Braves Win Regional B Meet; Hale Takes 2nd

Tawas Area High School's track squad captured meet B honors in the regional class Saturday at Mt. Pleasant.

Paced by Seniors Dale MacLean and Dick Grebe, the Braves won the class B trophy with 48 points, followed by Ithaca with 25 and Oscoda, 21. There were 16 class B schools entered.

Hale Area Eagles won second place in class D with 32 points, running close behind Vestaburg's 39. Whittemore-Prescott Area Cardinals won 14th place in class C.

For Tawas, it was a big day for MacLean and Grebe, who accounted for 31 of Tawas' 48 points. MacLean placed first in the long jump and 100-yard dash, second in the 220-yard dash and anchored the winning 180-yard relay team. Grebe was only slightly less spectacular while winning the high and low hurdles and running on the first place 180-yard relay team.

Altogether, Tawas grabbed six of the 13 first places available. Gary Haglund won first in high jump, Phillips won fourth in 120-yard high hurdles. Cain won third in long jump. Other members of the first place relay team were Cain and Lixey.

Hale won three first places in class D competition and finished second. The Eagles were paced by Duane Gruber, who had first places in the long jump and 180-yard low hurdles. Lyle McKenzie won a first in pole vault.

Others placing were Caverly in the high jump. Mellmurray in the 880-yard run, Maas in the 180-yard low hurdles. Hale won third in the 880-yard relay and third in the mile relay.

Others placing for Iosco schools in the meet were as follows: Oscoda—Fries, first, 440-yard dash; Hull, first, 220-yard dash; Giffon, fourth, shot put; Crawley, fifth.

Hale Auxiliary Plans Poppy Day Sales as Aid to Disabled Vets

Plans for another successful Poppy Day observance of the American Legion Auxiliary, Glenn Staley Post No. 422, Hale, scheduled for May 19, 20, 21, are under way, as volunteer workers make preparations for the annual day of remembrance.

According to Mrs. Frank Doing, poppy chairman, the traditional observance honors all war dead and, in addition, the funds received during the auxiliary's poppy sale are used to assist living victims of war, disabled veterans, children and widows of those who gave their lives for this country.

Funds remaining locally help to continue the vital rehabilitation and child welfare work of the American Legion Auxiliary.

The Featheringills have two children, Michael, five, and Elizabeth, age three. At one time, he was employed by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

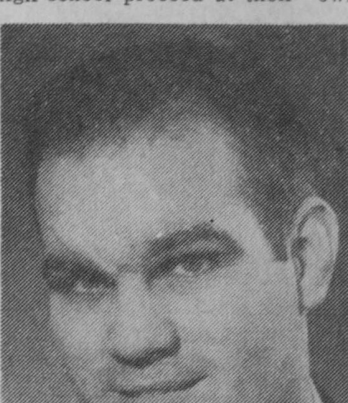
Mrs. Featheringill is taking art courses at CMU this year and will be a full-time student in the art department next fall.

Allocation Chairman to Discuss Iosco Finances

Meeting Today With County Supervisors

Operational money for next year, or rather the lack of it, will be the principal discussion during today's (Wednesday) session of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Scheduled to appear before the board at 2:00 p. m. is Arden Charters, chairman of the allocation board, which last week drafted its preliminary split of tax money for annual operation of schools, county and townships.

The preliminary tax split, as expected, gave townships one mill, intermediate school district 15 one-hundredths of one mill, schools received nine mills and the county was allocated 4.85 mills.

FACING the allocation board, however, is the fact that the state legislature still has not adopted a state aid bill for schools. A bill requiring an allocation of 10 mills for schools to receive full pay-

ment from the state seems to be a sure bet. Final order of the allocation board is due May 24.

Of principal concern to supervisors at today's session will be financing the county next year. The 4.85 mills allocated will leave the county's budget about \$99,000 short of the amount requested in its \$388,496 budget. This request was \$42,296 higher than requested but not received last year.

Budgets of schools also have to be pared, according to the nine-mill allocation.

Hale Area asked for \$126,100 and received \$84,300 under the preliminary order. This was \$41,700 short of the budget request. The school's extra voted operational millage will raise \$37,500, but this is still \$4,000 short.

