## Seven-Cap Receives Anti-Poverty Funds

According to an announcement from Washington, D. C., Monday, the Office of Economic Opportunity has approved a \$20,000 grant to Seven-Cap, Incorporated, a community action agency serving Arenac, Isosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties in their "war against poverty." A telegram from Sen. Philip A. Hart said that funds were to be used for a study into "the causes of local poverty conditions and the formulation of program designed to eliminate these causes."

## OK Playground as Site of T. Festival Midway

Unanimous approval was given by Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night for use of the East Tawas Elementary Unit's playground during the Michigan Tourist Festival this summer. Appearing before the board were three representatives of the Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the fourth annual event. Leonard Calabrese, chamber president, told members that permission had been granted by the City of East Tawas to block off Newman Street from State to Lincoln during the week-long festival. Carnival rides are to be located on the pavement and, with approval of the school board Monday night, the midway is to be located on the playground.

Chamber of commerce representatives emphasized that the carnival owners would be required to post a \$50,000 performance bond to protect both the chamber and the school and will provide liability insurance. Calabrese said the festival would be a financial asset to the community, as well as providing entertainment to visitors and local residents. About 75 percent of the cost of the festival is to be financed by the carnival and the remaining 25 percent by the chamber of commerce. In other business, a report that property owners on the west side of M-55 school property had connected a private ditch on a drain constructed several years ago on school property was turned over to the school attorney for investigation. Supt. Reynold Mick said that at the time this drain was constructed with school funds, private property owners in that area were not interested in participating and the drain was constructed on school property. Investigation by school authorities disclosed that the private property owners constructed a ditch across school property to reach the drain. The board was to have met Tuesday night to settle final details on a master contract with representatives of the faculty. Negotiations on the contract have been under way for several months. The board tabled action until June on taking estimates on a proposed leveling of land at the athletic field for use as a track. 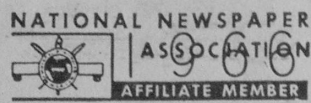

