Ray Moores Join US Peace Corps

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Moore, former Tawas residents, left Saturday for Malawi, Central East Africa, where they will spend the next two years as members of the Peace Corps.

The Moores visited relatives and friends here Friday after completing a 10-week training program at Syracuse University.

Moore taught junior high science and coached freshman basketball last year at Cherry Hill High School, Inkster. Mrs. Moore studied two years at Alpena Community College and attended the University of Michigan last year.

Both will be teaching English and mathematics in upper primary schools of East Africa.

Moore was an outstanding athlete at Alma College, where he received his bachelor of art degree in 1964. He starred in basketball there after being one of the top basketball products ever playing for the Tawas Area Braves. He graduated from high school here in 1959.

Mrs. Moore graduated from Tawas Area High School in 1961. She is the former Janis Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Phillips of East Tawas. Moore is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Moore, former Tawas residents now residing in Flint.

The Moores had been thinking about joining the Peace Corps for the past year and a half and finally made the decision after interviewing a former Peace Corps volunteer at Detroit.

"This should be an educational experience for both of us and we are looking forward to our two-

year stay in East Africa," said Moore.

He said that Malawi was an independent country in Central Eastern Africa (Nyasaland) with a very stable government.

They left New York City Saturday evening and were to fly directly to Nairobi, Kenya.

Pleads Guilty to Simple Assault

A 42-year-old Grant Township farmer was placed on probation for 18 months, paid a fine of \$50 and costs of \$25 when arraigned Monday in Isoco Circuit Court.

Eugene Coates entered a plea of guilty to simple assault after the charge had been reduced from assault with a dangerous weapon.

He had been arrested July 7 after a door-to-door salesman, Wesley Lammi, Osceola, complained to police that Coates had struck him with a chair.

Coates told the court he had asked the salesman to leave the premises on previous occasions. When the salesman did not heed his order to "pack up his papers" and leave July 7, Coates struck him with a chair.

Coates agreed to pay medical expenses sustained by Lammi.

In other arraignments Monday, the guilty plea of Raymond L. Bates, 22, Osceola, was taken under advisement by Judge Allan C. Miller. His case was referred to Philip A. Gidley, department of corrections officer, for presentence investigation.

Bates is charged with embezzling \$425 while operating an Osceola service station for Truman Barbier of East Tawas.

Judge Denies Injunction; Show Cause Hearing Set

Petition of Sam Aikens, Alabaster commercial fisherman, asking Isoco County Circuit Court to issue an order restraining the Michigan Department of Conservation from enforcing certain regulations pertaining to the commercial fishing industry, was denied Monday by Judge Allan C. Miller.

A hearing to show cause is to be held before Judge Miller on Wednesday, September 8, 11:00 a. m.

Aikens seeks injunctive relief for himself and on behalf of "all commercial perch fishermen in Isoco County." Approximately 15 boats are represented with 50 employees.

On August 10, the conservation department seized approximately 3,500 pounds of undersized perch in the possession of Aikens.

Attorney for Aikens claims that the seizure was illegal, being contrary to statutes of Michigan and United States Constitution, in that it denied equal protection of the laws.

Aikens petition claimed that the department prohibited fishermen from possessing perch less than 8½ inches in the round and filleted perch of a weight less than 1½ ounces, while permitting others in the commercial fishing industry to possess perch of smaller size and weight.

He claimed that enforcement bears no reasonable or just relation to the purpose for which it was enacted—conservation of the perch population. The petition stated that such classification was arbitrary and without factual basis, because:

1. The physiognomy of the perch population of Saginaw Bay has changed in that the perch develop in girth rather than in length;

2. The perch reach maturity prior to attaining a length of 8½ inches in the round;

3. Saginaw Bay is so heavily populated by perch that the taking of fish of less than 8½ inches in the round would not seriously deplete the bay's perch population;

4. Saginaw Bay is so heavily populated by perch that conservation goals would be furthered by granting the relief, in that it would foster development of small perch and other types of fish in the bay by increasing the per capita food supply.

