Iosco Board of Supervisors will have three new members at its reorganizational meeting next

### Rep.-Elect Prescott Starts New Job Jan. 1

George A. Prescott, state representative-elect of the 102nd District, announced Monday that he would resign December 31 as county clerk and clerk of the 23rd Judicial Circuit.

In a letter to Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, Prescott said, "I am certain that you understand the mixed emotions I feel in addressing this communication to you.

"May of this year marked a full 15 years of service for me to the people of Iosco County. At the moment, a nostalgia of sadness is uppermost at the thought of not being able to see daily the friends I have made while working for them in the courthouse all these years.

"The other emotion is one of excitement and pride in being successful in my quest for a seat in our Michigan Legislature. I am deeply moved by the confidence the folks of this county expressed in helping me gain this promotion. A public trust has been granted me that I will guard well."

Prescott said it was his fortune to have been able to serve as court clerk under both Miller and his predecessor, Judge Herman Dehne. "From each of you, I learned what marks able jurists, a dedication and respect for law above all other factors."

## AF Pilot Home from Vietnam

After 12 months of piloting twin-engine C-123 "Providers" in the Vietnam war zone, Capt. Kenneth Sorrell returned to the United States last week and was happily reunited with his wife, Janet, and their four children.

Relaxing at their "temporary home" on Oates Road, Alabaster Township, where Mrs. Sorrell, the former Janet Slaven of Tawas City, and children have made their home for the past year, Captain Sorrell described his tour as "most interesting."

Aside from the fact of being separated from his family, Sorrell said the tour had provided a sense of accomplishment in fulfillment of duty as a trained professional military man. He said it was nice to know that your work was appreciated by the men on the ground.

Sorrell piloted the 25-ton aircraft which supplied Special Forces troops of the United States with the necessities of life for fighting the Viet Cong.

"You name it, we carried it," said Sorrell. "From Jeeps, tents, howitzers, food and ammunition for our forces to cows, pigs and chickens for their Vietnamese counterparts."

Nha Trang air base on the western coast of South Vietnam, just "around the corner from the bay where President Johnson recently visited," was home for Sorrell as a member of the 310th Air Command Squadron.

Flying in the Vietnam war zone is hazardous, doubly so with the danger of ground fire and treacherous terrain features.

It requires skillful handling by the pilot, plus teamwork of the navigator and other members of

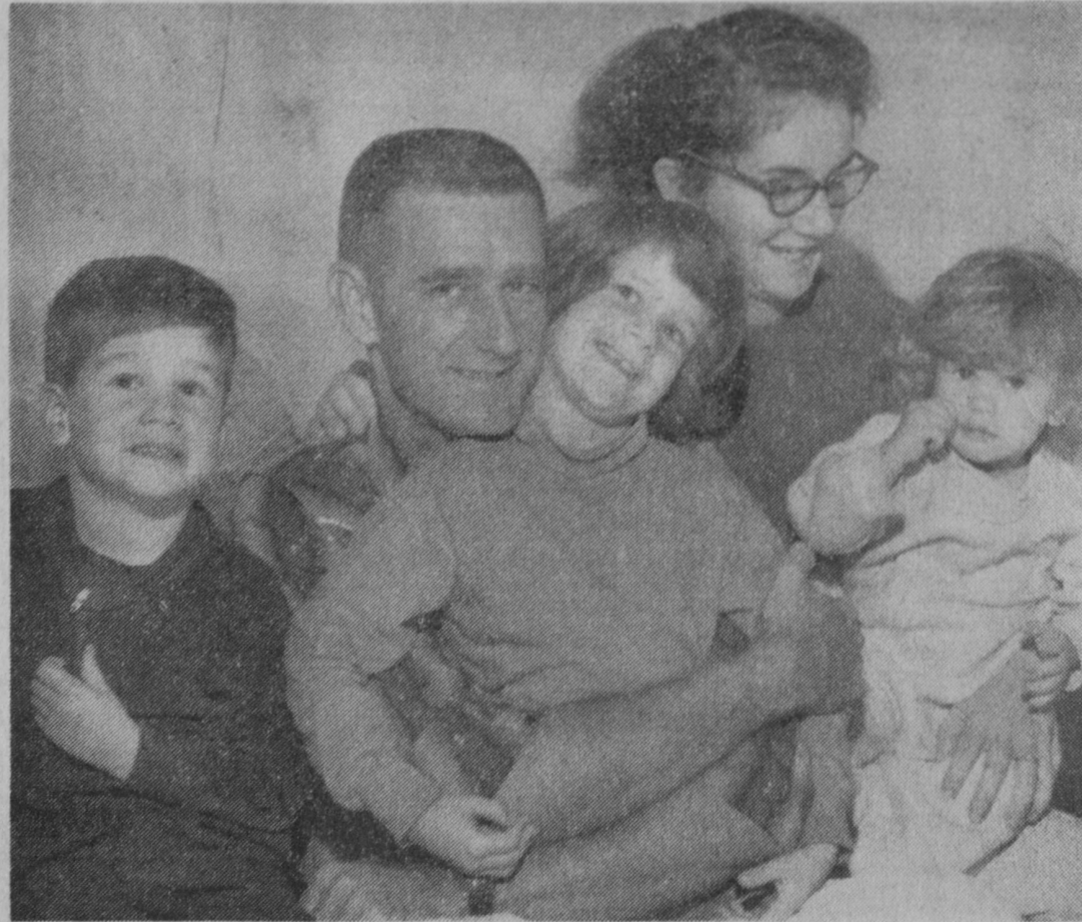

## Army of Deer Hunters Set for Opening Day

Michigan's firearm deer season in the Lower Peninsula opens this Saturday and continues through December 4.

While last year's deer hunting license sales of more than 600,000 was a record and may not be reached again for various reasons, Iosco and surrounding counties can still expect an army of deer hunters which probably will exceed years prior to 1965.

