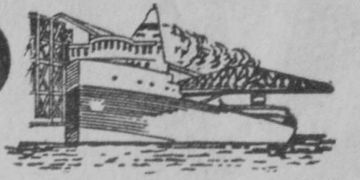

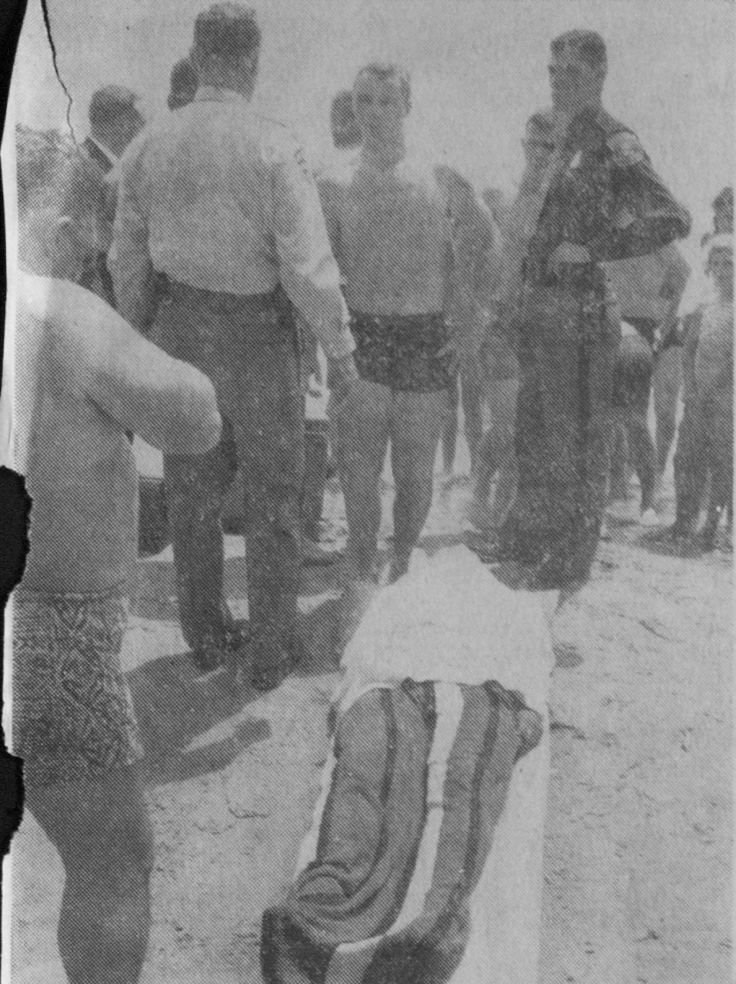

## East Tawas Teen is First Drowning Victim of '65

An 18-year-old East Tawas boy drowned Sunday afternoon off shore from the East Tawas Park, within sight of hundreds of persons who jammed the beach to enjoy perfect swimming conditions.

Dead is James Henry Hodge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrie Hodge, 515 Sawyer Street. James and a companion, Michael Riley, anchored the Hodge outboard motor boat about 50 yards off shore and 75 yards west of the Michigan Waterways Commission dock. The two boys then dove into the water and began to swim toward shore.

Riley told investigating officers that, after he reached shallow water, he looked back and saw the other boy was in trouble and swam to his aid. Hodge, he said, began to struggle with him and Riley was unable to assist him.

At first, Riley's calls for help went unnoticed on shore. The boys had anchored the boat beyond the outer limit and just east of an area marked with flags for swimming purposes and patrolled by the lifeguard. Riley finally attracted attention of other swimmers, who called for the lifeguard, Donald Evans, seated in his tower more than 100 yards from the scene.

Evans ran east along the beach and then into the water. Hodge's body was found in from 5 1/2 to six feet of water. He would have had to swim only a few more feet before he could have stood on bottom.

Assisting in bringing the victim ashore was L. G. (Ladd) McKay, who heard the call for help and began swimming from the Michigan Waterways Commission dock. Also assisting were Michigan State Police Troopers William Miller of Ithaca and Richard Perry of Erie, who were vacationing at the park and in the water at the time.

Evans' attempts to revive the boy with mouth-to-mouth resuscitation were unsuccessful, as were attempts later with a resuscitator. Assisting were City Patrolman Robert Langlois, State Trooper Payne Kramer and E. John Moffatt, coroner. The boy was pronounced dead by Dr. Raymond L. Patton. Hodge was born March 24, 1947, in Garden City. He attended Whit-

temore-Prescott Area High School last year and would have been a senior this fall.

He is survived by his parents; eight brothers, Jack, Ogden, Utah; Dennis L. Fort Benning, Georgia; Walter, Los Angeles, California; Richard and Thomas of Chicago, Illinois; Robert, Willow; Randy and Gary at home; one sister, Mrs. Gay Hall, Taylor; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Jarrell, Romulus, and Mrs. Anna Howard, New Boston.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday (today), 2:00 p. m., Jacques Funeral Home, with the Rev. Robert Morrison officiating.

