1966 Street Program Gets ET Council Okeh

A \$16,000 street construction project, part of a \$21,713.85 program for 1966, was approved Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

Included in the five streets which will require 1,345 tons of bituminous aggregate are:

West Bay Street from Sawyer to Wilkinson, 987 lineal feet, 130 tons; West State Street from Sawyer to Huron, 1,583 lineal feet, 205 tons; Newman Street from Lincoln to Tawas Lake Road, 4,200 lineal feet, 550 tons; Main Street from Bay to Westover, 420 lineal feet, 110 tons; South Newman Street from US-23 to dock, 550 lineal feet, 230 tons; intersection approaches and turning radius on above streets, 120 tons.

Remainder of the project, while included in the 1966 program, has been delayed until funds become available. This includes construction on Warren Avenue, Green Road, Jay Street, Tawas Street, Court Drive, Woodlawn Avenue, Lakewood Drive and Rainbow Drive.

Also approved was \$3,354 for ditches and drains.

East Tawas Valuation Shows \$125,450 Hike Over Previous Year

Assessed valuation of East Tawas showed an increase of \$125,450, according to a report Monday night by City Assessor Deloise (Dewey) Durant.

Total 1966 valuation of the city brought in by the board of review was \$6,228,300, as compared to \$6,102,850 for the previous year. Real estate value amounted to \$5,415,100, a \$60,950 increase over 1965. Personal property was valued at \$813,200, a \$6,405 increase.

East Tawas assessments reflect 100 percent of the state equalized valuation, or 50 percent of the cash value.

Durant's report was filed with the county equalization department and state tax commission.

Tawas City Board of Review has adjourned its sessions until March 31, when a final tabulation will be made on valuations.

Council Hears Report on US-23 Sewer Stalemate

Only five of 15 property owners on the lake side of US-23 between Mathews Street and the former Brooks Real Estate building have returned signed easements for a proposed sanitary sewer.

This report was made Monday night by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, who said that 100 percent participation was required for an easement type sewer district.

Interest in this project, which was first considered in 1952 but dropped when easements were not signed, was renewed last fall when several property owners appeared before the council.

Originally, the city had planned to extend sanitary sewer along right-of-way on both sides of US-23. Because homes on the south side of the highway have plumbing below the proposed line along the highway, engineering was obtained on a sewer running closer to the lake.

Three property owners have requested that the line be constructed along the shoreline and the city engineer is now studying to see if this would be possible.

The superintendent said the

city would like to stay away from property condemnation for the project as this would increase the cost to the special assessment district.

Bublitz said that plans for re-constructing US-23 had taken into consideration engineering for sewer, gas and storm sewer lines on the river side of the highway. The proposed project on both sides of US-23 would be connected by a loop under the road.

Members of the council said that property easements, if signed, would not be binding unless the entire project was approved by the special assessment district. Public hearings would be held for that purpose.

North side property owners, complaining that tile fields of septic tanks systems in the area may be polluting the bay, said they may go directly to the state health department and force action on the project.

Another attempt is to be made to obtain easements for the project. Several councilmen indicated that if that step failed, the only alternative would be property condemnation.

Iosco to Require Dog Vaccination Next Year

Effective next year, all dogs in Iosco County are to be vaccinated for rabies before the owner makes application for a dog license.

This action came about through passage of a resolution last Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors, which prescribed certain duties of the county dog warden deemed "necessary for the protection of public health, welfare and safety."

The measure was approved by a 14-5 roll call of supervisors. Voting

in favor were Alton Abbott, Aubrey Belson, George Blust, Robert Bolen, James Campbell, Clarence Everett, Edward Higgins, John Hosbach, Percy Jocks, L. S. Little, Richter Lixey, Clarence McKenzie, Edward Nelkie and Henry Oates. Opposed were Edward Gerard, Harvey Odell, Charles Smith, Clement Stephan and George Webb.

