

East Tawas Only City Featuring Election Races

Several contests for city offices and a general obligation bond proposition at East Tawas feature the Monday, April 4, spring election. Elections will be held in three Isosco cities. There are no contests listed in Tawas City or Whittemore.

At East Tawas, major interest is concerned with the race between James Campbell and Lewis Besancon for the office of mayor. Clarence McKenzie, who had served the city in that capacity since his election in 1962, retires from office following the April 4 election.

Campbell was top vote-getter in the February 21 primary with 226 of the 516 ballots cast. But Besancon had 158 votes and both men will be seeking a share of the 132 votes cast for James Bolen, who was eliminated from the running.

Besancon served eight years as city hall office manager and presently is a member of the East Tawas Park Board. Campbell presently serves as First Ward alderman.

Other races next Monday find Earl Hester, US-23 grocery store owner, and Mrs. Carol Tracy, wife of the county intermediate school superintendent, competing for Campbell's vacancy on the city council.

Incumbent Third Ward Alderman Robert Bolen is opposed by Merton J. Killey, chairman of the park board.

Second Ward Alderman Edward Higgins is unopposed as are Treasurer Grace Pelton, Clerk Fred B. Lomas and Justice of the Peace Carl Eckman.

There are no contests at Tawas City. Seeking re-election are George Tuttle, mayor; Walter C. Nelson, clerk; Ruth Albertson, treasurer; Daniel J. Ulrich, First Ward alderman; Clyde Eovil, Second Ward alderman; Howard W. Hatton, Third Ward alderman; Clement J. Stephan, First Ward supervisor; John E. Hoshach, Second Ward supervisor; Clarence S. Everett, Third Ward supervisor.

Unopposed candidates at Whit-

temore include George Blust, mayor; Bert Fortune, clerk; Mary Wasilewski, treasurer; Edward Graham, assessor; Octave St. James, First Ward alderman; Irum Collins, First Ward constable; Floyd Freel, Second Ward alderman; Melvin Bowen, Second Ward constable.

East Tawas Voters Decide Monday—

Approval Sought for Sewer Bonds

Next Monday's annual spring election will find East Tawas voters deciding the question of constructing a new sewage treatment plant and improvement to that city's municipal collection system.

A special proposition included with the regular ballot asks that a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue be approved for financing part of the cost of this construction.

The city council plans to use this money along with a federal grant, which it believes will be obtained. The bonds need not be sold immediately, but would await the outcome of a federal grant.

Only property owners and their spouses may vote on the question. Persons purchasing property on land contract are classed as property owners for voting purposes. The bonds need a 60 percent majority vote for approval.

To pay the interest and principal each year on the general obligation bonds, it is planned to have sewage rates include enough to pay this, instead of putting the amount on the tax roll. In this manner, users of the system would pay for the new plant and improvements and no tax money would be involved.

General obligation bonds can be sold at a lower rate of interest and could be as much as one percent below revenue bonds, which would amount to a \$3,000 savings annually.

Special assessments, which are not taxes, would be charged against properties for the lateral sewers running in front of those properties for the collection from homes and business places. The cost may be on a front foot basis or on a lump sum basis charged against the property. These costs would be determined by the engineers.

Special assessment procedures must be adhered to rigidly. Written notices of the assessment would be mailed to each property owner affected. A date for a hearing would be announced. Any property owner could attend the meeting and register his objections, which would be considered by the city council on its merits. Only after a hearing could a final assessment roll be ordered and prepared.

The city council considers the sewage project a most vital and important public improvement, the need for which grows greater each year as the present plant is over 30 years old and inadequate.

The state health department is interested in this matter and will be watching to see what steps are being taken to protect the public health of citizens and summer visitors.

After a week-long survey made by the department of health mobile laboratory in July 1958, results indicated a population, based on flow, of 5,650 persons and the population equivalent, based on strength, of 5,800.

The present plant, built in 1933 and designed for a 1963 population of 1,645, has a collection system designed only for the area lying south of Washington Street and between Huron and Adams Streets.

The present collection system has been extended to its practical limits and additional extensions can now be made only after the construction of costly lift stations. It is very unlikely that the state health department would approve construction permits for any additions to the sewer system that would increase the load on an already overburdened treatment plant.

The health department also

feels that the present treatment facility, aside from being inadequate, is in an undesirable location in that the receiving waters, having little or no turbulence or movement, cannot satisfactorily complete the recovery cycle for used water which is necessary to make the area properly safe for recreational use.

