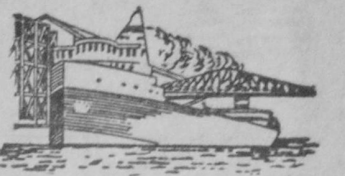

Late 'Roxey' Roach Honored at Johnstown Sports Banquet

Twenty relatives of the late Wilbur C. (Roxey) Roach of Tawas City attended a banquet November 8 at Johnstown, Pennsylvania, at which the former professional baseball player was among 18 athletes inducted into a district hall of fame.

Sports personalities, active and retired, from near and far headed a crowd of 1,266 in attendance. It was one of the largest gatherings of national sports notables this season.

Besides Roach, some of the better known inductees included Maurice Stokes, who was an all-star professional basketball player until 1958 when he was stricken by sleeping sickness; Tom Yawcic, former quarterback of the Michigan State Spartans; Donald Hall, a member of the Detroit Red Wings; James (Rip) Collins, former professional baseball player, and other sports figures from the Johnstown area.

Among those presenting awards were Frank Frisch, one-time baseball great; Joseph Torre, Milwaukee Braves catcher; Alfred N. Cervi, one of the greatest professional basketball competitors of all time; Gordie Howe, Detroit Red Wings; Dick Groat, Philadelphia Phillies; Oscar Robertson, Cincinnati Royals; Roger Staubach, Heisman Trophy winner of 1963; Archibald Roosevelt, son of the late Pres. Theodore Roosevelt and former president of the Boone and Crockett Club.

Benjamin J. Kline of Miami Beach, Florida, presented a posthumous award to Roach, who managed teams in the Johnstown area following his retirement from active participation. John Roach of Glencoe, Minnesota, eldest son of Roxey, accepted the award and then called Mrs. Elsie Roach to the dais where she was presented the award to her late husband.

A native of Windber, Pennsylvania, Roach began his professional baseball career with Youngstown and Sharon of the Ohio-Pennsylvania League in 1908. The following season he played for Lancaster of the Tri-State League and batted .302.

He was purchased by the New York Highlanders, now the Yankees, after the 1909 season for \$1,900. Roach played shortstop and second base for the Highlanders in 1910 when they finished second and in 1911. He started the 1912 season with the Washington Senators.

He moved to Baltimore of the International League later in 1912 and on to Buffalo for 1913 and 1914. In 1915, he led the International League shortstops, including the great Joe Tinker. He was with Louisville of the American Association in 1916, 1917 and 1918.

When Roach retired from Louisville, he had a consecutive game streak of 546 games. This durability string—a national record—was broken when he injured a finger. Roach not only was regarded as a smart player, but also as a great strategist as a manager. In 1919, he had an offer to take over as manager of Louisville, but turned the job down. It went to his friend whom he started in baseball, Joe McCarthy, later to become the manager of the Chicago Cubs, Yankees and Boston Red Sox.

He came to Tawas City in 1925 and purchased the Kane garage, which he operated as Roach Motor Sales until 1941. He was known here as an expert trout fisherman, hunter and state trap shooting champion. He passed away in 1947 at the age of 65.

Roach was Johnstown District's most prominent baseball figure in the late 1910s and 1920s. After his professional baseball career, he returned to manage strong independent teams in that area.

Besides his eldest son and widow attending the banquet, other members of the Roach family present were Mrs. Margaret Carter, Mt. Clemens; Mr. and Mrs. Judson Bowers, New Baltimore; Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Roach, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Roach, East Tawas; George Roach, Mr. and Mrs. James Roach, Tawas City; Mr. and Mrs. Roxey Roach, Pearl Beach, Florida; Donald Roach, Miami, Florida; Mrs. Dorothy Daley, St. Johns. Two granddaughters and two great grandsons of Mr. Roach also attended.

Deer Season Prospects Look Good for Nov. 20

Prospects point to another big deer kill approaching last year's second highest take of 140,000 whitetails when Michigan's fire-arm deer season blasts off November 20 in the Lower Peninsula. Upper Peninsula hunters opened the season one week earlier.

With the state's deer herd estimated at 800,000 animals, about the same as last fall, the pre-season picture again looks highly promising for upwards of a record 575,000 sportsmen who are expected to sweep across field and forest lands in the next two weeks.

Admittedly, much still depends on that big make-it or break-it factor, the weather. Last year's dismal opening day saw many hunters leave the woods at noon following a heavy downpour.

