

# D&M Employees on Rail Excursion

More than 500 past and present employees of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company are to board special passenger trains Saturday morning at Tawas and Alpena for an excursion and picnic at Harrisville.

This will mark the third time since passenger service was discontinued in 1952 that the D&M has operated special "varnish" runs. It is the first company picnic in recent history and will undoubtedly provide the first train ride for many children of employees.

"We have had to restrict participation in this special excursion to immediate families of employees or retirees and those boarding trains will have to show special passes provided for the trip," states C. R. McMullen, secretary-treasurer of the D&M, who has responsibility for arrangements.

Employees from Tawas south to Bay City are to leave the Tawas station at 11:15 a. m., while the Alpena special carrying passengers from Cheboygan south, is to leave Alpena at 11:00 a. m. The north-bound train will stop at Osceola for passengers and the south-bound train will stop at Ossineke.

A chicken barbecue has been arranged by the Harrisville Lions Club. No program has been arranged for the afternoon but employees will have the opportunity to renew old acquaintances. Both specials are to leave Harrisville at 3:00 p. m.

Eight coaches from the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad have been leased for the specials. As of Monday, 507 persons had answered invitations from the company, 171 from Alpena and 336 for the trip starting at Tawas.

The coaches are coming from Huntington, West Virginia; Chicago, Illinois, and Detroit, after recent service during the airline strike.

Last special excursion trains operated by the D&M were in 1962 during the East Tawas centennial.

## Col. Bowley New CO of 40th Air Div.

Col. Albert J. Bowley arrived at Wurtsmith August 14 to assume command of the 40th air division, replacing Brig. Gen. John A. Roberts, who has commanded the 40th since July 1963.

General Roberts is scheduled to retire from active duty the end of this month with over 29 years of service to his country. He entered the military in October 1937.

Colonel Bowley comes to the 40th air division from the office of the Vice Chief of Staff, USAF, Washington, D. C., where he has been since 1963.

The colonel was graduated from West Point in June 1943 and flew B-17 bombers in the European theater during World War II.

No newcomer to the Strategic Air Command, Colonel Bowley has flown B-29, B-50 and B-47 aircraft with SAC and from 1959 to 1961, he served as director of operations for SAC's third air division on Guam.

A native of Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, the colonel is married to the former Marjorie Marchand of Cornwall, New York. The Bowleys have two children, Robin Mills, 17, and Albert J. Jr., 14. Robin is scheduled to enter Briarcliffe College, New York, this fall and John will attend school in Osceola.

## County Ordinance Controls Septic Tanks

An ordinance adopted by the Iosco Board of Supervisors Wednesday establishes controls for the installation of septic tanks in townships.

The new ordinance requires that before any septic tank be installed, the owner is to notify the township supervisor.

It requires that a minimum of 50 feet be maintained as an isolation distance between water walls and sewage disposal systems in private homes; 75 feet isolation distance for public and semipublic places.

Failure to comply with the ordinance would constitute a misdemeanor.

## Opening Plans for W-P Area Told by Kesler

Opening plans for Whittemore-Prescott Schools for the 1966-67 school year were announced this week by Supt. Ray Kesler. Registration of high school students is according to the following schedule:

Seniors, Monday, August 29; juniors, Tuesday, August 30; sophomores, Wednesday, August 31; freshmen, Thursday, September 1; seventh and eighth grades, Friday, September 2.

Hours for registration days are 9:00 a. m. to 2:00 p. m.

Students will be expected to pay their book fees, locker fees and get their locker assignment at this time. Special counselors will be on hand to assist them with the completion of registration which they started last spring. Parents are invited to attend with their children for registration. All students are urged to register on their assigned days.

Teachers will report for a pre-school conference Tuesday, September 6, and half-day sessions will be held the morning of Wednesday, September 7, with full-day sessions Thursday and Friday. The cafeteria will be open on these days. The teaching staff is expected to be completed before school opens. An English position still remains to be filled.

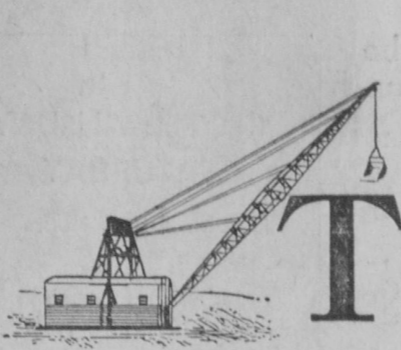
Bus routes will operate on the same schedule as last year and changes will be made during the first week to allow for new families. Parents are asked to cooperate during this transition period by notifying the school of where they live.

School lunches have been changed with the high school prices staying at five lunches for \$1.50 when purchased and used during the week. Single meals will be increased to 35 cents. At the elementary level, the price will stay at five lunches for \$1.25 when purchased and used during the week. Single meal prices have increased to 30 cents per lunch. Price change is due to the increased cost of food.

Textbook fees and workbook purchases along with locker fees have not changed. An extensive renewal program has taken place in all schools. Parents will be mailed a detailed account of school opening and a school calendar before the opening of school.

## Supervisors Reject Move to Resubmit Co. Millage

A resolution which would have asked Iosco County voters to approve a one-mill tax levy for two years, a measure defeated earlier this month in the primary election, was flatly turned down Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

The millage proposal, intended to help Iosco cope with serious financial woes expected over the next two years, was proposed by Supervisor Percy Jocks of AuSable Township and supported by Supervisor Charles Smith of Osceola. The latter's township, with Tawas City's Second Ward, were the only precincts favoring the millage in the August 2 election.

