JANUARY

January 5—Construction in Tawas City during 1965, as reflected by building permits issued, saw a \$52,015 increase over the previous year's total . . . Harry M. Rollin, 76, closed a 36-year career as a gasoline service station operator and sporting goods dealer in Tawas City . . . No primary election was necessary in Tawas City due to the lack of opposition for incumbent candidates. Three candidates filed for mayor at East Tawas . . . Miles G. Main, 81, Goodrich, former Tawas City businessman and a former Detroit Tiger, died at Royal Oak.

January 12—A special meeting to discuss "pegged millage" under the 18-mill tax limitation enacted by the state legislature is to be held at the East Tawas City Hall . . . LaVerne Koepke returned to take over his new position as personnel and safety supervisor at the National City plant of National Gypsum Company . . . McKay Sales Company rolled out its shiny little Chevrolet 490 to draw attention to the fact that 1966 marks the dealership's golden anniversary of service to Iosco County . . . Conservation service for the newly constructed First Methodist Church at Hale was held Sunday afternoon . . . Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation met to discuss plans for a membership drive.

January 19—A five-man committee was appointed to study re-apportionment of the Iosco Board of Supervisors under possible guidelines being established by the state . . . Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell announced that a riot control squad was being organized by his department . . . East Tawas

Council has withheld funds for repairs to the Michigan Waterways Commission dock until corrections are made by the contractor in removing debris from the lake bottom . . . Possible renovation or an addition to the front of the city hall was discussed Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

January 26—First meeting of a citizens advisory committee named to study needs of a proposed vocational training center for the Bay-Arenac-Iosco area was held Monday night . . . Buffalo Patrol of Troop 90, Hale, won the Klondike Derby Saturday at Silver Valley . . . A 1966 budget of \$9,140 has been adopted by Tawas Chamber of Commerce . . . First meeting of a citizens committee invited to aid in formulating future plans for Tawas Area School was held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit . . . Tawas Point Park is an active place as preparations are being made to receive the first camper sometime next spring.

FEBRUARY

February 2—Ralph Western, former president of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was named Tawas' man of the year . . . A broken water main caused Tawas City Water Department a 13-hour headache before repairs were finally made . . . Five busloads of youngsters representing the East Detroit Lutheran Caravan participated in skiing activities Saturday and Sunday at Silver Valley was opened on a temporary basis . . . A. J. Aulerich of Whittemore has been re-elected as chairman of the Iosco Road Commission.

February 9—A group of 21 persons interested in deer herd man-

agement were guests Monday at Mansfield Rod and Gun Club west of Whittemore . . . East Tawas ended the first year of operating its city park with a net profit of \$15,711 . . . Thirty members of Tawas Area High School Band received first division ratings in the solo and ensemble festival of District Nine . . . Walter Deering ended a 45-year career as a blaster at United States Gypsum Company's quarry . . . Police investigated a burglary in which a safe containing cash was stolen from the 3-C Vending Company at Oscoda . . . Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, predicted that Tawas City's financial condition by early summer, would be the best in 15 years.

February 16—O. S. Rose Builders, Tawas City, was low bidder on constructing a five-classroom junior high addition at Tawas Area High School . . . Hundreds of fishermen are enjoying outstanding perch fishing on the ice of Tawas Bay . . . Largest lumbering operation in the Whittemore area in modern times is well under way in the Johnson Creek valley at James A. Cole's proposed new lake . . . Tawas Area School is seeking a federal grant to be used in a summer reading program.

February 23—James Campbell and Lewis Besancon were successful candidates for the office of mayor in East Tawas' primary election and a runoff is to be held in spring . . . Tawas City received \$6,940 from the county as reimbursement of its share of the county-wide appraisal program being conducted by Gem Surveys . . . Michigan Municipal Finance Commission approved \$65,000 worth of sewer assessment bonds and \$48,000 in sewage disposal system revenue bonds for Plainfield Township . . . Voter approval is to be sought April 4 at East Tawas on a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue to aid in financing a proposed \$750,000 sewer construction program . . . Hale Area Eagles defeated Mio to put the two schools in a tie for first place in the North Star League.

MARCH

March 2—The annual Perchville Festival went into record books as the most successful in its three-year history as the weatherman cooperated with perfect conditions . . . A million dollar civil suit was commenced by Orville Leslie and Sons, Incorporated, against Ford Motor Company . . . Tawas Area School is to hold its first contract negotiation session with teachers . . . A photographic crew of the United States Department of Agriculture was here this week to shoot footage for a new documentary film to be entitled, "A Working Forest" . . . Hale Area Eagles defeated Posen and won the North Star League championship.

