Cost of Proposed E. Tawas Sewer Project is Outlined

(This is the second of a series of articles presented to the citizens of East Tawas, to explain the cost of the proposed sewage treatment plant and collection system improvements.)

Last week, there was presented the over-all need for the proposed sewage treatment facilities. Today, there is presented the total cost of the project.

ect, which cost has been set at \$775,000, due to increase costs of labor, materials and equipment, the financial consultant recommends that the city issue and sell:

\$300,000 general obligation bonds
475,000 sewage revenue bonds
\$775,000

The general obligation bonds will be voted on at the regular election on April 4. The revenue bonds would be paid from sewage rates or charges. A final plan may include special assessment bonds. Spreading the cost over a period of years makes a fair and equitable cost to the users of the sewage system. As new customers are added, revenues are increased.

Next week, the general obligation bonds will be discussed and following that the revenue bond issue.

Spring Will Be a Little Late This Year When it Arrives on March 20, Says Astronomer

You may not think so, but spring is going to be a little late this year when it arrives at 8:53 p. m. March 20, says University of Michigan astronomer, Dr. Hazel M. Losh.

That is the time the sun will reach the vernal equinox (cross the equator on its way north). And officially, this date of the start of the spring season is nearly six hours later than last year.

"This is so," Professor Losh explains, "because the number of days in our calendar is 365, while the sun requires the uneven number of 365.2422 days in its apparent yearly travel around the earth. Since December 21, the sun has been steadily trekking northward at the rate of about one degree per day."

Although it has been rising and setting south of the east and west points of the horizon for the last six months, on this day of the equinox the sun will shine vertically over the earth's equator. Both hemispheres will share the sun about equally on that day, Dr. Losh says.

"As the sun continues northward, it will not only lengthen the daylight hours, but also bring warmer weather to the northern hemisphere."

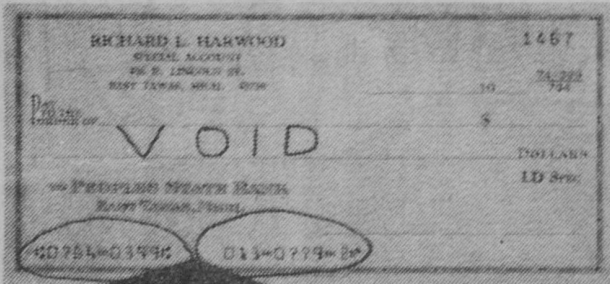