This is the second tragedy to strike the Hodge family in less than a year. On August 19, 1964, Gregory H. Hodge, 15, brother of Sunday's victim, was killed in an automobile crash on Plank Road west of Tawas City. James will be buried near his brother at RLDS Cemetery, Whittemore.

## Water Lowered on AuSable Dams

Repair work at Consumers Power Company's Loud and Five Channels hydroelectric plants on the AuSable River will require lowering the plant pond levels for periods during July.

Paul F. Ingell, region superintendent for Consumers Power, said the Loud pond will be lowered a total of three feet at the rate of one foot per day beginning the evening of July 5. By July 12, it will be back to normal. While the levels are down, repairs will be made to the concrete walls on the upstream side of the plants.

Mr. Ingell said the repair periods were chosen after consultation with the state conservation department to minimize inconvenience to fishermen.

Pond level will be restored well ahead of the annual AuSable Valley canoe race scheduled for August 21.

## Announce Free Prizes for Tourist Festival

The pony and saddle will be given away Saturday, July 17, 5:00 p. m., and the winner must be present at the drawing. The carnival is to be set up at this location from July 12 through July 17.

At the same time and location, the festival grand prize will also be drawn. This prize includes air travel for two from Tri-City Airport to New York and back, hotel room for three nights and four days in New York where the winners will visit the World's Fair. The pair will also be given spending money while in New York.

Tickets can be obtained now at all businesses in the Tawas area displaying the World's Fair poster. Contestants must be 18 years of age or older and need not be present at the drawing to win.

Thousands of visitors are expected to jam Isosco County this weekend for the annual observance of Independence Day. Because July 4 falls on Sunday this year, the following Monday is a legal holiday.

Some of the activities planned this week-end are fireworks sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, visit of the Michigan Historical Commission's historymobile and regular Saturday night auto racing at Whittemore Speedway.

Harness racing will be featured at Isosco County Fairgrounds, Hale, Sunday, July 4, 2:00 p. m. Tawas City Park will be the site of Sunday night's fireworks display, sponsored by the chamber in conjunction with city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas.

Oscoda has plans for a big holiday week-end sponsored by the Jaycees. The program will include a dance Friday night, canoe race Saturday afternoon, a parade Sunday at 2:00 p. m. with floats depicting local history, children's games at 3:30 p. m. and a fireworks display at Oscoda Township Park at 9:00 p. m.

Discontinuance of a cooperative training program at Tawas Area High School was directed Monday night by the board of education. The program had been tried on an experimental basis during the past school year with Robert Reasner as director.

According to a report included with Monday night's agenda, 13 students were participating in on-the-job training during summer months. The summary also listed 11 of last June's graduates as taking part in the program.

The board was to have taken action on hiring Reasner for five weeks during the summer to supervise the program. Cost would have been \$159 a week.

Students participating during the school year were eligible to receive one-quarter of a credit when enrolled under school supervision. Reasner visited employers on a periodic basis to determine progress of the student's work.

It was the opinion of board members that the program had not proven successful during the past year. Board members believed that a greater number of students could be supervised by the teacher in the classroom, rather than under the cooperative training plan.

A roll call on a motion for discontinuance of the program for the time being, or until such time when evidence warrants resumption of the program, passed by a six to one roll call. Voting in favor were Walter Champion, Waldo Curry, Donald Deering, Mrs. Helen Payea, Pres. Leonard Sarki and Clyde Soper. Voting against discontinuance was Walter Niles.

In other business, Supt. Reynold Mick presented contracts for three teachers and announced that attempts to find a replacement for Miss Grace Asplund in the commercial department had proven unsuccessful.

Contracts signed included those for Miss Barbara Mercer, fifth grade, social studies major, graduate of Ottawa University, Kansas, with one year at Kansas City University. She is a former Tawas City resident; Roger C. Spencer, Michigan State University, elementary

## Thousands of Miles Apart, but Pen Pals Finally Meet

Two pen pals of nearly 25 years' standing, separated by a half a continent and thousands of miles of Pacific Ocean, met each other for the first time last week-end.

Mrs. Beth Pugh of Tawas City and Mrs. Loris Fletcher of Melbourne, Australia, who have been corresponding since their high school days, spent a thrilling week-end together here with their families.

Their meeting came about under several chance circumstances. After corresponding with each other on a regular basis during high school, the two girls began to drift apart and the number of letters dwindled as each married and began to raise families. Exchanging of Christmas cards finally became their only contact.

When Mrs. Fletcher learned that her school-teacher husband, Harry,

had been selected to participate in the Fulbright scholarship program in the United States, she immediately sent a letter to Beth, whose husband, Vernon, operates Hiron Loan Company here.

