## Murder Suspect Nabbed by FBI

Fugitive Thomas J. Sergent, 25, is being held under \$10,000 bond at Flint following his capture Saturday afternoon by FBI agents and area law enforcement officers at a gasoline station north of East Tawas.

Wanted on a federal warrant in connection with the murder of an Arizona couple, Sergent had spent the past five weeks in an underground hideout south of Footesite.

An extradition hearing is pending on charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder and interstate transportation of a stolen vehicle.

Sergent was arrested shortly before 5:00 p. m. Saturday in an automobile owned and driven by his sister, Patricia, 22, Madison Heights.

The FBI had received information that Sergent was hiding near Oscoda and the area south of River Road near Footesite village had been under surveillance.

Miss Sergent drove her car to a point near the hideout to pick up her brother. Their car then returned to River Road where it was followed by officers dressed in civilian clothing.

The car then traveled to Oscoda and south on US-23 to Miller's Big Buck Station, about 15 miles from the original point.

When Miss Sergent walked in, officers surrounded the car and took the suspect into custody. He offered no resistance. His sister was not held by authorities.

Sergent was neatly dressed in slacks and a woolen shirt when arrested.

He was questioned for about two hours at the Michigan State Police Post, East Tawas, before being taken to Flint for arraignment before a United States commissioner.

The trunk of the Sergent car was packed with a large quantity of items taken from the hideout. Included was a footlocker which contained approximately \$2,000 in cash. Also found were two automatic pistols, one a .45 caliber and the other a .25 caliber. Also found were tools used to pick locks and clothing.

When searched at Flint, FBI agents found a zip gun and .25 caliber ammunition hidden in a hollow heel of Sergent's shoe. Under questioning there, he admitted theft of 30 sheets of plywood and a tarp used in constructing his hideout.

Sergent is wanted for questioning concerning the slaying of a couple at Del Norte, Colorado, on October 23.

Police linked him to the slayings after a man had purchased a ticket bound for Omaha, Nebraska. The trail proved a dead end and Sergent had not been seen since then.

He is also wanted in connection with interstate transportation of an automobile from Ely, Nevada, to San Juan, Colorado. This was filed November 18. Sergent was wanted in Michigan for parole violation.

Conducting the apprehension, in which 18 officers were involved, were Paul Stoddard, FBI agent in charge; Lt. Carl Gray, Michigan State Police, Bay City, and Losco County Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell.

Sergent had been apprehended here in 1959 and charged with breaking into two business places at East Tawas. He had resided here for several months.

Undersheriff Leon Putnam recalled Monday that Sergent had been considered dangerous at the time and had been placed under maximum security. He was sentenced from Losco County to serve a two to 15-year term in Jackson Prison.

Before being transferred, Putnam said that he had apparently intended to break jail. He used a tool fashioned out of a garbage can bail to pry two heavy iron braces off the wall of his maximum security cell. He then jimmied a lock on the inner cell door. Further attempt to escape was thwarted when a prisoner in an adjacent cell informed officers that Sergent had a "weapon"—the two iron braces.

## Sergent's Hideout Had Fantastic Conveniences

His hideout was utterly fantastic. Hidden from view in a brushy area south of Footesite, the underground "castle" of Thomas J. Sergent was the work of a man with much experience in roughing it in the outdoors.

It was discovered by FBI agents and area police late Saturday night after they backtracked from the point where Sergent had entered his sister's car.

Only a pile of brush was showing and the underground entrance was well hidden. One officer said he was standing only a few feet away and did not realize he was "on top of it."

Sergent had dug a 12 by 12-foot hole in the ground, lined the floor and walls with plywood stolen from Janis Food and Sport Market at Footesite.

He then used timbers to fashion joists across the top whereon he placed several pieces of plywood for a roof. Then he used a layer of sand for insulation and used a stolen tarp, also from Janis', for roofing.

Inside was a separate room for a toilet. He had stolen a toilet stool from the excursion boat, AuSable River Queen, moored near Footesite Dam.

In the main room, he had two oil stoves and running water to a sink. The latter was provided by a pressure tank stolen also from the River Queen.