March 9—Sale of Tawas Golf Club to Ted, Doyce and Eugene Moe of Midland is announced by Alvin Zaharias, former owner . . . Allison Green, state treasurer, reported that all financial records of AuSable Township were in order . . . Orlo J. Lixey of East Tawas, an employee of Consumers Power Company, was killed during construction of an electrical power line . . . Hearing on a proposed special assessment district to construct a sewer in Elms Garden Subdivision is to be held at the city hall . . . William A. Mallon, superintendent of operation for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, died of a heart attack . . . Four local organizations were represented Saturday in a program to clear litter off the ice of Tawas Bay.

March 16—Michigan Department of Conservation held an all-day session in the area for deer hunters and others interested in management of Michigan's most important big game animal . . . Warren Britt of Sherman Town-

ship was elected president of the Iosco unit, National Farmers Organization . . . Lowell M. Long, Tawas City, was killed in an auto crash south of Alpena . . . Local firemen have answered a number of grass fires as snow disappears from the ground . . . Judge Allan C. Miller announces that he will be a candidate for re-election as judge of the 23rd Judicial Circuit.

March 23—Walter Champion was elected president of Tawas Area School's Parent-Teacher Association . . . A \$21,713 street construction program was approved by East Tawas Council . . . A new salary schedule for elective city officers was adopted Monday night by Tawas City Council . . . State and federal fire fighting crews, along with local volunteer firemen, are poised for a battle against annual spring grass fires . . . Iosco Board of Supervisors has voiced vigorous opposition to Senate Bill 882 which would transfer responsibility for operating county medical care facilities to the state.

March 30—Dr. Howard A. Tanner, chief of the Michigan Conservation Department's fish division, answered local critics when he maintained Saginaw Bay perch were stunted because of competition for space and lack of food . . . A 1963 circuit court jury verdict absolving the Iosco Road Commission in a \$468,750 damage suit brought by the widow of a prominent Saginaw businessman has been set aside by the Michigan Court of Appeals . . . Area schools held a meeting to discuss possible reorganization of five schools into one large unit . . . Dr. L. A. Lambert, district health director, announces he is looking for a new county nurse as Iosco has been without one since the January 1 resignation of Mrs. Harold Drenberg.

APRIL

April 6—East Tawas voters approved a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue for sewer construction and named James Campbell as the new mayor . . . A \$165,575 property valuation increase was brought in by Tawas City Board of Review as it concluded its sessions . . . Tawas Industries, Incorporated, distributed \$140 Easter gift checks to each of its 60 employees . . . Organization of the Michigan Deer Hunters Association has been announced by a group of Oscoda hunters . . . Tawas City received a "clean bill of health" from the state in operation of its disposal grounds off

Monument Road.

April 13—L. S. Little was re-elected to his second term as chairman of Iosco Board of Supervisors . . . Alabaster Installation of United States Gypsum Company has been awarded the Peerless Trophy for an outstanding safety performance for the year . . . BMC Douglas Phelan is the new officer in charge of Tawas Coast Guard Station . . . Ronald L. Deering, Tawas City serviceman, died of injuries received in a motorcycle accident near Mt. Clemens . . . Trinklein Marine Service held a grand opening at its new location on US-23 . . . Oren Lee Staley, president of the National Farmers Organization, is to be principal speaker at the Arenac County NFO meeting at Standish . . . A deficit budget for 1966-1967 school operation was adopted by Tawas Area Board of Education . . . Elwood McMurray of Hale opened the season as a starting gate operator for state harness racing.

