

# Sidewalk Return Sought by T. City

On request of several businessmen, Tawas City Council is to inquire into the possibility of re-acquiring sidewalks now part of the US-23 right-of-way.

John N. Brugger, owner of Brugger's Market, felt that city sidewalks were not actually part of the highway and would probably never be used as such.

"This property could not be recovered by individual owners, but the city might be able to regain title to the land," said Brugger.

Portions of the sidewalk were turned over to the state for highway right-of-way in past years. Businessmen were of the opinion that acquisition of the property could answer future problems concerning private signs presently overhanging the sidewalks.

Mayor George Tuttle pointed out that, according to present policy, signs were permissible from a point two feet back from the curb on a revocable permit. He indicated that an investigation would be made into the request.

Businessmen attending, besides Brugger, were James Hilbert, Anthony DeFilippi and Gordon Huck, who represented Consumers Power Company.

In other business to come before the council, David P. Wyatt, home owner along US-23, was spokesman for a group of property owners who requested information as to progress on plans for a proposed sewer to serve the area between Mathews Street and the Tawas River bridge on both sides of US-23.

## Zoning Administrator Rejects 2 Applications

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bubltz, who acts as Tawas City's zoning administrator, denied two building applications this week under terms of the new city zoning ordinance.

Applications rejected were by Byron W. Brooks, 414 Eighth Avenue, who requested permission to construct a platform at Brooks Auto Parts, and John Solomon and Leland Moffatt, who asked permission to remodel Barkman Outfitting Building for a dance hall.

The Brooks application was denied as a nonconforming use in a residential zone. The dance hall application was denied because the exact wording of such use was not written into B-2 district specifications.

Bubltz said this was the reason for establishing a board of appeals under the ordinance to consider such a determination.

Building applications approved were Sally Wheatley, Seventh Avenue, new shingles on roof, \$150; James H. Leslie, 224 Fourth Avenue, erect frame garage, \$800; James R. Hughes, 1149 Bay Drive, 12 by 16-foot breezeway, \$800.

# Tawas C of C Seeks Program Support

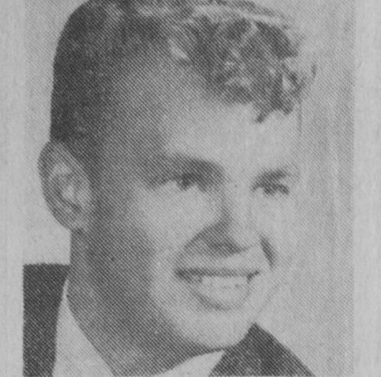
The third of four mailings of Tawas Chamber of Commerce membership accounts was made during the first few days of July. One more mailing will occur during early October.

## E. Tawas Sailor Died Saturday in Auto Crash

A 20-year-old East Tawas sailor, Mark J. Moore, died early Saturday morning of injuries received in an auto collision on the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Orville W. Moore, 930 Geller, East Tawas.

Moore was pronounced dead on arrival at North Hills Passavant Hospital, Pittsburgh.

State police said Moore's auto skidded on the highway near Butler, Pennsylvania, passed through an opening in the guard rail and collided with an east bound vehicle operated by Albert Polacek, 48, Flushing.

A passenger in Moore's car, Daniel R. Pohlman, 19, Spencerville, Ohio, was admitted to Montefiore Hospital, Pittsburgh.

The two young men were on their way home on a three-day pass from Norfolk, Virginia. Moore had enlisted in the United States Navy on April 15, 1964.

Moore was born July 5, 1944, at Las Vegas, Nevada. He came to East Tawas with his family when nine years old and graduated from Tawas Area High School in 1962.

Besides his parents, he is survived by a brother, Clair, and a sister, Marian, both at home; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Moore of Linwood and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Banner, Dewey, Illinois.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday (today), 2:00 p. m., at First Methodist Church, East Tawas. Burial will be in Greenwood Cemetery. The Rev. Donald Turbin will officiate.

## Contractors Behind Time on St. Park Construction

Contractors still busily engaged in construction of the new Tawas Point State Park apparently have lost their race with the clock and may be penalized for all work after July 1.

According to terms of a contract let earlier this year by the parks division of the Michigan Department of Conservation, contractors may be penalized for not meeting the contract deadline.

Contractors for constructing 200 camp sites, roads, sewage, water and electrical systems at the bid price of \$100,856 are Doherty and Doherty of Orchard Lake and Lyman Gerst and Son, Waterford.

Park Supervisor A. Ray Prosch said that the two firms had run into a delay when they were prevented from transporting gravel in large trucks over blacktop roads leading to the new park.