However, if hunters have conditions to their liking, particularly during the all-important first few days of the season, they should rack up a harvest of about 75,000 bucks and nearly 64,000 antlerless deer.

The projected buck figure is conservative, according to the Michigan Department of Conservation, down from last year's near-record take of 88,210. The antlerless quota rates next best to the all-time high set in 1952 when any-deer hunting was introduced on a major scale in the state.

While the season is five days later this year due to the change

Michigan deer hunters who hope to get a crack at a bear during this fall's big game season will have to go to the Upper Peninsula. Hunters are reminded that, because the Lower Peninsula's bear population is considered too low to hunt, these animals have been scratched as legal targets below the Straits of Mackinac for the next two years.

Mayor Names New Zoning Appeal Board

Written resignations of four members of the Tawas City Council, who had been serving as temporary members of the city's zoning appeal board, were accepted at Monday night's regular meeting.

A list of four new candidates for the appeal board submitted by Mayor George Tuttle was unanimously adopted by the council.

Filling the unexpired vacancies are Arnold Bronson, one year; Edwin Habermehl, two years; Donald Watson, two years; Irwin Ruppert, three years.

The above appointees replace Councilmen Cecil Cabbie, Clyde Evril, Daniel Ulrich and Clark Tanner.

Councilman Howard Hatton is to remain as chairman of the board and Delano Myles, member of the city planning commission, fills the sixth position.

The appeal board was established last spring following enactment of the city's new comprehensive zoning ordinance.

While activity of the appeal board has been limited since its organization, City Attorney Alf C. Watson said that a number of matters concerning denial of building applications would probably come before that group in the near future.

Concern has been expressed by councilmen regarding denial of several residential building applications in the business district. Under the ordinance, additions may not be constructed on a non-conforming use.

Attorney Watson has said that further study of the ordinance may be necessary to determine if amendments would be in order.

No action was taken on appointment of a new police chief to succeed Frank Roti, who resigned effective October 31.

Students Patch Relations After Painting Spree

Combined student councils of Tawas Area High School and Oscoda Area High School met Thursday to patch relationships between the two schools following two recent vandalism incidents.

Concern had been expressed by officials of the two schools when students from Tawas damaged Oscoda's football field press box and bell with red paint. Students from Oscoda retaliated by painting Tawas' press box. Those responsible have not been apprehended.

A resolution prepared by the two student councils was as follows:

"The student council, with the cooperation of all classes, organizations, faculty and administration, will accept the full responsibility of a thorough investigation to uncover any wrong doing or vandalism coming from any member or members of the student body." Signing the statement were Mary Sass, Tawas Area president, and Steven Hennigar, Oscoda Area president.

Officers from Tawas are to attend a luncheon meeting today (Wednesday) at Oscoda. The student council exchange is to continue and other groups are to exchange visits between the two schools in an effort to restore past relations.

"We at Tawas Area High School have enjoyed a very fine reputation for good sportsmanship in the league," said Miss Sass in a letter printed in the school's newspaper. "Let's not have a few students destroy this reputation."

Sentenced to Prison on Forgery Charge

Lloyd C. LaMar, Flint, was sentenced to serve concurrent terms of from five to 14 years at State Prison of Southern Michigan on separate charges of forgery and uttering and publishing a forged check. He was arraigned Friday before Isosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

LaMar admitted passing a forged check for \$49.61 at the Holland Hotel, East Tawas, on September 28. The checks had been stolen from a Flint business place and a check writing machine was used.

He had been held in custody of Flint authorities on a similar charge there. He was taken to Jackson Tuesday by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell.

Grossmeyer Named Night Patrolman for East Tawas P. D.

William D. Grossmeyer has been named as the new night patrolman of the East Tawas Police Department. His appointment is effective December 1.

Selection of Grossmeyer was recommended Monday night by Police Chief Donald Docking and approved by the city council.

Seven persons made application for the position and final determination was made by written examination and oral interview conducted by Chief Docking, Sgt. Police Cpl. William Scates and Councilman James Campbell.

Grossmeyer is presently employed by the East Tawas Department of Public Works. He first entered the city's employment in 1957.

Council Adopts Rules for Outdoor Burning

Restrictions governing the outdoor burning of trash in the fire zone, under terms of a new city ordinance, are now being prepared by the Tawas City Department of Public Works.

Five applications for burning permits in the fire zone were approved Monday night by the city council, subject to approval of burners by the city. More applications are expected from residences and business places in the zone which extends from the US-23 bridge over the Tawas River to the east city limits.

