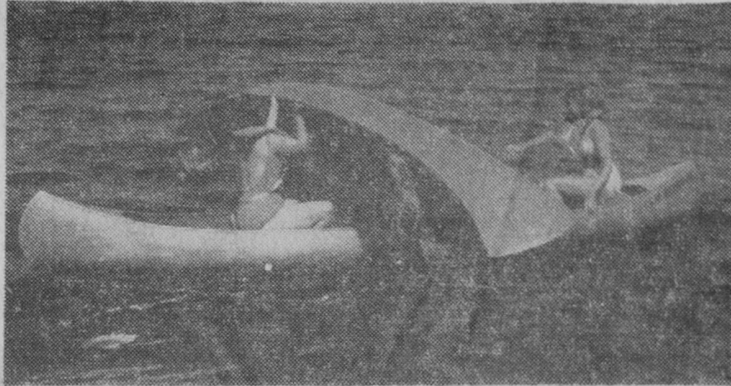
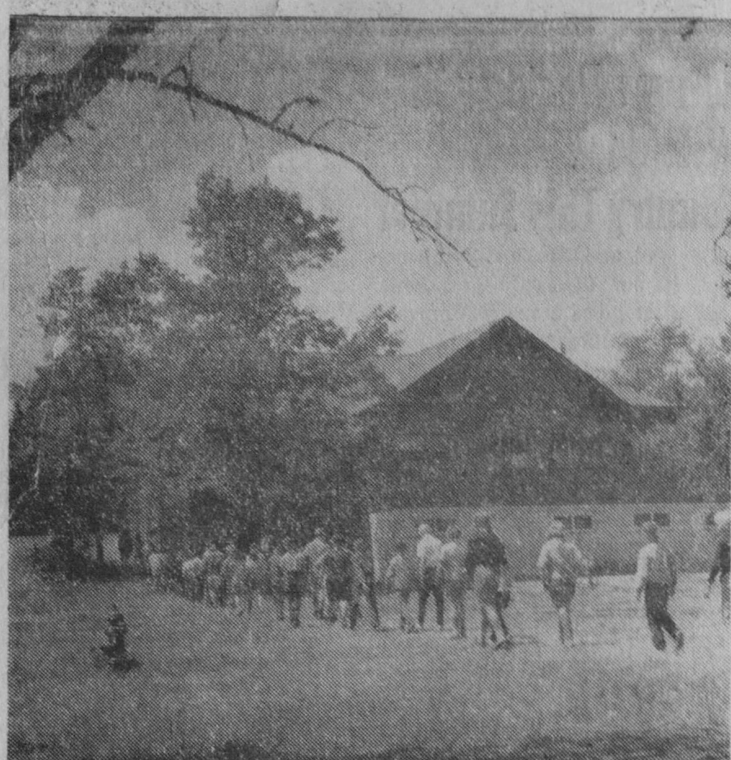

East Tawas Hires Bond Expert for Sewer Plans

First step toward planning for a proposed \$786,000 sewerage treatment facility and collection system improvements was taken Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

Julius Hanslovsky of Lansing was hired to handle financing measures for the proposed facility. He would plan all financial phases of a bond issue, work with consulting engineers and bonding attorneys and make necessary applications to the Municipal Finance Commission for permission to issue and sell bonds.

Hanslovsky told the council Monday night that it was advisable to file an application with the Water Resources Commission for a federal grant under the Water Pollution Control Act for assistance in the financing of the proposed sewerage treatment plant. This must be filed by September 15 and is already being prepared.

Cost of Hanslovsky's services to the city would be \$3,600. In other business, Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper reported that work was to be completed Tuesday on seal-coating of city streets and that major construction on Newman Street to Tawas Lake Road was to be commenced.

The city clerk was instructed to notify Thofiel DeMaet, Tawas Lake boat livery operator, of a complaint received that his boats were blocking a public easement to the lake. The city ordered the boats removed from public property.

