Douglas Drive Home Damaged by Fire

A flash fire gutted the summer residence of Austin L. Jankens on Douglas Drive, Alabaster Township, Saturday afternoon.

Tawas City Fire Department responded to a call turned in by F. W. Pretzer, a neighbor of the Jankens, but heat from the fire had charred the building's interior when firemen arrived.

Another neighbor, Edward Tolhurst, said he was working on his lawn when he saw the Jankens drive out of their yard on their return to Bay City. A few minutes later, he said, smoke was pouring out from under the eaves of the structure.

Fire Chief James Lansky said that flames were confined to one bedroom, but heat damaged the entire interior of knotty pine.

With homes constructed so close together in that area along the bay and with Saturday's heavy wind, the fire could have been more serious than it was.

Seek \$430,000 Damages in Court

A \$430,000 auto negligence suit was filed May 27 in Isosco Circuit Court against Katherine and Frank Gay of Whittemore.

Filing the suit was the estate of Mrs. Marian Dumas, who was killed in an auto crash September 22, 1962, while a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Gay. A jury trial was requested.

Mrs. Gay was convicted of negligent homicide as a result of the crash and in September 1962 was sentenced to three years probation.

Richard Dumas, husband of the deceased woman, asked judgment in behalf of her estate in the amount of \$225,000, plus costs and five percent interest from the date of her death. Individually, Dumas seeks judgment of \$65,000, plus \$55,000 for his son, Daniel, and \$85,000 for his son, Robert, both of whom were injured in the crash.