While control of rabies through required vaccination of all dogs will not be enforced here until 1967, the resolution had immediate effect insofar as dogs impounded by the sheriff's department.

Impounded dogs may be purchased or redeemed by furnishing proof of a valid dog license, proof that the animal had been vaccinated for rabies within one year and by paying the following expenses:

1. Board at the rate of \$1 for the first day in the pound and 50 cents for each successive day.
 2. All veterinary fees incurred.
- Any dog impounded for seven full days without being redeemed as provided is to be disposed of by the dog warden.

Such a vaccination requirement for dogs has been a state law for years, but local implementation has been at the discretion of the board of supervisors.

The board went on record stating that the state law would be strictly enforced in this county.

Immediate reaction of those charged with enforcing the dog law was in complete agreement with the board's action.

Undersheriff Leon Putnam said he had always been in favor of dog vaccination and that it had been enforced in the more populated areas of the state for years.

Arrangements are now being made to establish clinics throughout the county at which dogs may be vaccinated by a professional veterinarian.

In other business, the board concurred with a resolution from Kalamazoo County which favored a law for testing intoxication of motor vehicle drivers when investigating officers have reasonable grounds to believe the driver to be under the influence of intoxicants.

The board authorized its health committee to attend a child guidance meeting March 24 at Alpena.

LeRoy McCluer, Iosco juvenile officer, was authorized to attend the regional detention seminar May 17-18 at Lansing.

Supervisor Jocks reported that the officers' salary committee had been studying county salaries since January and that a report would be given in April.

Council Votes Hike in City Salaries

A new salary schedule for elective city officers, fire chief and garbage disposal contractor was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Annual salary of the mayor was increased from \$125 to \$150 per year, city clerk's salary was raised from \$600 to \$650 per year, salary of the city treasurer was increased from \$400 to \$450 per year plus one percent collection fee, council members are to receive \$6 per meeting attended instead of the present \$4 pay.

The appointive fire chief's salary was raised from \$50 to \$75 per year. The city garbage contractor's pay was raised from \$30 to \$33.50 per day.

Pay of the election board was increased from \$18 to \$20 per day and parttime help pay was increased from \$6 to \$8 per day.

Only salaries not increased were for the three ward supervisors. Annual salary of these offices is to remain at \$150 per year.

In other business, one building application was approved during the past two weeks. A permit was granted to Orville Leslie Jr., 319 Lake Street, for constructing of a new roof and plastering ceilings, \$1,000.

A request from George A. Prescott for rezoning a parcel of property on M-55 at German Street from residential to commercial was referred to the planning commission for its recommendation.

In answer to a letter from the city, the county drain commissioner said that cleaning of the Townline Drain from US-23 to the lake was being considered. Work is to be commenced this spring.

Iosco Board Opposes Proposed MC Facility Operational Change

Iosco Board of Supervisors has voiced vigorous opposition to Senate Bill 882 which would transfer responsibility for operating county medical care facilities and county infirmaries to the state department of public health.

In a resolution transmitted to State Sen. Robert L. Richardson Jr., State Rep. Sanford E. Charron and to those legislators sponsoring three different bills, supervisors said that removing responsibility for control of such facilities from local government would not be in the best interest of citizens of the community.

A public act of 1939 presently places responsibility for the establishment, extension and operation of county medical care facilities and county infirmaries in the county department of social services, thereby vesting responsibility in the hands of local governmental officers directly accountable to citizens of the community concerned.

Elected officers of Iosco County recently voted a special assessment to provide funds for construction of a county medical care facility, now nearing completion, under provisions of the 1939 act, in the belief and expectation that the facility would be operated by the board of supervisors.

Iosco's Firefighters Poised for Annual Spring Battle

State and federal fire fighting crews, along with assistance from local volunteer firemen, are now poised for a battle against wild grass fires.

Fighting spring grass fires is but one job of the many handled by the Michigan Department of Conservation and the United States Forest Service.