After receiving the February 1964 report, the state health department, in a letter to the city council (March 1964), expressed its "sincere desire that the city proceed with all haste to construct these needed improvements."

The treatment plant proposed for this project will have a design capacity of approximately 7,000 persons and would be located in the northwest section of the city so that effluent will be directed to the river. The collection system is designed so that it can be extended to include the entire corporate limits of the city.

A public meeting to discuss the sewage project will be held at the city hall Friday, April 1, 7:30 p. m. Various phases of the project will be discussed by engineers, the health department and financial consultant. The mayor is to preside over the panel.

Officials of the Tawas junior baseball program are in a bind—there are many vacancies for managers of Pony and Knothole teams that will have to be filled soon in order for the 400-boy program to operate this summer. \$468,750 Suit Against County Gets New Trial

A 1963 circuit court jury verdict absolving the Isosco Road Commission in a \$468,750 damage suit brought by the widow of a prominent Saginaw businessman has been reversed by the Michigan Court of Appeals and a new trial ordered.

Justice Thomas C. Kavanagh, in

reviewing the case, ruled last Thursday that an autopsy report concerning Hilmer J. Hall and entered during the February 1963 trial was not permissible.

Hall was killed July 1, 1961, when a road grader backed over him during construction on the Indian Lake Road near Floyd Lake.

The victim had been watching construction from a bank alongside the roadway just moments before his body was discovered on the road by Kenneth Blake, Isosco Road Commission employee. There were no eyewitnesses to the tragedy.

Mrs. Augusta O. Hall, widow of the deceased, brought suit against the road commission and sought nearly one-half million dollars in damages. The trial was originally set to be held in Isosco but was moved to Arenac County when Judge Allan C. Miller granted a change of venue at the request of attorneys for Mrs. Hall.

On February 22, 1963, a jury brought in a "no cause for action" verdict before Arenac Circuit Judge Dennis O'Keefe.

Attorneys for Mrs. Hall had argued that the road grader had been operated in a careless and negligent manner but the road commission's answer claimed that death resulted from Hall's own careless and negligence in going into a place of obvious and conspicuous danger.

Chief counsel for Isosco during the trial was then Probate Judge H. Read Smith and trial attorney was John Watkins of East Tawas, assisted by Paul Harvey, former Isosco prosecuting attorney.

Tawas Area Application Set for State Action Thursday

Complete approval of the program developed by Alexander to further train slow learners was given by the board of education.

The program is to be presented Thursday to state officials at Lansing and Alexander said he had been assured that it would receive approval.

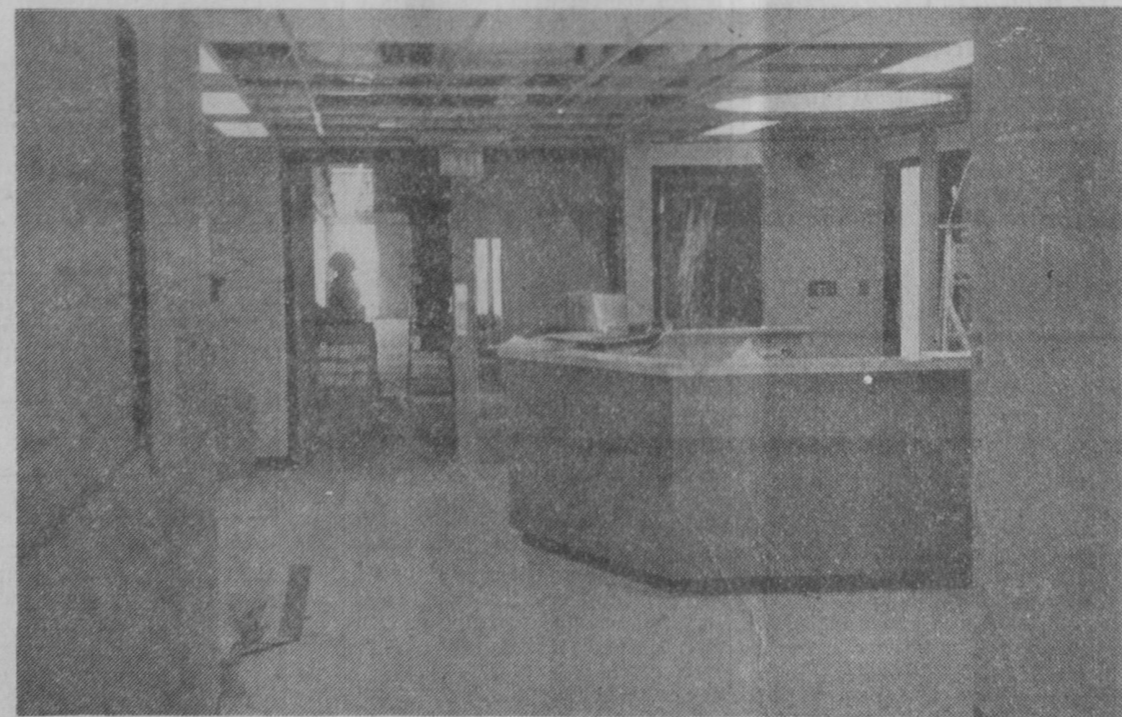
Tawas Area is making application for \$42,424 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act to finance its program starting June 13. It has been estimated

