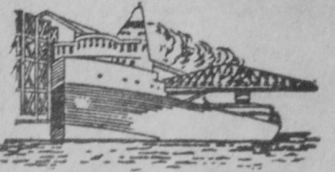

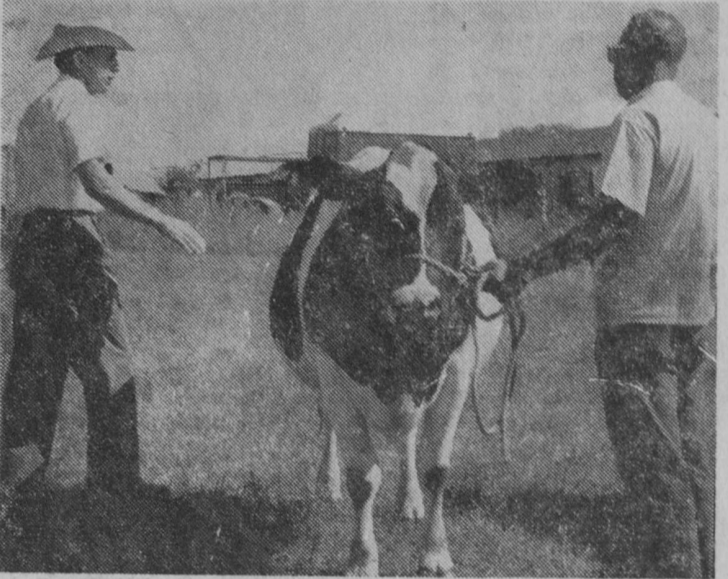
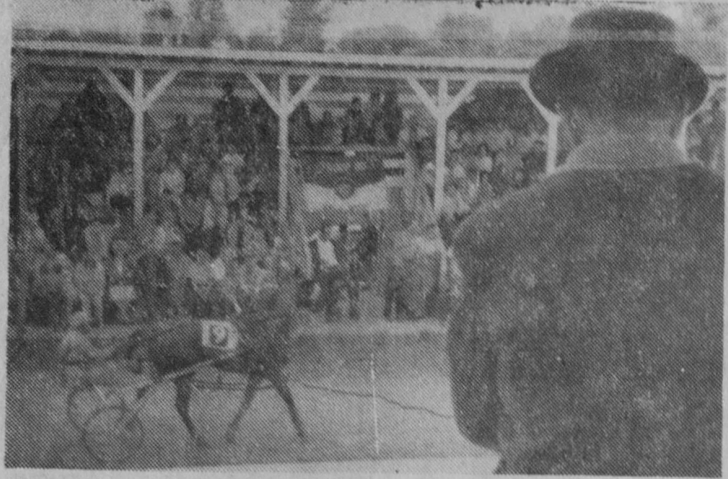

## Annual Iosco County Fair Opens 4-Day Run at Hale

Exhibits are being readied today (Wednesday) for the biggest and best Iosco County Fair ever held at Hale. The event will continue through Saturday, July 31, with a complete program of interest to the entire family. And "family interest" is just what the Iosco County Fair Society had in mind when it arranged the 1965 program, according to Gerald Bellen, president. Members of the fair board have worked many months in preparation for the next four days. "An invitation is extended to all Iosco County families to attend this year's event—their fair—at the ever-expanding fairgrounds in Hale," states Thurman Scofield secretary-manager. "The more support this year's program receives,

the better the fair will be next year."

With assembling of exhibits to be held Wednesday from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m., the giant midway also opens today. There will be judging of 4-H Club exhibits tonight at 7 o'clock.

Thursday's program includes judging of exhibits from 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m., horse racing at 2:00 p. m., and the midway opens at 4:00 p. m.

Open class livestock will be judged Friday morning starting at 9 o'clock. A pig scramble will be held at 10:30 a. m., horse racing at 12:30 p. m. through the Hale business district. Horse racing will again be held at 2:00 p. m. and the midway opens at 4:00 p. m. All exhibits are to be released at 9:00 p. m.

