

Iosco Plans Welcome for Governor Romney

Monday, June 6, is Romney Day in Iosco County. Republicans of Iosco and adjoining counties are going all out to make the day one to remember for the governor, who makes his first appearance here since the Michigan Tourist Festival last August. Merton Killey, chairman of the day for the county committee, said that the governor was scheduled to arrive here at 5:30 p. m. He will be

Governor Romney is to be guest of honor at a banquet held at the high school cafeteria. Ticket sales as of last Thursday totaled more than 200 and Killey believes that 400 or more persons will be seated in the cafeteria the night of the welcome.

"Enthusiasm has started to build over this banquet and we have received many requests for tickets from surrounding counties," said Killey. "It should prove to be one of the biggest affairs ever held here."

Romney will be at the high school auditorium starting at 6:30 p. m. to greet people who are on hand.

The governor is to be entertained by a performance of Tawas Area High School Band from 7:00 to 7:30 p. m., followed by dinner. Among those welcoming the visitor will be six "Romney Girls" from area high schools, dressed in blue skirts, white blouses and blue caps.

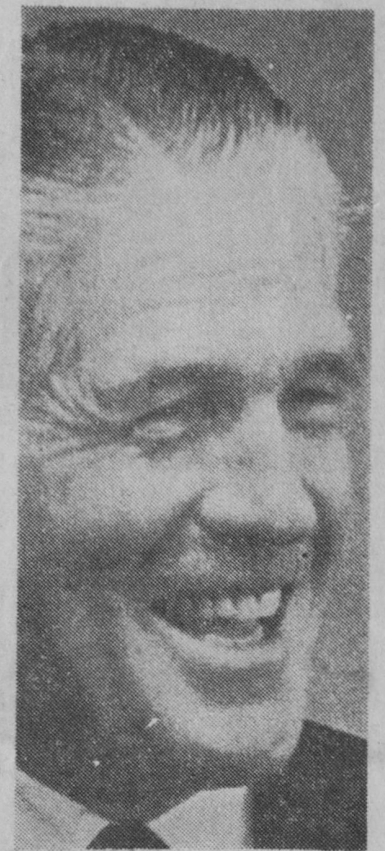
Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas will be master of ceremonies. Among those taking part will be William McLaughlin, vice chairman of the state central committee.

The banquet has been in planning for two months and a family-style beef dinner is to be served. A color guard from Wurtsmith Air Force Base is to greet the governor at the entrance of the building.

Killey said this was the first banquet held by the Iosco Republican Committee for a number of years and that members were going all out to make the governor's visit a memorable one. "He is making a special trip here just to get acquainted with the people of this county," said the chairman.

School Seeks Expansion of Vocational Training

Providing additional space and equipment for a proposed expansion of vocational training, plus funds for operating this program, will be decided by Tawas Area School District voters at the annual school election June 13.

Voters are being asked to continue a three-mill tax levy which was originally approved in 1961 to finance a pay-as-you-go school construction program. This special tax, which provided the new Tawas City Elementary Unit, addition to the East Tawas Elementary Unit and classroom construction at the high school, is due to expire this year.

Following several months study by a citizens' advisory committee of vocational training classes offered by the school, the board of education decided to ask voters to continue the three-mill tax program for another two years.

The three mills will provide approximately \$82,000 annually, based on the district's valuation of \$27,327,979. Two-thirds of the levy would go to a sinking fund for construction of new facilities and one-third would go for operation. In addition, five percent of the state aid payment received by the school, or about \$17,400, would be transferred to the sinking fund, as provided by law.

Under consideration by the board for the past two years has been a plan to construct a new shop building which would provide 6,960 square feet of floor space. This building would be attached to the south end of the high school building's west wing.

Although no decision has been made as yet as to the actual form of construction of the new shop building, it has been estimated that a steel and concrete block building would cost approximately \$80,000 and a brick veneer building would run in the neighborhood of \$112,000. It is expected that before construction would be utilized.

