

Campbell and Besancon to Vie for ET Mayor Post

The field was narrowed to two candidates Monday in the race to name a successor to East Tawas Mayor Clarence McKenzie, who retires from office this spring after serving since 1962.

James Campbell and Lewis Besancon were successful in their bids to have their names printed on East Tawas' April 4 ballot in Monday's primary election.

The third candidate for nomination to the city's top executive post was James Bolen, who was low man after votes were counted and was eliminated from the running.

Campbell received a total of 226 of the 516 votes cast in Monday's election. Besancon was second with 158 and Bolen had 132.

Besancon retired last year after serving as city hall office manager and Campbell presently is serving out his term as First Ward alderman.

East Tawas election officials finished work of counting ballots in record time Monday night as this was the only contest with more than two candidates.

Other races guaranteed for the April election find Earl Hester and Mrs. Carol Tracy competing for the vacancy as First Ward alderman. Incumbent Third Ward Alderman Robert Bolen will be opposed by Merton J. Killey. Second Ward Alderman Edward Higgins is unopposed.

Renominated without opposition were Treasurer Grace Pelton, Clerk Fred B. Lomas and Justice of the Peace Carl Eckman.

No primary election was required in Tawas City this year as not more than two candidates filed for any one office.

Sevencap Participation Wins by Narrow Margin

Iosco's participation in Sevencap, Incorporated, as the community action committee being formed in conjunction with three other counties, barely passed by a 10-8

roll call vote of the board of supervisors last Wednesday.

Robert Gieger, director of Sevencap, appeared before the board in the morning and asked that Iosco support the group's efforts by resolution and also provide office space in the county building.

He said the Counties of Arenac, Ogemaw and Oscoda had already expressed willingness to coordinate activities under the federal Economic Opportunities Act of 1964. Although receiving technical assistance from NORCAP, Northern Michigan Community Action Program, the four-county group would act as its own agent.

Gieger and staff have been employed to work in the federal anti-poverty program. He said that the first step in the program was to acquaint citizens with medical care provisions of social security.

The Rev. G. Douglas Taipalus of the Oscoda area is newly-elected chairman of Sevencap.

Gieger said that 10 percent matching funds would be required to participate. Office space provided by the county would be sufficient as a contribution.

All projects developed by Sevencap would be locally devised and sponsored. The county would be required to provide 50 percent matching funds to obtain federal money.

Supervisor Clarence Everett said that even if a workable program was developed, he doubted if the county would have money available to participate.

Voting in favor of joining Sevencap was 10-8.

Plainfield Sewer Bonds Approved by State

Michigan Municipal Finance Commission announced February 15 that it had approved \$65,000 worth of sewer assessment bonds and \$48,000 in sewage disposal system revenue bonds for the Township of Plainfield.

Proceeds will be used to defray the cost of constructing sanitary sewers in a special assessment district within the township, while proceeds of the second issue will be used to pay the cost of acquiring a sewage disposal system.

ET OKs Purchase of Parking Meters

Authorization to purchase up to 200 new parking meters was approved Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

The new meters, costing \$49 each, are to replace present meters located on Newman, Westover and State Streets, along with installation in city parking lots.

Thirty of the old meters, purchased 15 years ago, are to be repaired for possible use in parking lots.

Cost of purchasing the meters is to come directly from revenues gained therefrom. It was stated at the meeting that since installation, the city had received approximately \$75,000 in revenue from the meters.

In other business, Supt. Paul Ropert was named as street administrator under the state highway contract.

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City Returned Part Cost of 1965 Gem Appraisal

Receipt of \$6,940 from the County of Iosco as part of Tawas City's cost in the current property appraisal program being conducted by Gem Surveys was noted at Monday night's council meeting.

In January 1965, Tawas City became the first unit of local government to hire the St. Clair firm to conduct an equalization and appraisal survey for tax purposes.

Several months later, the county board of supervisors hired the same firm to conduct a similar survey throughout the entire county.

The city received a prorated share of the total cost to the county for this service. Actual cost to Tawas City for this work was \$8,180. The difference between the city's return and its actual cost came through a lower per unit bid offered by Gem in the larger project.

Mayor George Tuttle told the council Monday night that the extra \$1,240 paid for this service was worth the money as information on the appraisal cards presently in possession of the city could be copied before turning over to the county's new tax appraisal department.

"We were faced with a project unique to this city—equalization of the three wards in order to come up with the same state equalized ratio," said Tuttle.

"Had this work not been accomplished with outside professional help, we probably would have lost our three supervisors as it would have been just too much to expect of them," said the mayor.

Part of the money is to be used to pay off several notes owed by the city and the remainder is being returned to the city's revolving and general funds.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that the city had only \$50 in outstanding bills as of Monday. Payment of those had been held up as others were expected from the same firm this month.

