New Medical Care Facility to be Dedicated July 31

Plans are completed for a dedication and open house at the new Isosco Medical Care Facility on July 31, according to a report Monday by Clarence Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee.

"Many distinguished guests will be present and highlighting the program will be former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke, Harrisville, giving the dedicatory address," said Everett.

The program will start at 2:00 p. m. and open house at the facility located at the west limits of Tawas City on Plank Road will be held to 6:00 p. m.

Everett reports that guided tours will be given throughout the facility following the dedication program.

After almost a year of construction, the facility is now completed. This new 50-bed, long-term, extended care facility is located near a group of Norway pine trees.

With nearly 24,000 square feet located on one floor, the facility has a well equipped physical therapy department and a diversional therapy department, making available an efficient rehabilitation program to its patients. The services of the physical therapy de-

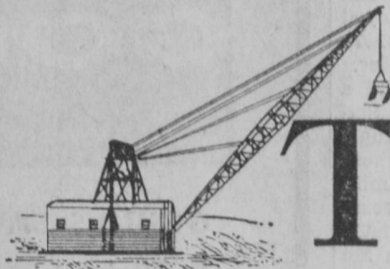
partment will also be made available, under orders of physicians, on an out-patient basis.

Spacious windows enhance the day room and dining room which is furnished with colorful Danish modern furniture. A large central nurses' station enables rapid access to the ward, semi-private and private patient rooms. Included in this modern building is a barber and beauty shop.

The facility also has its own large modern laundry and kitchen. "Thanks to the support of the people of Isosco County and the united efforts of the board of su-



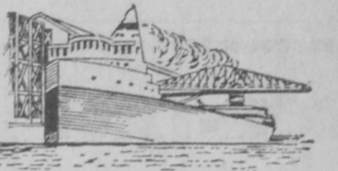

Fire Danger Still Critical in North

Firefighters and farmers, as well as most "dehydrated" residents of Northern Michigan, were hoping Tuesday morning that a light sprinkle of rain would turn into a two-day shower.

Woods, brush lands, pastures and grain fields were tinder dry Monday. According to the Michigan Department of Conservation's fire office at East Tawas, the fire spreading index reached 66-71—the most extreme dry condition registered this year.

The United States Forest Service reported it had dropped use of its index system and considered woodlands as being in a dead stage—the same as early spring. The governor's proclamation pro-

hibiting use of camp fires or smoking in wooded areas has been in effect since July 7. It will remain in force until the northern half of the state receives sufficient rain to alleviate dangerous forest fire conditions.

Fire Officers Gary Dutcher and Roy Milnes of the conservation department believe that three fires on Saturday and Sunday were caused by the careless use of matches or cigarette butts being thrown from automobile windows.

This department, along with the United States Forest Service and Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department, stopped one fire Saturday afternoon south of Bissonette Road in Oscoda Township. A total of 5.4 acres was burned.

One volunteer fireman lost his Jeep truck equipped with a pump and expensive radio communications system when it stalled in the path of the fire. It was completely destroyed.

Another fire was stopped by the three departments that same day at Foote Dam.

A volunteer fireman received serious burns Sunday afternoon while the three departments battled a blaze on Loud Drive east of VanEtan Lake. One acre of jackpine was burned before the fire was stopped.

Council Approves River Dredging

Temporary dredging of the Tawas River mouth to allow passage of small craft into Tawas Bay was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council. A combination of high water and prevailing winds closed the mouth nearly two weeks ago.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, reported Monday night that an attempt was made last Saturday to use city equipment to remove a sand bar. This failed when the city's dragline could not operate along the edge of the water.

A private contractor with a dragline equipped with crawler-type traction is to be hired to do the work this week.

State Sen. Robert Richardson was here Friday to investigate the possibility of using state funds to aid the city in improving the river mouth.

Permission to remove sand from the river was given by George Taack of the Michigan Department of Conservation's land division.

To do an adequate job of dredging, Bublitz said it would require an expenditure of \$1,000 or more. He said the principal need at the river mouth was shoring along the channel to prevent a buildup of sand. This would be an expensive undertaking.

Senator Richardson, who is to make his regular visit here today (Wednesday) at the Isosco County Building, is to meet with city officials to discuss any progress at the state level.

