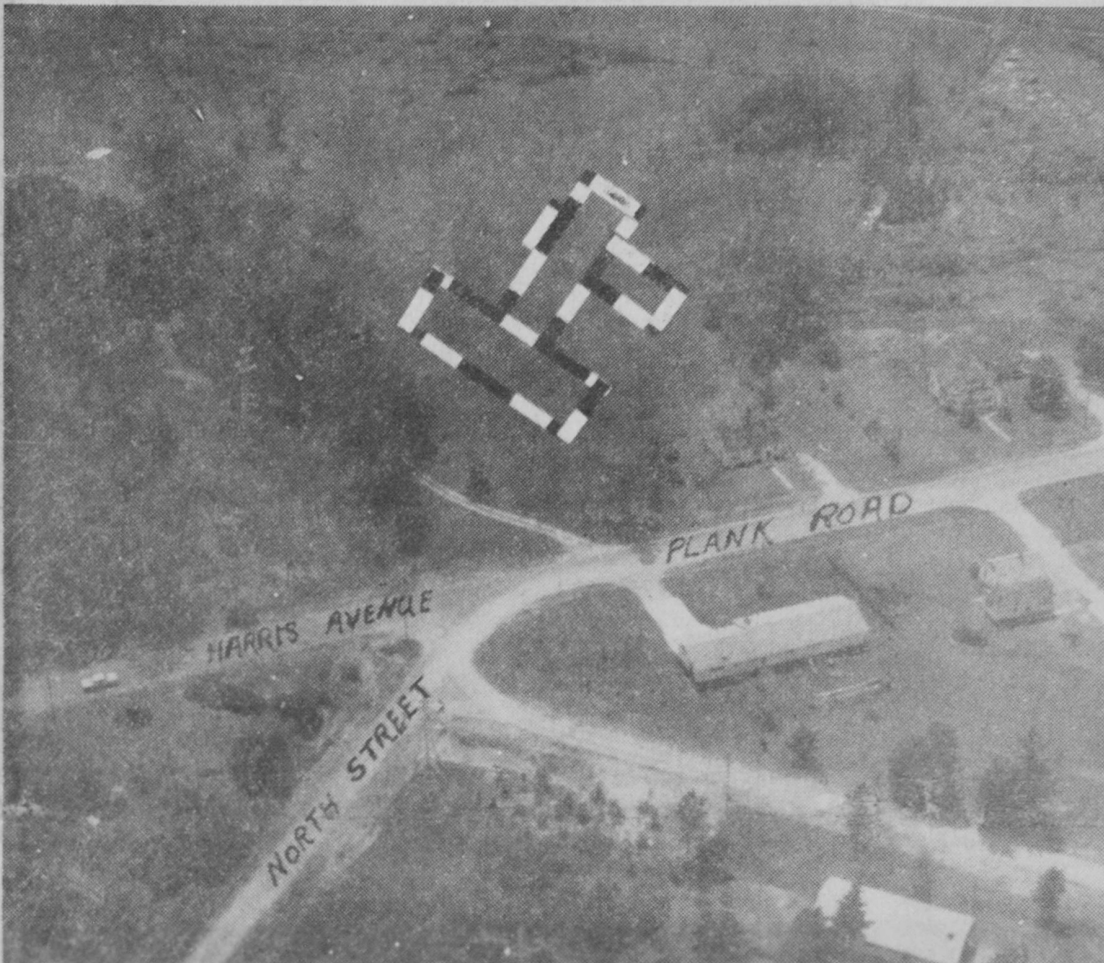
Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller is to be master of ceremonies for the day. Other speakers are to be announced later.

Bids totaling \$475,516 were accepted June 15 and final application for a federal grant in the amount of \$29,000 has been submitted to the Michigan Department of Health. The federal money is to be combined with proceeds from Iosco's \$300,000 general obligation bond issue.

