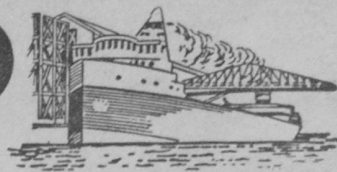

Oscoda Teacher Ends Long Career

Miss Marion Jennings of Tawas City, a member of Oscoda Area School faculty, is to retire from teaching in June after 43 years in Michigan public schools.

Graduated from East Tawas High School in 1920 and from Iosco County Normal in 1921, she taught her first year at Hale, then went on to get her life certificate at Ypsilanti State Normal College.

In 1925, Miss Jennings went to Royal Oak, then a small city of 8,000 persons. She taught the fourth grade of Longfellow School, which was the fourth elementary school built in Royal Oak. There are now 23 elementary schools and Royal Oak is Michigan's 10th largest city.

She helped to organize the Royal Oak Education Association, an affiliate of the MEA and NEA. She served as secretary, vice president and president of the ROEA, terminating 12 years of active service as a director. She helped to organize the Royal Oak Employees Credit Union and was a member of the board of directors for 20 years.

In 1942, Stephan Nisbet, then president of the Michigan Education Association, commissioned a group of eight classroom teachers to organize a classroom department of the MEA. Miss Jennings was one of the eight chosen and worked on the committee for two years, helping to write the constitution and organize the state into areas. She was the first chairman of her local area of the newly-organized classroom department.

After the race riots in Detroit, a joint committee of leaders of both races was appointed by the governor to discuss racial problems. Miss Jennings was on this committee for three years.

She served as chairman of Region Six of MEA and was also chairman of the Oakland County Institute Committee. Miss Jennings helped to implement teacher tenure in the Royal Oak schools. She was twice appointed by the superintendent of schools to assist the new principals as building chairman in charge of probationary teachers.

In 1946, the United States and Great Britain decided on a teacher exchange program between the two countries. The first year there were to be 75 teachers from 35 of the 48 states to be exchanged with teachers from England, Scotland and Wales. The cities from which these teachers were to be selected were those with high educational qualifications. Royal Oak was one of those cities.

The first year, the board of education and the superintendent of each city were to choose the teacher whom they believed to be professionally and academically qualified for the position. Miss Jennings was selected from Royal Oak and was approved by the Fulbright Committee in Washington, D. C.

Miss Jennings taught in Edinburgh, Scotland, the school year of 1946-1947. While in Britain, the American exchange teachers were entertained in London and presented to Mother Queen Elizabeth.

While there, a group of four was chosen by the state department and interviewed by Ambassador Douglas to go to Norway, Sweden and Denmark and later to France, Luxembourg, Belgium, Holland and Italy on a mission for the gov-

ernment. Miss Jennings was one of those chosen. After returning from Scotland, the department of state appointed (See RETIRES, page 8.)

Two \$45,000 Suits Filed Last Week in Iosco Circuit Court

Two \$45,000 damage suits were filed in Iosco County Circuit Court last week. The cases are unrelated.

Kenneth Conn, East Tawas, started an auto negligence suit against Miss Burnetta Miller, Tawas Area School teacher. William Morrison, Oscoda, filed suit against James Foster, Oscoda garage owner.

Conn was a passenger in a car driven by James Berkeley Smith, formerly of East Tawas now of Oscoda, which was involved in a collision with Miss Miller's car on November 7, 1963, south of Tawas City.

Miss Miller pulled out of a driveway near the National Gypsum installation and her car was struck from the rear by the Smith vehicle.

Both Conn and Smith were injured seriously in the crash and hospitalized. Smith has been joined by his wife, Emily C., in seeking \$101,000 damages against Miss Miller.

The case had been set for jury trial June 8 but now has been postponed until June 15.

Morrison's suit is the result of injuries he sustained September 2, 1963, when a pan of gasoline exploded at Foster's Garage.

Morrison claims he was in the garage on business. A pan of gasoline used to wash auto parts suddenly exploded causing serious burns to his body. He claims permanent injury.

Chamber Mails Second Billing on Dues Schedule

Budget and finance committee of the Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce reports that its new fair share minimum dues schedule originated this year is off to a very successful start.

Last year at this time, the chamber had 59 dues-paying members, but this year, after nearly three months, the chamber reports that there are 93 dues-paying members. These 93 members have accounted for a total of \$4,406 paid and pledged for 1965.

"Considering that last year's membership was approximately 200 members, this means that about 47 percent of last year's members have accounted for the above financial support," states Leonard Calabrese, budget and finance chairman.

Projected on a basis of 200 members, this means that the chamber can expect total dues for 1965 to approximate \$9,500.

"From these figures, it is obvious that the fair share plan has been a financial success so far, but what is more important to the chamber of commerce is the total number of members. The Tawas area can boast of approximately 400 businesses and organizations that qualify for chamber membership. However, only 200 or 50 percent were members in 1964. This year's goal is to attain a membership of over 300," states Calabrese.

The two teachers whose contracts were approved Thursday night were Miss Cleopatra Shelp and Mrs. Ruby E. Bowerman, both in the elementary department.