Police Chief Donald Docking's request for a light in the parking lot east of the Waterways Commission Dock was approved.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie issued a proclamation, in conjunction with one signed by Gov. George Romney, encouraging the ringing of all church bells on July 4. Bells would be rung at 1:00 p. m. for five minutes.

Admit Eight to Citizenship
Eight persons were admitted to citizenship during naturalization proceedings last Thursday in Isosco Circuit Court.

The new citizens are Michiko Jones, Roseta Frye, Cecile Hall, Ingrid Esposito, Maria McNally, Monika Baize, Paul Hanen and Wilhemine Hammond. 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Let Contracts June 25 for Medi-Care Facility

Contracts are to be let June 25 and ground broken sometime in July for the new Isosco County Medi-Care Facility, according to C. S. Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors welfare committee.

Low bids totaling \$475,516 were accepted June 15 and contracts are to be awarded contingent upon final approval of the federal government.

Final application for a federal grant in the amount of \$290,000 has been submitted to the Michigan Department of Health and, when approved, the federal funds are to be combined with proceeds from Isosco's \$300,000 bond issue to finance cost of the project.

Everett and his committee have recommended that construction contracts be awarded as follows: General—L. A. Trapp Construction Company, Grand Rapids \$248,867; mechanical—Flint Plumbing and Heating, Flint, \$151,400; electrical—Normsmith Electric, Cheboygan, \$53,955; kitchen equipment—Great Lakes Hotel Supply, Detroit, \$22,295.

Also authorized was a contract for laundry equipment not to exceed \$13,000.

Only local contract received was from Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated.

Among those attending last Tuesday's bid opening were representatives of the architectural firm of Spence and Smith, Michigan Department of Health, Isosco Welfare Board and the board of supervisors' welfare committee.

Everett expressed satisfaction with construction bids and he reported that prices were considerably lower than previously anticipated by the architect.

Work on the new facility is to be completed within 330 days of letting the contract. This would place the completion date around June 1, 1966.

Isosco's new home for the aged, approved last summer by voters, is to be located on the former Bradley property just west of the city limit of Tawas City and south of Plank Road.

Zoning Fee Schedule OK'd by TC Council
Tawas City's new zoning code has been implemented with a schedule of fees to be paid for inspections, applications, issuance of building permits and certificates of occupancy as required by the new ordinance.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, who serves as the zoning administrator, emphasized at Monday night's council meeting that a building permit is required for any type of construction or change in a structure, no matter how minor the work performed.

Cost for the five steps required under the new ordinance would be \$5, as compared to the \$1 fee provided under the old ordinance.

The five steps and costs of each are as follows: Application for building permit, \$1; issuance of permit, \$1; certificate of occupancy, \$1; final inspection, \$2.

Much more information is required to prepare the new applications, including a complete sketch of the property showing existing buildings and proposed new construction. The zoning administrator would assist the applicant in preparing this information, thus the initial \$1 fee. The next two steps would require paper work and a fee is provided for each. The final inspection would be made by the zoning administrator.

All appeals filed under the new ordinance are to be accompanied by a fee of \$5. If the city is requested to complete the steps required to perfect the appeal, which includes notification of adjacent property owners, the fee would be \$15.

All fees adopted are to be credited to the city's general fund, reports City Attorney Alf C. Watson.

Bublitz said that in some cases, where work is of a minor nature, the last two steps could be waived and the applicant need only pay the first two \$1 fees. This would be at the discretion of the zoning administrator.

Funeral services for Agnes (Dolly) Savage Grise of Tawas City will be conducted Thursday, June 24, 9:00 a. m., at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Tawas City. The Rev. Fr. John Kolevar will officiate with burial in St. Joseph Cemetery, East Tawas. Rosary will be recited tonight (Wednesday), 8 o'clock, at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City.

Mrs. Grise died Sunday, June 20, at McLaren Hospital, Flint, from injuries suffered in an auto accident June 16 as she was returning from her father's funeral in Detroit. She was born February 1, 1917, and married Harold Grise Tuesday, June 26, 1939, at Detroit. Mr. Grise preceded her in death October 18, 1963.