Tourist Festival Termed Huge Financial Success

Perfect weather conditions and large crowds of vacationers turned the fourth annual Michigan Tourist Festival into a financial success.

A spokesman for the sponsoring Tawas Chamber of Commerce revealed Monday that the local group received a profit of more than \$1,300 from the carnival which operated from Tuesday through Sunday on Newman Street.

"It sure seemed nice to have perfect weather for the second consecutive chamber-sponsored event this year," said Leonard Calabrese, president, as he viewed Saturday afternoon's huge throng along Tawas Bay. "Memories of previous wash-outs are now forgotten after the successful winter carnival and now a repeat performance for the tourist festival."

Highlighting this year's program was a full slate of activities on Saturday, starting with a parade through the Tawasess. Handled by Tawas Area Senior Citizens Club, the parade was well supervised and had a surprisingly large number of units.

Another feature of the program was the water show presented by the Cass Lake Ski Club. Held at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, several hundred persons lined the shore of Tawas Bay to watch an outstanding exhibition of water skiing and acrobatics.

Included in the afternoon's show was an aerial demonstration by three airmen parachutists from

Wurtsmith Air Force Base, who made a free fall landing in Tawas Bay.

Highlight of the day came with the selection and crowning of Miss Wendy Defibaugh, 17, East Tawas, as the tourist festival queen. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Defibaugh. Wendy will be a senior this fall at Tawas Area High School.

Named as runner up by the judges was Judy Lemon, 17, Alabaster. Other contestants included Linda Fallu, 17; Susan Moore, 19; Elsie Osborne, 18; Edith Donovan, 22; and Tiresa Walt, 17.

