Pick TA Teacher as IFYE Delegate

Miss Eleanor Foreman, a member of Tawas Area High School faculty, is one of five Michiganians selected to participate in the International Farm Youth Exchange program in which they will live and work for six months with overseas families.

A home making instructor here, Miss Foreman leaves in late September for Australia. She will return to this country in early April.

A native of Webberville, Ingham County, Miss Foreman was a 10-year member of a 4-H Club in her hometown. The National 4-H Club Foundation cosponsors IFYE with the Cooperative Extension Service.

"This will be a wonderful experience and I feel very lucky to be able to go," stated Miss Foreman Monday, as she prepared for her teaching duties at Tawas Area. "Competition to participate in this program is very stiff and this was my second application."

During her six-month stay in Australia, she will be living with several different families for periods ranging from three to four weeks.

Purpose of the exchange program is to promote international goodwill through the mutual understanding and learning of different ways of life throughout the world.

A 1964 graduate of Michigan State University, Miss Foreman plans to resume her teaching career after her return in 1966.

Cost of the trip, \$2,500, is to be financed through county, state and federal funds. She applied while still a 4-H Club member in Ingham County. At present, there are 84 delegates assigned under the program from 35 states.

Miss Foreman should have many experiences to relate when she returns to her teaching career. Prior to her trip to Australia, she will participate in a two-month travel seminar in Europe next summer sponsored by Methodist Churches of Michigan.

"These counties and the net forest areas within their boundaries are: Alcona, 102,901 acres; Crawford, 48,554; Iosco, 102,395; Ogemaw, 19,771; Oscoda, 142,890; Roscommon, 40; Mecosta, 2,534; and Montcalm, 1,381.

"The combined area of these forests located in the northern part of Michigan's Lower Peninsula is 866,500 acres.

"Those of us who have followed the development of these two forests in recent years are going to miss Louis A. Pommerening, retiring forest supervisor, who started his career with the forest service in the Huron Forest in May 1933 and concluded his work last December after more than 30 years of faithful service. He has been succeeded by John Von Bargen.

"I would like to pay tribute to Pommerening and compliment him on a splendid job he has done in administering these forests through the years. I know he will reap much reward in his retirement in the knowledge that the area has become such an attraction for visitors.

"I also want to extend to the new supervisor, Mr. Von Bargen, and his staff my cooperation in future development of these two fine forests.

"Our visitors are going to find their visits even more enjoyable in the future due to the improvements being made in these two forests. Within the past year, 175 new family camping units were completed and when spring comes, work will start on 50 more camping units. A must on any visitor's sightseeing schedule in our area is Lumbermen's Monument and plans are under way to redevelop the site to make it even more attractive. Nearly 40 miles of forest road were constructed in the two forests and another 10 roads were restored. The combined forests already have 792 miles of forest roads.

"Michigan's visitors traveling slowly over these roads may be treated to the sight of a doe and her fawn, a strutting buck and other animals whose habitat is within the boundaries of this area. Bird lovers, too, will be well rewarded by their visit. Not only game

Charter Change Under Study by Tawas City

A study is now being made to determine if Tawas City's present designation under the Fourth Class City Act is adequate for present and future growth.

Mayor George Tuttle announced at Monday night's council meeting that he had asked the city planning commission to act as an unofficial committee to study possibility of adopting a new city charter under the home rule system.

Tawas City is one of only five cities of Michigan still operating under the Fourth Class City Act of 1895. Supt. Reginald Bublitz stated that, at one time, there were more than 200 cities operating under the act. (East Tawas operates under the Fourth Class City Act, but is one of 11 in the state designated under a special act of the legislature.)

It has been said that the Fourth Class City Act was designed to handle the simple problems of government back before the turn of the century, but that it is now out-moded. One of the principal differences under home rule would be to allow adoption of a council-manager type of government.

Tuttle said that work of the planning commission was just about completed and he felt its present organization should be continued in order to study the charter change question.

A legally constituted charter commission would be required, however, before any official action could be taken.