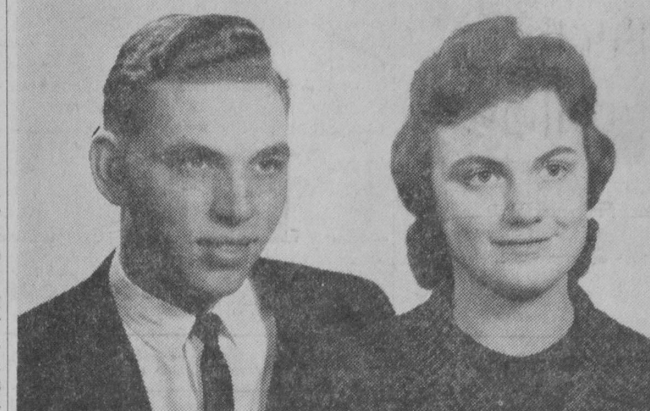
THE BIBLE SPEAKS TO YOU

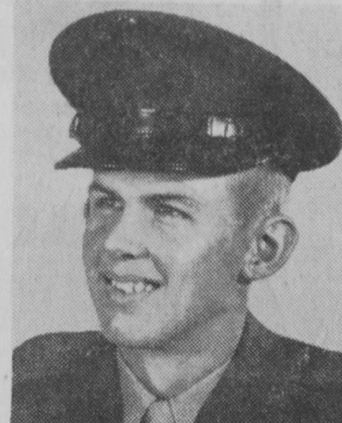

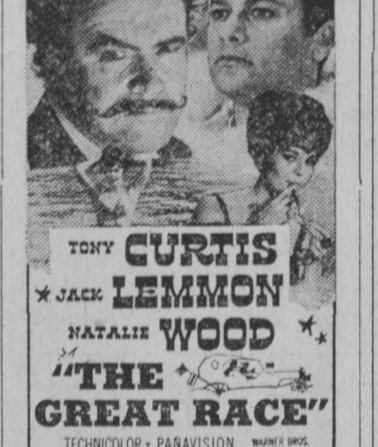

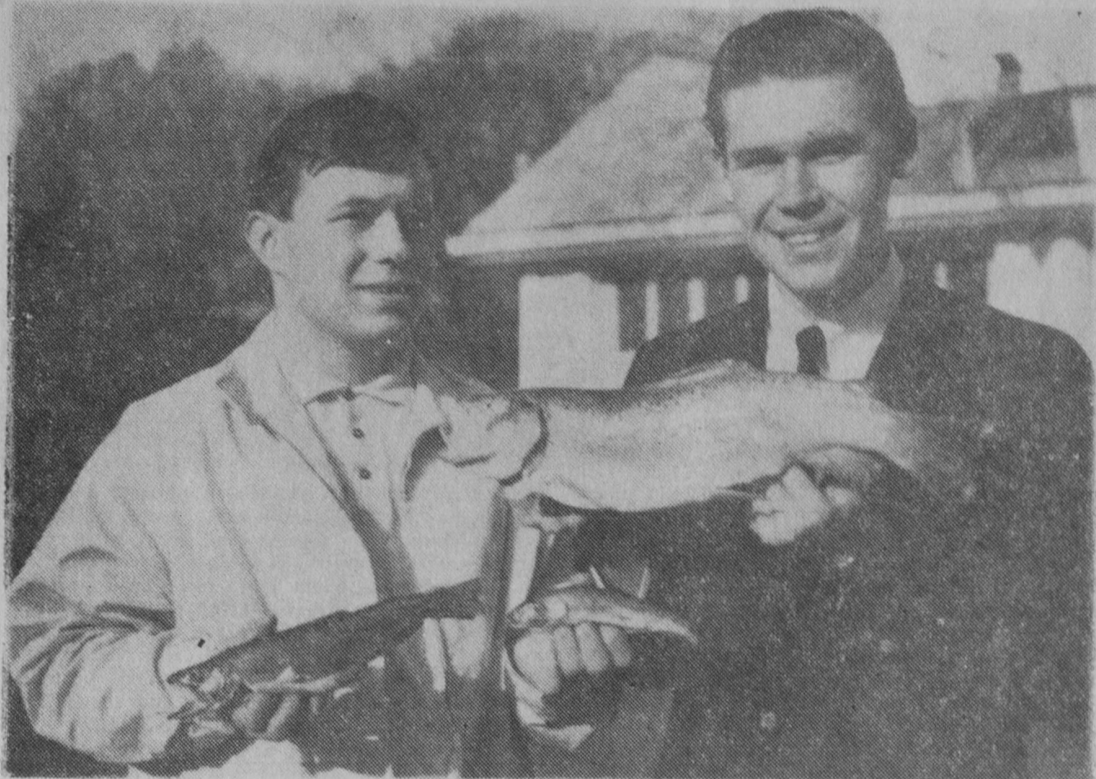

### Boat Owners Have Until 1967 to Meet Cowl Standards

Through amendment of federal regulations, boat owners have until June 1967 to meet requirements concerning ducts to obtain adequate ventilation of fuel and engine compartments.

According to BMC Douglas Phelan, officer in charge of the Tawas Coast Guard Station, all motorboats or motor vessels, except open boats, are to be fitted with cowls for the efficient removal of explosive or flammable gases from bilges of engine and fuel tank compartments.

There is to be at least one exhaust duct installed so as to extend from the open atmosphere to the lower portion of the bilge and at least one intake duct installed so as to extend to a point at least mid way to the bilge or at least below the level of the carburetor air intake.

While regulations have been amended to allow further time for compliance, Phelan emphasizes that ventilation requirements are designed for the protection and safety of boat owners and passengers.

"A number of explosions occur each year which are caused by poor ventilation in the bilges of motorboats. We hope that boat owners for their own safety, will meet these ventilation requirements now instead of waiting until next year," said Phelan.

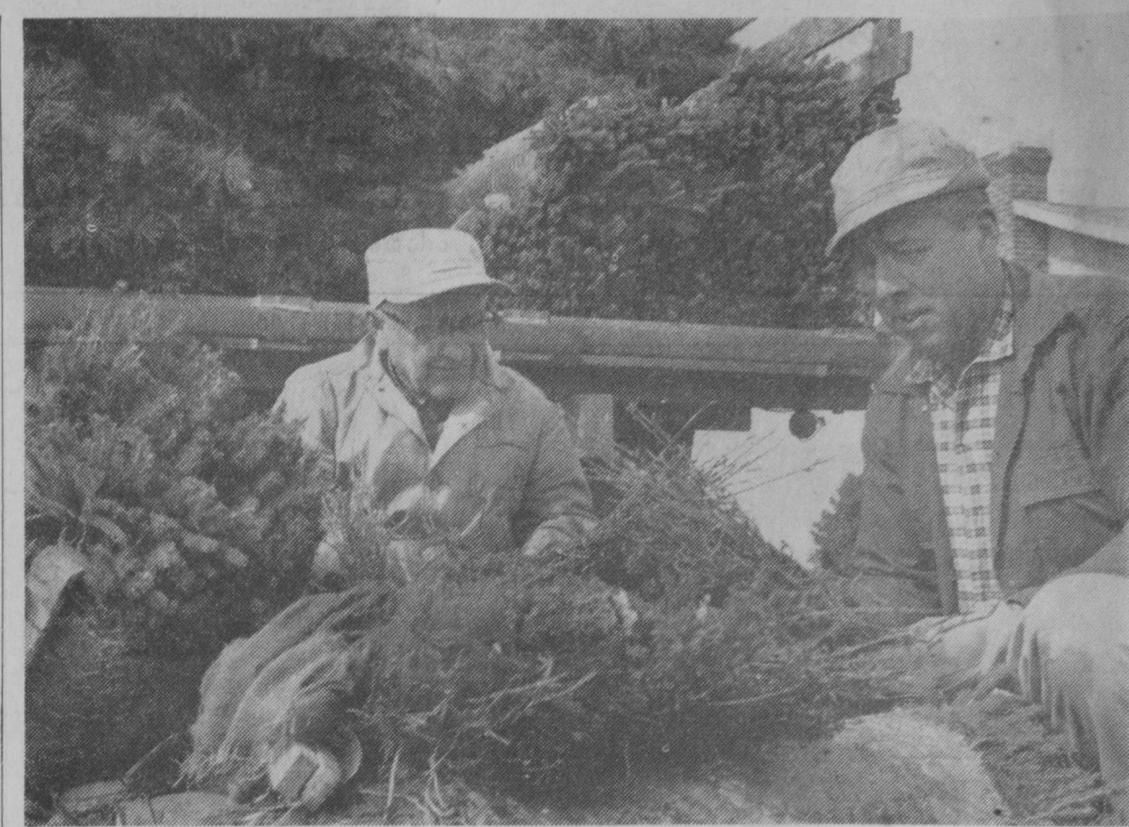
