

Defeated Propositions Are to be Resubmitted

A pair of propositions turned down last Monday by voters of Tawas Area School District are to be resubmitted at a special election to be held Friday, July 29.

This action was taken at a special meeting of the board of education last Friday night following a discussion on reasons believed to have contributed to defeat of the proposal.

Last Monday, district voters approved one proposition establishing a sinking fund to receive money for constructing a new shop building but turned thumbs down—by less than 25 votes—on furnishing any money for the fund.

The board had sought a two-year continuation of its special three-mill tax levy originally passed in 1961 and used to finance construction of school facilities.

Proposition No. 1, continuation of the three-mill tax, was defeated 492 to 515; proposition No. 2, establishing the sinking fund, passed by a vote of 509 to 498.

Board members were of the opinion that voters, after entering the polls, may have become confused because of wording printed on the two ballots. A number of voters told officials that it appeared as though they were voting for a total of five mills.

Approval was actually being sought for three mills, two of which would have gone to establish the sinking fund. The other mill would go for school operation.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that attorneys for the school had prepared the ballots and that the wording was standard for such elections.

Tawas Area School is one of only a few schools in the state which does not have voted millage for operation. The one mill, added to the county's nine-mill allocation, would have given the district the required 10-mill allocation for full state aid participation. Without the one mill, the school would lose

Facilities Expanded at Old Orchard Park

Last year, 42 of the 50 states of the union were represented at one time or another at Old Orchard Park, operated by Isosco County along the AuSable River.

According to a report read Wednesday by Supt. Charles Smith of Oscoda, some 60 new trailer spaces have been added to the park this year giving a total of 324 spaces for visitors.

Other improvements to the park, financed by its receipts, includes purchase of \$1,000 worth of playground equipment and construction of a 30 by 60-foot outdoor pavilion. A new water system for the east end of the park was constructed at a cost of \$2,000.

The Old Orchard Park Fund has a balance of \$14,800 and Smith invited other townships of the county to study the possibility of obtaining other sites for park development.

A new addition to the county park at the mouth of the AuSable River is now being studied. Of particular interest is the location there of a public mooring site for boats, as there is no public facility there at present.

Williams Greeted by County Dems

Within a period of nine days, Isosco County had its second visit last Wednesday by a major candidate in Michigan politics.

G. Mennen Williams, who seeks the Democratic nomination as United States senator, needed little introduction to Isosco. Democrats gathered for a noon luncheon at the Barnes Hotel. The former six-term governor of Michigan greeted several local committee members on a "first name" basis, having visited the area on numerous occasions.

Current prosperity of the nation, which has a direct bearing on Michigan's economy, was the principal theme of Williams' talk.

"It is nonsense for Governor Romney to claim credit for Michigan's prosperity," declared Williams.

"Michigan's prosperity depends upon the prosperity of the nation. And we are enjoying national prosperity because President Kennedy and President Johnson have had the courage to apply the theory of Keynesian economics to our national structure, using the tax laws and public works to influence our gross national product."

He said that in the old days, recessions were greeted by a national reaction to "cut things back, pull in your horns, reduce federal spending and jobs." He said this generally worsened the condition with more people out of work.

Such a situation, as in the early 1960s, needed a stimulant—income tax cut, reduction of excise taxes, investment credit act for industrial and business incentive and public works.

Williams pointed out that Michigan relies on the national market—that 80 percent of its manufactured goods are shipped outside the state and that such goods could be sold only if the rest of the country was prospering.

He said that while some areas of the state are enjoying low unemployment, other areas of Northern Michigan are suffering from excessive unemployment have had need of the financial and technical assistance provided by the Economic Development Act of 1965.

Williams said he was delighted to see "Democrats moving ahead" in Northern Michigan. During his travels, he noted increased political interest in townships—"the grass roots of politics"—since the requirement that all candidates must file for primaries through one of the two major political parties.

East Tawas in Excellent Position for Fed. Grant

East Tawas is now in a good position to receive benefit of a federal grant to assist in modernizing its sewer system, according to a report Monday night by Julius Hanslovsky, the city's financial consultant.

Since approval by voters last April of a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue, Hanslovsky has completed work on application for federal grants with two different agencies.

"It is now all a matter of timing," Hanslovsky told the council Monday night.

Application to the municipal finance commission for selling its general obligation bonds was authorized by the council. This is to be timed to coincide with approval of a federal grant.

