

TC Property Owners to Discuss New Appraisals

Informal hearings to discuss values placed on real estate of Tawas City, as a result of a recent equalization study conducted by Gem Surveys, will be held March 22, 23, 24 and 25 at the city hall.

According to City Clerk Walter C. Nelson, the hearings are to pre-

cede final meetings of the board of review which have been set for March 29, 30 and 31.

It is important that property owners bring cards mailed to them this week when appearing at next week's hearing.

In mid-January, Tawas City Council hired the St. Clair firm to make a comprehensive property appraisal for tax purposes. Since then, a crew of three men made a house-to-house canvass of the city and then made a survey of commercial buildings.

Work has been completed on preparing individual record cards for each parcel of land in the city showing location of buildings on lots, physical improvements and appraised value.

Considerable work remains for ward supervisors and members of the board of review, who must now assess the property using information gained by the survey and then prepare the tax rolls.

The board of review has held several meetings during recent weeks to check reports submitted by owners of personal property.

City Librarian Arlene Leslie Died Monday

Miss Arlene Leslie, who had served as Tawas City's librarian for more than 18 years, died Monday at Mercy Hospital, Bay City. Death was caused by a heart attack.

Miss Leslie was a friend to children of the community over the years, having conducted summer reading programs in addition to other services of the library. She had served the library when it was located in the city hall and later at its present location in the Buch Building. She had also been a member of the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library staff and was a member of Tawas City Chapter No. 303, OES.

Miss Leslie had been organist at the Tawas City Baptist Church for the past 15 years. Her body will lie in state there from 12 o'clock noon Friday until 2:00 p. m. when funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. Alfred P. Miller. Burial will be at RLDs Cemetery, Whitmore.

The body will be at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City, until removal to the church.

Survivors include her parents; three brothers, Waldo R., Tawas City; Wallace R., Capac; and William R., Reed City.

The family requests that memorials be made to the organ fund for the Tawas City Baptist Church.

Salaries of City Officers to Remain Unchanged

Salaries of city officials are to remain unchanged for another year, according to action taken at Monday night's meeting of Tawas City Council.

Schedule of last year was as follows: Mayor, \$125 per year; clerk, \$600; treasurer, \$400 plus one percent tax collection fee; fire chief, \$50; supervisors, \$150; aldermen, \$4 per meeting attended.

In other business, City Attorney Alf C. Watson reported that the city treasurer had collected all delinquent personal taxes. He said that next year's personal tax collection would start earlier in order to force those habitually tardy to meet a February 1 deadline.

A meeting of the park board is to be held Thursday or Friday evening of this week to make plans for painting the interior of the railroad car museum in the city park. Councilman Howard Hatton urged that work be completed in order to have it ready for public viewing by June 1.

E. Tawas to Study Appraisal Project Proposed by Gem

City officials of East Tawas are to study the possibility of hiring a professional firm to appraise real estate for tax purposes.

Appearing before Monday night's council meeting was Glen Mask of St. Clair, whose Gem Surveys recently completed an appraisal of residential, commercial and industrial property in Tawas City.

Estimated cost of the East Tawas project would be \$13,200. City Assessor Deloise (Dewey) Durant said that East Tawas had a total of 1,511 property descriptions, including 1,362 residential and 149 commercial. There are 985 dwellings and 112 commercial buildings.

Gem Surveys has also discussed possible property appraisals with officials of Oscoda and AuSable Township. Mask has been invited to appear before Wednesday's session of the Iosco Board of Supervisors to discuss possible appraisal of the entire county.

East Tawas, as well as Tawas City and several townships of Iosco, is to join Alabaster Township in using state equalized values this year for assessing all taxes. Previously, only county and school taxes were based on the state valuation, which, in most cases, is about double the locally assessed figure.

When Tawas City approved the complete property appraisal by Gem Surveys in January, officials were of the opinion that it was the fairest method of establishing a base for tax assessments.

TA Chamber Roll Now Numbers 91

A current count shows that there are 91 members of the Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce since the membership drive opened January 1.

Second billing of the fair share minimum dues schedule will be mailed to the remaining businesses of the Tawas effective the first week of April.

"It is to be remembered that this is not a statement but the amount that the chamber or some member would have to pay for promotional benefits if all businesses do not participate in the membership plan," states Leonard Calabrese, membership chairman. The amount was derived by classification of businesses or organizations.

