Death Takes Former Iosco Businessman, Joseph Danin, 75

Joseph Danin, former Iosco County businessman, died Thursday, January 6, at his home in Saginaw.

Born January 1, 1891, in Russia, he came to Whittemore in 1909 where he worked in the store owned by Albert Blumenau. He later worked at a Whittemore bank.

In 1916, Mr. Danin and Charles L. McLean purchased a mercantile store from Harry Price. The two partners then purchased the A. Blumenau store in 1918 and established a hardware at their former location.

The Danin Company also operated a general store in the former Hamilton Building in Tawas City. After Mr. McLean independently purchased the F. F. Taylor Store in Tawas City in 1924, Mr. Danin became associated with McLean in the purchase of the Friedman Store at the corner of Lake and Mathews Streets. The deceased had also been associated with the Hennigar Company at East Tawas. Mr. Danin conducted business at Whittemore for 40 years, selling his store to William Fuerst and Arden Charters in January 1953.

He moved to Saginaw in 1945 to devote full time to his wool and fur business. Joining the Whittemore Masonic Lodge in 1913, he was one of the first members after the lodge was constituted. He was made a life member in 1963.

He was also a member of the Whittemore Chapter, Order of Eastern Star; Bay City Consistory and Elv Khurafteh Shrine, Saginaw.

He is survived by his wife, Marguerite; one daughter, Frances; two grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted January 7 from the Case Funeral Home, Saginaw, and interment was in Saginaw Mausoleum.

Bank Directors Name McKay Honorary Chm.

L. G. McKay, veteran East Tawas banker, Tuesday was named honorary chairman of the board of directors of Peoples State Bank at the 39th annual meeting of shareholders.

Mr. McKay has been associated with banking in Iosco County since 1903, when he came here as a clerk at the Carson, Ealy and Company Bank.

He founded Peoples State Bank of East Tawas in 1927, serving as its president for many years and later as chairman of the board.

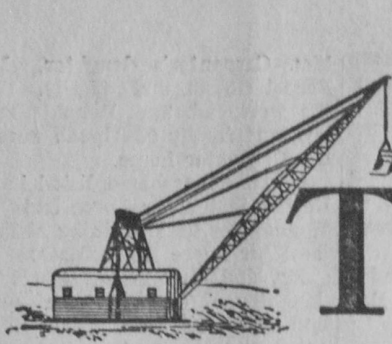
Elected board chairman by di-

Iosco Officials Set Discussion Thursday on Pegged Millage

A special meeting to discuss "pegged millage" under the 18-mill tax limitation enacted by the state legislature is to be held Thursday night, 8 o'clock, at the East Tawas City Hall.

Attending will be representatives from county and township governments and from schools.

"Time is again coming when only six citizens, the tax allocation board, must decide upon a division of taxes," said a joint statement issued by L. S. Little, chairman of the board of supervisors, and William F. Tracy, Iosco Intermediate School superintendent.

Portions of the present 15 mills are earmarked by law. However, the remaining millage is allocated

according to need in the presented budgets of the various units by the tax allocation board. It is the general feeling of township, county and school officials in Iosco that to provide services for the citizens and their children, the present division of taxes is inadequate.

"It is an understatement to say that over the years there have been disappointed taxing units and budget problems resulting from the allocation board decisions," said the statement. "The law last year gave the possibility to alleviate, by mutual action and cooperation, the problem of tax distribution by pegged millage."

If a decision to peg millage is reached, citizens of Iosco would vote upon a millage limitation, thus taking the decision from the allocation board.

All taxing units have talked about and some acted upon extra millage for operation during the past year. Both Whittemore-Prescott Area School and Hale Area School voters approved increases in operational millage.

"If we are to continue to provide expected services to our people, extra voted millage is a reality," said Little and Tracy.

The two men noted that Iosco was one of the fastest-growing counties in outstate Michigan, according to the 1960 census.

Parents to be Surveyed on School Sex Education

Are you in favor of sex education in schools?

This sensitive question will soon be asked parents by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

At Monday night's regular meeting, the board authorized administrators to develop a questionnaire on the above proposal and submit it to parents of the district.

Action came after several weeks of discussion between board members, area ministers and laymen. Many favorable comments were heard by members and it was decided to poll citizens before any final steps were taken.

It is necessary to receive parental approval before any such instruction may be instituted. Qualified personnel would be used in classes.

In other matters, the board formally recognized the Tawas Area Education Association as bargaining agent for teachers of the school district. Petitions signed by teachers were checked for authenticity of signatures by the

Rev. William Lindholm, who had been requested by the board to perform that requirement.

Athletic Director William McIntosh was authorized to purchase protective football gear at a cost of \$2,300. The school had been investigating a program whereby such equipment could be leased and in four years become property of the district. It was felt, however, that outright purchase would result in a saving of money. Equipment now used by the varsity is 12 years old and will be utilized by the junior varsity.

The January 24 meeting of the board has been postponed until January 31 because of a number of important meetings involving school matters that week.

TA School Hopes to Halt Spiraling Costs With Food Pool

Eyeballing spiraling costs in its hot lunch program, Tawas Area Board of Education authorized a central purchase of food, rather than to have each school make separate purchases.

This action came on recommendation of Trustees Carl Helmer and Mrs. Norman Payea, who met recently with cooks and Supt. Reynold Mick.