State Police Sgt. George Briggs, commander of the Michigan State Police Post, East Tawas, said Monday that no additional help would be received this year from the Michigan National Guard.

Iosco Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies are preparing for the usual number of lost hunters and a variety of complaints received during the season.

Outlook for probable hunter success this year in the Iosco area is expected to duplicate the dismal 1965 season—fair to good on private hunting land and poor on state or federally-owned property.

Despite mild weather conditions last winter, Iosco's deer herd is generally believed to be far below the total number in prior years. An excellent fawn crop was reported last spring by Conservation Officer A. G. Leitz of Baldwin Township, who also said a good growth of acorns would help deer this winter which survive Saturday's opening gunfire.

Numerous poaching complaints have been investigated by conservation officers and area law enforcement agencies. More than 180 deer have been killed so far this year in Iosco highways south of the AuSable River.

Opposition to the state's antlerless deer permits, curtailed in this region for 1966 by action of a citizen's advisory committee, has cooled somewhat by appeals court action upholding the state's position.

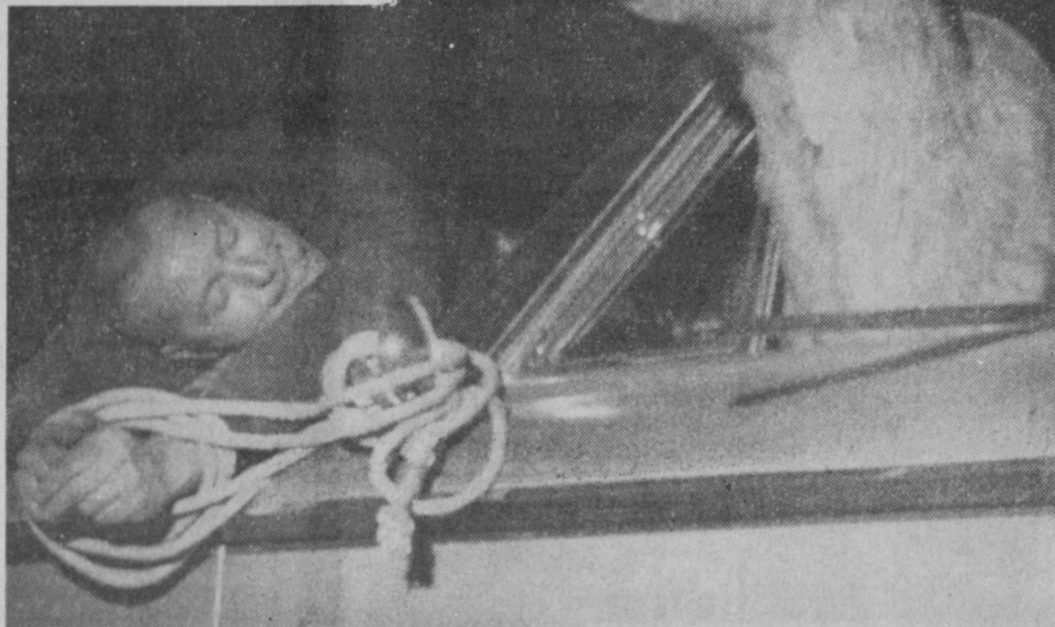
Efforts of the Michigan Deer Hunters Association, incorporated, organized last spring at Oscoda to oppose the any deer season, is expected to resume on an even larger scale following the December 4 closing date. The organization now numbers several thousand members.

This year's deer hunting season coincides with Michigan's Farm City Week. It is a special time focused on building greater un-

derstanding and a stronger bond between city and country folks.

Spirit and timing of this special week is especially apropos, at a time of year when relations between these two groups are put to test, for better or worse.

For farmers, it involves recognizing the fact that many hunters are men without their own places to hunt. For hunters, it means asking the owner for permission to hunt on private farm lands and then abiding with rules of common sense relative to use of another person's property.

## Tawas School Board Discusses New Offerings Here in Special Education

Furnishing educational help to a homebound hemophilic patient was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Tutoring of the eighth grader is to be handled by Miss Burnetta Miller, a member of the junior high faculty, on a three-hour-a-week basis.

The teacher is to handle English, spelling and literature, while other teachers would assign work in algebra and science.

The school does not have a teacher certified to teach the homebound and thus would not be supported by special education funds. As a regularly enrolled student, the school would receive \$280 in state aid funds.

In other matters concerning special education discussed Monday night, it was reported that the school has 15 students in the type A program supported by the state and intermediate school district.

Miss Cleopatra Shelp has re-

ceived certification from Central Michigan University for this type of instruction to aid children with IQs between 50 and 80.

Classes are being held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit for such children between the ages of eight and 13.

It was stated that these children are trainable and need help in nonacademic instruction. This is the first year that training has been offered here as Miss Shelp is the first teacher in this system to receive special certification.

It has been suggested that another room be included for older children if trained personnel can be obtained. The board is to encourage members of the faculty to enroll in special training courses at the school's expense.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that he believed there were about five children in every grade in high school needing special help. "We hate to lose them as dropouts, as

### Four Boys Admit—

## Smashing Windows

Four boys between the ages of 13 and 15 have been implicated in a series of window breakings and general property destruction here during the past two weeks.

Tawas City Police Chief George Westcott said Tuesday that the youths had been released to their parents and that names had been turned over to probate court authorities. Restitution is to be made.

Westcott estimated that more than \$250 damage had been done in the window smashing spree.

The boys admitted breaking eight windows at the Tawas City Elementary Unit on October 8. They smashed 18 windows at the Tawas Masonic Temple on November 7, returned to the elementary unit on November 11 and smashed four additional windows.