With no extra voted operational millage, Oscoda Area School and Tawas Area School stand to be far short of budget requests. Os-

ceda presented a budget of \$320,200 and receives \$268,700 and Tawas Area School District presented a budget of \$287,700 and is to receive \$245,900 under the allocation.

CHARTERS will explain problems facing the six-man allocation board at this afternoon's meeting. Up for discussion again probably will be pegged millage, which would eliminate the need for an

allocation board and allow the taxpayers to determine the tax limitation for any given unit. A tax levy, under pegged millage, would be determined by an audited and approved budget.

Iosco County is not alone in its pressing financial difficulties. The same situation has resulted in neighboring Arenac County, where available tax money has fallen far short of operational budgets submitted by the county and schools.

Area Sanitary Land Fill Under Study by Council

Possible cooperation between area municipalities and townships in joint operation of a disposal ground was discussed at Monday night's meeting of East Tawas Council.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, told council members that operation of a dump under new state regulations would be very costly.

Attending a recent meeting of the Michigan Municipal League at Roscommon, Ropert said he learned during a discussion on new regulations that only 19 of 560 dumps in the state had been bonded and licensed.

Among the state regulations recently enacted, new licensing provisions require that a dump be of the sanitary land fill type with a caretaker.

Following an inspection recently of East Tawas' dump by the health department, Ropert said the city would be required to make daily fills to cover refuse and that burning would not be allowed. A problem of standing water would also have to be corrected as 90

percent of the property is flooded at present.

In Ropert's discussion with representatives of the United States Forest Service concerning a new dump location, the forest service suggested the possibility of forming an area sanitary land fill authority.

This would reduce the number of township and municipal dumps presently on federal property and would provide a better means of control. In the long run, it probably would mean a saving of operational expense for all units concerned because of duplication of necessary labor and equipment needed to comply with new state regulations.

While operation of Tawas City's land fill disposal area recently received a "clean bill" from the state health department, the area being filled is rapidly reaching its maximum use and the city has been seeking a new site in recent years.

Councilmen Robert Bolen, Edward Higgins and Earl Hester, representing the city's health committee, are to contact Tawas City, Tawas, Wilber and Baldwin Townships to discuss the possibility of organizing an area land fill authority.

In other business, minutes of the park board indicated that daily camper rates at the city park were being raised this year in line with those charged at state parks. Twenty-five cents has been added and the daily fee will be \$2 effective June 1.

Park Chairman Merton Killey said that many improvements were being planned at the city park over the next five years and the extra \$4,000 or more received through the increase would help to make these camping improvements possible.

The council took under advisement a proposed payment of \$5 to park board members for meetings attended. It was felt that before any action be taken, the city should investigate paying members of all city committees.

State police are investigating an armed holdup at Tawas River Trailer Park early Tuesday morning. Zigmot Davis, 60, told officers he was beaten by two persons, his wallet was stolen and released along a back road.

The award to Miss Britt, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Britt of Turner, was made possible through the cooperation of Mr. Freil and his teaching staff. They selected Miss Britt to receive the award, designed to stimulate scholarship, citizenship and continued contact with good reading after graduation.

Pupils Now Registering for TA Summer Classes

Tawas Area School, through a federal education grant, will conduct a summer session this year for students in grades four through nine.

According to John Alexander, coordinator, questionnaires have been sent home to parents in order that students may enroll for instruction which starts June 13 and runs for seven weeks.

Classes are to meet Monday through Thursday, 9:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon, at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

The program will consist of English and reading improvement, art, music and physical education. Small classes will be provided for the English and reading improvement in order that a great deal of personal help may be given.

Teachers for this program will be regular members of the Tawas

Area faculty, especially those having special training in reading improvement.

There is no cost to the student or his family, the program being financed under the federal programs of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 and is open to students of public as well as parochial schools.

Bus transportation is being provided and a midmorning snack will be furnished.

Since this is to be an extension of the regular school program, it is obviously necessary that similar attendance requirements must be met, states Alexander. "All students will take all parts of the program, unless it is not physically advisable for the child to participate in physical education activities."