The hideout is located about seven miles west of Oscoda and about three miles south of River Road. A trail led through an area in Huron National Forest to a point about 75 or 100 yards from the hideout.

There was a gas cooking stove, a portable oven, a bunk, battery-operated radio, shelving, books, a

supply of gum and cigarettes. He had fashioned a kitchen table out of boards, complete with shelves made from a soft drink case. He also had a medicine cabinet over the sink, filled with the usual aspirin, tooth paste, shaving equipment and a remedy for backache.

A large supply of canned goods which had been stolen from Oscoda Area Junior High School was found. What was left of the food, along with kitchen equipment and other items stolen from the school, were removed by school authorities.

The underground hideout was equipped with an air vent, plus a window in one wall—complete with glass—so he could look down the trail.

Police think that it took Sergent at least a week to construct the layout. Everything was neat, tidy and in its appointed place. Then police began to remove the brush Sunday afternoon. Next came the tarp, then the sand and finally the plywood roof.

Exposed to the light, it was only a lair and not so tidy. One officer, testing the breeze with his nose, was of the opinion that it must have been pretty close quarters for five weeks.

Sergent has had several experiences in this type of living. FBI agents said he had lived in a dugout in Colorado in 1958 and once hid out in Florida—sleeping for two weeks in a wooded area. He was an expert outdoorsman.

But, as Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said Monday, he was probably fed up with dwelling in a dugout and wanted to "get out in the bright lights and spend some of that dough."

Seek Occupational Training Center—

## Intermediate District to Seek Aid in Plans

Following completion of a year-long survey concerning a three-county vocational education program, the Bay-Arenac-Losco Citizens' Advisory Committee dissolved last week on completion of its work.

At Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education, local schoolmen were of the opinion that the Losco Intermediate Board of Education should be the local agency which initiates application for federal and state assistance in conducting plans for a vocational training center to serve schools of Losco and neighboring Arenac.

At a meeting called Tuesday afternoon by Ernest Jordan, intermediate school superintendent, representatives of the six schools involved were of the same opinion and directed the intermediate office to proceed with steps to make application for a planning grant.

At Monday night's meeting, Superintendent Mick estimated that cost of such a center would be approximately \$300,000 to \$400,000. As a guess, he estimated this would require a levy of approximately one-half mill to pay the district's share of the construction.

He told board members that it was the thinking of the citizens' advisory that, while a center located in the Bay City area could probably offer a greater variety of training to students, transportation could be an involved factor. While it is doubtful that an application can be completed in time to meet a deadline for a planning application—only three weeks away—local school board members were of the opinion that a comprehensive survey now being conducted in area schools should be completed before final action is taken.

The survey includes the same schools which probably would participate in the vocational or occupational training center, namely Whittemore - Prescott Area, Hale Area, Tawas Area, Oscoda Area, AuGres-Sims and Arenac Eastern.

At last week's citizens' advisory committee meeting at Standish, need for occupational training was stressed in the three-county study entitled, "Occupational Training Needs" of Bay-Arenac-Losco Counties.

The report emphasized that a regional or area occupational training center does not mean a vocational high school. It would be a vocational department serving all the high schools in the region.

Specifically, such a school should be planned for the 53 percent of the high school population which, according to the study, is not going to college.

Such a center, said Elwyn J. Bodley, Bay-Arenac Intermediate School superintendent, should permit the student to acquire the skills needed to fill job opportunities in the area. The report said that the vocational student would attend the center for his specific occupational training and attend his regular high school for other courses, athletics and other school activities.

A partial list of job opportunities listed in the study included auto mechanics, auto body repairmen, farm implement repairmen, appliance repairmen, mechanical and architectural drafting, machine shop, typing, shorthand, business machine operators, electronics, hydraulics, pneumatics, printing and the building trades.

Organization to provide such centers could be had through intermediate school districts or a single school district may ask to be designated as an area center, provided the services are made available to students on an area basis.