Miss Shelp, a resident of Alabaster Township, had been a member of the Oscoda faculty. She will teach second grade here. Mrs. Bowerman is presently teaching at Sault Ste. Marie.

The name of Band Director Salamony had inadvertently been left off the list of second-year probationary teachers approved at the last meeting and it was recommended that his name be added.

Credentials of all the above teachers are to be inspected by the board's tenure committee.

Three contests are listed in Tawas City's annual spring election slated Monday, April 5. Only 165 voters went to the polls during the February primary and this total is expected to be exceeded next Monday.

A three-way race has developed for Second Ward alderman. Only candidate listed on the ballot is Russell A. Rollin Sr., Republican. Opposing him will be two write-in candidates, Earl B. Davis, incumbent Republican, who was defeated by Rollin in the primary, and another write-in candidate, Clarence Oates.

Another race for a council seat will be in the First Ward where Clark Tanner, Republican incumbent, will be opposed by Eugene Wegner, Democrat.

The third race will be between Vernon Pugh, Republican, and Roy Bergeron, Democrat, who seek the justice of the peace position. Pugh had received an interim appointment to fill the vacancy of Charles L. McLean and his appointment is to expire in July. He defeated Matthew Hoag for the Republican nomination in February.

Unopposed on the ballot are George W. Tuttle, mayor; Walter Nelson, clerk; Ruth Albertson, treasurer; Clement Stephan, First

Ward supervisor; John Hosbach, Second Ward supervisor; Clarence Everett, Third Ward supervisor; Cecil W. Cabbie, Third Ward alderman.

Bd. of Review Sets April 7 as Last Meeting

Final meeting of the Tawas City Board of Review is to be held Wednesday, April 7, 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., at the city hall.

This will be the last opportunity for taxpayers to check appraisals and assessments on real and personal property with the board of review before books are turned over to the Iosco Board of Supervisors' county equalization committee.

"If anyone has any complaints, this is the time to make them," states City Attorney Alf C. Watson. At that time, the board listens to any evidence why appraisals or assessments should be reduced or increased.

The board of review started work Monday on making assessments of real and personal property according to the property appraisal conducted by Gem Surveys of St. Clair. Total valuation of the city is to be compiled by Wednesday.

"I believe the appraisal program conducted by Gem Surveys has worked out fine," was the comment of Third Ward Supervisor C. S. Everett, who spent most of last week attending hearings with taxpayers and is again at the city hall this week for the board of review.

Following the four days of hearings, Glen Mask of Gem Surveys spent the week-end inspecting property on which complaints were heard concerning appraisals.

Property throughout the city is to be assessed according to the same percentage of state equalized valuation, rather than using the three different factors as in the past. This change in the state law was one of the reasons that the city hired a professional appraisal firm to make a complete equalization study.

TA Board Views 1965-66 Budget

A preliminary budget of \$596,498 for 1965-1966 operation is being considered by Tawas Area Board of Education. This compares to \$570,440 for the current operating year.

This budget, along with those from other school districts of the county, the intermediate school district, board of supervisors and various townships is to be submitted to the Iosco Allocation Board in mid-April.

According to Supt. Reynold Mick, the above amount represents anticipated expenses for the next school year. "As far as income, we can only guess at what the district will receive in state aid and from taxes," Mick told board members last Thursday night.

Of the grand total of expenses for Tawas Area School during 1965-1966, it is estimated that \$202,182 would be allocated for elementary instruction and \$214,809 for secondary. This compares to \$183,856 and \$203,505 for the current year.

Transportation costs next year are expected to be \$44,990, as compared to \$47,900 this year. This results from lower equipment replacement in the new budget. Operation of the school plant is expected to be somewhat higher, \$64,900 under the new budget as compared to \$62,750 during the current year.

Estimated income under the new budget is as follows: From taxation, based on nine mills, \$243,000; state aid, \$286,250; transportation, \$34,000; federal aid, \$5,000; National Defense Education Act, \$3,500, to name a few categories.

Final adoption of the budget is to take place at the board of education's April 12 meeting. A public hearing would be held in August, after the tax allocation is set and the state aid payment announced.

Water Level Shows Increase

Here is some good news for Michigan boaters, fishermen, shoreline cottage owners and water users:

Levels of the state's inland lakes and streams should take a turn for the better this spring, according to the water resources branch of the United States Geological Survey.

Starting the state off to a wetter year in 1965 have been this winter's generally above-average precipitation and frequent thaws

which have raised ground-water levels in most of the agency's key observation wells in the state.

"Although ground-water stages are still in low range, most are above a year ago and levels this summer should be higher than last year if the favorable trend of precipitation continues at least until the growing season starts," reports P. R. Giroux, hydraulic engineer, with the USGS.

Levels of unregulated inland lakes have also shown some improvement and stream flows have been higher with some minor floods occurring in the southern part of the state, Giroux adds.

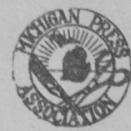
Although water levels are on the upturn, they have a long way to go to make up for the general deficiency in precipitation during the last five years. Over this period, rain and snowfall have measured as much as 29 inches below average in the Lower Peninsula.