Iosco's Auxiliary Police in 6-Month Riot Control Study

Nearing the conclusion of a six-month training program is Iosco County's new 24-man emergency police force under command of the sheriff's department.

Instigated February 17, it was decided to organize and train such a unit to provide the county with additional police manpower, especially trained to assist in riot control and the policing of any other major disturbance that might occur.

"The apparent need for such an organization manifests itself by the unrest that exists among student groups and racial problems in certain areas," states Francis J. Block, coordinator for the program. "While it is hoped that such a force will never be needed in our county, we want to be ready with a fully-trained and capable corps that will present an impressive and purposeful front to any unruly mob or group that might form in defiance of the law."

The training course started in February and runs through June 23. Meetings are held each Thursday night at the county building.

The first five meetings presented a mandatory standard first aid course, prescribed by the American Red Cross and taught by Block, a qualified instructor. Succeeding sessions covered various phases of police work and riot control. Cpl. Kenneth Rhyner, civil defense coordinator for Michigan State Police, lectured on police services in civil defense, how to prepare lecture notes and organization-rules of police departments.

Sgt. Morris Tubbs, Michigan State Police, Bay City, lectured on traffic control. In a later session, laws and manner of arrest were explained by J. Richard Ernst, Iosco prosecuting attorney.

Interpretation of local ordinance and state laws were presented by Block. Interviews and descriptions were discussed by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Undersheriff Leon Putnam.

Sgt. Coleman Lane, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, instructed in panic and riot control. Police public relations were presented last Thursday night by Clare F. Carter, resident FBI agent, Bay City.

Sessions yet to be presented will cover preservation and identification of physical evidence, explained by Charles Kurtzrock. Laws of search and seizure will be presented by Allan C. Miller, circuit judge of Iosco County.

Internal security, police equipment and the preparation of investigation reports, hand to hand combat and judo instruction are to follow the regular course.

It is expected that the group will have a complement of two fully trained squads consisting of 12 men each.

The training course is open to any civic-minded citizen, all local law enforcement units and members of the sheriff's staff.

"The splendid cooperation from every organization concerned has made this program a success and it has created much interest throughout the county and state. The unit, under command of the

sheriff, will be available to assist state police, local city and township police departments. In the event of a natural disaster, the unit would assist the existing civil defense unit.

After completion of the training program, squads are to meet two nights each month and plans are now being made for another training course this fall.

Everyone connected with the program has done so on a voluntary basis, donating time and effort without any payment or fee.

ET Property Owners Complain of Fence; City to Investigate

On complaint of three property owners of Forest Glen Subdivision, Tawas Beach Road, East Tawas Council has directed City Attorney Michael Freil to investigate construction of a six-foot high chain link fence on property owned by Ottawa Equipment Company.

Appearing before the council Monday night were Mr. and Mrs. Richard Powers and Mr. and Mrs. Truman Barbier. A telegram protesting construction of the fence was received from Daniel Moore, whose property is adjacent to the fenced property.

In August 1965, the city council disapproved Ottawa's application for a six-foot chain link fence in that it violated the city's ordinance requiring that such structures be constructed at a height of not more than four feet in a residential zone. The action then went to the Michigan Board of appeals and the ordinance variance was allowed.

As spokesman for the group Powers said that property owners within 300 feet of the fence were not notified of a public hearing required for such action by the zoning board of appeals. He further claimed that, contrary to city ordinance, the board did not meet in formal session to allow the variance, but reached its conclusion through verbal contacts with members.

Attorney Freil said that in his initial investigation, he had found that the zoning board of appeals had failed to notify property owners of the required hearing and that, in fact, no formal hearing was held.

Freil stated that he believed action of the board could be termed voidable by the court, in that proper notice was not given. However, he questioned if it was proper for the city to attack its own action as it probably would be a party defendant in any court case.

Also questioned by the previously mentioned property owners, along with O. J. MacMurray and John Mielock, who live in the immediate vicinity, was survey work being conducted for a new assessor's plat of the subdivision. They claimed that existing property lines were being disrupted, according to new survey stakes being established.

Mayor James Campbell said that an assessor's plat was not official until accepted by the city council and that any new plat would respect existing lines as occupied.