Bublitz reported that he had received information relative to open space land development which he had requested from the Michigan Municipal League. This information is to be used in seeking federal assistance in acquiring additional property for the city park.

Bublitz said he did not feel qualified to make out an application for federal funds because of the terminology used in the application. He suggested that the matter be turned over to the planning commission to seek assistance from the city's planning consultant.

The federal government pays up to 50 percent of the cost of acquiring and developing land for recreational use. The council seeks (See TC COUNCIL, page 8.)

Drain Commissioner to Represent County in Watershed Talks

Iosco County Drain Commissioner Richard Miller has been directed to "look after interests" of this county at hearings on a proposed AuGres River watershed project.

At last Wednesday's meeting of the board of supervisors, a district representative of the Soil Conservation Service reported that efforts were being made to interest Iosco and Ogemaw Counties to cooperate with Arenac in an AuGres River project.

It was stated that some 16,000 acres of land in Arenac County are subject to periodic flooding each year. Included is approximately 8,000 acres of good crop land.

It was noted that the AuGres River watershed extends as far as Londo Lake in Iosco County and into part of Ogemaw County. Therein lies the trouble, it was explained, as water runoff must be controlled at the upper end to prevent flooding conditions at the lower end.

It was stated that if any action to control flooding is contemplated, it would have to be taken soon as sites for control dams are rapidly being developed for other uses.

It was recorded that federal participation is available if backwaters of such dams are used for recreation purposes.

Council Seeks Federal Grant of \$450,000

Voter approval will be sought in the April 4 spring election at East Tawas on a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue to aid in financing a proposed \$750,000 sewer construction program.

Approval to place the proposition before voters was authorized Monday night by the city council.

According to a report from Julius Hanslovsky, Lansing, the city's financial consultant, an application is now being prepared seeking a federal grant of \$450,000 to cover 50 percent of the total construction cost.

While congress has not yet funded the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, many cities, large and small, have made application for similar projects. East Tawas' project would be channeled through the Farmers Home Administration, which handles applications of cities with a population up to 5,500.

Hanslovsky told councilmen that the act was so new that application forms had not been prepared as yet by the federal government. He said that information was being prepared rapidly to take advantage of any new development.

"The trick is all in the timing," said Hanslovsky, indicating that the communities which had all necessary data compiled would probably have an advantage when it comes to final allocation of funds.

Hanslovsky said that the city's share of the project could be financed either by general obligation or revenue bonds. He said that considerable savings to taxpayers could result from using the former due to lower interest rates.

The \$750,000 project would finance cost of constructing a new sewage treatment plant, trunkline sewers, force mains, laterals and lift stations.

The city has long considered such a project. According to Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert, the present plant has been operating over capacity for years.

Complete information on the proposal, including financing of the original construction, operation, maintenance and a description of the type of plant to be utilized is now being prepared by Hanslovsky for dissemination to voters.

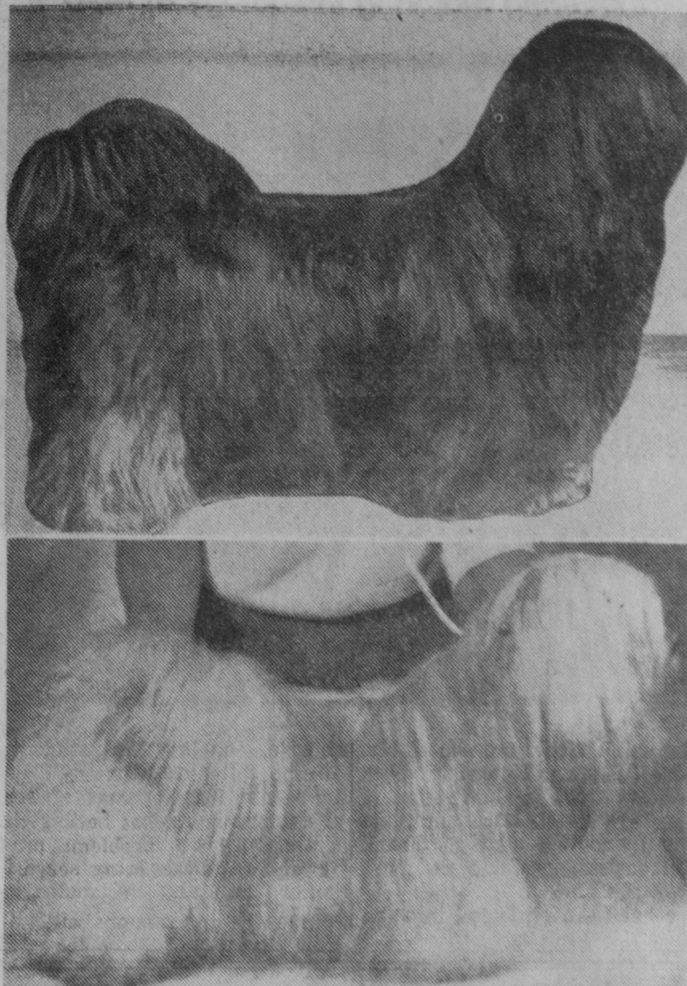

Children's Aid Society Serves State 70 Years

For more than 70 years, the Michigan Children's Aid Society has met the needs of thousands of children throughout the state in finding permanent homes for many through adoption and in supplying foster care in private homes for others not eligible for adoption because of parental ties or other reasons.