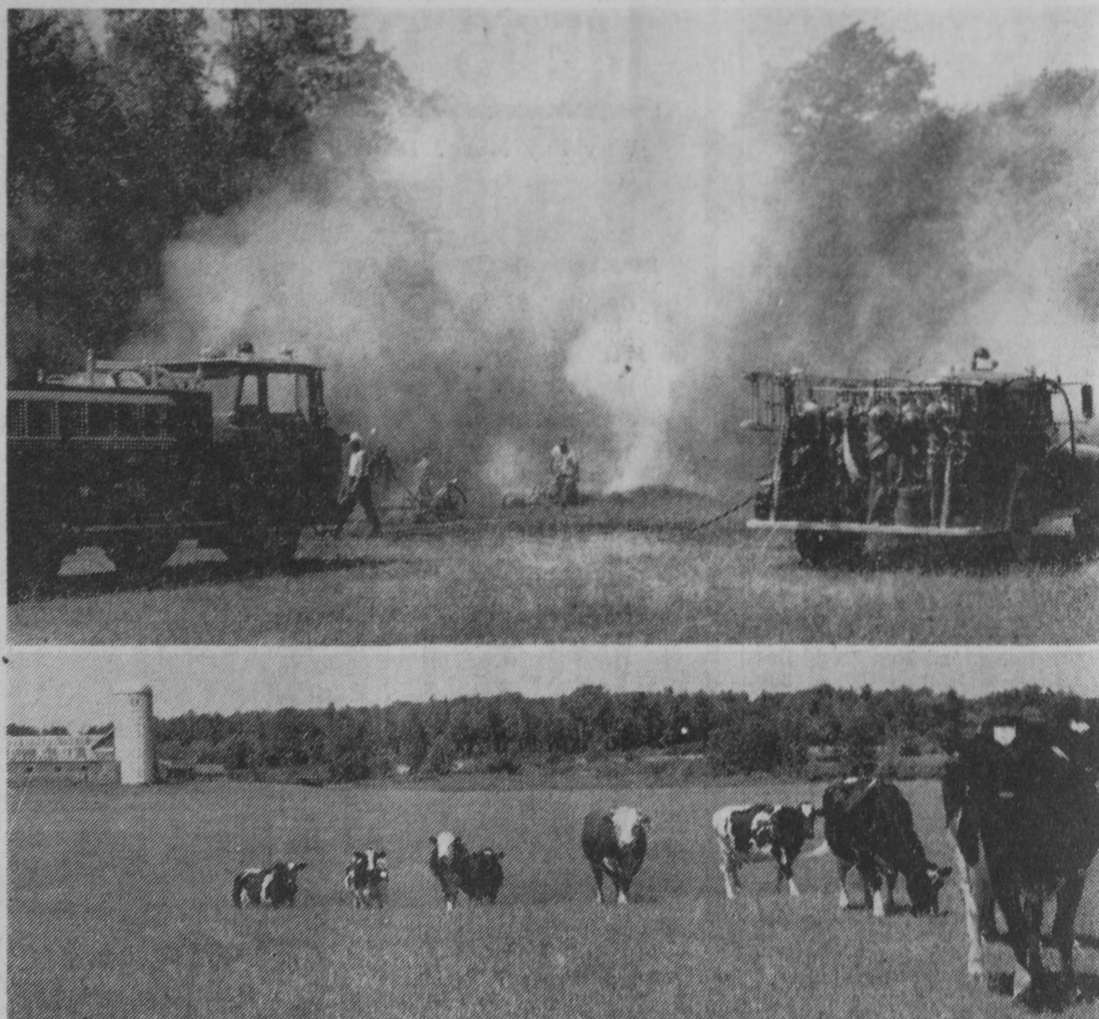

East Tawas Youth Dies of Bike Crash Injuries

A 16-year-old East Tawas boy died Monday morning of injuries sustained late Saturday afternoon when his rented motor bike was struck by a motorist at the intersection of Fifth Avenue and First Street, Tawas City.

The victim was William Alan Smith Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Smith, 604 Sawyer Street, East Tawas. The boy would have been a senior this fall at Tawas Area High School.

The youth, traveling south on Fifth Avenue, met a car driven by

Nelson N. Schlicker, 26, Lincoln, in the middle of the intersection.

According to Tawas City Police Chief George Westcott's report, Schlicker, who was headed west on First Street, disregarded a stop sign at the intersection. He was ticketed at the scene for his failure to stop at the intersection.

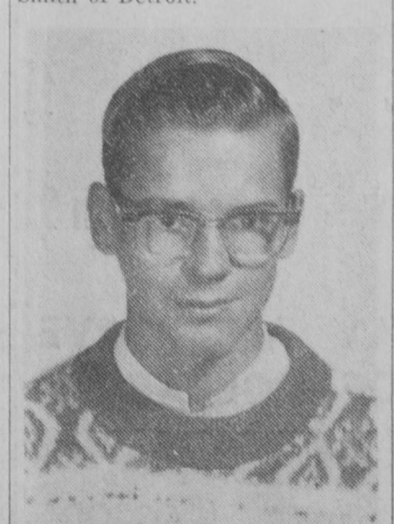
The youth was thrown over the top of the Schlicker vehicle and landed 39 feet from the point of impact. Witnesses at the scene said the boy landed on his head. He was not wearing a crash helmet.

Westcott's report indicated that the Schlicker vehicle had skidded 46 feet before the impact and then traveled another 80 feet before stopping.

Smith had rented the motorbike a short time earlier from an East Tawas rental agency.

Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday, July 20, (today), 2:00 p. m., at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas. The Rev. Robert Morrison will officiate and burial will be in Greenwood Cemetery.

Surviving are his parents, two brothers, Michael, 14, and Keith, 11; grandmother, Mrs. Grace Smith of Detroit.

Peoples State Bank Offers Michigan Bankard Program

L. G. McKay Jr., chairman of the board, has announced that Peoples State Bank is now participating in the Michigan Bankard charge plan. Participation in the Michigan Bankard program means that Peoples State Bank will enroll merchant members and accept applications for charge cards from individuals throughout the bank's service area, McKay said.

More than 300,000 Michigan residents are cardholders and some 8,000 establishments are already members of the charge plan, according to McKay. Although some merchants in the Peoples State Bank service area are already members of the charge plan, it is anticipated that merchant participation in the Isosco County area will increase rapidly in the next few months, he said.

Persons applying for Michigan Bankard credit privileges will receive a merchant directory in addition to their charge cards. The directory serves as a "shopper's guide" for charge card users.

The listings cover almost the full range of consumer needs, including purchases for the home and car, apparel, hobbies, recreation, travel, beauty care, TV and appliance sales and service, mot-

els, hotels, restaurants and a host of other services.