While stating that the fence was constructed according to a new line established by the surveyor, Powers said his main concern was to see that the fence be reduced to four feet in height, according to terms of the city ordinance.

Mayor Campbell appointed Carlton Merschel, Newman Street businessman, as new chairman of the zoning board of appeals. He replaces Raymond Klinger, who resigned.

M-65 Store Robbery Under Investigation

Two "neatly dressed" robbers at gunpoint last Wednesday night held up an M-65 motel-store owner and made off with an estimated \$300 in cash.

Mrs. LeRoy Clough, who was alone at the time, told sheriff's department officers that two men walked into the Evergreen Store and Motel, which she and her husband operate north of Hale, and demanded money in the till.

As the robbers left, one shoved Mrs. Clough into the wall, knocking her unconscious.

'Bird Banding,' Title of Garden Club Program

"Banding of Birds and Butterflies" was the program title for the May 9 meeting of East Tawas Garden Club. Norman Sibley, part-time employee of Michigan Department of Conservation and taxidermist, was guest speaker. Starting 36 years ago banding birds, Mr. Sibley has over 400 exhibits at Whittemore.

He stated that birds travel 2,000 miles to migrate and fly at the rate of 400 miles per hour. In one instance, it took a bird 15 days to travel 2,000 miles from Upper Canada. Information is secured from banding and charts. Most song birds migrate at night while water fowl fly during the day.

Some butterflies migrate along a coastline route from New England to Florida while others are in the North. In 1961, Mr. Sibley banded 926 birds.

Gen. Roberts Logs 10,000th Hour in Planes

Brig. Gen. John A. Roberts, 40th air division commander, passed a milestone in his career with the air force May 12 when he completed more than 10,000 hours of flying.

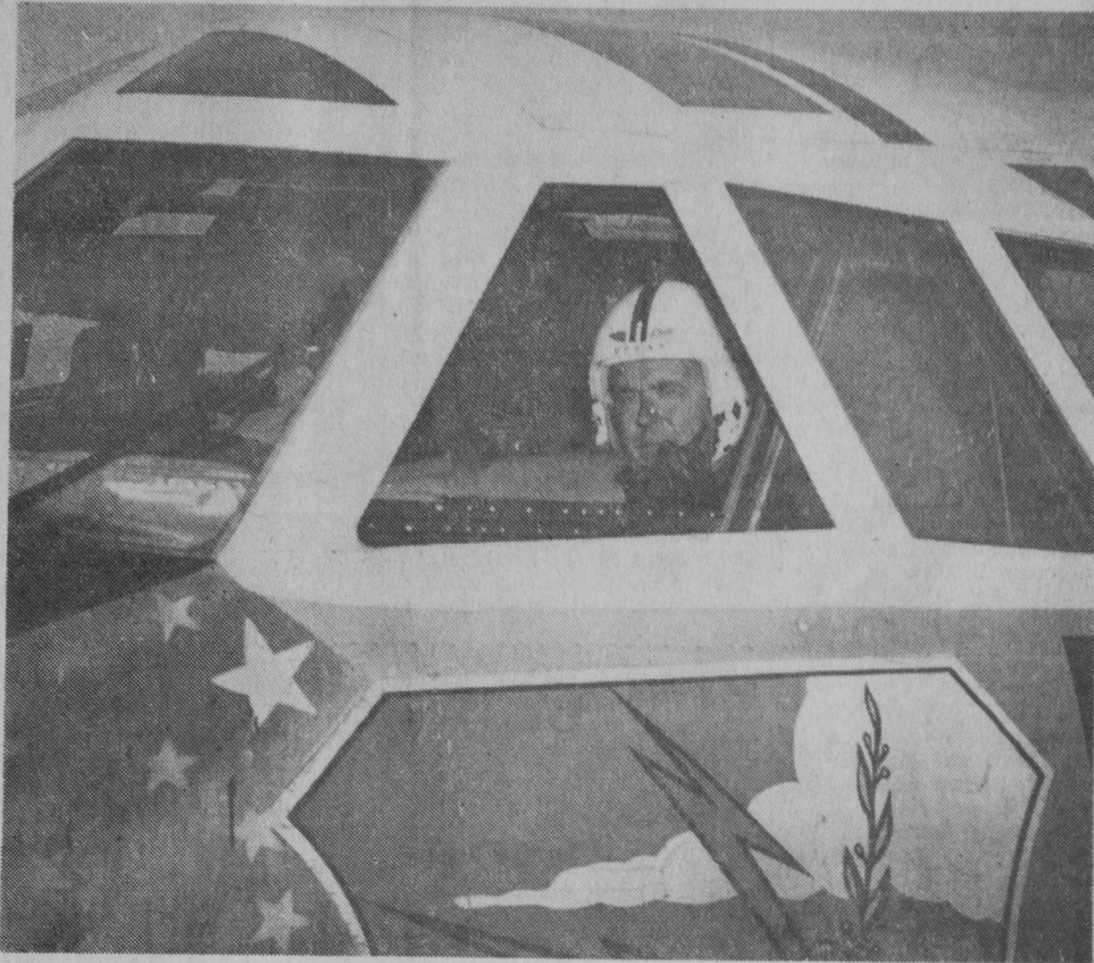
Ten thousand hours of flying means that during his career in the air force the general has spent one year, one month and 21 1/2 days of his life as a pilot on air force aircraft.