They were also implicated in smashing windows out of an old school bus at the high school. The

school placed a scrap value of about \$100 on the bus before the incident. It is now worth about \$15. That same night, the group smashed large plate glass windows in the old Campbell Grocery on Mathews Street, now owned by William Borosch. The building is used for storage purposes.

The police chief said that one boy was involved in all of the complaints while the others took part in two or three.

While on patrol Friday night, Westcott spotted the group and told the boys to go home as it was after the curfew hour. Upon receipt of complaints the next morning, he questioned the boys and they admitted being involved.

Members of the Tawas Area Board of Education said Monday night that while they believed no criminal action should be taken, they are to suggest possible disciplinary measures, in addition to restitution.

## School Board Takes Look at its Long-Time Ban on Student Spectator Buses

Tawas Area Board of Education is to re-examine its past policy which prohibited use of school buses in furnishing student transportation to out-of-town athletic events.

The school's policy against use of buses for spectators, in effect since the district's original reorganization, has come under fire from some member schools of the Northern B Conference. Tawas Area's student council has also requested the board to reconsider its past policy.

A report from Supt. Reynold Mick Monday night stated that there are about eight away games in basketball and on the average of 4½ away games in football each year. This would net approximately 1,200 miles per bus for at least two buses.

Total cost to the district for such use would be about \$1,000. This would include deducting \$360 from state aid for transportation, operational expenses, pay for drivers and chaperones.

The Michigan Department of Public Instruction has always questioned whether a school's insurance covered hauling spectators and has advised that it did not, said Mick. The board is to question the company insuring the school concerning this point.

### 'No Cause' Found in Suit Against Ford

A finding of no cause of action was filed Monday in Iosco Circuit Court on a million dollar lawsuit against Ford Motor Company.

Brought by Orville Leslie and Sons, Incorporated, Tawas City, Judge Allan C. Miller found that failure of the 1958 transaction between Leslie and Cottrill Ford Sales, Oscoda, was in no way the fault of any conduct on the part of Ford or its representatives.

Plaintiffs were Mrs. Dora Leslie, Benjamin T. Leslie, Orville LeRoy Leslie and Otto Leonard Leslie. The original complaint was filed in April 1964.

Orville Leslie and Sons, Incorporated, leased a leasehold of premises held by the Cottrill Corporation at Oscoda in April 1958. The Leslies alleged that Ford Motor Company delayed termination of Cottrill's sales agreement and failed to promptly issue a sales agreement to them.

It was claimed that the sales agreement had been held up for more than a year and that the Leslies had lost the opportunity to obtain additional working capital, thereby resorting to liquidating personal holdings and to draw upon corporate assets of its dealership in Tawas City.

It was claimed that this greatly impaired the financial status of the Tawas City operation and that financial loss had forced both the Tawas City and Oscoda dealerships out of business.

Points in favor of furnishing transportation include the fact that buses are safer for students than buses traveling to games and that many children, now unable to attend away games, would be able to go on buses.

Final action on the proposal is to be taken at the next regular meeting.

### Christmas Club

Peoples State Bank last week mailed checks amounting to \$44,247 to members of its 1966 Christmas Savings Club. Members deposited amounts weekly, or as often as they wished in a regular savings plan. Mrs. Robert Hemphill, who has charge of the bank's 1967 club, said that checks last week amounted to \$4,989 more than checks sent out the previous year.

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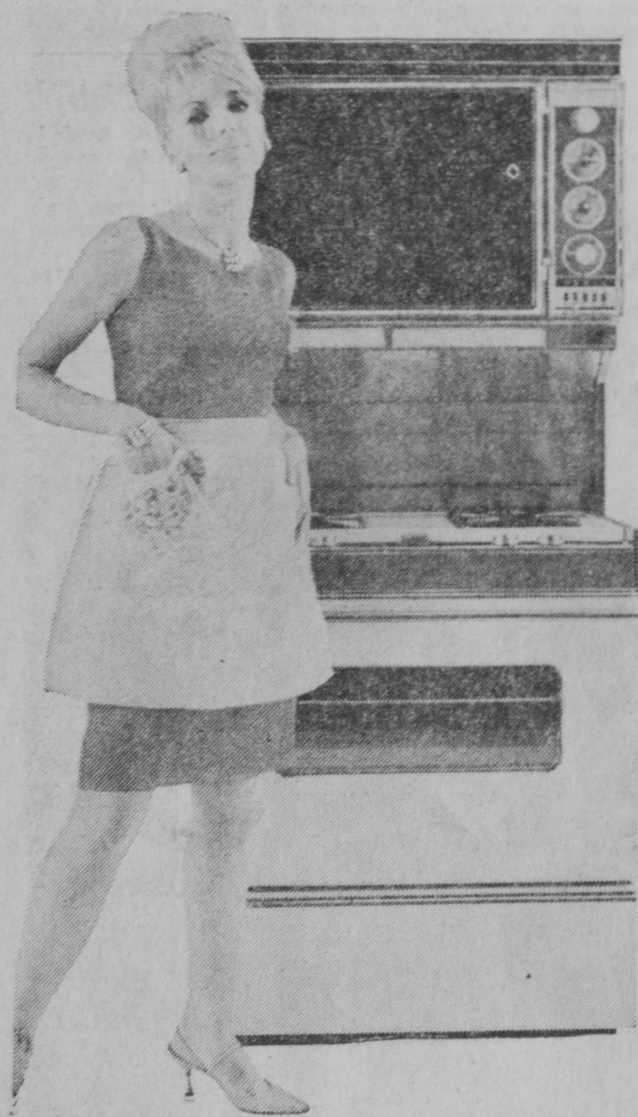

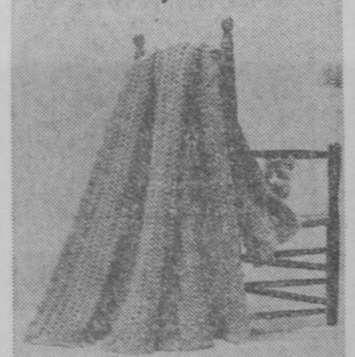

(Continued from page 1.) Sorrell received the Air Medal with eight clusters, which gives some indication of the type of sustained aerial operation he performed.