Aikens claims that fishermen will be "irreparably damaged" in that they will be unable to pursue their means of livelihood; they will be forced out of their business; they will be unable to retain their employees, and will have lost the opportunity afforded by a favorable market which is subject to the seasons, the taste of the consuming public and whims of the nature of perch.

A hearing on a request from

commercial fishermen to lower the legal limit on perch was held two weeks ago before representatives of the department at the Federal Building. At present, the law requires perch fishermen to use gill (See HEARING, page 8.)

Tawas City Project 'Scratched' from List

Michigan State Highway Department has been forced to scratch from scheduled bid-taking September 1 four major roadbuilding projects including widening, resurfacing and improving US-23 in Tawas City.

Howard E. Hill, highway director, has announced that the projects had been approved by the United States Bureau of Public Roads but fund authorizations cannot be released because Pres. Lyndon Johnson has not yet signed necessary appropriations bills.

No official word has been received here that Tawas City has been "scratched" from the bid list, according to Supt. of Public Works, Reginald Bublitz.

The city superintendent said that the federal government had appropriated additional funds for road construction this week and understands that another bid list is to be published at the end of September.

"Had the lack of funds been serious enough to cause a long delay, I feel the city would have received official notification promptly from the department that construction here was not included in fall bid letting," said Bublitz.

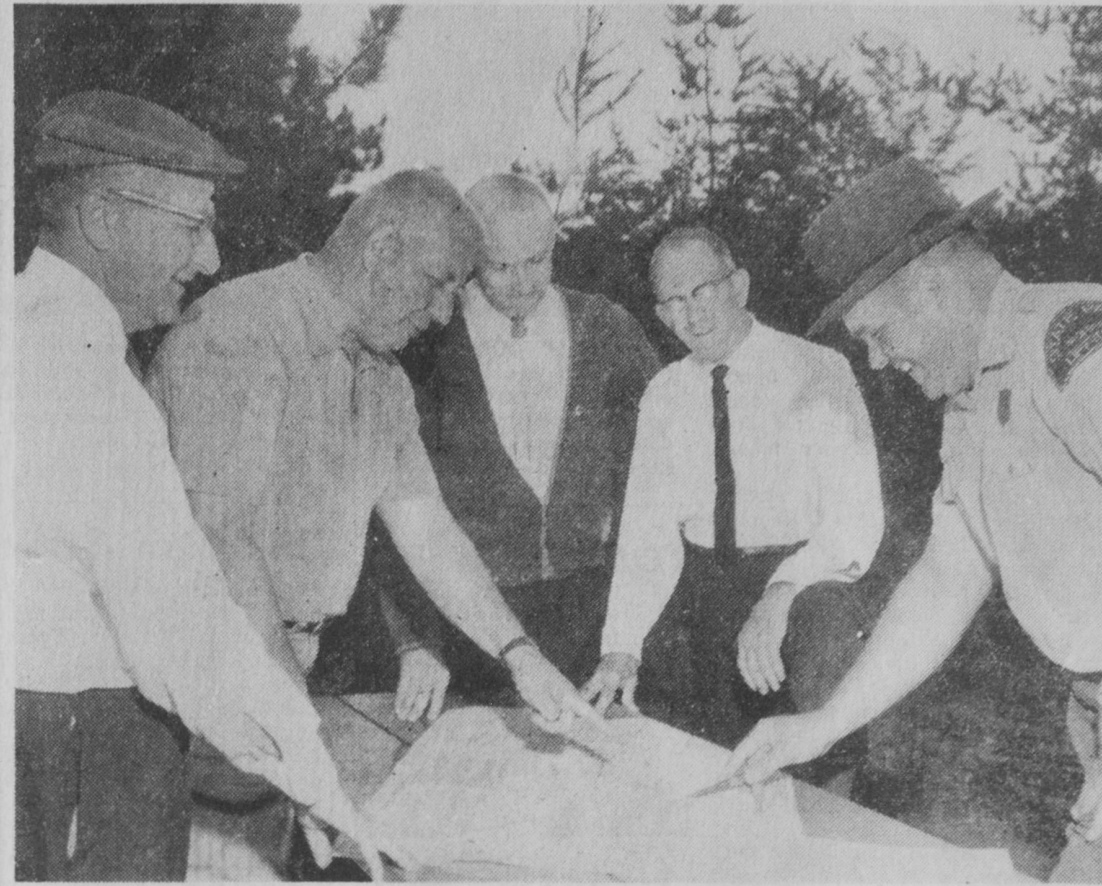

Legislators Gain Insight on State Budget Expenditures

A three-member subcommittee of the Michigan House of Representatives' ways and means committee was here last Thursday on a tour of Northern Michigan.