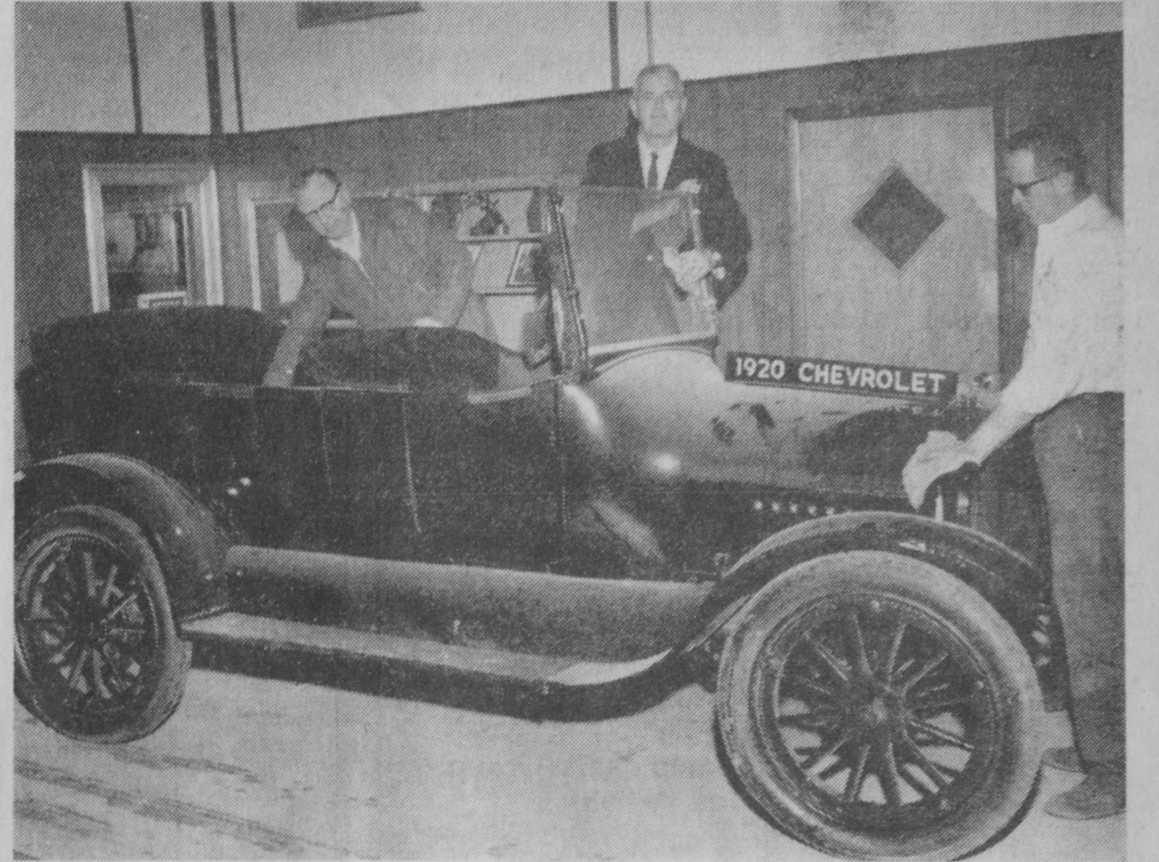
It was recommended that meat purchases be made locally if possible by competitive bidding.

Cost of canned goods and other foods is approximately \$3,000 per month and monthly purchase of meat amounts to \$700.

It was stated that if expenses were not reduced, prices of the hot lunches would have to be increased or quality reduced.

Members noted a decrease in the amount of federal surplus foods available to the hot lunch program.

It was reported that only about one-half of the surplus food allotment had been received from the federal government.

McKay Rolls Out Chevy 490 for 50th Anniversary Event

McKay Sales Company will roll out its shiny little Chevrolet 490 this week to draw attention to the fact that 1966 marks the dealership's golden anniversary of service to the Iosco area.

This famous 1920 Chevrolet touring car, sold by McKay Sales to the late Adolph Cadorette, of East Tawas in the year of its manufacture, will be proudly displayed in the firm's Tawas City showroom.

It has appeared in three centennial parades over the years and is still in fine operating condition. The car's unusual designation is derived from its original selling price—\$490—but it is not for sale at any price.

Chevrolet and McKay Sales Company have an association which began 50 years ago this month. Having seen and heard of the new "490," which had just been put on the market, L. G. McKay obtained the dealership on January 16, 1916, traveling to Flint to pick up his first model.

The agency was first located at East Tawas and the dealership's reputation for sales and outstanding service flourished during the 1920s, 1930s and early 1940s.

Joining his father in the business in May 1946 was L. G. (Ladd) McKay, who had returned home after serving with the armed forces during World War II.

The dealership was moved into a new brick and block building constructed that year at 325 Lake Street, Tawas City. McKay Chevrolet's history has been one of constant growth and in the fall of 1949, the Cadillac line was added.

In 1953, the firm established an OK used car lot at Oscoda. Over the years, many expansions have been made to the building and service equipment facilities. In 1950, a 50 by 90-foot service department was added. In 1964, a 25 by 75-foot paint, used car repair and auto care department was added.

Last year, the showroom and parts department were remodeled to make the dealership among the most modern and best equipped in Northern Michigan.

"We are planning a number of special sales events during our golden anniversary year and invite our many valued customers of the Iosco area to visit our salesroom and service department," stated Ladd McKay.

Offices Exchanged at County Building

A change in offices this week saw the intermediate school superintendent move his files, desk and equipment into the former location of the county welfare department.

Phillip Gidley, probation and parole officer, had occupied the office for several months and is now located in the former school superintendent's office, directly across from the county treasurer's office.

IDC Met Last Night to Make Plans for Membership Drive

A meeting of the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation was held Tuesday night at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office to discuss plans for a membership drive.

The IDC is currently studying the purchase of property for an industrial park and local participation would be needed to obtain the property.

Regular meeting of the IDC board of directors is to be held Wednesday (today) at the Barnes Hotel.

"If you will not invest time or money to attract industry, how can you expect industry to invest time or money with you," concluded Calabrese.

He welcomes comments on the program from area residents.

Area Needs Industry---C of C President Calabrese Believes IDC is Best Answer

"Congratulations and I hope you can bring industry to our area."

These sentiments have been expressed many times during the past two weeks to Leonard Calabrese, new president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. In a letter this week, he expresses his feelings and plans regarding the attracting of industry to the Tawas area.

"First, we must analyze the roll of the chamber of commerce in regard to the industrial development of this area," states Calabrese. "It was primarily through the efforts of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce that the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation was originated and whether we like it or not, it is this corporation that offers you and I the best chance to get industry."

"The IDC has the full support of myself and the chamber of commerce—and the chamber will do all in its power to attract industry and make it known that we want industry."