Because of transportation factors involved, the two center concept was deemed most practical. The intersection of US-10 and US-23 at Bay City was arbitrarily chosen as the center point from which the problem of distance would be analyzed in that region. This center could effectively serve schools of the Bay City area, along with Pinconning and Standish-Steele.

The Michigan State Department of Education has prepared legislative proposals which may provide answers to questions of operating cost, transportation and construction cost for proposed centers.

Deadline for making application for tentative construction planning grants is January 2, 1967. Failure to meet the deadline will postpone a center in this area for another year if the project is to have state or federal assistance.

## Iosco May Seek Planning Grant

Iosco County Planning Commission will give consideration January 19 to proposals submitted by professional planners for costs involved in the development of a county comprehensive plan.

This was the word last Thursday night following a meeting called by the commission and the Cooperative Extension Service. Attending were members of the board of supervisors, planning commissions, city councils and representatives of the Tawas Industrial Development Corporation.

The meeting was concerned with necessity and need to develop a county comprehensive plan. Guest speaker was Dr. Frank Suggitt, professional planning consultant.

Suggitt said that purpose of a comprehensive plan was to take an inventory of physical and natural resources, then decide how they should be improved. Some controls would be incorporated.

The professional planner said that federal aid would not be given any projects unless the county has a comprehensive plan. As an example, he said that 40 percent participation grants were awarded last year by Michigan Water Resources Commission and similar grants were made by the Public Health Service.

However, in 1966-1967, the federal government has turned the handling of grants, especially water and sewer, over to such agencies as the Housing and Urban Development and Farmers Home Administration. Comprehensive plans are one requirement for participation.

Suggitt said that counties have until the end of the year to get land approved for designated waste disposal areas.

Insofar as the effect a comprehensive plan would have in the disposal of solid waste, Suggitt said the plan would specify where such a plant would be located. He said there were five areas interested in the program at present.

Once the comprehensive plan is completed, more federal funds

## Standish Businessman Killed in US-23 Crash

A Standish businessman was killed and four other persons injured in a two-car collision Saturday night on US-23 just south of the Arenac-Losco County line.

Killed instantly was Frank W. Whipple, 60. He was a passenger in a car which collided with a second car driven by Harry E. Rescoe, 68, Tawas City.

Injured were Rescoe; Herbert Luecke, 62, Standish, driver of the car in which Whipple was riding, and other passengers, Mrs. Lela Whipple and Mrs. Helen Luecke.

The cars collided when Rescoe, traveling north, apparently crossed the center line. An investigation is continuing by Michigan State Police and the Arenac County prosecuting attorney's office.

Whipple was owner-operator of Whipple Wholesale Photo Finish Service for the past 25 years. The business serves all of Northeastern Michigan, parts of Southern Michigan and out of state.

The Standish residents were returning home after attending a party in the Tawas given by employees of Mr. Whipple.

The injured were taken to Tawas Hospital for treatment and then transferred to Standish Hospital. Mr. Luecke is cashier of the State Bank of Standish and chairman of the Losco-Arenac Regional Library Board.

The deceased was a former Standish councilman, was an active boatman and a member of the United States Power Squadron. He was a member of Standish Masonic Lodge, the Master Photo Dealers and Finishers Association and the Standish Community Methodist Church.

He was born September 27, 1906, in Arenac County.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Mrs. Irene Kraushaar, Royal Oak; Mrs. Esther Sadlak, Wyoming; Mrs. Barbara Penrod, Standish; Mrs. Trudy Dittenber, Turner; 13 grandchildren; one brother, and four sisters.

Masonic services are to be held Wednesday, 2:00 p. m., at the R. O. Savage Funeral Chapel under auspices of the Standish Masonic Lodge. Burial will be in Cedar Valley Cemetery.