A roll call vote saw the proposition being defeated, 12-4. Yes votes were cast by Jocks, Richter Lixey, Earl McElheron and Smith. Voting no were Aubrey Belsion, James Campbell, Clarence Everett, Edward Gerard, Lloyd Little, Richard Moss, Edward Nelkie, Henry Oates, Harvey Odell, Charles Schreck, Clement Stephan and George Webb.

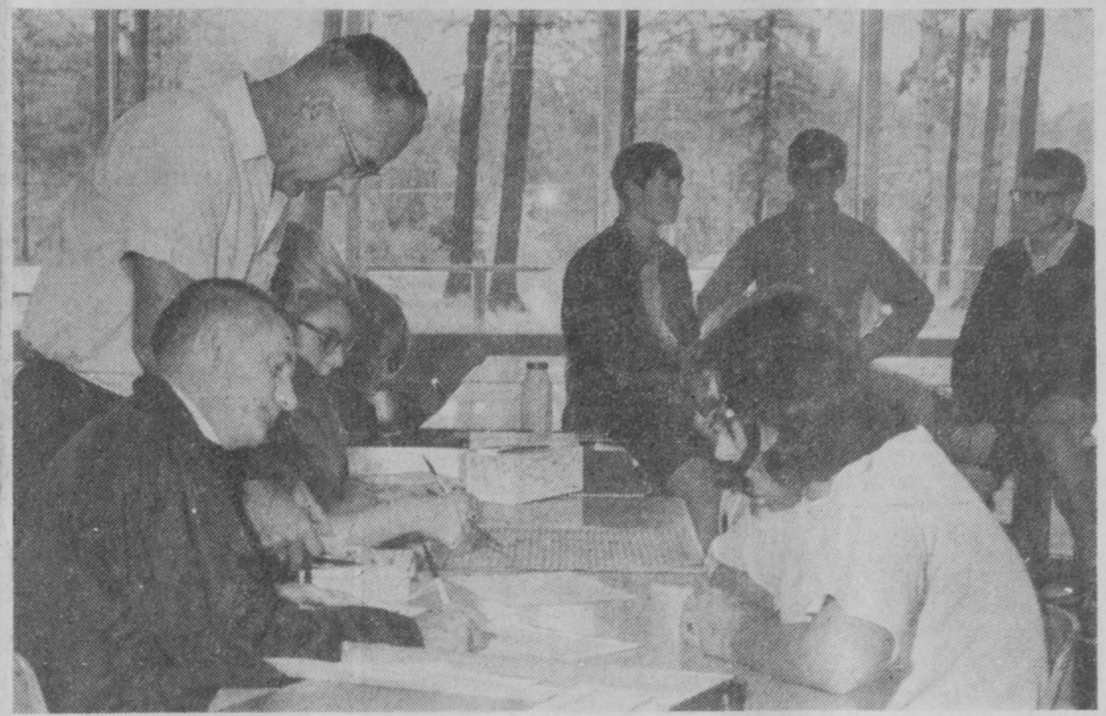
During discussion on the question, supervisors believed that the proposition, if offered again, probably would be turned down by the electorate and result in spending approximately \$3,000 for nothing. It was felt, generally, that the county should continue to operate "close to the belt" and, if the general fund ended fiscal 1967 with a deficit, taxpayers would have a better understanding of the financial problems.

Henry Oates, chairman of the finance committee, said that a complete review had been made of fees charged in the various county offices for services. It was found that no help could be found as the fee schedule was set by the state and no additional money could be received.

Several other measures intended to raise extra money for county operation were discussed, including a possible increase in the \$1 dog license fee, charging county and township units for tax roll work.

Another possibility was charging cities and townships for ballots used in the recent primary election.

The board endorsed a resolution from the Osceola Knights of Columbus favoring a house resolution allowing charitable bingo.

## Make Plans for TA Junior High Wing Delay

With the opening of school on September 6 and completion of a five-room junior high wing not expected by that date, Tawas Area School administrators are making plans to hold seventh and eighth grade classes in temporary quarters at the high school.

Prin. Ernest W. Jordan Jr. told board of education members Monday night that two possible avenues to a solution were open: 1. Continue class schedules as last year with one section at the Tawas City Elementary Unit and one at the high school; 2. Bring the entire junior high school to the high school building and make use of temporary classrooms for a period of two or three weeks.

He was of the opinion that the latter move would cause less disruption to scheduling in the long run and received the board's approval in adopting a temporary schedule. The first possibility would have required considerable shuffling of teachers between the two buildings. Another point against it was the schedule of 35-minute classes in the elementary unit and 55-minute classes at the high school.

As a result of this action, some seventh and eighth grade classes will be held in the library, high school classrooms when not in use, stage and balcony of the auditorium and the girl's locker room.

Ceilings are being completed this week in the junior high wing. It is expected that the remaining work will move along rapidly.

## Preliminary Shop Plans Get Board Study Sept. 12

Preliminary plans for Tawas Area School's new shop building, art room and renovation of former shop rooms into classrooms are to be presented for study at the September 12 meeting of the board of education.

Peter Brysselbout and Irvin Hacker, members of a Bay City architectural firm which has designed recent school additions here, were present at Monday night's board meeting to discuss preliminary plans on construction.