Another city in the area currently contemplating a charter change is Standish. A detailed report from

its charter study commission was received a week ago by the Standish City Council.

Land Fill Draws Complaint; City to Investigate

Complaint concerning a land fill in Tawas Bay is to be investigated by City Attorney Michael Freel of East Tawas.

At Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Tripp, owners of Sail Fish Marine, 110 Alice Street, complained that debris used as a land fill by an adjacent property owner was unsightly.

Truman Barbier, East Tawas businessman and owner of a pier being constructed for a new marina, told the Herald Tuesday morning that the project had been approved by the Michigan Department of Conservation and the United States Corps of Engineers.

He said, however, that he had given permission to a contractor who was demolishing the old Anderson Coach plant to place broken concrete in the pier which is extending into the lake. He said the contractor did not follow specifications and included some charred wood and scrap metal in the fill.

Barbier is now attempting to get the contractor to remove the unspecified items.

New TA Schedule Ups Teacher Pay

A salary schedule calling for a \$200 increase on the base and \$600 at the top was approved Thursday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. At the same time, the board adopted a new schedule of pay for special services.

This action followed considerable discussion over the past several weeks between school administrators, representatives of the faculty's professional problems committee and the board's salary committee, composed of Walter Niles, secretary, and Mrs. Helen Payea, trustee.

The new salary schedule to be offered teachers for the 1965-1966 school year calls for a base of \$4,800 and a maximum of \$6,500. This compares to the present schedule of \$4,600 to \$5,900 in 13 steps.

The new 10-increment schedule would be paid over a two-year period.

With this action, the board of education has accomplished something for which it has been striving in recent years—improving the pay scale for the more experienced teachers in the system and at the same time, has brought its base to a point where it is a little more competitive with other schools in hiring new teachers.

The new pay schedule will cost the district approximately \$15,000 more than the \$302,075 paid for operation during the current school year. The above increase does not include hiring three additional teachers for next year.

There are 56 teachers on the 1964-1965 staff.

The schedule calling for paying teachers for special services will cost an additional \$22,000. The additional pay is for coaching, heads of departments, etc.

Some of the extra pay would be as follows: Head football and basketball coaches, \$500; athletic director, assistant varsity football and JV basketball, \$350; head track and JV football, \$300; cross country, head baseball and assistant JV football, \$200; debate, student activities, JV baseball, ninth grade basketball, eighth grade basketball, \$150; dramas (per play) and forensics, \$75; ticket takers, timers, scorekeepers, \$50.

No pay was adopted for teaching extra classes or for driver education. This is to be discussed at a (See TEACHER PAY, page 8.)

Eight Volunteer Fire Departments Study New Mutual Aid Agreement

Eight volunteer fire departments of Iosco and bordering townships of adjoining counties met last week at East Tawas as the first step toward adopting a mutual aid agreement. Proposed by laws of the new organization are to be discussed by departmental chiefs at the March 15 meeting to be held at Hale.

Communities represented at the meeting were Oscoda, Greenbush, Glennie, South Branch, Hale, Augres, Tawas City and East Tawas.

Howard Hofacer, chief of the Oscoda-AuSable Fire Department, was elected president of the new organization. Other officers are Robert Squires, assistant chief at East Tawas, vice president; Robert Willis, South Branch, treasurer, and Ronald Dane, Hale, secretary.

Mutual aid pacts have been adopted by volunteer fire departments of other counties in the area. When assistance is required by one department, all other departments are alerted. Depending on the location of the fire, certain departments would go to the aid of the caller and other departments would furnish stand-by protection.

By-laws for the new group are to be adopted by the general membership in April.

Confirm Tawas as Bicycle Meet Site

A representative of the Amateur Bicycle League of America has confirmed Tawas as the site September 11-12 for a 50-mile race and has been added to the national hike racing schedule.

Michael Walden of Royal Oak said that he and other Michigan officials would be here in the spring to work out race details with the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Leonard Calabrese, local race chairman, said that the ABL-sanctioned event would be an Olympic style event. Sprint races would be held Saturday, September 11, and the 50-mile race from Tawas to Oscoda and back via old US-23 would be held on Sunday.