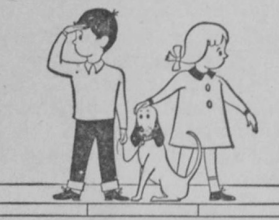

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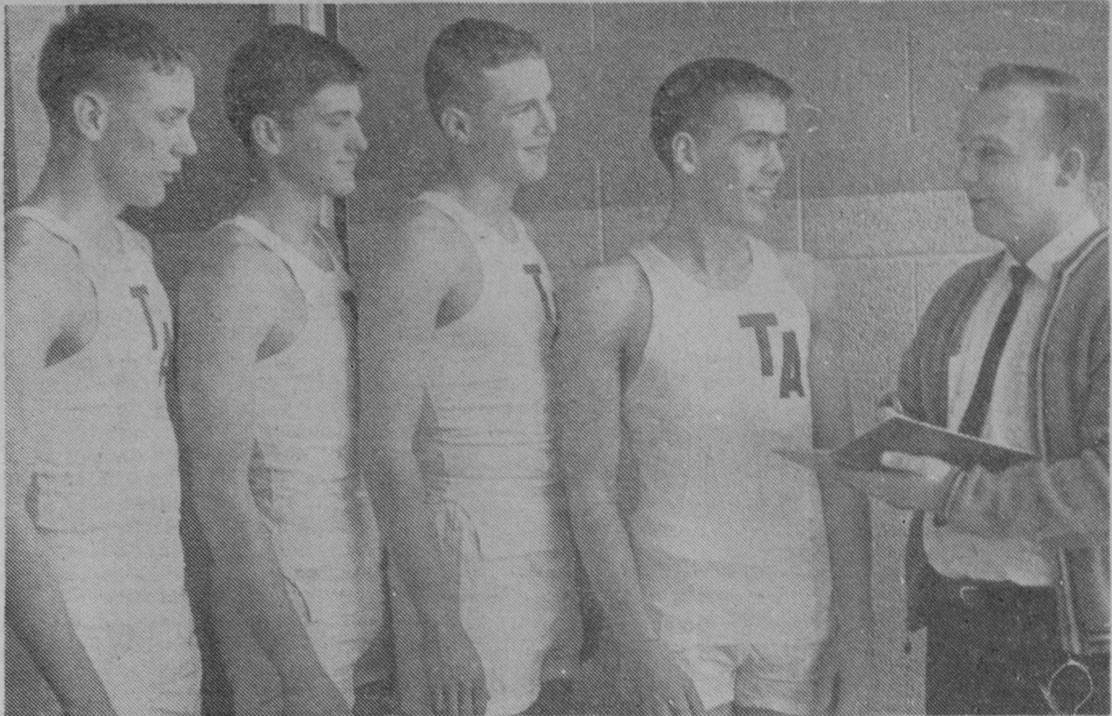

Now at age 62, health conditions have made retirement necessary. She lives with Miss Cleopatra Shelp, who has been hired as an elementary teacher in Tawas Area School. She presently teaches at Oscoda and came here with Miss Jennings.

The two have many hobbies. They are expert gardeners. Miss Jennings has a writing assignment for next year and Miss Shelp not only illustrates for her, but does commercial art as an avocation and hobby.

Make Arrangements For June Annual School Election

Arrangements for the annual June school election were made last Thursday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Trustees whose terms expire this year are Waldo Curry and Walter Champion, four-year terms, and Donald Deering, two-year term. The latter was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Harold Hammond.

The board hired Fred Thurn, Lansing attorney, to again handle arrangements for the election.

In other business, the board authorized hiring Thomas Pintkowski for an additional two weeks of guidance work during the summer months. This is to be in addition to his regular four-week guidance program during the summer.

Supt. Reynold Mick, in recommending the above action, said that it would be profitable for the school to have the guidance counselor for the additional two weeks. He works with students in individual conference and also assists in scheduling.

The board voted to pay Miss Judith Gillies, vocal music instructor, for one extra class for the 1965-1966 school year. Mr. Mick told board members that she had turned in an excellent job and has been putting extra time in daily. She also teaches English.

The board went on record as opposing House Bills 108 and 2300, which are being considered by the state legislature. It was noted that the latter would reduce the district's tax base by about one-third, or \$9,000,000.

Both bills involve parochial pupils. Mick said that HB 108 would cost the district an additional \$15,000. HB 2300, if adopted, would require credit be given on public school taxes for all tuition paid to a parochial school. The superintendent cited one instance where one large family would receive more credit than taxes paid, even though three children are in high school.

Low bids were accepted as follows for purchase of a new 36-passenger school bus: William Look and Sons, GMC chassis, including trade-in, \$1,994; Superior Body, \$2,910.

Meetings of the board of education are to return to the regular schedule, every second and fourth Monday of the month, effective April 12.

Installation of shelving, check-out counter and storage area in the Tawas City Elementary Unit library, requested by Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, was authorized. Charles Charboneau is to do the work.