Voters of the district approved a special levy of two mills for two years to finance the project. This was a continuation of the five-year pay-as-you-go program of school construction, which was to have expired this year. The third mill under the proposal approved July 29 goes for operation.

Because of rapidly increasing costs in construction, the 6,900-foot addition will be a combination of masonry and steel. Hacker said that plans would be designed with economy in mind, but emphasized that steel and masonry construction would well serve functions of a shop.

With transfer of state aid money, up to five percent provided by law, \$91,000 would be made available next year for construction. An additional \$57,000 would be made available in 1968.

The shop building would contain restrooms at the extreme south end for the use of spectators at attending events at the athletic field.

Captain Alexander will furnish information concerning the air force academy to students and counselors in high schools located in the following Michigan counties: Iosco, Alcona, Alpena, Montcalm and Osceola.

The new liaison officer will visit the high schools and will advise students on how to prepare for the academy's entrance requirements and its program of education. He will assist highly qualified students to apply for an academy nomination the year previous to desired admission.

While on active duty with the air force, Captain Alexander instructed radar, navigation and electronics in USAF Observer Schools from 1953 to 1956.

A graduate of Michigan State University, he is a mathematics teacher in Tawas Area Schools.

## For 1966-67 School Year

# Name Successful Bidders

Contracts for furnishing supplies for the coming school year, plus conversion of the high school's heating unit to natural gas, were adopted Monday night by the board of education. Contracts went to low bidders in all instances.

Barbier Gas and Oil received the contract for furnishing approximately 33,000 gallons of gasoline with its bid of .1282 cents per gallon. The other bid came from Ammond-Resteiner Oil Company, 1371 cents.

Osceola Refineries' bid of .0884 cents on No. 5 fuel oil and .0814 cents on No. 6 was accepted. This compared to .0899 and .08494 entered by Barbier and .0965 and .0865 entered by Leonard Refinery.

Michigan Bakery was awarded the contract for furnishing baked goods with a bid of 17 1/2 cents per loaf of bread and 26 cents per dozen for hamburger buns and hot

dog buns. Gase Baking Company had entered a bid of 18 cents for bread and 28 cents for the buns.

Nelkie Dairy received the contract for furnishing milk at 5.8 cents per one-half pint, ice cream bars at 94 cents per dozen and cottage cheese at 17 cents per pound. McDonald Dairy had entered a bid of 6.3 cents per one-half pint of milk, 23 cents per pound of cottage cheese in one-pound containers, 22 1/2 cents per pound of cottage cheese in five-pound containers, and 6.10 cents per half-pint of milk in plastic cartons.

Conversion of the heating unit at the high school from fuel oil to natural gas went to Joseph Day of Bay City. Day's base bid of \$3,385 for converting the unit and \$545 for a standby unit to burn fuel oil was accepted. This compared to \$3,589 entered by Northern Plumbing and Heating.

In other business, the board approved expenditures of \$1,495 as a continuation of a three-year program to purchase band instruments.

Bus drivers were given a salary increase of \$20 per month, while those making kindergarten runs received a \$10 per month increase. The school had been paying \$140 per month for drivers with runs up to 50 miles per day, \$150 for 50-100 miles, \$160 for the one run into Sherman Township and \$72.50 for kindergarten runs.

A \$500 annual increase was granted to school custodians, who had been receiving an annual salary of \$4,500.

The board authorized adoption of a program which will allow participation by parochial schools in a three-day-a-week program of physical education. St. Joseph School requested this program and other parochial schools are expected to participate.

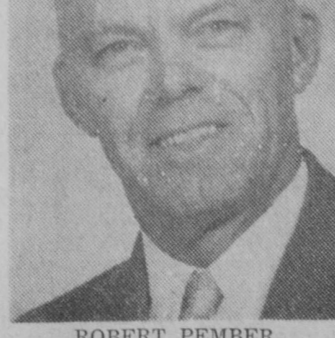
### Pember Heads Iosco Democrats

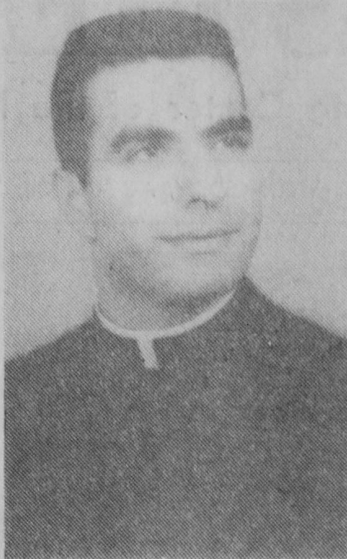

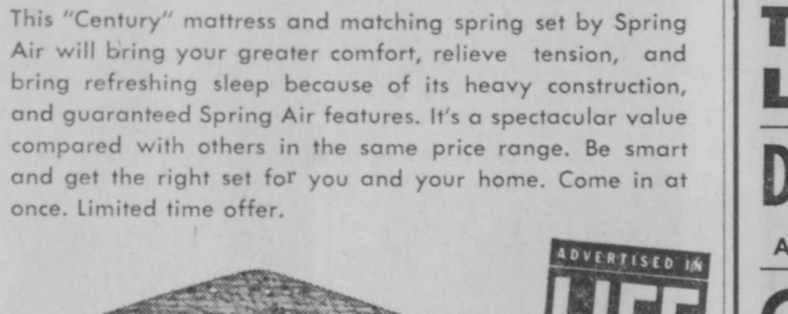

## Iosco Has 15 Herds Under DHIA Testing

Duane Reinke, Iosco DHIA supervisor, states that there are 15 dairy herds in Iosco County on the dairy testing program. Two of them use the official testing program that provides more detailed information than the owner-sampler program. In the owner-sampler program, the farmer collects his own samples. In the official DHIA program, the dairy tester is paid an additional fee for collecting the samples.

