"I took planes into places where a year ago I would have thought twice about landing a much smaller Cessna 172," admitted Sorrell. "No two missions were alike. Weather was changeable and there were no air traffic control facilities as we know them in the states."

Most missions during daylight hours were flown navigationally by visual flight map reading-That is, "follow that road, the place we are looking for is right around the next river bend" type of navigation.

On air-drop supply missions, they would fly in at about 300 feet to hit the target area with a payload of supplies dropped by parachute. This calls for precision and coordination from everyone in the plane.


