

One of the principal features is a 4-H Club division which exhibits the best work of club members for the past years.

"I expect that exhibits of farm produce will be plentiful this year in spite of the poor growing conditions," said Scofield. He reminded growers that last year's crops may be exhibited if the 1965 crops are

not ready by fair time. The fair manager warns live stock exhibitors or horse racing stable owners that straw, hay or grain coming from a quarantined area would not be allowed on the fairgrounds, or would be burned immediately by fair officials. This action is in accord with agricultural department instruc-