East Tawas to Study Sewer Project Finances

Authorization to start plans for financing a \$722,000 sewer construction project was given at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Retained to develop a financial plan was Julius Hanslovsky of Lansing, who has served the city on a number of previous occasions as its consultant on fiscal matters.

This program, which was originally considered last year but commenced too late to receive federal aid in planning, includes construction of a new disposal plant, trunkline sewers, lift stations and lateral sanitary sewers. Cost of the first three named would be approximately \$374,000.

Hanslovsky recommended that the city obtain applications for various federal funds available for such projects. With no outstanding general obligation bonds for

the past 10 years, the financial consultant said that East Tawas had plenty of borrowing power to finance such a project.

Assuming that the city would receive federal assistance in the project, Hanslovsky said that the balance could be paid through general obligation or revenue bonds. He also pointed out that it had been past policy of the city to finance construction of sanitary sewer laterals through special assessments.

Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper said that engineering for such a project was expensive and that federal funds could be available for such work. He had already discussed the matter with Spicer Engineering of Saginaw, the city's engineering consultant.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie stressed the need for immediate action on the project.

In other business, Lewis Besancon, secretary of the board of public works, reported that a bid from Badger Meter Manufacturing Company had been accepted for furnishing 675 water meters. Cost of outside reading five-eighths inch residential meters was \$38 each. The program is being financed by a revenue bond issue.

The council adopted a new ordinance formally establishing a five-member park commission. The commission, already organized, also includes one member of the council.

Park Commission Chairman Merton Killey reported on progress of modernization and repairs to the community building. The council authorized \$350 for purchase of new aluminum doors for the building.

Resignation of Earl McElheron as a member of the board of canvassers was accepted. Joseph Hennigan was named as his successor. Mr. McElheron is a candidate in the spring election for councilman.

Authorization was given to purchase four metal boxes to be used as curbside depositories for paying parking tickets. Parking meters are to go into operation April 1.

Expenditure of \$430 was authorized for planting 28 new trees and fertilization of trees planted last year in the city's beautification program. Ziehl's Nursery was again hired to do the work.

The council adopted a resolution calling for the superintendent of public works to act as the city's representative in dealings with the state highway department.

Wallace D. (Mike) Nunn submitted his resignation March 12 as a member of the Iosco County Road Commission, with which he had been affiliated by appointment and election since 1950.

"My resignation comes as a result of my appointment by Governor Romney, November 13, to the new Michigan State Highway Commission and confirmation by the senate on March 11," said Nunn.

"It has been a privilege and pleasure to have served on the Iosco Road Commission. The cooperation of the commissioners, engineers, superintendent and employees has been gratifying and helped make Iosco one of the leading counties in highway progress in the State of Michigan," said Nunn.

He thanked the people for the support and confidence tendered him during the past 15 years.

A successor to Nunn will probably be appointed at today's (Wednesday) meeting of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

A committee to make plans for Tawas City's participation in mayor's exchange day during the Michigan Week program in May was appointed Monday night by Mayor George Tuttle.

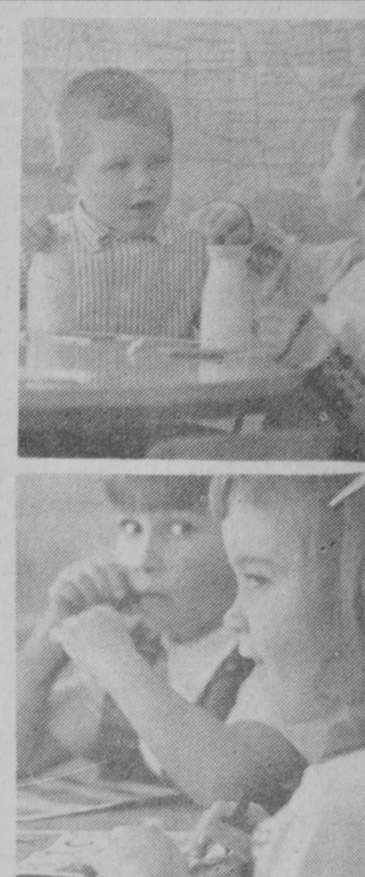
Named to the committee were City Supt. Reginald Bublitz and Aldermen Howard Hatton and Cecil Cable.

