Ranger 'Joe' Blake to Retire July 31

Huron National Forest and the Tawas Ranger District occupy a special niche in the career of Ranger Joseph Blake, 60, East Tawas. He joined the department here on May 1, 1933, returned 25 years later and now retires here at the end of this month with 32 years of service.

He and Mrs. Blake are to be honored at a retirement party Saturday, July 31, at the Tawas Country Club.

A native of Grandville, Blake was born August 15, 1904. He attended Grandville High School and graduated in 1922. He attended Michigan Agricultural College, now Michigan State University, and received a bachelor of science degree in forestry in 1927.

Blake was first employed by the Michigan Shade Tree Company at Battle Creek and then established his own landscaping business.

In the spring of 1933, Blake entered the United States Forest Service at East Tawas and was sent to the Glennie CCC Camp as technical foreman. There, he supervised crews in timber stand improvement, planting surveys and actual planting.

He was transferred at Williams, Missouri, in April 1934 to be-

come chief of party at Clark National Forest.

Blake was promoted March 1, 1935, and returned to Michigan as ranger of the Ottawa National Forest, Bergland. He continued at that post until 1942, when he was transferred to Watersmeet in the same forest district.

Twenty-five years to the day he entered the forest service, Blake was transferred back to East Tawas on May 1, 1958, to succeed Conrad W. Carlson as Tawas District ranger.

Since returning here, he has supervised the planting of more than 4,000,000 red pine seedlings. He has also seen his crews thin out red pines which men of the Glennie CCC Camp planted near M-65 32 years ago.

Blake says that one of the major changes he witnessed has been the great improvement in fire-fighting techniques. He has had charge of fighting 365 fires during his career, ranging from one of 2,000 acres down to fires covering only a small area.

"We used to fight fires with manpower alone, but crews are now much more effective with bulldozers and pumps," said Blake. "Rapid communications with modern radio has also played an important role in improving the efficiency of fire-fighters."

When assigned to the Upper Peninsula, he recalls that the rangers were the only full-time men in the forest district. If a fire was reported, he would go to the nearest town and recruit local citizens as fire-fighters.

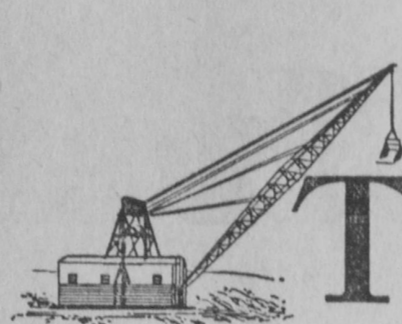
"After leaving the telephone in the office, you were absolutely on your own as there were no other communications," he said.

Because of these technical advances, there are very few major fires today. He does not recall of a single major fire in the Tawas District since his return in 1958 and attributes much of this record to modern communications, well-equipped forestry crews and close cooperation of area volunteer fire departments.

With Porcupine Mountain in the news today, Blake recalls that his first job at Bergland was to map that wilderness area. There were only 48 miles of roads in the entire 600 square miles and it was part of the Ottawa National Forest. Michigan later traded property with the federal government to acquire the Porcupine Mountain.

Blake and his wife, Mary, are to remain at East Tawas. They have one son, Joseph C. Blake, Davison, who is an electrician at the Flint plant of Chevrolet.

Future plans of the Blakes are still undecided but they plan to spend their winters in Florida and then do some traveling during the summer months.

Break Ground Today for Medical Care Facility

State Sen. Robert Richardson of Saginaw heads a delegation of dignitaries who are here today (Wednesday) for ground-breaking ceremonies at the new Iosco County Medical Care Facility. The program starts at 2:00 p. m. and all residents of the county have been invited to attend.

Others attending from Lansing are Joseph R. Homminga, director of the division of hospitals and medical facilities, Michigan Department of Health, and Donald G.

Bennett, engineer for the department of health.

