

Road Commission Explains Reason for Sign Installation

Verbal fireworks erupted Friday when township supervisors protested installation of signs by Isosco Road Commission stating that certain "private" roads were not being maintained by the commission.

According to regulations of the state highway department, county road commissions are now prohibited from removing snow or maintaining any roads not within its certified system, even though reimbursed for this work by individual townships.

In the past, townships have accepted new subdivisions with roads which were not dedicated to the public or were not constructed according to certain specifications. As a result, the roads were never included in the county road commission's certified system, which is reimbursed for maintenance by the state.

Townships have contracted with the road commission for snow removal and maintenance of these roads, but this practice is to be discontinued here next year. According to state law, townships are prohibited from purchasing equipment and would be required to use private contractors for such work, if desired.

While designated as "private" according to road commission specifications, most of the roads involved are open to the public. Since installation of signs, considerable concern has been expressed by hunters and motorists concerning use of roads which have been traveled for years.

In order to become designated as a certified county road, which system is brought up to date each April, property owners would have to grant a 33-foot right-of-way across their land on both sides of the road. It would then have to meet certain construction requirements before being acceptable for snow removal and maintenance.

Road commissioners admitted to the board of supervisors that there had been a lack of communication between the two groups concerning the problems, both before and after installation of the new "private road" designation signs. Complete information on the change in requirements is to be sent to township authorities.

Legislative Committee to Hear Fish Complaints

A joint hearing of Michigan Senate and House Conservation committee is to be held Wednesday, October 27, 10:00 a. m., at the East Tawas Community Building to examine recent problems caused in the Tawas-Saginaw Bay area by use of gill nets for commercial perch fishing.

This announcement was made last Thursday by State Sen. Carl W. O'Brien (D-Pontiac), chairman of the conservation committee, and State Rep. Joseph N. Snyder (D-St. Clair Shores), chairman of the house conservation and recreation committee.

The twin problems of using gill nets and the declining perch supply in Saginaw and Tawas Bays have been the subject of recent court action in Isosco County and a conservation department announcement of possible liberalization of commercial perch fishing regulations for Saginaw-Tawas Bays.

A recent conservation department announcement indicates intention to allow commercial operators to keep and sell all yellow perch caught in gill nets of 2½-inch size. A recent Isosco County Circuit Court ruling allows all fish caught below the 8½-inch legal limit to be kept without penalty if it can be shown to the department that they weigh at least 1½ ounces in fillet form.

"Because of the great public concern and the importance to the economy in this area, and with the growing demand for legislative review and possible revision of the statutes controlling the taking and filleting of fish, the chairman of the joint committee believed that it would be in the public interest to conduct this hearing in the Tawas area at the earliest possible time," said the announcement.

Expected to be present are the two legislators from this district, Sen. Robert L. Richardson Jr. (R-

Action Tabled on Parking Pact

Action on a proposed agreement which would allow the state highway department to remove parking along US-23 at any time it was deemed necessary was tabled for further discussion November 1 by the Tawas City Council.

The agreement, described as "routine" is to satisfy regulations of the United States Bureau of Public Roads, which is participating in reconstruction of US-23 through Tawas City.

Mayor George Tuttle pointed out that, regardless of any action by the council, the state could remove parking at any time it was deemed dangerous or interfered with the free movement of traffic along a state highway.

Such action, according to Section 9.2375 of the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code, could be taken following a traffic survey and a hearing before the state highway commission.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz said that such an agreement was necessary before construction of the new highway can be started. He was of the opinion that parking would not be removed in the business district.

A decision is to be made at the

May Seek Attorney General Opinion on W-P Area School Millage Difficulty

Question on a technicality concerning millage used to determine operating tax money for Whittemore-Prescott Area School District may go to the state attorney general for a decision.

Last week, when the Isosco Board of Supervisors' finance committee brought in its recommended apportionment of taxes for townships, county and schools, Ray Kesler, superintendent of Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools maintained that his district should receive 9½ mills, rather than the nine mills designated last spring by the county allocation board.

According to state law, the largest geographical area of a school district which overlaps county lines determines millage for the entire district. In Whittemore-Prescott's case, its largest geographical area is now located in Ogemaw County, which last spring voted to "peg" 9½ mills for school operation in the entire county.

As a result of using nine mills as allocated by Isosco County, Kesler said that his district stood to lose approximately \$8,000 in operating money.

Henry Oates, chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee, said that the committee would be required to follow the nine-mill order of Isosco Allocation Board until ordered otherwise. He pointed out that no official notification of Ogemaw County's millage action had been received here and that notice should have been received within five days of the special election.

Mr. Kesler said that he had contacted Ogemaw County officials and asked them to make this notification at the time of the election. "We should not be penalized because some other agency of government did not do its job," maintained the superintendent.

Whittemore-Prescott Area Board of Education has been in contact with its attorney and Kesler said it would probably request an opinion from the state attorney general.

