Paced by Seniors Dale Mac-Lean and Dick Grebe, the Braves won the class B trophy with 48 points, followed by Ithaca with 25 and Oscoda, 21. There were 16 class B schools entered.

Hale Area Eagles won second place in class D with 32 points, running close behind Vestaburg's Whittemore-Prescott Area Cardinals won 14th place in class

For Tawas, it was a big day for MacLean and Grebe, who accounted for 31 of Tawas' 48 points. Mac-Lean placed first in the long jump and 100-yard dash, second in the 220-yard dash and anchored the winning 180-yard relay team. Grebe was only slightly less spectacular while winning the high and low hurdles and running on the first place 180-yard relay team.



ET Property Owners Complain of Fence; City to Investigate

On complaint of three property owners of Forest Glen Subdivision Tawas Beach Road, East Tawas Council has directed City Attorney Michael Freel to investigate construction of a six-foot high chain link fence on property owned by Ottawa Equipment Company. Appearing before the council

In August 1965, the city council disapproved Ottawa's application for a six-foot chain link fence in that it violated the city's ordinance requiring that such structures be constructed at a height of not more than four feet in a residential zone. The sction then went to the creation hig board of appeals and the ordinance variance was allowed.

Medical authorities agree that the activity provides important occupational therapy for hospitalized veterans. All other work done in connection with the annual observance is on a volunteer basis. Funds remaining locally help to continue the vital rehabilitation and child welfare work of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Gen. Roberts Logs 10,000th **Hour in Planes**

SECTION TWO

Brig. Gen. John A. Roberts, 40th air division commander, passed a milestone in his career with the air force May 12 when he completed more than 10,000 hours of flying.

Ten thousand hours of flying means that during his career in the air force the general has spent one year, one month and 212/3 days of his life as a pilot on air force aircraft.

The general first entered the service during October 1937 and completed his pilot's training a year later. Since that time, he has flown 37 different models of aircraft ranging from the single engine prop-driven BT-8 and PT-3 during pilot training to the modern eight, jet-engined B-52H Stratofortress.

At a little after noon May 12, General Roberts eased the eight throttles of a B-52H forward and the 450,000-pound aircraft moved down Wurtsmith's runway and became airborne. When the aircraft settled to the ground at Wurtsmith some seven hours later, the general had over 10,000 hours of flying time to his credit.

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