that approximately 140 youngsters in public and parochial schools here need special training in reading.

The program is to be staffed by members of the school faculty. Classes would be held for seven weeks from Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Bus transportation would be provided for students in grades four through nine.

In addition to providing remedial reading courses for children, the federal funds would also provide tuition scholarships to two teachers in the school system. They would receive training during the summer concerning teaching of remedial courses.

Answers Policy Critics—

Fish Chief Maintains Bay Perch are Stunted

Competition for space by fish, not a lack of food, was the main point emphasized by a Michigan Department of Conservation spokesman in defending the department's recent liberalization of commercial laws on netting perch.

Dr. Howard A. Tanner, chief of the department's fish division, was here Monday noon to answer local criticism directed at the recently adopted policy of the Michigan Conservation Commission which removes size limits and closed seasons on commercial perch fishing.

Tanner and Walter Crowe, fish department aide, met with local press representatives and State Sen. Robert Richardson, Saginaw, who arranged the session.

In justifying biologically the removal of the size limit and closed season on perch, Dr. Tanner reiterated the same reasons he outlined at a joint hearing last November of senate and house conservation committees.

He also produced a report on findings from a week-long survey conducted by the department last August on Saginaw Bay showing that perch in these waters were stunted, slow-growing individuals.

He said that last year's survey only confirmed previous reports from other areas of Great Lakes waters which indicated that perch were becoming shorter and fatter.

Commenting on the exceptional fine catches of jumbo perch taken through the ice of Tawas Bay during the past winter, the fish division chief explained that it was possible for certain fish in one age group to grow more rapidly than others in the competition for space and food. He said, however, that on the whole, perch of Saginaw Bay were slow-growing and final conclusions "should not be based on one school of fish."

Tanner emphasized that the physical change in perch was not caused by a shortage of food, but rather that the fish were under stress due to a lack of space.

Answering a Herald editorial, he said the department does not consider perch to be trash fish, unless they are too small. "If we would have wanted them harvested completely, we would have taken off the mesh size on gill nets," he emphasized that legal size of gill nets remains at 2½ inches and that only about 13 percent of the total catch would be under the former legal size limit.

Tanner said that the department was going to give primary interest to sport fishing on the Great Lakes. While his division is interested in expanding both sport and commercial fishing, he said that only when there is a conflict between the two, such as in the Tawas area last summer, would there be any necessity for restricting commercial fishing.

He cited the fact that a recent change in fish laws prohibits set-

ting of commercial fish nets in water less than 18 feet in depth along the shoreline from Harrisville to Point AuGres between June 10 and September 10. This change is for the benefit of sport fishermen and boat operators. Another recent law change prohibits out-of-state operators from fishing in Michigan waters.

The department is now studying the possibility of establishing certain annual tonnage limits for the commercial harvest of fish in the Great Lakes.

Crowe said that the fish division would be most anxious to see what commercial fishermen would market this year. "We are going to continue to take samples to see what is being harvested," he said.

"We have but one yardstick in conservation—is a restrictive or liberalization measure good for the resource," said Dr. Tanner. After spending 1½ years as Michigan's fish division director and after years of study by the department, Tanner believed that the department's policy to remove excess numbers of slow-growing perch was proper.

The fish division chief said that a change of environment in the Great Lakes has also affected other species of fish, noting the disappearance from Lake Huron of the lake trout, walleye, herring, white fish and the emergence of the alewife.

"We would really have to be optimistic if we thought lake trout could again reach large numbers in Lake Huron. Alewife predation on eggs of other fish may be bringing about this change."