The subcommittee, which wrote

and approved a \$27,000,000 appropriation last year for the Michigan Department of Conservation, made the tour in order to get a first-hand look at how the money was actually expended.

"This is actually a tour for learning," said Chairman Russell Hellman, Dollar Bay Democrat.

"Because of the many changes made by voters in the house of representatives last fall, there are many new committee members who have no acquaintance with the actual problems of state government in the field.

"Through this tour, we are trying to come up with an honest, intelligent bill for next year's appropriation, which will allow the conservation department to operate efficiently and still prevent a waste of tax dollars.

"Actually, it should mean that the state should get a greater return for the money spent," said Hellman. "We are learning first hand just what the budget money is doing for conservation."

Included in the tour was a stop at the new Tawas Point State Park which is still under construction. Other stops were made at Roscommon, Houghton Lake, Grayling, Higgins Lake, Mio, Pinconning and Bay City.

Accompanying Hellman were Charles O. Conrad, Jackson Democrat, and Cyril Root, Kalamazoo Republican.

The tour is being made at the

legislators' own expense and their families accompanied them. Conrad has visited the past six weeks visiting state parks throughout Northern Michigan.

Growers in a 'Pickle' Over Want of Pickers

Isoco and Arenac pickle growers have found themselves in a bind—much of the 1965 crop is still on the vine for lack of pickers.

Growers are complaining that a federal ruling which stopped the use of Mexican Nationals in the pickle fields is the cause of all their trouble.

With their Mexican laborers ruled out of the fields, ostensibly as a means to promote utilization of the unemployed labor force, pickle growers are unhappy with field hands brought here from other parts of the country.

And, apparently, the majority of laborers coming from other states were unhappy with work in pickle fields here—of the 232-member force signed up for the season at Turner, only 82 men are left to work 300 acres.

One Isoco pickle grower, Edwin Peterson of Alabaster Township, returned his last five pickers to the "pool" Monday—they headed back to Kentucky, disillusioned be-

cause they had to pay their own bus fare home.

Peterson said that workers had been guaranteed a minimum hourly wage of \$1.25 by the company which purchases his pickles. But, the majority of field hands just refused to work.

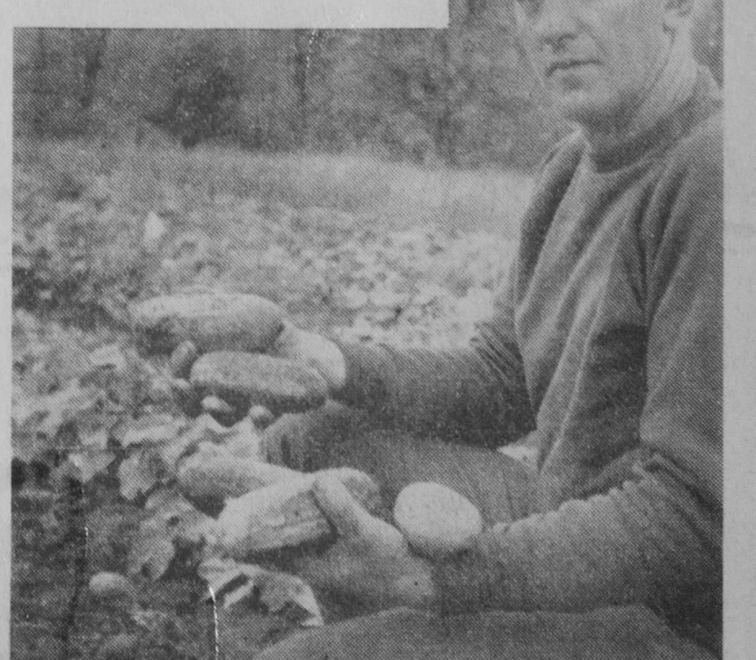
Picking pickles is back-breaking labor and most decided they could find easier work. The Kentuckians were unhappy with the cold, wet weather in this area, too.

