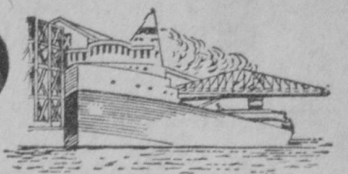

## 2nd AuSable River Queen Set for Dedication Thursday

Formal dedication of a second AuSable River Queen will be held this Thursday afternoon at its Foote Dam dock, six miles west of Oscoda on River Road.

According to Howard Brubaker, owner, invitations have been sent to more than 250 outdoor sports writers, civic and state officials, Consumers Power Company representatives and others. The general public is invited to attend the christening ceremony slated for 2:00 p. m.

To be known officially as AuSable River Queen II, this paddle wheel river boat will join its sister river cruise boat which has been one of the area's outstanding attractions since it was launched in the summer of 1959.

During the past eight summers, thousands of visitors have enjoyed the two-hour river boat cruises between Five Channels and Cooke Dams, probably one of the most scenic stretches of water in the entire state.

Route of the new River Queen will be equally pleasing to passengers. For those who have aboard the original vessel, AuSable River Queen II will offer an entirely different scenic route on the backwater of Foote Dam.

The new boat, measuring 67 feet by 24 feet, is six feet wider and seven feet longer than the original AuSable River Queen. Both are driven by eight-foot-high paddle wheels.

The boats were designed along the lines of stern wheelers which ply the Suwannee River and are the only boats of this type in the North.

Inspiration for this attraction came to Brubaker during the winter of 1958 when he and his wife were on their way to Florida. Brubaker had operated a regular fishing type cruise boat on the river but had experienced navigation trouble because of the boat's deep draft.

Seeing the Suwannee River boats, Brubaker snapped pictures and contacted owners to learn specifications. Armed with this information, he realized the potential of such an attraction and began putting his plans on paper.

When the Brubakers returned to Oscoda that spring, he contacted Melvin Brown, Alabaster commercial fisherman, and Herbert Choler, Tawas City service station operator, both experienced in boat building. After more planning, Brown constructed the steel hull

and Choler developed and built the paddle wheel assembly.

Since its original launching, the first AuSable River Queen has undergone a number of design changes, all with the safety and convenience of passengers paramount in the planning.

From lessons learned in construction and operation of the original boat, Brubaker hired Choler and Harold Moeller to start work on welding the hull for his second boat. Work started a year ago at Foote Dam and the hull was placed in the water this spring. Since then, a crew of carpenters has been busy building the double decked boat, while Choler installed the marine engine and eight-foot-high paddle wheel. The second deck is covered by a roof

and the boat may be operated from either the top or bottom deck.

A shakedown cruise was held Sunday afternoon to time the two-hour excursion between Foote and Cooke Dams. The route passes such sites as Devils Island, Deadman's Curve, Beaver Point, Eagles Nest, AuSable Ski Bowl and passes under power lines from Cooke Dam.

One interesting feature pointed out by Brubaker was Beaver Point, where trees more than 50 feet in length have been dropped by the tiny dam builders of nature.

Christening the boat Thursday will be Mrs. George Perrault, wife of the nationally known traveler and Detroit television adventure series host, Mr. Perrault will be one of the principal speakers.

## Table Salary Hikes for Custodians-Secretaries

### Savage Promoted by Consumers Power Co.

## Iosco to Benefit from Real Estate Transfer Tax

Iosco County's general operating fund will be enriched by \$5,850 effective January 1, 1968, according to a report by State Sen. Robert Richardson.

A leftover bill from the 1965 session, which previously passed the senate and house of representatives, was signed June 24 by the governor. It will provide \$67,604 for the general fund of the 10 counties in the 35th senatorial district.

The bill will levy a tax of \$1.10 per thousand dollars on real estate transfers. All money collected from affixing transfer stamps to deeds and other instruments of conveyance are to be returned where the tax is collected.

This would amount to about \$4,000,000 annually among Michigan's 83 counties. The bill will go into effect as soon as a similar federal excise tax is repealed on January 1, 1968.

In other business, Supt. Reynold Mick reported that a decision is to be made July 1 by St. Joseph School if it is to have a seventh grade next term. If not, the public school will receive an additional 20 pupils and would require the hiring of one additional junior high teacher.

Mick said that estimated enrollment of the school for the start of the next term is 1,700 pupils, about 40 less than counted in February. Although a master contract has not been adopted as yet between the board of education and teachers, the faculty is pretty well set for next year.

Gary Chapman, who graduated last January from Northern Michigan University, has been hired as physical education instructor for the elementary grades. The 24-year-old Chapman, a native of the Upper Peninsula, taught one semester at Memphis and comes here with high recommendations.