To receive a permit to burn in this zone, the owner must agree to four conditions: 1. A barrel or trash burner is to be used for such fires; 2. The burner is to be in a nonhazardous location; 3. The burner is to be located on the permittee's own property; 4. The fire is to be attended at all times. Permits issued may be revoked at any time by the council because of a fire hazard or nuisance. The permittee would be held responsible for any damage caused by fire escaping from a burner and would be subject to fine for violations.

Applications approved Monday night included those submitted by Miss Ferne Mark, John A. Mark, O. J. Armstrong, John H. Brugger, Dorthea McComb. A permit had been granted at the last meeting to George A. Prescott.

Fire Chief James Lansky was authorized to continue his past practice of issuing temporary permits under his control for the burning of leaves and grass. Such permits are usually issued in the spring and fall.

In other matters, the council's street committee is to inspect a ditch along Ninth Avenue to determine if it should be deepened. Making the inspection this evening (Wednesday) with Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz will be Councilmen Howard Hatton, Clyde Evril and Daniel Ulrich.

Harry Krumrei, owner of Krumrei Beverage Distributing, appeared before the council and said he was having a problem with surface drainage at his new warehouse and office building.

Councilman Russell A. Rollin Sr. urged investigation of the drainage problem as the Ninth Avenue district along the railroad tracks has prospects for future industrial development.

The firm of Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants, East Tawas, was authorized to start its audit of city books before the end of the year. The city is to inquire into the possibility of a quarterly audit of books rather than an annual audit.

Isosco Schools Receive \$6,454.35 from Forest

Schools and county roads of Isosco received a combined total of \$6,454.35 as its share of the gross income from federal forest service lands located here. The money is derived from the sale of timber and permit fees charged for special uses of national forest lands.

To date, counties in the Huron-Manistee National Forests have shared a total of \$782,661.24.

CHARGE YOUTHS WITH DAMAGING MAIL BOXES

Two Hale boys, aged 15 and 17, have been charged with malicious destruction of 13 mail boxes on Lakeside Heights Drive in Plainfield Township. Deputy Sheriff Jerry Kruse said the boys admitted knocking the mail boxes over Friday night with the older boy's automobile.

Hilbert's Tawas Lanes Damaged by Electrical Fire

"It could have been a lot worse," was the way H. R. (Jim) Hilbert described a fire which struck Hilbert's Tawas Lanes following bowling last Thursday night. Only the Friday night bowling league had to be cancelled.

He and his wife were still busy Tuesday morning cleaning smoke damage to the building and carpenters were repairing damage to the side entrance. He estimated the loss at approximately \$1,000.

After the commercial league concluded action Thursday night, Hilbert decided to do some repair work on automatic pin spotters at the rear of the building. He noticed the lights flicker about 10:30 o'clock and walked toward the front to investigate.

Hilbert found the building filled with smoke and notified the Tawas City Fire Department. Using high-pressure fog nozzles, firemen extinguished a blaze in the ceiling over the first and second alleys using only 20 gallons of water.

The owners said the blaze was caused by a faulty electrical cable in a storage room at the side of the building. Flames broke through a wooden partition separating the two structures.

Had he not been in the structure and discovered the smoke, Hilbert said the entire building probably would have been lost.

The main structure had been completely rewired since installation of new pin setting equipment and remodeling of the interior. Hilbert said his electrical contractor had recommended replacement of older electrical service in the side storage building.

Cheaper Parcel Post Rates Provided U. S. Overseas Military Personnel

The United States Post Office Department has put into effect cheaper air parcel rates for military personnel overseas.

The new rates, in line with H. R. 11420 just signed into law by the president, provides that parcels from many points in the United States can be sent all the way by air to overseas military personnel anywhere at substantially lower rates.

Air parcels will no longer be charged automatically at a maximum domestic rate. Instead, charges will be based on the actual distance the parcels travel domestically before the military service take over their transportation overseas.

The new law also cleared the way for air lifting to Vietnam on a space-available basis, of parcels.

Outstanding Citizen to be Honored at Chamber of Commerce Banquet

A special committee to determine procedures for selecting the outstanding man or woman in the Tawas area for 1965 has been appointed by James DeWysse, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

"The chamber realizes that extra effort by an individual must not go unrecognized," said DeWysse. "It is to be the annual pleasure of the chamber to present an award to this person during the annual winter banquet."