Present shop rooms would then be converted into classrooms for the junior high wing. As the final phase of the original pay-as-you-go plan, five classrooms are now under construction for junior high use and are to be completed by this fall. If approval is received on continuing the millage for another two years, conversion of the present shop area would provide three additional classrooms. The present art room and high school mathematics room would be turned over to junior high use, giving that department a cluster of 10 classrooms and would provide complete segregation from the high school.

This arrangement would still allow complete utilization of cafeteria facilities, the band room and auditorium by the junior high. The present junior high wing at the west end of the school would be taken over by high school classrooms.

The proposed new shop would provide an area 60 by 100 feet for vocational training. In addition, there would be a 30 by 32-foot art room. Restroom facilities would be provided in the new shop building and would be located so as to serve spectators attending events at the athletic field.

Providing an expanded vocational training program, plus segregation of seventh and eighth graders from the high school, has been of principal concern of the board of education and the reason behind the decision to ask voters

for a continuation of the three-mill program. In addition, the one mill for operation would satisfy expected state requirements that local contribution for school operation be at least 10 mills in order to qualify for full state aid.

The present 2,700 feet of floor space in the shop area is entirely inadequate for instructional purposes. The board plans to expand instruction in auto mechanics, metal and wood working, mechanical drawing and drafting. This instruction is to start in junior high, which at present receives no shop training.

By providing these additional facilities, Supt. Reynold Mick said last week that the proposed expansion of vocational training would allow students to further explore fields not otherwise available here in order to determine future careers for which the individual student is best suited.

"We do not expect to turn out expert mechanics, metal workers or carpenters, but the program would provide exposure to the student to better qualify him for a field for which he is best fitted," said Mick.

While vocational training has for years been an important field of training in larger metropolitan schools, necessary funds have been lacking in the smaller schools to provide this instruction. Tawas Area hopes to follow the pattern of vocational training now being provided by other schools in the area.

With this expansion, it is expected that one extra shop teacher will be hired. Through a shifting of emphasis on regular academic classroom teaching, however, other teachers in the system can also be utilized in the expanded vocational instruction.

This shift in emphasis will also tend to alleviate overcrowded conditions in present high school classrooms.

Receipt of the additional mill for school operation is most important, said the superintendent. While no state aid bill has been adopted as yet, it is a foregone conclusion that the one finally adopted will require 10 mills of local taxes to receive full benefit of state aid. If only nine mills are levied, the school would be penalized one-tenth of its total state aid—or \$34,000.

The school was recently commended by the University of Michigan, during an inspection for accreditation, on expanding its auto mechanics training and plans for expanding its vocational training program.

"The visitor recognized the difficulty of providing such instruction in the present inadequate shop area," said Mr. Mick.

Two Detroit Men Held in Break-In

Two Detroit area men are held at Iosco County Jail on charges of breaking and entering. One man is also charged with possessing an unregistered pistol.

The two men, Dennis W. Francisco, 18, and Edgar R. Smith, 21, were apprehended Sunday morning in a tool shed owned by Francis Drumm, located at Drumm's hunting camp northwest of the East Tawas Cemetery.

Harvey Smiley, a neighbor of Drumm's, heard someone shooting a rifle and went to investigate. He blocked Drumm's gate with his truck. Francisco and Smith ran into the woods but came out later and surrendered to state police. They are held under \$1,000 bond each.

ET Girl Injured in Boat Accident

A 17-year-old East Tawas girl was treated at Tawas Hospital for an injury received Monday afternoon in a boating accident on the north shore of Sand Lake.

Released after treatment for a back laceration was Teresa Walt.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that John Brugger, 18, Tawas City, was in the process of beaching his boat where a group of his friends were standing. The girl was struck and taken to the hospital by ambulance.