His hiring leaves one vacancy in the high school. Miss Judith Gillies has decided to teach this year at Birch Run, leaving a vacancy in the high school English department.

The board authorized taking of bids on removal of bleachers and filling in the floor at the Tawas City gymnasium. This would enlarge the floor area by 13 by 52 feet. Bids will be received at the next board meeting.

The board adopted a set of policies which it has been compiling over the past year. A complete list of policies has never been available and Secretary Clyde Soper (See BOARD, page 6.)

# County Prepares for Holiday Rush

## Parks Expect Capacity Crowds Over Week-End

Federal, state, county and city parks of Iosco County are bracing for the mad rush of tourists expected to hit the area this week-end and for the Fourth of July.

Loren Woerpel, Tawas District ranger for the United States Forestry Department, said Tuesday that all parks in Huron National Forest were "all set for the mighty horde."

Round Lake campground has been filled every week-end this month and a new swimming beach has proven very popular with visitors.

"We expect that campgrounds at Lumbermen's Monument and High Rollways will be filled by Friday, but there will still be room left for vacationers at Silver Valley."

Woerpel said that if the area does not get some rain before the week-end, there could be a very serious situation due to the danger of fire. "Our only hope is that people will be very careful with matches, cigarettes and campfires when they are in these wooded areas—if not, we could have a major forest fire because of the extreme dryness."

The forest ranger was also encouraged over reports that vandalism had shown a decrease over the past two weeks. His department has been unable to keep directional signs in place for the benefit of everyone using highways through the national forest.

Tawas Point State Park is gearing for a major rush this week-end. The Fourth of July holiday annually marks the start of summer vacation season and the new state park will be visited by hundreds of people.

East Tawas City Park, always one of the most popular spots in the state, will likely be one of the first places in the area to be filled

this week. Its location near the East Tawas business district is ideal for those persons who want to "rough it" and still have the advantage of shopping within walking distance.

Old Orchard Park on River Road west of Oscoda will also be the vacation spot of many visitors and this park has been greatly improved this year with the addition of new camping facilities.

Michigan Waterways Commission Dock will be the site next Monday—July 4—of the annual fireworks display sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with city councils of East Tawas and Tawas City.

Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper and his crew will set up special equipment on the dock for the fireworks display, which is scheduled to get under way between 8:30 and 9:00 p. m.

## TC Sewer Deficit Brings Rate Hike

First sewer rate increase in 10 years, which goes into effect July 1, is designed to alleviate deficit spending of Tawas City's sewer department.

An audit of the city books shows that the sewer department ended 1965 \$2,599 in the red. According to Supt. Reginald Bublitz, this has been the case for the past six years as cost of operation is increasing slightly each year.

The water department voted last month to adopt a new sewer rate which would provide that heavy users of water would pay a more proportionate share of the cost of operating the sewer disposal system.

The new sewer rate will be based on 40 percent of the water bill, instead of a minimum sewer charge of \$3 per quarter for all residential dwellings.

Sixty percent of all residential users currently pay the present minimum quarterly charge of \$8 for water. This would mean that minimum users would then be charged \$3.20 for sewer.

First billing under the new rate will be September 1.

## Everett Appointed to National Committee

C. S. Everett, Tawas City Third Ward supervisor, has been appointed to the welfare committee of the National Association of Counties, according to an announcement this week from Washington, D. C. He hopes to attend a regional problems congress of the committee at New Orleans, Louisiana, July 17-20.

## Accident Damage Claim is Settled Out of Court

An out-of-court settlement has been reached in the lawsuit brought by estate of the late Marian Dumas vs. Katherine and Frank Gay, defendants, and George Grabow, third party defendant.

Trial of the lawsuit, which originally asked a judgment of \$430,000, was to have been held June 14. An order dismissing the case in Iosco Circuit Court was signed Monday by Judge Allan C. Miller.

According to Probate Judge William McCready, to whom the settlement was referred, the probate estate of Mrs. Dumas received a settlement of \$19,000. Each of the Dumas' three children received an award of damages which was set up in trust by the probate court.

Exact amount of the award to the three Dumas children was not revealed by the court.