Some laborers from Texas worked out very well in hoeing fields earlier in the season, according to Peterson, but he has been unable to obtain their services in picking.

As an experiment, students from the Bay City and Saginaw area were brought to the area to work in the pickle fields.

"Some of the youngsters were willing to work, but the majority refused to set foot in the field after they arrived by bus—they feinted (See PICKLES, page 7.)

Walter Moeller Retires from D&M

When Walter H. Moeller stepped down from the cab of a diesel locomotive last Friday at Bay City, closing his railroad career of 47 years and 10 months, it also marked the last time the Moeller name would be listed on a payroll of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

There have been Moellers on the engineer's side of the D&M locomotives since long before the turn of the century. Ernest L. Moeller Sr. started with the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad, forerunner of the D&M, and retired in 1908.

His two sons, Edward and Walter, both followed in his footsteps. Edward retired in 1957 after long service on the road.

Walter started with the D&M in October 1917 as a machinist's helper. He was more interested in the operational end of the railroad and transferred to firing a steam locomotive in November 1917.

In February 1919, Walter left the D&M and went to work with the old Erie and Michigan Railway and Navigation Company, which hauled gypsum rock between Ala-

baster and Tawas. He served as fireman until 1928 when he became engineer on locomotive No. 8. He worked on that short line road until it ceased operations in November 1948.

Moeller then transferred back to the D&M and had been employed as a diesel fireman and engineer for the past 17 years.

Most of his service has been on a switch engine in the North Bay City Yards and he and his wife, Florence, have made their home at Bay City for the past nine years.

Moeller was born in Tawas City August 6, 1900, and he attended school here. He played independent baseball here for 15 years and still is quite a fan of the game.

About the only "exciting" thing he can recall during his railroad career was the time when he was firing for the late Charles A. Bigelow on the old E&M. Six cars loaded with rock uncoupled from a string of cars, rolled down a hill at Alabaster, jumped a gravel road and plowed into the post office.

school. After the first week, rate for high school will be 30 cents per day and 25 cents daily for elementary students.

Kindergartners are not to report for school on September 7, but will start classes on Wednesday, reports Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal.

Bus routes, as published last week, are essentially the same as last year.

All families moving into Tawas Area School District are urged to contact the school immediately so provisions may be made for them, both in classrooms and for transportation. Elementary students are to report to the elementary office on Newman Street and high school students register at the building on M-55.

The only 8 o'clock class in high school this year is a two-hour auto mechanics class with Robert Reasner as instructor.

Package pictures are to be taken September 9 at the Tawas City Elementary Unit and the high school. Students in the East Tawas Elementary Unit are to be photographed on September 10.

Estimated enrollment figures indicate that there will be about 682 students attending classes in the high school building. A breakdown of the total as of Monday revealed that 116 seniors had registered, there are 136 students in the 11th grade, the 10th grade totals 135 and there are 145 freshmen for a grand total of 532 students in high school.

In addition, eighth grade classes in the high school building will number some 150 students.

Enrollment figures for elementary grades were not available Monday. Miss Bolen said that an accurate count could not be given until after the start of school because of new students expected from parochial schools.

She said, however, that pre-school registration indicated an enrollment of 140 pupils in kindergarten, as compared to 160 last year.

Most Isoco Residents To be Affected by New SS Changes

Most Isoco County residents will be affected in some way by one or more of the changes made in the social security law by congress this year, Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, announced this week.

The one change that will affect all beneficiaries who now get monthly retirement, survivor or disability payments is the seven percent increase in the benefit rate.

Monthly payments which previously ranged from \$40 to \$127 a month, will now be \$44 to \$135.90 each month. The increase will be effective with January 1965. In September, beneficiaries will get an extra check for the difference between the old and new rates for January through August, Mr. Ellifritz added.