There are no membership fees or dues and no service charge when the cardholder pays his bill within 25 days of the statement date. If the cardholder prefers, he can budget his payments by paying as little as 10 percent each month plus a small service charge on the unpaid balance. Cardholders do not have to have an account in any of the more than 40 Michigan banks participating in the plan and the cards are honored all over the state.

For the merchant, the Michigan Bankard plan offers several benefits, McKay explained. By receiving immediate cash credit for every Michigan Bankard sale, the merchant has access to working capital that would otherwise be tied up in accounts receivable.

Record keeping, credit checking, charge card issuance, billing and collecting are all handled by the Michigan Bankard Center, relieving the merchant of these burdens and protecting him against credit risks.

"Our charge plan will cost the merchant less than if he set up his own credit operation and less than any comparable type of national credit card system," McKay said.

Two— COUSINS DROWN IN BAY

Two Auburn youths, Joyce Knight, 13, and Ronald Wackerly, 20, first cousins, drowned Tuesday afternoon less than 100 yards offshore in Saginaw Bay near the Singing Bridge.

Witnesses said that Joyce and Ronald, along with three other young people vacationing at a cabin near the bridge with their families, had gone swimming in Saginaw Bay.

A heavy undercurrent caused by a high wind blowing toward shore swept the youngsters into deep water. David Knight, 17, and Marilyn Knight, 26, brother and sister of Joyce, along with Jeannette Bergman, 11, Meridian, Mississippi, were able to reach shore.

Ronald, described as a strong swimmer, attempted to rescue his cousin. He was last seen alive holding the girl as four-foot-high waves crashed over them.

Carl Wackerly, Ronald's father, took a small boat out to rescue them but his outboard motor failed within a few feet of the youngsters. The boat tipped over and the man, who was wearing a lifejacket, was thrown into the water.

An Isosco County Sheriff's Department patrol boat also swamped later during the search for Joyce's body. Deputy Jerry Kruse and two coast guardsmen probably owed their lives to the lifejackets they were wearing.

Ronald's body was recovered shortly after the drowning and the search for the girl's body continued under the direction of Arenac County Sheriff Russell McCullough. Joining the search with the two sheriffs' departments and the coast guard were Michigan State Police from East Tawas, who received the original call for help.

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Council Proposes Ordinance Requiring Motor Bike Helmets

An ordinance requiring all motor bike riders to wear protective headgear was proposed at Monday night's East Tawas Council meeting by Alderman Charles Schreck.

The proposal met with complete approval of the council and City Attorney Michael Freel is to start work this week on preparing an ordinance. Action may be taken at a special meeting next week.

This discussion came on the heels of several accidents in the area involving motor bikes, one of which resulted in the death of an East Tawas boy this week.

The state is considering similar legislation but no action has been taken as yet.

Police Chief Donald Doeking expressed the opinion that the city should take some action immediately requiring the wearing of helmets during the operation of motor bikes, believing that fatal injuries could be eliminated in most cases.

In other business, the council continued its discussion on a proposed area sanitary authority for joint operation of a disposal ground, Tawas City and adjoining

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Selective Service Law Changes Affects College Students

Recent changes in selective service regulations and how they affect the draft status of college students were explained this week by Mrs. Evelyn Price, clerk of the Iosco County Draft Board.

To be considered for deferment as an undergraduate student, the activity in study must be considered to be in the national interest, the registrant must be enrolled as a full time student in a recognized college, university or similar institution of learning, have no breaks in his educational pattern except for normal summer vacations, have completed one year or more of his school program and achieved a relative class standing in his last year which places him in the upper one-half of the male students in the freshman class, the upper two-thirds of the sophomore class or the upper three-fourths of the junior class as appropriate.

Those who took the selective service qualification test in May or June and attained a score of 70 or higher will be considered for deferment on the basis of their test score if class standing information is not available or is lower than that required above.

To be eligible for deferment as a graduate student, the registrant must have already been enrolled in graduate studies. If not, he must have been in the upper one-fourth of his senior class or attained a score of 80 or higher on the selective service qualification test.

Under these new regulations, students in their first year of college will be retained in class 1-A, unless eligible for a lower classification and ordered for their armed forces physical examination during the school year. At the end of their first year, they will be considered for deferment on the basis of evidence submitted which verifies entitlement to same under current undergraduate student deferment rules.