Forest fire prevention will be of principal concern to those two agencies later in the season when wooded areas become extremely dry.

But, for the moment, keeping Michigan green is of primary importance. In spite of the fact that brushland areas and fields are still wet from winter snow and rain, one or two warm days with

high winds can send the burning index soaring.

Under Michigan law, a permit is required in order to have an open fire except when the ground is snowcovered. Any person who willfully, negligently or carelessly sets a fire which injures or endangers the property of another is subject to prosecution.

In addition, any person who negligently allows a fire to escape is liable for expenses incurred.

One of the primary reasons for requiring a burning permit is to actually have on record the location of all controlled grass fires.

In this way, false runs will not be made by men and equipment when smoke is spotted from fire towers and observation airplanes.

Both the department of conservation and federal forest service have protection areas within Iosco County.

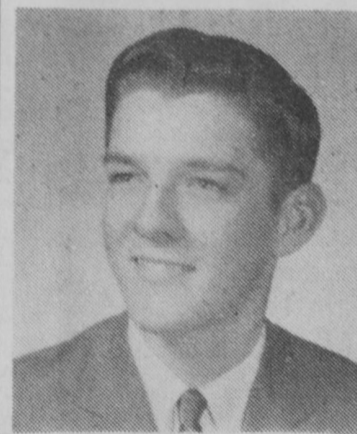

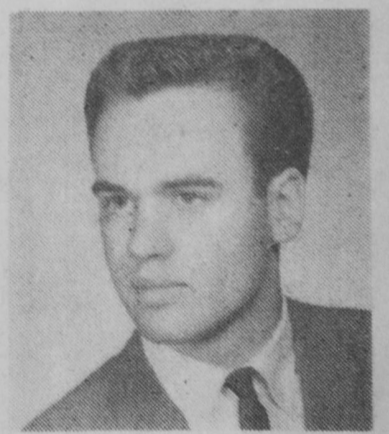
Certain conditions relative to the time of day and weather conditions are prescribed by issuing officers for burning permit applicants.

Paper Written by ET Pastor Used in Amish Defense Case

A paper written by the Rev. William C. Lindholm, pastor of Grace and Hope Lutheran Church, East Tawas and Oscoda, will be used in an appeal to the Kansas Supreme Court in behalf of an Amishman arrested for not sending his child to an accredited school. A Hutchinson, Kansas, attorney who said as a boy he spent many hours in the Tawas area wrote: "I am presently in the process of preparing our brief for the Supreme Court of the State of Kansas and find much in your article which I believe will be a benefit."

Pastor Lindholm has been very disturbed about the plight of the Amish people and their efforts to defend their school systems. ASC To Cooperate in Wildlife Week

Frank Light, chairman of the Michigan State ASC Committee, said that 78 county ASCS offices in Michigan will cooperate with local sportsmen's and wildlife organizations in the observance of National Wildlife Week, March 20-26.

National Wildlife Week is sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation and the Michigan United Conservation Clubs. This year, the project focuses public attention on the need to preserve natural beauty.

The observance points to urgent needs for controlling water and air pollution, reducing soil erosion and preventing the littering of lakes, streams, forests, parks and highways. Valuable assistance is provided by state and federal governmental conservation agencies.

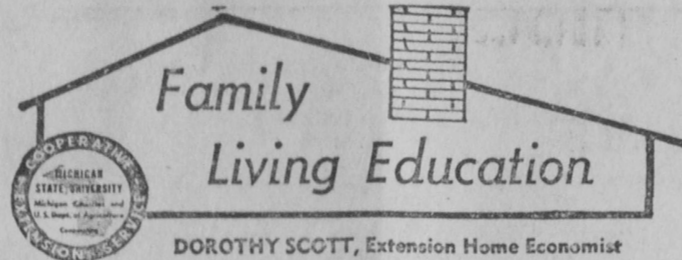
Light emphasized that we must not overlook the fact that conservation practices also improve natural beauty. When the pollution is removed from a stream, its beauty is enhanced. When trees, grasses or shrubs heal scars on the land, the natural beauty is restored.