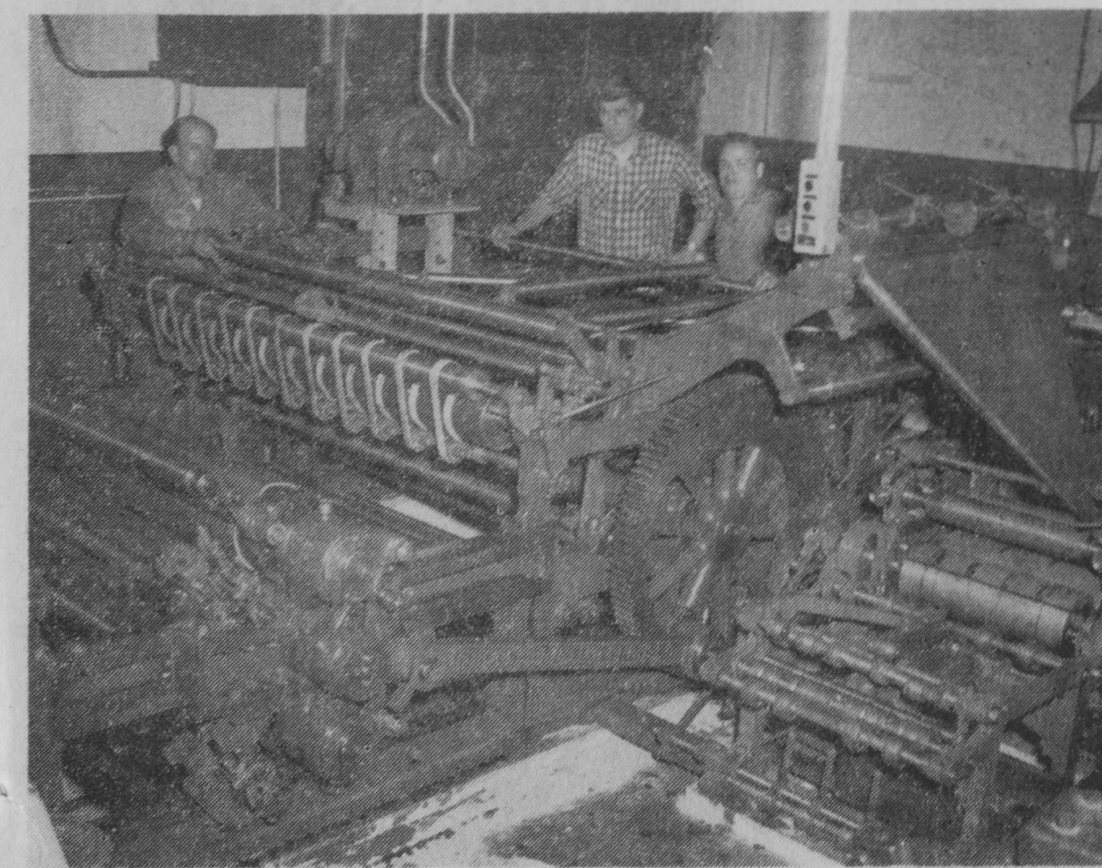

East Tawas Park Chief Happy About Operation

"Everything seemed to be operating pretty smoothly on our first big week-end," reports M. J. Killey, chairman of the East Tawas Park Commission.

The park was operating at 100 percent capacity as of 1:00 a. m. Saturday and Joseph Badalucco, manager, said that the registration office had to turn away at least 50 trailers Saturday morning because of the lack of space.

This is the first year of operation of the former state park by

the city park commission and, as of Friday night, the park had registered 1,184 camper days during May. There are 186 camp sites in the park.

The new state park on Tawas Point is not expected to be in operation until July.

Besides Badalucco, some five persons are hired to work this summer at the city park. Most of the park maintenance personnel are college students home between terms.

Work was recently completed on remodeling of the East Tawas Community Building, which included location of a new park registration office on the north side.

Plans are now being made to install asphalt on the parking lot and roads on the east side of the park and, if possible, roads in the west portion of the park are to be black-topped later in the year.

"We are also considering the possibility of equipping our park maintenance personnel with handy talkie radio units," reports Chairman Killey.

He said that such communications equipment would be invaluable in directing maintenance workers and would also be useful in times of emergency.

While operated by the Michigan Department of Conservation, "the park was always known as one of the most popular in the state and, under city operation, it is expected that it will retain this high standing."

Considerable work has gone into maintaining the property this spring.

Girl's Quick Thinking Saved Child's Life

A 14-year-old Tawas Area High School freshman was credited Monday with saving the life of a two-year-old Lansing child.

Carol Herriman and her sister, Verna Jean, 13, both daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Olen Herriman, were left in charge of seven children Memorial Day at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold M. Busch, 2802 West M-55.

Besides the Buschs' four children, the girls were also caring for three children of the Rev. and Mrs. Grant Lapham, Lansing, who were visiting at the Busch home and were spending the afternoon fishing with the M-55 couple.

Kathy, two-year-old daughter of the Laphams, accidentally swallowed some medication and Carol had the presence of mind to immediately notify the family doctor.

The tot was rushed to Tawas Hospital for emergency treatment. Mrs. Busch said later that there was no time to spare as one-half teaspoon of the medicine could have been fatal to the child.

No Basis for Rumor on CP Land Sale

A local representative of Consumers Power Company said Tuesday there was no basis of fact in a news story from Lansing concerning a rumored sale of thousands of acres of AuSable River frontage to the Michigan Department of Conservation.

"The company is now preparing to spend more money on its hydro-electric dams along the AuSable and, personally, I don't foresee the company selling this land for some time to come," said Gordon Huck, manager of the Tawas district.

The Lansing story said the conservation department wants the land to maintain it for recreational purposes and also to preserve the large schools of trout in the AuSable.

Lillian L. Reid, head of Consumers' right-of-way department, flatly denies that the company intends to sell the land.

The company permits public access to the river for fishing, hunting and camping purposes, but has never sold any large chunks of the land, either to private buyers or to any state or federal agency. Much of the land was purchased in the early 1900s for power development usage.

A similar story was printed about a year ago in a state newspaper.

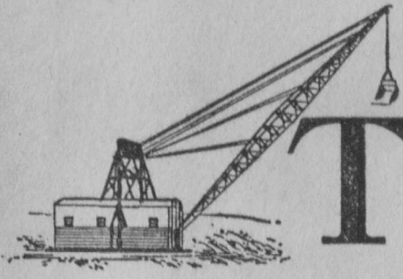
Entry Blanks Ready for ET Bike Races

Several races are to be run for both boys and girls with divisions arranged according to age and types of bicycles.