Eye Collection of Delinquent Personal Tax

Collection of delinquent personal property taxes owed by five persons in Tawas City has been turned over to City Attorney Alf C. Watson for action.

At Monday night's regular meeting, City Treasurer Ruth Albertson reported that \$400 was still standing on the books on personal property after the February 15 deadline and that she had been unable to make collection.

She told councilmen that she had taken considerable verbal abuse from some taxpayers while collecting personal taxes. She said she was open to any suggestion on collecting the tax. A three percent penalty was slapped on delinquent bills after the deadline.

"City treasurers have been so lenient in past years and perhaps it is time for a crackdown," said Mayor George Tuttle. "I can not see any reason why the treasurer must wait two or three weeks after the deadline and then go out and collect personally."

City Attorney Watson noted that the problem "had been going on several years" and it was "time something was done about it." He said there were ways to handle such things and "I propose to do so."

In other business, the council named Mayor Tuttle, Clerk Walter Nelson and H. R. Hilbert, businessman, to act with the three ward supervisors and city attorney as the board of review, which opened sessions Tuesday. The mayor and clerk had always acted on the board but, according to state law, three members are to be appointed by the council in addition to the statutory number.

The council recommended that ward supervisors change tax rolls this year to state equalized valuation. At present, county and school taxes are figured on state equalized valuation while the city tax is figured on the local assessed figure. Under a new state statute, the state equalized figure must be included on each tax statement. Tawas City is currently undergoing a complete reappraisal of real estate for tax purposes by Gem Surveys of St. Clair Shores. This work is to be completed before the final meeting of the board of review.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz asked the council to appoint a committee soon to make plans for annual mayor's exchange day as part of Michigan Week. He felt that the matter should not be (See COUNCIL, page 8.)

C of C Endorses Fish Proposal of Sportsmen

Board of directors of Tawas Chamber of Commerce went on record Wednesday night as endorsing an Iosco Sportsmen's Club resolution asking certain restrictions on commercial fishing nets in the Great Lakes.

Appearing before the board's regular meeting was Lawrence J. O'Neil, director of District 14, Michigan United Conservation Clubs, East Tawas, who was instrumental in writing a resolution to the state legislature.

O'Neil told chamber directors that the resolution had met with many favorable comments and that petitions were now being circulated throughout the state and are to be submitted to the legislature.

The resolution seeks passage of a law which would establish a limit on setting commercial fishing nets at a minimum of 14 feet in water depth or one-quarter mile off any shore line of Lake Huron during the months of May through October. It is proposed to allow setting of nets close to shore during the yearly smelt fishing run.

It was suggested that the chamber of commerce call a special meeting and invite commercial fishermen of the area to discuss the proposed legislation.

The board of directors also went on record as endorsing a resolution from the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce calling for beverage distributors to use returnable, deposit-required type of bottles instead of "throw-aways." It was pointed out that the state should make some effort toward eliminating the current problem of littering highway right-of-ways with no-deposit bottles.

Michigan's senate conservation committee is considering a bill to allow persons 65 years or older to have a free fishing license.

