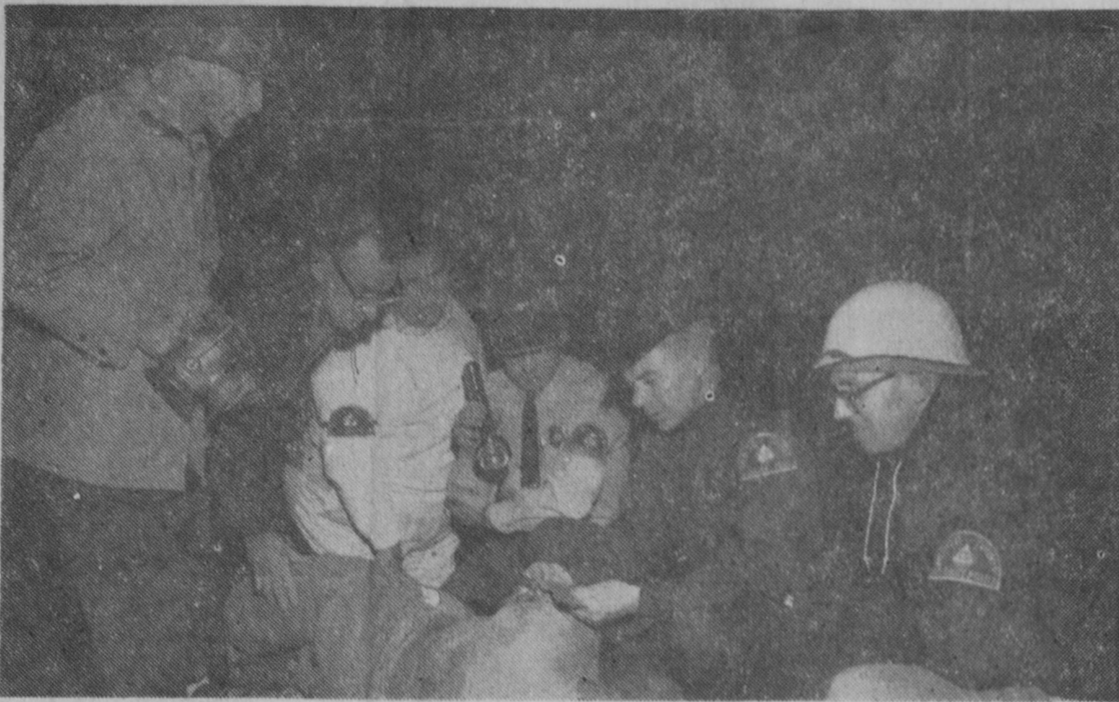

# Another Cole Man-Made Lake in Iosco

Another James H. Cole man-made lake is in the making two miles south of Whittemore in Iosco County. The dam for the lake will be on the Johnson Creek just west of M-65 and the lake will extend west for approximately three miles.

A problem in getting an option on one 40-acre description on the west end of the proposed lake will determine exactly how large the lake will be. Plans call for the lake to cover approximately 800 acres. The water depth at the dam will be from 46-56 feet.

Exact size of the dam will depend on surveys yet to be taken but will be about one-third mile long and 450 feet wide at the base. Plans call for the dam to blend in with the surrounding area with a spill way resembling a series of water falls instead of just plain concrete.

A name for the lake has not been chosen; it may be picked in a contest next year.

Mr. Cole stated, "We have had good cooperation from everyone in the area. The land owners in the valley have been very friendly toward the project. This is necessary in this type of an enterprise. Many valleys are worthless for this type of a project because of lack of this cooperation."

This is the 12th lake planned by Cole and it will be the largest. It also will have the largest dam for

a recreation lake in Michigan.

A picnic and swimming area on the lake for local township residents is being considered. Several sand areas near the east end of the lake can be developed into beautiful beaches. This depth lake should develop into a good fishing spot as the Johnson is a trout stream now.

Much still has to be done before actual construction on the dam can start. A few scattered descriptions of property must still be obtained. Clearing on the west end of the lake is expected to start immediately. Approval by the fish division of the conservation department has been obtained. The conservation department also approves the dam design for safety, etc. Approval of the Iosco Board of Supervisors will be necessary and cooperation of the Iosco County Road Commission will be needed.

Construction of the dam is tentatively planned to start in January with completion in the spring and flooding completed by next summer. Donald Tietz of Sebewaing will supervise the earth moving operations for the project.

The lake development will have a large impact on Whittemore and the surrounding area. Construction of the dam and clearing of the area to be flooded will mean quite a few job opportunities for the area. Construction of homes on the lake will make more jobs. Added valuation will mean more tax money for schools and local governmental units.

The area to be flooded is mostly woods, brush and some wild pasture land and will not cover any good farming areas. Homesites on these lakes sell in a hurry. Many lots on Lake Ogemaw, another Cole development between Prescott and West Branch, were sold and homes built on them before the lake was completed.

Vernon (Robby) Robinson, sales manager of the concern, will move from Allen Park to Whittemore in the spring. A construction and sales office will be established near the site of the dam.

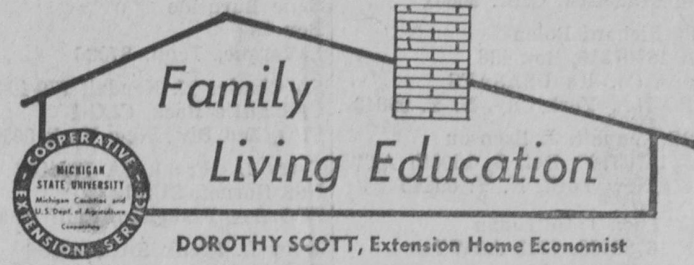