The general first entered the service during October 1937 and completed his pilot's training a year later. Since that time, he has flown 37 different models of aircraft ranging from the single engine prop-driven BT-8 and PT-3 during pilot training to the modern eight, jet-engined B-52H Stratofortress.

At a little after noon May 12, General Roberts eased the eight throttles of a B-52H forward and the 450,000-pound aircraft moved down Wurtsmith's runway and became airborne. When the aircraft settled to the ground at Wurtsmith some seven hours later, the general had over 10,000 hours of flying time to his credit.

Nearly 1,000 of the flying hours the general has accumulated were accomplished during World War II when he was assigned in the Pacific Theater. During this time, he flew 143 combat missions and logged 906 hours of combat flying time in B-17 and B-29 aircraft.

Since World War II, he has served as comptroller and chief of staff of the eighth air force, commander of the 19th air division at Carswell Air Force Base, Texas, and four times commander of the seventh bomb wing at Carswell.

Between tours of duty as commander of the seventh bomb wing, General Roberts served as chief of the Strategic Air Division, Director of Requirements Office, Headquarters, USAF, chief of staff, Fifth Air Force, and attended the National War College.

Following B-52 training, he assumed command of the Fourth Air Division, Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, during 1958.

The general moved to his present position as commander of the 40th air division during July 1963.

New Building Law Creates Questions

"More questions have been engendered by Public Act 383 of 1965 and its amendatory law, Public Act 12 of 1966, than any other legislation passed during the past two years," reports State Sen. Robert Richardson.

Most directly affected are residential builders and residential maintenance and alteration contractors and salesmen.

Originally intended to control only prefabricated homebuilders and itinerant alteration jobbers, the bill was expanded before passage to cover just about everyone in the construction industry.

The Michigan Corporation and Securities Corporation will administer the act. Each license applicant must pass a written examination establishing that the applicant has a fair knowledge of the English language include reading, writing, spelling, elementary arithmetic and an ability to read and interpret plans and specifications.

Applicants presenting satisfactory proof of engaging in any of the covered functions for a period of five years are not required to take the examination.

"One of the more important features is the requirement that the license applicant furnish a bond by an admitted surety insurer or in cash in which the State of Michigan shall appear as the insured," states Senator Richardson.

Under Public Act 12, a special board has been appointed by the governor to prescribe the amount, conditions, form and sufficiency of a bond not less than \$2,000 nor more than \$10,000. Board members consist of three licensed residential builders, one licensed maintenance and alteration contractor, two contractors in the construction trades, one in the building suppliers industry and one representative of the building trades unions.

The two acts take effect September 1 and the board should have its rules and regulations prescribing the terms of the bond by that date.

Meanwhile, contractors are or-

ganizing in the 35th district to ask for repeal or further amendments to the law. They appear to be concerned primarily over the bonding requirement.