April 20—Iosco County's equalized tax base is \$59,715,540, an increase of \$2,315,203 over the previous year's valuation . . . Continuation of a three-mill

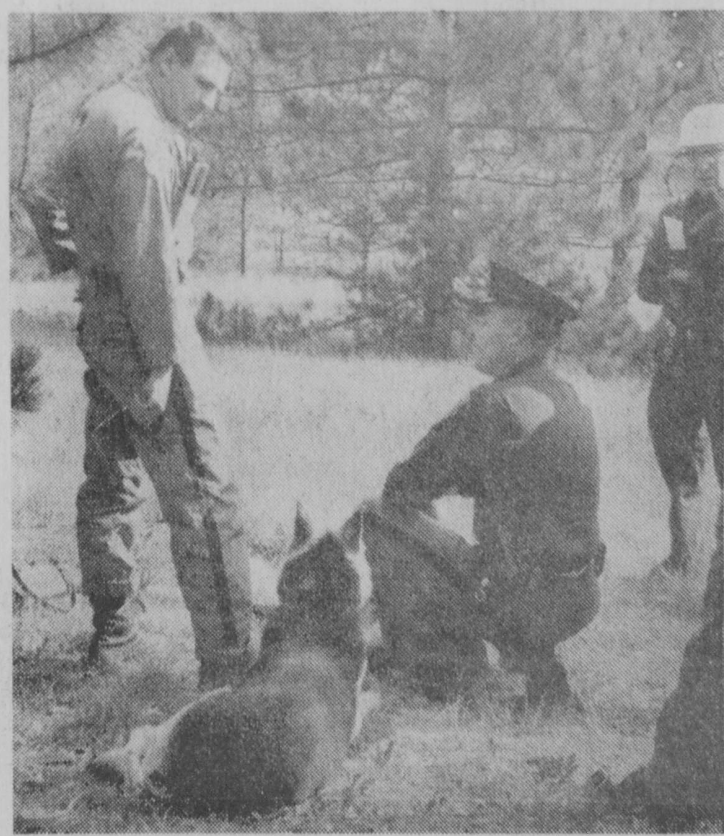

Rollin Sr., Second Ward alderman, was elected Tawas City's mayor pro tem . . . Iosco-Arenac Regional Library observes its 12th anniversary during National Library Week . . . Roy Soncrant, Oscoda, received a contract for leasing the concession stand in the Tawas City Park . . . Tawas City Methodist WSCS held a 25th anniversary tea . . . Northern Michigan building tradesmen have voiced opposition to the new Residential Builders License Law.

April 27—Ralph Western, William Pinkerton and Charles Schreck were named to three-year terms on the Tawas Industrial Development Corporation board of directors . . . Spicer Engineering of Saginaw has signed a contract to handle planning for the sanitary sewer expansion project at East Tawas . . . Continuation of the junior baseball program was assured in the Tawas when parents volunteered as Little League and Pony League managers . . . AuSable River Golf Club, which recently underwent a reorganization when Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City, assumed controlling interest, has been approved for a class C resort liquor license . . . Iosco Board of Supervisors is seeking donations from local groups to help with landscaping projects at the medical care facility.

May 4—Iosco schools received \$11,840 in federal funds for purchase of library materials . . . Construction of a new bowling alley at Hale has been announced by Ira Scofield . . . National Hospital Week is being observed at Tawas Hospital . . . Miss Dorothy Scott, a member of Iosco Cooperative Extension staff since 1953, has accepted a position with Farmers Home Administration at Petoskey . . . A state-wide strike of construction workers has halted progress on the Iosco Medical Care Facility . . . Iosco County Clerk George A. Prescott announces that he will be a candidate for the 102nd District seat in the Michigan House of Representatives . . . R. G. Schreck Lumber Company is to hold open house at its newly-remodeled sales department.

May 11—Several pieces of mail were damaged when vandals dropped a firecracker into a drop box in front of the East Tawas post office . . . Mayor's exchange day is the principal event in the local observance of Michigan Week . . . National Gypsum Company's installations in Iosco County completed 1965 with no disabling injuries and received the Central Division safety award . . . Edward Eppert received Tawas Area School's annual John Philip Sousa band award . . . Mrs. Marian Rose was honored by Iosco Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, on her selection as president of the Michigan-der Club.

May 18—Operational money for next year, or rather the lack of it, will be the principal discussion during the May session of Iosco Board of Supervisors . . . Possible cooperation between area municipalities and townships in joint operation of a disposal ground is being proposed . . . Tawas Area High School's track squad won class B honors in the regional meet at Mt. Pleasant . . . Herbert Escott, former head coach at Tawas Area High School, has been named principal of Essexville Garber High School . . . Briz Gen. John A. Roberts, 40th air division commander at Oscoda, completed more than 10,000 hours of flying during his air force career . . . Largest single truckload shipment ever to leave National Gypsum Company's local plant was made by Jefferson Trucking Company.