Joining members of the Iosco Board of Supervisors in this program will be representatives of the four contracting firms involved and the architects.

Supervisor Clarence Everett of Tawas City, who has headed the board's welfare committee since before the start of this project, will present a shovel to Chairman Lloyd S. Little for the official ground-breaking ceremony.

Other members of the welfare committee participating will be Supervisor Charles Smith, Henry Oates and John Hosbach.

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller is to be master of ceremonies and the Rev. Robert Morrison, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, is to deliver the invocation.

L. A. Trapp Construction Company, Grand Rapids, moved equipment to the site Monday and began preliminary engineering work. Other contractors are Flint Plumbing and Heating, Flint, mechanical; Normsmith Electric, Cheboygan, electrical; Great Lakes Hotel Supply, Detroit, kitchen equipment; Spence and Smith of Saginaw is the architectural firm in charge.

This project was begun originally by action of the board of supervisors in November 1959 when a committee was appointed to study nursing homes. Serving on that committee were Oates, Everett and William White.

This committee reported in 1960 that it was unable to interest private capital in constructing a nursing home here and the board appointed a committee headed by Everett to take further proceedings.

Since then, the federal government approved a \$290,000 grant for construction of a medical care facility and voters of the county approved a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue last summer.

The 50-bed facility is to be located on an 80-acre site overlooking a beautiful grove of white pine just west of the city limits at Harris Avenue and North Streets.

Ald. H. Hatton Quits Post on Appeal Board

Councilman Howard Hatton, who has served as chairman of Tawas City's new zoning appeal board since it was organized in early June, Monday night announced his resignation from that position.

Hatton told the Tawas City Council that he was resigning be-

cause he believed that not more than one alderman should be sitting on the zoning appeals board.

Mayor George Tuttle appointed Councilmen Hatton, Clyde Evril, Clark Tanner, Daniel Ulrich and Cecil Cable to the new board. The sixth member is Delano Myles of the city planning commission.

The appointments were made on a temporary basis, according to the mayor, until such time as other persons willing to act on the board are found.

Tuttle said Monday night that Hatton's resignation would not be recognized until he receives written notification.

Establishment of this board was required through enactment of the city's new comprehensive zoning ordinance adopted earlier this year. The board acts on all appeals of rulings by the city's zoning administrator, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz.

First official action of the board saw members concurring with Bublitz last Monday night in denying a building application submitted by Joseph S. Brooks, who had requested permission to use a van-type trailer for net storage on his property located on First Avenue south of First Street.

Formerly zoned industrial, the property is now residential and Bublitz ruled that a nonconforming use could not be enlarged.

Board Prohibits Booze on TA School Property

Tawas Area Board of Education notified the public Monday that the policy forbids consuming alcoholic beverages on school property and organizations using school premises are responsible for carrying out this school policy.

At Monday night's board meeting, Pres. Leonard Sarki cited the fact that there was considerable drinking at the Tawas Knot Hole Association all-star game and at the Tawas Softball Association all-star game held on school premises over the week-end.

Unanimous approval was given by board members to notify the public of its policy forbidding drinking on school premises.

Sarki also stated that organizations which do not cooperate in eliminating drinking on school premises would not be allowed to use school property in the future.

As a further help in eliminating this dangerous problem, states Board Secretary Clyde Soper, signs are to be displayed stating school policy and requesting cooperation from guests of the school.

Chamber Calls Festival Success Despite Weather

Tawas Chamber of Commerce, which has had a very poor "batting average" in scheduling outdoor events over the past several years, again ran into difficulty with its Michigan Tourist Festival last week.

Rain caused postponement or complete cancellation of several events on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Chamber officials reported Monday, however, that they were well satisfied with the response to program events and believed that the program was generally a success.

Co-Chairmen Leonard Calabrese and Vernon Pugh, along with Chamber President James DeWyse, were pleased with comments expressed Saturday afternoon by Gov. George Romney.