Waldo Curry has 95 percent of his cows participating in the official testing program and shows a monthly output of 1,318 pounds milk and 47 pounds butterfat. Harvey Odell has 86 percent of his cows recorded in the official testing program and has totaled 950 pounds milk and 31 pounds butterfat.

Results for the farmer sampled herds are as follows:

Eugene Kaiser, 100 percent, 1,486 pounds milk, 55 pounds butterfat; Nelson Ostrander, 95 percent, 1,151 pounds milk, 38 pounds butterfat; Hope Creek Ranch, 95 percent, 1,063 pounds milk, 35 pounds butterfat; Siegrist Brothers, 89 percent, 1,057 pounds milk, 40 pounds butterfat; Charles Timreck III, 87 percent; 934 pounds milk,

30 pounds butterfat; Herman Drenberg, 85 percent, 1,243 pounds milk, 43 pounds butterfat; Elwood Ruckle, 83 percent, 1,016 pounds milk, 35 pounds butterfat; Dornace Bellville, 80 percent, 1,013 pounds milk, 35 pounds butterfat; Lester Robinson, 72 percent, 990 pounds milk, 36 pounds butterfat; James Dobson, 64 percent, 673 pounds milk, 22 pounds butterfat; Carl A. Lange, 62 percent, 631 pounds milk, 22 pounds butterfat; Thomas Nelkie, 62 percent, 742 pounds milk, 23 pounds butterfat; Charles Sullivan, 54 percent, 635 pounds milk, 21 pounds butterfat.

## Veterans May Speed Up GI Bill Processing

Veterans who plan to attend school under the new GI bill can speed up the processing of a certificate of approval if they will attach a copy of their service separation form, DD 214, to their application. R. M. Fitzgerald, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office, Detroit, stated that this form is required to determine the amount of training time a veteran is entitled to receive and is necessary to the processing of an application.

Mr. Fitzgerald further stated that veterans with dependents can save themselves much inconvenience and needless adjustments in monthly payments of training allowance if they will submit marriage certificates and birth certi-

icates of children with their initial application form.

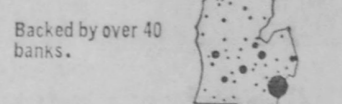

AN ORDINANCE to create zoning districts and provisions governing Wilber Township, Iosco County, Michigan, and to provide for amendments, nonconforming uses, a Zoning Board of Appeals, and the administration of this Ordinance.

WHEREAS Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan, as amended, provides that the township board of any organized township in the State of Michigan may establish zoning districts to protect the health, security, morals, and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Township.

NOW THEREFORE, the Township Board of Wilber Township, ordains:

## ARTICLE ONE—PREAMBLE SECTION 1.01 PURPOSE

The primary purposes of this Ordinance shall be:  
—to promote the use and conservation of the lands and resources of the Township in conformity with their character and adaptability;  
—to promote the orderly development of the Township;  
—to protect and stabilize property values;  
—to create safe and desirable conditions for living, economic progress, recreation, and other activities in the Township;  
—to facilitate the development of adequate systems of transportation, fire protection, education, waste disposal, safe and adequate water supplies, and other public requirements;  
—to conserve the use of funds for public services, roads, and other improvements to conform with the most advantageous use of the lands and resources of the Township.

## SECTION 1.02 LIMITATION OF ORDINANCE

1.02-A Continued Existing Uses of Land, Buildings and Structures  
At the discretion of the owner, the lawful use of any dwelling, building, or structure, and of any land or premises as existing and lawful at the time of enactment of this Ordinance, may be continued even though such use may not conform with the provisions of this Ordinance.

## 1.02-B Exemption of Accessory Farm Buildings and Structures

The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the construction of repair of any accessory farm building or structure erected and used for customary agricultural pursuits in the Township, such as barns, sheds, fences and other necessary structures. Provided, that no building or structure other than open fences through which there shall be clear vision shall be erected less than Forty (40) feet from the Right of Way of any abutting public road or highway, and not less than Twenty-Five (25) feet from any interior property line.

## ARTICLE TWO—ZONING DISTRICTS

### SECTION 2.01 DISTRICTS

To accomplish the purposes set forth in the Preamble, Wilber Township is hereby divided into the following Zoning Districts:

2.01-A Agricultural-Residential, A-R, which shall include

2.01-B Recreational - Forestry, R-F, which shall include

2.01-C Commercial, C, which shall include

2.01-D Industrial, I, which shall include

(Note: See accompanying map SECTION 2.02 INTERPRETATION OF DISTRICT BOUNDARIES)

All questions concerning the exact location of boundary lines shall be determined by the Zoning Board of Appeals consistent with the purpose of this Ordinance. Unless otherwise indicated, boundary lines shall be interpreted as following along section lines or customary divisions of sections, such as either quarter or eighths or centerlines of public roads and highways; or the shorelines of water bodies; or the boundary lines of recorded plats or subdivisions.