She was a past president of Immaculate Heart of Mary Altar Society, past president of Tawas Hospital Auxiliary, secretary of Isosco County Red Cross Blood Bank and had served as dietician at Immaculate Heart of Mary School.

Among survivors is her mother, Mrs. Felicks Sanbor of Detroit.

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East Tawas Man Dies in US-23 Crash

A 33-year-old East Tawas businessman, Adrian Hamel, died of injuries received early Tuesday morning in an automobile crash south of Tawas City.

Hamel was a passenger in a car driven by his wife, Joan Ann. Mrs. Hamel was injured and treated at Tawas Hospital. The accident occurred at 5:45 a. m.

Investigating state police officers learned from a witness that the Hamel vehicle had passed a car and, when she attempted to turn back into her lane, she cut too sharply and lost control of the vehicle.

The Hamel car went into a ditch on the left side of the road, rolled over and skidded 260 feet before coming to a stop near Blair Road intersection.

Mr. Hamel was thrown from the car by the impact. He died later of internal injuries.

Mrs. Hamel sustained minor injuries in the crash consisting of a lacerated ankle and bruises.

Hamel operated an office equipment sales and service at 312 Newman Street.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Kathy and Linda.

The races drew a crowd of several hundred persons along the course and finish line at the corners of West State Street and Newman Street, East Tawas.

First place winners were as follows:

Tricycle, five and under, boys and girls, Jane Mooney; boys, ages six and seven, Thomas Mooney; girls, ages six and seven, Kimarie Wickert; boys, ages eight, nine and 10, Kevin Elliott; girls, ages eight, nine and 10, Joann Quarters.

Winning the mile race for boys, age 11-13, was Lyle Klinger, while Marjorie Schaaf won first place in girls. Bruce Davenport won the mile race for boys, age 14-16, while Elsie Osborne, won in the same category for girls.

Feature race of the day, a two-mile event for boys 17 years of age and over, was won by James Sass. Sass paced himself well over the four-lap course and he completed the route in seven minutes, 2 1/2 seconds. Second place was won by James Riley.

Ribbons were presented to winners following the races by Donald Mooney, president of the East Tawas Business Association.

Several of the contestants are to be encouraged to participate in the tour of the Lumbermen's Monument 50-mile Olympic race to be held here in September.

Park Commission Approves Paving Streets-Parking Lot

Paving of streets in the city park and parking lot at the community building was approved June 19 at a special meeting of the East Tawas Park Commission.

Cost of the bituminous surface would be \$1,644. Work would be by Yockey Construction Company, Alpena.

The board also made purchases of markers and buoys for the swimming area, a two-way radio system for use in the park and a sewage tank for self-contained trailers.

Tawas City Council OKs Parking Lane

Construction of a 700-foot parking lane on the lake side of US-23 from the post office to the east end of the city park has been authorized by the Tawas City Council.

This action came Monday night

after reading a letter from the Michigan State Highway Department. The city was notified that an eight-inch aggregate base with bituminous surface would be sufficient for the lane, rather than a concrete base course as specified earlier.

The city authorized the state highway department to include this construction in its plans for renovating US-23 through Tawas City, yet to be approved. Cost of the parking lane would be borne by the city.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz said that cost of the lane with aggregate base would be \$2,500, as compared to \$8,000 for the concrete base.

In other business, the council approved the annual maintenance contract with the state highway department. Bublitz said the new contract reflected a \$647 increase over the past year's \$12,155 pact. He noted that the city is also to receive an additional \$2,100 for snow removal this year.

Tawas City has 3 1/2 miles of state trunklines, which represent 63,877 square yards of pavement and 14,520 lineal feet of curbing.

On request of E. Irwin Gauthier, the council authorized opening an alley in Ferguson's Addition to serve his warehouse building. The building is to be used for cable storage by General Cable Television.