"I took planes into places where a year ago I would have thought twice about landing a much smaller Cessna 172," admitted Sorrell. "No two missions were exactly alike. Weather was changeable and there were no air traffic control facilities as we know them in the states."

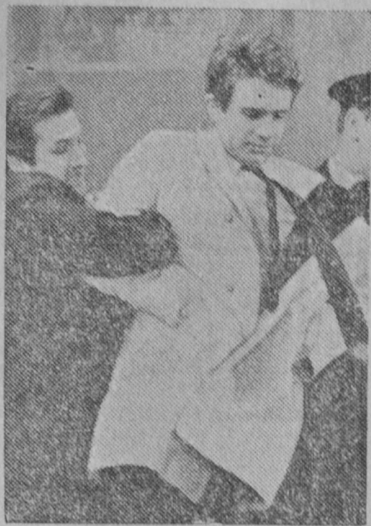
Most missions during daylight hours were flown navigationally by visual flight map reading—That is, "follow that road, the place we are looking for is right around the next river bend" is type of navigation.

On air-drop supply missions, they would fly in at about 300 feet to hit the target area with a payload of supplies dropped by parachute. This calls for precision and coordination from everyone in the plane.

The C-123s also flew six-hour night missions, where one of the principal responsibilities was to drop parachute flares to illuminate a particular zone where a fire fight was taking place on the ground.

Sorrell's plane was struck by ground fire a number of times. "You can't tell he is down there, but when Charlie drills one through your aircraft, he makes a believer out of you."

A veteran of 11 years of service in the air force, the 31-year-old Sorrell and his family will be here until the end of November when he takes up his new duties

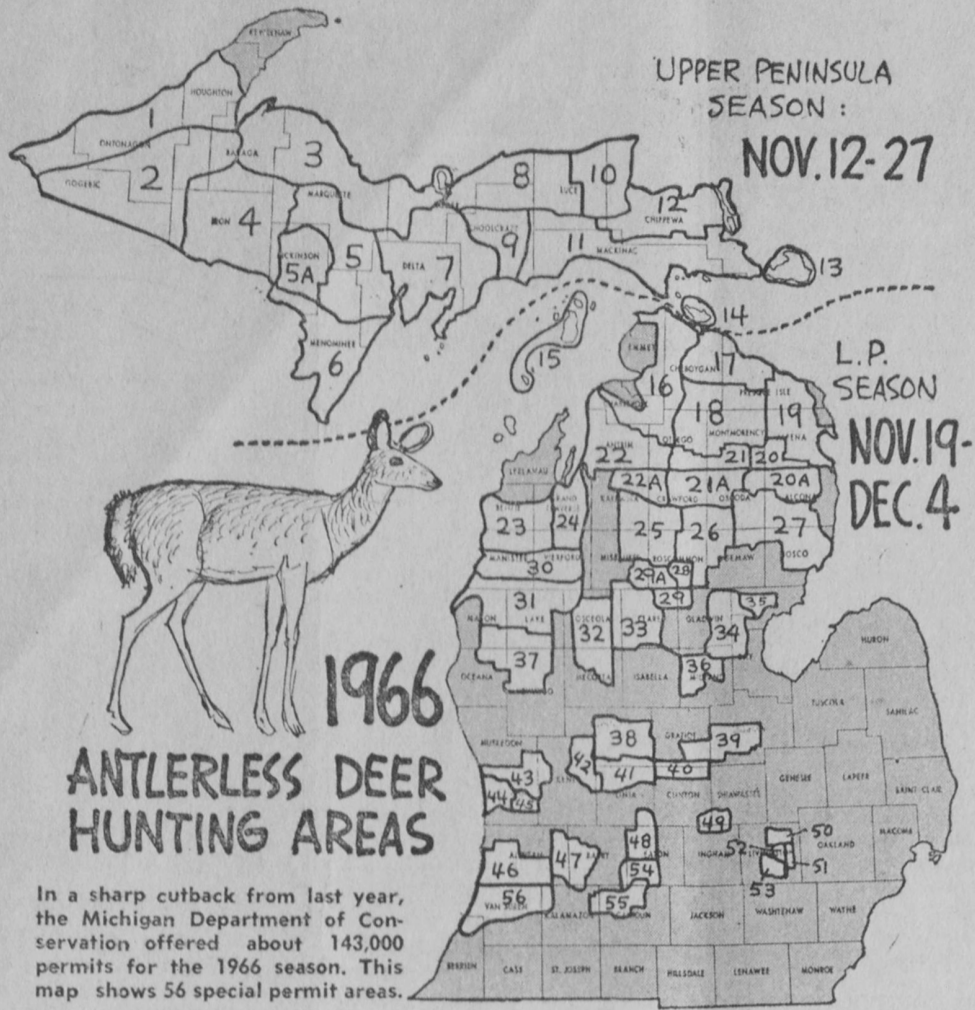

(Continued from page 1.) special training could help them in future life," he said.

In other matters, Trustee Clyde Soper reported on a recent meeting at AuGres concerning possible reorganization of school districts in Eastern Arenac County and three schools of Isoco County.

The board of education authorized expenditure of \$1.25 per pupil in this district as its share of a study to be made by Central Michigan University. Schools represented at the meeting included AuGres-Sims, Arenac Eastern, Whittemore-Prescott Area, Hale Area and Tawas Area.

Information gathered in the study is to be presented at a joint meeting in February. The project has a completion target date of June 1 and no later than July 1.