A purse of \$10,000 awaits winners in the three big days of harness racing. This is a traditional part of any county fair and spectators are afforded the opportunity to keep close tabs on all races with programs printed daily listing the names, owners and drivers of all horses.

Farm produce exhibits will be displayed in Plainfield Township Hall along with commercial exhibits. 4-H livestock exhibits and open livestock exhibits are quartered in new barns. A new barn is provided this year for poultry exhibits.

Livestock judging is conducted in an outdoor ring near the exhibition barns. Superintendents of the various departments are: George Erickson and Robert Robinson, livestock; Perry Shellenbarger and Glenwood Streeter, poultry; John Dooley, farm produce; Fay Ewing, flowers and plants; Dorothy Mielock, home economics; Mrs. Gerald Ruckle, domestic arts; Leon Brunson, antiques; Gladys Goodrow, art, hobbies and handicraft; Norman Sibley, 4-H Club division; Lyle Bielby, conservation.

Bruce Goupil is superintendent of speed for harness racing, assisted by Merle Bodenhorn. Bill Jones is presiding judge, the starting gate is operated by E. J. McMurray, Jerry Cleary is announcer. The fair is a member of the Northern Michigan Fair and Racing Association. United States Trotting Association rules govern events. Only Michigan-owned horses are eligible to enter.

### Rattlesnakes Plentiful, Reports Forest Service

Frank Wilkusi, crew foreman, United States Forest Service, proposes his T. S. I. (timber stand improvement) crew be renamed "rattlesnake extermination crew." During the past five days, the T. S. I. crew has killed four rattlesnakes on its project area, one mile north and two miles west of Five Channels Dam. One female was found to contain six young ones.

Wilkusi states this is the first time in 30 years he has seen so many snakes in such a short period of time in this area.

## Co. Supervisors OK Site Condemnation for Dam

Iosco Board of Supervisors voted Wednesday to start property condemnation proceedings to acquire a site for the controversial Tawas Lake dam.

A motion by Edward Higgins, East Tawas supervisor and president of the Tawas Lake Property Owners Association, passed by a 14-4 roll call. The resolution directed the county drain commissioner to start condemnations proceedings.

At present, Iosco is without a drain commissioner since the death of E. H. (Bert) Stiekney. The board filed a letter from Joseph Reinke, Tawas Township, who seeks the job, until action can be taken next month on appointment of a successor to Mr. Stiekney.

This is the second time in less than a year that the board has voted to resume action on the dam. In August 1964, the board directed the drain commissioner to start condemnation proceedings, but then reversed this action two months later when supervisors voted 10-7 to table the matter.

The off-again, on-again Tawas Lake dam has been a matter of discussion before the board of supervisors since 1959. That year, Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke established the lake's maximum level. Since then, the matter has been heard again in circuit court and discussed many times at meetings of the board of supervisors.

Site of the proposed dam is owned by T. S. Dimmick and Charles Timreck. Dimmick accepted an offer for his property but Timreck rejected the proposal.

A special assessment district has been created for the purpose of financing the proposed dam. According to last week's resolution, the entire cost and maintenance of the dam would be the responsibility of the special assessment district.

Before the roll call was taken, Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda, chairman of the conservation committee, said the question boiled down to one of three things: To have or not to have a dam on Tawas Lake and to ask federal participation in the project. He said the conservation committee had not reached agreement on any proposal and asked for discussion from the floor.

Higgins said that aid from the federal government "was just talk about pie in the sky. We feel we need water now. Instead of waiting for a handout from the federal government, people here are willing to accept the responsibility for paying for it."

Attorney Paul Harvey, who represents the property association, said that people around Tawas Lake needed the dam and were willing to pay for it.

Possible federal aid in the project is to be discussed at next month's meeting.

## Judge Lauds Everett at Ground-Breaking

A crowd of about 100 persons attending last Wednesday's ground-breaking ceremonies for Iosco's new medical care facility, heard a tribute paid to C. S. Everett, Tawas City supervisor, for his untiring efforts in behalf of this new institution.