The underground water table is also higher this year at Tawas Point and the contractor ran into a serious problem in construction of a concrete well for the sewage system. The precast concrete well shifted on its base and must be replaced.

Contractor for constructing two toilet-shower buildings has also run into a delay. The firm has been unable to obtain the proper ceramic tile for the job.

Prosch reports that contractors have requested an extension of time, but no word has been received as yet from Lansing. An extension may be impossible due to terms of the bond issue which finances the construction.

Original plans called for constructing individual camp sites

along roads with a five-inch layer of black dirt. Instead, the contractor received permission to change this plan by installing a 30-foot wide layer of black dirt, paralleling both sides of roads in the camp area.

Material for this fill, 5,000 yards of top soil in all, was donated to the state by National Gypsum Company. The dirt is being hauled in 10-yard trucks from one of the farms owned by the gypsum firm along Meadow Road.

Prosch actually is in hopes that the department will not be forced to open the park this summer.

"It would be a shame to use these camp sites before there is a good growth of grass," said Prosch. "If we could seed it now and delay the park opening until next spring, the sod would be heavy enough to take any kind of traffic."

With its large expanses of beach fronting both Lake Huron and Tawas Bay, Tawas Point Park is destined to become one of the most popular recreational areas in the state.

The park again saw heavy use over the past holiday week-end. Picnic tables set up along the shore were jammed with vacationers, as were bathing areas.

## Injuries Fatal to Child Sunday at Indian Lake

A two-year-old Indian Lake child died of injuries received Sunday morning after being struck by a car while playing in a driveway.

Dead is Terry LaDirgue, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond LaDirgue of Camel Road.

Investigating state police officers said that a car driven by the boy's grandfather, William B. Williams, 64, ran over the boy. Williams told officers he did not know he had hit the child until he heard his screams.

The boy apparently crawled in front of the vehicle after Williams entered from the driver's side. Williams pulled ahead and then backed up so as to leave the driveway.

The child was rushed to Tawas Hospital and later transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay City. He died there of head injuries Sunday afternoon.

Born February 28, 1963, funeral services were held Tuesday, 2:00 p. m., at Jacques Funeral Home, the Rev. Allen Heron officiating. Burial was in Tawas City Cemetery.

Besides his parents, he is survived by three brothers, Raymond, Mark and Frank; three sisters, Mary, Janice and Linda; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mader, Saginaw, and Mr. and Mrs. Williams, Indian Lake.

Dumas seeks \$430,000 damages for himself and two sons as the result of the death of his wife, Marian, September 22, 1962, while she was a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Gay.

The Gay vehicle crashed into the rear of a truck owned by Grabow.

## Slate Hearing Here on Changes to Fish Laws

Public hearing will be held by the conservation department July 14 in the Federal Building, East Tawas, to air proposed changes in commercial fishing regulations covering Michigan's Great Lakes waters.

The hearing, scheduled to begin at 9:00 a. m., will bring up for discussion several items tentatively approved by the conservation commission last month. They must be presented for public discussion before final action can be taken on them by the commission.

Among the recommended changes is a proposal to shut down commercial fishing for lake trout on Lake Michigan on or after October 1 of this year as the latest step to boost the comeback of these fish in upper Great Lakes waters.

More specifically, the planned restriction is timed to protect 1.2 million yearling fish which were planted in June to kick off efforts for rebuilding Lake Michigan's trout populations.

Also on tap for public review at the East Tawas hearing is a measure to dovetail the closed season for taking whitefish in Lakes Michigan, Huron and Superior. As recommended, these fish would be

His first job was in the packing department of the warehouse sewing plaster bags. He later moved to transportation, firing and later operating steam locomotives for 25 years.