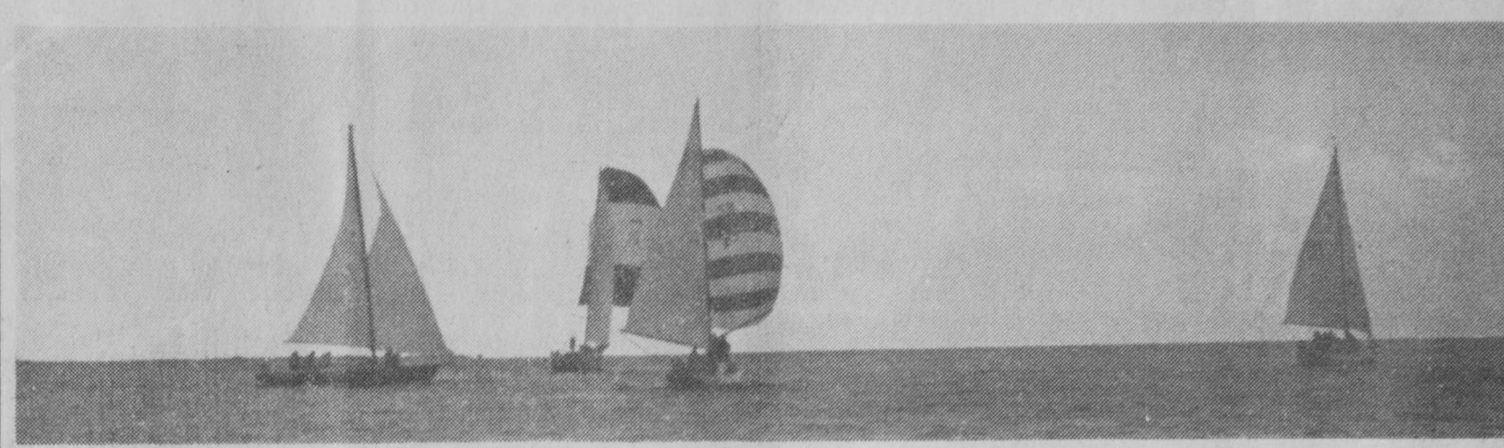

Weather Rough for SB Memorial Race

Tawas Bay Yacht Club's 1966 competitive sailing season got off to a screaming start Saturday as five big Mackinac class boats battled for the club's new rotating Memorial week-end trophy.

The race is aptly described as "screaming" because of the severe weather conditions encountered throughout 95 miles of sailing.

John Sutton, East Tawas, skipper of the 32½-foot-long Sea Fever, won first place in a corrected time of 14 hours, 11 minutes and five seconds, based on handicapping rules of the Cruising Club of America.

Second place went to A. B. Crow, Alpena Yacht Club, whose Crow's Nest was the first boat to cross the finish line Sunday morning. The other finisher was C. H. Moulthrop Jr., Saginaw Bay Yacht Club, who completed the course in 14 hours, 40 minutes, 45 seconds, in his Shadow.

Other starters included Dr. James H. Ballard, Saginaw Bay Yacht Club, who dropped out at Port Austin, and Richard Milliman, Tawas Bay Yacht Club, who turned back at the AuSable buoy. Decision of these two skippers to drop out of the race was wise as their smaller craft, coupled with inexperienced crews, could have run into serious trouble.

This was the first race ever sponsored by Tawas Bay Yacht Club for sailboats this large and the course from Tawas to AuSable, then to Port Austin and back, served as a shakedown for the Mackinac Race later in the month. Boats planned on voyages at 12-14 miles per hour as they raced around Saginaw Bay.

Sutton said following the race that he won the new trophy on the strength of his crew's stomach. The three boats finishing were buffeted throughout the course by winds up to 45 miles per hour and the sailors had not acquired their "sea legs" this early in the season. Only half of Sutton's crew (three out of six) had queasy stomachs caused by seas running as high as 20 feet. Six out of the eight crewmen aboard each of the other two finishing boats were at the rail most of the trip and could offer little help with sails.

Because of the high winds, cold temperature and seasickness, it was actually a survival race—skippers were not trying to set sails to gain more speed, but were only trying to keep afloat and move around the course.