Kindergarten Said to Play Important Educational Role

"Kindergarten experience is an important part of a child's education. It is a part of a continuing school experience. Kindergarten is not a preschool class, but, rather, an integral part of the elementary school program."

So stated Mrs. R. J. Cooke, a kindergarten teacher in the elementary department of Tawas Area School, who spoke before the board of education last Thursday night.

Her report is one of a series being given at board of education meetings by the various departments of the school. It was accompanied by color slides snapped during classes, examples of materials used and sample report cards.

Mrs. Cooke was also the featured speaker at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association.

Speaking on behalf of all kindergarten teachers, Mrs. Cooke said that working with young children was a rewarding experience.

"Young children respond when properly directed. Our job is to start the 'engine' of the child's mind, so we do not have to keep propelling it," she stated.

She said that an educator had spoken of kindergarten as being composed of the "fascinating five," and Mrs. Cooke feels that was truly a good, short description of the children.

Some of the characteristics of five-year-olds, she said, were: The large muscles of children are coordinated much more than the smaller muscles, the eye muscles are susceptible to colds and illness. Mentally, the child likes to explore, feel, touch and ask questions. The attention span is short.

"He must have many concrete experiences," said Mrs. Cooke of

the kindergarten. As an example, she told of the delight children had in watching the various stages of the development of the monarch butterfly. She has also found that a bowl of goldfish often helps children overcome shyness.

A child starting to school likes to do hard things, as long as he sees a reason or purpose for it.

"Emotionally, he is a quick change artist—changing from sunny to cloudy and cloudy to sunny on the spur of the moment," she said.

"We want children to have the attitude to want to like to explore the world in which they live, to be a part of the group, to express ideas verbally and through the media of art, painting what they truly feel," she stated.

Skills developed through kindergarten include the sharing of ideas and materials, to help others when they need help, to carry out simple directions, to develop a desire to learn to read and to make numerals meaningful.

"Our job is to guide growth, not force it," said Mrs. Cooke. "The task of the kindergarten teacher is to support the child's intellectual growth as part of his total development."

"We must train the child to live richly and fully at each stage of his development," said Mrs. Cooke. "We enjoy trying to get them to enjoy being five-year-olds."

Board Seeks to Fill TA Teacher Vacancies

Administrators of Tawas Area School are now advertising for teachers to fill an expected six vacancies in the elementary department and five or more known vacancies on the junior and senior high school staff; for the 1965-1966 term.

At last Thursday's meeting of the board of education, High School Principal Ernest Jordan said that vacancies now existed in a high school social study class, eighth and ninth grade science, junior high English. An extra English teacher is also to be hired this year.

Applications are now being received to fill the vacancy of Herbert Escott as head football coach.

Vacancies also exist in assistant junior varsity football, junior varsity basketball and ninth grade basketball, which probably amounts to duplication as one teacher would handle more than one assignment.

Two vacancies exist in the first grade, two vacancies in the second and one teacher would be hired for sixth and seventh grade English, replacing Mrs. Edward Westphal, who transfers to the high school home economics department replacing Miss Eleanor Foreman, according to Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal.

Secretary Walter Niles and Mrs. Helen Payea were appointed by Pres. Leonard Sarki to continue work as the board's salary committee.

An annual increase of \$300 was granted to Supt. Reynold Mick and to Principals Jordan and Bolen.

The board adopted a policy of allowing two days off for deer hunting next fall, November 15 and 16. The season opens on Monday.

Eligible two-year teachers placed on tenure were Mrs. Susan Freel, Mrs. Marian Klenow, Richard Fairless and Miss Grace Asplund. At the request of Mrs. Arlene Brown, she is to continue teaching for another year off tenure.

Approved for their second year as probationary teachers under the tenure act were Mrs. Barbara Erickson, E. Paul Young, Miss Judith Gillie, Mrs. Alice Deftbaugh, Mrs. M. Joan Alpert, Robert Erickson, Mrs. Barbara Miller and Mrs. Lois Fuerst.

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State Police Warn Of Drowning Danger In Water Areas

With 16 Michigan water deaths already recorded this year, the state police have issued a seasonal reminder that thawing weather increases the drowning danger for unprepared youngsters and other persons who fail to follow safety rules in water areas.