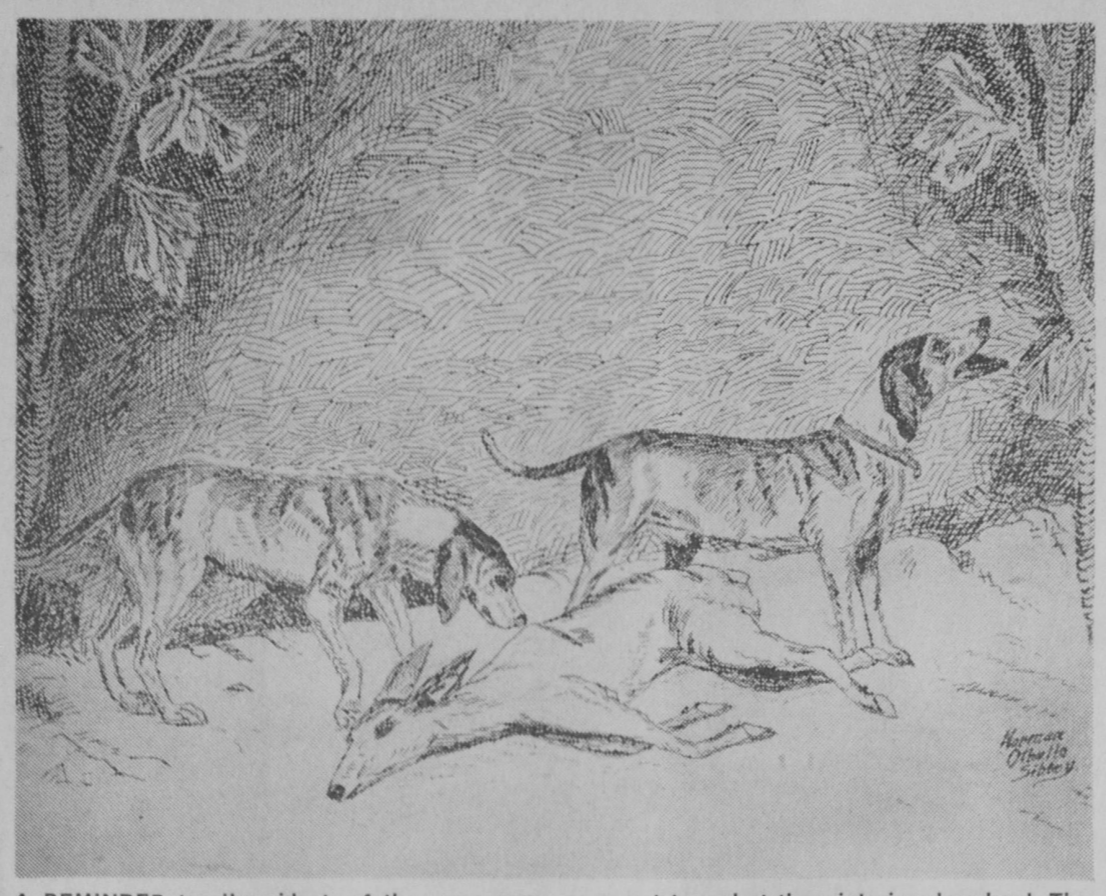

Mrs. Goodman served refreshments, assisted by Mrs. Ruth Tree. The March 16 meeting will be in the church memorial hall.