"Because great difficulties were foreseen over this provision, I voted against the original PA 383 and introduced a bill early this year to repeal the bonding section," said Richardson.

"However, when it was not considered by the majority, I voted for the PA 12 amendments as the best possible compromise obtainable."

He said he hoped the board can work out bonding provisions that will not "impose strict performance liability, but will guarantee faithful performance and completion of the contracted work, as well as prompt payment of furnished goods and services."

Jefferson Trucking Makes its Largest Shipment at National

The largest single truckload shipment ever to leave the National Gypsum Company, National City plant, was made last week to the John Bruski Lumber Company of Posen. The Jefferson Trucking Company truck contained over 50,000 square feet of Gold-Bond wallboard, enough to build 15 average size homes.

Jefferson Trucking Company, a local organization, with its fleet of trucks, is capable of making deliveries anywhere in Michigan within a few hours.

Jefferson has been hauling Gold-Bond building products since the early 1930s and its first truckload contained approximately 10,000 square feet.

Jefferson is headed by Ralph T. White, president, and Jerry Cotter, secretary-treasurer, both of East Tawas. In addition to the main terminal at National City, a terminal at Lorain, Ohio, serves the National Gypsum Lorain plant.

A record number of mayors, village presidents, elected and appointed municipal officers attended the meeting, including Tawas City's Mayor George Tuttle, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz and Mr. Rollin.

Bublitz retired this year as vice chairman of the region.

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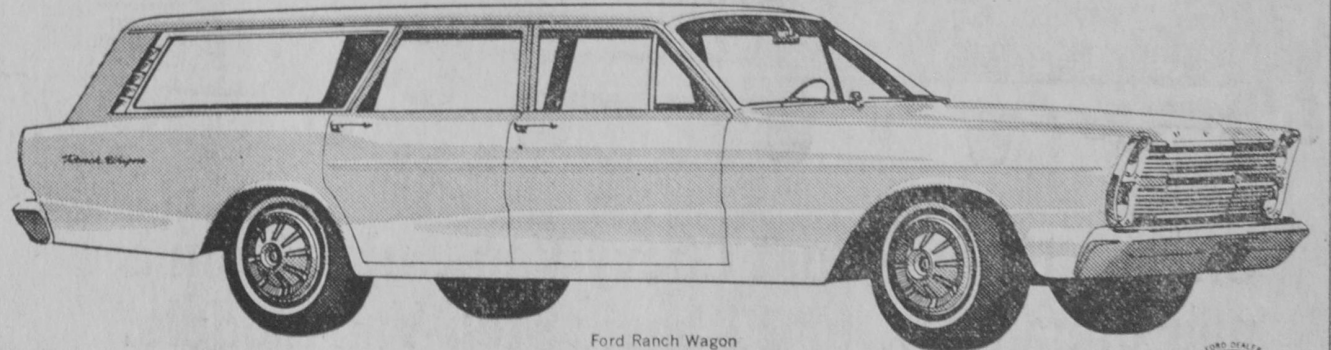

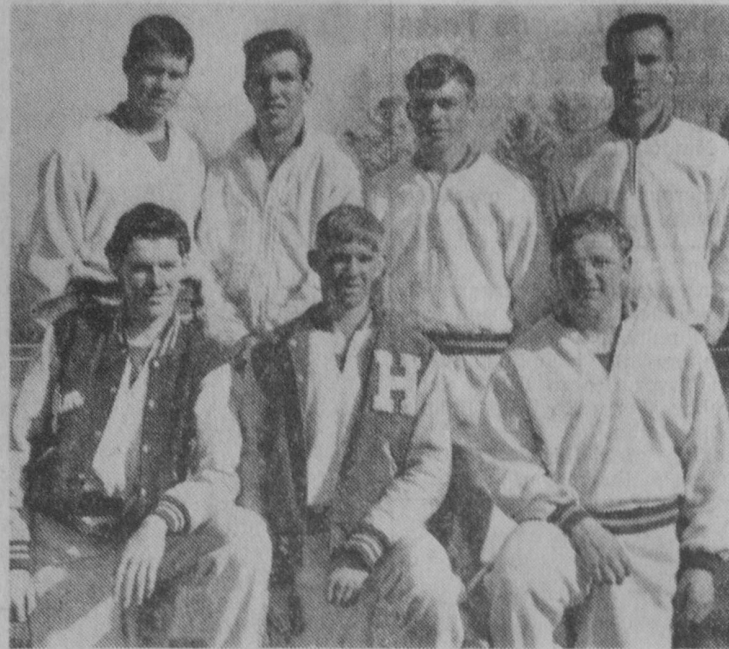

Lieut. Com. Charles E. Rosen-dahl, America's foremost authority on dirigibles, has been named to command the Akron, the world's largest air ship, now under construction.