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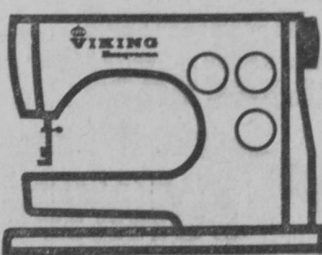

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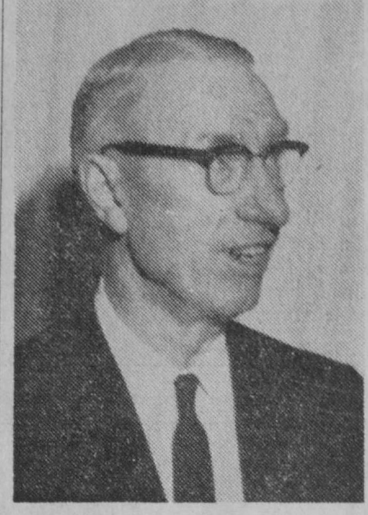

# MSU Hereford Specialist Retires; Long Service to NEM

Wilton L. (Bill) Finley, former Iosco County agricultural agent and Michigan State University animal husbandry department specialist for the past 19 years, was honored at a retirement party last Tuesday night at West Branch Country Club.

Retiring after serving the beef industry of Northern Michigan since 1931, he has been agricultural agent in Iosco from 1936 until September 15, 1947, when he took up duties with MSU.

Since the existence of the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association, he has worked with local beef farmers to improve the cattle sales and boost farm income.

The West Branch sale alone brings in over a quarter of a million dollars from the sale of feeder calves.

Finley came to Iosco in 1936 from Three Rivers, where he had been employed for two years as farm manager of the Falius Farms. Previous to going to Three Rivers, he had spent seven years in MSU's animal husbandry department.

His work at MSU in the 1930s dealt largely with animal husbandry research and experimental livestock feedings. He later worked in the field of general management, feeding and breeding problems within beef cattle herds throughout the state.

The retiring beef specialist was presented gifts by Jack Small, president of the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association.

Nearly 125 people honored Mr. Finley by their presence at the West Branch dinner. He will be long remembered for his foresight in promotion of beef cow-calf industry throughout Northern Michigan.

Marvin Davenport, Iosco County extension agent, was program chairman. K. C. Festerling, Emmet County extension agent, was master of ceremonies. The banquet was sponsored by the Northern Michigan Beef Breeders Association, Iosco Animal Breeders Association and the Northern Michigan Calf Association.

## Hale Area— Seeks Answers to Enrollment Increase

A questionnaire seeking an opinion from taxpayer-voters of Hale Area School District concerning ways to solve school enrollment problems was given distribution through the mail last week.

Supt. Paul L. Southerland said he hoped to have a cross section of public opinion for presentation to the board of education this week.

The increase in enrollment, 54 in the last two years, coupled with lack of facilities to meet educational standards, has resulted in Hale Area School losing its accreditation with the University of Michigan. The school has been on a probationary status for several years.

**THE ENROLLMENT** increase has caused oversized classes in grades kindergarten through eight. This increase is now starting to move into the high school. The school had been cited previously in grades K-8 for having classes too large.

Lack of rooms and a shortage of teachers has resulted in large classes. Teachers have been forced to cut down on written work and unable to give the attention and amount of material children should be receiving, said Southerland.

**THE THREE** questions listed in the public opinion are:

1. I would prefer to do what is necessary to meet a high quality education program in Hale, even if it means replacing the present high school building.
2. I would prefer adding a few rooms to the elementary building to just meet the need of enrollment.
3. I would prefer doing nothing and go in with another school district to build facilities which would be needed.

At present, two school districts of Arenac County and three in Iosco County have hired specialists from Central Michigan University to study the feasibility of complete reorganization of schools. Current thinking of schoolmen is that it might be possible to make a more complete utilization of present facilities, without constructing new buildings, if area schools were reorganized.

Southerland said that the U of M had pointed out that the large number of teachers leaving Hale Area School is being caused by excessive work load, low salaries and substandard facilities and curriculum.

**"THIS IS NOT** all of the causes but it does nothing to encourage them to stay or help in getting new teachers," said the Hale Area superintendent. "Only one teacher in grades seven through 12 has been with us three years and only one more than three years."

The superintendent said the school could not provide guidance,

special education and participation in many federal and state programs (for adults as well as preschool) on a share-the-cost basis because of the lack of facilities.