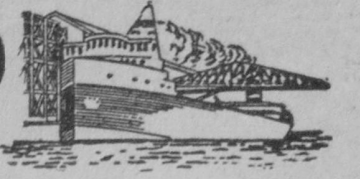

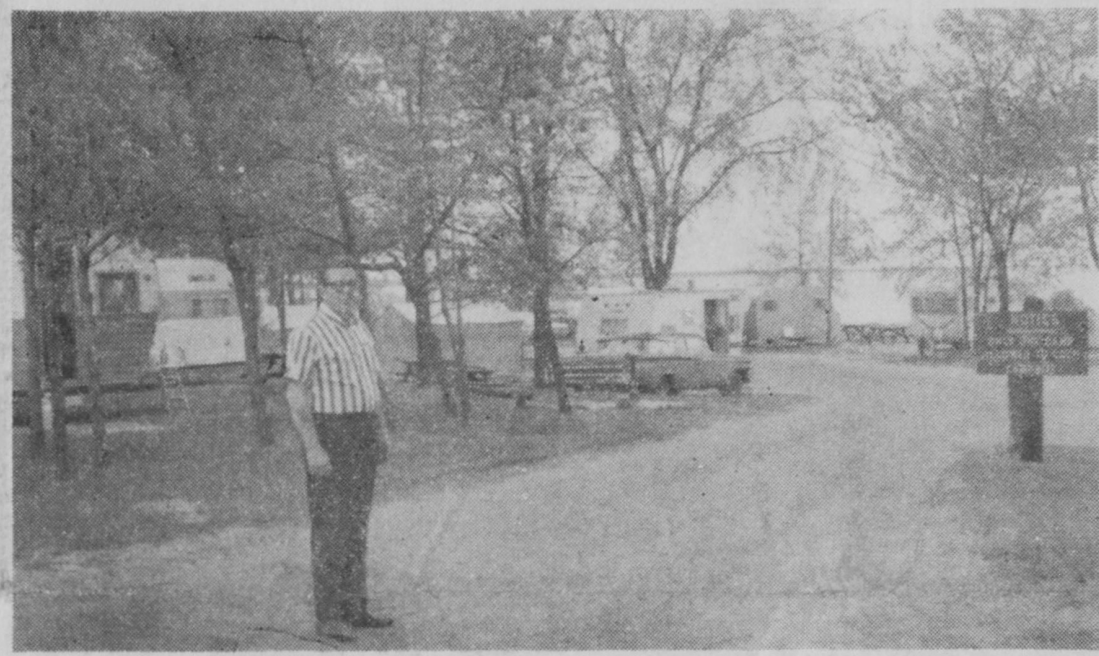

Training Class in Forestry Aid to Young Men

"We are trying to help some of our young people who are not going to college to earn a living," states Marvin Davenport, county extension director. Young men 18 years of age and older can "earn while they learn" in the development of pulpwood industries.

Cooperative Extension Service has arranged a four-week training course at Gaylord that will pay those interested \$38 per week while they learn the technique and management skills of forestry. Briefly, they will learn about chain saws, skidding, loading, handling and hauling, harvesting, cruising, sealing and woodland management.

"I contacted the area high schools and to date, Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott and Hale have responded with a list of young men who might be interested in this job opportunity. If there are others, please contact my office and leave your name, address and phone number with Mrs. Jean Smith. We will then send you a copy of the program and other necessary details. If you know of others, encourage them to call or write," states Davenport.

The school is expected to start June 14. Intention must be known by Friday, June 4. The office is located in the Federal Building, East Tawas, and is open from 8:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. Monday through Friday. The phone number is 362-3449.

Citizens Band Radio Operators Aid Police

An experimental citizens band radio operation to help handle motorist emergency calls in 15 Eastern Michigan counties was started over the Memorial Day week-end by Michigan State Police.

Equipment for receiving calls was installed at Bay City, East Tawas, Bad Axe, Sandusky, Flint, West Branch and Bridgeport.

The citizens band radios operate on channel 17 with call letters KMM-7902. Calls to a post should be only for emergencies.

Counties served include Arenac, Alcona, Bay, Gladwin, Huron, Isosco, LaPeer, Midland, Ogemaw, Oscoda, Roscommon, Saginaw, Sanilac, Shiawassee and Tuscola.

