## Mrs. Sloan Retiring at Close of Term

Mrs. Emma Sloan, first grade teacher in the East Tawas Elementary Unit, has announced that she will retire from teaching at the end of the school year. She has spent her entire teaching career in schools of the Tawas area.

"I am just going to rest this year—beyond that I just have not thought too much about it," said Mrs. Sloan. She fell on the ice last winter and sustained a severe wrist fracture.

"I know that I will probably miss school and the children when next fall rolls around," she said.

Between 1,400 and 1,500 pupils, many of them members of the second generation, have paraded through Mrs. Sloan's primary rooms—starting back in her first school, Tawas No. 4, in 1919.

The former Miss Emma Bygden graduated from Tawas City High School in 1917 and from Iosco County Normal in 1918. She taught at the Anshuetz School one year, left teaching for two years and then returned for another year in the rural school. She became primary teacher in the Tawas City School in 1924 and has served here since then, with eight years in the old Ward School.

After reorganization of Tawas Area Schools in 1952, she remained as first grade teacher in the Tawas City Elementary Unit and served four years as building principal. She has taught the past three years at East Tawas.

"Children are much the same today as when I started teaching, but we have more to work with in the form of textbooks and instructional aids," said Mrs. Sloan. "Not only do teachers know more about their profession, but we also know considerably more about children."

She received her life certificate in 1930, bachelor of science degree, 1950, master of art degree in 1954, all from Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti.

She served as classroom teacher delegate from the AuSable District of Michigan Education Association for 10 years and as delegate to the representative assembly for her three years.

Her son, James, is a resident of Oscoda and she has three grandchildren.

Mrs. Sloan, Mrs. Nina May and John Forsten, all of whom are retiring this year, will be honored at a banquet Thursday night by the Tawas Area Teachers Club.

## East Tawas Council OK's City Budget of \$179,688

A budget of \$179,688 was adopted Monday night for 1965-1966 operation by the East Tawas Council. A public hearing was held at the city hall with no objectors.

A total of \$57,978 is to be raised by taxation, which requires a levy of 9 1/2 mills on state equalized valuation of \$6,103,007. Last year, 19 1/2 mills levied against an assessed valuation of \$2,765,150 brought \$53,920 in taxes.

The budget as presented by Alderman Charles Schreck of the finance committee included the following expenditures:

General fund, \$27,816; maintenance of public buildings, \$2,347;

street lighting, \$8,516; sanitary service, \$6,530; recreation, \$825; tree planting, \$450; cemetery, \$2,250; fire department, \$4,100; street construction - maintenance, \$43,650; police department, \$19,603; revolving fund, \$610; water department, \$56,550; sewer department, \$8,395.

Schreck pointed out that the street budget was higher than the previous year and that a new street sweeper apparatus would be needed within the next 18 months.

He said that the council would soon have to consider establishment of a sinking fund for construction of a new city garage, possibly within the next five years. Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert has estimated the cost at around \$40,000.

In other business, the volunteer fire department reported three fires during the month of April.

According to a report from the city park commission, some 138 campers have stayed in the city park since opening this spring for a total of 360 camper days.

The park commission re-elected Merton Killey as chairman; James LaBerge, vice chairman, and Lewis Besancon, secretary.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie read a long list of names representing those individuals or businesses not complying with the city's gas ordinance. The city requires that a permit be obtained before installation of gas heating equipment and an inspection made prior to use.

Appropriate action is to be taken to enforce the ordinance. A form letter is to be sent to each offender on the list.

The city superintendent was authorized to obtain bids on clearing debris from the site of the old Anderson Coach Company plant, which was destroyed by fire last year.

Investigation is to be made concerning three outdoor toilets in the Tawas Lake area.

A request from Sail Fish Marine for installation of a sign on city-owned property was referred to the street committee for action at the next meeting.

Announcement was made that Donald Young was applying for a permit to install eight pool tables in the former location of Barrett's.

According to Mrs. Helen G. Hertzler, chairman, Tawas Bay Artists, the program starts with registration and coffee at 10:00 a. m., followed by a business meeting. Remainder of the morning program is to be devoted to a ceramic demonstration by Mrs. Theresa Maynard of Carrollton. Mrs. Maynard recently returned from attending a special ceramics class at Aspen, Colorado, and promises new ideas in her program, "From a Handful of Mud to a Thing of Beauty."

A luncheon is to be served starting at 12:30 p. m. Discussion and demonstration in casein painting will be presented by Sidney Seeley of Detroit starting at 1:30 p. m.

Seeley is widely-known for his realistic paintings in casein. He exhibits nationally as well as locally. Some of his paintings are currently in a Massachusetts exhibition.

In 1964, he was elected a national member of Associated Academic Artists and has received the Armour Award.

## Drop Charges in Circuit Court

Criminal charges against four persons were nolle prosequed in Iosco Circuit Court on Monday.

Dropped were charges of theft from an auto owned by Huron Auto Parts against Terry Hampton and Joseph Harris.

Charges of breaking and entering against Joseph Irk and James Sturgeon of Flint were dropped. The men were given a polygraph examination Monday and results of the test substantiated their claim of innocence.