Judge Allan C. Miller, master of ceremonies for the program, said there was usually one person who "really works to put such a project across to the people."

In this case, said Miller, it was Everett who "used the needle" as chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee to keep the project rolling.

Miller recalled that Everett had headed a committee which first investigated possible construction of

a nursing home here in 1959. He has been chairman of the welfare committee through the successful \$300,000 bond issue and subsequent approval of a \$290,000 grant from the federal government to aid in construction.

Stressing the need for such a facility, Judge Miller pointed out that the 1960 census indicated that 10 percent of Iosco County's population, or about 1,700 persons, was over the age of 65 years. By 1970, he said, the figure would be approximately 2,700 persons.

Officially breaking ground for the \$590,000 project was L. S. Little, chairman of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Among guests introduced were State Sen. Robert Richardson, Saginaw; Sister Doreen, director of nurses at Tawas Hospital; James Campbell, assistant to the administrator of Tawas Hospital; Mrs. Lucille Drengberg, county nurse.

James A. Spence Jr., a member of the architectural firm which designed the new facility, said that he had been very pleased with results of recent bids received for the construction. Costs were lower than anticipated, he said, allowing for paving of a parking lot and driveway during the major construction period.

The one-story building is to be built of brick and stone fully equipped to serve the needs of 50 patients. The low maintenance building is designed to expand in several directions if required.

Dr. James Jacques, chief of the medical staff at Tawas Hospital, said that the new facility was badly needed here as it would make regular hospital facilities more available for acute care patients.

Donald G. Bennett, engineer of the Michigan Department of Health, stressed the fact that the new medical care facility would offer high quality care at a lower cost to the public, along with needed physical, occupational and rehabilitation services.

L. A. Trapp Construction Company, Grand Rapids, general contractor, began preparation of footings for the building last week. The structure is to be completed within a year.

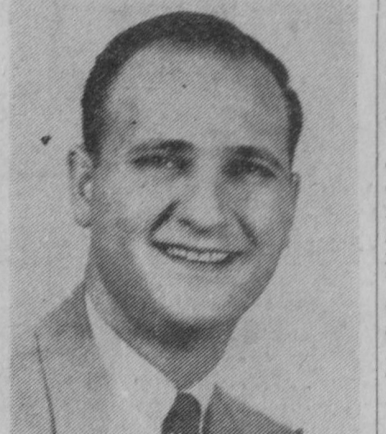
## Awalt Leaves National City for New Job

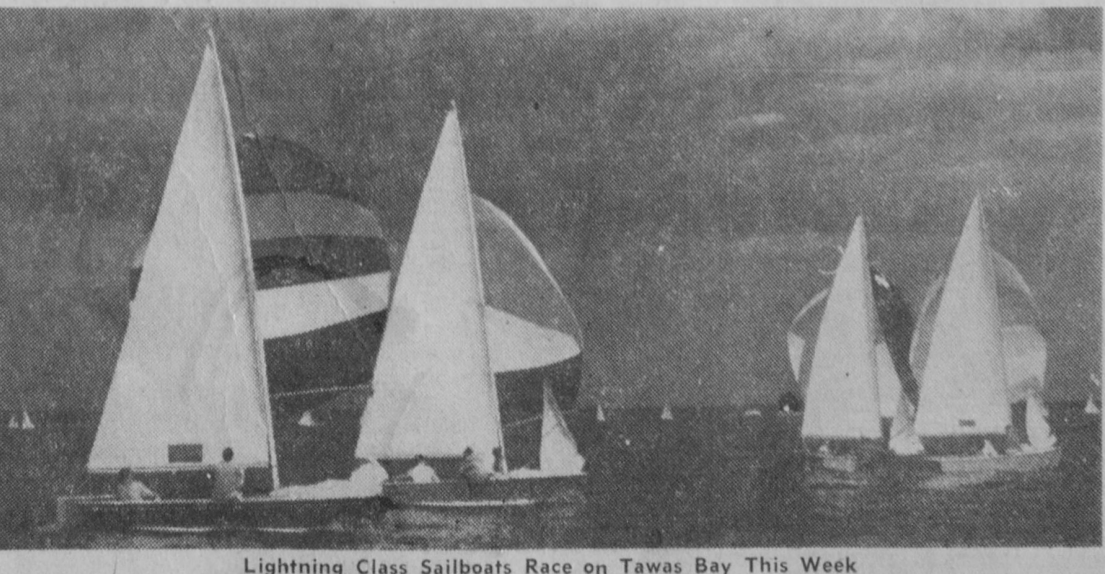
Besides hosting the national regatta twice, Tawas Bay has been the scene of the Michigan District Lightning Regatta in 1954, 1958, 1959 and 1963.