At least 13 of the deaths involved persons who broke through ice or fell into water from bridges, banks or docks. The others included a Scuba diver, a boat operator and a passenger.

Pointing out that five of the victims were youngsters, four less than 10 years old, the state police urged parents to warn children of the dangers of rotting ice and flood waters. Adequate supervision is advised for youngsters wherever there is water accident danger.

The state's drownings averaged more than one a week so far in 1965, three more than the toll of 13 charged to the first full three months last year.

Accident reports show that several vehicles used by fishermen also have broken through weakened ice. Involved were situations where ice that appeared strong on its surface was weakened from beneath.

The Spanish and United States English editions likewise are published in Nashville. All other editions with the exception of French, Russian and Hungarian are published in the respective countries. The French edition is published in

Haiti; the Russian in Sweden, and the Hungarian in Canada. There are 10 editions published in India and four in the Philippines.

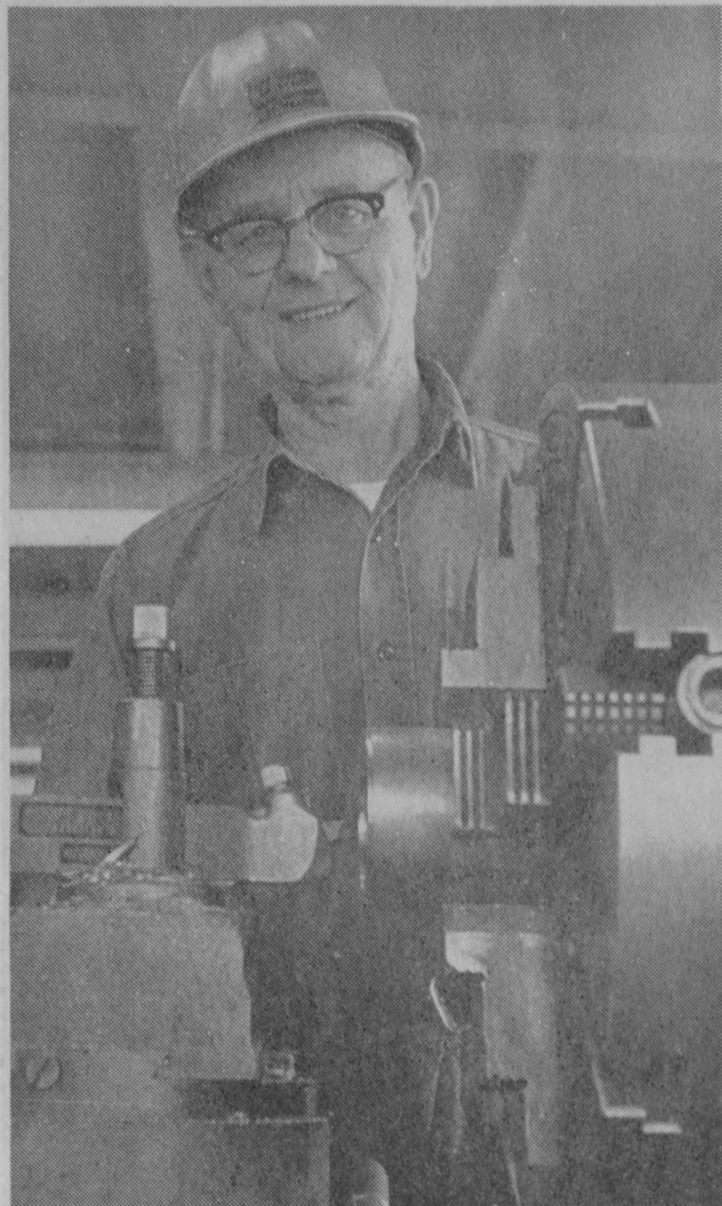

Johnson Closes 35-Year USG Machinist Career

In one way, March 10 was no different than any other day for Victor Johnson of 2138 South US-23, Tawas City. He was on the job in the machine shop at United States Gypsum's Alabaster installation turning out new bushings for heavy quarry equipment.

The day was to end quite differently than it started. The afternoon whistle signaled the close of Johnson's 35-year career as a machinist for USG and his name was added to a long list of recent retirees.