Members of Sutton's winning crew included Clarence Hohman of Fenton, Donald Pine of Flint, Charles Schreck, Carl Babcock Jr. and Henry Porter, all of the Tawas.

Safety-Check Set in Tawas

Tawas' voluntary vehicle safety-check will be held June 6-11. The program is being sponsored by area new car dealers.

All area motorists are urged to join the circle of safety: Check your car, check your driving, check accidents. Even the best drivers are poor risks if they are driving cars with bad brakes, worn tires, or other neglected items.

This voluntary safety-check gives every motorist a chance to do his part in making this community a safer place to live.

Equally important in the safety-check is the challenge to all drivers to check their conduct behind the wheel. Both safe cars and safe drivers are needed to check accidents.

Check lanes will be set up at each of the six participating deal-

County School Supt. Tells Need of Special Education

Open letter on Special Education for Isoco County.

The Board of Education of Isoco County Intermediate School District has taken the first step towards a county-wide special education program; the second step is up to the citizens of all four school districts when they go to the annual school elections on June 13. The board asks your support of a three-quarter mill annual levy for this special education.

The board of education takes the point of view that a child with a handicap is no less a child—an individual human being with the same needs as a so-called "normal" child.

These needs include love, affectionate parental care and, in addition, the handicapped child needs status, belonging to a group and an understanding of his own potential.

To help the child achieve this, the board feels that a handicapped child should be educated as close to home as can be done and still have the special programs provided that are necessary to enable him to live with his handicap.

Last year, the board hired a school diagnostician, Robert Mattson, who came to this county from a similar position he held in Gratiot County for the five previous years.

Mr. Mattson has worked this

year in all four schools in Isoco County evaluating children who are referred to him by the schools. He has interviewed, tested and evaluated 215 children and certified 97 of these children eligible for a special program of education for the mentally handicapped.

Only 37 of these children are in any program of special education, all in Oscoda. These children are in three special education rooms. The elementary room has 14 children in the six to 10-year age grouping, 12 children are in a room at the junior high school and the remaining 11 children are at the high school, they are 14 years of age and over. These children are receiving special help from highly-trained teachers who are certified by the department of education to work with these handicapped children.

This still leaves 60 children who are identified as eligible and the diagnostician has only seen about one-third of the children in the county who have been referred. They are not receiving special help because three of the four schools have no special education available.

Every community has some children with handicaps. You know them as does everyone in your community. But we have many more who are not the obviously handicapped.

I make an educated guess based upon percentages of incidence in the United States and our children in Isoco County fall within these averages. (As we have our exceedingly bright students, more that are average and some who have a difficult time learning as well as mentally and physically handicapped children.) Isoco County with 7,320 children enrolled in school this year, has over 700 children who can benefit from some special education program. That is a conservative guess based upon the percentage of incidence and the estimates of the professional educators in the county.

This gives you an idea of how many children can be helped, but before I tell you how it works or the cost, I would like to explain why I believe a county-wide program is the answer for special education in Isoco County.

No single school is large enough or rich enough to qualify individually for all special education programs. For example, a program for partially seeing child in Tawas or Oscoda would be ridiculous as the incidence rate involving this handicap is less than one in a 1,000.

The limit for an approved eight program of this kind would be eight handicapped children. So, such a program would be conducted by one of the schools on a contracted basis, taking children from throughout the county and receiving funds from the county education millage for operation.

Any program in education cannot be a temporary program and yet give the children a necessary amount of training. This is especially true of these special education programs.

The federal programs that are getting a great deal of publicity will not supplant a local program and they are primarily aimed at the economically and educationally deprived youngster, not the handicapped child, physically or mentally, who should be served by a special education program. If done in all the schools cooperatively, all children would have the opportunity to be served regardless of their school districts.

The Intermediate School District will not conduct a separate school nor will it compete with any local school. A local existing school can ask for funds from this special millage and be designated a special education center. A portion of the operational costs of these programs not reimbursed from the state (usually about 40 percent of the operational costs) will be paid to any school with an approved program for the handicapped child from the county-wide special education fund.