"Industry does not move into a city overnight, or in a month or a year. It takes a well-planned program to persuade a manufacturer that this area is the best for him. We envision look at the success of cities like Gaylord, Clare and Standish and then ask why don't we get our share of the pie? You must realize that Gaylord took over 10 years to attract its industry—10 years of planned and coordinated efforts which are now paying off dividends. Our efforts will also reap dividends, perhaps this year, or in three or five years. I have no doubts in my

mind that the Tawas will get industry. We need it, want it and will try in many ways to get it.

"I do not like to see the young people leave the area because there is no reliable means of support for them or their future families. Nor do I like to see long-time residents leave the Tawas, moving their families to where they can find employment. I want to see them stay, return and bring back new families with them.

"Do I have any ideas to further our program for attracting industry? Yes I do, and I will make these plans public when the time comes. As an ex-officio member of the IDC I am certain that I will have the opportunity to express my plans. I am not saying that myself or the chamber will be pri-

marily responsible for all industry that comes to this area. What I am attempting to make obvious is that the chamber undisputedly wants industry, will do all that it can to get and keep industry.

I realize that added industry not only means more jobs in the area, but also creates better schools, better churches, more diversified business districts and a more stable economy. It is because industry does this that we must also secure companies that will not hire 400 people this year and be gone within the next two years.

"Finally, I say that we will get industry, but have patience and confidence in your industrial development corporation which is less than three years old. Do not expect us to do in three years what has taken hundreds of cities

to do in more than 10 years. With the economic boom now reaching 60 months of duration, I believe that we will not have to wait 10 years, but will get results much sooner.

"Also, remember that each and every person who lives or works in the Tawas area is also a salesman for the area. Do not sell our area short, but promote the Tawas as an ideal location for industry. Above all, when you are asked to contribute time or money to support this correct program, be generous as possible.

"If you will not invest time or money to attract industry, how can you expect industry to invest time or money with you," concluded Calabrese.

He welcomes comments on the program from area residents.

TA Athletic Booster Club Sponsors Square Dance

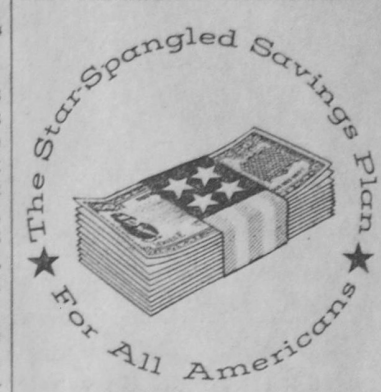

In Several Counties of Michigan

Watershed Management Provides Flood Control

Watershed development under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act continues to make headway in Michigan, despite below average precipitation in recent years. Since the 1954 act was passed, a total of 73 communities in the state have requested technical and financial assistance. This will establish improved controls and management of surface water.

The State Soil Conservation Committee, acting for Gov. George Romney, has officially approved 34 applications.

Dr. E. T. VanNierop, soil and water conservationist for the Co-operative Extension Service, observes that proper management of water resources is imperative to meet rapidly expanding needs.

In addition to controls, watershed projects provide for land treatment measures. These reduce excessive surface runoff and promote delivery of controlled volumes of sediment-free water to the stream channels, VanNierop notes.

The watershed program is administered by the United States Soil Conservation Service. Operation and maintenance after completion tests rest with local communities.

A major part of a development was recently completed in the watershed of the South Branch of the Cass River in Sanilac and Lapeer Counties. The main stream of the river was improved over a length of 27 miles. This should result in considerable reduction of flooding of farm lands, roads and buildings. Floods have been frequent in the area for many years. While construction is under way

land owners are carrying out soil conservation practices with plans prepared by the soil conservation service.

A flood water retarding structure in the 46,000-acre watershed of the North Branch of Mill Creek in Lapeer, St. Clair and Sanilac Counties, has been completed.

Progress has also been made during the year in Misteguy River watershed. The area covers more than 100,000 acres in Saginaw, Shiawassee and Genesee Counties.

It has suffered from water management problems common to many watersheds, including considerable flooding of agricultural land in the lower reaches of the stream and inadequate drainage in the head water areas.

The project calls for three flood water retarding structures, six miles of levees and 27 miles of channel improvement in combination with extensive land treatment measures.

Before work began on the Misteguy project, uncontrolled water caused an estimated annual damage of more than \$200,000. Most of these losses will be eliminated when the program is completed.

As in all projects carried out under the Watershed Act, communities in this watershed will receive more than a dollar in benefits for every dollar expended.

Earl Fenton, assistant state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, said work on the channel of the middle branch of Cass River in Sanilac County will begin next summer. Work has progressed on the watersheds of

Farm Creek in Gladwin County, Fowlerville drain in Livingston County, Sturgeon River in Dickinson County and the Jo drain in Midland County. Residents in the Pinnebog River watershed in Huron County have recently submitted a formal application for assistance.

The watershed and flood prevention program by local people is an important phase in community development efforts. It

will also contribute significantly to the much needed protection and development of precious water resources.