Soil, water, woodland and wildlife practices cost-shared under the agricultural conservation program benefit wildlife. These practices also beautify the countryside. New beautification practices have been added to the 1966 program.

Conservation, then, besides its multitude of other values and benefits, gives us this added bonus of making our environment a better and more meaningful place in which to live.

Hello Everyone!
Before we go further into what is new in household fabrics, let us try to simplify the most frequently used synthetic fiber names. An easy way to relate them is like we do names of people in a family. Take the Jones family. Suppose there are Jim, Sue, Ann Marie and Bill Jones. This we understand.

Synthetic fibers have family names, too. Each family consists of several members. Examples are: Avril, Lirelle, Zantron and Corval RAYON; Dacron, Fortrel, Kodol and Vycron POLYESTER; Hercilon, Vectra and Reevon POLYPROPYLENE; Aerilan, Orlon, Orlon Cantreco, Orlon Savelle, Zefran and Creslan ACRYLIC; Dynel and Verel MODACRYLIC; Arnel TRIACETATE; Chromspun and Celanese ACETATE; Lycra SPANDEX; Rovana SARAN.

Members of the same synthetic family have some like and some different characteristics. Members of your family do, too, do they not?

What quick things can we remember about different synthetic families? Nylon is strong, elastic; Acetate, fragile, heat sensitive; Acrylic, crimped, wool-like; Fibreglas, does not burn, subject to abrasion; Polypropylene, very non-absorptive, light weight; Polyester, springy, wrinkle resistant; Rayon, much like natural cotton fiber, low wet strength; Modified Rayon, more wet strength, silky look; Saran, water and flame resistant; Spandex, elastic; Triacetate, holds shape, pleats well.

A given fiber may be adapted to various uses distinguished in several ways. An example is Nylon and 501 Nylon (for carpet use).

Among newcomers to the synthetic families, we can expect to hear from: Enkrome RAYON, Zefkrome and Orlon 33 ACRYLIC, Beta FIBERGLAS, Marvess POLYPROPYLENE, Vycron 55, Kodol II and IV POLYESTER, Antron Caprolan, Enkaloft and Quilon NYLON, Estron ACETATE. Just remember, they are more mem-

bers of the same families. Several fabric finishes are important to household articles. Built-in whiteners can be a permanent part of the Polyesters, which tend to gray. Whiteners are a fluorescent compound that assures a greater whiteness or brightness that stays. They do not prevent color pick-up or soil build-up from poor laundry methods. Look for a permanent whiteness indicator on labels and handtags.

Fluoridizers are chemical treatments resulting in resistance to both water and oil-borne stains—stain resistance, not stain proofness. Actually, the finish simply gives us time to act before serious damage results. However, we have a responsibility to keep the finish effective. Thorough rinsing is a must. Should deep soil penetration occur, flush it out using a cleaner such as Lestoil or Mr. Clean. Launder and rinse very thoroughly afterward. Scotchgard and Zepel are two names for this finish found on handtags.

Estron SLR (sunlight resistant) acetate is available for curtains and draperies. It helps make acetate a satisfactory window treatment, along with other kinds of fabrics. All fabrics lose some strength over time due to sunlight.

Professional and some do-it-yourself fabric finish applications are possible. One is a durable elas-

tic coating that gives moth proofing; water, mildew and rot resistance to rugs, draperies, canvas and other fabrics. Next week, the topic will be carpet news.

Garbage and Refuse Site Operators Should Apply Soon for Annual State Health License

Operators of garbage and refuse disposal sites in the state should apply for their annual license as soon as possible, according to Fred B. Kellow, chief of the environmental health planning unit, Michigan Department of Public Health.