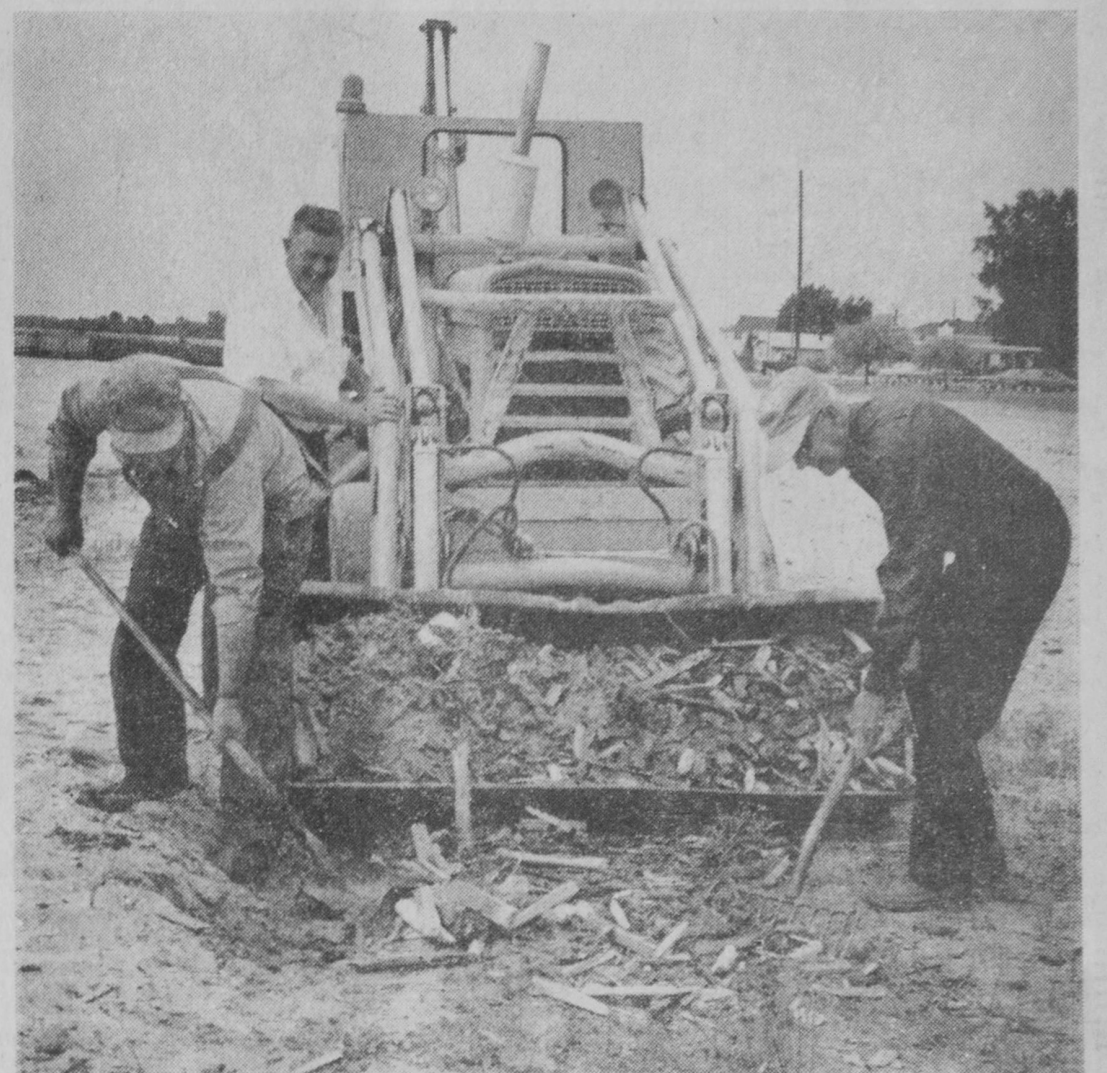
The lawsuit was originated by Richard Dumas, husband of the deceased. She was killed in an automobile accident on September 22, 1962, in the City of Whittemore.

A car owned by Frank Gay and driven by Mrs. Gay struck the rear of a trailer parked on M-65 and owned by George Grabow, Whittemore beverage distributor.

Three of the Dumas children, Daniel, Robert and Richard D., were injured in the crash.

By written stipulation in circuit court, Grabow agreed to pay a \$10,000 judgment to his insurance company.

Third party action filed by the Gays against Grabow were dismissed without prejudice and the order signed by Judge Miller stipulated that all dismissals were without cost to any of the parties.

## Only One Ballot Needed in School Millage Vote

Tawas Area School voters are to receive but one ballot in the July 29 millage question, according to information announced at Monday night's board of education meeting.

Robert Thrun, attorney for the school, said that voters had approved establishment of a sinking fund on June 13 and that another vote on this question was not necessary.

This leaves but one question to be resubmitted to voters—continuation of the three-mill tax levy originally approved in 1961 and expires this year.