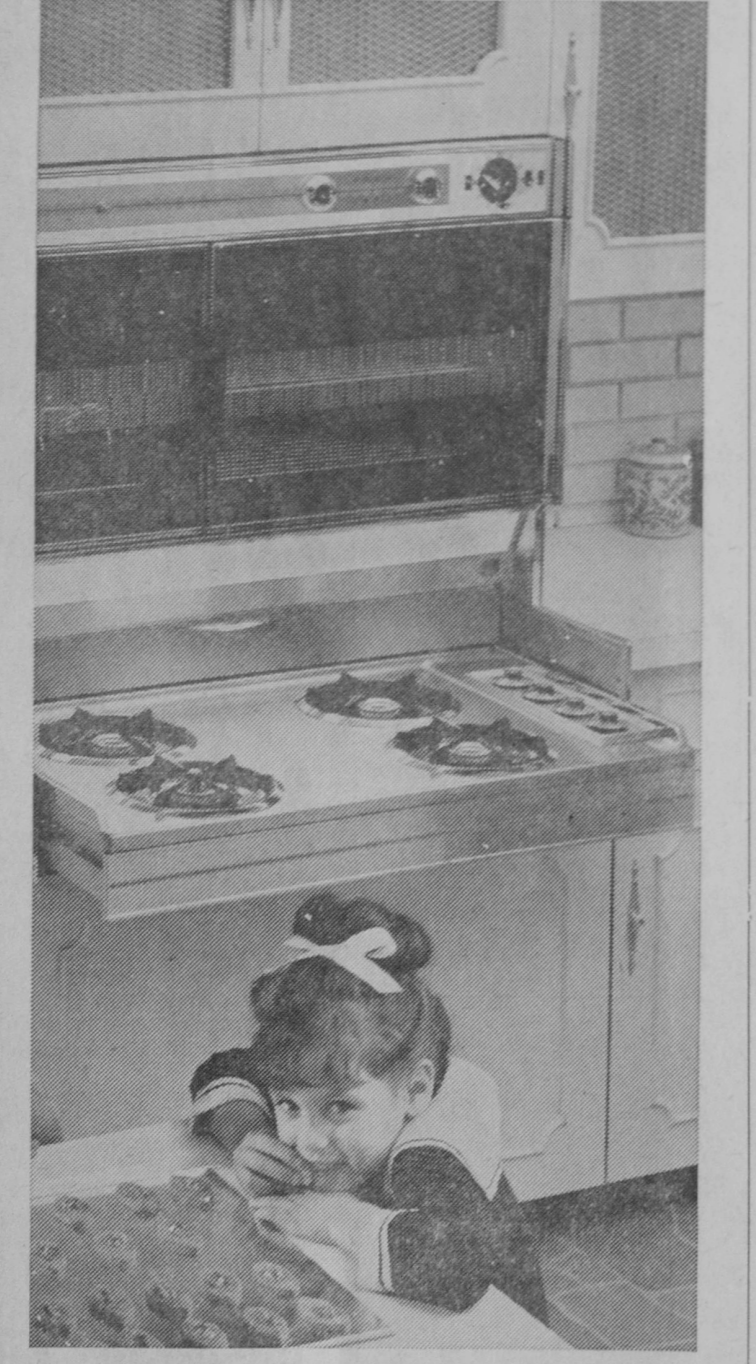

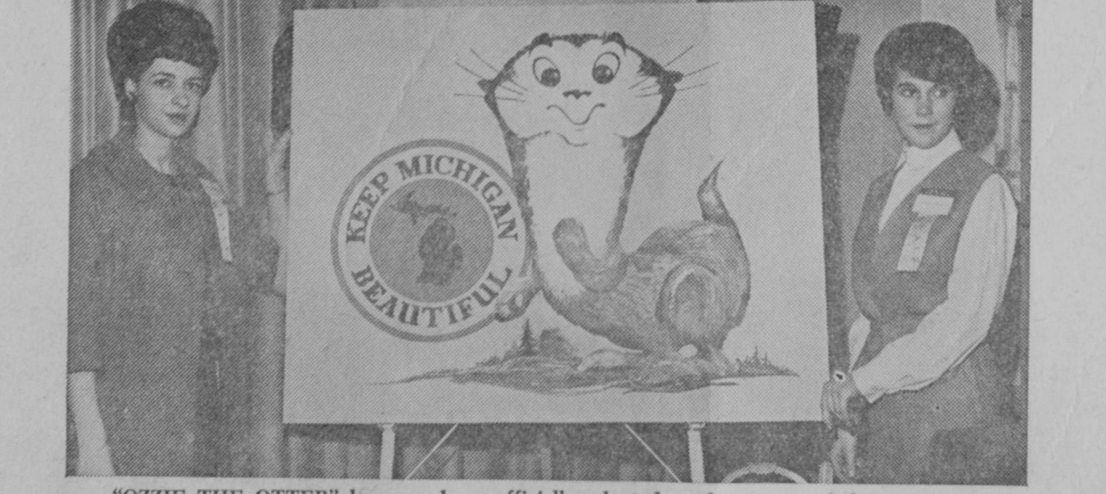

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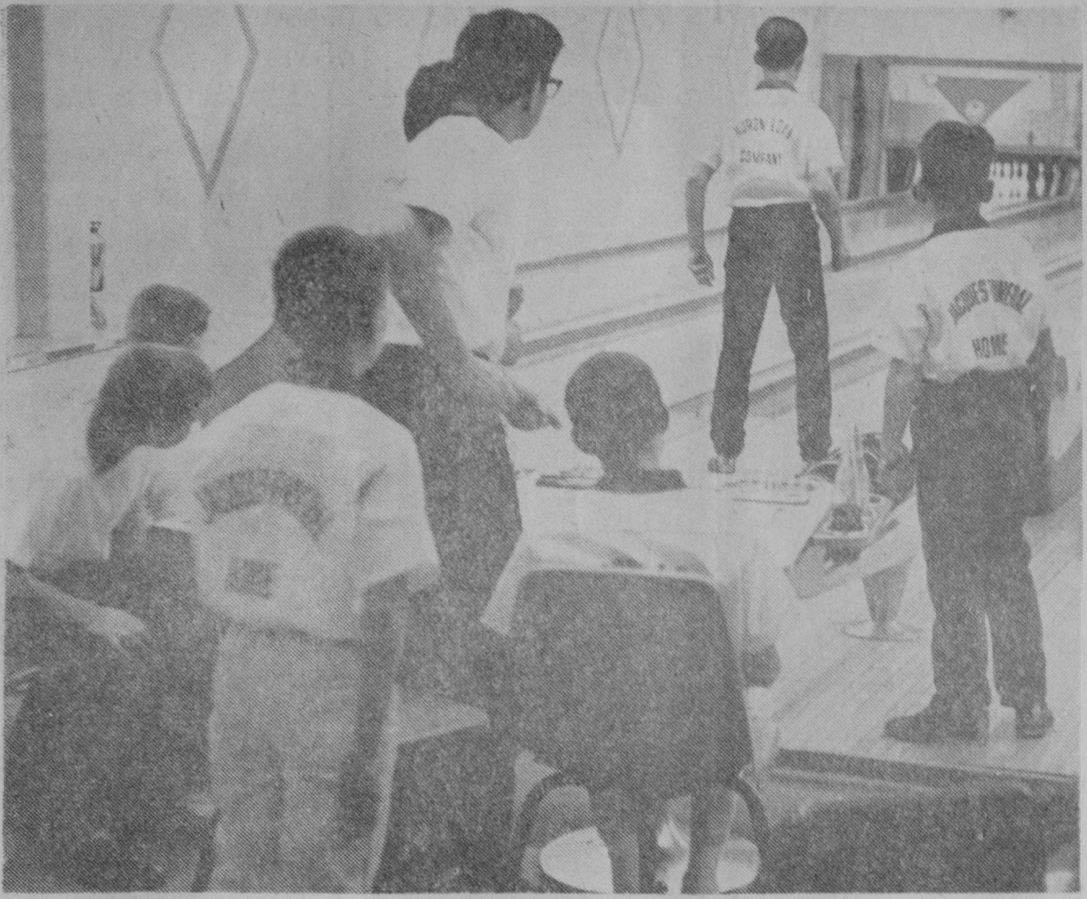
'Keep Michigan Beautiful' adopts Ozzie the Otter

The 1965 program covers corn, barley and grain sorghum. Participants may qualify for a payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses and for a price-support payment on the normal production of the 1965 feed grain acreage.

An eighth grade education is required for either classification. One year of experience is required for janitor B.

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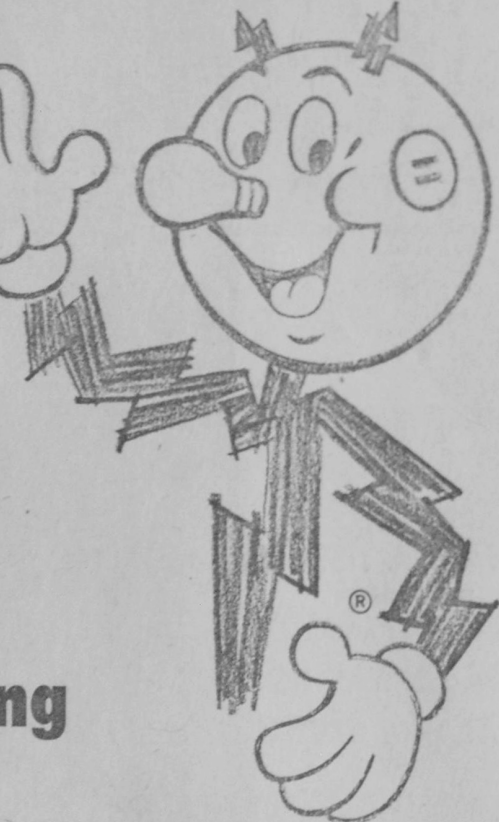