The board of supervisors adopted recommendations of its finance committee which apportioned operating funds of \$516,601.87 to four school districts within the county, based on an al-

Anderson Trustees Accept City's Offer

An offer of \$20,000 by the City of East Tawas for the former site of Anderson Coach Company has been accepted, according to City Attorney Michael Freel.

At Monday night's regular meeting, Freel announced that Anderson trustees had indicated willingness to accept the offer. He was authorized to prepare necessary legal work for the transaction.

The building formerly occupied by the firm was destroyed by fire in 1964. A warehouse is still located on the property and this would be used to house city equipment.

In other council matters, Supt. Paul Ropert reported that the waterways commission had been notified of recent complaints that old piling and debris littered the lake bottom following reconstruction of the state dock. The contractor has been ordered to remove debris from the lake bottom.

The council unanimously adopted a resolution urging the conservation commission to refrain from removing present restrictions on commercial fishing in Saginaw-Tawas Bay. The council was in agreement with local bait shop and party boat operators, who

Bank Suspect Killed Himself

Chester P. York, 40, Saginaw, prime suspect in the October 6 holdup of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, Whittemore, shot and killed himself Saturday afternoon as police closed in on him in Reno Township.

York was taken to Tawas Hospital shortly after 2:00 p. m. with a 22 caliber bullet wound in the temple and died before 5:00 p. m.

Wanted in the October 3 holdup of a Pinconning tavern, York became an immediate suspect of the Whittemore robbery when his description matched that of the gunman, who held up Mrs. Lillian Smith, part-time bank teller, and made off with more than \$7,000.

The search was intensified here late last week when York was reportedly seen at various bars in Isosco and Arenac Counties.

He was again spotted early Saturday afternoon when he entered the Hard Hat Bar on M-65 between Hale and Whittemore by Emily Dostal, wife of the bar owner. York reportedly had a drink and then left Mrs. Dostal notified her husband, Albert, who called state police at East Tawas. Mrs. Dostal said she recognized York from pictures distributed to business owners throughout the area.

Trooper George Woodward, who was the first police officer on the scene following the bank robbery and was continuing his investigation Saturday afternoon at Whittemore, heard the radio alert. He started driving north on M-65, passed York traveling in the opposite direction and made positive identification of the fugitive.

Woodward followed York at a safe distance while keeping the post informed of his whereabouts. Cpl. William Scales dispatched patrol cars to intercept York at the intersection of US-23 and M-65, but York turned down a street in Whittemore and then doubled back on M-65 with Woodward still following.

The Saginaw man continued north on M-65 to Britt Road, about two miles north of the M-55 intersection. There, he turned east and traveled two miles, turned north and traveled about one-half mile and stopped.

Woodward, who had been instructed to keep a safe distance from the fugitive until other officers arrived, said that he stopped approximately 50-75 yards behind York's car and waited while the man sat in his car for several minutes.

York then got out of his car, his hands raised, but clutching a .22 caliber Remington slide action rifle with sawed off stock. He pointed the muzzle at his head and told the officer he was going to shoot himself.

Woodward talked with York for several minutes trying to dissuade him from suicide. The man sat on the ground, with the rifle pointed

at his head, and smoked a cigarette. Meantime, other state police cars from East Tawas, West (See KILLS SELF, page 6.)

Two Teens Die at Oscoda in Freak Mishap

A 19-year-old airman from Wurtsmith and his 15-year-old girl companion were electrocuted early Sunday when they stopped to aid another motorist, whose auto had knocked down high voltage electric lines at Oscoda.

Dead are Timothy J. Walbridge and Jacqueline W. Barry, Oscoda. Oscoda Township Police said that a car driven by Maryee Brooks, 45, Oscoda, veered off of control on M-171 and sheared off a utility pole, knocking an 11,000-volt power line onto the road.

Minutes later, Walbridge drove up and stopped his car on the power line. Apparently Miss Barry opened the door and stepped out. She was killed by shock as her feet touched the ground and Walbridge apparently tried to grab her and was electrocuted.

Another car carrying two air men also stopped on the power line but they stayed inside the vehicle until rescued.

Miss Brooks was taken to Tawas Hospital for treatment of injuries suffered in the collision with the pole.

A student at Oscoda Area High School, Miss Barry was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Summers. She was born October 25, 1949, at Flint.

Walbridge, son of William F. Walbridge, Detroit, joined the air force in 1962.

Hale to be Served by Natural Gas

Extension of natural gas service to Hale, along with seven other communities in the central and northern part of the Lower Peninsula, was announced last week by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

James C. Preston, general manager of the utility's Northern District, said the company will invest nearly \$2,000,000 next year to bring natural gas to Hale, Higgins Lake, Rose City, Howard City, Trufant, Gowen and Fife Lake.

Preston said the company will construct 83 miles of distribution mains and about 16 miles of supply lines to serve an estimated 3,200 customers.

Rose City and Hale, with eight miles of mains and 14 miles of supply line, will become part of the Tawas district.