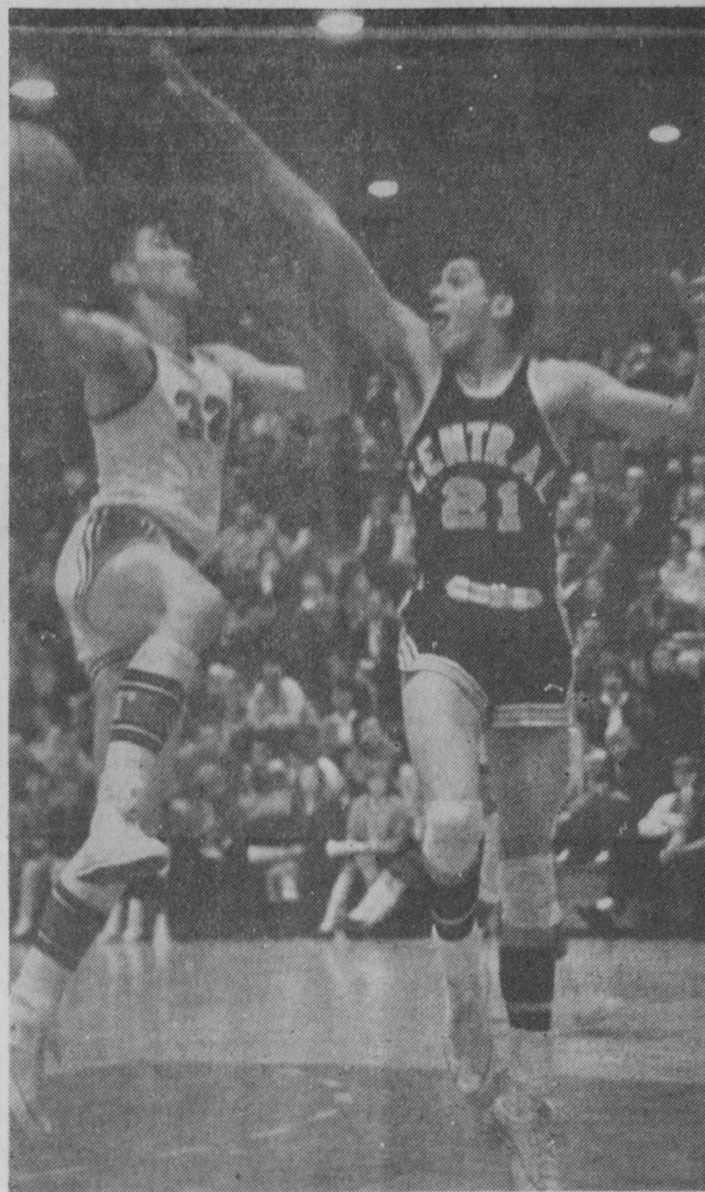

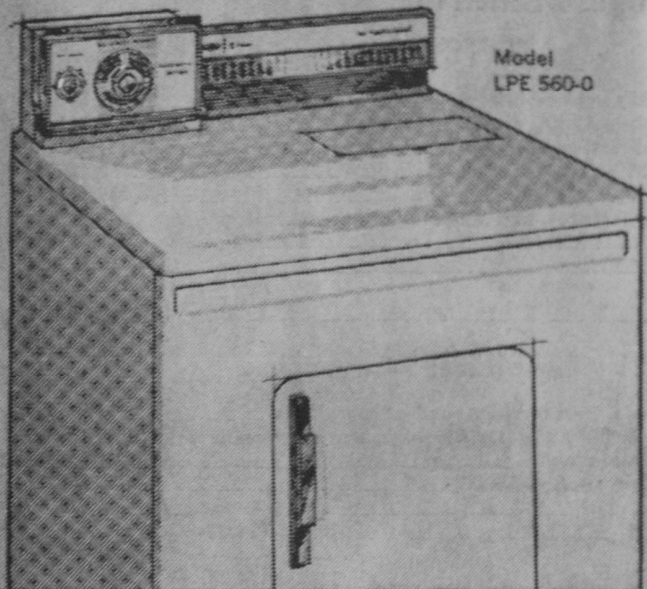

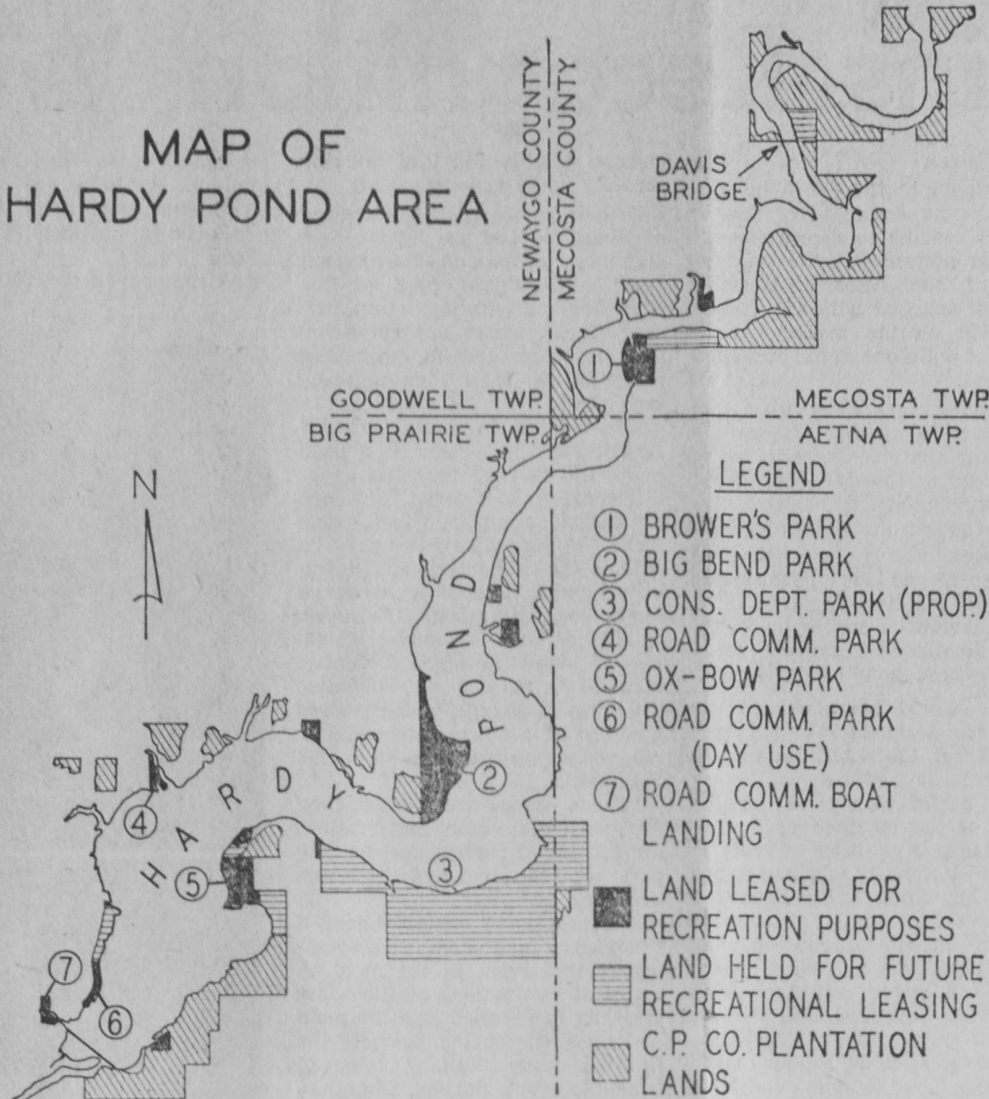

Social Security Hunts Persons for MA Benefits

Nearly 2,000,000 persons are being sought in a huge missing persons hunt being conducted by the Social Security Administration.

Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, said these people may be eligible for hospital and medical insurance benefits provided by the social security amendments of 1965.

These people 65 or over are now eligible under the new broad program of health insurance known popularly as medicare. But, they are unknown to the Social Security Administration because they have not taken steps to sign up under the program.

The missing persons are divided into two groups, Ellifritz said. Over 900,000 are those over 65 who have never filed claims for benefits, usually because they are still working. Another 800,000 over 65 do not have enough credit for work under social security to get benefits.

These missing persons or members of their families are urged to get in touch with their social security offices without delay to establish benefit rights so they can receive health insurance and other benefits when the program goes into effect July 1.

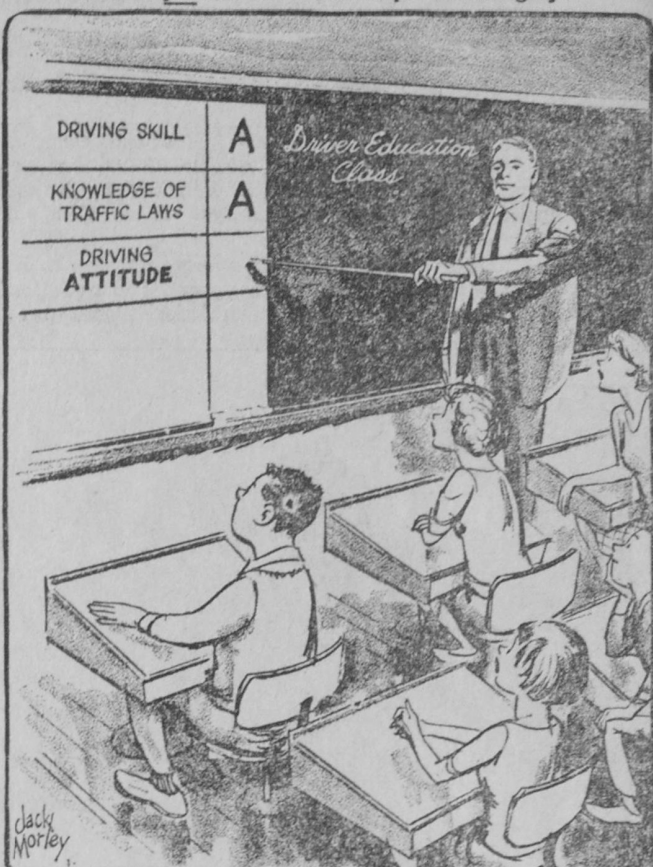

Sawyer Canoe Co. Gains Recognition With Expansion

A name familiar to international canoe racing enthusiasts is fast becoming recognized as a producer of top quality canoes.

Ralph Sawyer, five-time winner of the AuSable River Marathon and holder of championships in many other canoe races in the

United States and Canada, has been associated for the past 12 months with Robert Grampré in the Sawyer Canoe Company, Oscoda.

And success appears to be coming their way. The new firm's 18-foot-long Safari model was a dis-

trict winner in a Michigan Week contest last May to pick the state's outstanding manufactured product.

In addition to the canoe building business, the two men offer canoe rental service at their new location at the mouth of the Au-

Sable River.

Getting into the canoe business came as no accident for Sawyer. Always seeking to slice a few seconds or minutes off the running time of the AuSable Marathon and not satisfied with the canoes available on the market, he decided to build one to his own specifications.

It sounds easy, but what followed was a number of years of practical study where Sawyer brought his knowledge of canoes into play gained through years of experience on the mighty AuSable. Sawyer canoes are designed and developed for performance, function and handling ease. Since 1958, handmade canoes by Sawyer have dominated canoe racing events throughout North America.

The Oscoda-manufactured canoes are designed and hand-crafted for the discriminating canoe enthusiast who demands maximum performance and quality. Many of the outstanding features include: Low position of seats for improved stability and easier paddling; low bows and silhouette to reduce cross wind disturbances and in directional control; minimum keel rake to reduce water draft and water resistance while improving maneuverability and shallow water travel; flat bottom (20 inches wide at center extending well out to the ends) in-

creases stability and load carrying capacity while reducing draft.

Sawyer canoes are manufactured of fiberglass and are lighter than aluminum canoes. A permanent color is an integral part of the structure and painting is unnecessary. These canoes are quiet and fiberglass has strength properties much greater than aluminum and even steel.

The secret to building a successful fiberglass canoe is a good mold and Sawyer now has four different models: Sport, designed for casual outings, 15 feet, nine inches in length and weighs 55 pounds; guide special, an 18-footer weighing 70 pounds designed for outdoor enthusiasts; the super, an 18-foot, six-inch model weighing 65 pounds designed for canoe racing; the Safari, an 18-footer weighing 75 pounds, which is combined with a square stern motor mount for power and speed on the long haul.

"These canoes are not designed for production ease, but, rather, for functional performance on the part of the canoeists," states Grampré.

The process of manufacturing a fiberglass canoe starts with spraying colored resin in the mold. A series of laminations of fiberglass are then hand-rolled into the mold and after the curing period, the finished canoe hull is removed from the mold. Surplus fiberglass

is trimmed away and extruded aluminum gunwales are then attached. Fiberglass seats are also manufactured and installed by the Oscoda firm.