Dr. Tanner was very enthusiastic about the department's introduction of coho salmon in the Great Lakes, which he said should help to curb the population explosion of the alewife.

Tanner said he could envision the day when 10 pounds of alewife would produce one pound of salmon or steelheads . . . or perhaps 40,000,000 pounds of sport fish using this yardstick.

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County Board Plans Millage Vote June 13

A special millage proposition will be placed before Isosco voters at the annual school election June 13 asking approval of a measure to finance cost of a special education program for handicapped youngsters.

William Tracy, Isosco Intermediate School superintendent, announced Monday that voters would be asked to approve a special voted tax of three-quarters of a mill to finance the program.

Such a program has been under consideration by the intermediate school district and area school boards for several years.

Tracy said that this was a fairly new program dealing with special education through schools to handicapped children. It would serve children with speech defects and handicaps both physical, emotional and mental.

"We must realize that every child with a handicap is a human being with the same needs of all children," said Tracy. He said that it would be best to educate such children as close to home as possible and that such a program would teach the children to live with the handicaps.

He said that if the special tax was approved, special classes would be established in area schools for slow-learning children who are capable of educational training.

He said that the program would operate on a budget basis determined by local schools and the full three-quarters of a mill may not be necessary. Approximately 75 percent of the cost of the program would be reimbursed by the state.

Schools Continue Reorganization Talk

Discussion continued last night (Tuesday) on the possible reorganization of five area school districts into one large unit.

A meeting was held at Whittemore-Preseott Area High School as the direct result of the Isosco Reorganization Study Committee's recommendation last year that, while area school boundaries should remain unchanged for the present, a survey should be made with the idea of reorganization.

Attending the meeting were representatives of Arenac Eastern, AuGres-Sims, Whittemore-Preseott Area, Hale Area and Tawas Area. Standish-Sterling Central was invited to sit in on the discussions as its boundaries are contiguous to two of the districts.

A determination was to have been made on the hiring of professional assistance to study school district boundaries and to recommend changes in high school districts.

Mentioned as a possible supplier of resource personnel have been Central Michigan University, Michigan State University and the University of Michigan. It was estimated that cost of such a survey would be from \$1 to \$1.70 per capita, to be paid on a prorated basis.

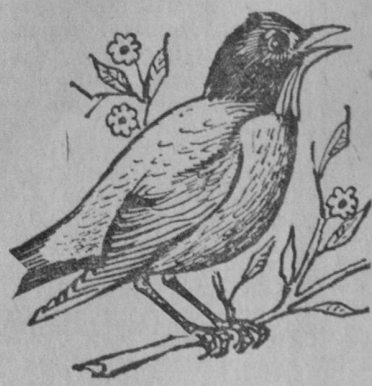

"We are making a diligent search but as yet have been unable to find a new county nurse for Iosco," reports Dr. L. A. Lambert of East Tawas, district health director.

Iosco has been without a county nurse since the January 1 resignation of Mrs. Harold Drengberg.

Mrs. Lillian J. Richards, new county nurse for Alcona, is assisting with work in the northern half of this county and the Ogemaw nurse is aiding with duties in the southern half of Iosco.

Any qualified nurse interested in the position may contact Dr. Lambert at the district health office or the county nurse office in the Iosco County Building.

Mrs. C. T. Prescott has been hired as the new office clerk for

the Iosco office. This office is now open from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon daily.

Dr. Lambert said that immunization clinics are being held every Tuesday afternoon, 1:00 to 4:30 p. m., at the county office.

"A nurse is in attendance during these immunization periods. Free vaccinations are provided any child three months of age and up and anyone requesting this service is eligible. No previous application is necessary," said Dr. Lambert.

The office is now investigating the possibility of conducting preschool immunization for next fall's kindergartners at the county office rather than to have the county nurse visit the various schools.

The district health director said that it appeared such a program would be more feasible than under the former visitation system and scheduling is now being arranged through local schools.