Contractors are L. A. Trapp Construction Company, Grand Rapids, general; Flint Plumbing and Heating, Flint, mechanical; Normsmith Electric, Cheboygan, electrical; Great Lakes Hotel Supply, Detroit, kitchen equipment.

Iosco's new home for the aged, to be located on the former Bradley farm, is to have an 85 by 122-foot administration area, a 44 by 182-foot wing extending toward the west and a 42 by 85-foot wing extending toward the north.

The 50-bed facility is located on an 80-acre tract of land and overlooks a beautiful grove of white pine.

Tawas Tube Strikebound; 2nd in Iosco

Tawas Tube Company yesterday (Tuesday) became the second Iosco County industry to be closed because of a strike by employees.

About 35 men walked off their jobs Tuesday noon and began picking the plant on Ninth Avenue. They are members of United Steel Workers of America, AFL-CIO.

Charles Hayes, president of the union local, and Jerry Hogan, treasurer, representing the negotiating committee, stated that negotiations had been under way on a contract since March 30.

United Steel Workers of America had been named as the bargaining agent following an election in February.

The local union committee has been assisted by Anthony Reinhardt, subdistrict director, and M. P. Schutte, international staff.

Tawas Tube joins National Gypsum Company's plant and quarry facilities in being closed by strikers. National Gypsum employees walked off their jobs June 2 and no headway has been reported on adoption of a new contract.

Appeal Board Agrees on Denial of Permit

In its first official action Monday night, Tawas City's new zoning board of appeals concurred with Zoning Administrator Reginald Bublitz in denying a building application submitted by Joseph S. Brooks.

The hearing was conducted by Appeals Board Chairman Howard Hatton, Third Ward alderman. Members of the board include Clark Tanner, Clyde Evril, Daniel Ulrich, Delano Myles and Cecil Cabbie. Myles is the lone member who is not a councilman, but serves on the city planning commission.

Brooks had requested permission to move an eight by 24-foot metal, van-type trailer on his property located on First Avenue south of First Street near Tawas River for the purpose of storing fish nets and other equipment now situated outside of his building.

Bublitz denied the application on grounds that the present building was allowed as a nonconforming use, which could not be expanded. Brooks then completed necessary steps to appeal the decision, including notification of all interested property owners.

Among property owners attending Monday night's hearing were Mrs. Fred Landon, Wilbert I. Treichel, Fred Luedtke, Frank Byrd, Albert Conklin and Frank Wilkusi.

A three to one roll call vote concurred with action of Bublitz. Favoring denial of the permit were Hatton, Tanner and Myles. Evril cast the only vote in favor of allowing the trailer. Ulrich, a resident of the involved area, disqualified himself from voting. Cabbie was unable to attend the meeting.

Investigate Theft of Commercial Nets

Theft of a 3,600-foot gill net at Point Lookout is under investigation by state police.

Edward Coyle, Tawas City commercial fisherman, told police he set his net in 10 feet of water about 1,200 feet from shore. He returned Monday and the net had disappeared.

The net was valued at \$500, reported Coyle.

Nine Persons Now Employed at Tawas Point State Park

Nine persons are employed this summer at Tawas Point State Park by the Michigan Department of Conservation. Besides Park Supervisor A. Ray Prosch, there is an assistant park supervisor, one "A" park ranger, five "B" park rangers and a clerk typist.

Clifford E. Norman, 46, transferred here recently from Muskegon State Park as assistant park supervisor.

Gerald L. Russell, 39, "A" ranger, transferred from Wilson State Park, Harrison, on May 21.

"B" rangers are Richard K. Hillman, 22, who worked at East Tawas State Park last summer; Peter C. McKenna, 21; John E. Fletcher, 28; Edward D. Jackson, 44, and Robert E. McDonald, 28. The last four named rangers are in their first year of state employment. McDonald is a member of Tawas Area High School faculty.

Mrs. Peggy Depuydt, clerk typist, started work for the parks department on May 21.