Sgt. George Briggs, commander of the East Tawas post, said that no emergency calls were received here over the first week-end of operation.

Emergencies under which CB radios would be used include accidents, traveler illness, drunk driving incidents and other situations where life and property may be endangered and police assistance is needed.

Many CB members have organized groups and set up rules and procedures for eliminating non-emergency radio traffic. This is true in the third district area, which includes Isosco County.

State Aid Payments Raised for All Schools

A 21-million dollar state school aid bill received the approval of the Michigan House of Representatives last Tuesday.

This action, according to State Rep. Sanford E. Charron of Pinconning, represents a unique compromise that assures substantial increases to all classes of local school districts.

Representative Charron explained that the bill had four major areas of state support. Since all school districts have been faced with increasing school costs, an increase of approximately 7½ percent was granted to all school districts.

This section provided funds for all districts with local taxable valuation at or above the state average per pupil. The formula for this class of district would provide a gross allowance of \$255 with deductible millage of 4.6 mills.

Charron further stated that another section had been developed to provide a new approach for distributing school aid to low valuation school districts. This would include school districts with less than \$13,000 per pupil in local taxable valuation. This new section would bring such districts sufficient aid to permit them to expend approximately \$380 per pupil if they were making a local effort of 14.5 mills, now the state average.

He pointed out that this approach effectively eliminated the age old battle over deductible millage. These districts would, for the most part, receive dramatic increases in state aid.

The \$23,250,000 allocated to this section of the bill would provide a basic program for all school districts at or near the state average of pupil expenditure.

Action was also taken to assure full payment of special education and transportation at a formula rate not to exceed 75 percent of allowable cost. These programs, Charron said, have not been fully supported by state aid for a number of years. He indicated that this program would tend to encour-

age local programs to educate exceptional boys and girls.

A final section added to the basic bill this year allocated \$4,000,000 in special aid to school districts educating large numbers of disadvantaged youth. This program, Charron explained, was in keeping with the national emphasis placed upon upgrading the educational opportunities of all youth, "one of the goals of the Johnson administration," he said.

These basic facts with other minor innovations make this state bill one of the most unique ever passed by this legislative body, stated Charron.

"We now have a well-rounded base state aid program for all districts—more equal educational opportunities should be available to all boys and girls in Michigan regardless of where they live," concluded the Pinconning legislator.

Aid Bill Favors Schools With Low Valuations, States Tawas A. Supt.

A preliminary study of the new bill by Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area High School indicated that locally, state aid would be increased about \$13.73 per pupil. With 1,650 students here, Tawas Area School received \$166 per child during the current year and is to receive \$179.73 per child under the new bill.

Although Tawas Area Schools will receive about a 7½ percent increase in state aid over last year, Mick said that the bill does not particularly favor this school, as compared to some other schools.

With a valuation of \$16,363 behind each child, Tawas Area School is below the state average in operating millage.

He said the new bill followed principals advocated by the Michigan Education Association, Michigan Education of School Boards and Michigan Association of School Administrators.

Careless Smoker Caused Dock Fire

A burning cigarette tossed on the deck of Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas, has been blamed as the cause of a fire there Sunday night.

Persons fishing on the dock notified state police of the blaze and the East Tawas Fire Department answered the call.

City Patrolman Robert Langlois said that a burning cigarette carelessly tossed on the dock may have smoldered for some time before fire broke out on one of the treated posts at boat well No. 16. The fire was extinguished before any serious damage was caused.

Two years ago, the dock was struck by a fire which destroyed a large section of the structure. Repairs were completed last summer.

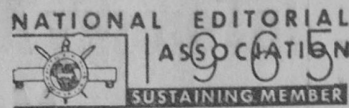
On her 95th birthday anniversary in 1962, Mrs. Proper had 35 grandchildren, 83 great grandchildren and 19 great, great grandchildren.

Takes Part in U. S. and French War Games in Corsica

Sonar Technician Third Class John F. Sass Jr., United States Navy, son of John F. Sass, East Tawas, participated in an international exercise called Operation Fairgame III in the central Mediterranean and on the island of Corsica May 16-25, while serving aboard the guided missile destroyer, USS Richard E. Byrd.