Throughout Wednesday, fellow employees stopped by to wish him luck in the years ahead. Included was Maynard VanOrnum, works manager, who considered Johnson as one of Alabaster's top employees.

"Vic has been an invaluable man here; in fact, he is the best machinist I have seen in my 30 years in the industry," said VanOrnum.

"Everyone took his mechanical problems to Vic and he had the ability to solve them, whether it involved a broken part on one of the big draglines in the quarry, repairs to the rock crusher or adjustment of the chlorinator on the water supply—he kept things running," was the work manager's comment.

Born in Sweden, Johnson came to the United States when 19 years of age. He went to work for the American Car and Foundry Company at Chicago, Illinois, and served as an apprentice machinist from 1914 to 1916. He later worked a year for a Brooklyn, New York, concern.

During World War I, Johnson served as an infantryman with the United States Army. After the armistice, he came to Michigan and worked for the American Car and Foundry Company at Detroit. From 1920 to 1925, he worked for the United States Rubber Company.

Johnson came to this community in 1925 and became a machinist for the Detroit and Machine Railway Company. He served the D&M four years until joining USG in 1929.

Johnson has witnessed many changes in methods and equipment used to quarry gypsum at Alabaster. His own machinist field has seen considerable change,

with modern quick-change lathes and other equipment. Dangerous line shafts and belts have given way to individually powered machines.

The 73-year-old retiree does not plan to give up the lifetime he has spent as a machinist, just because of retirement. "I plan to build a little shop at my home and work at odd jobs," he stated.

He and his wife, Grace, have a lovely brick home overlooking US-23 in Alabaster Township. His hobby is working around the yard and he guessed that he would find plenty to do during retirement.

The Johnsons' three children are Victor of Detroit, John (Jack), an employee of USG, and Mrs. William (Alice) Asplund of California.

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

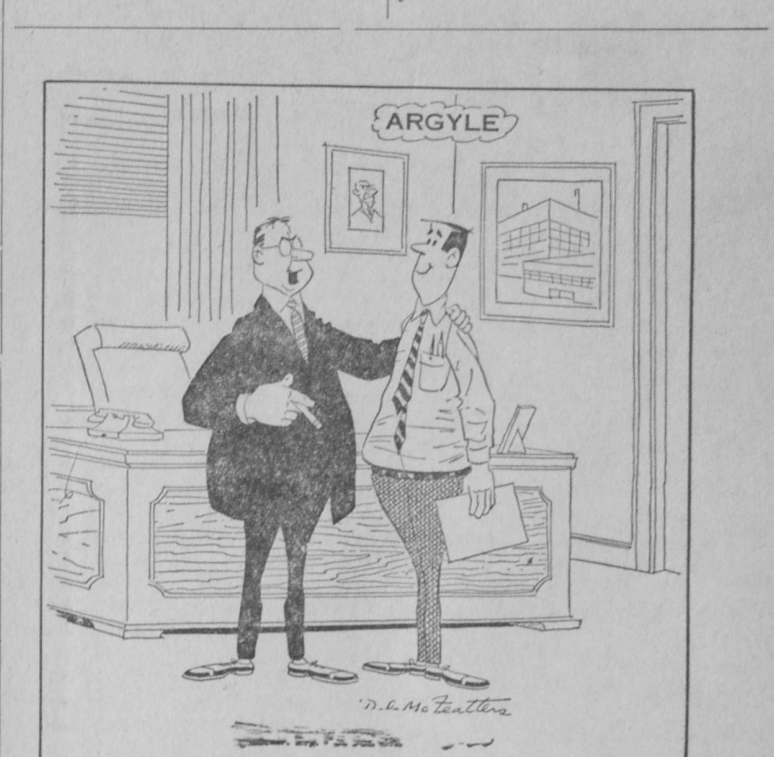

Countdown Near; Kids Urged to Fly Kites With Care

It is the missile season in Michigan and young spacemen and spacewomen will be on the launching pads all around the state by the thousands. Meaning, kids will be flying kites and they will not have nearly the trouble getting their missiles off the ground that the people down at Cape Kennedy frequently encounter.

Just about every Michigan countdown will end in the skyward soar of a colorful, though modest, man-made missile. It is once they are up in the sky that kites become a problem. Not to any real or imaginary enemy but to the children themselves and sometimes to the power company.