Instead of landing at Iosco County Airport, the governor's plane was forced to land at Wurtsmith Air Force Base because of poor flying conditions. The governor was met there by city and county officials and then whisked by open car for a parade through the Tawas.

Stopping at the Tawas City Park, Governor Romney stressed the need for more events such as the tourist festival and urged its continuance. He noted the many natural attractions the area had to offer.

Before leaving on an inspection of Tawas Point State Park, Governor Romney was presented with a plaque constructed of white pine and gypsum rock, representing the area's major natural resources. The tour was delayed several minutes when the governor was swamped with requests for his autograph by area children.

Dr. and Mrs. John Page of Bay City were lucky winners in the contest to select a couple to attend the New York World's Fair. About 300 persons saw Governor Romney draw the winning ticket at Tawas City Park.

Later Saturday afternoon, Dale and David Kasischke, six and 10 years old, became the happiest boys in the Tawas when Dale's name was drawn as winner of the pony and saddle. They are the sons of Postmaster and Mrs. Martin Kasischke.

Rain may have caused momentary discomfort for fans attending Saturday night's all-star baseball games at Tawas Area High School, but the two Knot Hole divisions turned in excellent games and a large crowd was in attendance.

Friday night's all-star games of the Tawas Softball League was postponed until Sunday night. Band concert scheduled Friday night by Tawas Area High School Band was canceled, although the Wurtsmith judo team was on hand to entertain those who remained after the storm.

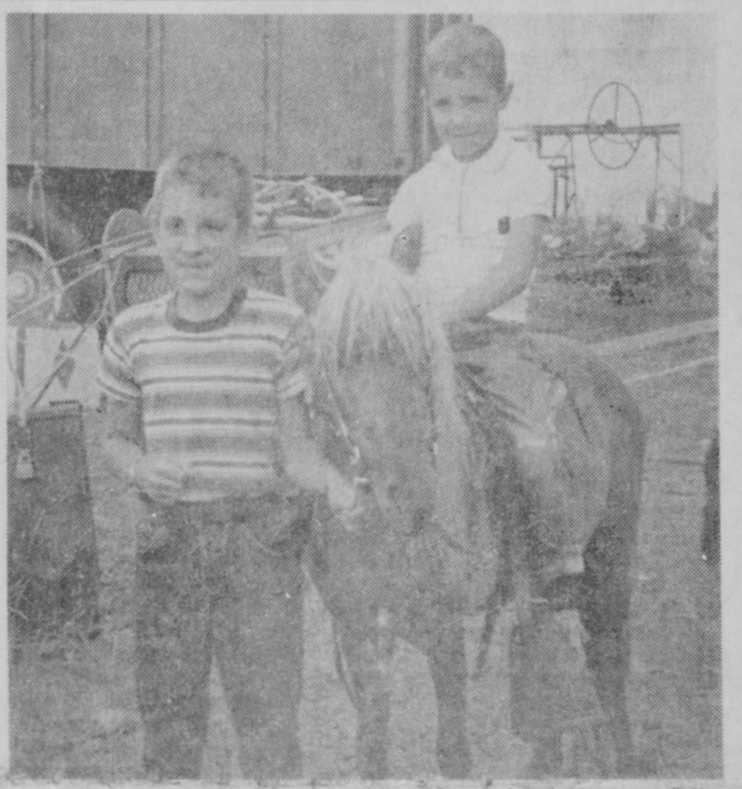

Iosco Fair Set to Open July 28; Ready Exhibits

All exhibits for the 1965 Iosco County Fair are to be assembled at the Hale fairgrounds one week from today, July 28, is the reminder today of Thurman Scofield, secretary-manager.

The veteran fair manager expects the number of 1965 exhibits to again surpass the preceding year's total, continuing the trend of a "bigger and better" fair each year as facilities are improved.