## ARTICLE THREE—AGRICULTURAL - RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS, A-R

The following provisions shall apply to all Agricultural-Residential Districts, A-R:

### SECTION 3.01 PURPOSE

The purpose of establishing Agricultural-Residential Districts is to promote the proper use and conservation of the agricultural lands and resources of the Township, and to provide suitable and safe conditions for non-farm residential developments in the District. The Ordinance is designed to provide for the location of all dwellings hereafter erected on lots or premises adequate in size to insure safe water supplies and a safe system of sewage and waste disposal, reasonably spaced to diminish spread of fire, and set back from the public thoroughfare to facilitate safe exit from the entrance to the premises.

The requirements are intended to protect and stabilize the basic qualities of the District. Since other property uses are generally accepted as compatible and desir-

able with agricultural and residential developments, if properly integrated, the incorporation of such property uses is provided by Special Approval.

### SECTION 3.02 PROPERTY USES

The use and occupancy of all lands and premises, and the erection, use and occupancy of all buildings, shall hereafter be limited to the following, except as provided by Section 1.02, or may be subsequently provided by due amendment to the Ordinance.

#### 3.02-A Primary Uses

1 - Both general and specialized farming including livestock, truck, tree farms, forestry and nurseries.

2 - One-family and two-family dwellings.

3 - Roadside stands for the sale of locally produced products, provided, that parking facilities and entrance and exit to the site be approved in writing by the county road commission in the interest of public safety.

4 - Home occupations and professional offices.

5 - Churches and other buildings of a religious nature, including facilities incidental thereto.

6 - Public and private schools.

7 - Publicly-owned and operated libraries, buildings, parks and playgrounds.

8 - Occupied trailer coaches or mobile homes located outside of Trailer Coach Parks, subject to the provisions of Section 7.08.

#### 3.02-B Uses by Special Approval, as provided by Section 7.07

1 - Hospitals, clinics, sanitariums, convalescent homes and similar buildings and structures for human care.

2 - Multi-family homes.

3 - Animal hospitals, clinics, kennels and boarding.

4 - Home-operated enterprises, such as machine shops, auto repairing, wood-working shops, furniture making and refinishing, welding, sale and service of machinery.

5 - Trailer coach parks.

6 - Clubs, lodges, and similar social organizations.

#### 3.02-C Accessory Buildings and Uses

Accessory buildings, structures and uses customarily and clearly incidental to any primary or approved use.

#### SECTION 3.03 MINIMUM LAND OR LOT REQUIREMENTS: DWELLINGS

Every lot or premises upon which a one-family dwelling is hereafter erected or moved shall contain not less than Nine Thousand (9,000) square feet of area, and not less than Thirteen Thousand, Five Hundred (13,500) square feet for two-family dwellings. Such land shall be not less than Sixty (60) feet in width at the building line for one-family dwellings, and not less than Eighty (80) feet for two-family dwellings.

#### SECTION 3.04 MINIMUM YARD REQUIREMENTS

##### 3.04-A Setback

Every building hereafter erected shall be set back not less than Forty (40) feet from the right of way of any abutting public road or highway. Or front lot line as the case may be.

##### 3.04-B Side Yards: Dwellings

Every lot or premises upon which a dwelling is hereafter erected shall have open side yards on each not less than Ten (10) feet in width. In the event a lot on public record on the effective date of this Ordinance has a width less than required at the building site, each side yard may be reduced to not less than Twenty (20) percent of the required width, but not less than Four (4) feet.

##### 3.04-C Sideyards: Non-Dwellings

Every premises upon which a non-dwelling building or structure is hereafter erected shall have side yards on each side not less than Ten (10) feet in width.

#### SECTION 3.05 MINIMUM FLOOR AREA: DWELLINGS

Every dwelling hereafter erected shall provide not less than seven hundred and twenty (720) square feet of floor area per family on the first floor, exclusive of any area in an included or attached garage, open porch or other attached structure.

#### ARTICLE FOUR—RECREATIONAL - FORESTRY DISTRICTS, R-F

The following provisions shall apply to all Recreational-Forestry Districts, R-F:

### SECTION 4.01 PURPOSE

The primary purpose of establishing Recreational-Forestry Districts, R-F, is to promote the proper use, conservation and enjoyment of those water, land, topographic and vegetable resources of the Township peculiarly adapted to recreational use, and the proper use and conservation of the Township's lands best adapted to forest.

### SECTION 4.02 PROPERTY USES

The use and occupancy of all lands and premises, and the erection, use and occupancy of all buildings and structures shall hereafter be limited to the following, except as provided by Section 1.02, or as may be subsequently provided by due amendment to the Ordinance:

4.02-A Primary Uses

1 - One-family dwellings, cottages and cabins.

2 - Camps for recreational use, when not operated for profit.

3 - Hunting, fishing, trapping.

4 - Fire control structures and facilities.

5 - Parks and similar open-air facilities for outdoor recreation and exercise, when not operated for profit.

6 - Schools, churches and other buildings for religious purposes.

4.02-B Uses by Special Approval, as provided by Section 7.07

1 - Recreational camps, resorts, and clubs, when operated for profit.

2 - Retail stores and shops.

3 - Service enterprises.

4 - Public, private and commercial amusement enterprises.

5 - Trailer parks.

4.02-C Accessory buildings, structures and uses customarily and clearly incidental to any primary use, or approved use.