Thirty-four American and 26 French ships participated in the exercise along with ground troops from the two countries. United States Marines of the second battalion, eighth marine regiment took part, along with the French forces. France provided troops from the group fusiliers des marins commando, group tactical assault and French Foreign Legion.

Fairgame III is one of a series of combined French and United States naval exercises which have been conducted annually to provide mutual tactical training and familiarization in offensive and defensive air, amphibious, submarine and anti-submarine operations for French and United States forces.

Fairgame III was conducted in three phases. The initial phase was designed to exercise the United States and French carrier task forces in mutual combined support operations. They are opposed by French air forces and French and United States submarines.

The second phase consisted of a combined French and United States amphibious assault leading at Santa Manza, Corsica. A fast carrier task force supported the amphibious landing. This assault was opposed by French and United States submarines and land forces and by French air forces.

The final phase of Fairgame III consisted of basic individual ship training exercises in which French and United States observers were exchanged for orientation and indoctrination.

His ship is providing anti-air-

craft and anti-submarine protection for the naval forces.

Quartermaster 1C Robert E. Starck and Engineman 1C Richard J. Look, who are serving with the United States Navy, participated in the largest combat amphibious operation since Inchon, Korea, in 1950, while serving aboard the tank landing ship, USS Washoe County. They are the sons of the Paul A. Starcks and the Richard F. Looks, all of East Tawas.

Initial elements of the fourth marine regiment and third reconnaissance battalion were landed at Chu Lai, Republic of Viet Nam, on May 7. This was the first completely "over the beach" landing in the four American amphibious landings that have been made in South Viet Nam.

Without the harbor landing ramps of Da Nang to rely on, all the marines' equipment and supplies were landed over the seabed, installed causeway or flown in by marine helicopters from the ships anchored off Chu Lai, to the south of Da Nang.

The landing also incorporated the initial combat use by Americans of vertical assault with the landing of combat troops by helicopter from the amphibious assault ship, USS Princeton. The marines were quickly followed ashore by the navy seabees who immediately began construction of an airfield behind the Chu Lai beaches.

The marines were landed at the request of the Republic of Viet Nam government and are to provide security for the airfield, similar to their mission at Da Nang, relieving South Vietnamese Army troops presently in the area.

Army Pvt. Harold J. Alda, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Alda, East Tawas, completed an eight-week combat engineer course at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, May 27.

During the course, Alda received instruction in the construction and repair of roads, railroads and structures. He also received training in demolition and mine warfare.

The 17-year-old soldier entered the army in January 1965 and received basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

Alda attended Tawas Area High School.