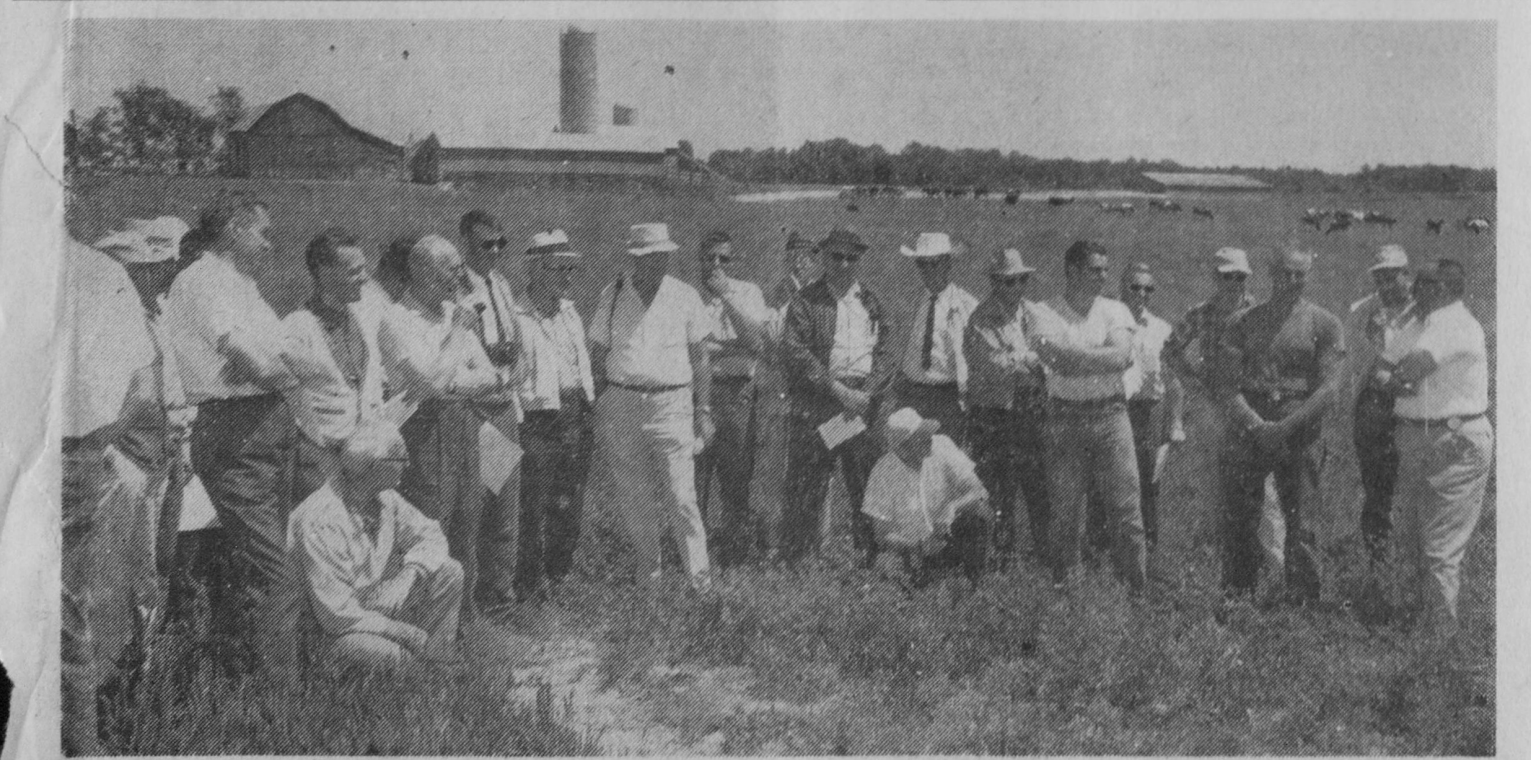
Erickson then moved to the maintenance department where he had charge of repairing railroad cars up to the time of his retirement.