### SECTION 4.03 MINIMUM LAND OR LOT REQUIREMENTS

4.03-A Dwellings, Cottages and Cabins

Every dwelling or cottage hereafter erected or moved shall be located on a lot or premises containing not less than Six Thousand (6,000) square feet of area. Such premises shall be not less than Sixty (60) feet in width at the building line.

#### SECTION 4.04 MINIMUM YARD REQUIREMENTS

##### 4.04-A Setback

Every building hereafter erected shall be set back not less than Forty (40) feet from the Right of Way of any abutting public road or highway.

##### 4.04-B Sideyards

Every lot or premises upon which a building is hereafter erected shall have side yards on each side not less than Six (6) feet in width. In the event a lot on public record on the effective date of this Ordinance has a width less than required at the building site, each side yard may be reduced to Twenty (20) percent of the required width, but not less than two feet.

#### SECTION 4.05 MINIMUM FLOOR AREA

4.05-A Dwellings and Cottages

Every dwelling and cottage hereafter erected shall provide not less than Five Hundred and Seventy Six (576) square feet of floor area on the first floor, exclusive of any area in an included or attached garage, open porch or other attached structure.

#### ARTICLE FIVE—COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS, C

The following provisions shall apply to all Commercial Districts, C:

### SECTION 5.01 PURPOSE

The primary purpose of Commercial Districts, C, is to provide areas suitable for retail and wholesale business activities, and for professional and other services commonly associated with commercial districts. As in other districts, provision is also made for other enterprises by Special Approval.

### SECTION 5.02 PROPERTY USES

The use and occupancy of all lands and premises, and the erection, use and occupancy of all buildings and structures hereafter erected shall be limited to the following, except as provided by Section 1.02, and as may be subsequently provided by due amendment to the Ordinance:

5.02-A Primary Uses

1 - Retail stores and shops offering chiefly new merchandise.

2 - Business and personal service establishments, such as beauty parlors, barber shops, dry-cleaning, radio and TV sales and service, and similar commercial enterprises.

3 - Restaurants but not including drive-ins.

4 - Professional offices of doctors, lawyers, dentists, chiropractors, osteopaths and similar or allied professions.

5 - Motor vehicle sales and service, gasoline stations, farm machinery sales and service.

6 - Publicly-owned buildings and publicly utility buildings.

7 - Wood working shops and machine shops including welding.

8 - Commercial recreational enterprises.

5.02-B Uses by Special Approval, as provided by Section 7.07

1 - Used-car lots.

2 - Trailer coach parks.

3 - Junkyards.

4 - Parking lots.

5 - Storage yards.

6 - Manufacturing enterprises.

5.02-C Accessory Uses

Accessory uses, buildings and structures customarily incidental to any primary or approved use.

### SECTION 5.03 SETBACK

All buildings hereafter erected shall be setback not less than twenty (20) feet from the Right of Way line of the public road or highway. Buildings erected near any intersection of State or County Highways shall be setback not less than Forty (40) feet from the centerline of each thoroughfare.

#### ARTICLE SIX—INDUSTRIAL DISTRICTS, I

We welcome Industry and will zone to their benefit.

#### ARTICLE SEVEN—SUPPLEMENT PROVISIONS

### SECTION 7.01 SCOPE OF ORDINANCE

Except as provided by Section 1.02, no building or structure, or part thereof, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, shall hereafter be erected, altered or maintained, and no new use or change shall be made or maintained of any building, structure or land, or part thereof, except in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance.

### SECTION 7.02 NONCONFORMING USES AND BUILDINGS

7.02-A Nonconforming Uses

Any nonconforming use of land or buildings which is discontinued through vacancy, lack of operations or otherwise for a period of six (6) or more months shall be construed as abandonment of use, following which the use thereof shall conform to this Ordinance.

7.02-B Nonconforming Buildings

Any nonconforming buildings, the use of which is discontinued for a period of Twelve (12) or more months shall be construed as abandoned, following which no further use shall maintain until such building has been brought into conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance.

7.02-C Extension of Nonconforming Use

Extension of a nonconforming use throughout a building, or into or throughout a parcel of land not fully occupied by such nonconforming use may be granted by the Zoning Board. Provided that, in all such cases, the proposed extension will not be in accord with any provision of Section 1.01, then such application shall be denied.

7.02-D Change of Nonconforming Use

No nonconforming use shall be changed to other than a conforming use, nor shall any nonconforming use be reverted to a former nonconforming use after such use has been changed to a conforming use.

7.02-E Repair of Nonconforming Buildings

Nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent such repair of a nonconforming building existing on the date of enactment of this Ordinance as may be necessary to secure continued advantageous use thereof during its natural life. Provided, such repair involves no changes or enlargement of use, and provided, further, that the owner first obtain a Certificate of Approval as provided by Article Eight.

### SECTION 7.03 GENERAL LAND AND YARD REQUIREMENTS

7.03-A Lot of Record

Every dwelling, cabin, summer cottage or other building used for dwelling purposes shall be located on a lot or premises, the description of the boundaries of which shall be on record at the County Register of Deeds office, or, in the case of a Land Contract shall be on record with, and satisfactory to, the Zoning Administrator as adequately descriptive. No more than one (1) dwelling shall be erected on such lot or premises.

In conforming to land and yard requirements, no area shall be counted as accessory to more than one (1) dwelling or main building.

7.03-B Accessory Buildings and Structures

All accessory buildings and structures attached to the main building, including breezeways and carports, shall be considered a part of the main building in determining yard requirements.