By law, the registrant bears full responsibility for keeping the local board informed of his status. If no new information, such as qualification test score or report of class standing, is received, the board must proceed with the classification of the student based upon information available in his file. Students should, therefore, ask their schools to verify their class standing at the end of each school year and their enrollment each fall.

Students who are not entitled to or lose the right to student deferment but whose files contain evidence of full time attendance at school when ordered for induction will be ordered and postponed until either the end of the academic year or they cease to serve satisfactorily, whichever occurs first. Students in this category are classified in class 1-S(C) while students meeting the criteria for deferment are classified in class 2-S.

The council accepted the resignation of J. E. LaBerge from the city park commission and named William Look as his replacement. Mr. LaBerge resigned because of the press of his business.

Recent verbal resignation of other park board members has not been recognized by the council. Considerable discussion was heard Monday night concerning an apparent confusion of authority over actual supervision of park matters. One city ordinance gives the park board control of management and another directs that park board action is subject to approval of the city council.

When the council recently overruled the park board allowing teen dances along the beach, it was stated that the entire board turned in its verbal resignation.

A special meeting has been held since then in an effort to patch matters between the two groups. Regular meeting of the park board is to be held this week and several councilmen expressed the hope that commission members would continue their splendid work on improving this important civic project.

City About Ready to Construct Sewer Line Addition

After months of negotiation and discussion, it appeared Monday night as though the last hurdle would finally be reached toward construction of a sanitary sewer system to serve both sides of US-23 from Matthews Street south to a point near the river bridge.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, reported to the city council that 16 of 17 easements needed for the project had been signed and returned to the city hall.

The council directed City Attorney Alf C. Watson to notify owners of the last parcel of property not signing an easement that condemnation proceedings would start Wednesday noon on acquiring the right to cross their land with the sewer.

This proposed sewer has been in the talking stage for more than 10 years but, when property owners failed to authorize easements for construction of a main, the project was dropped.

In recent months, the majority of property owners became interested in obtaining municipal sanitary sewer service and the council authorized use of condemnation proceedings if needed.

One property owner within the district was assured at the meeting that signing of an easement for the proposed sanitary sewer would not prevent future construction over the main.

Bublitz reported that original engineering obtained in the project had been updated and would again be checked by Spicer Engineering Company before formal action is taken on establishment of an assessment district.

In other business, a report from the cemetery board indicated that Councilman Russell A. Rollin Sr. had been named as the board's new chairman. New members are Charles Eich and William Clark.

Rollin said the group had held two meetings last week and was now in the process of making a new plan of the cemetery. Professional engineering assistance is to be obtained.

The council gave permission for location of an asphalt paving plant to be located at the West Tawas Yards of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. Work on paving US-23 through Tawas City is to start August 1.