East Tawas' project has been placed on the Water Resources Commission's list for financial assistance and allocations are to be made June 29 according to priority points awarded to each applicant.

Hanslovsky said that the city was in a very favorable position to be included in the allocations. In the event that the above application is not successful, a second application has been made with the Farmers Home Administration.

The city seeks a grant which would pay 50 percent of the total estimated cost of \$760,000 for its new disposal plant and collection system.

A grant of \$31,000 has already been received from the department of housing and welfare to finance engineering for the project. The city authorized Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw to start work on plans.

Matinee Horse Races

Area harness racing fans will have the opportunity to see pacers and trotters in action Sunday, June 26, when matinee harness races are held at the Isosco County Fairgrounds, Hale. The local track is included in a program of matinee races held throughout Northern Michigan prior to fair time. Post time Sunday is 2:00 p. m. Regular fair races are scheduled at Hale on July 28, 29 and 30.

East Tawas Park Board Quits After Tiff Over Beach Dances

Resignation of the East Tawas Park Commission resulted Monday night following action of the city council which overruled the commission's policy of not allowing teen dances on the bathing beach.

The park commission had banned a beach dance last Saturday afternoon which was to have been sponsored by a group currently making regular appearances at the Knights of Columbus Hall with out-of-town entertainers.

Chairman Merton Killey told the council that it was his feeling and that of other commission members that such dances, attracting large numbers of out-of-town youths, could soon get out of hand.

Killey said the park commission was running a trailer park which will be packed with people during July and August and that these people were paying for the privilege of using it. He felt that the dances would "squeeze out" campers and local residents.

Killey warned that other areas of the state have experienced uncontrolled rowdiness at such beach dances and that the "commission was trying to nip this in the bud before anything starts."

Hale Area Gas Mains Opened

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company began operation of its new 500,000-dollar natural gas distribution and supply system in Rose City and Hale Tuesday.

James C. Preston, general manager of the utility's northern district, with headquarters in Mt. Pleasant, joined local community and utility officials for valve turning ceremonies.

Rose City and Hale are part of a \$2,500,000 expansion program to extend natural gas to eight additional communities in the northern half of the Lower Peninsula this year. It required some 26 miles of distribution and supply lines to serve Rose City and Hale.

William A. Smith, manager of the Tawas area of operations for the utility, which includes Rose City and Hale, said it would be about one week before gas is actually turned on in individual homes. He said that when a customer has had his fuel line connected to an appliance or furnace, he should call the Tawas office at Enterprise 6233 and ask to have his service turned on.

Smith said that at the outset there will probably be some delay to the usual fast service the company gives, due to the large number of new customers desiring service. "But we will see that everybody is connected just as quickly as we can," he added.

Preston said Michigan Consolidated is "extremely pleased to become an industrial citizen of Rose City and Hale. We have had wonderful cooperation from city and township officials and the welcome we have received from residents has been most cordial.

"We are now in a position to do something for the people of these communities by reducing their cost of living through lower fuel costs and by doing our best to help them bring new industry and business here," Preston said.

Fails to Set Brakes; Isosco Woman Run Down by Own Auto

A Bass Lake housewife was treated at Tawas Hospital Wednesday night for injuries received after being run down by a car which she had just parked at the top of a hill.

Treated for multiple lacerations, bruises, fractured wrist and several fractured ribs was Mrs. Myrtle A. Brown.

Jay Brown, husband of the victim, told investigating state police officers that his wife and their two sons had come home about 10:30 o'clock. She parked her car at the top of a steep hill and started to walk down the slope to the family's trailer home.

As she walked in front of the car, the boys shouted that the car was moving toward her. The car struck Mrs. Brown and dragged her about 60 feet down the hill before completely passing over her. The driverless car continued on down the hill, bounced off the trailer home and continued another 100 feet before coming to a halt.

Brown told officers that his wife had apparently neglected to apply the parking brakes on the vehicle.

Isosco Board Not Interested in River Study

On recommendation of its drains and bridges committee, Isosco Board of Supervisors voted 9-7 Wednesday not to participate in a proposed study of the AuGres River drainage program.

A resolution from the drains and ditches committee stated: "We believe the only solution to the damage by water to the lower AuGres River—the part that is not profitable to farm without expending more money than the farms are worth—is to have the state conservation department take it over for a wildlife sanctuary, develop a sportsmen's paradise or annex it to the Alpena State Forest."