In the election earlier this

month, voters approved the second proposition—509 to 498—establishing a two-mill sinking fund for school construction, but then failed to approve millage necessary to raise money for the fund.

Members of the board of education were of the opinion that voters were confused by the two ballots—believing that voters on entering the polls had totaled millage on the two propositions and thought a "yes" vote would approve a levy of five mills.

This is not the case as the board seeks a continuation of the three-mill levy which taxpayers have been paying since 1961 to finance a school construction program. This program is being completed

Two of the three mills which the board is seeking at the July 29 election would be placed in the sinking fund to finance cost of constructing a new shop building,

renovation of quarters presently used by the shop and conversion of that area into new classrooms for the junior high school wing.

The remaining one mill would be used for school operation and board members point out that it is most important that this levy be approved as full state aid participation hinges on the outcome.

House Bill No. 4025 has now been passed by the state legislature. If Tawas Area School District does not receive an affirmative vote at the July 29 election, it would lose \$34,000 in state aid.

The school district received nine mills from the Iosco Allocation Board and to qualify for full state aid must levy one additional mill under terms of the new state law.

"Elimination of the need for voting on the sinking fund should simplify the question to be put before voters on July 29," stated Supt. Reynold Mick.

## Prodded by Police, Man Decides He'll Pay for Purchase

A State College, Pennsylvania, resident, vacationing in the Tawas area, decided to pay the cost of purchasing five cones from the East Tawas Dairy Queen after investigation by state police.

The man, who was not prosecuted, ordered five cones and then refused to pay for them after an argument with the cashier. Police were called when the man tore a dollar bill in half and handed it to the cashier as "payment."

## Passenger Hurt When Deer Jumped on Road

A Tawas City woman received minor injuries last Wednesday night when a deer jumped into the path of an auto in which she was a passenger.

Treated at Tawas Hospital was Mrs. Jennie Smith. The accident occurred on M-55, two miles west of the M-65 intersection.

Escaping injury were Mrs. Opal R. Kyser, East Tawas, the driver, and three other passengers, Mrs. Maude Westcott, Mrs. Naomi Bennett and Mrs. Margaret Meyers, all of East Tawas.

## Napier Named Tawas Forester

Daniel A. Napier, a June graduate of the University of Missouri, is the new forester for the Tawas Ranger District, Huron National Forest, according to an announcement Tuesday by Ranger Loren Woerpel, East Tawas.

Napier replaces James Hanson, who moved to Delaware, Ohio, as a forest entomologist for the forest service division of state and private forestry.

Hanson and his wife, Barbara, have made their home at 2846 North US-23, East Tawas.

The new forester comes from St. Louis, Missouri. He graduated from the University of Missouri at Columbia with his bachelor of science degree in forestry. Previous to that he had served in the United States Navy at a California station for three years.

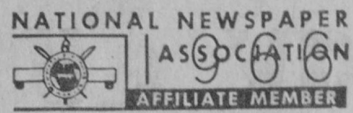

## 9-Foot Lumbermen To Take Stand on AuSable Highbanks

35 Years Ago—July 3, 1931—Within the next few months, three men will travel down the Thompson Trail in Huron National Forest—they will trail shift their feet and then take up their stand to look forever down on the waters of the AuSable River. Those "three men" will be the nine-foot figures of bronze that are to constitute the memorial to pioneer lumbermen of Michigan. Robert Aitken, who was paid \$50,000 to design the memorial, is presently in the process of making plaster casts in which molten metal is to be poured for the statue. Sponsors of the memorial are descendants of the pioneer lumbermen. Foremost among them is William B. Merschon, Saginaw; R. G. Schreck, former supervisor of Huron National Forest, and John W. Blodgett of Grand Rapids.

Governor Brucker, Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald, Outdoor Editor Ben East and Herman N. Butler of East Tawas, president of the Bay-Strait League, were among speakers at a meeting of the league last week which attracted some 5,000 Michigan sportsmen.

State Rep. Frank Holbeck of East Tawas reports that under terms of his bill before the legislature, road commissions are to make out a program of construction for townships and submit it to boards of supervisors at the October session. The program would specify the amount of money the county at large and the township would pay.

Hundreds of persons are flocking to bathing beaches at Tawas City and East Tawas to get relief from the extreme heat. It is said that crowds enjoying the new slide and fine bathing were the largest in years and consisted principally of people living within the county, although a considerable number of people from Detroit and Flint have pitched tents in the park to enjoy the community's hospitality.

This proposal, advocated by sports fishermen, along with one bill to abolish deep trap or submarine nets, were defeated. Suggested lengthening of closed seasons on trout for Lakes Superior, Michigan and Huron also drew sharp criticism of commercial fishermen.

minutes of board meetings since reorganization of the school in order to compile a complete list. Some old policies were obsolete, others were rewritten or deleted.