Another important change will affect nearly everybody 65 or over. A new program of health insurance for the aged was established. There are two parts to this program, one a basic plan of hospital insurance and the second a supplemental medical plan covering physicians' and surgeons' fees as well as other costs. Enrollments will begin in September and continue through March 31, 1966. All age 65 beneficiaries will be contacted by mail and need not call at the district office, Mr. Ellifritz stressed. All other workers 65 or over who have not filed an application for social security benefits should do so without delay.

A social security representative for this area will be at the Isoco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, September 9, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

illness and had all kinds of excuses," said Peterson.

He said that some of the youngsters chased his cattle out of the barnyard, climbed his silo and even threw glass in front of the tires of an automobile driven by a labor department representative. Others kicked pickles all over the field.

"Nothing can replace the experienced Mexican Nationals for work of this type," said Peterson. "Pickles must be handled with care and they know what is expected of them."

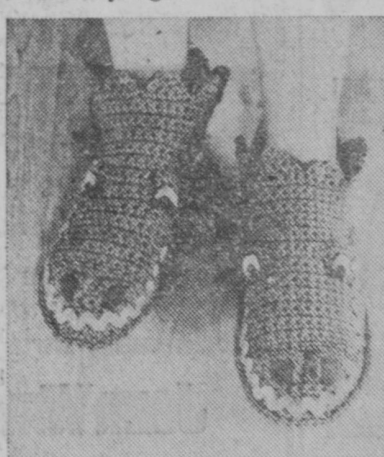
Peterson planted 20 acres pickles. He expected a return about \$150 an acre from his crop but said he would be lucky if would net \$500.

"After the first picking by family living near AuGres, a majority of the crop was left on the vines—there is no market for late pickles, they must be picked eye three or four days and vines drained if they are not picked the proper time," he said.

"The pickle company wants to plant twice as many pickles next year, but I just do not know what to do about getting them picked," said Peterson.