The board also voted expenditures of \$250 as its share of a study presently being made at Alpena concerning possible participation of Isoco schools in a community college for Northeastern Michigan.

Superintendent Mick reported that schools of Alpena, Presque Isle and Montmorency had invited Isoco schools to participate. The University of Michigan is to conduct the study.

At present, Isoco is not involved with any other county in a community college program. Expansion of Alpena Community College is being discussed. This facility presently has an enrollment of 700 students, compared to 2,000 at Delta College, which serves the Tri-City area.

Expansion of the Alpena facility under area-wide control is being discussed.

**Hunters' Group Loses Antlerless Deer Fight With State of Michigan**

Michigan Deer Hunters Association lost in its court attempt to prevent the conservation department from holding its antlerless deer control program in 1966.

The Michigan Court of Appeals last Wednesday denied the association's request for a writ of mandamus ordering the department not to issue the new paper deer tags and not to grant licenses on a lottery basis.

The three appellate judges stated no basis for granting the mandamus had been presented.

**Board Adopts Committee Report as New Policy Regulating School Organizations**

A new policy regulating student clubs, societies and organizations at Tawas Area High School was adopted Monday night by the board of education.

Action followed discussion at board meetings and sessions with faculty representatives and students. Recommendations submitted by Board Trustees Robert Elliott and Clyde Soper were adopted as follows:

Any student eligible for any club or society is to be granted membership. In general, members of student organizations are to be elected democratically by the student body. If the administration finds it necessary to select a group of students from which new members of a certain club are to be chosen, eligibility requirements for potential candidates are to be posted on school bulletin boards.

No group or club would be allowed special privileges over other students, including out-of-town trips. Any student eligible for the National Honor Society would not have his recognition by this group depend on his participation in any kind of ceremony in which he does not care to take part.

No student is to be allowed to hold office in more than one organization. The board stressed that it was important to give this opportunity to as many as possible and, if there are not enough leaders to "go around, we have too many clubs."

While recognizing that such school organizations are important in developing individual leadership, social training and to provide constructive outlets for youthful enthusiasm, such clubs should not interfere with the primary purpose of school which is education, said the board.

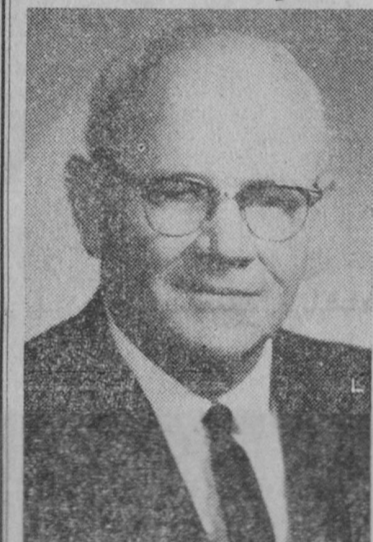
The board also felt that with a limited staff and administrative force, the school should avoid making any excessive demands on personnel during school hours or afterward.

"In connection with recognition of academic excellence, thought should be given by all people involved to develop and maintain this type of encouragement in the manner most acceptable to the students involved. It is our belief that scholastic achievement is the most important goal of our program and should be recognized as such," stated the new board policy.

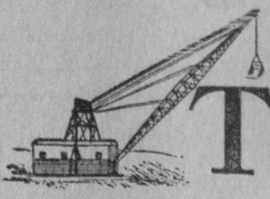

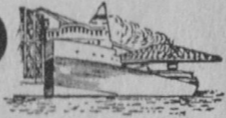

## TA Braves Outclassed, 40-0 by Top-Ranked Buena Vista

As far as Tawas Braves and fans are concerned, Saginaw Buena Vista left little doubt as to its rating as one of Michigan's best class B high school football teams.

Buena Vista scored a 40-0 victory over the Braves to cap an undefeated season Friday night. While the score indicates the devastating rout that it was, visiting coaches said that Tawas had given them one of their three best battles of the season—and even that was something to salve some of the hurts after a bruising night.

"We hit harder than we did all season—Buena Vista was just that much better," said Coach Ernie Mousseau.

Going into the game with four straight wins after a dismal start this fall, the Braves ran headlong into a team boasting all-around balance. Buena Vista had tremendous speed and power in the backfield, plus rugged line play to give it an offensive attack spelled with a capital "A." The visitors also had an equally tough defensive line.