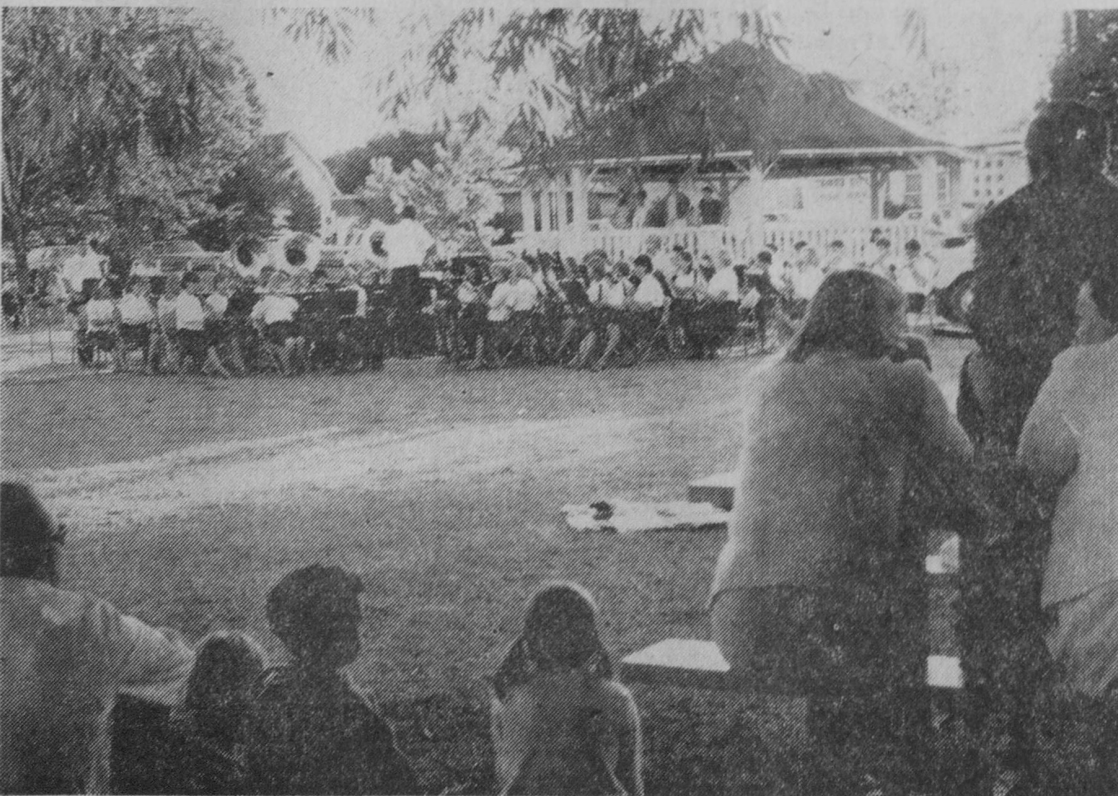

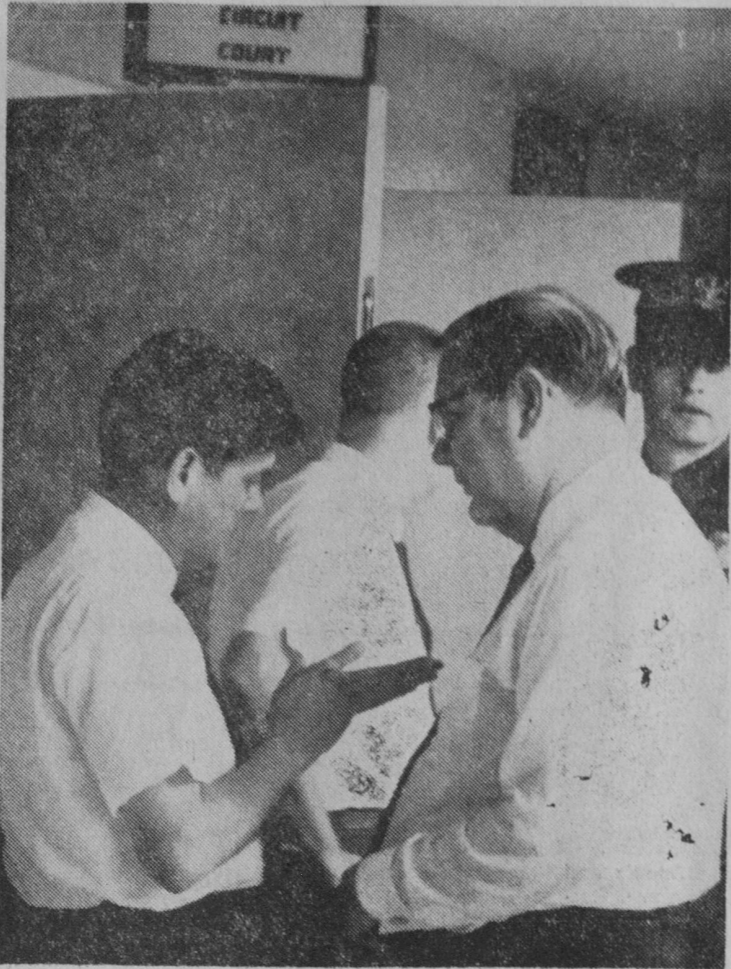

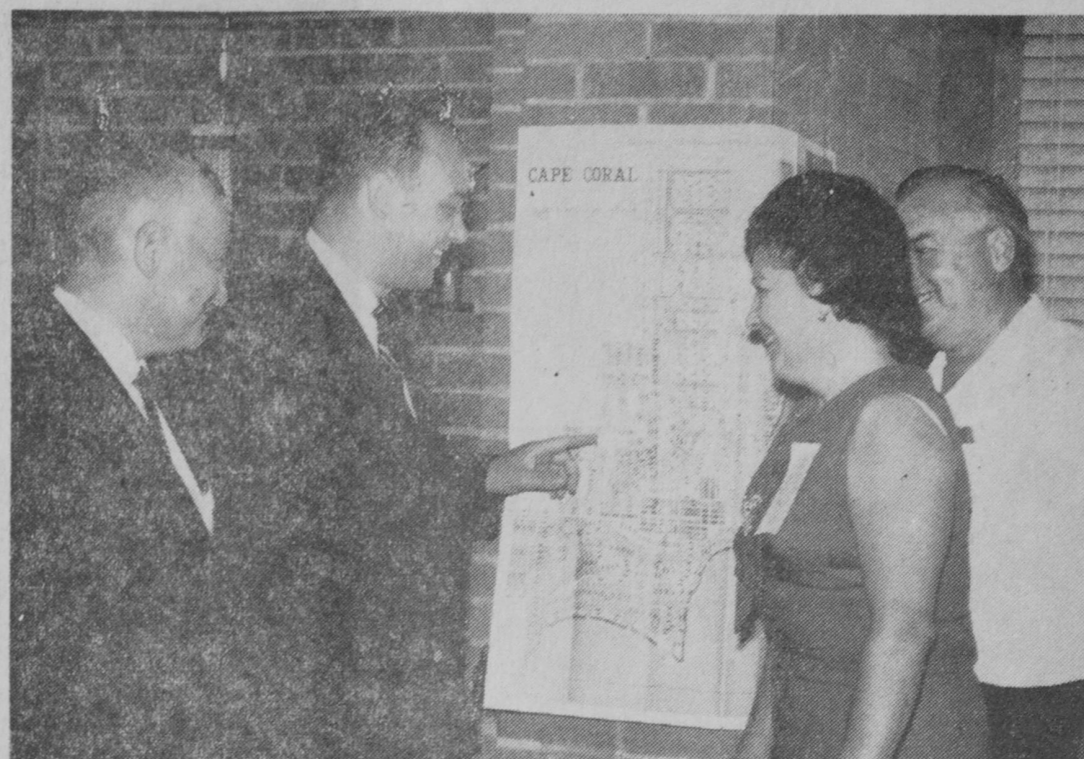

25 Years Ago—

The United States Civilian Defense Office is sponsoring a national movement to secure scrap aluminum to help overcome the temporary shortage of metal which is interfering with defense production. It is asked that unused aluminum articles be tossed on the scrap pile in the hope that enough of the metal will be collected to free material to build 2,000 badly needed fighting planes.

Gypsum rock for use in several Portland cement plants is now being quarried from deposits near Turner. While the deposits of gypsum rock in that locality have been long known to be present, the project is of recent origin and is being operated by Francis Weaver and Martin McCormick of Standish. A large crew of men is now employed at the quarry located on the Norman Staebler farm.

Michigan local boards will be requested to deliver an additional 750 registrants for induction into the army during July and August due to increased manpower requirements announced last week by the department of defense, states Col. Arthur A. Holmes, state director of selective service.

The previous July call for 2,225 men has been increased by 300. The August call for 2,980 men will be increased by 450. It is expected that the September call will require an additional 2,600 to 3,000 registrants to be delivered by Michigan local boards.

With approximately 9,000 men to be ordered for induction over the next three months, Michigan local boards will virtually exhaust the currently available pool of class I-A manpower. Local boards have been authorized to select married registrants in class I-A who do not have children to fill all outstanding calls.

With insufficient registrants available for induction at age 19, all local boards have been requested to tighten deferment requirements and screen additional manpower from among registrants previously deferred as students or for occupational and dependency reasons.

Michigan local boards have reported approximately 40,000 inductions and enlistments during the past 12 months.