7.03-C Use of Yard Space

No yard or open space encompassing a dwelling shall hereafter be used for the open-air location, parking, placement, lodging, disposition, storage, deposit, wrecking, salvaging, dismantling, accumulation or abandonment, of disused, discarded, worn-out, wrecked or dismantled vehicles, machinery, implements, apparatus, furniture, appliances, junk or other personal property.

### SECTION 7.04 WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL FACILITIES

Every building hereafter erected or moved upon any premises and used in whole or in part for dwelling, recreational, business, commercial or industrial purposes, including churches, schools and other buildings in which persons customarily congregate shall be provided with a safe and sanitary water supply system, and with means of collecting and disposal of all human excreta, and of all water-carried domestic, commercial, industrial and other wastes that may adversely affect the public health. Such wastes shall be treated and disposed of according to applicable standards of the Michigan Department of Health, and the Michigan Water Resources Commission.

7.04-A Standards

Every building or structure employed in whole or in part for human occupancy or frequency shall be provided with a safe and sanitary water supply, and a method of sewage and waste disposal, each erected and maintained in accordance with the standards of material and installation recommended by the Michigan Department of Health. The use of privies and other outside toilet facilities is prohibited unless constructed in such a manner as to be sanitary and dry proof.

7.04-B Location of Wells

No well shall be erected within fifty (50) feet of any system of sewage disposal. No drainage field or sewage outlet shall be located less than fifty (50) feet of, or drain into, a creek, lake, swamp, roadside ditch, or natural water course or body.

visions of this Ordinance, shall hereafter be erected, altered or maintained, and no new use or change shall be made or maintained of any building, structure or land, or part thereof, except in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance.

### SECTION 7.05 PLATS AND SUBDIVISIONS

All future plats and subdivisions shall be in conformity with the provisions of Section 1.01, and be submitted to the Zoning Board through the office of the Township Clerk for approval. All land hereafter platted or subdivided shall be subject to the provisions governing lot size of the District wherein located.

### SECTION 7.06 GRADING

No premises shall be filled or graded so as to discharge surface runoff on abutting premises in such a manner as to cause ponding or surface accumulation of such runoff thereon.

### SECTION 7.07 USES BY SPECIAL APPROVAL

7.07-A General Requirements

Uses by Special Approval, where provided, shall be subject to the provisions of the Zoning District wherein located in addition to the provisions of this Section to prevent conflict with or impairment of the Primary Use thereof. Each use shall be considered as an individual case.

7.07-B Specific Requirements

1 - Written application shall be filed with the Zoning Administrator, and shall include the following applicable statements:

(a) Name of applicant and owner of premises

(b) Legally recorded description of premises

(c) Description of the proposed use, including parking facilities, if required, and any exceptional traffic situation that the use may occasion.

(d) A sketch drawn to scale showing size of building or structure and location on the premises.

(e) The use of premises on adjacent properties.

(f) An appraisal by the applicant of the effect of the proposed use on adjacent properties, and the development of the neighborhood.

2 - Following investigation, the Zoning Administrator shall file his recommendations with the Zoning Board, which may hold a public hearing and shall make determination thereon. In reaching its determination, the Board shall consider the following:

(a) Whether the sewage disposal, water supply, traffic and parking facilities, and the proposed treatment of conditions in the case of a manufacturing enterprise, are safe and adequate.

(b) Whether the location, the use and nature of the operation will discourage or hinder the use of adjacent premises, and the appropriate development of the neighborhood.

(c) Whether the proposed use is in conflict with purposes of this Ordinance as detailed in Section 1.01.

### SECTION 7.08 TRAILER COACH OCCUPANCIES

Except as hereinafter provided by permit, every occupied trailer coach shall be located in a trailer coach park under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Department of Health. Violation of any terms of a permit shall constitute automatic cancellation.

#### 7.08-A Trailer Coach Residence

1 - Permit

No person shall locate or permit the location of any occupied trailer coach on any site, lot, field, or tract of land except by written permit application for which shall be made to the Zoning Administrator. One copy of such permit shall be provided the owner of the premises, and one copy, the trailer owner. Such permit shall be limited to One Hundred and Eighty (180) days from date of issue, but may be renewed upon expiration and payment of the required fee, subject to the provisions of this ordinance then in effect. Permits not acted upon within Thirty (30) days of issue shall expire by limitation.

2 - Application

The application shall contain the following information, and be accompanied by the required fee which shall be deposited in the Zoning Ordinance fund:

(a) The name of applicant and owner of the trailer coach, including date of application.

(b) The make, length and number of the trailer coach and its license number.

(c) The location of the premises as to house number, or legal description of the premises where no house number is available, including name of the owner of the premises.

(d) The location of the trailer coach on the premises, which shall conform to all yard and setback requirements of dwellings in the District.

(e) Description of all facilities for waste and sewage disposal, and for water supply when not self-contained, which facilities shall comply with all standards recommended by the Michigan Department of Health as to location, materials, and methods of installation. The premises shall at all times be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition.

(f) The names of all persons, including ages of children to be occupying the trailer coach.

(g) The signature of the owner of the premises, accepting his responsibility under the permit.

(h) Written approval or disapproval, as the case may be, of (1) all owners of land bordering upon the premises, and (2) all owners of property located within Four Hundred (400) feet of any boundary of the premises.