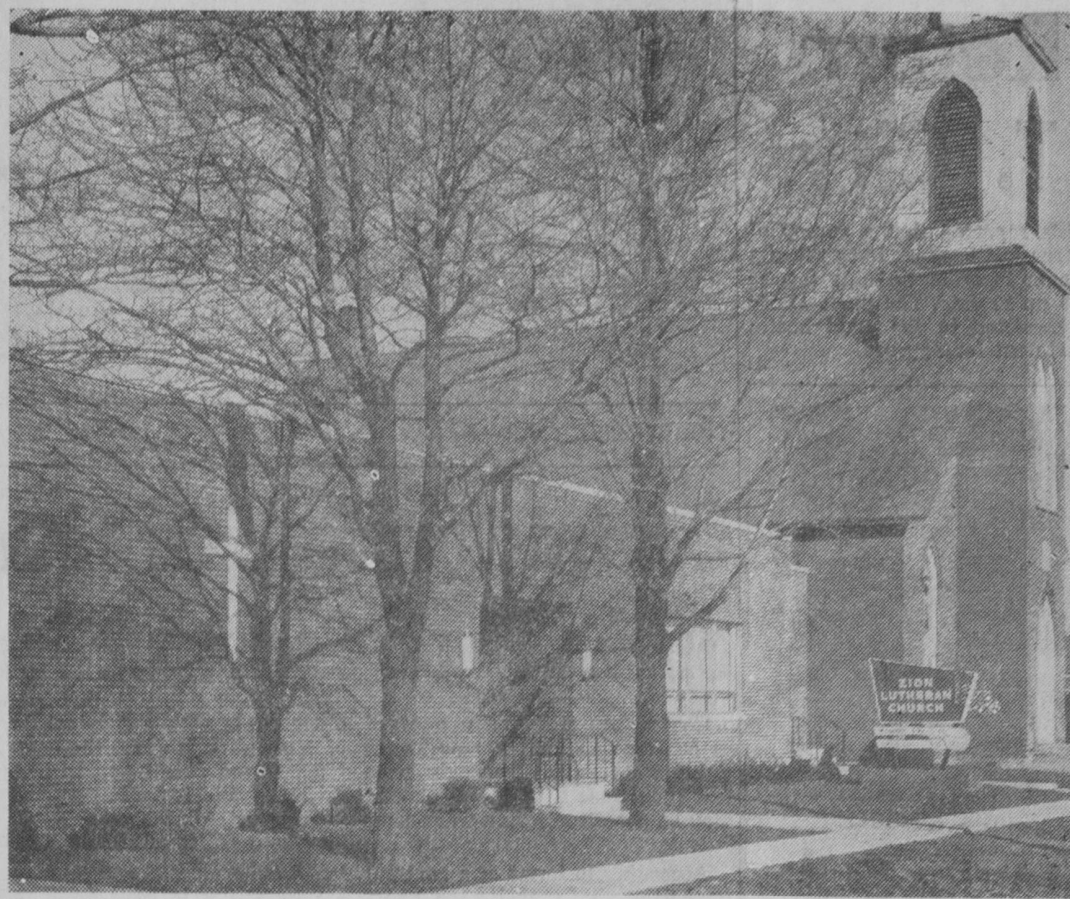

## Zion Church to Commemorate Organization of Congregation

Sunday, July 11, Zion Lutheran Church will have a special worship service commemorating the organization of the congregation 95 years ago. The service will be held at 4 o'clock in the afternoon with the Rev. Martin A. Bertermann, pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Bay City, preaching. A display of items used by the church during these years will also be shown.

Zion Lutheran Church, the oldest Lutheran church north of Bay City, was organized July 3, 1870, in East Tawas. The congregation was served by the Rev. H. Partenfeller, pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Bay City. He traveled to the Tawas area by boat to serve the Lutherans with Word and Sacrament. A church was built on Church Street in East Tawas and was used until 1877. In that year, a new church, school and parsonage was built on Plank Road, Tawas City. The congregation still maintains a cemetery at that location. In 1890, the present church at Second Street and Seventh Ave-

nue was built. The steeple was added in 1964.

The present pastor, the Rev. Walter C. Pieper, is the eighth resident pastor of the congregation. He has served the church since 1960.

During most of these 95 years, Zion congregation has maintained a Christian day school, in which the children of the parish receive their Christian training along with the regular course of study required by the state board of education. Zion Church at the present time operates a six-grade school, taught by Darwin Dubke and Miss Helen Zurstadt. The present school building was dedicated in 1962.

Zion Church is a member of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, which has congregations in every state in the union and carries on a mission program in 24 countries. It sponsors "The Lutheran Hour" on radio and "This is the Life" on television.

## Insurance Benefits Still Available to Disabled GIs

Should some unexpected tragedy befall a veteran, he can still be sure that his child will have a good start toward a higher education—and for as little as 75 cents a week, Robert M. FitzGerald, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office at Detroit, said today.

Mr. FitzGerald was referring to the opportunity certain disabled veterans now have to purchase GI life insurance at extremely low rates if they have less than \$10,000 of their original GI insurance in effect.

A \$2,000 modified life GI policy can be obtained by eligible disabled veterans for as little as \$3.06 a month. In a state university, \$2,000 will pay practically all tuition expenses for four years.

A \$1,000 modified life policy which would give a youngster a good start toward a college degree can be obtained for as little as \$1.76 a month or 44 cents a week.

Mr. FitzGerald pointed out that many disabled veterans eligible for the reopened GI insurance may have decided that a full \$10,000 policy is beyond their means, not realizing that a lesser amount may be purchased.

A veteran preferring a 20-payment life plan to the modified plan can obtain \$1,000 in coverage for \$2.86 a month or \$2,000 for less than \$1.35 a week.

Mr. FitzGerald said that the examples given above were based upon age 45, the average age today of veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict. The cost would be less for younger men and slightly more for older veterans.