First step of the committee will be to mail letters to all clubs and organizations in the area asking for nominations of from one to three individuals, including a brief report as to why this person should be nominated for the honor.

The committee points out that it is not looking for the person who is highly efficient in their occupations, but the individual who is devoting extra time and effort for the good of others.

The person to be honored must reside in the Tawas Area School District, can be man or woman and must be considered on the basis of efforts for the year of 1965. If any organization does not receive a letter, the chamber of commerce office should be contacted immediately.

All nominations are to be turned into the chamber office before January 1. The committee is to review each nomination, select the award winner and seal the name of this person in an envelope which will be held in security by Peoples State Bank until the night of the chamber of commerce banquet.

Hello, everyone! Do you recognize us with our "new looks" — new name, new head, new title, new area of work, new ideas for sharing up-to-the-minute information?

You may have heard about a state-wide reorganization of Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service . . . off-campus opportunity for all family members to continue their education and keep up with ever changing family needs.

The family living education program will have some new directions, according to Loa Whitfield, who heads our state-wide program. Among them, she cites:

Division of the state into 28 county groups served by 42 home economists in the areas of two, three, four or five counties bringing an extension family living pro-

As a starter, we will soon begin bringing you the latest information on the fast changing subject . . . textiles. You and I wear them, decorate with them and do many work jobs with them.

Next week, I will tell you when, where and how to get current textile facts and trends.

cels weighing up to five pounds paid at the surface parcel post rates. The Department of Defense is providing this service, both to and from Vietnam servicemen abroad. Previously, such parcels went overseas by ship.

Parcels sent at surface rates to servicemen will travel by surface transportation within the United States to military points of embarkation and then the air lift will apply. In most cases, up to a week or more will be saved on delivery time.

Illustrating the new air parcel rates, a six-pound parcel from Tawas City to a serviceman in Germany has been charged the maximum domestic rate (eighth zone) of \$4.88. New cost to New York (fourth zone) will be \$3.23.

Similar provisions apply for the servicemen abroad mailing parcels home.

The new service made possible by the air lift of parcels to combat areas, which is a combination surface-air service (surface transit domestically and air lift overseas) provides an expedited service at considerably less cost than the rates for all-air service.

Another provision of the new law broadens the free letters provision previously granted to servicemen in Vietnam under terms of the Military Pay Act of 1965. The new proviso clarifies authority to extend the franking privilege to Vietnam servicemen who may be hospitalized outside that combat area.

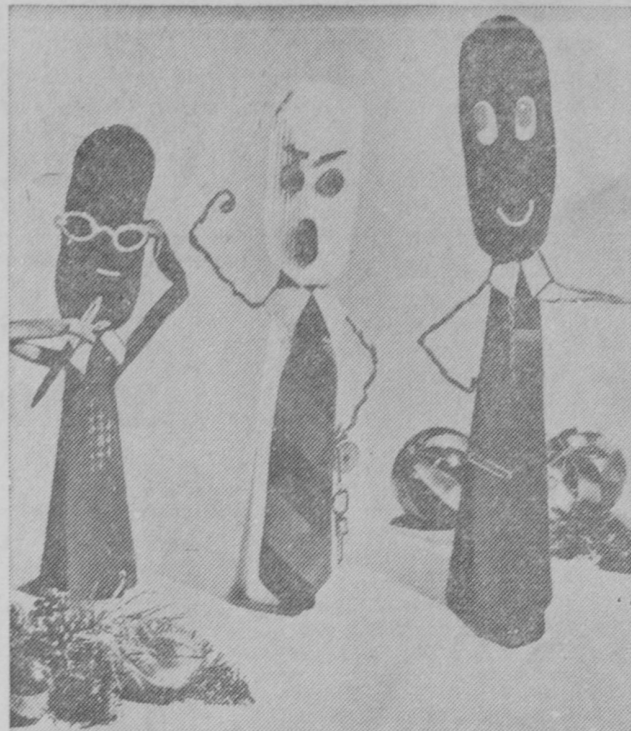
Charges Filed Against Driver in Fatal Accident