The company now utilizes a 40-

by 80-foot building for its manufacturing operation. In addition to the two owners, one full-time employee is hired at present and production is expected to be expanded this year.

Grampré became interested in the business through his brother, who is a canoe racer. "It sounded like too good a product to remain in limited production," he said.

On Thursday, December 16, on Michigan Outdoors TV program you welcomed letters of suggestions on control of the deer herd. This is what I can't understand. What I have in my possession is a letter from the conservation department game division dated March 18, 1965, in answer to a letter sent March 12, 1965, pleading with you to do something in this specific area (Iosco County). Yet this letter, written nine months before this deer season, would have eliminated the pile of letters in protest that you have on your desk right now and yet you asked for more letters December 16.

I am more in the dark than ever before as to the policy the department is following. Am I to assume that the policy in the past has been erroneous?

What I cannot understand is in

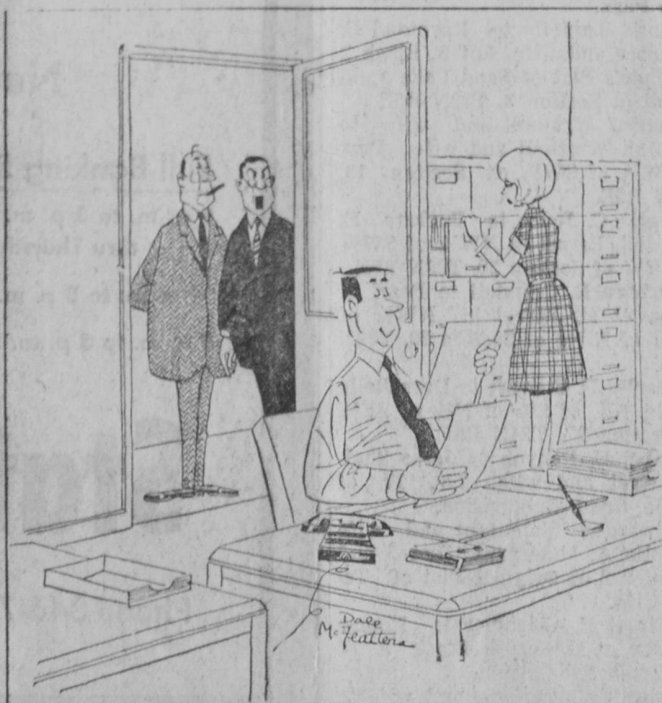
the letter you answered, stating that you would be very careful what you would do in this area in November 1965, and signed by David Arnold of the game section. How could the department turn right around and allow over 13,000 antlerless permits in this area when we do not have that many deer with or without horns in the total area?

I know starvation has been over estimated. This is obvious to the casual observer in the woods, because we all know that private individuals and local organizations have the money to feed these deer or the herd we had 20 years ago, so no longer can you people go on the starvation kick.

What is needed now is less technical theorizing and more truer evaluation of what the deer herd really is in specific areas; such as, the true woodsman of old that went into the woods 12 months out of the year and not the one or two-week armchair experts that we have heard from so much in the past.

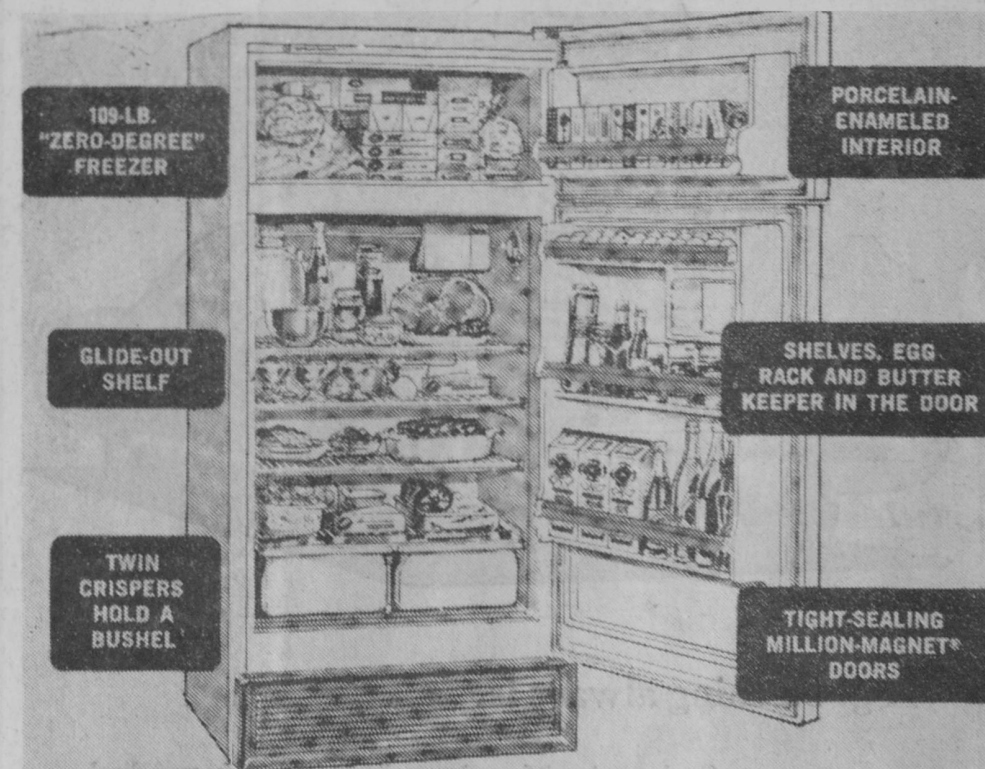
If you claim to be interested in public opinion, a couple of other naturalists and myself will draw up a course of action to follow immediately in this area.

Sheriff's '65 Report Lists 23 Violent Deaths in Iosco Co.

According to a report read at today's (Wednesday) meeting of the board of supervisors, Iosco County had 23 violent deaths during 1965.

The annual report of Iosco Sheriff's Department revealed that there were four drownings, seven traffic deaths, one hunting fatality, four persons were killed by fire or electrocuted, two died by asphyxiation and there was one accidental shooting.