George Webb, Plainfield Township supervisor, chairman of the committee, pointed out that the three sections of Isosco County in Sherman Township, which were to be included in the study, are already a part of the state forest.

In other business, action on a proposal to purchase microfilming equipment for the county building was tabled for further study of prices.

Probate Judge William McCready addressed the board and said that court records—both probate and circuit—were becoming so voluminous that the county building was running out of vault space.

The board of supervisors sent a letter to Miss Dorothy Scott, former county extension agent, commending her on her years of work with Isosco 4-H Club groups and with the family living program.

Herman Maas of Hale was appointed to the county planning commission to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Lyle Bielby.

The board continued with a resolution from Kalamazoo County which believed the tax law be amended so as to require an earlier filing of personal property statements. At present, the deadline for filing such statements is February 20 and, because this is so near to the time for meetings of the board of review, it was felt the final date for filing should be advanced to January 15.

Tawas City Seeks Burning Permit from State for Dump

Tawas City has received tentative approval for twice a week burning at its disposal grounds, following an inspection of facilities by Albert Renwick, state sanitary inspector.

According to Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, final approval on such burning must still come from Lansing because of an apparent conflict with state law controlling operation of municipal disposal grounds.

Bublitz said that under state regulations, combustible materials may be burned only once or twice a year at dumping grounds. Renwick believed that Tawas City's method, subject to United States Forest Service approval, would be permissible on a twice a week basis.

In other business conducted at Monday night's meeting, the council gave final approval to its new ordinance governing storage of automobiles, parts of automobiles and junk or non-operating machines within the city.

The new ordinance provides that no person, firm or corporation may park or store within the city any motor vehicle or any machine which is not in operating condition for more than 14 days in any one year, unless it is located within an enclosed building or a permit is first obtained.

It provides that not more than one motor vehicle in operative condition which is not regularly used may be stored, unless within an enclosed building.

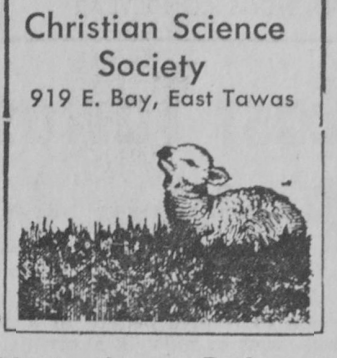

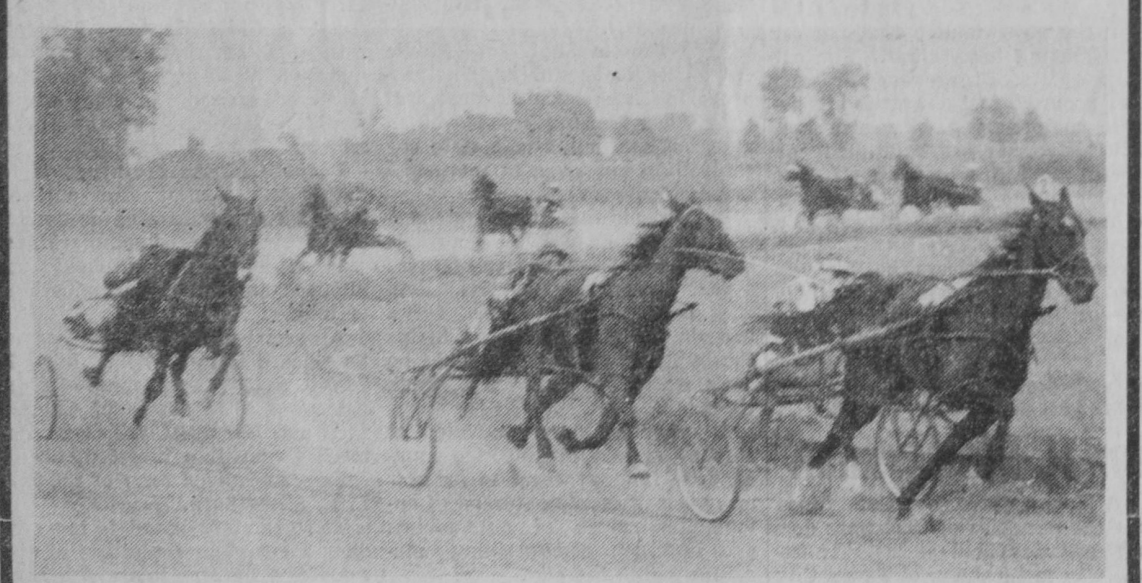

Family Living Education

That Little Child
School is out and you have the children home for all day. In the confusion of vacations, company and the varying schedules, you may by-pass opportunities with the younger children to develop a warm parent-child relationship. It is more apt to prevail if you remember to take time to consider the following reminders given us by a well-known specialist in family life, Mrs. Lennah Backus.