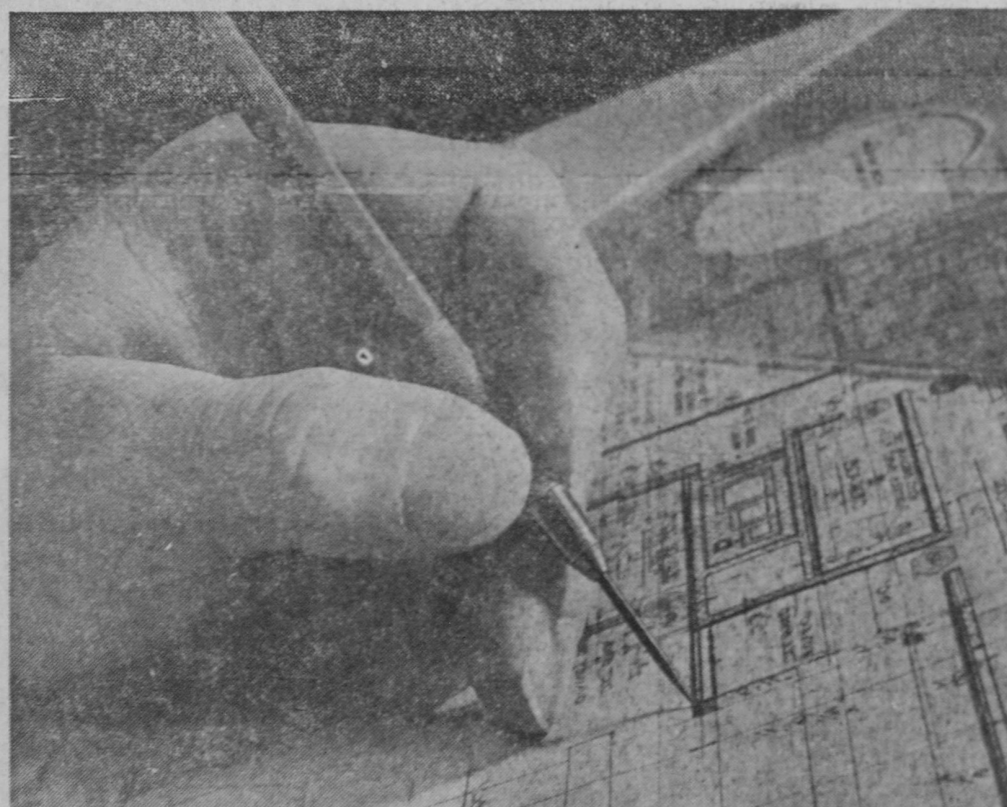

Draft Card Burners 'Break Faith' with Dead U. S. Patriots

Draft card burners and "retreat to peace" demonstrators demanding withdrawal of United States forces in Vietnam were accused last week of breaking faith with the nearly 1,000,000 Americans who have died in the service of their country.

The charge was leveled by William J. Driver, administrator of veterans affairs and chairman of the President's Veterans Day National Committee, as the nation prepared to observe Veterans day on November 11.

Driver pointed out that more than 30,000,000 Americans have donned uniforms to insure the survival of freedom and liberty in

the course of nine wars during the nation's history, and that approximately 1,000,000 of these patriots met death in service.

"If those who now refuse to serve and those who preach peace at any price were to prevail," he declared, "it would make a shameful mockery of the sacrifices and deeds of valor contributed by all our veterans, living and dead."

WHY CABLE TELEVISION?

When a new community antenna television service is introduced to a city or community it is natural that the people of that community should ask questions pertaining to the operation and to the service to be provided by this new facility.

As a convenience to our friends in Tawas and East Tawas, we shall try to anticipate some of these questions and also attempt to provide the answers to these queries. Accordingly, the following is a list of questions and answers that we feel will prove of interest to the potential subscriber to our service.

QUESTION: What real service does a community antenna service provide that cannot be received by using a home type tower and antenna?

ANSWER: Essentially, the service to be provided offers the subscriber a greater selection of television station signals and much clearer reception of those signals through the use of elaborate and complicated transmission equipment and the use of co-axial cables. The co-axial cable isolates the signals to be transmitted from unwanted or interfering signals that would normally strike your home type of antenna causing brilliant spots or lines or other distracting interference.

QUESTION: How many television station signals will I be able to view on the community antenna system?

ANSWER: The new cable television service will have 4 television station signals at the beginning of the new service. These are Channel 5 Bay City, Channel 9 Cadillac, Channel 12 Flint, and Channel 57 Saginaw. In addition to the television signals there will also be a minimum of 12 FM radio signals transmitted over the co-axial cable system.

QUESTION: Is a tower needed at my home to be used in conjunction with the community antenna service?