Kellow, in charge of the licensure program, said that applications are now available at all local health departments and the state health department. State law requires that each operator obtain an annual license or be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The law, passed by the Michigan legislature last year, states that each operator must pay an annual fee of \$25 for the license and provide a minimum performance bond

of \$2,500 or \$500 per acre. The bond is filed with the state health director.

Although governmentally operated disposal sites are not subject to the annual license fee, units of government are required to post a performance bond on the same basis as private sites, Kellow observed.

Annual licenses to operate disposal areas expire September 1 each year. Renewals will be based on reappraisal and operational techniques observed during local health department site inspection.

Fifth Loggers' Workshop March 28 at Grayling

The fifth in a successful and unusual series of "Loggers' Workshops" is due to start Monday, March 28, in Grayling, according to Marvin Davenport, county extension agent.

"Michigan's booming pulpwood industry is using wood at an astonishing rate," states Agent Davenport. "It takes a lot of good loggers to keep these plants rolling. This workshop helps to get more good men into this important industry but even more, it helps those now working to improve their efficiency."

Details of the four-week program are listed as follows: A logger can receive up to \$78 per week while attending. Course fees are paid from funds under the area redevelopment act. Subsistence and travel allowances are paid through the MESC. Periods usually run from 10:00 a. m. to 5:40 p.

m. Monday through Friday. They are held in the agriculture shop in the Grayling Community School.

Anyone who is interested in woods work or any unemployed woods worker is eligible to apply. He should report as soon as possible to his nearest office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (unemployment office) to sign up for the workshop.

Additional details can be secured from the Cooperative Extension Office, East Tawas.

ORDINANCE NO. 5

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE LICENSING OF PERSONS ENGAGING IN THE OPERATION FOR PROFIT OF MARINAS, RIDING STABLES, POOL OR BILLIARD ROOMS, DANCE HALLS, MECHANICAL AMUSEMENT DEVICES, AND GARBAGE COLLECTION; WITH PENALTIES FOR ENGAGING IN SAID OPERATIONS WITHOUT A LICENSE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF GRANT ORDAINS

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall, either as owner, proprietor, operator or manager, establish, maintain, or operate for profit any marina, riding stable, pool or billiard room, dance hall, mechanical amusement device or garbage collection service without first obtaining and thereafter possessing a license in a manner hereinafter provided.

Definitions
Section 2. Operating a "marina" shall mean engaging in a business involving repeated sales, use, rental or rentals of a boat, boats or other water borne vessels.

Section 3. Operating a "riding stable" shall mean repeated provision for profit of a horse, horses or other animals for riding.

Section 4. "Pool rooms," "billiard rooms" and "dance halls" shall have the meanings usually and normally accorded to said terms.

Section 5. "Mechanical Amusement Device" shall mean any machine which, upon the insertion of a coin, slug, token, plate, disc, or key, may be operated by the public, generally, for use as a game, entertainment, or amusement, whether or not registering a score, or for the emission of songs or music. It shall include such device as marble machines, pinball machines, skill ball machines, mechanical grab machines, nickelodeons, music boxes, and all games, operations, or transactions similar thereto by whatever name they may be known.

Application For License
Section 6. Application for the licenses required above shall be made in writing by the owner, proprietor, operator or manager of such business to the Township Clerk. Included in said application shall be a sworn statement giving the location of such business, the names and addresses of the applicant, the owner of the premises, the operator and the manager or other local agent, if other than the owner, operator or manager, together with a detailed description of the operation contemplated.

Investigation
Section 7. The Township Clerk may refer any application for a license to the Enforcing Officer for an investigation and recommendation on matters pertaining to the public safety, health, or welfare which are or may be involved in the exercise of the license applied for, including the good moral character of the person, firm or corporation applying for such license, and including such other information as may be necessary to establish the identity of the applicant.

Cost of License
Section 8. The cost of the license required by this Ordinance shall be the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) each.

Issuance of License
Section 9. Upon recommendation by the Enforcing Officer that a license be issued and the receipt from the applicant of said license fee, the Township Clerk shall issue the license applied for.