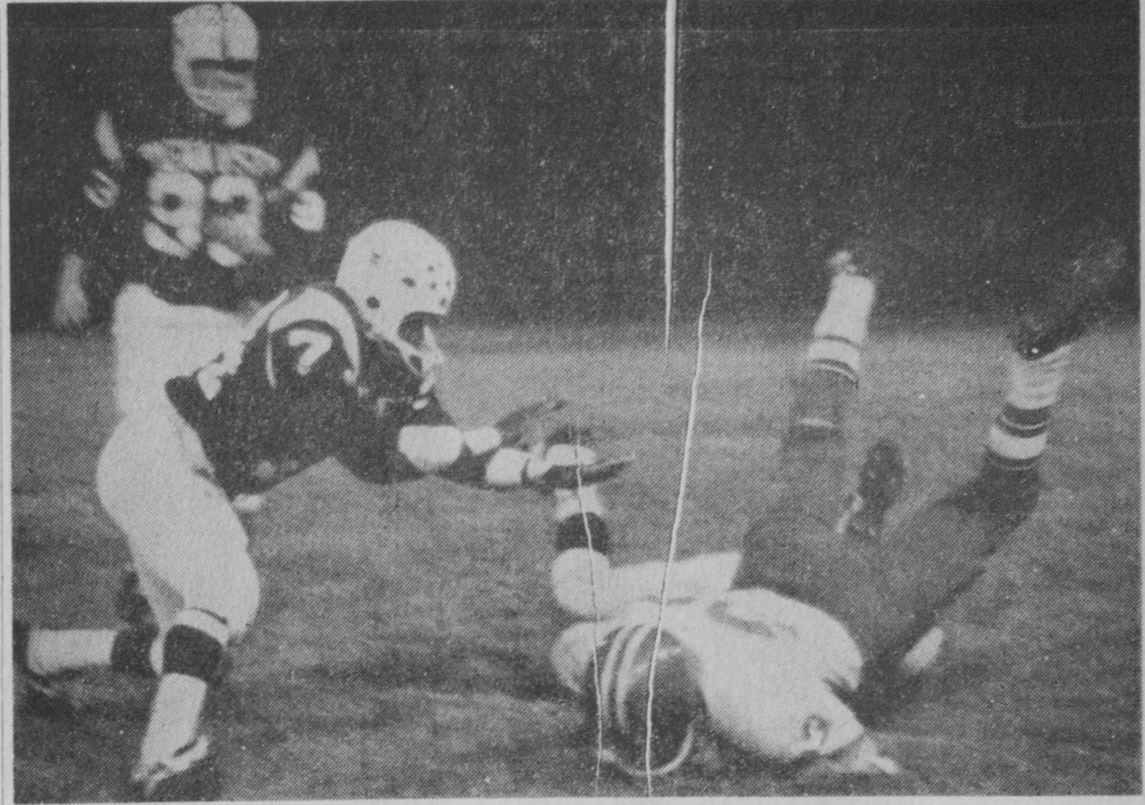
The Braves had only one real bright spot offensively during the entire 48 minutes of playing time. That came in the third quarter when Halfback Ray Powers broke away on a 29-yard run. The Braves penetrated to the BV 15, but the tough line of the visitors cracked down to push Tawas back to the 26 before taking over on fourth down.

The Braves never really had a chance to get an offense rolling against a BV line boasting Tackle Herb Perrie and Fred Guarnieri, a couple of outstanding 200 pounders, along with several other huskies.

After taking a kickoff (Buena Vista never punted), Tawas would have the ball for three plays and then had to punt. Time and again, Tawas halfbacks were dropped before they reached the line. Passing was an absolute failure as Quarterback Gene Kushion was smothered by the onrushing linemen.

The Braves seemed to hold their own in the first period, although Buena Vista scored the first time it took over the ball. Halfback Dave Tolliver scored the first TD on a 37-yard pass play.