But, during the past several years, the Pughs have lived at Fenton, Sault Ste. Marie, East Tawas and finally here on Bay Drive. Letters mailed to the former addresses were returned by the post office to Australia as "unknown."

The Fletchers and their two children, Andrea, 10, and Julie, 13, finally left Melbourne, not knowing if Mrs. Fletcher would ever meet her friend in the United States. Mr. Fletcher taught high school science and mathematics during the past term in Spokane, Washington, and they were ready to return home.

Mrs. Fletcher learned of the Pughs' new address when a Christmas card sent to Australia by Mrs. Pugh was forwarded to Spokane by Mrs. Fletcher's mother. She immediately called Tawas City and the two friends finally met.

The Fletchers arrived here Saturday morning on their return trip to Australia. They are making the 4,000-mile trip from Spokane to New York City, New York, by station wagon and are camping in national parks along the way.

While it may seem like an around-the-world vacation, Fletcher is actually collecting information on schools here which he will use in his teaching when they return to Australia later in the summer.

The trip across the United States will serve as a well-earned

vacation for Fletcher. December and January are summer months in Australia and the school year runs from February through December. As a consequence, Fletcher had been teaching for nearly 18 months straight, with the September-June term at Spokane.

The Fletchers have found much in common between the United States and Australia. Both are young countries and Australia ranks second behind the United States in automobiles per capita of population.

The two Fletcher girls enjoyed seeing snow for the first time in Washington and thought bathing in Tawas Bay with the three Pugh (See PEN PALS, page 8.)

## Ferris State Lists Two Tawas Grads

Two Tawas City residents were among the 983 Ferris State College students who received degrees or certificates at the June 13 commencement.

The graduates, part of an audience of more than 6,000, heard Walter F. Carey, chairman of the board of the United States Chamber of Commerce, explain the labor paradox where "nearly four million Americans are without jobs at a time when personnel managers are combing the country for skilled workers."

The students and their fields of specialization were Ruth A. Rollin, certificate, special business skills, commerce, and Janet L. Smith, associate of applied science degree, executive secretarial, commerce.

## Hospital Tells New Schedule of Bed Charges

Sister Rose Helene, administrator of Tawas Hospital, announced today that the hospital will increase its rates, effective July 1.

Semiprivate rates will go up to \$21 from \$18 per day, a \$3 increase. Pediatric ward rates will be increased \$2 per day, from \$15 to \$17, and private room rates will be \$28 per day, an increase of \$7 over the old rate of \$21.

The administrator stated that the new rates were necessary to keep the hospital on a self-sustaining basis.

The administrator pointed out that the new charges were decided upon only after a comprehensive study of the hospital's own rates, charges and expenses, and the rates and charges of other hospitals in Districts IV and V of the Michigan Hospital Association. These districts cover the Thumb and Bay City area and the Lower Peninsula counties north of M-55.

The administrator also pointed out that the new charges brought the cost of hospital care at Tawas Hospital to 87 1/2 cents per hour as compared to a national cost of \$1.75 per hour.

## Park 'Harvests' Crop of Glass Left by Visitors

"Our crop of broken glass is second to none," was the comment Tuesday of Ray Prosch, manager of Tawas Point State Park, as his crew of five was hard at work clearing up a mountain of debris left by Sunday's visitors.

The Tawas Point beach, with frontage on both Lake Huron and Tawas Bay, was littered by hundreds of broken beer bottles, waste paper and garbage, left by week-end "fun-seekers." Park employees were bringing in broken glass by the bushel.

"We found picnic or beach party sites where several cases of empty beer bottles were stacked up and then smashed—even to the extent of throwing broken glass into the water," said Prosch. "This would be great for the kids to step on."

Prosch said this was one reason why a permanent gate has been installed at the lighthouse stopping all vehicular traffic to the fog horn.

"People are welcome to use this nature area on the tip of Tawas Point, but not cars," said Prosch. "Perhaps we can curb these beach parties and reduce littering of the shoreline."

Although open to the public, Tawas Point State Park is still under construction and camp sites are to be completed sometime next month.

## Floating Laboratory Visited Local Port

Floating laboratory of the United States Corps of Engineers lake survey crew made Tawas Harbor a port of call last Tuesday. Catamaran No. 4 docked overnight at the Michigan Waterways Dock, East Tawas, on its way to the Straits of Mackinac.

The survey crew is measuring wind, water and sedimentary movements and hope eventually to control the level of Lake Huron.

On board the 30-foot catamaran were Wayne Townsend, hydraulic engineer; John Grumblatt, party chief; Roman Stack and Ray Scheppeler.