May 25—Iosco Board of Supervisors plans to go to the voters in August and ask for an additional 1½ mills for operating the county . . . Karl Kobs, a veteran of World War I, will be honorary officer of the day for Memorial Day services at Tawas City Cemetery . . . Henry Etherington ended a 45-year career with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway . . . Kevin Soultz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Soultz, Wilber Road, was injured when his father's motorcycle tipped over and pinned him to the ground . . . Twenty-one Tawas Area seniors were presented scholarships at Tuesday morning's honor award assembly . . . Donald and Rose Watson of Sunset Motel announce they have signed a contract to install a swimming pool at their motel on US-23.

JUNE

Tawas Bay Yacht Club's 1966 competitive sailing season got off to a screaming start Saturday as five big Mackinac class boats battled for the club's new rotating Memorial week-end trophy . . . Graduation exercises for the 114-member graduating class of 1966 are to be held Thursday at Tawas Area High School Auditorium . . .

Stephen P. Youngs, former basketball coach at East Tawas, has been promoted to the rank of full professor at Michigan Technological University, Sault Branch . . . Jennifer Charboneau, Tawas Area High School junior, won third place in a national safety poster contest sponsored by the Automobile Association of America.

June 8—Republican Party faithful, more than 400 strong, turned out Monday to welcome Gov. George Romney on his "day" in Iosco County . . . Clyde Soper of East Tawas was appointed Iosco-Arenac child welfare worker by the Michigan Department of Social Aid . . . Two separate lawsuits asking judgments of \$100,000 each were filed by the estates of Timothy J. Walbridge and Jacqueline W. Barry, who were electrocuted October 17 in an auto accident at Oscoda . . . Members of the Mio district citizens' advisory conservation department's proposed 1966 antlerless deer quota for this district be cut by 50 percent . . . A car repair program at the Detroit and Mackinac Railway shop has resulted in 12 new jobs for the area.

June 15—Tawas Area School District turned thumbs down on continuing a special three-mill tax levy to finance cost of a new vocational education program . . . Robert W. Elliott Jr. defeated Walter Niles for a seat on Tawas Area Board of Education . . . Stanley Hall and Ralph Sawyer successfully defended their canoe racing championship on the Tawas River . . . Iosco Intermediate School District voters gave an emphatic stamp of approval to levying three-quarters of a mill annually for a special education program . . . Tentative approval was given by Tawas City Council to a new ordinance governing outdoor storage of automobiles . . . Tawas Area Board of Education adopted a new policy prohibiting boys from wearing long hair styles and supported the administration in its interpretation of what is the proper dress for students . . . Mystery of a huge white pine log found three years ago at the bottom of a peat bog in the Jack Kessler farm in Plainfield Township is still unsolved.

June 22—Resignation of the East Tawas Park Commission resulted Monday night following ac-

A kickoff drive to raise funds for the purchase of Christmas decorations was held at the noon luncheon of Tawas City Businessmen's Association . . . Michigan Consolidated Gas Company opened its new gas distribution main to start service to the Hale area . . . A pair of propositions turned down by voters of Tawas Area School District are to be resubmitted to voters Friday, July 29.

June 29—Federal, state, county, township and city parks of Iosco County are bracing for the mad rush of tourists expected to hit the area over the July 4 week-end . . . Formal dedication of the AuSable River Queen is to be held next week . . . First sewer rate increase in 10 years, which goes into effect July 1, is designed to alleviate deficit spending of Tawas City's sewer department . . . Daniel A. Napier is the new forester for the Tawas Ranger Dis-

trict, Huron National Forest . . . Frazer Brothers Construction Company started work on Plainfield Township's \$48,000 sewer system . . . Frank Mark, Tawas City leader, along with Michael Wilson of Hale and Mark LaForge of Whittemore are attending a boy scout training course at Philmont Scout Ranch, New Mexico.

July 6—A 13-year-old Detroit boy, Richard A. Mathers, killed north of East Tawas, was Iosco County's lone accident fatality over the holiday week-end . . . Lyle Bernard was the successful applicant in the recent examination for rural mail carrier at Hale . . . A new historical picture display has been installed at Lumbermen's Monument by the United States Forest Service . . . The area received some welcome rain showers but not enough to ease danger of forest fires . . . A six-week instructional swimming program sponsored by Iosco Chapter of the American Red Cross has commenced for all children seven years of age and older . . . A summer reading improvement program is in its fourth week at Tawas Area and Hale Area Schools.