The board authorized purchase of \$442 in band instruments and supplies from Ferris Music Shop. A report from the school superintendent indicated that the school's hot lunch program finished the year "in the black" or nearly so as far as can be determined.

Some 160,178 lunches were served in the three cafeterias. Receipts amounted to \$56,751 and expenditures totaled \$60,400. The school has an inventory of \$1,489 remaining and is to receive \$900 in federal funds for the hot lunch program. This leaves approximately \$700 in deficit spending.

Mick told the board members that Tawas was still one of the few school districts which was operating a hot lunch program and not losing money. Rapidly increasing cost of food used in the program and gradual reduction of participation by the federal government may prove to be a different story next fall, it was pointed out.

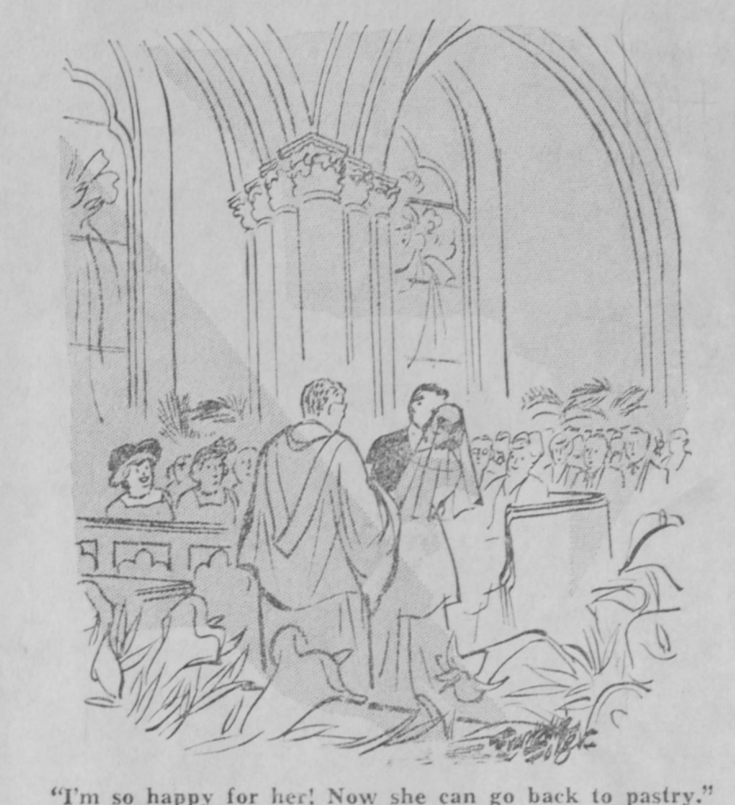

State Educator Urges Vocational Instruction Emphasis in High School

State Supt. of Public Instruction Ira Polley has called on educators to place greater emphasis on programs aimed at preparing youth in skills needed to get a job when they graduate from high school.

"For far too long a time, vocational education has been the scullery maid of American education," Polley told a recent state-wide conference of vocational education administrators.

"High schools with vocational programs did little to keep them up-to-date. Those without them did not bother to get them. The stress has been on the glamour programs—preparation for college."

Polley said schools generally have failed to place enough emphasis on the role of technicians and craftsmen in the present scientific and technological age.

"We have failed," he said "to build employability into our young men and women who plan to enter

the work force after they leave high school.

"We must not lose sight of the fact that for each scientist and engineer, we must also have many more technicians and craftsmen to put his ideas and inventions into practice and to service and maintain the machines the scientists create."

Polley said that vocational education programs "must encompass not only the immediate skills needed for employability, but also those courses of general education that can give scope, depth and guidance in meeting and coping with everyday living."

# The Village Blacksmith

Harness racing—long a traditional sport of rural Americans—entered its 1966 season two weeks ago with the opening of Sunday matinee races at Northern Michigan fairground tracks.

On hand to watch and plan an important behind-the-scenes role in the races was Duncan Valley, 71, Whittemore.

A blacksmith for 54 years, Valley has been fitting his special lightweight shoes on race horses for longer than he would care to admit and is one of the last of this state's old-time farriers.

Shoeing a race horse properly is almost a lost art, in spite of the fact that harness racing still attracts thousands of spectators each year at fairgrounds around Michigan and at push parimutual tracks.

"Blacksmithing is hard work and what young man wants to work at a trade that is busy for less than six months a year," he said.