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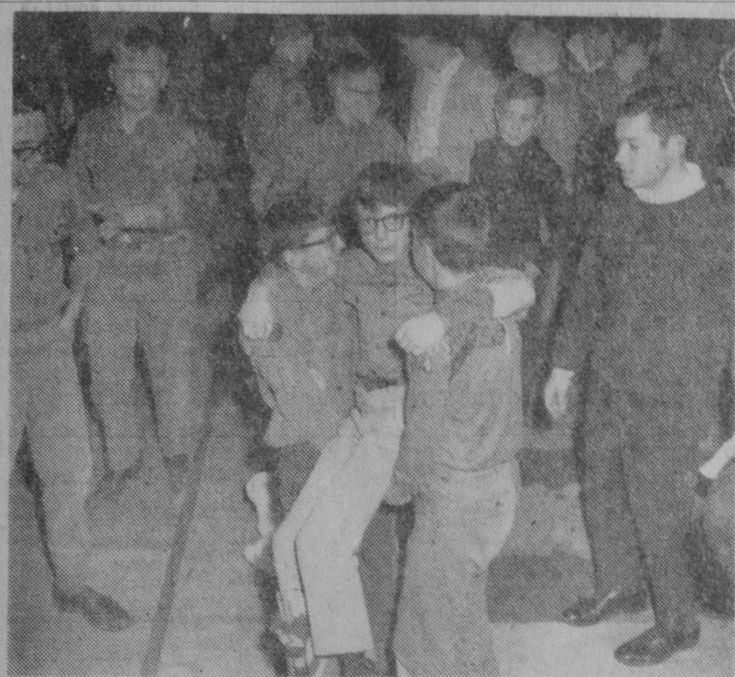

Two from Iosco Attend Animal Breeder's Meet

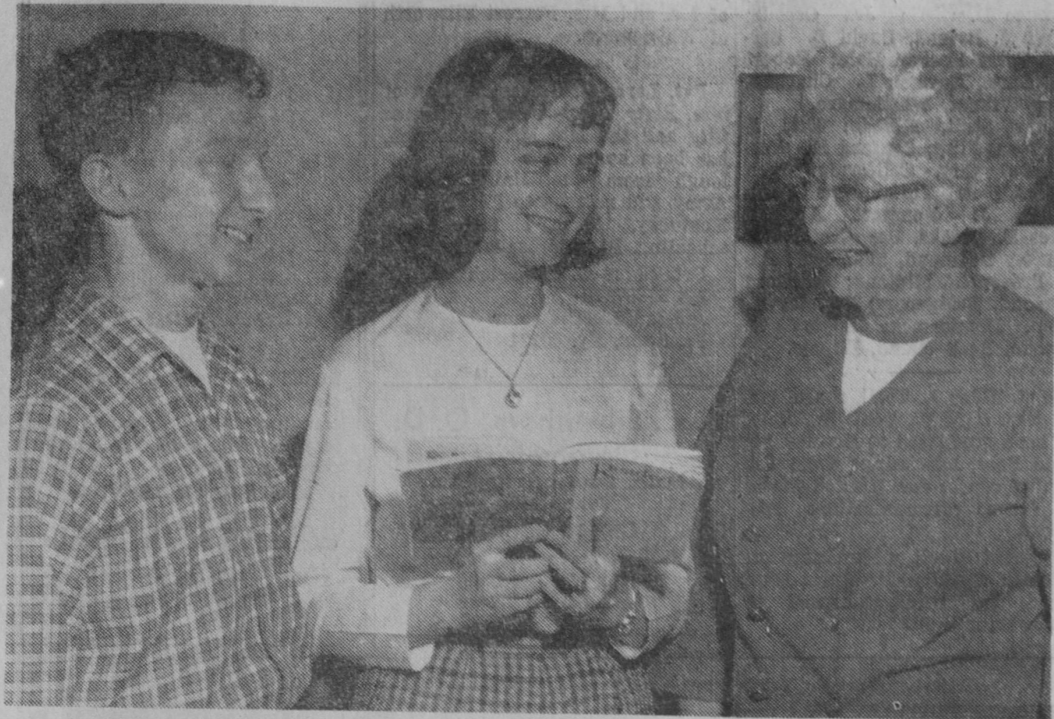

There were 8,485 fewer registered births in Michigan during 1965 than the previous year, according to provision statistics released by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

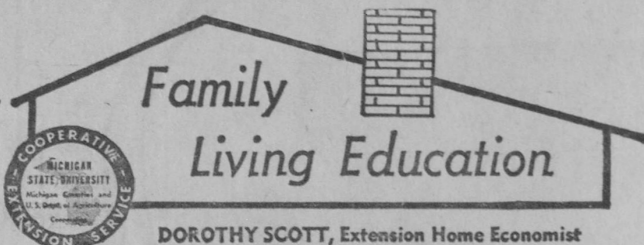
The figures showed 165,483 births in 1965 as compared to 173,968 in 1964. In 1963, 177,636 births were recorded.