July 13—Tawas Hospital has met all qualifications and has been certified for patients under health insurance provisions of the Social Security Act . . . William

J. Davis entered a plea of guilty to careless use of firearms without due caution in the November 20 hunting accident which claimed the life of William Nash, 13, East Tawas . . . Announcement was made of the merger of Ammond Oil Company and Resterier Oil Company . . . An order modifying a 1965 judgment permitting nighttime loading of lake carriers at National Gypsum Company's installation south of Tawas City was signed in circuit court . . . Herman Rollin has signed a contract to teach at West Branch High School

while Gary Humphrey has been named head football coach at Garden City.

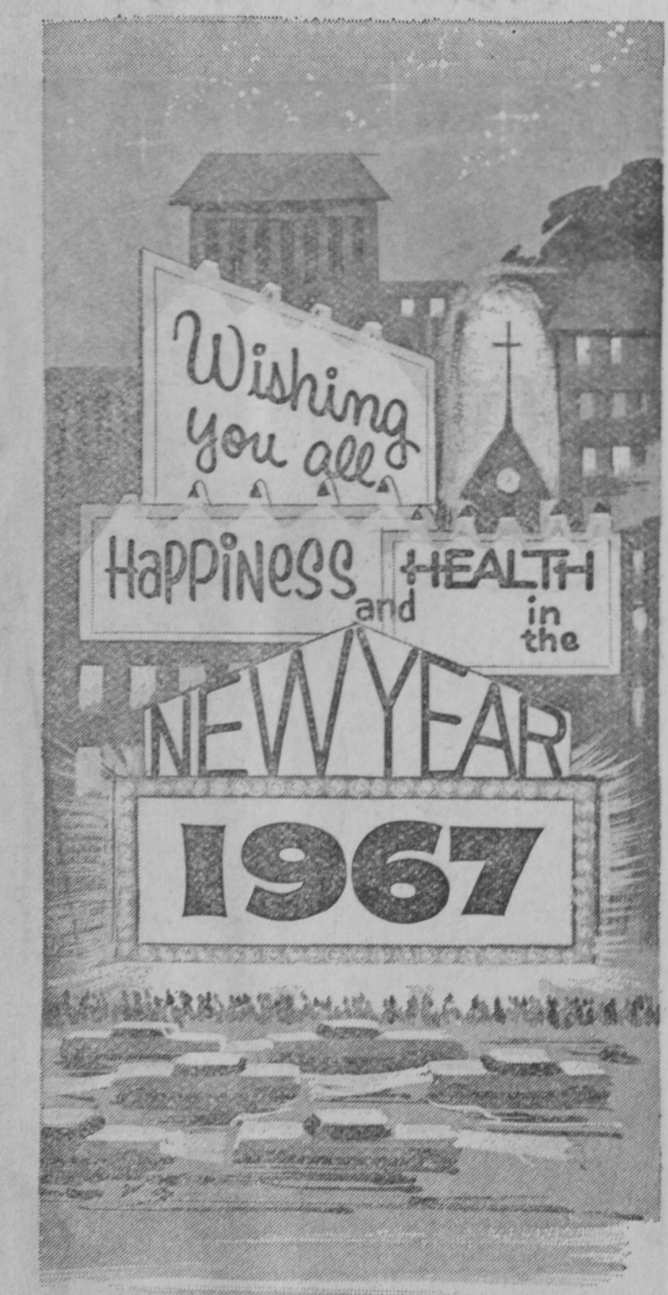

Saginaw Bay near the Singing Bridge . . . William A. Smith Jr. was killed when his rented motorbike was struck by a motorist at the intersection of Fifth Avenue and First Street in Tawas City . . . John D. Webb was named president of Hale Area Board of Education . . . Midseason trophies were awarded at Whittemore Speedway to Dale Brown, road cars, and Ron Hourigan, stock cars . . . A Plymouth pilot averted tragedy by landing his light plane loaded with three passengers in a field near Emanuel Lutheran School.

July 27—East Tawas authorities are investigating what they believe to be three deliberate incendiaries on Ottawas Beach Road . . . Frank Walker, former state police sergeant and a motorcycle expert in his day, warned that speed was one of the greatest contributors to accidents among young motorbike operators . . . Isosco County was officially declared a disaster area for relief in haying and pasture because of the long drought . . . The Bear Track Inn, a US-23 landmark south of Tawas City since the early 1930s, burned to the ground . . . Isosco County Fair opened its four-day progress at Hale.