The gait of nearly every horse is a little different and it is up to the blacksmith, working in close cooperation with the owner or driver, to fit shoes that are properly balanced and protect the horse's hoofs.

Balanced shoes improve the speed of the horse and the way it travels. "Without that correct balance, its travel may worsen instead of being improved," said Valley. A good race horse can be ruined by being improperly shod.

Although he has some pet ideas concerning balance which he has acquired after long years of plying his trade, Valley said it was up to the owner to determine such shoe niceties as length and angle of the

toe, or whether the shoe should be full swedge or half-round, depending whether the horse is a pacer or trotter. A pacer, for instance, has three more ounces of metal on hind shoes than on the front.

After standing the horse on level ground or a barn floor, Valley goes to work.

He manufactures his own shoes and tools of his trade using the time-honored hand forge in his Whittemore shop. Tiny cleats used to balance his special T-bar shoes are welded into place by heating the metal in the forge and use of a sand flux.

After preparing each hoof to be shod, the light metal shoes are fitted then nailed and clinched. Using a rasp, the blacksmith then trims the horny-like hoof to fit the metal.

After that, it is up to the trainer and driver to get the most out of the horse.

Valley was born in 1895 in Ogemaw County, six miles east of West Branch. He started to learn his trade when 16 years old at the munificent wage of 50 cents a day.

"I used to shoe all the mean horses in Ogemaw County," said Valley as he recalled the days of his apprenticeship.

He purchased a blacksmith shop at Prescott in 1919, operated it two years and then moved to Bay City where he worked at Rodney Adams' shop on Water Street. He later worked for the Jacox Machine Company at Saginaw and once installed 44 shoes in one day when he was employed by Leonard Lossell at Saginaw.

Valley came to Whittemore on April 1, 1925, and purchased a blacksmith shop owned by Hector Flynn. He has plied his trade in that community since that time.

In the early days of the automobile, he was often called upon to make repairs to the "gas buggies." In later years, he bought a truck, equipped it with a portable blacksmith outfit and followed county fairs around Michigan and Canada.

In addition to this trade, Valley served in the United States Navy during World War I and then answered the call in 1942 when he served in the Navy Sea Bees. He was discharged in 1945 as a first class petty officer after serving in the South Pacific as a blacksmith.

"I still have a lot of vim, vigor and vitality," laughed Valley, who could not be far from wrong, as he shod two horses on the morning of this visit.

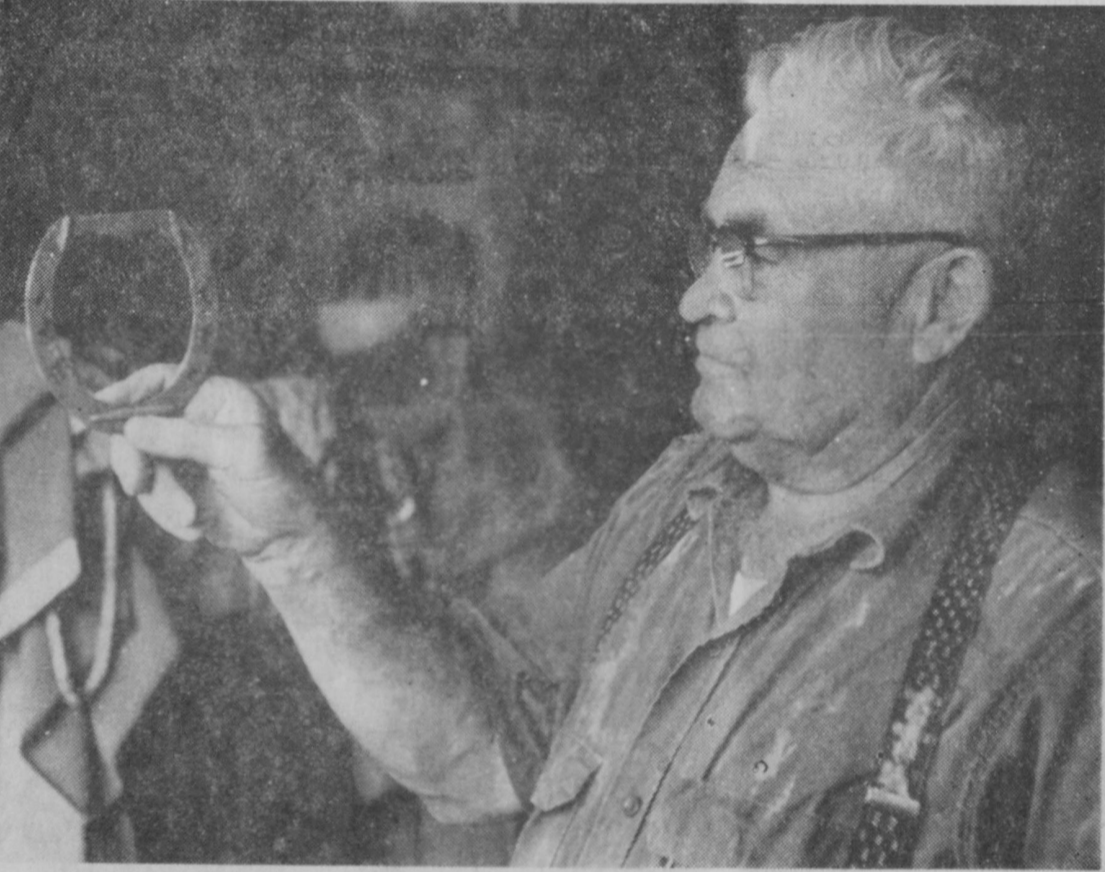
Blacksmithing is hard work and he is now taking life a little easier. Valley and his wife, Jennie, usually spend winters in Florida.