Dr. Earl A. Hasty, 62, Died at West Branch

Dr. Earl A. Hasty, 62, director of Michigan Public Health Unit No. 2, died Monday at his West Branch home following a two-year illness.

Well known throughout Northeastern Michigan, Dr. Hasty practiced medicine at Whittemore for 17 years before moving to West Branch in 1947.

Former chief of staff of Tolfree Hospital, Dr. Hasty retired from active practice in 1957 when he assumed duties as public health director in Iosco, Ogemaw, Alcona and Oscoda Counties.

Born at Sterling, Arenac County, March 8, 1903, he grew up in that town and at Standish. In the spring of 1929, he graduated from the University of Michigan Medical School.

He entered St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw, for a year of intern work before becoming associated with Dr. C. S. Tarter at Sterling for four months.

On November 12, 1930, Dr. Hasty opened his practice at Whittemore. There, he was married to the former Miss Mildred Albertson at Whittemore Methodist Church.

He was a member of West Branch Masonic Lodge No. 376.

An avid outdoorsman, Dr. Hasty and several other professional men of the Tawas area established the Wilber Hunting Club in the 1930s, which has since grown to an area comprising more than three sections of hunting land. He and Harold Gould of East Tawas made hunting expeditions to Alaska and British Columbia in 1953-1954.

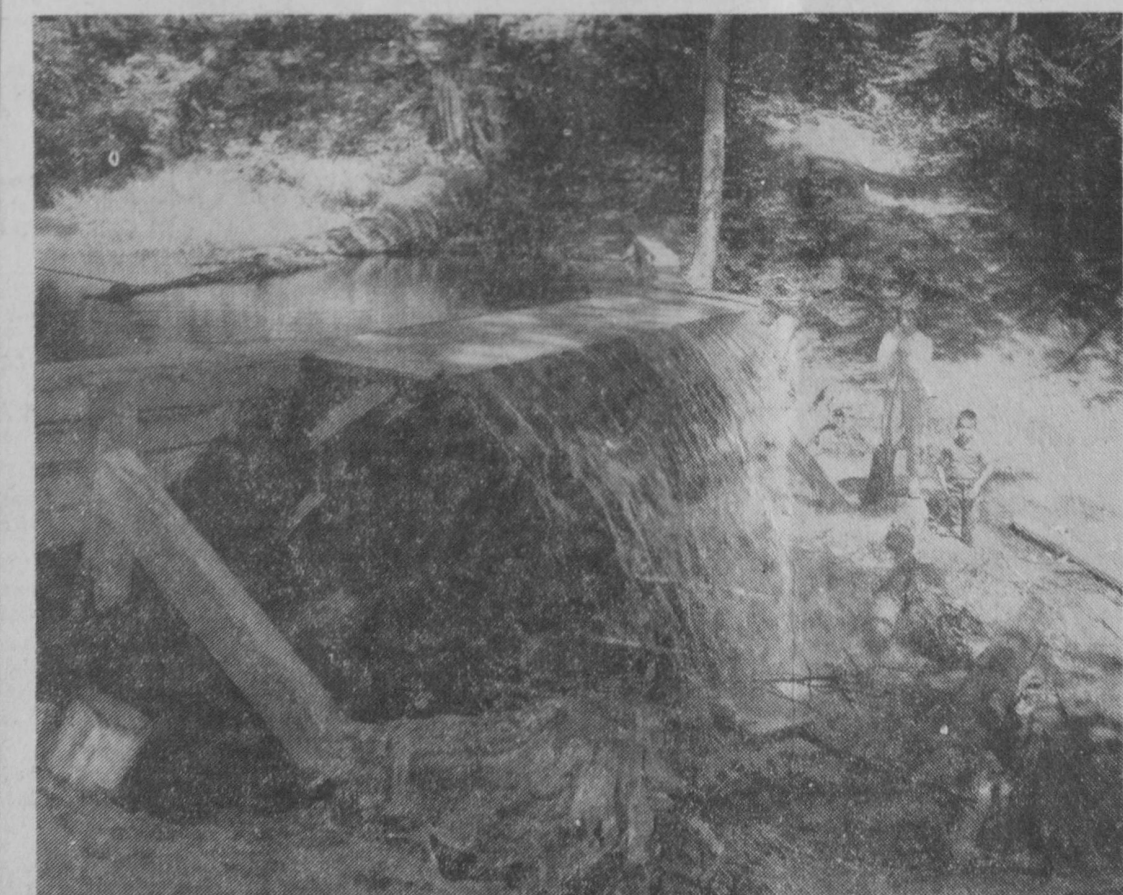
Besides his wife, Dr. Hasty is survived by one son, James W. of West Branch; two daughters, Mrs. Helen Jennings of West Branch and Mrs. Marjorie Fletcher, Bay City; seven grandchildren; two brothers, William Hasty of Sterling and Jack Hasty of Prudenville; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Averill and Miss Julia Hasty, both of Prudenville.