"We would like to know what our people prefer to do. There is no guarantee that a high school will always be in Hale. However, if we can meet the guidelines of the University of Michigan and the state department which they feel provides a high quality education and are willing to support it, you have a much better chance of keeping the high school in Hale—at least grades kindergarten through eight or nine," said Southerland.

The questionnaire also asked the person if he would be willing to serve on a curriculum committee. Included were choices in English, history, mathematics, shop, home economics, commercial sciences, health and physical education, music, adult education, electives (arts and crafts), and state supported programs.

## Hunters Stabbed Pet Buck in Refuge

Two hunters have been charged with stabbing a pet buck to death at the Ogemaw Game Refuge. They were caught by the refuge caretaker after removing the deer from its pen.

Ray King, Ogemaw County prosecuting attorney, said the case was a little out of the ordinary and was to discuss it fully with conservation department officials and local police before filing a formal charge.

The buck was a great pet of visitors at the refuge. It came and went as it pleased, in and out of the pens, always looking for a handout from visitors.

## Drop Charges Here After Flint Prosecution

Circuit court charges here against Michael J. Hodge were closed last week with a nolle prosequi when authorities were informed that he had been found guilty of probation violation at Flint. His probationary term was set aside by Circuit Judge Newblatt and a five-year term granted, the first six months to be served in the Genesee County Jail.

Hodge had been charged in Iosco with obstructing, resisting, opposing, assaulting, beating or wounding Charles Burke, Oscoda Township patrolman.

## Oscoda Realtor Plans Beach Fill

Public notice has been given by the Department of the Army, Corps of Engineers, Detroit District, that Carl A. Brownell Jr., was issued a federal permit to establish a beach by placing a sand fill approximately 296 feet from the US-23 right-of-way north of Oscoda.

The notice said Brownell had been granted right to stabilize the beach by constructing 24 sheet steel pile groins, placed at 120-foot centers, 120 feet in length, in Lake Huron offshore from lots 298 through 307 of Lake Huron Sand Beach Subdivision No. 2, Oscoda Township.

Any interested party objecting to the proposed operation has until January 6 to file written protests with the corps of engineers. Objections are to be based on reasons affecting navigation. Other pertinent factors, including fish and wildlife conservation aspects, are to be accepted and made part of the record.

# Discontinue Jack Pine Bike Run Because of 'Outlaw' Riders

The annual Jack Pine Run to West Branch became a thing of the past last week when the city council was notified that there would be no stopovers in the future.

In a letter addressed to the council, Harold Farnum, chairman of the Lansing Motorcycle Club, sponsor of the Jack Pine Run, said, "It is with regret that we look back on the action taken by some of the 'outlaw' motorcyclists which necessitated the closing of some of your business establishments over the Labor Day weekend.

"The destruction of cabins and the fighting in some of the restaurants was certainly a disgrace to our sport.

"Rather than jeopardize our relationship with the wonderful people of West Branch, the committee has voted to discontinue the Jack Pine Run," said Farnum.

Motorcyclists had stopped at West Branch for their overnight rest for many years. Many of the same riders returned year after year and stayed with the same families.

No serious trouble was ever encountered until the last two or three years when nonmembers began to appear on the scene. "They were not contestants and seemed to be dedicated to the work of creating trouble," said a news story in the Ogemaw County Herald.

Trouble came to a climax over the past Labor Day week-end when several bike clubs from downstate appeared. They wrecked at least two buildings as well as "taking over" a few areas in the outlying districts of the community. Extra police protection was required.