## Detroiters Liked Area's Hospitality

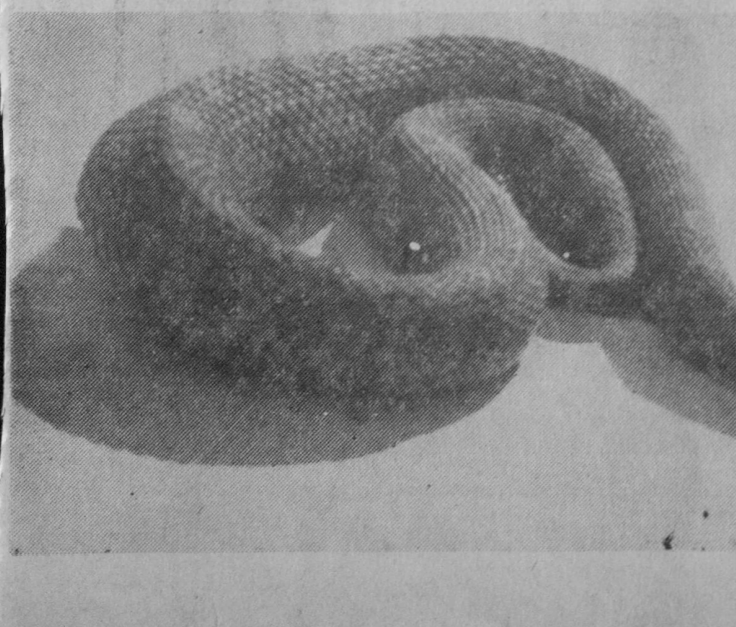

"We had an excellent week—everything was perfect," commented the Englunds. "The weather man was good to us and the perch were biting. Who could ask for more?"

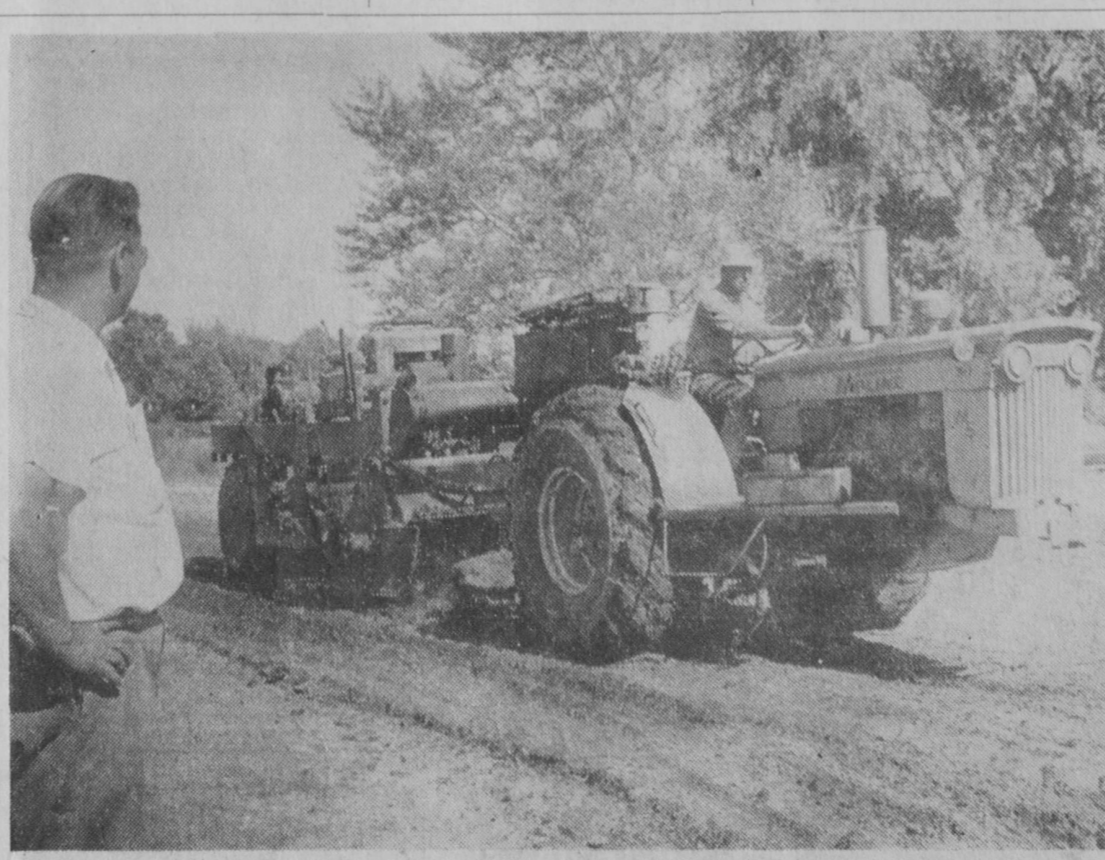
The Englunds said they had met many local residents during their stay and "we shall vacation in your cities again."