With completion of this project, Michigan Consolidated will be serving 132 cities, villages and townships in Northern Lower Michigan, compared to 17 of 10 years ago. The utility invested \$5,600,000 this year to bring gas to 32 communities to the northern tip of the Lower Peninsula and another \$2,000,000 in the older service areas of its northern district.

Supervisors Pass Gill Net Resolution; Appoint New Equalization Director

Isosco Board of Supervisors went on record Friday as opposing Michigan Department of Conservation plan to liberalize commercial fishing regulations on Saginaw-Tawas Bays and Lake Huron.

Noting that a large segment of Isosco's business was predicated on tourism and stressing the importance of sport fishing to the tourist industry, the board of supervisors went on record as favoring adopting a mesh size of 2½ inches to be used by gill netters in the taking of perch.

In other matters, the board voted to hire Henry Oates, former board chairman and presently chairman of the finance committee, to serve as Isosco's new equalization director. The appointment would be effective in 1966.

Oates is to dissolve himself from the building contracting business and is to assume full-time responsibilities as equalization director in 1967. During 1966, he is to work on a per diem basis. Under state law, each county must have a full-time director by

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING FIRES

Approved October 18, 1965

The City of Tawas City Ordains:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall, after the effective date of this ordinance, kindle, build or start any fire, or permit or suffer any fire to be started or take place in any part of the fire limits of the City (said fire limits being and including all the land along US-23 from the Tawas River Bridge to Wheeler Streets between the Tawas River and Tawas Bay), including the streets or alleys adjacent to said fire limits, for the purpose of burning any leaves, rubbish, paper, paste-board boxes, store or shop sweepings, chips, boards or sawdust, shavings, or any other material of any kind, except that said material hereinafter specified may be burned in a stove or furnace located indoors and it shall be unlawful to burn, within the district aforesaid, any of said material in so-called burners.

Section 2. Tinkers, plumbers, or other mechanics in the lawful pursuit of their business, and for the construction or repair of houses, drains, sewers, pipe connections or other necessary repairs, alterations or improvements, are hereby permitted to make or kindle in any street, alley or lane, or other public place in the city, or on any lot, with the permission of the owner or occupant thereof, any fire necessary for the purpose of the said business. The permission herein granted shall not operate to relieve or discharge any person from any liability that might otherwise incur from any negligence or evil intent in the care or control of the said fire, and any person building any fire in any street, lane, alley or other public place in the city, shall use all reasonable precaution to prevent any property from being endangered thereby.

Section 3. SPECIAL PERMISSION Special permission for the outdoor burning of any kind of material may be applied for in writing to the Superintendent of Public Works. Special permission may be granted by the City Council on such terms and conditions as may be ordered by said Council. Such special permission shall exempt the holder thereof from the penal provisions of Section 4 hereof, provided the burning is done in strict and absolute conformity with the terms and conditions of the permission granted.

Section 4. Any person guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Fifty (\$50) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not exceeding thirty days, or by both said fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be effective 20 days from the date of passage, and shall be published in The Tawas Herald within one week of the date hereof.



\$26,051 Harvest is Taken from Huron National Forest

A harvest of \$26,051 was realized in Huron National Forest during the fiscal year that ended June 30 and checks amounting to 25 percent of it were sent to the State of Michigan.

According to Tawas District Ranger Loren Woerpel, under federal law, the 25 percent payments to states are shared among counties in proportion to national forests acreages in the counties. This returned money is invested in schools and county roads.

Iosco County is to receive \$6,454 from the fund. Other counties which share in the Huron National Forest receipts are Alcona, \$6,485; Crawford, \$2,867; Ogemaw, \$1,246; Oscoda, \$8,996.

"It is relatively easy," said Woerpel, "to estimate the material worth of a possession when we prefix it with a dollar symbol. But there are intangible values which must be considered in estimating the total value of soundly managed national forests."

For example, national forests demonstrate the value of scientific conservation practices applied to lands which were once considered worthless. Much of the land in this region, now national forests, was tax-delinquent idle land only three decades ago.

Watersheds are protected and wildlife habitats are improved. These public forests are protected from fire, insects and disease.

Senator Reminds Students of Deadline For State Established College Scholarships

High school seniors in the 35th Senatorial District wishing to apply for a state scholarship through the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority are reminded that the registration deadline is October 31, according to State Sen. Robert Richardson of Saginaw.

Richardson noted that there are nearly 6,000 scholarships available for the 1966-67 academic year "but many students who could qualify do not because they are unaware of these scholarships established by the Michigan Legislature."

In alerting eligible high school seniors, the senator stated that students may: 1. Secure a State of Michigan competitive scholarship registration from their own high school; 2. Mail the registration form and \$1.50 fee, with self-addressed envelope by October 31 as defined in the registration instructions; 3. Take the state competitive scholarship examination on Saturday, November 20, 8:00 a. m., at the assigned center.