Section 10. All licenses shall begin on May 1st in each year and shall terminate on April 30th of the following year: Provided, that any license issued between March 30th and April 30th of any year shall expire on the 30th day of April one (1) year after the date of the issuance thereof.

Authority of Township Officers To Enter And Inspect
Section 11. Acceptance of any person, firm or corporation of a license granted under this Ordinance shall constitute permission to any officer of the Township to enter upon and inspect the premises or property where such license is exercised at all reasonable times.

Renewal
Section 12. Application for the renewal of any license shall be considered to be and shall be treated in the same manner as an original application for such license.

Non-transferability
Section 13. Licenses issued by the Township shall not be transferable, unless specifically authorized by the Township Board.

Suspension And Revocation
Section 14. Any license required by this Ordinance may be suspended or revoked, or the renewal thereof refused, for misrepresentation of any material fact in the application for such license or

for any good cause, by the Township Board or by the officer of the Township to whom application was required to be made to secure such license. The term "good cause" as used in this Section, shall mean any act, omission, or the permitting of a condition to exist, with respect to the license in question, which is:

(a) Contrary to the health, morals, safety, or welfare of the public;

(b) Unlawful or fraudulent in nature;

(c) A violation of this Ordinance;

(d) Beyond the scope of the license issued; and/or

(e) A fact, circumstance, or condition, which, had it existed or been known to the issuing authority at the time the license was granted, would have been sufficient grounds for the refusal thereof.

Notice And Revocation Of License; Hearing
Section 15. No license issued under this Ordinance shall be revoked except after hearing with not less than ten (10) days' notice to the licensee stating the time and place of such hearing and setting forth reasons for revocation. Said notice shall be mailed to the license holder by the Township Clerk certified mail, return receipt requested, at the address set forth in the application for said license.

Appeal To Township Board
Section 16. An applicant for any license who has been refused such license or a person whose license has been revoked for any reason by the authorized issuing officer may appeal such refusal to the Township Board by setting forth all the facts in a written petition and filing the same with the Clerk. The Township Board may set forth therein or may grant a further hearing to the applicant. The decision of the Township Board on such appeal shall be final.

Licenses To Minors Prohibited
Section 17. No license shall be issued under this Ordinance to any person under the age of eighteen (18) years.

Clerk To Keep Record Of License Applications
Section 18. The Township Clerk shall keep a record of all applications for licenses made under this Ordinance indicating whether the license applied for in each case has been granted or withheld, and, if withheld, the reason therefor.

Appointment Of Enforcing Officer
Section 19. Ronald Ponke and Carl Smith are hereby appointed the Enforcing Officers of this Ordinance. The Township Board shall, whenever required, provide by Resolution for replacements.

Penalties
Section 20. Any person, firm or corporation engaging without a valid, existing license in any of the operations or activities covered by this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both said fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. Each and every day this Ordinance is violated shall be deemed a separate offense.

Publication And Effect
Section 21. Publication of this Ordinance shall be made by causing a true copy thereof to be inserted twice in The Tawas Herald, which insertion shall be made within ten (10) days after the passage thereof. Said Ordinance shall not take effect until thirty (30) days shall have elapsed after the publication thereof, at which time it shall take immediate effect.

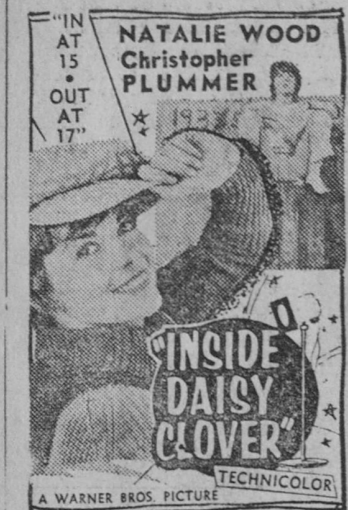