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 p. m. Thursday from Stencornal Funeral Home, West Branch. Burial will be in Sterling Cemetery with the Rev. Dorraine Snogren officiating.

A memorial fund is being established in his name at the West Branch Methodist Church.

School Board Hikes Pay of Cooks and Bus Drivers

Pay raises to bus drivers and kitchen employees were approved Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education. Last month, the board gave its approval to raising wages of building custodians.

A \$15 per month increase was voted for bus drivers, who are now paid \$125 per month for less than 50 miles daily, \$135 for 50 to 100 miles and \$145 for the lone driver over 100 miles daily.

In addition, drivers under the above schedule who have a noon kindergarten run receive \$65. Under the new pay schedule, such drivers would receive \$72.50.

A 10-cent hourly pay increase was voted for kitchen employees. Three head cooks now are to receive \$1.50, experienced employees as cooks helpers are to receive \$1.30, new employees as cooks helpers are to receive \$1.10. Pay schedule of students on lunch line and student dish washers is to remain at 60 cents and 70 cents per hour, respectively.

Notices have been set for bids on oil, gas, milk and bread to be considered at the August 9 meeting.

With two potential bidders sitting on the board of education, the department of public instruction is being asked for a ruling on bids from such members. It was pointed out Monday night by Pres. Leonard Sarki that the two members, Clyde Soper and Carl Helmer, are local agents rather than actual owners of the firms they represent. Soper is a dairy products distributor and Helmer is distributor of petroleum products.

Sarki was of the opinion that because Soper and Helmer were agents rather than owners, they should be eligible to submit bids.

Death Takes Iosco's Drain Commissioner

E. H. (Bert) Stickney, 72, of Oscoda, Iosco County drain commissioner, died Tuesday noon at Tawas Hospital. Mr. Stickney had been ill for some years and was taken to the hospital Sunday morning after suffering a heart attack.

Edward Herbert Stickney was born October 30, 1892, at Tawas City, the son of Frank B. and Mary M. Stickney. He attended school in Tawas City.

He was employed by the United States Forest Service in 1916 and later served with the United States Marines during World War I.

On June 16, 1917, he married the former Miss Marvel Ellis of Oscoda.

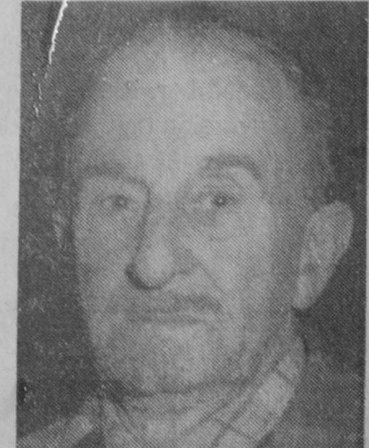
After military service, Mr. Stickney returned to Oscoda where he was employed by Consumers Power Company. He retired from that company eight years ago.