#### 7.08-B Home Builder's Exception

A temporary permit not exceeding One Hundred and Eighty (180) days with only one renewal, may be obtained for the location of a house trailer on an owner's premises while erecting his dwelling on the premises, following issuance of a Certificate of Approval for such construction.

#### 7.08-C Visitor's Exception

The owner of any property may permit the location of one (1) occupied trailer coach of a guest or visitor on the premises for a period not exceeding Twenty (20) days in the case of any one party in any calendar year, but not exceeding a total of more than Forty (40) days within any calendar year in the case of all visitors.

### SECTION 7.09 PUBLIC UTILITY BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES

The erection, alteration and maintenance of public utility buildings and structures and of power, communication, supply, disposal, distribution and similar public utility facilities, including accessories essential therewith as authorized and regulated by law, shall be permitted in every zoning district, it being the intent thereof to exempt such buildings, structures and systems from the application of this Ordinance when not in conflict with the provisions of Section 1.01. When in conflict, the Board of Appeals shall have the power to determine reasonable conditions under which such facilities may be erected.

## ARTICLE EIGHT—ADMINISTRATION

### SECTION 8.01 ZONING ADMINISTRATOR

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be administered by a Zoning Administrator who shall be appointed by the Township Board for such term and subject to such conditions as the Township Board deems desirable to carry out the terms of this Ordinance. He shall hold office at the pleasure of the Township Board, and receive such compensation as shall be determined by the Township Board.

### SECTION 8.02 APPLICATION AND CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL AND COMPLIANCE

#### 8.02-A Application for Certificate of Approval

1 - Before proceeding with the erection, moving or use of any building or structure or change of use of any premises subject to the provisions of the Ordinance, the owner thereof shall first obtain a Certificate of Approval from the Zoning Administrator. Application shall be made upon forms provided by the Township. It shall be the duty of all contractors and other persons having charge of use, erection or movement to determine that proper Certificate has been issued before undertaking any such work. All persons performing such work in violation shall be deemed guilty of violation in like manner as the owner of the premises.

2 - The application shall be filed not less than ten (10) days prior to the intended initiation of work on the premises, and shall be accompanied by a blueprint or pen and ink sketch to scale in duplicate showing the location and dimension of the premises, and kind and location on the premises of the buildings or structures, including accessory buildings or structures, and the kind and location of sewage disposal and water supply facilities.

#### 8.02-B Issuance of Certificate of Approval

If the Zoning Administrator finds the application conforms to the requirements of this Ordinance and other applicable law, he shall mark all copies approved over his signature and date. One copy shall be retained for filing with the Township Clerk and the other delivered to the applicant together with a card signed by the Zoning Administrator stating the terms of the Certificate, which card shall be displayed and remain on the construction during the progress of the work authorized.

2 - Any Certificate under which no work is done within six (6) months from date of issue shall expire by limitation; but shall be renewable upon reapplication and payment of the original fee, subject, however, to the provisions of all Ordinance then in effect.

3 - The Zoning Administrator shall have the power to revoke or cancel any Certificate in case of false statements or misrepresentation made in the application. The owner shall be notified of such revocation in writing.

#### 8.02-C Certificate of Compliance

Within Five (5) days after receiving written notification of compliance, the Zoning Administrator shall inspect the premises and issue the owner a Certificate of Compliance if the building, structure or use are in conformity with the Ordinance.

#### 8.02-D Fees

Fees for inspection and issuance of certificates, permits or copies thereof required or issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be paid to the Zoning Administrator in advance for deposit with the Township Treasurer who shall place the same in a separate

fund to be known as the Township Zoning Ordinance Fund, to be used solely for the administration of this Ordinance as determined by the



# Supervisors' Proceedings

JULY SESSION

July 20, 1966

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Belson, Campbell, Everett, Gerard, Jocks, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Moss, Nelkie, Oates, O'Dell, Schreck, Smith, Stephan, Webb. Absent: Blust, Hoshbach.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committee by the chairman.

Mr. Cecil Taylor addressed the board for action on the water level of Long Lake and stated that the property owners of Long Lake were prepared to pay preliminary expenses of a survey. He requested a resolution from the board which would start proceedings to establish a lake level. Referred to the conservation committee.

Mr. Gerard reported his attendance at a Regional Library Board meeting.

Chairman requested a report from the conservation committee on the regulation of water skiing on inland lakes. Referred to the conservation committee.

State Sen. Robert Richardson addressed the board discussing the proposed deer regulation.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. Campbell presented the following report of the zoning committee:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

We, the zoning coordinating committee, recommend approval of the Wilber Township Zoning Ordinance as submitted.

Signed: Campbell, Belson, Schreck

Upon motion by Campbell supported by Lixey, the report was unanimously accepted.

Mr. Campbell presented the following report of the zoning committee:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

We, the zoning coordinating committee, recommend approval of the Baldwin Township Zoning Ordinance.

Signed: Campbell, Belson, Schreck

Upon motion by Campbell supported by Schreck, the report was unanimously accepted.

Mr. VanAlstyne addressed the board and requested consideration of a resolution for the control of water skiing on inland lakes in Iosco County. Referred to the conservation committee.

Mr. Little reminded members that this board would be host to Fourth District Supervisors meeting scheduled for August 11.

Mr. Schreck read the following report of the building and grounds committee:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

We, the building and grounds committee, recommend the sheriff's department be granted permission to hire a night turnkey at a maximum wage of \$3,600.00 per year.

Hours recommended to this committee are 11:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m., six nights per week, Sunday through Friday.