August 31—Grace L. Miller announces that she will retire after nearly 31 years of service as Isosco County treasurer . . . Peter J. Barrett was an easy winner in the North American Finn Regatta on Tawas Bay . . . One hundred eighty-one individuals now hold at least one share of stock in the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation . . . Three Ann Arbor youths completed their 220-mile trek across Michigan from Alberta to the Tawas . . . Jack R. and Louis F. McKinney were sentenced to Jackson Prison for their part in the May 17 armed robbery at Tawas River Trailer Park . . . Baldwin Township's new zoning ordinance has been adopted by the township board.

SEPTEMBER

September 7—Ron Hohman and Jerry Lauwers set a new record in winning the annual 240-mile AuSable River Canoe Marathon . . . Edward Nelkie was sworn in as Isosco County's new treasurer . . . Tawas Area School opened its 19-66-67 term with overcrowded facilities as contractors had not completed work on the new junior high school addition . . . The largest crowd in history was in Isosco County over the Labor Day weekend.

AUGUST

August 3—George A. Prescott won in his bid for Republican nomination as 102nd District state representative . . . Isosco County's new medical care facility was dedicated . . . Tawas Area School voters reversed their decision of last month and approved extension of a special three-mill tax levy for two years . . . Mayor James Campbell named new members to the park board to fill recent resignations . . . Water pressure has been maintained on city mains during the critical dry summer months through operation of the First Avenue pumping station on a standby basis . . . Tawas Chamber of Commerce has been notified that the Amateur Bicycle League of America has again sanctioned the annual Olympic style bike races to be held in September.