This millage can also be paid to a local school to build and equip rooms for special education as there is no state reimbursement for equipment or building in the special education program.

Some itinerate specialists would work in all schools and have an office provided at the Intermediate School District office.

That gives a general overview of how programs work without going into administrative detail.

Some of the different programs that could be established are: Blind or partially seeing classroom, deaf or hard of hearing training, emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted, speech correction, homebound class, hospitalized, visiting teacher, rooms for the mentally or physically handicapped.

It is obvious that not all of these programs can be started immediately nor has the need been established for all possible programs.

The most practical program and one of the highest priority, also where staff is most readily available, is what we call a Type A program, a special program for the mentally handicapped. These are the children who have been identified by the school diagnostician this past year.

Speech correction, which is a program for children with speech defects, would be available to all children in each school. This, for the smaller schools and including the parochial schools, could possibly be a service by speech correctionists working parttime in several schools. While the larger schools would need the service of a full time specialist to serve their speech problem children. Oscoda with 3,250 students now has two. The county-wide special education fund would not do away with these full-time speech correctionists, people, rather it would help the Oscoda school system by giving an amount of money to help pay the expense of operating this costly special program and paying for the service of these highly-trained specialists.

These are all fine programs but how much do they cost?

Well, I have pointed out that

National City Plant Benefits Economy

Total expenditures at National Gypsum Company's National City gypsum plant amounted to approximately \$3,000,000 in 1965, according to Richard M. Harris, plant manager.

Harris said the total included state and local taxes, wages and salaries paid to local employees and local purchases of goods and services in the National City plant area.

He noted that about \$1,000,000 was paid to employees during 1965 and that total plant expenditures not including wages, utilities and taxes amounted to an additional \$1,800,000.

Workshop Planned at Tawas Area HS by Central Mich.

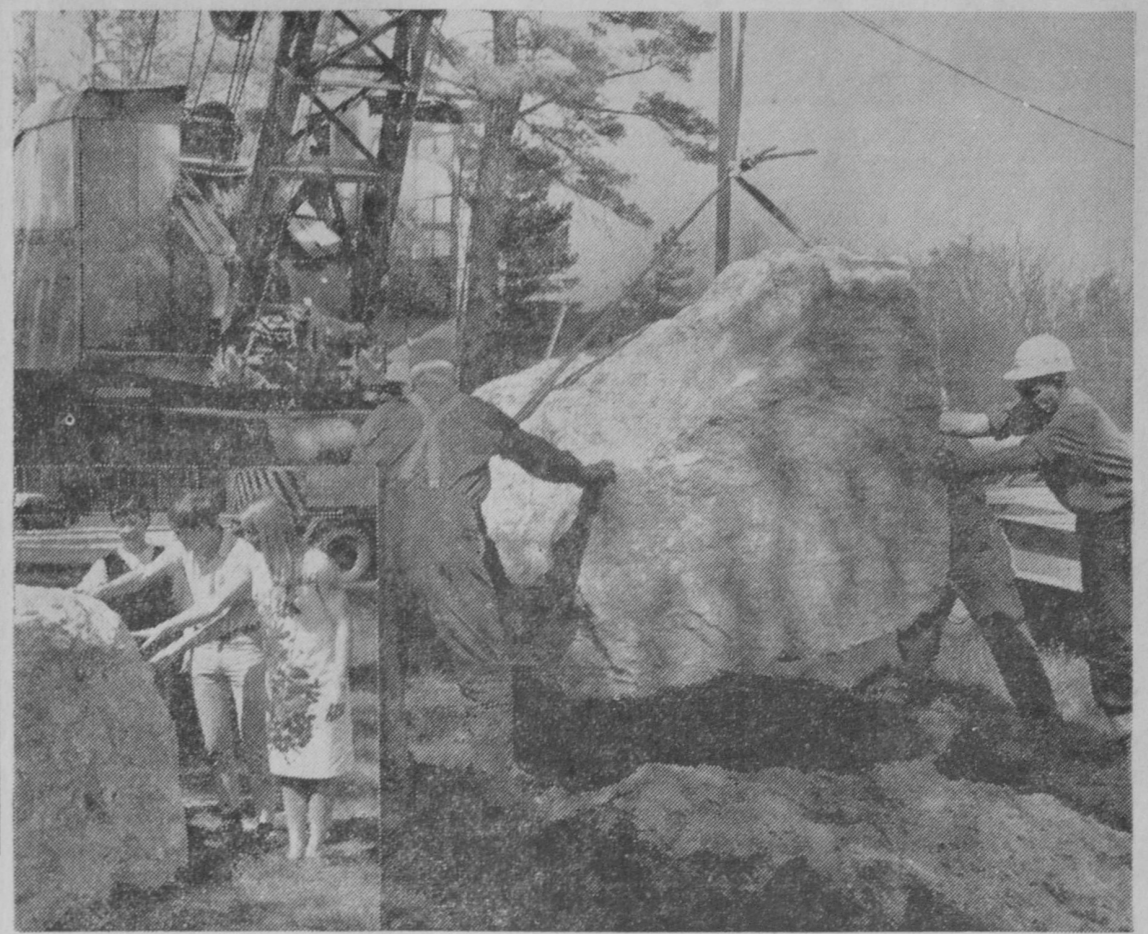
Central Michigan University will offer a workshop for teachers of educationally disadvantaged youth at the Tawas Area Schools beginning June 21.