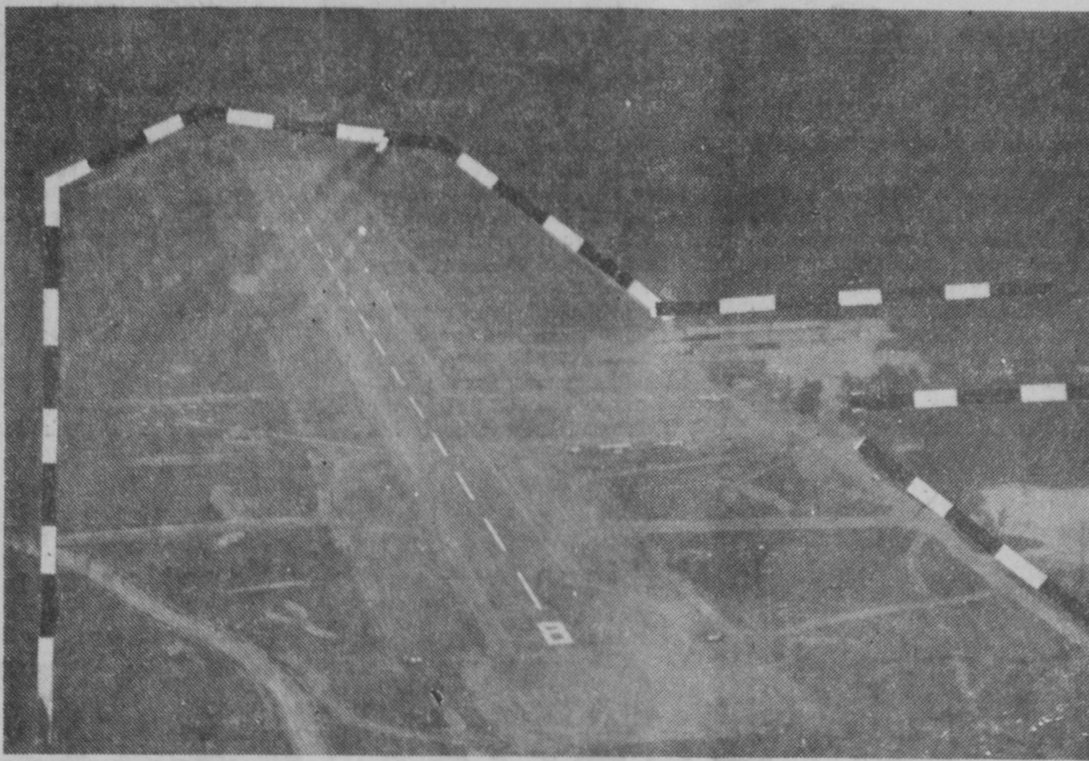

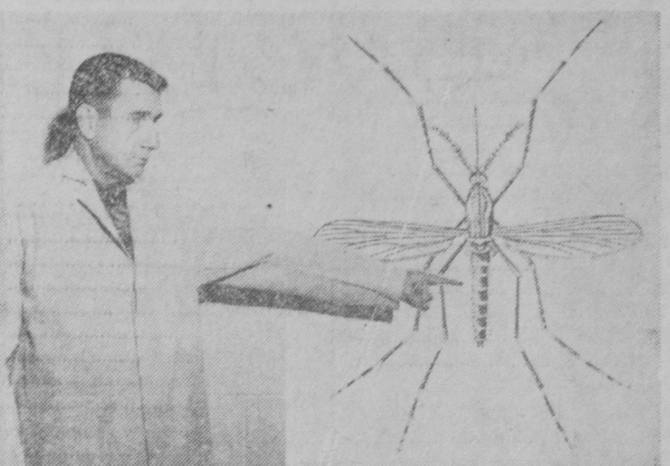

Mosquito Control Hints Given By Wayne State Biologist

DETROIT — "Mosquitoes ordinarily do not bite because they are hungry for blood, but because the females need the food materials in blood to mature a batch of their eggs," says Prof. David R. Cook, Wayne State University biologist.