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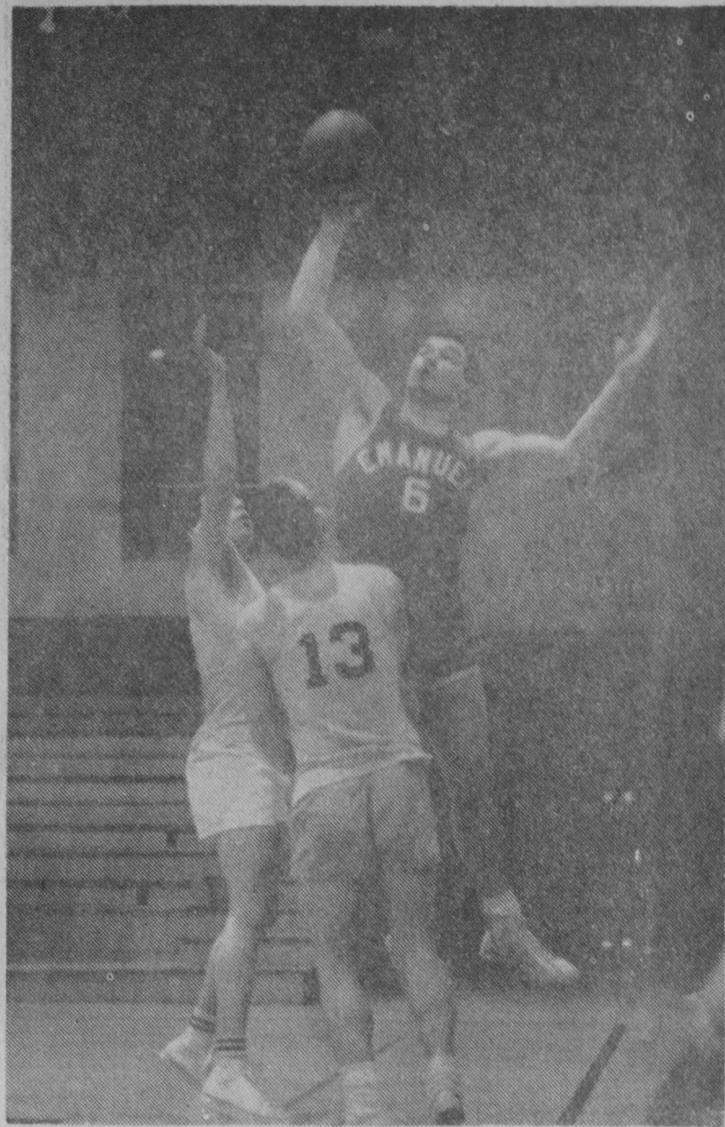

SS Recipients Under 72 Must File Report on Annual Earnings

Early each year, many people who get social security payments must file an annual report of their earnings for the prior year, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security Office.

This report must be filed by everyone who was under age 72 during any part of the year and had income of over \$1,200 in wages or in profit from his own business. One of the questions on this report is: "Do you expect to earn over \$1,200 in 1964?" If so, you show your expected total earnings for 1964.

Many times the estimate shown is not high enough. If, at any time during the year, you think your actual earnings will be more than you anticipated, you should get in touch with your local social security office. Someone there will be glad to help you complete the form and revise your estimate.

You may find that you have already received more benefits than you will be entitled to get for the year and are overpaid. The adjustment of this overpayment need not be made until after the end of the year when you make your annual report.