The fair runs from Wednesday, July 28, through Saturday, July 31, a new 26 by 48-foot poultry

house was constructed at the fairgrounds this year, continuing the fair board's policy of adding one new building a year in its modernization program.

The new structure was inspected Monday by John J. O'Brien, assistant fair coordinator for the Michigan Department of Health, who said he was well satisfied with the building.

Scofield reported Tuesday morning that horse racing entries were now being received for the big racing card to be run Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A purse of \$10,000 is to be awarded winners during those days.

The fair premium list has departments for livestock, farm produce, flowers and plants, home economics, domestic arts, antiques and conservation, plus one combined department for art, hobbies and handicraft. One of the principal features is a 4-H Club division, which exhibits the best work of club members for the past year.

"I expect that exhibits of farm produce will be plentiful this year in spite of the poor growing conditions," said Scofield. He reminded growers that last year's crops may be exhibited if the 1965 crops are not ready by fair time.

The fair manager warns livestock exhibitors or horse racing stable owners that straw, hay or grain coming from a quarantined area would not be allowed on the fairgrounds, or would be burned immediately by fair officials. This action is in accord with agricultural department instructions.

The fair will feature games and contests for children of all ages on Saturday, July 31, along with a parade that noon.

David Zellmer Wins Fellowship to Illinois

In other business, the council authorized purchase of materials for construction of curbs and gutters as part of the summer street construction program outlined recently by Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert.

Police Investigate Two Break-Ins in Area

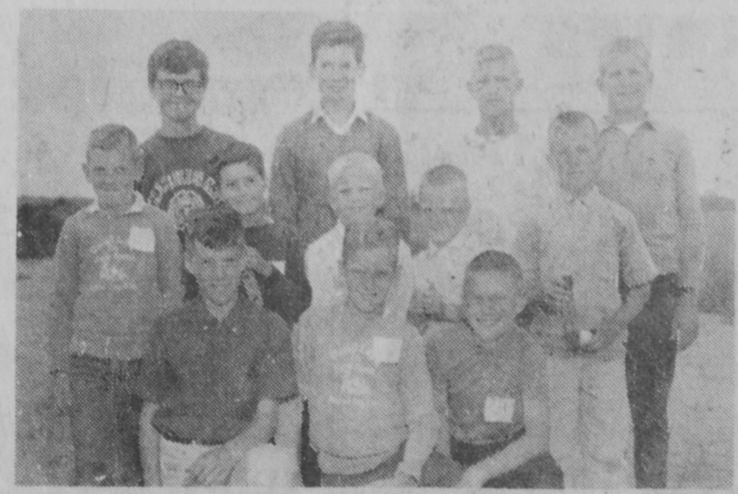
Breakings and enterings at two cabins are under investigation by state police.

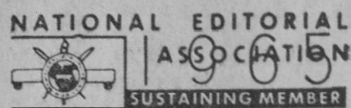

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Commercial Fishermen Endorse Plan to Lift Depth Restrictions on Nets

Commercial fishermen of Eastern Michigan, who attended last Wednesday's hearing at East Tawas on proposed changes in fishing regulations, were in general agreement with the Michigan Department of Conservation in regard to lifting depth restrictions on using trap nets to take lake trout and whitefish.

Also heard was the problem in resort areas of conflicting use of off-shore waters between commercial fishermen and sport fishermen-water sports enthusiasts. Conservationists also warned that the

alewife population in the Great Lakes had not reached its peak yet and would be a menace to all fishing.

Held at the Federal Building with 40 people attending, the hearing brought up for discussion several items tentatively approved by the conservation commission last month. They were to be presented for public discussion before final action was taken July 17.

While reports were given on proposals to shut down commercial fishing for lake trout on Lake Michigan and closing the season on taking whitefish in Lakes Michigan, Huron and Superior from November 1 through November 30, the discussion of most interest locally was the proposed removal of net depth restrictions.