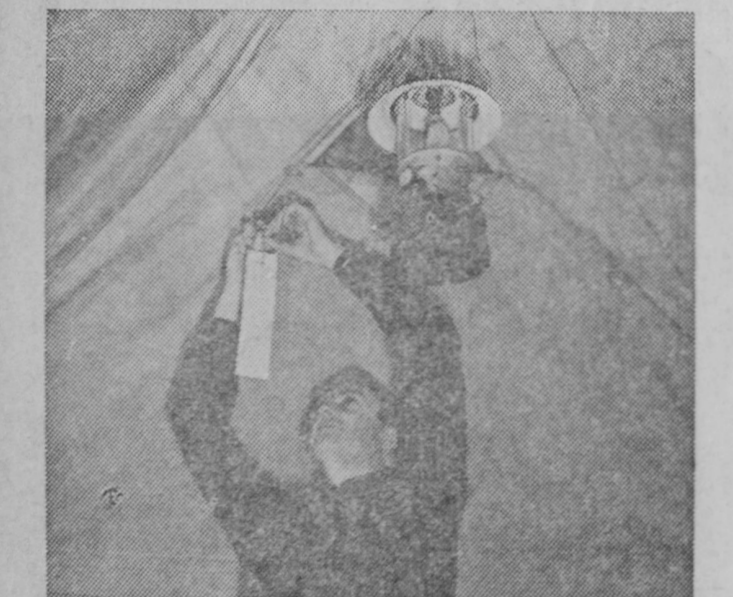

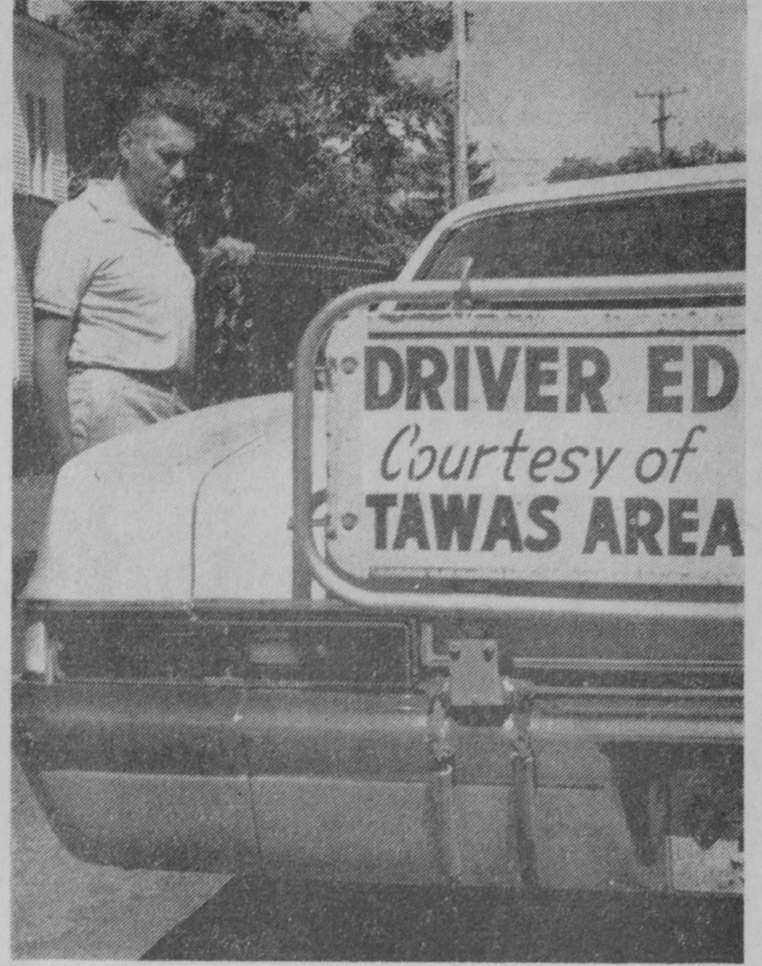

List 14 Dairy Herds in Iosco Test Program

There are 14 dairy herds in Iosco County on the dairy testing program. Herds owned by Waldo Curry and Harvey Odell use the official testing program which provides more detailed information than the owner-sampler program.
The 34 cow Curry herd tabulated 1,394 pounds milk and 46 pounds butterfat on the June report according to Duane Reinke, supervisor. Odell's 27 cows show a June total of 931 pounds milk, 34 pounds butterfat.