The first rocket will be fired into space from Berlin's rocket airport at Reinkendorfwest in April. It is only a baby projectile, less than seven feet high, but it is expected to attain a height of over 12 miles. It will be driven by a mixture of oxygen and gasoline. The rocket will be fitted with scientific recording apparatus, from which valuable information is expected. Based on these results, experiments will be renewed on a large scale this summer.

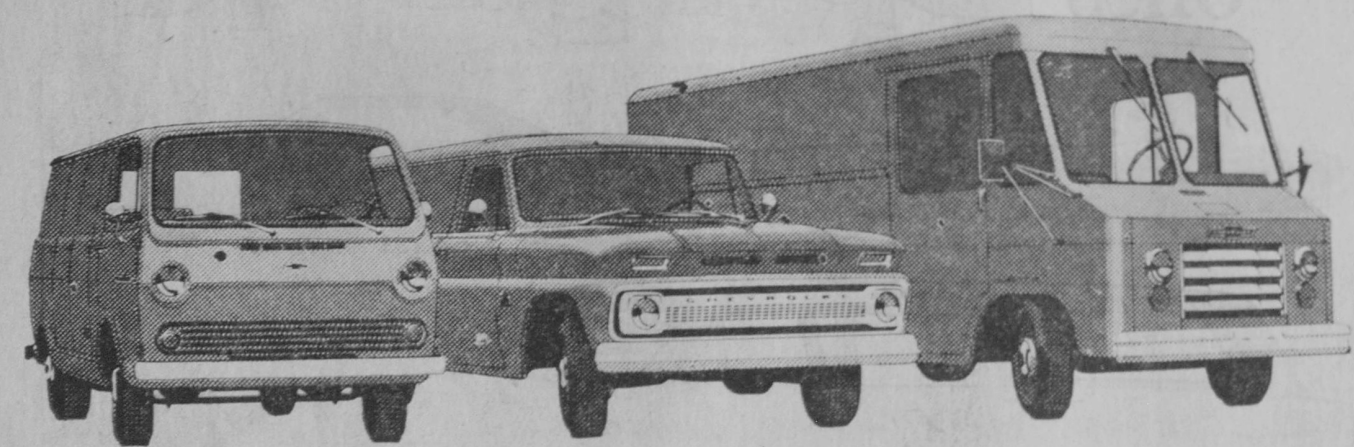

Must Sign this Month to be Eligible for Dr. Bill Insurance

Under the new law passed by congress, May is the month that persons who reached 65 before March 1 will have to sign up for doctor bill insurance if they are to have coverage by July 1, the date medicare coverage begins.

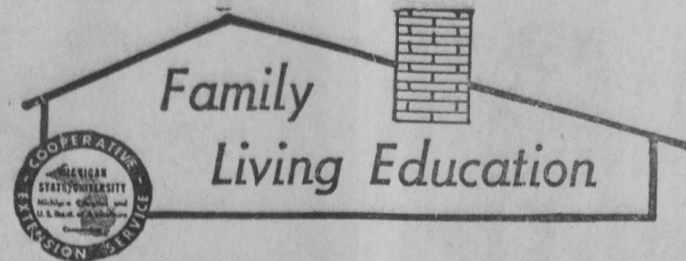
Paul M. Ellifritz urged all senior citizens age 65 or over who have not signed up for doctor bill insurance to visit their social security office immediately, so that they may have protection when the program starts July 1. Almost all persons 65 or over are eligible for the two types of health insurance under the medicare program, hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance. Social security beneficiaries, are automatically enrolled in the hospital insurance program, but persons who are still working or who do not receive social security benefits must sign up for hospital insurance. On the other hand, in order to get protection toward the cost of doctors bills at a cost of \$3 per month, all persons must enroll.