Mr. FitzGerald stated that over 2,600 veterans have already applied for approximately \$16,500,000 of new insurance in Michigan.

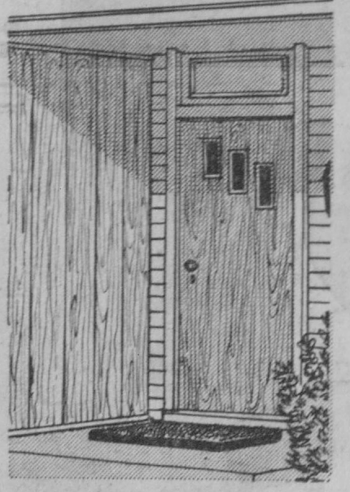

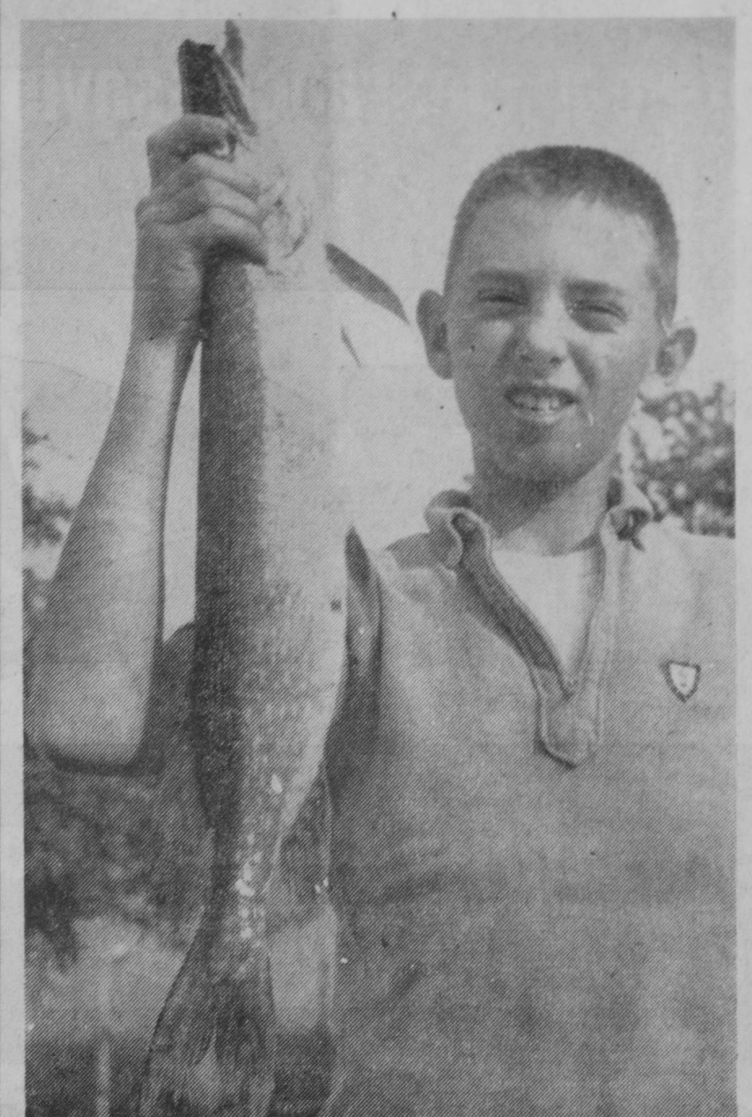

### Earnings Fix Trot Lineups

Nearly all county fair harness racing is conducted with the money-won system as the general basis for classification of horses. In general this places trotters or pacers in competition against others who have won the same amount.

As the horses accumulate winnings, they move up into the next bracket of earnings. The U. S. Trotting Association keeps a record of all winnings. Each time a horse starts his winnings are entered on his eligibility certificate which always must be on file with the secretary at each track where the horse is racing.

The classification schedule begins with Class 30 which consists of all horses which have not won at least \$200. Next is Class 25 for non-winners of \$500 and Class 24 has non-winners of \$1,000. Then, in \$500 jumps, the earning limit goes up as the Class number drops until Class 19 consists of non-winners of \$4,000.

Then the jumps are greater. Class 18 is for non-winners of \$5,000, Class 17 for non-winners of \$7,500 and Class 16 for non-winners of \$10,000. The classification scale continues up to the \$40,000 and over. Fair secretaries have the privilege of scheduling free-for-all races on their programs which are open to the fastest class horses on the grounds and not necessarily based on earning capacity.