- parents take time to listen to children
- we realize that it is the little things that build relationships
- a child is greeted with a smile as he awakens
- parents try to discover from the child's behavior how he really feels
- we do not become too upset by his shortcomings
- we look for some of the things a child does right rather than dwelling on all the things he does wrong
- we set limits in a firm and yet kindly way
- we share his small successes with him
- we are ready with comfort when things go wrong
- we display kindness and good will in the family group

Frozen Dairy Foods
They have been popular since the days of the Roman emperor, Nero. Is there anything so refreshing on a hot day than a stop at a dairy window, joining the youngsters in the line for a cone? There are more than 200 flavors available in the three kinds of frozen dairy foods made and sold in Michigan—ice cream, sherbets and jels. The most popular variety is vanilla with chocolate and strawberry following close behind.

They all taste best if served at around 16 degrees Fahrenheit. If colder, the flavor is weaker.

A one-half cup portion of sherbet provides 120 calories, one-half cup vanilla ice cream has 150 calories. Compare this with other desserts—one-half cup chocolate pudding has 200 calories, one-tenth of a 10-inch angel cake is 300 calories. That two-inch section of layer cake with fudge icing will give you 400 calories, so many of us should be happy to serve and eat the convenient, lower calorie dessert, a frozen dairy product.

Meat For Outdoor Cooking
Outdoor eating enthusiasts will be busy in the next two or three months. These enthusiasts will be following the great love of barbecues which have been popular, and many times necessary, during all of history. The word "barbecue" has come to mean anything cooked out-of-doors. If we want to get technical, "barbecuing" means to roast or broil meat slowly over an open fire with a highly seasoned sauce. The Spanish explorers of the West Indies gave us the name, the word "barbacoa" used to describe the wooden framework used in grilling smoked meat and fish. In early English writings, the word was used to describe broiling a large animal over an outdoor pit and eventually came to mean any family picnic, county fair or political rally at which meat cooked in a pit was served.

Use the definition you prefer and enjoy cooking outdoors.

You may wish to use beef and whenever we think of beef for barbecuing, we think of steaks. Those beautiful steaks, at least one inch thick, are excellent for outdoor cooking. But there are other cuts of beef which work out very well, too, and can cost much less. This general guide holds true; any cut which can be broiled or roasted with dry heat in the home can be done on the outdoor grill. But today, with the use of tenderizers, many of the cuts which were designated only for moist heat cookery have joined the steaks on the grill. However, when you want to choose some of the less tender cuts, select a USDA choice grade. Grades lower than choice are really best if cooked with moist heat.

Blade steaks, cut from the shoulder, can also be used for outdoor cookery. They are less tender than hind-quarter or rib steaks but with some tenderizing can be very tasty. The same is true of chuck roast or chuck steak. Short ribs, too, can be successfully cooked on the grill or spit.

D&M's Big Cut Gravel Plant Hit by \$150,000 Fire

35 Years Ago—
June 26, 1931—The gravel plant at Big Cut was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon. The damage is estimated at \$150,000 besides the loss to the Detroit and Mackinac Railway from curtailment of its freight business. A large amount of gravel will be used in the construction of roads in this section during the next few months and the lack of this plant will inconvenience contractors, counties and state and will result in a possible higher cost of gravel.

The "Genevieve," a fish boat belonging to the Lixey Fish Company, was burned Thursday morning when about one-fourth mile out in the bay. James Herrick was blown from the cabin into the bay by an explosion of gasoline. Harris Lixey and Orville Cunningham were forced to jump into the water by the flames. The burning boat was towed back to the dock where the East Tawas Fire Department extinguished the flames.

June 27, 1941—Judge Herman Dehnke denied a motion by attorneys for Mrs. Winnifred Mosher asking for a new trial in the slaying last October of Bobby Kenyon.

A barn belonging to Dewey Ross of Sherman Township was destroyed by fire last Sunday. Loss included all contents, hay in barn and 200 bushels of beans. Origin of the fire is unknown. Quick work on the part of neighbors saved other buildings.