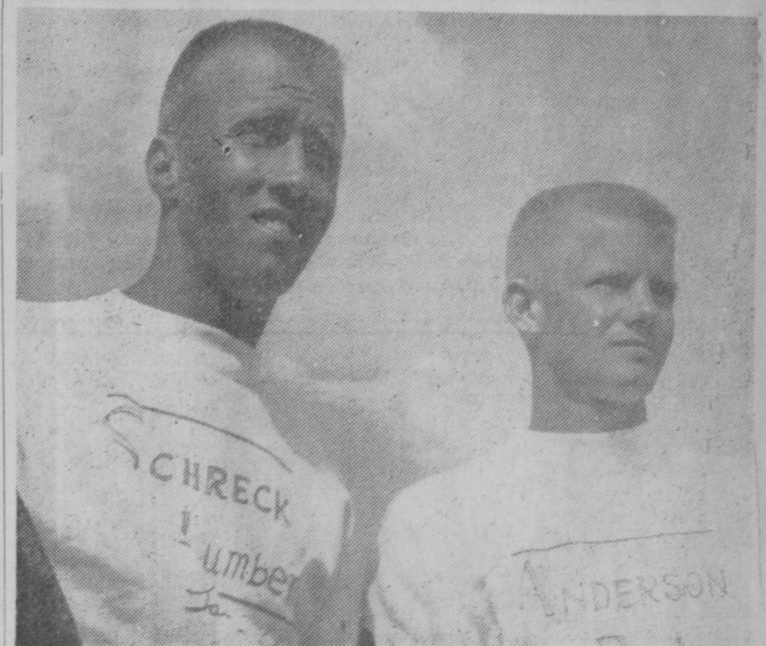

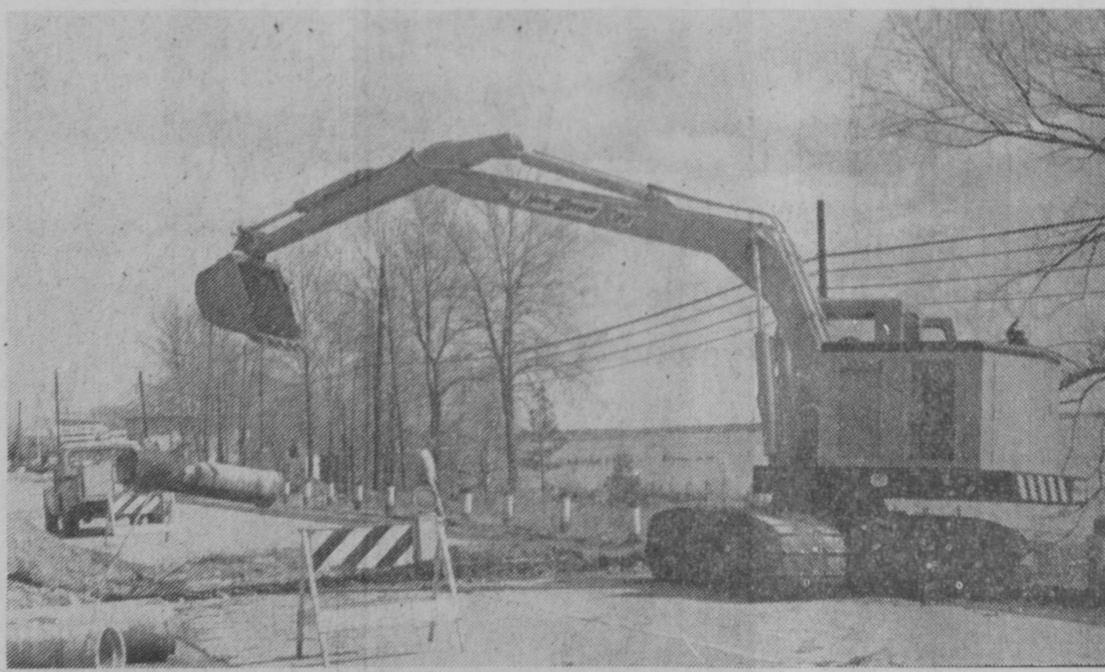

Members of the Tawas City team include Swartz, Bingham, Roach, McDonald, Wentz, Bigelow, Decou and Curry. Hale players are Goupli, Bielby, Johnson, C. McGirr, Brandle and L. McGirr.

25 Years Ago—

January 2, 1942—A Saginaw Bay landmark and one of Isoco County's oldest business buildings ceased to exist when fire destroyed the company store and plant offices of the United States Gypsum Company at Alabaster early Monday morning. The loss sustained, in addition to the building, included a large stock of merchandise, office equipment and records, plus household furniture of three families on the second and third floors. The 60 by 70 three-story building was completed in 1861 for B. F. Smith and Associates and became the general offices and company store for Western Plaster Company.

Rationing of tires and tubes under federal regulations to conserve the nation's limited supply of crude rubber takes effect in Michigan January 5. Russell A. Rollin has been appointed county chairman of the committee to collect waste paper for the war effort.

Tawas City Council adopted plans for a trailer park with 20 sites at its meeting Monday night.

Explaining that he was answering an "inner call," Adolf Hitler took over sole command of the Nazi army because, he said, the Russian war had "exceeded all

past notions." Reports of the German retreat told of the abandonment of materials, including tanks and guns as the Nazis fled back over snow-packed roads.

At the Market

Christmas is past but food shopping continues. Because of the season, certain meat cuts have more glamour for the holidays than others. Those cuts with less prestige right now go begging for buyers. Cuts of beef chuck, pork butts, less well known lamb cuts, as well as ground beef are good buys to pay special attention to at the meat counter this week.

A bit over half of Florida's grapefruit is sold for fresh eating. The rest goes into canned or frozen segments and juice. Good quality grapefruit are firm but springy to the touch, well shaped and heavy with a relatively thin skin. Surface defects such as discoloration do not affect the eating quality. Any degree of decay must be avoided. The size of grapefruit is by number; the larger the number the smaller the fruit. It is the number it takes to fill a standard shipping box. The 70s and 80s are medium size.

Serve fresh fruit instead of cakes, cookies and puddings. Tangerines, tangelos, oranges, bananas, apples, grapes, pears make good looking as well as good tasting and low calorie desserts. Add walnuts and cheese slices to this dessert.

Carrots are in good supply and holding their price since most other vegetables are in shorter supply. Weather, lack of harvest help and reduced acreage led to these reductions in supply.

Sweet potatoes are in their best condition in local stores now. Today's marketing methods include a curing treatment that disappears as we use them to get a sweet potato to vine into the beautiful leaves as we could years ago for a house plant.

Laundry Equipment and Detergents— These, along with dishwashers and other water using equipment and water problems are the highlights of the program for homemakers at Farmers' Week this year. Held on the campus of Michigan State University January 30 to February 3, everyone is invited to attend these sessions. There is no charge and a load of homemakers or two or three couples could have a wonderful day this winter. Watch this column for details and write or call Mrs. Lenehan for a program.