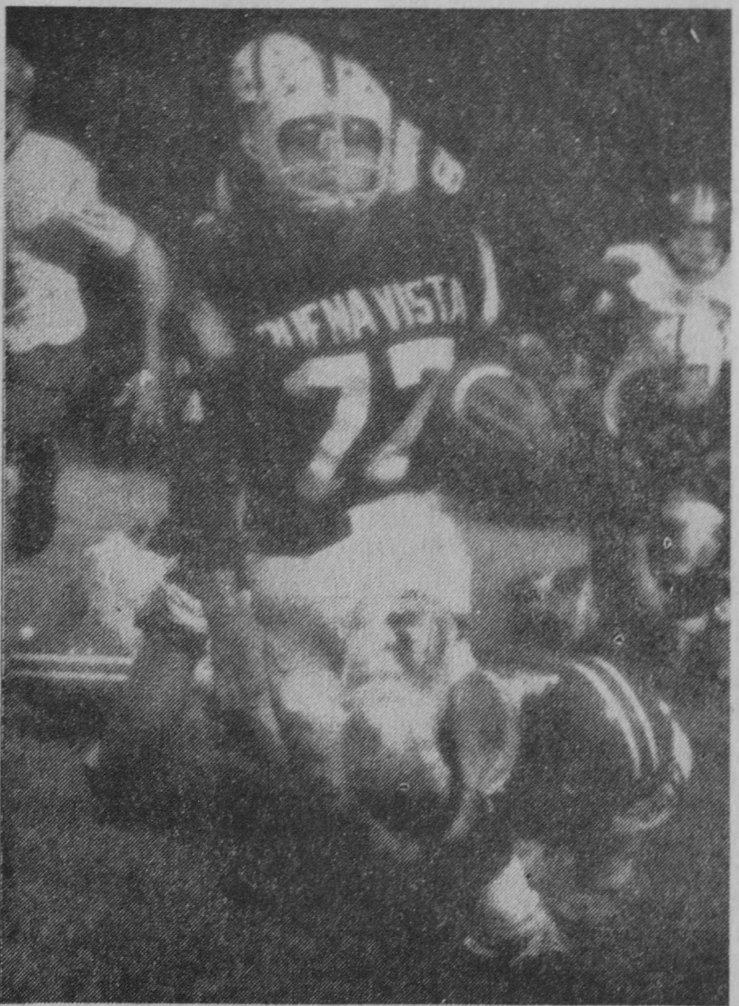

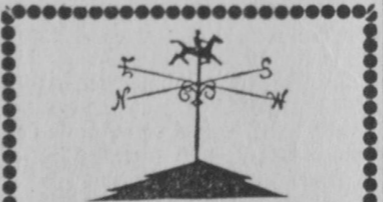

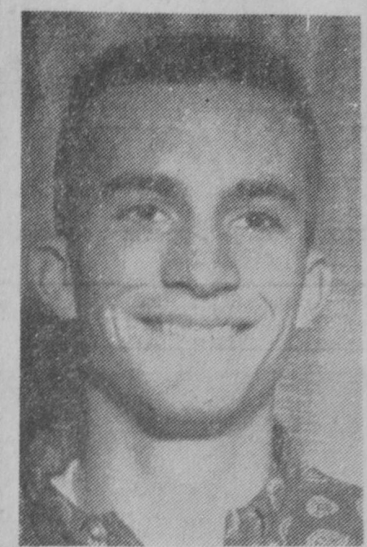

**What Size Turkey?**  
 Your retail grocer has your Thanksgiving turkey ordered. Have you pondered what size to buy?  
 The least expensive turkey is the tom turkey which usually weighs 16-24 pounds while the most expensive is the small six-eight pound fryer-roaster. Anyone who can use the large bird saves two ways—the initial cost per pound is less and there is more meat per pound on the larger birds. By the time a turkey reaches 10-14 pounds in weight, its bony structure has reached full growth. Any weight added beyond this is meat. This is one reason "larger turkeys" cost less per serving and make a good value if you can use it.  
**Now, Handle It Safely!**  
 Do not let food poisoning spoil your family holiday plans. Turkey, when mishandled, rates high as a source of food poisoning largely because of contaminated stuffing and gravy resulting from carelessness. Because food poisoning organisms are found so many places—even in the air—food must be handled with extreme care to prevent their growth and to prevent growth of toxins or poisons which cause illnesses.  
 To avoid trouble, follow safe food handling practices. Allow adequate time for thawing frozen turkey. Thaw it slowly but never at room temperatures or in warm water. It takes two to three days for a 12-20 pound turkey to thaw in the refrigerator or six-eight hours under cold running water. The time can be shortened for a smaller bird and increased for a larger bird. Frozen unstuffed turkey should be thawed in the original moisture proof wrapper.  
 Stuff your defrosted or fresh turkey just before roasting. Do not hold the stuffing at temperatures above 40 degrees or below 14 degrees. Never stuff a bird and allow it to stand, even refrigerated, before putting into the oven.  
 Put a meat thermometer in the center of the stuffing. When it shows 165 degrees, any harmful organisms have been destroyed. After taking the bird from the oven, the stuffing temperature will rise for 15 to 20 minutes while waiting for carving.  
 At the same time, a meat thermometer in the center of the inside thigh muscle or the thickest part of the breast muscle should register 185 degrees. Turkey is done when the thickest part of the drum sticks feel very soft when pressed.  
 Roast your turkey all at one time. It is dangerous to partially cook it, then remove it from the oven and finish cooking it later. During the early stages of roasting, organisms in stuffing multiply rapidly.  
 If you are planning to cook a commercially frozen stuffed turkey, follow the instructions on the label. They recommend baking the frozen stuffed turkey for the frozen state and warn against thawing before roasting. With frozen stuffed turkeys, the time

needed for the center temperature of the stuffing to reach 165 degrees is frequently twice that required for unfrozen birds.  
 Refrigerate left over turkey, dressing and gravy separately and promptly. Heat it to at least 165 degrees before you serve it again.  
 Refrigerating or freezing does not destroy harmful organisms but depresses their growth. Bacteriologists recommend refrigerating food while it is still warm or within a half hour after cooking.  
 Temperatures from 32 to 40 degrees help prevent growth of food poisoning microorganisms and toxins. The best holding temperature of poultry is from 29 to 32 degrees. Since refrigerators are often overloaded at holiday time, be sure to check and maintain temperatures below 45 degrees. Allow for adequate circulation of air.

### Widows Are Now Eligible for SS Checks at 60 Years of Age

Many widows may be unaware of a change in the social security law and still think they have to wait until they become 62 to collect social security widow's benefits. This is the concern of Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of social security in Bay City.  
 Until the change in the law, effective September 1965, the widow of a man who had worked under social security could not qualify for monthly widow's benefits until she reached 62. Now, she can elect to have her payments start as early as her 60th birthday but in smaller installments to take account of the longer time that beneficiaries will be paid.  
 Ellifritz pointed out that generally women who choose to take these reduced benefits will collect about the same value in benefits over the years. He urged widows, who may have been waiting for their 62nd birthday, to call or visit the social security office nearest their homes to find out how the age-60 benefits would work out in their particular cases.  
 The social security office in Bay City is located at 1009 North Madison Avenue. A social security representative in this area will be at the Isosco County Building, Tawas City, Friday, November 25, from 10:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

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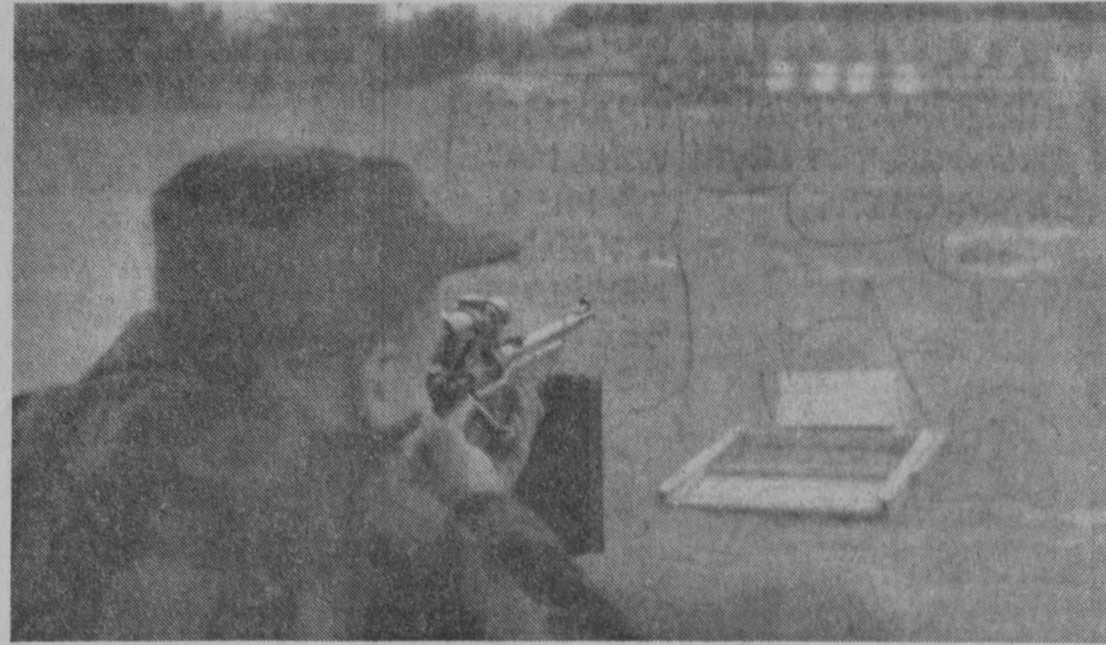