According to Gordon Huck, area manager of Consumers Power Company, Tawas City, youngsters should observe the following rules of kite flying for their own personal safety's sake:

1. Always use dry string, not wire or anything metallic like gift wrapping ribbon.
2. Use no metal in kite construction.
3. Fly kites on days when it is not rainy or showery.
4. Keep off streets and highways.
5. Keep away from TV and other types of aerials.
6. Never fly a kite near any kind of power lines.
7. If, he adds, your kite ends up in a tree or on a wire, never climb up after it because of the danger of falling. Mr. Huck said kite flying is a joyful pastime if it is done safely, but still every year in Michigan alone there are one or two children who forget the rules and are hurt, sometimes seriously.
8. And that, he said, is when the game of kite flying becomes a case of playing with deadly missiles, which is no game at all.

Household Workers Receiving \$50 Are Covered Under SS

Whether employed as a maid, cook, laundress, cleaning woman, baby sitter or similar job—are covered for social security purposes if the employee is paid \$50 or more in cash in a calendar quarter.

A calendar quarter is a three-month period beginning with January, April, July or October. Room and board are not counted but care is, if paid in cash. If you have a domestic employee who meets this requirement, you are required to report these wages to the Internal Revenue Service and pay the social security taxes. Failure to file timely tax returns may result in additional penalty and interest charges.

But more important, you might be depriving your household worker of her social security protection and benefits for herself and possibly her family—benefits to which she is legally entitled.

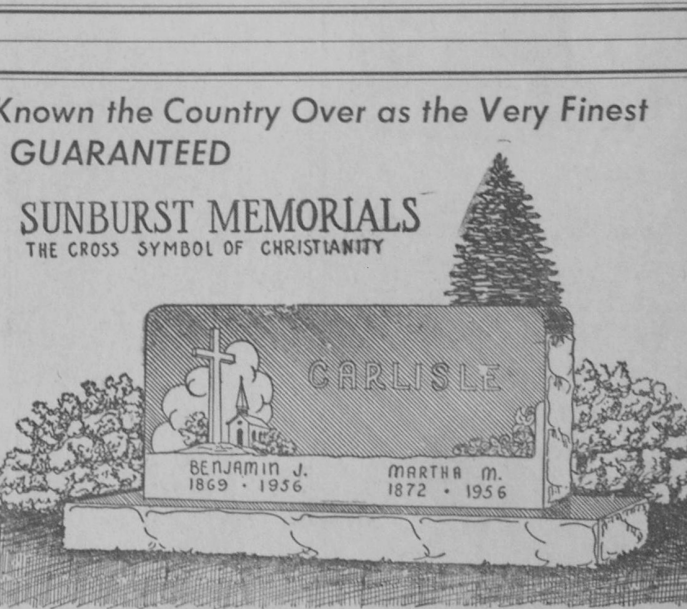

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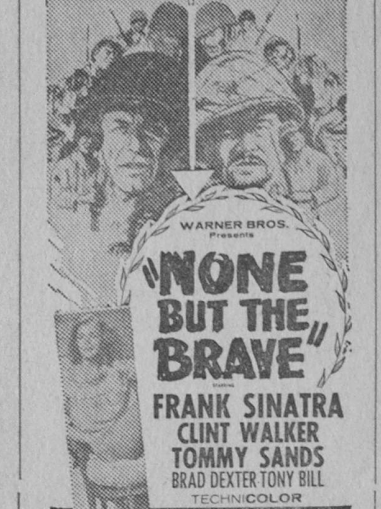

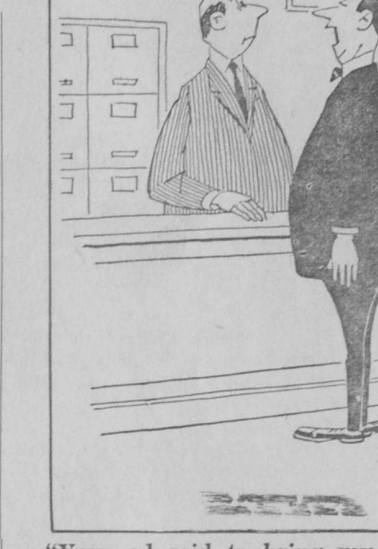