Gov. Murray D. VanWagoner, in a proclamation signed today, called upon all citizens, all state and county officials to join in a great effort to prevent a repetition of the Memorial Day week-end traffic tragedy over the Fourth of July week-end. A total of 49 persons were killed on Michigan highways over Memorial Day week-end.

Isco Board of Supervisors voted to remodel rooms in the courthouse to be used as an office for the welfare department.

Fireworks exhibits for the annual Fourth of July celebration in the Tawas are to be set off from barges anchored in the bay, directly in front of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway roundhouse. This year's program is being sponsored through joint efforts of the two chambers of commerce.



Farmers Wishing 1967 Allotment May File With ASCS

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new farm" allotment for the 1967 crop of winter wheat on a farm which does not have a 1966 wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS county office. Federal Building, East Tawas. Such farmers have until July 1 to file applications for such an allotment.

A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, has available land, adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm, during the last five years has had at least two years experience in producing wheat and who as an operator expects to receive 50 percent or more of the current year's income from the total production on the farm. Interested producers should discuss the details with officials at the ASCS county office.

Formal application for a new farm wheat allotment may be made by filing a written application at the ASCS county office prior to the July 1 deadline.

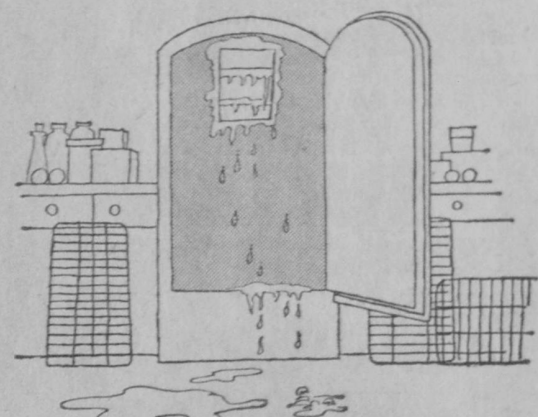

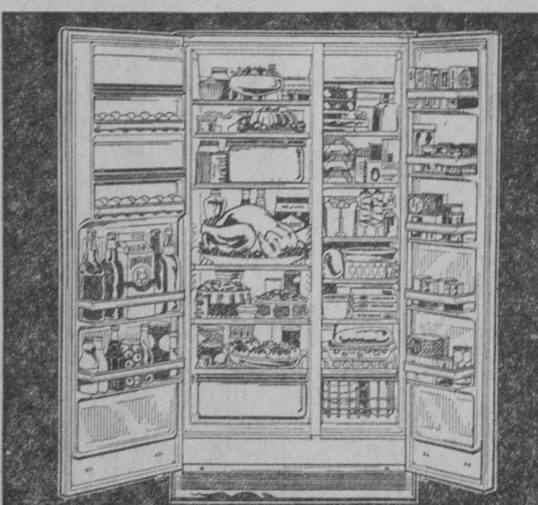

An Ordinance to secure public peace, health, safety, welfare and convenience of the City of Tawas City, Isoco County, Michigan, a municipal corporation, by the regulation of the parking and storage of automobiles and parts thereof and other machines or parts thereof within said City; to provide penalties for the violation thereof.

THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY, ISOCO COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

(1) NAME: This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the Tawas City Automobile and Machinery Parking and Storage Ordinance.

(2) REGULATIONS:

(a) No person, firm or corporation shall park or store within the City any motor vehicle which is not in operating condition and which cannot be propelled under its own power, nor any part or portion thereof not fully and immediately operable, nor any other machine or part or portion thereof not fully and immediately operable, for more than fourteen (14) days in any one year, unless the same is located within an enclosed building, or unless a special permit therefor is first obtained from the Chief of Police or Acting Chief of Police or such other officer as the City Council may designate, to be granted only in special hardship cases beyond the control of the applicant, where peculiar circumstances exist, where no adjoining property owner is adversely affected thereby, and where the spirit and purposes of these regulations are still observed.

(b) No person, firm or corporation shall park or store within the City more than one motor vehicle or other machine in operative condition which is not regularly used for the purpose for which it was manufactured or designated unless the same is located within an enclosed building or unless a special permit is first obtained therefor from the Chief of Police or Acting Chief of Police or such other officer as the City Council may designate, to be granted only in special hardship cases beyond the control of the applicant, where special peculiar circumstances exist, where no adjoining property owner is adversely affected thereby, and where the spirit and purpose of these regulations are still observed.