As the years have progressed, the population of the state has increased creating numerous social problems and making the need for the work of Michigan Children's Aid Society far greater with each succeeding year. These problems are in no way unique in only this state, in fact, a very similar situation exists throughout all the other states.

For the year, 1964, MCAS had a 16 percent increase both in the number of adoptive placements and in the number of unmarried mothers who received help. There were 650 adoptions and 1,675 unmarried mothers who came to the society for assistance.

While maintaining its high standards of work, MCAS finds it necessary at various times to make its adoption program more flexible.

The present policies regarding the ages of prospective adoptive parents are not as rigid as before and multiple placements in families are made. It is now also possible for parents with one or more natural children to adopt children.

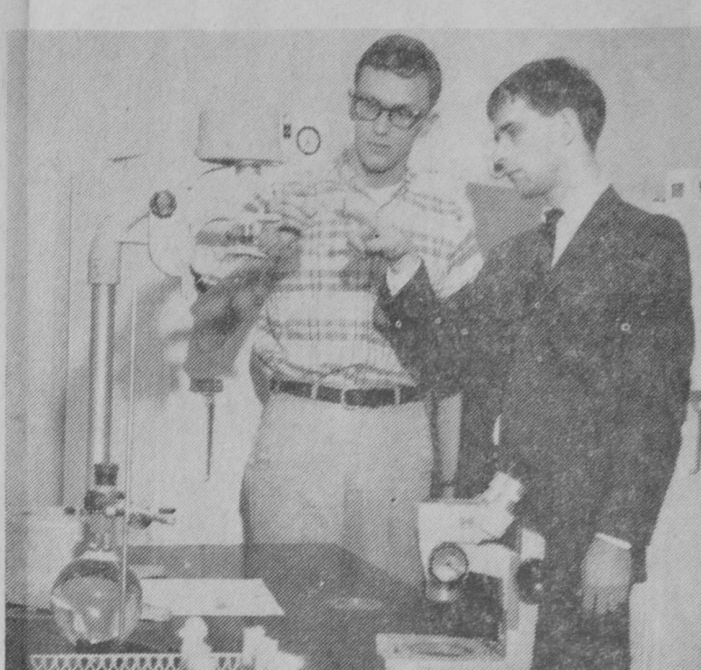
The value of good adoptive work is rewarding in that it provides the adopted child with the happiness, love and security supplied by the adoptive parents. It also enhances his chances of becoming a well adjusted, mature person by having a permanent family.

The agency's first and foremost interest is in finding homes that will insure lifetime happiness and opportunity for the children entrusted to its care. It is also interested in finding couples who will meet the children's physical, spiritual and emotional needs. This objective is well expressed in a quotation by Philip Brooks:

"He who helps a child, helps humanity with a distinctiveness, with an immediateness, which no other help, given in any other stage of life, can possibly give again."

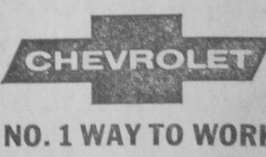

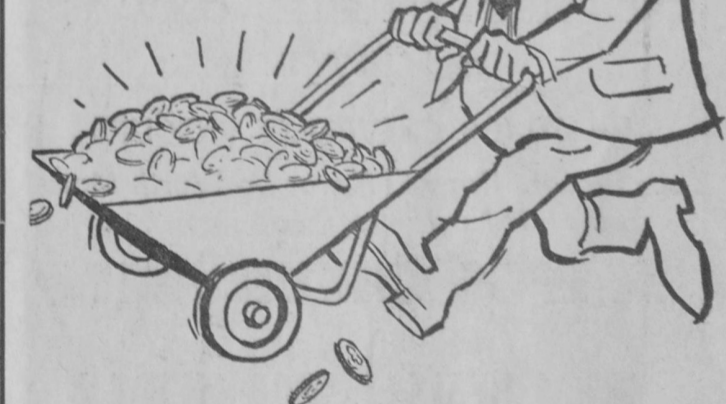

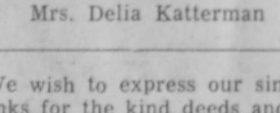