This compared to 11 persons meeting violent death the previous year. Traffic fatalities were down from the eight in 1964 and there was one death each in the categories of hunting, suicide and fire. There were no drownings in 1964.

In other matters, the report revealed that there were fewer prisoners in jail during the past year. During 1965, there were 528 prisoners lodged, as compared to 563

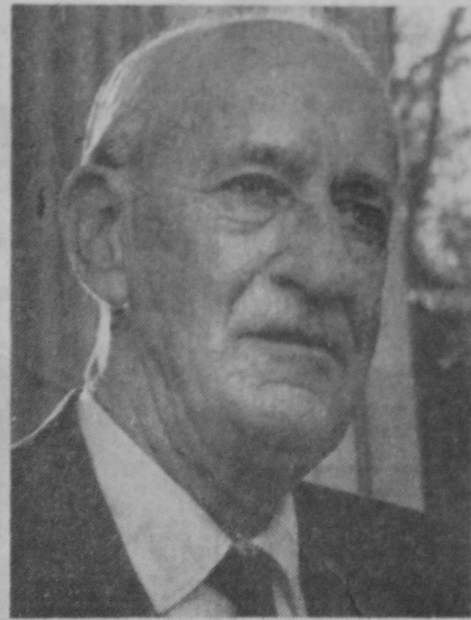

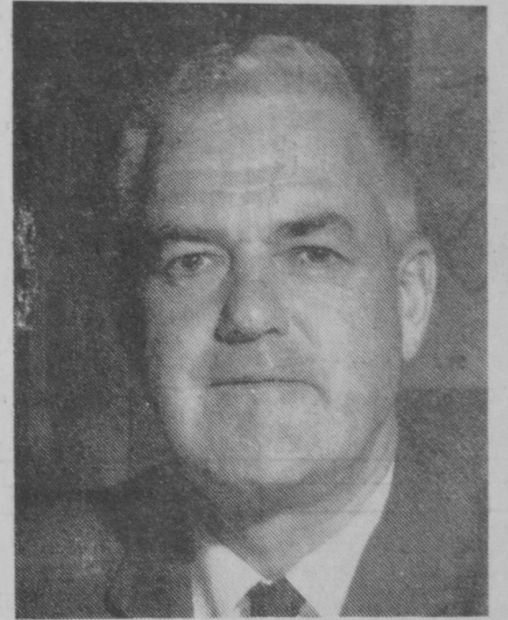

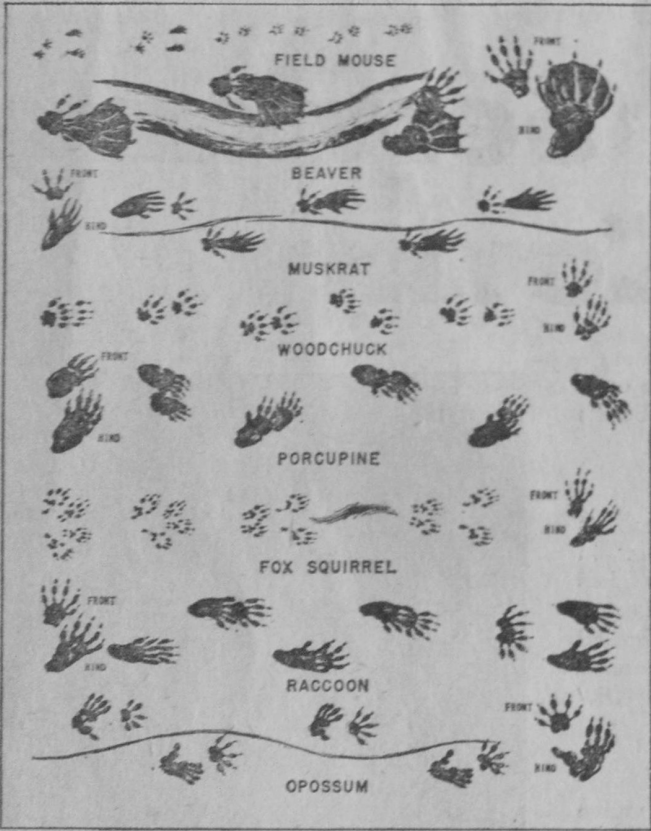

MERRY MODS... TWINKLING TWINS

HERE IS A DOUBLE DOSE OF FASHION NEATLY PACKED IN TWO PATTERN ENVELOPES!

As you know, versatility is yours when you sew your own clothes. We are showing you two of the many styles you can create from Simplicity patterns 6122 and 6096.

The high waisted check and stripe combination can be made into an equally as lovely corduroy print... a smooth creamy velvet date dress... a brilliant wool crepe... or, a feminine and flattering printed wool challis.

The polka dotted trimmed skimmer is shown here in grey flannel but you could try using a pretty houndstooth check with braid trim around the neck and sleeves (which could, of course, be warmly 3/4 length)... or, as a slim wool flannel sheath sporting two perky rouchs of buttons on either side.

BEHIND THE SCENES... is the proper backing! Sometimes called underlinings, they are a most important part of your sewing and are used for stability, body or to give a special effect in a completed garment. Backings differ in construction from linings in that they are cut from the same pattern pieces as the outer garment, stitched to the wrong side of the corresponding outer sections and the two layers are treated as one.

CRISP CHIC If you are doing a skirt or an A-line dress which should stand out or have a sculptured, carved look, you will need a fairly crisp backing. Should you try using one of insufficient body, your garment will not have the proper shape and would look wilted—no matter how beautifully planned or sewn it is.

SOFT AND FLOWING If you decide on making one of the very popular dirndl skirts which are now sweeping the country, you will need a soft, lightweight fabric which will gather easily. This is also true of draped bodices or cowl necklines where backing is needed for stability but must not make the line stiff and unattractive.

HOW TO! These are the two most delightful words in the vocabulary of new devotees to home sewing. For example, our polka dot tie-collar shift is a "How to Sew" pattern (to say nothing of being delightfully simple to sew) and it features a special lesson on "How to Apply Trims." You'll have many ideas for the dress you feel would be just right for your wardrobe and it will help to stimulate your own creative urges... (and, of course, this is the most fun in sewing.)