ANSWER: No. There is no need for a tower or antenna of any kind at your home. A small co-axial cable approximately the same size as a telephone line is run direct from our trunk line system to your television set. Accordingly, the appearance of your home can be enhanced by the removal of your television tower and antenna system.

QUESTION: If I should have the cable installed in my home, will the cable company provide service on my television set as well as the cable hook-up?

ANSWER: No. The cable TV company does not provide repair service to the subscribers television set. This is the business of your local television dealer and repair man. However, if you are a subscriber to the community antenna service, the TV company will provide you a snow-free picture at the end of the line to be attached to the back of your set.

There is no extra charge for service calls to your home if damage should occur to the cable television system.

QUESTION: Does the cable television company require that my home tower and antenna system be removed before attaching the cable to my set?

ANSWER: Absolutely not. There is no such requirement.

QUESTION: If I become a subscriber to the cable service and then the cable company adds additional television signals to its system will this require that I pay more money for the service?

ANSWER: No. The addition of more signals to the television system is not a basis for the company to increase the television rates. The television company's agreement with your city provides that any request for increase in rates must be approved by the city council and the request for such increase must stem from an increase in the cost of living index or considerable increase in inflation thereby making it economically impossible for the company to operate at the present rate scale. Generally speaking increased service by providing additional channels usually results in more and happier subscribers to our service.

QUESTION: If I decide to have a cable hook-up, am I then required to keep the cable over an extended period of time?

ANSWER: Absolutely not. You may sign up to use the cable television service on a rental plan which requires that you pay \$5.50 for one month service. If at the end of the first month you decide you do not want the service, the company will cheerfully disconnect the service from your home at no additional charge.

QUESTION: Is there any high voltage used in the cable television transmission that may be potentially dangerous to my set or occupants of my home?

ANSWER: The voltage used to deliver the signal to your set is less than 8 volts, or about the same amount as is used in a normal 3 cell flashlight. Accordingly the cable system is perfectly safe to use anywhere. The main trunk system of the cable television service is grounded to a common ground with the Power Company serving your area.

QUESTION: If I purchase a color set to be used on the cable will the cable provide me with good color reception?

ANSWER: Cable television service will enhance the operation of any television set. The modern equipment used in the delivery of TV signals to your home is of the finest to be found in the entire television industry. Pictures are sharp and clear and color is exceptionally vivid when viewed over a modern cable television system.

QUESTION: If I have cable TV in my home and I decide to move to another home on the cable TV system, how much will it cost me to have the new hook-up at my new residence?

ANSWER: Your cable TV hook-up may be moved as many times as you wish at a set charge of \$5.00 per move.

QUESTION: What are the different plans under which I may subscribe to the Cable television service?

ANSWER: There are 2 plans under which you may use cable television service. First is the permanent hook-up plan which requires a cash payment of \$19.00 at the time of hook-up and a set monthly charge of \$4.50 per month. The second plan is called the rental plan and costs \$5.50 per month. Under this plan there is no hook-up charge, you merely rent the cable service for \$5.50 per month as long as you retain the service.

QUESTION: How do I order the cable television service to be put into my home?

ANSWER: Merely dial 739-9077 and a cable television company technician will come out and make installation at your home.

QUESTION: Where do I make my payments for the cable television service?

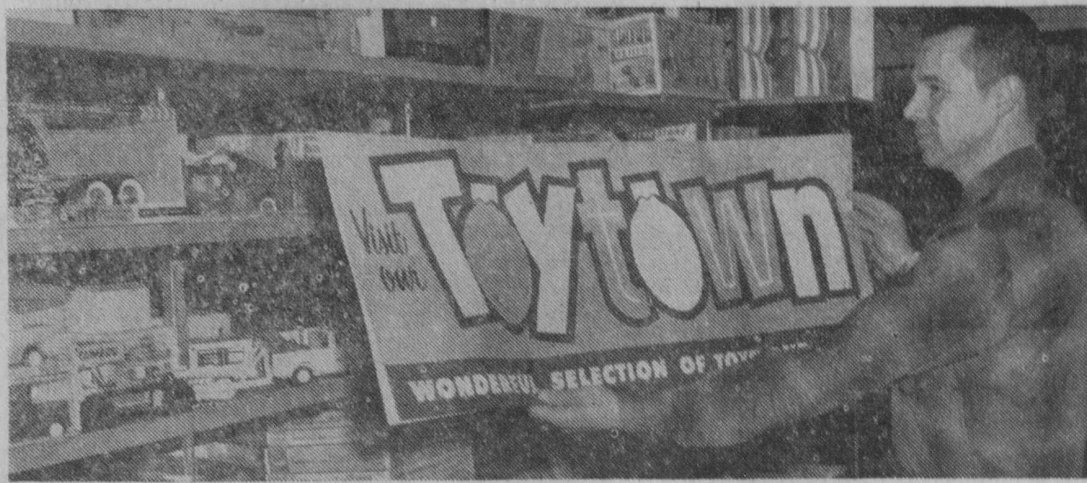
ANSWER: At the time you sign up for the cable television service, a book of coupons is issued in your name and account number. You merely tear out a coupon each month and mail it in together with your payment to General Television of Michigan, 319 State St., Oscoda, Michigan.