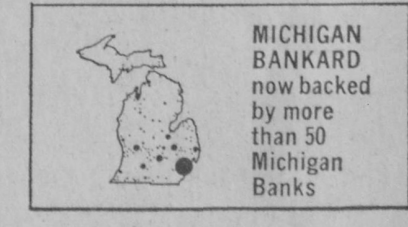

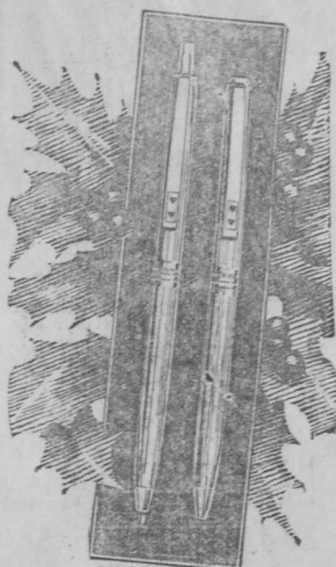

## Family Living Education

### That Dried Milk Scare

Do you feel a little concern about buying nonfat dry milk after hearing or reading about the supply that was withdrawn from the market? You need not. Just look for the U. S. grade shield on the box before selecting powdered milk and then buy with confidence. The USDA grading program includes inspection for wholesomeness. It was such an inspection that resulted in the recent temporary shutdown of a processing plant. It was done for your protection. There is a new grade designation for extra fine quality instant nonfat dry milk. It is called U. S. extra grade and the shield appears on the label. It promises no lumping ever, that it dissolves more quickly and will be smoothly free-flowing.

**Bringing In The Tree**  
A few families still have the fun of going to the woods (or their tree plantation) and selecting just the right tree for Christmas decorating. Those Currier and Ives pictures always show the snow deep and fresh without the tracks of children playing in it, the sled loaded with a huge tree, or the children carrying one across the snow to the house.  
Most of us have not time or the property from which to cut a tree, so it is off to the tree sales lot for us. Most of us find the trees are much larger when we attempt to put them in the house than when we selected them. It is always a mystery how they grew so fast in those few days.  
We look first at size and density, of course. We must also be sure of the shape, its freshness, how clean it is and that there are no weak, broken or too long branches or crooks in the stem.  
Experts suggest we shake or bounce the tree stump on the ground lightly. If only a few needles drop, the tree is fresh. Once home, keep it fresh by cutting off an inch or so of the butt end of the tree and stand it in water. Be sure to stand it in a large enough container in the house to hold water during all the

season and firmly braced so it will not tip easily.

Check your strings of lights before that evening when you plan to decorate the tree. You may need more bulbs in order to completely fill each socket on the string. Do not leave any sockets empty as little fingers or decorative material can get into them.

When buying new strings of lights, buy only the UL approved lights. They will cost a bit more but may mean saving a home from fire.  
A bit more wire between bulbs on a string allows for more flexibility in placing the bulbs. Most are multiple-type which means that all lights remain lighted even if one fails. In the series type, if one fails, all go out. Check size of bulb base on your strings of lights.

Flasher plugs and portable dimmer units are available for a variety of effects.

**Ham For Dinner?**  
Or perhaps you are selecting one for the holidays. Check the label carefully.  
A "country cured" ham available in some markets are traditional and we associate them with "dry" curing which is slow smoking and long drying. They always require further cooking before serving. Often they are labeled as to region of the origin, such as Virginia, Kentucky or Georgia.

Today's more modern processed hams are tender and mild in flavor, but if one is labeled "hickory smoked," it has the USDA inspection, it truly is hickory smoked.  
Remember, that a ham marked "smoked" only is heated to an internal temperature of 140 degrees Fahrenheit and must be further cooked. Only if it is labeled "fully-cooked," it requires no further cooking. Flavor is improved and safety is more sure if that ham is fully heated before serving, however. Heat before slicing to retain the juiciness and flavor.  
Plan on one-fourth to one-third pound of ham per serving. Remember that many guests will want two servings, and, of course, what is more delicious than sandwiches and casseroles using up more servings after the big meal?  
Cook hams at 325 degrees. For those that are not fully cooked, allow 18-25 minutes per pound.