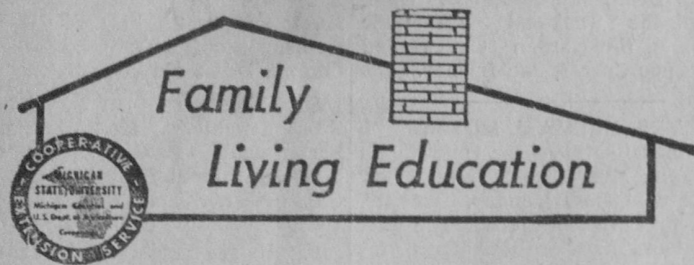

Avoid machine agitation or tumbling. Never put an electric blanket through a wringer; instead, press moisture out by hand. A short spin cycle on automatic washers will remove most of the water safely.

A blanket can be hand laundered in a bath tub, using a plumber's plunger to suck suds through the fabric. Lifting a wet blanket can be damaging to the wiring.

Drop the blanket over two parallel lines to dry, straightening corners and clipping to the line along the edge where there is no wiring.

Frumil is a softer cheese with fruit added. Cut into cubes, serve as candy, snack or in salads. It is a distinctly new flavor.

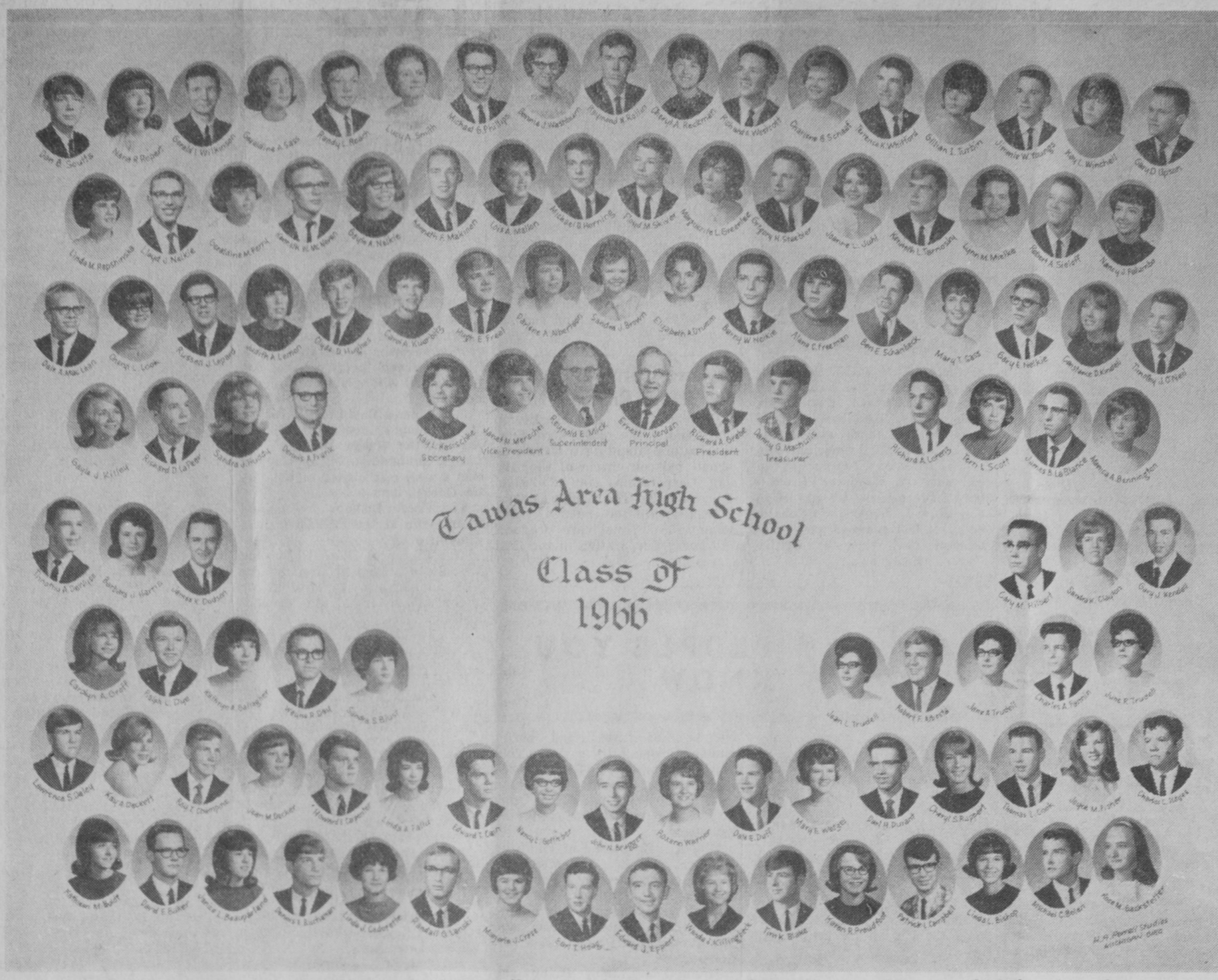

More Meat To Serve

When it comes to cooking meat, research has proved that low temperature cookery produces more palatable meat and stretches the number of servings per pound. The old idea that "searing" meat holds in the meat juices has been proven to be a false idea. Meat cooked right from the beginning at a low temperature shrinks less than meat which is seared.

If you want more servings to the pound, plan to use low cooking temperatures for your meat. As the oven temperature increases, the number of slices or servings of meat decreases!

School District Divided to End Long Standing Dispute

Voters of Nester School District, Ogemaw County, ended a dispute of long standing May 20 when they voted overwhelmingly to split the district into two parts and attach them to Hale Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area School Districts. This action, arranged through a special ruling of the state attorney general, ended a year-long dispute as to the eventual membership of residents in the area. The area had been set over into the West Branch-Rose City Area by action of the COOR Intermediate School District, but petitions were filed by residents of Nester asking they be given the opportunity to vote as to the district to which it would be annexed. The May 20 vote was 30 for and one against dividing the district between the Hale and Whittemore-Prescott schools. The annexation is to become effective as of June 1. The proposal was that all land being south of M-55 being within the area formerly known as the Nester School District be annexed to the Whittemore-Prescott Area School and that land north of M-55 be annexed to the Hale Area School.