I, too, have a "how-to" for you. It's a leaflet explaining the art of backings and is complete with brand names and helpful hints. Family Living Education

Hello Everyone!
We learned a great deal from Carlton Edwards, Michigan State University housing specialist, at the workshop meeting last week.

All the information cannot be shared with you here, but I am going to give you some pointers. You are invited to ask for more details about any of them.

Every family really needs three houses in their lifetime—one as a beginning family, another with the growing family and a third as a retirement home.

Some families get answers by buying and selling. Others have to make one house do. This can mean additions and remodeling.

Or, consider the trend to building truss rafter-type houses. Why? There need be no inside supporting walls. This means you can have complete freedom for space arrangement inside and no division of the space need be permanent (except plumbing fixture areas). It is done by using moveable storage walls and dividers in various combinations.

Bathroom location in the sleeping area—maybe. It just could be more accessible and useful in the activity area of the home. It is used more during the day than at night.

Many homes have more than one bathroom area. Interesting results come from planning a compartment bathroom—one location, several private areas.

New plastic piping (unless prevented in your area by a building code) is best for all but hot water lines. Plastic is inert and noncorrosive. It installs quickly and easily, also repairs easily if necessary.

Shut-off's ahead of every faucet are worth every cent of extra investment. Plan to check their operation efficiency twice a year. Fourth of July and Christmas makes it easy to remember.

Every family member should know where and how to turn on and off the water, electric, gas supply and equipment using them. Use labels to help them remember. Chances are real need occurs rarely but requires immediate action when it does occur.

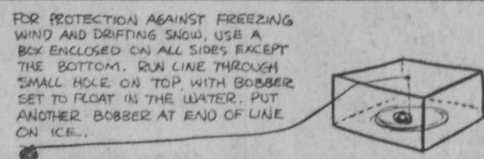

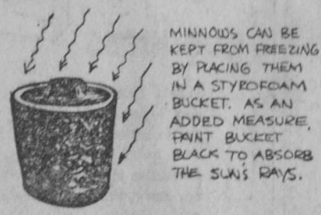
De-icing Ideas for Winter Fishing

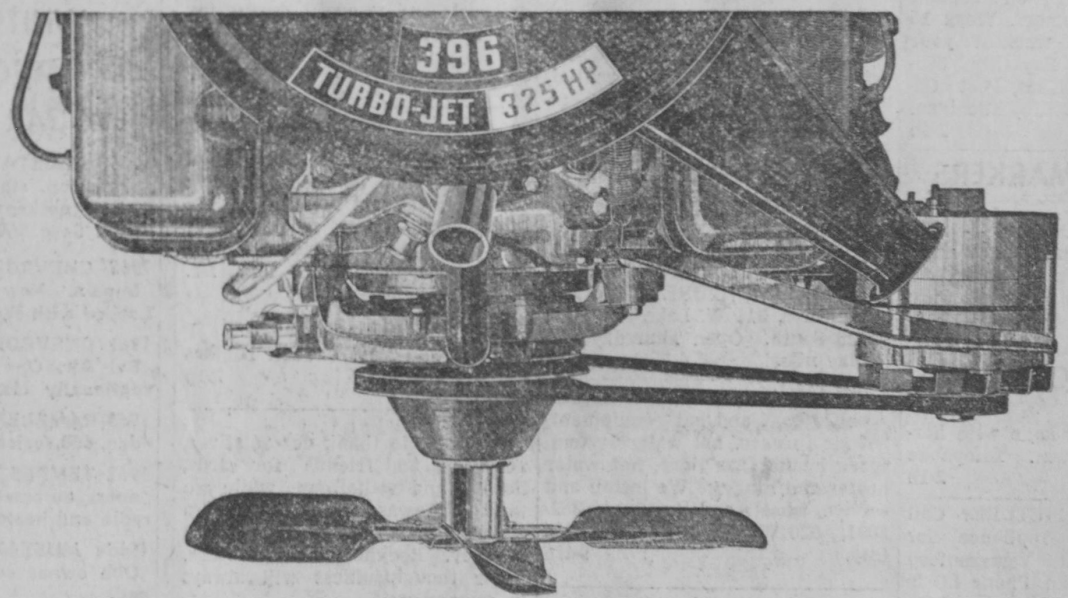

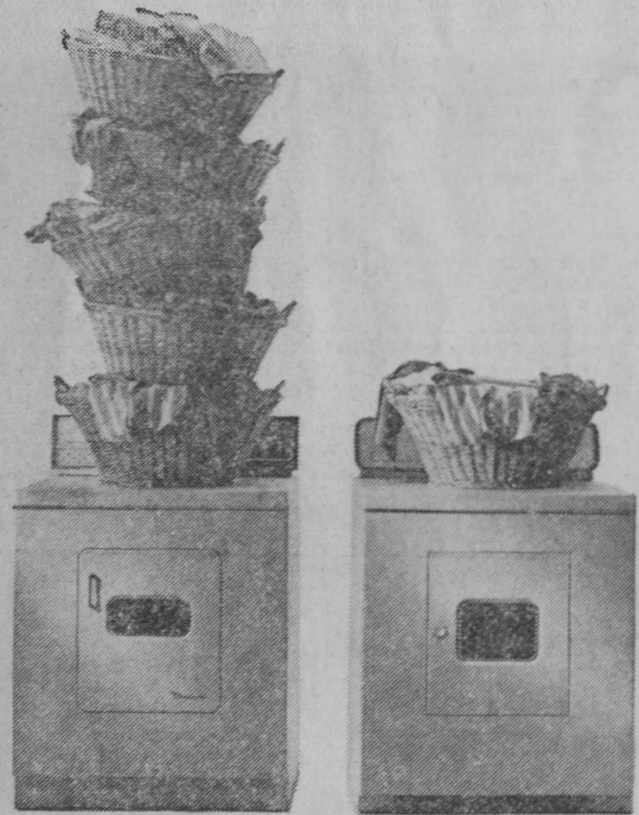