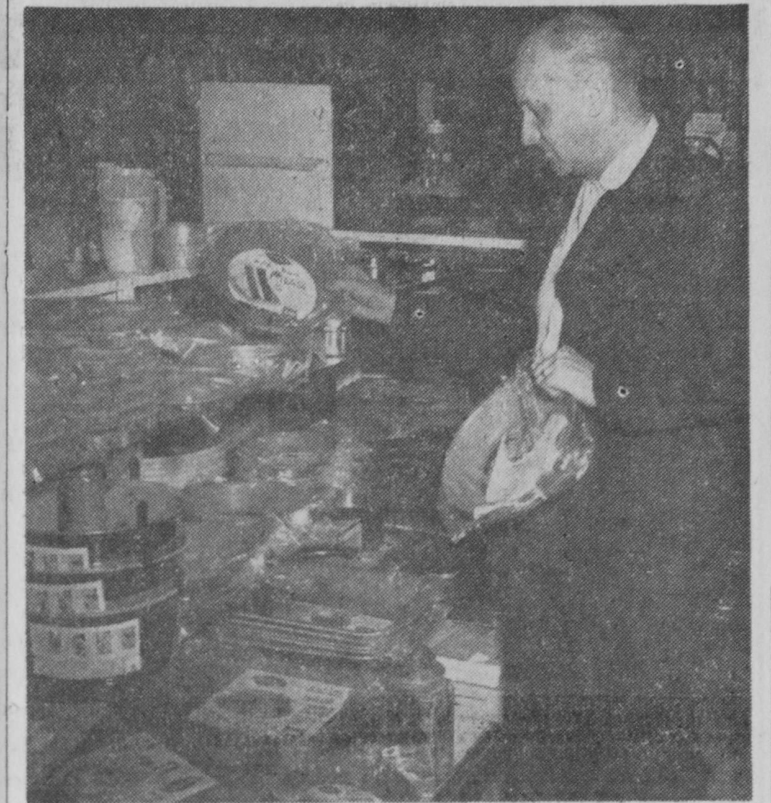

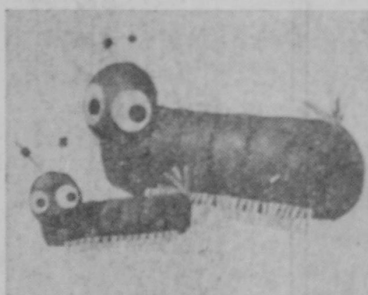

GLAZE: Combine 1 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 tablespoon soft butter, 1 tablespoon water, 2 teaspoons lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon rum extract (or other flavor as desired). Beat until smooth.

Prune-Pecan Loaf is another fine holiday bread. It is chock full of plump prunes and crunchy pecans.

PRUNE-PECAN LOAF

2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 cup coarsely chopped pecans
1 cup coarsely chopped, cooked prunes
1/2 cup prune juice
1 egg, beaten
2 teaspoons orange peel
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and soda. Add pecans. Combine prunes, prune juice, egg, orange peel, butter and vanilla extract; add to the dry mixture. Stir enough to blend. Pour into a 9x5x3-inch foil or waxed paper-lined pan that is lightly greased and sprinkled with flour. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 to 60 minutes or until it tests done with a cake tester. Cool on rack five minutes. Turn out and cool. (Cuts more easily and tastes even better the next day.)