"Male mosquitoes do not bite but feed on the nectar of flowers like butterflies," continues Dr. Cook.

"Mosquitoes in Michigan are more of a nuisance than dangerous disease carriers," he says. "Large scale programs to control the nuisance are not considered economically feasible. It is up to the individual homeowner to do what he can to eliminate mosquitoes around his dwelling."

Most people think the same mosquitoes attack day and night. Dr. Cook points out. Actually, different species of mosquitoes work "day and night shifts."

The day-biting species most common in Michigan are of the Aedes type shown in the sketch above. This type breeds in puddles or any place where water collects temporarily, and is very difficult to control without an extensive campaign by trained personnel.

"The night-biters are called that because they rest during the day, often in houses, and come out at night to bite. The most common night-biting mosquito in Michigan is the Culex type. They breed in tin cans or more permanent water places such as lakes, ponds or uncovered wells and cisterns."

The "malaria mosquito," Anopheles, occurs in Michigan, but under existing conditions no longer transmits malaria. "A thin coat of oil poured into their breeding water can cut down on the number of night-biters," says Dr. Cook. "The oil acts as a barrier which prevents the developing mosquitoes or wrigglers from reaching the surface to breathe."

He suggests two checkpoints for homeowners to eliminate night biters:

1. Eliminate receptacles which could collect water during rains. Check for clogged roof gutters and puddles on flat roofs.
2. For large permanent areas of water such as lakes, ponds and excavations, pour in one quart of oil per 500 square feet of water surface weekly. For weed-infested water add more oil.

"Protection against night biters should begin with screening the home completely. The mesh on the screens should be no larger than one-sixteenth of an inch. Also screen doors should open outward and have spring closures."

For summer vacationers Dr. Cook advises the use of one of a number of good commercial repellents which will ward off mosquitoes for a few hours. These should be reapplied often, he says.

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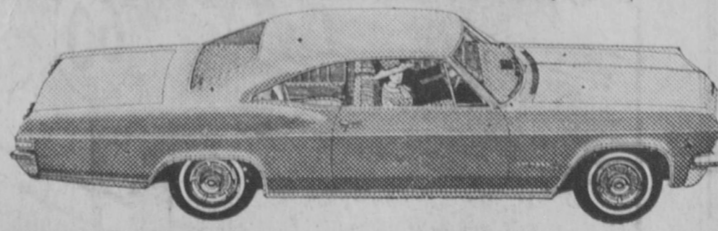

Iosco County Supervisors' Proceedings

JUNE SESSION
June 16, 1965

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in June session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Blust, Bolen, Campbell, Everett, Gerard, Higgins, Hosbach, Jocks, Little, Lixey, McKenzie, Oates, O'Dell, Smith, Stephan, Webb. Absent: Bellville, Nelkie.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

Mr. Smith addressed the board reporting for the conservation committee on operation at Old Orchard Park. He stated that they had a water problem and bids were being taken for a new water supply. Mr. Smith recommended the purchase of fire extinguishers for the buildings of the park.

Mr. Higgins read a report from the civil defense director and moved that the report be filed in the county clerk's office. The motion was supported by Stephan and carried unanimously.

Mr. Smith requested authorization for a speed limit at Old Orchard Park and also a ban on firearms, sling shots, bows and arrows. Mr. Smith requested action during this session on the so called Simpson Dam in Oscoda Township which he believes is now a serious hazard to property owners below the dam.

Mr. Smith reported that the conservation committee would meet the prosecutor to discuss further action on Tawas Lake Dam.

Chairman Little informed the board that he believed that the county will run short of funds before the end of the fiscal year. He stated that he sincerely believed that real taxes have reached the limit and he called attention to the extra funds just received by schools through legislative action. He said that there would be no such unexpected relief for counties.

Mr. Everett reported that bids had been opened on the new medicare facility and that the low bidders had been selected and contracts would be let as soon as state and federal approval are received.

Mr. Everett presented the following resolution and moved its adoption.