## East Tawas Eyes Enforcement of Peddler Code

Enforcement of East Tawas' 1960 peddler license is to be studied by the city council and City Attorney Michael Freil.

At Monday night's regular meeting, it was reported that numerous complaints had been received concerning magazine sale campaigns and other house-to-house merchandise sales.

The ordinance requires that all transient merchants or peddlers, whether resident or nonresident, obtain a license from the city. Fees are \$10 a day, \$35 a week or \$150 a year.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie pointed out that to enforce the ordinance properly, all peddlers or transient businesses would be required to have a license. Otherwise, the city's code would probably not hold up in a court test.

The ordinance allows persons who grow their own farm produce to conduct house-to-house sales without a license.

## Bike Racing May Expand Next Year in Tawas Area

While plans for the third annual Lumbermen's Monument Bicycle Tour on September 11-12 are being formulated, the Tawas Chamber of Commerce learned this week that Tawas may be the site of a future 300-mile race from Tawas to Gaylord.

A proposal has been heard seeking establishment of a three-day race, the first leg from Tawas to Atlanta, the second leg from Atlanta to Petoskey and the third from Petoskey to Gaylord.

Leonard Calabrese of the chamber of commerce board of directors said that the 300-mile race proposal was being considered for next year.

He also noted that Michigan may become the site of a North American bicycle tour, similar to a 400-mile race in France. He said that Tawas may be included in the above tour should plans materialize.

The four-year terms of Waldo J. Curry of Tawas Township and Walter Champion of Tawas City expire this year and both have qualified to run for re-election. Opposing them will be Earl B. Davis of Tawas City and Carl J. Helmer of East Tawas.

## Believe Arrests Solve Many Area Burglaries

Four Livingston County men entered guilty pleas to breaking and entering when arraigned Monday in Iosco Circuit Court. According to investigating officers, two of the men have admitted being implicated in a vast number of burglaries which have taken place in this area over the past three years.

Released on bond were Emerson Bowlsby, 38, Howell, former Burlington Township resident; Gerald D. Sullivan, 25, Brighton; Lockard Ervin, 24, Fowlerville; Joseph J. Walls, 17, Brighton.

The four await presentence investigation by Philip Gidley, Iosco probation and parole officer for the Michigan Department of Corrections.

The four men were charged with and admitted to the breaking and entering of the Anthony Sapino cabin on Bowlsby Road, Sherman Township, on May 8.

George Peterson of Twining notified the sheriff's department about 10:30 p. m. that Saturday that he had seen a pick-up truck parked near several cabins on Turtle Road and became suspicious. Peterson followed the pick-up truck and when three of its occupants got out and ran into the woods, he notified the sheriff. Two of the men were apprehended and held by state police at Twining. Burglary of the Sapino cabin was discovered later.

At first, the four men claimed they had been smelt fishing and ran away because they did not have a fishing license. When officers compared tire tracks of Bowlsby's truck and found they matched those at Sapino's, the men admitted the burglary.

During the past week, Sullivan and Ervin admitted taking part in many break-ins of cabins in the Iosco area over the past three years and implicated Bowlsby. The latter denies any complicity.

During Monday's arraignment before Judge Allan C. Miller, Deputy Kruse said that the sheriff's department and state police, both with bulging files of unsolved cabin burglary complaints, were to continue questioning the men.

Sherriff Ivan O'Farrell said the men admitted using one, sometimes two pick-up trucks in stealing household furniture, electrical appliances and guns from cabins in the Iosco area.

He said that Sullivan and Ervin claimed the loot was then sold at auction sales in Livingston County. Deputy Kruse said that loot was valued from \$15,000 to \$30,000.

## COLOR CAMERA INSTALLATION SOON AT IOSCO CO. JAIL

Installation of the first 48 color photo cameras to produce Michigan's new driver licenses has started and will continue through June 7, according to Sec. of State James M. Hare.

The new camera will be installed in three stages, Hare said. The first of the new licenses will be out starting late this month or early June.

Iosco County is scheduled to receive its new camera on Thursday, June 3. Installation is to be made at the county jail.

## Two Iosco Schools Eligible for Funds

Two Iosco schools received notification Tuesday that federal funds would be expended here in "Operation Headstart," a program designed to assist schools financially in preschool instruction for culturally deprived children and families.

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg announced at Washington, D. C., that Oscoda Area School would receive \$7,512 from the federal government and Whittemore-Prescott Area School is to receive \$5,374.

Cederberg's office said that Oscoda would train 45 youngsters in a program costing \$8,509. The staff would include five professionals, six paid residents and 21 volunteers.

Whittemore-Prescott Area's program, costing \$6,304, would train 35 youngsters. The staff would include three professionals, four paid residents and seven volunteers.

Mrs. Parmerter has been active in missions, having served as president of the conference Women's Missionary Society and eastern area promoter.





Flying combat mission as a volunteer "flare kicker" is the way AIC John N. Kirk (pictured at

left), son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Kirk of Lee Center, New York, has elected to spend his "off-duty" time in Viet Nam. Airman Kirk, an administrative specialist at Tan Son Nhut Airfield, started flying flare drop missions last November. "At first, I just wanted to better understand what my unit was doing," explains the airman. "Now I feel that I am making a real contribution as a regular flare kicker."