Hello Everyone!
Never have we had so many choices for carpeting and there are going to be more and more! One can have everything from the small scatter rugs to room size rugs and broadloom carpeting installed wall to wall. They can be made from natural or synthetic fibers or in a multitude of fabric blends and in an almost never ending array of colors, patterns and textures.

While wool remains an important carpet fabric, consumers are more and more giving the nod to nylon, acrylic and polypropylene fabrics as they choose carpeting for their homes.

Improved rayons are making new inroads in the carpet market and an extension of the polyesters to broadloom floor coverage is logical. They are now widely used in scatter rugs.

Polypropylene carpeting is the one bringing the most questions just now. Claimed for it are outstanding qualities of cleanability, color-fastness and durability. The carpet yarn is produced as a continuous filament (also being done with nylon). This means less fuzzing, pilling or shedding. This fiber was engineered especially for carpets, an approach different from other fibers made them adapted to various uses, including carpet. Of course, polypropylene will be used for purposes other than carpet, too. This carpet fiber does not absorb moisture, a reason why it is suggested for use in nurseries and kitchens, believe it or not.

In fact, a push to carpeting is being made to more and more rooms in homes, as well as in hospitals and schools. Claims are made that there is less maintenance problem with some new carpetings than is required for smooth surface floor coverings. They can be unaffected by mildew, moths, etc., non-allergenic and cut down on noise.

If you are interested in a particular kind of carpeting, you may be able to get a remnant piece. Put it on your floor, walk on it, see how it soaks, cleans, shows footprints and the like.

New uses for carpeting can be yours with some new developments. There is an indoor-outdoor carpet for use in patios, breezeways, in boats, beside the pool, in playrooms, kitchens, bathroom, basement or family room. The first offering is quite inexpensive and made to have a felt like appearance. The fiber is polypropylene with two family members named Vectra and Marvess. Wetting does not harm it, though it should be dry when vacuumed. It can be hosed down out-of-doors. Coming is another one with the pile look of conventional carpet.

Another process in making an indoor-outdoor carpet is to use a vinyl back and have a "flocked" on nylon face.

Then, there is a durable grass for lawns, putting greens and the like from Rovana Saran—looks, feels, rustles like grass, outwears it 1,000 to one.

Watch for braided rugs from polypropylene.

Maintenance of pile height and resiliency is claimed for solution dyed Zetkrome Acrylic carpeting that has been nine years in development. Orlon 33 Polyester carpeting features spiral shaped fibers. They push against each other in the carpet, making air spaces, bulk and a luxurious look, as well as hold each other upright.

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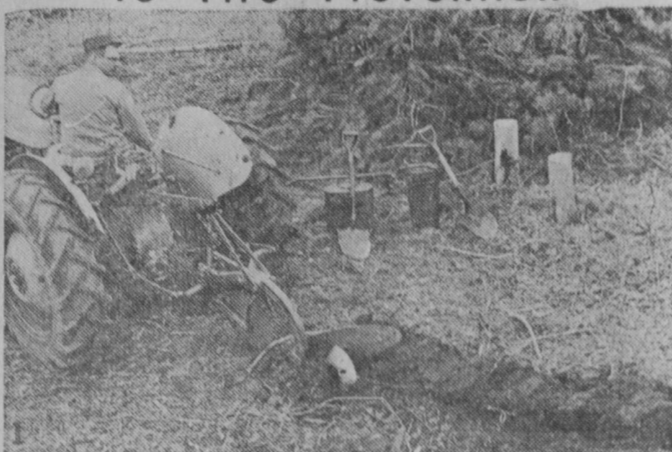

Urges Placing of 'Medi-Label' on Back of Driver's License

If you have a driver's license or especially if you are one of the almost 2,000,000 Michigan folks who will be renewing driver's license this year, the Michigan Department of Public Health strongly urges you to request your doctor to place a "Medi-Label" on it. This small sticker, containing medical information important in an emergency, could conceivably save your life. The label, which fits on the back of the permit, will allow the physician to include such medical information as an allergy to certain drugs, whether or not contact lenses are worn, or other special medical information. In addition, the individual's blood type can be included on this medi-label and that could be extremely important in saving time after a serious accident or helping one to remember his own blood type so he could help another. Anyone with a special medical history, like a heart condition, can easily see the value of the label. However, everyone really has a special medical history.