(c) Any motor vehicle or other machine being dismantled for the sale or other use of parts thereof or any motor vehicle or other machine which has main component parts missing or unattached shall be deemed inoperable for the purposes of this Ordinance. The foregoing is not to be construed to be inclusive of all inoperable vehicles or other machines covered by this Ordinance but merely descriptive of a particular class of such vehicles.

(d) The purpose of these regulations is to limit and restrict the outdoor storage or unreasonable accumulation of junk cars and other junk machines, unused cars and other unused machines, and dilapidated non-operating motor vehicles and other dilapidated non-operating machines within the city limits; to thereby avoid injury and hazards to children attracted to such vehicles or machines, and the psychological ill effect of the presence of such vehicles or machines upon adjoining residents and property owners.

(3) PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS:

Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the County Jail, not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each day that a violation continues to exist shall constitute a separate offense. In addition to the imposition of the foregoing fines and penalties, the Tawas City Chief of Police or Acting Chief of Police or such other officer as the City Council may designate, may cause any vehicle or part or portion thereof or any other machine or part or portion thereof which violates the provisions of this Ordinance to be removed from the premises, impounded and destroyed, or sold for junk, as the case may be, and the cost thereof assessed against the owner of such vehicle or part or portion thereof or other machine or part or portion thereof. Any sums realized by the City of Tawas City on such sale or sales may be used to reimburse the City for the cost incurred therein. Any balance of such sums remaining after the aforesaid reimbursement shall be returned to the owner.

(4) ENFORCEMENT: The provisions of the within Ordinance shall be enforced by all duly accredited law enforcement officers of the City of Tawas City.

Primaries to Feature Hot State-Twp. Races

State and township primary elections in Isosco County should match the expected hot weather coming in August.

Under the new state constitution and revision of election laws last year wiping out local parties, township elections will be strictly partisan for the August 2 vote. Township candidates have responded with races in all but one precinct—either party against party (Republican vs. Democrat) next November or races within one political party.

Three township supervisors have decided not to run for reelection, one incumbent supervisor is opposed by two other candidates on his ticket and four others have opponents on the same ticket.

Adding spice locally to the August 2 state-township ballot will be the race between George A. Prescott of Tawas City and Henry Smith of Bay City, who are Republican candidates for 102nd district state representative.

All township candidates were required to file nominating peti-

tions this year and a rundown on the various Isosco County races shaping up in less than five weeks is as follows:

AuSable Township—No Democratic candidates filed in this township, but there are races on the Republican slate for three positions. Incumbent Supervisor Percy J. Jocks is being opposed by Keith D. Dobson; Morneva Snitchler, clerk, is unopposed; in a two-way race for treasurer are Mary Spencer and Hedvig D. Wright; Rhea Matthews and Donald G. Fashbender will vie for nomination as trustee.

Grant Township—Lloyd S. Little, chairman of the Isosco Board of Supervisors, is one of three Republican candidates. George A. Wilhelm and Lucille Blackmore, the other two, are running for trustee. On the Democratic side, Kirby L. Millour is candidate for supervisor and Ann M. Hayes, clerk. Olen Herriman and Henry Gage will compete for nomination as treasurer and Joseph Lackies seeks the nomination as trustee.

Sherman Township—This township has a full Democratic slate, headed by Edward A. Gerard, incumbent supervisor. Other candidates are Harold Parent, clerk; Harvey E. Smith, treasurer; John H. Jordan, trustee; Floyd E. Pierson and Walter J. Murringer, constables. On the Republican side, George M. Strauer is candidate for supervisor and Donald C. Schuster is candidate for constable.

Barleish Township—There is but one Democratic candidate in this township and he is chairman of the county committee, Ralph Degesie, who seeks nomination as supervisor. Candidates on the Republican side are Aubrey Belson, supervisor; Gerald Bellen, clerk; Edna Sheffer, treasurer; Martin Siegrist and Donald Daniels, trustee; Russell White and Nelson Provoast, constable.

Reno Township—Incumbent Sup. Harvey Odell is retiring this year and there will be a two-way race between former State Rep. James P. Mielock and Will Waters for this position. Other Republican candidates include Leonard Robinson, clerk; Sylvia Youngs, treasurer; Theodore Dobson, four-year trustee; James L. Robinson, trustee to fill two-year vacancy; Lawrence Everitt and Howard Brindley, constable. The only Democratic candidate to file was John Cobb, two-year trustee.

Plainfield Township—George Webb, veteran supervisor, is not a candidate for re-election this year. Republican candidates include: Dennis B.