A social security representative for this area will be at the Isoco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, March 11, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

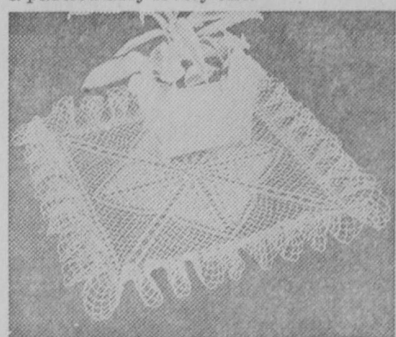
Cub Scouts Staged Blue and Gold Banquet

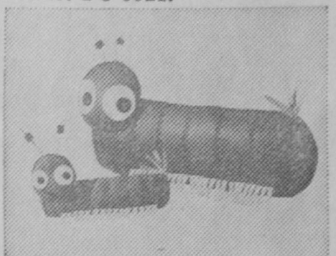

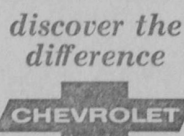

Tawas City Officials Start Busy Tax Time Schedule

Tawas City Board of Review held its initial one-day session Tuesday, but members were not sure when a date would be set to meet with individual taxpayers. One thing is for sure, however. A second meeting will be called soon to review personal property tax statements being submitted for the first time this year under state law.

At Tuesday's meeting, it was found that many tax statements had been filled out improperly and that some had not been notarized. Supervisors are to return such statements in order that they may be completed properly.

It was tentatively set to recess Tuesday's meeting until March 11

in order to give taxpayers time enough to complete personal property statements.

As for a day when taxpayers may meet with the board of review concerning valuation on real estate, Mayor George Tuttle said that the meeting would probably be delayed to the very latest in order that the appraisal on real estate within the city may be completed by Gem Surveys of St. Clair Shores.

While tax time is always hectic for officials because of the usual last-minute rush, the next few weeks should prove "interesting" in Tawas City. Gem Surveys has completed its residential appraisal and is now working on commercial and industrial. A hearing is necessary prior to adoption of the appraisal.

Tawas City, along with East Tawas and several townships of Iosco, is to join Alabaster this year in preparing tax rolls using the state's equalized figure, rather than to add the "penalty" on county and school taxes. If not, the state equalized figure must be printed on the tax statement to be mailed each owner, which would require additional work.

All of the above must be completed prior to the statutory meeting of the Iosco Board of Supervisors, which opens Tuesday, April 13. Principal work of that session is to equalize tax rolls of the various townships and cities within the county.

left to the last minute before taking action.

Police Chief Frank Roti reported that there is a possibility that Tawas City might be able to hire an off-duty deputy sheriff as a night patrolman for week-ends during the summer months. He said that the deputy could be hired by the city and then team up with the regular sheriff's department night patrol to offer protection here. It was felt that the chief should be on duty during the daytime instead of alternating his hours with night patrol. A report is to be made at the next meeting.

No action was taken on a proposed truck parking ban on US-23 from Wheeler Street to M-55. This had been discussed at the last meeting because of what was termed as a dangerous condition across from the Midway Drive-In when large trucks park in the outer lane. Truck parking is currently prohibited from Wheeler Street to Mathews Street. Further study is to be made.

Alderman Howard Hatton requested that steps be taken to eliminate the drainage problem in front of the post office. He noted that water was ankle-deep on the sidewalk Monday and that the area between the curb and sidewalk was muddy. He believed a layer of crushed stone would help to eliminate the problem. He also felt that the area between the curb and sidewalk should be black-topped in the future.

birds abound but song birds abound. A few months ago, I called attention of my colleagues to the efforts of the forest service to provide a refuge for the annual visit of Kirkland's warblers, a rare bird, which pays our section of the state a visit each year. Thirty-one bald eagle nests were spotted by forest rangers. Nine of these were active at time of location and 17 young were being produced.

To insure adequate cover for wildlife in the years ahead, the forest service has a carefully managed program. Last year, over four million trees were planted in the Huron-Manistee Forests. In addition, two waterfowl dams were constructed and numerous wildlife waterholes were established.

"Fishermen, hunters, nature lovers, mushroom and berry pickers, bird watchers, hikers and all lovers of the out-of-doors will find the Huron-Manistee National Forests of interest."