Fishermen were not unanimous in endorsing the conservation department's proposed actions, as one fisherman predicted that the whitefish would be wiped out here, if present depth restrictions are abandoned.

Generally speaking, however, fishermen were of the opinion that conservation department biologists should be given the opportunity to develop some of their theories in regard to the industry.

Most fishermen believed that the 30-year-old depth restriction on trap nets had not improved the whitefish population to any great extent and most felt that trap netters should be allowed to fish at the same depth as the presently unrestricted gill netters.

The majority of local fishermen were of the opinion that if the conservation department found later that removal of restrictions dam-

aged fishing, the restrictions could be returned.

Conservation department biologists are convinced that removal of depth limits on setting trap nets for whitefish will not endanger the number of these fish, once very abundant in the Great Lakes but only taken in small numbers today.

Dr. Howard A. Tanner, fish division chief, said he was pushing for a change in regulations. The easiest thing to do, he said, is to over regulate. He pointed out that the job of the department of conservation was to make use of our natural resources without destroying them.

Tanner's report indicated that there appeared to be a large number of whitefish in deeper water, now closed to fishing because of the 80-foot depth limit. He felt the department could liberalize restrictions on taking of whitefish.

Jack Mathews, Oscoda fisherman, warned that if whitefish were not protected in deeper water, the species would be wiped out. He said that whitefish disappeared from Lake Huron in the 1930s and then returned in large numbers in the 1940s.

"There were so many fishermen here in 1947 that the lake looked like a cedar swamp with floats on fish nets," said Mathews. "The only reason we have whitefish today is because of present restrictions and one can make a fair living. Wipe out the restrictions and we will all be wiped out."

Mathews said the real problem was not in the number of fish being caught, but the fact that commercial fishermen were not organized to control the market price.

Richter Lixey, East Tawas fisherman, was in favor of lifting depth restrictions. During a test in cooperation with the conservation department, Lixey said he found fishing was very good in deep water. Two of his nets set with permission of the state brought 1 1/2 tons of whitefish, while nets set in water up to the 80-foot limit only brought a few fish.

Lixey was of the opinion that there was plenty of fish in deep water, driven there presumably because of the large amount of pollution closer to shore.

Frank Hammell of East Tawas said that in the heyday of the whitefish there were probably 400 trap nets in Lake Huron. Today, he said, there were less than 75 deep traps and, even if the department lifted depth restrictions, trap net fishing would not return to any great degree because of the expense involved.

Hammell said that the depart-

ment preached years ago that the larger fish should be caught. He said that setting in deeper water would tend to distribute nets over a greater area rather than concentrating them in one place. This, he said, would be better for the fish and better for the fishermen.

Several fishermen expressed concern that smelt and alewife had much to do with depletion of whitefish, lake trout, herring and other species. Alewife, they said, chased herring right out of the spawning beds.

"When the smelt died off some years ago, pike and walleyes came back," said Harold Lance of Point Lookout.

Tanner said that up to 1955, alewife were not particularly abundant in Lake Huron. Since then, the population has exploded. In 1964, the population was 50 times greater than in 1962 and he said that if there was a market, 50 million pounds could be taken annually in Lake Michigan.

The fish division chief said that the long term picture in Lake Huron indicated that the alewife would probably reach its peak reproduction within five years. He thought all pressure possible should be put on this fish to get rid of them.

Complaints were heard from cottage owners concerning setting of gill nets along the shoreline, to the detriment of sport fishermen and other recreational uses. Several persons were of the opinion that gill netters were responsible for the reduction of perch and also complained that the shore was being littered by undersized fish killed by these nets.

Tanner pointed out that perch kills were quite common at this time of year and were not necessarily caused by gill nets as kills were not confined to any particular area. He said that dead perch had been reported in all of the Great Lakes and inland lakes.

"As sport fishing becomes more common, smart commercial fishermen will stay away from shores or shallow waters during the busy tourist season," said Tanner.