## 400 Guardsmen Get Active Duty in Jan.

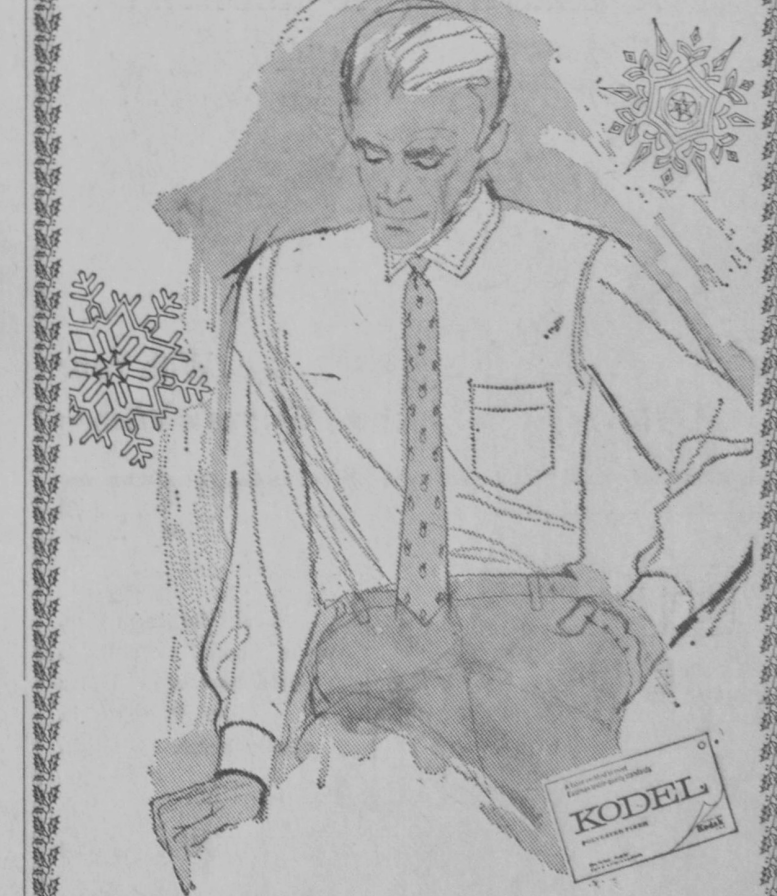
Maj. Gen. Clarence C. Schnipke, adjutant general of Michigan, announced today that an estimated 400 Michigan National Guardsmen will be called up for six months active duty in January. This is a sharp increase from call-up quotas for the last few months of 1966. For December, the quota was 120; in November, 60, and in October, only 54 guardsmen were called to serve their six-month tour of duty.  
According to General Schnipke, the monthly quotas following the big January call-up will remain high through May or June 1967. "We now have a backlog of 1,500 guardsmen awaiting their active duty assignment," said the adjutant general. "By the middle of next year, our backlog number should be minimal."  
The increase in monthly quotas is the result of a recent department of defense announcement disclosing plans for providing active duty training for approximately 150,000 national guardsmen and United States Army Reservists during the period January through June 1967.

**Braves Defeat Orioles**

There is nothing like a strong bench — that basketball maxim proved a key factor in Tawas' 78-75 win over West Branch Friday night.

In what should be one of the hardest fought games of the entire season, Tawas used nine players to turn back a scrapping bunch of West Branch Orioles.

Officials tooted a total of 55 fouls during the night—that averages out to three fouls for every player who stepped foot on the floor. The game never seemed out of hand, but wild scrambles for the ball gave fans just about all of the excitement they could digest in one night.

Both teams used a pressing man-on-man defense throughout the first half, which accounted for many of the fouls. Three Tawas starters cooled their heels in the second quarter with a dangerous accumulation of fouls, but replacements turned in excellent performances and that is bench strength.

The Orioles, enjoying their home confines, jumped off to an early lead in the first quarter. Aided by converting seven of 11 free throw attempts and meshing six buckets, West Branch held a 19-15 edge at the whistle. Tawas was not far off the pace with seven of 10 foul shots and four buckets.

Coach Bill McIntosh, with an eye toward play in the second half, grounded Forward Ron Doak, Center Gary Haglund and Guard Denny Krish, all with three or more fouls. Coming in to alternate at these positions were Paul Beyer, Ray Powers, Howard Rollin and Al Lickfelt.

Combining three field goals by Guard Wayne Fairfield, plus a field goal and foul shot by Forward Dale Koepke, the Braves took over the lead and then lost it shortly before intermission. Beyer and Lickfelt pumped in two field goals each. Rollin added one field goal and Powers popped a foul shot while looking impressive at guard. The Braves outscored the Orioles 20-17, but were down by one point, 35-36, at the half.