According to Mr. Ellifritz, persons who were 65 before March 1 and fail to enroll before the deadline, May 31, will have to wait until October 1967 before they will have another chance to apply for doctor bill protection. He added that as senior citizens become 65 they should visit their social security office no later than the month before their 65th birthday to have protection as soon as they reach 65.

A social security representative for this area will be at the Isosco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, May 26, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

Uninsured Motorists Must Pay \$35 Fee

Motorists who permit liability insurance on their vehicles to lapse or who are canceled by their insurance companies must either obtain new insurance or register as uninsured motorists by paying \$35 into the state's motor vehicle claims fund.

Washing Feather Pillows:

Comes a nice sunny day and you decide to wash the down or feather pillows!

First, make sure that the ticking is strong and the seams sewed firmly. If you are in doubt about the strength of the ticking, put the filling into a firmly woven muslin bag for washing and wash the ticking separately. If the pillow is extra full, empty half the filling into a separate bag for laundering. To transfer the filling, stitch or pin the open ends of the two coverings, securely together then restitch the ends, except for a small opening for ventilation.

Some new pillows have an eyelet type ventilator to let air out and to keep pillows from floating in the wash water. If your pillows do not have one, rip the stitching in the ticking about an inch in opposite corners and pin the slit shut with a large safety pin. Wash two pillows at a time or one pillow with some bath towels to balance the load.

Use medium water (about 120° Fahrenheit). Dissolve the usual amount of detergent as for a regular load and hold the two pillows under water until they stay submerged. Agitate about 10 minutes. You may spin out this water and rewash in clean water with less detergent this time. Complete the regular wash cycle and add one rinse.

Before drying, check seams again, especially corners. If using a tumble dryer, use the warmest setting for one hour, then use a lower temperature to finish drying.

To dry without a dryer, hang outdoors out of the sunshine in a bright, breezy day when the humidity is low. Hang with several clothespins. Every 30 minutes turn and fluff the pillows. It may take more than a day to dry on the line; bring inside at night.

Increase Your Kitchen Storage
"A place for everything and everything in its place" is still a most important rule in the kitchen. For those planning a new kitchen, remodeling an old one or dreaming of the future, a few principles can help attain an organized and efficient kitchen.

You can save time and energy if you store supplies and utensils where you use them and within easy reach. For example, knives in a rack over the work space, percolator and coffee canister near the sink, drip coffee maker and coffee near the range.

Cupboards and drawers will be more convenient if one can see articles and pick each one up without moving others. This means one row deep on the shelves and one stack deep in the drawers. Articles which are alike, such as cups, may be placed in front of each other and can still be easily reached.

Vertical partitions or slots slightly slanted are convenient for storing mixing bowls and baking pans. This way, the one you want can be removed without taking down a stack of pans or a nest of bowls. These vertical partitions are especially efficient in the space above a wall oven.

Spices are most conveniently stored on shelves which are only two or three inches deep. Common ways to provide narrow shelves

are to put one row in the cupboard and another on the door or provide step shelves within the cupboard.

Heavy articles, such as heavy pans and stacks of dinner plates, should be stored on shelves that are easy to reach. This reduces excessive lifting and stooping.

Pull-out shelves in base cabinets and adjustable shelves in wall cabinets provide easy-to-reach flexible storage which can be easily changed as the family's needs change.

A pull-out board in the kitchen counter is useful for carving meats. It also makes additional serving space or it can be placed on top of the counter for setting out hot pans or fruit jars.

While rearranging storage, consider how often each utensil and tool would be used. Avoid unnecessary clutter on shelves and in drawers by discarding unused utensils and tools.

Remember, adequate counter space should provide enough storage above and below the counter for the supplies and equipment used in that work center.

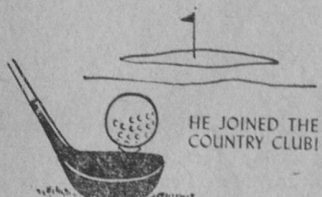
