

Grand total of expenses listed under the 1966-1967 budget was \$672,535, as compared to \$619,825 for the current year. Total receipts during 1965-1966 amounted to \$614,242 or \$10,408 lower than revenue anticipated for 1966-1967. Superintendent Mick estimated the school district's valuation at \$27,327,979. With an allocation of nine mills, this would bring \$247,-500, as compared to \$245,951 last

Under the nine-mill allocation, Tawas Area would have deficit spending of \$47,885. Should the legislative bill be adopted, requiring a 10-mill allocation, the school would receive an additional \$35,-000 but would still show a deficit between revenue and expendi-


A special invitation is extended by Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Trinklein, owners, to all area boat owners and water sports enthusiasts to attend the grand opening.



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

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

mutuel tracks of Northville Downs, Hazel Park and Detroit Race Track. He also has two starting gates which work between 18 and 20 county fairs each year, including the Iosco County Fair, which accounts for another 70 days and nights of racing.

Normally, he would be at Northville Downs at this time of the year operating his starting gate for 25 spring racing dates. A strike of track employees seeking pay raises has closed the track and appeared last week as though Northville would not be open for the spring season.

McIlmurray's four starting gates are stored at the fairgrounds in Hale while awaiting a break in negotiations.

These are expensive rigs. The hydraulically - operated gates, which allow a controlled running start in harness racing, are mounted on the rear decks of highpowered convertible automobiles. One man drives the car and the gate operator sits on a perch overlooking the field of horses. He uses a public address system to "talk" the sulky drivers into their proper position and, when satisfied that the horses will move across the starting line properly, the car speeds ahead of the field and arms of the starting gate fold away

At parimutuel tracks, the starting gate operator has constant communication with the judges' stand through two-way radios. McIlmurray expects that strike negotiations will be completed soon and he will be back at Michigan race tracks guiding sleek horses and sulkies into position for the enjoyment of thousands of racing fans.