He attended Sunday's matinee races at Hale Fairgrounds and guessed he probably would attend a few other races this year in the Northeastern Michigan area.

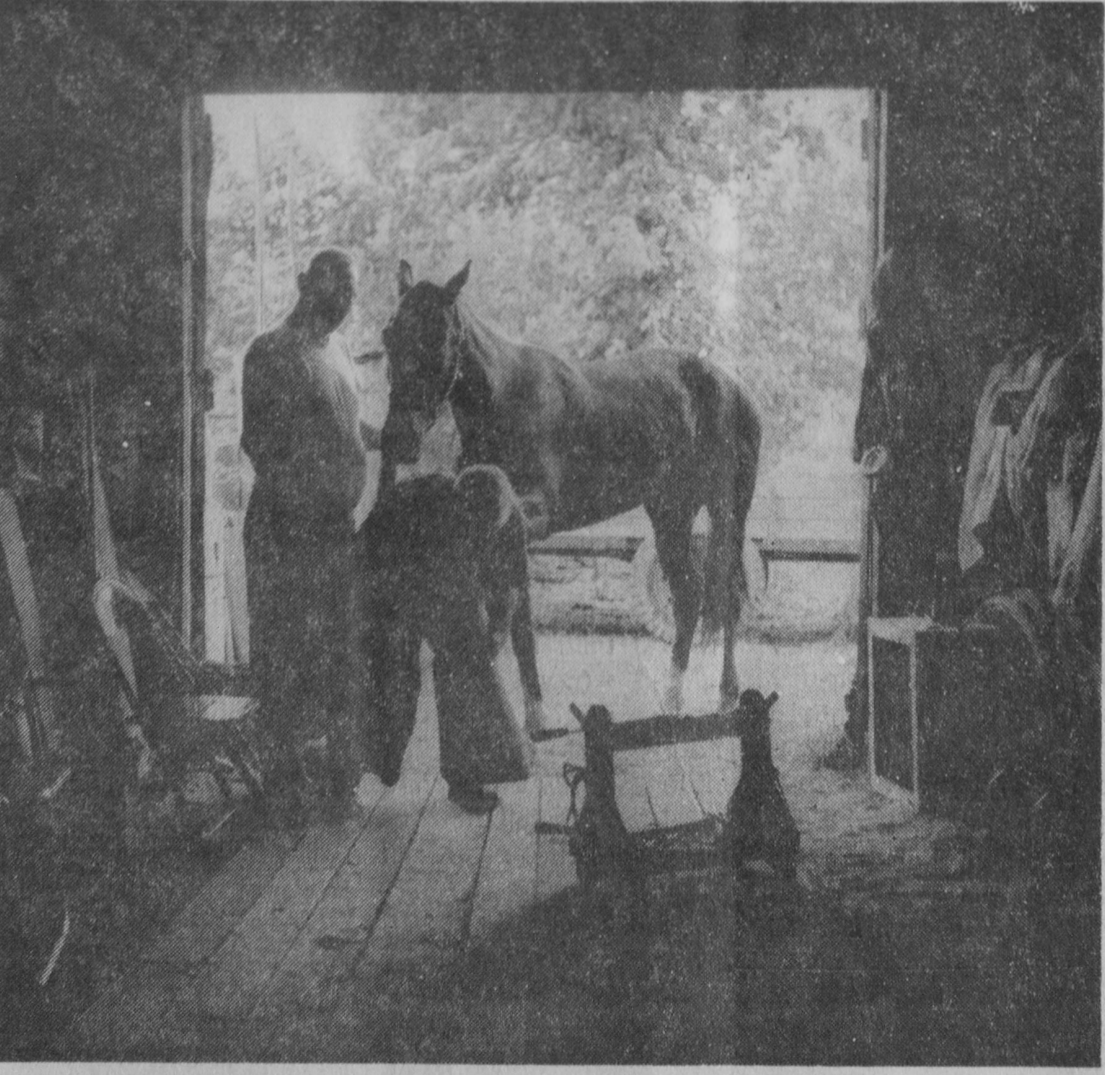

# Contractor Starts on \$48,000 Sewer Project to Serve Hale

Completion Date to be Within 150 Days of Start

Frazer Brothers Construction Company, St. Charles, started work June 21 on Plainfield Township's \$48,000 sewer system.

Financed through revenue bonds, the system is to serve the unincorporated Village of Hale.

James Mann, subcontractor for Frazer, and his crew started work Tuesday on laying 750 feet of tile along Towerline Road east of Hale. This is part of an outlet which is to serve the system's disposal area.

Inspector for the township on this project is Lawrence Shaum, who reported that work is to be completed within 150 days.

George Webb, township supervisor, reports that the system is to utilize the lagoon method of sewage treatment, similar to facilities at Tawas Point State Park. It will include two ponds of 2.04 and 1.68 acres. The lagoons will have an eight-foot sodded dike, bottoms of compacted clay and will be fenced.

Work was also started by Frazer on brushing a line for interceptor sewer mains toward town.

Edmonds Engineering, Incorporated, provided professional engineering service for the project.

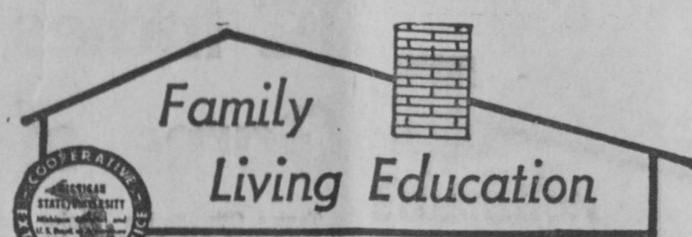

### Cream With "Culture"

Sour cream is completely different from the unpredictably flavored "cream gone sour" of grandmother's day.

What makes it different? It is pasteurized to destroy the bacteria which might "sour" the product. The pleasant modern flavor will always be the same. Only high quality cream is used.

It is homogenized to stabilize the thick velvety-smooth texture. It is scientifically refined, cultured, to a definite degree of acidity to develop the rich flavor.

Made of coffee cream consistency, 18 percent butterfat, a tablespoon contains about 29 calories.

Store it upside down to protect the perfect seal, use it within a week.

Heat sour cream sauces carefully and over hot water—high temperatures or boiling may cause curdling. Or, stir gently into sauces at the end of cooking.