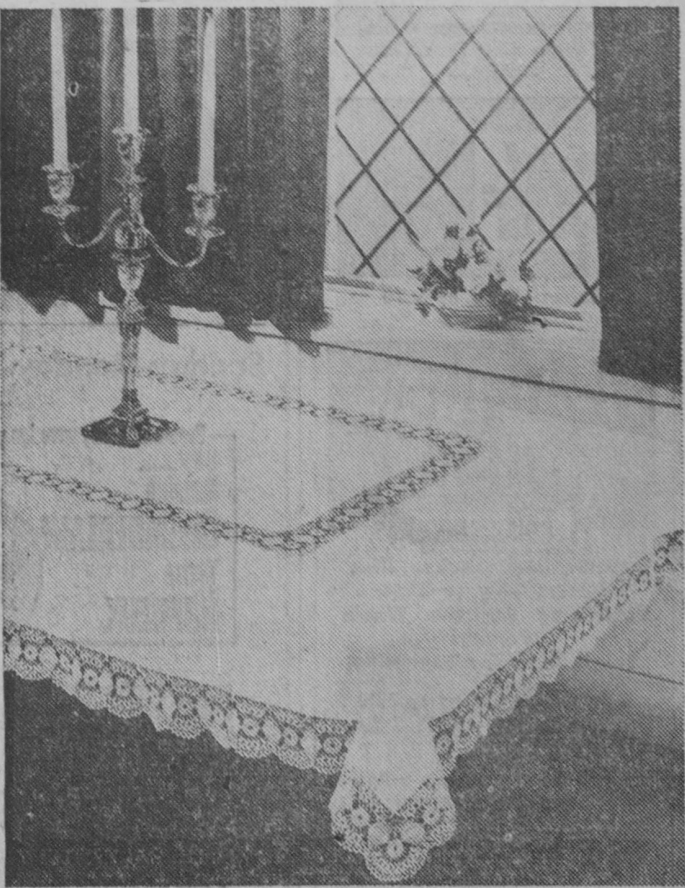

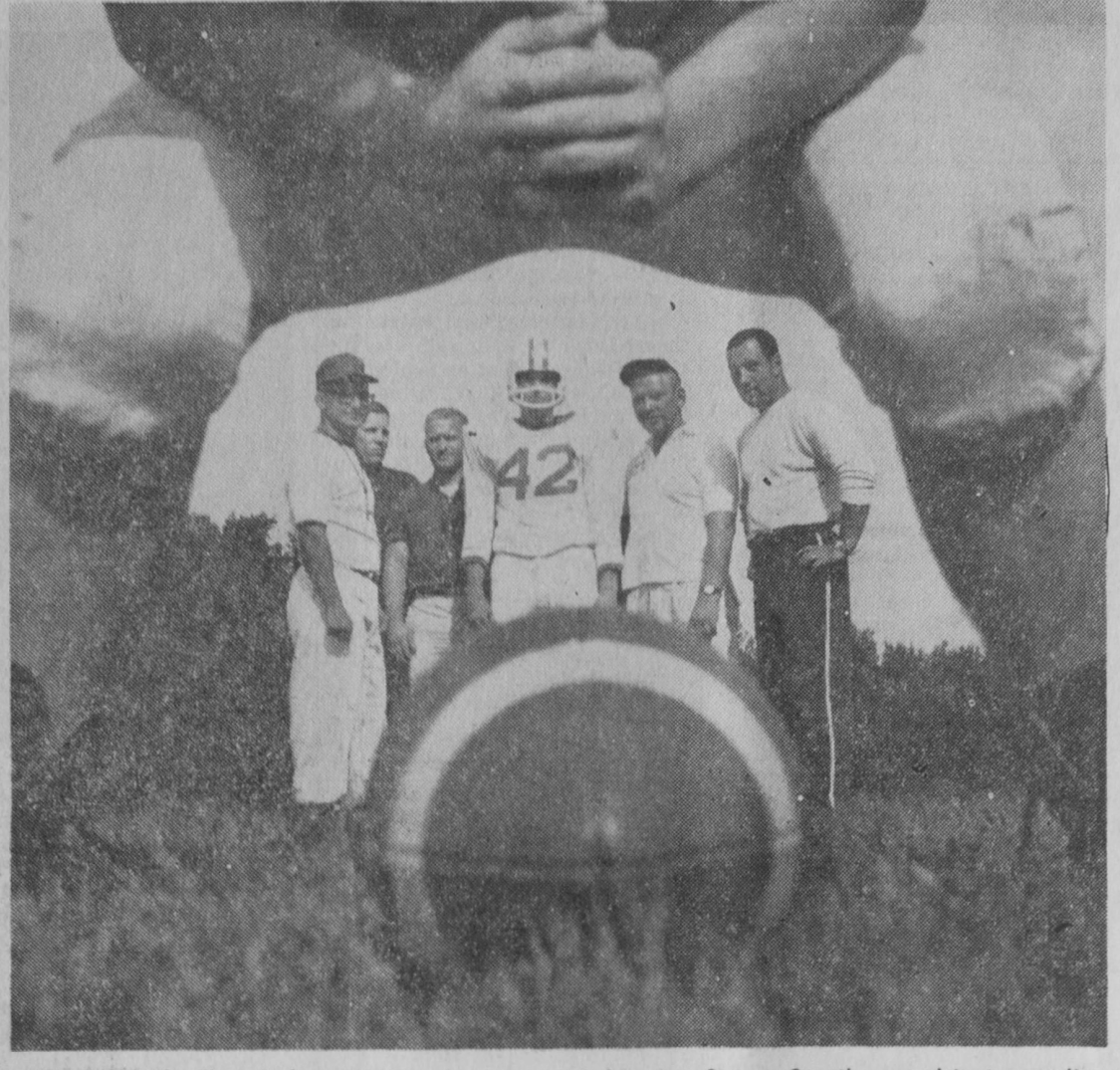

Bike Racers to Compete in Olympic Style

Third annual tour of Lumbermen's Monument Bike Races will be held in the Tawas area Friday, Saturday and Sunday, September 10, 11 and 12. These bike races are sanctioned by the Amateur Bicycle League of America, promoted by the Wolverine Sports Club and sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Representatives of the Bicycle League and the Bicycle Institute of America claim that this race is one of the fastest growing events in America and the week-end schedule offers bike riders one of the few three-day events in the country.

Chamber officials are expecting racers, racing officials and families to total nearly 200 persons to be in the Tawas area for the week-end following Labor Day.