He said there is a lot of opportunity on the Great Lakes and believed that recreational fishing has a big potential. He said the department did not share the gloom with respect to the commercial fishing industry and he was not fearful of the fact that it would drop to a point where Michigan would lose commercial fishing.

Among those representing the conservation department at the hearing were Troy Yoder, region II supervisor, and Dorias J. Curry, deputy field director.

Over-Age Workers Not Retiring Eligible For SS Benefits

"You do not have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, said today.
 If you earn \$1,200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your "benefits," he added.
 If you earn over \$1,200 a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1,200 and \$1,700. For earnings over \$1,700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.
 Mr. Ellifritz emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn

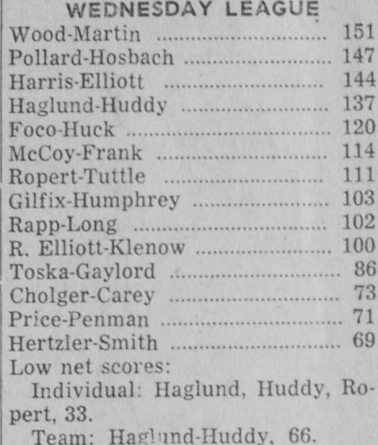

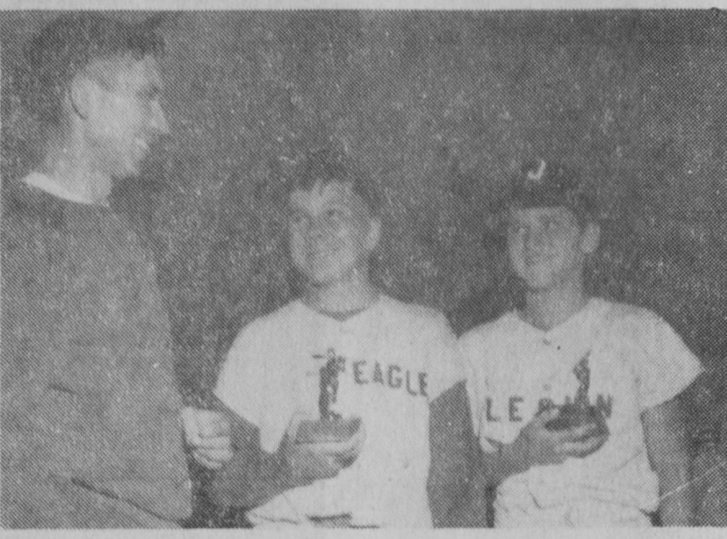

CPA Gives Year-End Report to TC Council At Monday Meeting

A year-end report by Yeo and Yeo, certified public accountants of East Tawas, indicated that the City of Tawas City was moving in the right direction financially.

"When you start building an equity it is a healthy sign," said Joseph Ruth of the accounting firm, who reported on the examination of the city's books for the year ending March 10.

The city had a total equity during the past year of approximately \$12,000. With a balance of \$2,200 at the start of fiscal 1964, the city came up with an excess of revenue over expenditures of \$9,800.

Accounts payable totaled \$5,000, as compared to more than \$9,000 a year ago and more than \$20,000 about nine years ago. The city has outstanding notes of \$13,396.96.

According to the report, the city had total assets of \$43,626 at the end of the year, which included \$7,378.04 in assets, \$25,327.84 in accounts receivable and \$10,420 in deferred charges on the fire truck. Revenues during the past year total \$99,570.31, as compared to a budget of \$97,440. Expenditures actually totaled \$89,701.45.

In other business Monday night, final hearing was held on the special assessment district for con-

structing sanitary sewer on Maple and German Streets. Total cost of the project is \$2,520 with each property owner's share being \$260. Payments may be made over a period of 10 years.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz said that pipe for the project had been ordered and expects that work will be started within

two or three weeks.

One building application was read by Bublitz as follows: Vernon Eckstein, install siding on office building at 105 Bird Street, \$300.