## Tourist Season Heads for Its August 1 Peak

As Michigan's summer tourist season heads for its peak on August 1, East Michigan Tourist Association officials have reported on the importance of tourist dollars to the economy of the 29-county region served by the tourist group.

In answer to the question, "What will a one billion dollar tourist year in 1965 mean to communities in our region," Dr. F. H. Letchfield of Pinconning, EMTA president, replied:

"Tourist dollars generate a far higher percentage of profit to a community than most other industries. There are nearly always new dollars coming into our region which runs from Hillsdale-Jackson area to the Thumb and northward to Cheboygan-Mackinaw City on Michigan's eastern side. Their ultimate circulation within a community is far deeper than imagined; every section of the local economy, in large cities and small towns receive tourist dollars. Every cash register holds some of these important dollars before they leave town—from the gas station, to motel, to retail shop, to wholesaler, to insurance agent, to grocer, to farmer; even to dentists and then to the bank."

"One billion dollars coming to Michigan will generate as much as five billion dollars in local trade. Compute this to jobs and take-home pay and the impact hits close to home as hundreds of thousands of Michigan citizens receive tourist dollars in their paychecks. Before leaving town, these dollars go into just about everyone's pockets. This is why we say that tourist promotion deserves the financial support of every business in the region."

EMTA will raise and spend a total of \$130,000 this year to attract tourists to the region, up \$16,000 over a year ago.

# Consumers Power Rate Cut Effects Residential Users of Electric Service

Lower electric rates which will save Consumers Power customers about \$3,000,000 a year are now in effect.

Practically all of the saving will be realized by residential customers, who will pay lower rates for electricity used in excess of 100 kilowatt-hours per month. Gordon Huck, area manager for Consumers Power, said the average residential customer uses 400 kilowatt-hours per month. Only about 14 percent of the company's electric customers use less than 100 kwh. The average saving will be about

\$3.50 a year, Mr. Huck said, but customers using more than the average amount of electricity per month will save more.

Rates for the first 100 kwh remain the same. The next 200 now come at 2.1 cents and the following 200 at 1.9 cents per kwh. For all over 500, the charge per kilowatt-hour is now 1.7 cents. (The former charge for kilowatt-hours in excess of the first 100 was 2.15 cents per kwh for the next 225 and two cents per kwh for additional use.)

The rate reduction is the third

by Consumers Power in the last six months. On January 1, an electric home-heating rate of 1.5 cents per kwh became effective and also a more economical rate for customers who use uncontrolled fast-recovery electric water heaters or controlled service to standard-recovery electric water heaters.

Minor adjustments of some commercial rates will account for about \$70,000 of the present \$3,000,000 reduction.

**GROVER B. SAWYER**

Grover B. Sawyer, 76, former Tawas City businessman, passed away in a Santa Cruz, California, hospital July 15 after a long illness.

Born March 4, 1889, in Tawas City, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Sawyer. He left here in 1905 and settled in California. He was employed by the Southern Pacific Railroad as a brakeman and later as a conductor for 40 years until he retired in 1958.

During the 1930s, he obtained a leave of absence from the railroad and operated a grocery here in a building on Mathews Street across from Harry Rollin's gasoline station. He had also operated a grocery store and restaurant in the building later occupied by Tuttle Hardware and destroyed by fire.