A hearing was set for July 19 on a special assessment district being established to finance construction of sanitary sewer on German Street, 60 by 94 feet, \$25,000; L. J. Trinklein, 1197 Lake Street, 40 by 60 marine sales building, \$7,500; George Wood, 203 Wheeler Street, new footing under garage, \$40; Delano Myles, 1130 Bay Drive, eight by 10-foot tornado shelter, \$150.

Tawas Lake Dam Proposal to be Aired

Final decision on whether or not to go ahead with allowing construction of a dam on Tawas Lake is to be taken at the July meeting of Isosco Board of Supervisors.

Attorney Paul Harvey, who represents an association of Tawas Lake property owners, is to attend the session and present his views.

The proposed dam ran into a snag about a year ago when the board voted against starting condemnation proceedings against property owners for a dam site.

In other business conducted at the June session, the board approved changes in Alabaster Township's zoning ordinance.

The board did not concur with a resolution from Allegan County calling for changing township elections back to April and did not favor four-year terms instead of two.

The board concurred with a resolution from Allegan County opposing salary increases to members of the state legislature.

A resolution from the roads and bridges committee adopted opposing closing of Scott Road in Baldwin Township.

Salary increases, recommended by the officers salary committee for the probate judge and director of the county Addressograph department were rejected on a roll call vote.

The board tabled a request from the county clerk and sheriff's department for purchase of a tape recorder.

Payment of \$65 for extra clerk's help in the probate judge's office was approved by a seven to six roll call.

On recommendation of Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickey, Chester A. Simpson was requested to remove all control devices he has installed to restore the flow of Huron Creek.

As a means of protecting the public health, welfare and safety, the board passed a resolution prohibiting the shooting of firearms, air or gas pellet guns, bows and arrows, slingshots and all other devices of like matter in the county-operated Old Orchard Park.

Isosco Jury Finds 'No Cause' Verdict

An Isosco Circuit Court jury deliberated 4 1/2 hours Friday before bringing in a unanimous "no cause for action" verdict on an auto negligence lawsuit.

Seeking damages of \$101,000 were J. Berkeley Smith and wife of Oscoda vs. Burnetta Miller, Tawas Area School teacher. A cross complaint asking \$27,500 damages had been filed by Miss Miller.

The lawsuit resulted from an auto collision November 7, 1963, south of Tawas City, involving cars operated by Smith and Miss Miller.

The Miller vehicle had pulled out of a private driveway near National Gypsum Company's conveyor system which passes under US-23. Her car was struck from behind by the Smith vehicle. Both Smith and a passenger, Kenneth Conn, East Tawas, were injured.

Four trial days were required to hear the lawsuit and 12 jurors, seven men and five women, were empaneled from a list of 30 persons. At the request of attorneys, Judge Allan C. Miller polled each juror for his verdict at the close of the trial.

Sel Firearm Deer Kill at 138,000

Game men of the Michigan Conservation Department have their sights tentatively set on a firearm take of 138,000 deer in November and an elk kill of over 200, patterned after last December's successful hunt.

Their present plans, reflecting prospects that this fall's deer and elk herds will be at least up to last year's levels, were previewed before the conservation commission during its June 10-11 meeting at Gaylord. The department's preliminary recommendations will undoubtedly be changed somewhat before they are presented for formal action at the commission's July meeting in Traverse City, but their general forecast of a high deer take and modest elk harvest will hold firm. As now projected, the deer season's kill would be made up of some 75,000 bucks and 3,000 antlerless animals to compare closely with last year's take of 140,000 whitetails which is second best on record. A regional breakdown of the planned antlerless figure includes nearly 18,700 deer from the Upper Peninsula, 42,735 from the northern half of Lower Michigan, and about 2,970 out of the southern part of the state. Estimating shooting success from results of previous years, the department plans to issue about 228,000 special permits in an effort to meet its goal for antlerless kill. Approximately 35,000 square miles will be open to shooting deer of either sex. In 1964, antlerless deer hunting areas covered 31,000 square miles; some 192,000 permits were issued.