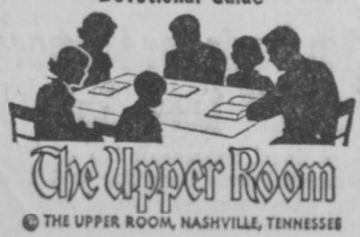

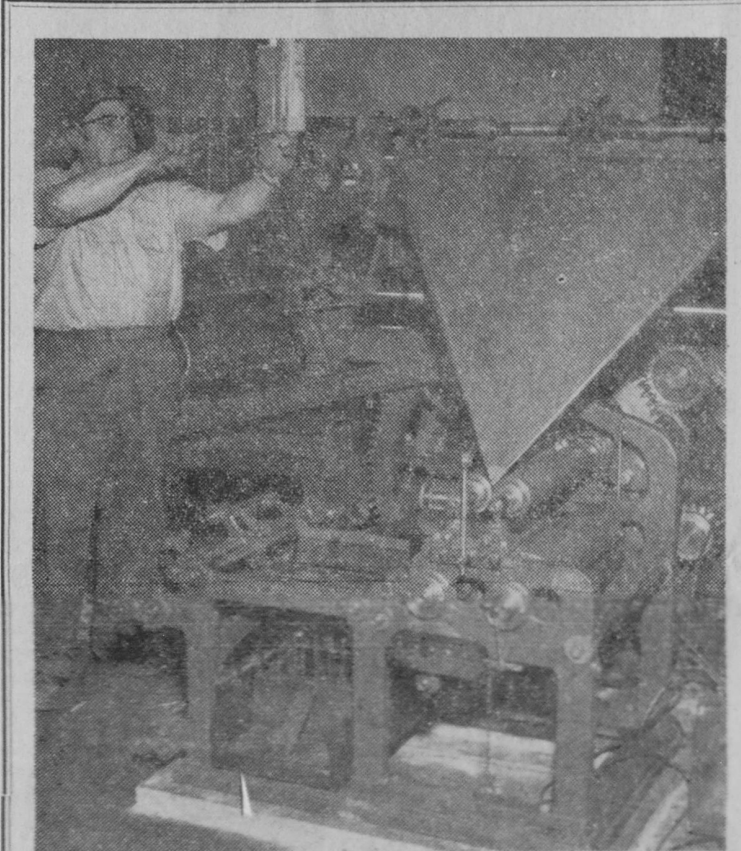

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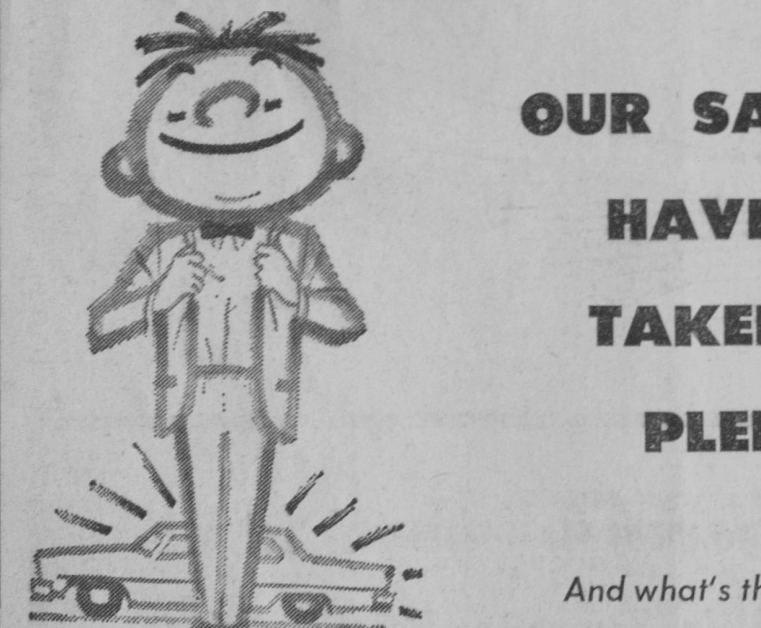

Art Dillon Recalls When—

Baseball Was Once Principal Activity on Sunday Afternoons

When Tawas City and East Tawas were independent baseball teams met a couple of Sundays ago at the high school diamond, there was only a handful of fans along the sidelines to watch the game.

"It wasn't that way 35 or 40 years ago," was the comment recently of Arthur Dillon.

Ask any old-timer in this area to name whom he thinks was one of the most aggressive competitors in the history of baseball here and the name of "Art" Dillon of East Tawas would be mentioned many times.

His baseball "competition" is limited today to sitting in an armchair and watching the Tigers on television, but he still knows baseball and is an avid fan.

"While people today probably have a greater variety of interests—more things to do on a Sunday afternoon than watching local sandlot games—in the old days, about the only entertainment on a Sunday afternoon was to go out to the ball park.

"And the brand of baseball played here today or even 15-20

years ago is vastly different than the period ranging from the 1830s back to the early 1900s," said Dillon.

While this argument is often heard concerning professional baseball and, generally speaking, it is believed that today's pros are better ballplayers than their earlier counterparts, the reverse could well be true in comparing teams in the Northeastern Michigan League.

The late Hazen S. "Kiki" Cuyler of Harrisville, during his professional playing days, once told Dillon that he believed baseball as played in the early days of the NEM was probably as "fast" as many minor leagues.

Dillon would have no argument with anyone when he says that the teams enjoyed better support and larger crowds in the old days.

"We could always guarantee an outside team a gate from \$250 to \$500, all at 25 cents a head, when we played at the old D&M diamond," said Dillon. The grandstand would be filled and cars would be lined clear around the field and out on the road.