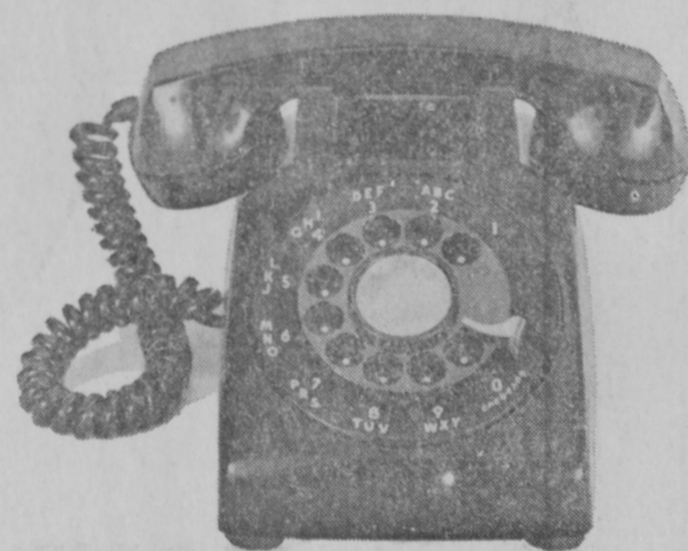

## First Prosecution in State for Killing Protected Elk

**35 Years Ago—**  
November 28, 1931—First prosecution for the killing of an elk in Alcona County, if not in the Lower

Peninsula of Michigan, took place last week when a Charlotte man appeared before Justice F. A. Beeds and entered a guilty plea to killing a bull elk a short distance from Curran in Mitchell Township.

### 25 Years Ago—

November 21, 1941—The Tawas, along with nine other Northeastern Michigan towns, experienced a four-hour "blackout" Sunday when the 44,000-volt line running to the Tawas substation, was severed. Authorities have been investigating the theory that a hunter had hit an insulator with a rifle bullet.

Work had been started on grading for two new runways at Camp Skeel, Oscoda. The two new runways are to be 200 feet in width, 4,000 feet in length and constructed of soil cement seven inches thick. Prest runways are about 150 feet wide, 2,500 feet long and composed of blacktop with gravel sidings. Congress appropriated \$275,000 for the additions. It is believed that Camp Skeel will be a permanent air corps field after this construction boom, which included a new hangar, officers quarters, mess building, ammunition storage buildings and a new target shed.

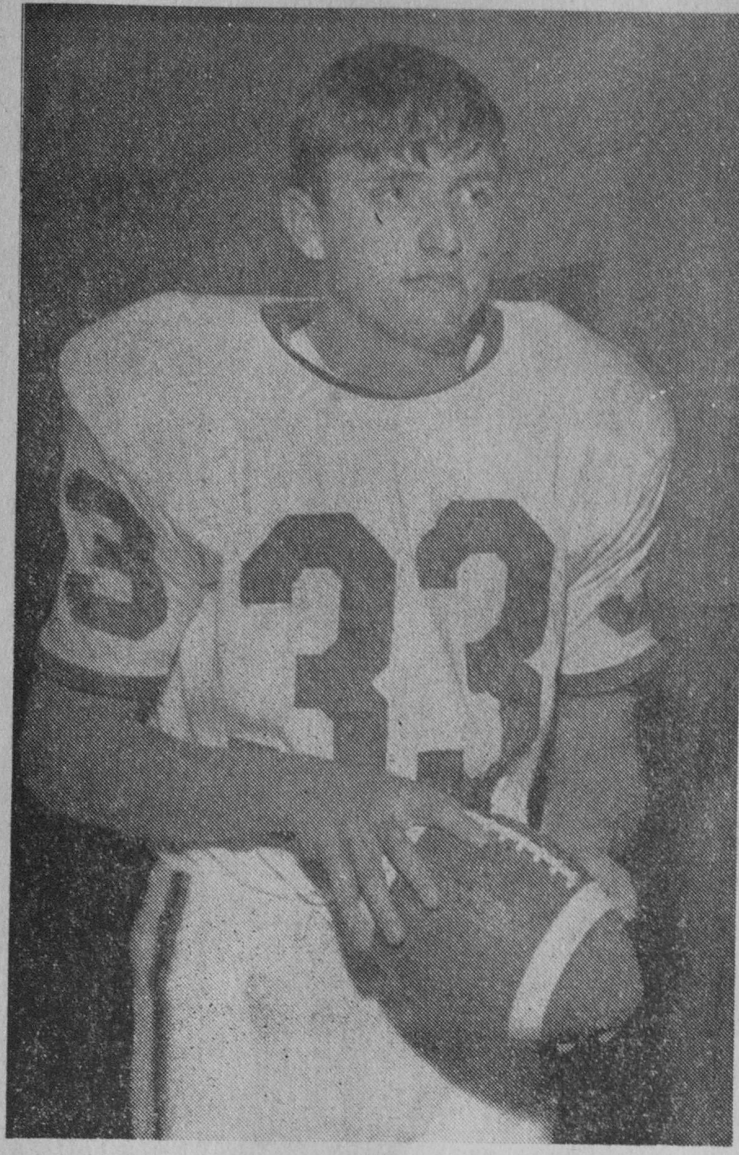