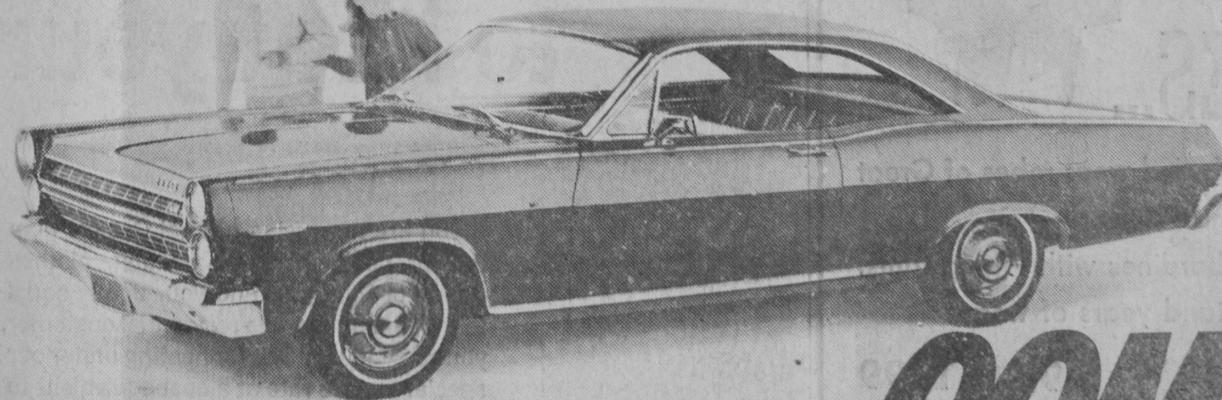

State Police Lower Height Restrictions in Recruiting Drive

Minimum height requirements for applicants to join the Michigan State Police has been lowered to five feet, nine inches to increase the number of good recruiting applicants, Col. Frederick E. Davids, department director, announces.

Minimum height requirement in recent years has been five feet, 10 inches. A study, however, shows that between the new minimum and old one there is available a large reservoir of young men well qualified to be troopers and this opportunity is now open to them.

In progress at East Lansing headquarters is the first of a series of recruit schools to add 200 troopers authorized by the 1965 legislature. Eight-week schools with no elapsed time between them will be held throughout this fiscal year to reach the new complement of 1,459 officers.

No changes have been made in other enlistment qualifications. Candidates must be between 21 to 29 years of age, high school graduates or the equivalent, of good moral character and residents of Michigan for at least six months. The weight is 150 to 230 in proportion to height. Candidates may be single or married.

Trooper rank pay begins with the first day of recruit school and tops \$6,100 in the first year with increases following automatically to \$8,656. There also is a subsistence allowance and many other benefits. Promotions bring substantial pay increases and an officer may retire after just 25 years of service at half pay, which also protects his wife.

Full-Time Students Continue SS Benefits After Reaching 18

Iosco County students who receive social security benefits as the children of retired, disabled or deceased workers can continue to get the payments after age 18 if they are attending school full time, Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, announced this week.

Under this new provision, con-

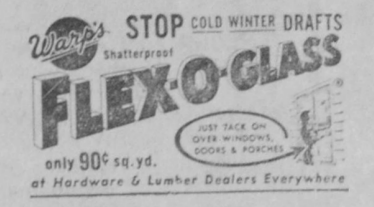
tained in the 1965 amendments to the social security law, students can continue to receive monthly benefits until they reach 22 or complete their education, whichever is earlier, Mr. Ellifritz continued.

Students whose benefits were stopped when they reached 18 and who are continuing their education as full-time students will have to file a new application in order to have their payments started again. Benefit payments can be made retroactive to January 1965.

Young adults who take a full-time vocational course, as well as

those going to high school or college full time, are covered by this provision, Mr. Ellifritz stated.

Flashing Red Lights on School Buses Designate Traffic Halt

Two-way stops are required by all other traffic when approaching school buses which show flashing red stop lights in front and behind.

However, at an intersection controlled by signals or a police officer proceed with caution according to the signals.

In incorporated cities and villages, the regular traffic signals are followed with one important variation. Local ordinances in Tawas City and East Tawas require the same procedure as in the un-

incorporated rural area; this is, a two-way stop when school bus stop signals are activated, which includes all of US-23.

If this seems a bit confusing, you can always fall back on common sense. If a red light shows up in front of you, stop - look - check things out. If it is a school bus, do not move either way until it does or until the driver puts out his flashing stop signal and you are sure the kids are clear.

How would you like 50 back seat drivers instead of only two or three? School bus drivers are usually trained for the job under a special program provided by the Michigan Department of Education but they are not infallible. Recollecting the last long trip you made with just your own family in the car, give the man some extra consideration.