"And, when East Tawas and Tawas City met on the baseball field at least three times a season—those were the days. I can still hear Mrs. Mark and Mrs. Nelem standing in back of first base—they had boys on the teams and were real baseball fans."

Art's baseball days started in 1907, when he was a member of the East Tawas High School team. He still rattle off the lineup of the 1910 team which beat Eastern High of Bay City for the state title.

Members of that team included Bill Smith, pitcher; Ernest Dillon, catcher; John Anderson, first base; Tom Sullivan, shortstop; Frank Hewson, third base; Seymour Wright, left field; Alva Wood, center field; Leo Kunze, left field, and Art Dillon at second base. His cousin, Charles Dillon, was also a member of that team.

After high school, Dillon played independent baseball for East Tawas until an eye injury in 1928.

"There were so many good players I never could begin to name them all," said Dillon. "But, as far as naming a few pitchers, there was Vic Marzinski, who struck out

21 Alpena batters with his fast ball in one game; Felix Stepanski, a real good pitcher, and I remember I was playing with Tawas City during an exhibition game against a Bay City team when he threw out his arm. Then, there was George Kobs, among the best, and the Tawas City battery of Byron and Altee Mark."

Dillon said that Harry Bolen of Alabaster probably had the best arm of any outfielder who ever played in the league.

As for his own playing days, Dillon said he would always remember the game when an all-star team from this area met the Cuban Red Sox. Bolen, Jack Johnson and Dillon each turned in a spectacular running catch in the outfield in the same inning.

In another game, he recalls that a fan offered \$5 to the first player who reached first base and \$25 for the first score. He bunted his way to first, stole second and third bases and then stole home to collect the money from the fan waiting at the plate.

Dillon was employed by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway from 1910 until 1924, he was East Tawas postmaster from 1924 until 1936 and served from 1938 until retiring in 1959 as city superintendent.

He has not taken an active part in baseball since he managed an American Legion team in 1948 and he managed the East Tawas independent team in 1941.

"I get out to watch the little leaguers once in a while, but that is about the extent of my baseball today," he said. He keeps himself busy with his garden and he is active in the National Class fleet of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

Iosco County's allocation board was faced with a thankless task last week when it made its final apportionment of the "tax pie" to meet requirements of schools, county and township government during 1966.

While the final order probably did not please all phases of local government, particularly the county, it would have to be admitted that the allocation board's action was the only course it could take.

There was considerable discussion during the hearing concerning "pegged millage" that is, adding up to three mills above the 15-mill limitation and setting or "pegging" the millage for each unit, thus eliminating the need for an allocation board.

This could be a possible solution in some counties, but most of those attending last week's allocation hearing were of the opinion that it was not necessarily the answer to this county's problem.

A complete evaluation study of the entire county for tax assessing purposes, contracted for last week by the board of supervisors, probably is the best solution. At least, it will mean that all assessing will be made on the same basis using information obtained from an on-the-spot study by professional appraisers. Members of the board of supervisors believe the county's valuation will be increased considerably.

It is fortunate this county has a high valuation today, or it could have been in serious trouble in securing adequate operational funds for next year. It is hoped that lowering the county budget will not eliminate the proposed property evaluation.

This corner would like to make one comment concerning remarks heard at last week's hearing. Schools are important and no one will deny that fact. But, all governmental units are equally important—none can operate without the other.

It was not a case for the allocation board to decide "which is the most important," as one school representative stated, but, rather, a case of economics this year. Because of the fact that the state required local government to allocate nine mills to schools, or lose a proportionate share of state aid, the work of the allocation board was pretty well decided beforehand.

It was the opinion of one person attending the meeting that all taxing units—principally schools and county should make an attempt to understand the other's problems. This corner will second that motion.

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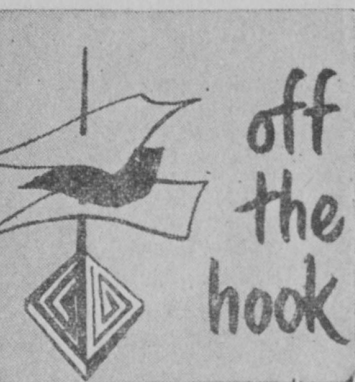