Krish, Doak and Haglund returned to the fracas in the third period and, both teams had to slow the defensive pace because of the large number of fouls. When the Oriole defense sagged off Tawas' guards, it was probably their undoing. Fairfield had his hottest quarter with five field goals and a foul shot, while Koepke was a jump ahead with five field goals on dead eye shooting from the baseline and two charity tosses. Beyer's two foul shots gave Tawas a 25-15 edge over West Branch and a 60-51 margin.

The fourth quarter found the guards pressing again and Greg Rivard, slick-shooting Oriole who had 18 points during the night, left via the five foul route. He was followed by Doak of Tawas.

The two teams traded basket-for-basket and then West Branch started to cut into Tawas' lead. The Orioles scored 24 points during the quarter, but Tawas stuck to its guns with Koepke hitting seven points, followed by two field goals for Beyer, a field goal and two foul shots for Fairfield and two foul shots for Krish.

The Braves meshed eight out of 18 free throws in the final quarter as West Branch made a determined bid to gain possession of the ball. Janish popped five field goals and two foul shots for the losers in the quarter, but the game ended with Fairfield at the free throw line—the other four players were at the opposite end of the court to guard against any West Branch trickery. The final gun went off with a West Branch pass.

Fairfield and Koepke led the Braves with 25 and 24 points, respectively. Beyer turned in 10 points. Despite his four early fouls, Haglund turned in a good game on the backboard and was particularly helpful in the fourth quarter. Krish was unable to convert a field goal but turned in some key passes to set up scoring plays.

Janish of West Branch was top gun of the night with 10 field goals and six foul shots for 26 points.

Coach Dick Fairless' Junior Braves had an easy time winning over the Oriole JV, 85-48. Tawas substituted freely throughout the game but every player hit the scoring column and that was all for West Branch. Yanek topped Tawas players with 18 points, followed by 13 points for Lixey, 12 for Look, and 10 apiece for Brugger and Rieger. Others scoring were Brown with six points, four

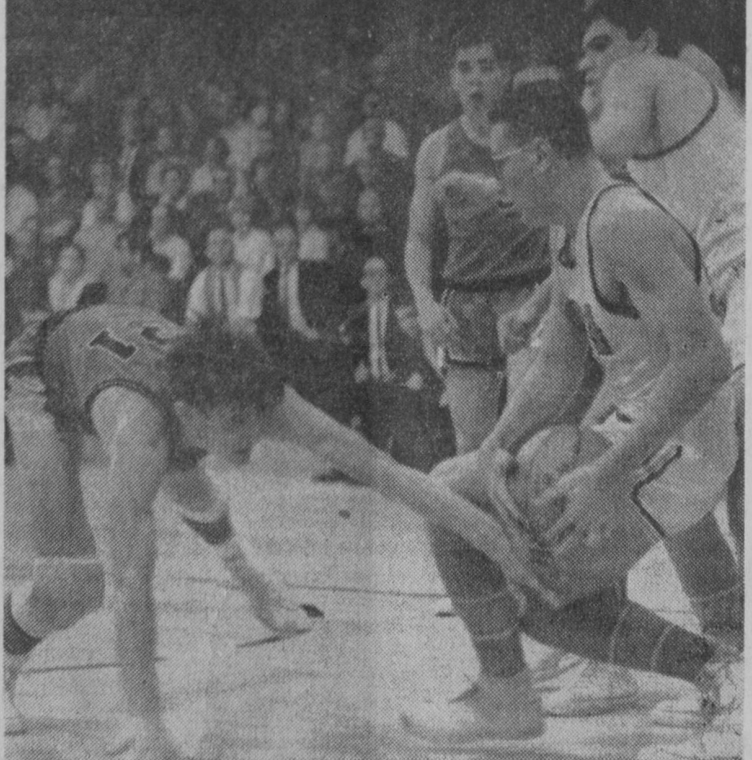