Fold sour cream into mixtures, and gently, then avoid beating the mixture.

### Potato Size and Quality

Do you wonder why US No. 1 potatoes are not all the same size? Then, you should know more about potato grades. Potatoes sold as US No. 1 can range in size from 1 1/2 inches in diameter to as large as they grow. Luckily, many Michigan producers pack well above the grade standards. . . . And do you sometimes feel that potato quality should be better? According to potato grades, a 100-pound sack of US No. 1 potatoes may have six

pounds of external defects and five pounds with internal defects. All potatoes sold in Michigan retail stores must meet the minimum standards for the US grade marked on the bag . . . and all potato advertising must show grade as well as price. Keal improvements have been made in Michigan potatoes—and this will continue. Better varieties, washing, sorting for size as well as for grade, better packaging and greater care in handling are bringing you better Michigan potatoes.

**Kabobs For Outdoor Cooking**  
Have you considered a kabob for your next barbecue meal? Skewer cooking is a delightful, impressive way to entertain and everyone can get in on the act.

You will want to plan on quick-cooking foods, preferably those that will get done in the same length of time. If some do take a longer time to cook than others, potatoes and onions for example, you can precook them or use canned which are already cooked. Also, foods that share the same skewer should all be approximately the same size.

Here are some suggestions: use in any combination of meat, vegetables and fruit. Regular broiling steaks can be cut and used for kabobs without tenderizing. Beef chuck and round (US choice grade) are all right if they have been tenderized. A commercial tenderizer may be used but a marinade has the advantage of added flavor with the tenderizing it imparts. Marinated lamb is a natural for kabobs. Franks cut in one-inch pieces and cubes of canned meats or bologna. Mushrooms and sliced onions; pineapple chunks and sliced bacon; quartered tomatoes, carrots and small cooked onions; all are good kabob combinations.
