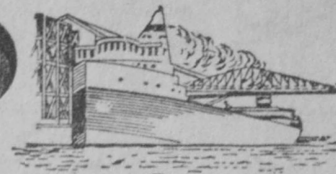

Registered Electors to Receive Three Ballots

November 8 is the Day-Vote!

Many Important Races in 'Off-Year' Election

If the voting franchise was suddenly taken away from Americans, one could rightfully expect a gigantic howl from coast-to-coast—quite possibly, a revolution could sweep the country.

Next Tuesday, November 8, is the date for Michigan's general election—how many of Iosco County's approximately 8,000 registered voters will go to the polls and exercise this right? Only 2,700 turned out for the August 2 primary.

Next week's election is one of great importance—both at the state, area and local level. There are many contests on the ballots and Michigan voters are to decide on one constitutional amendment.

For the first time in history, a November general election will list township offices on the same ballot with candidates for state offices.

Heading state contests will be the race between Gov. George A. Romney, Republican, and his Democratic opponent, Zolton A. Ferency. In the August primary, Romney received 2,092 votes in Iosco while Ferency pulled 602. Running mates of the two major candidates are Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken, Republican, and John B. Bruff.

Other state candidates include James M. Hare, incumbent Democratic secretary of state, who is opposed by George Washington, Republican; Frank J. Kelley, Democrat, incumbent attorney general, is opposed by Lawrence B. Lindemer, Republican.

In congressional races, Robert P. Griffin, Republican, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Patrick V. McNamara in the United States Senate, will be opposed by G. Mennen Williams, former governor; Elford A. Cederberg, Republican, veteran 10th District representative in congress, will be opposed by Hubert C. Evans, perennial Democratic candidate.

Of particular interest to Iosco voters will be the race between Sanford E. Charron, Democratic incumbent, and George A. Prescott, present Iosco County clerk, in the race for 102nd District representative in the state legislature. Prescott made an impressive showing in the primary election to defeat Henry B. Smith of Bay County for Republican candidate to represent Iosco, Ogemaw, Arenac and part of Bay County in the state legislature. Charron, a resident of Pinconning, upset James P. Mielock, veteran state representative from Reno Township, in the general election two years ago.

Also listed in the legislative race are Robert L. Richardson Jr., seeking re-election as Republican state senator in the 35th District, who is opposed by Leo M. Kenny, Democrat.

Various races are listed for state boards. Two members of the state board of education are to be elected. Democratic candidates are Leon Hill and Donald M. D. Thurber. They are opposed by LeRoy G. Augenstein and James F. O'Neil. Two regents of the University of Michigan are to be named. Republican candidates are Robert J. Brown and Trudy Huebner, being opposed by Irene E. Murphy and John J. Collins, Democrats. Two members of the board of trustees of Michigan State University are to be elected. Democratic candidates include Warren M. Huff and Nathan G. Conyers, opposed by Frank Merriman and Ken Thompson, Republicans. Two members of the board of governors for Wayne State University are to be selected. Candidates include Norman O. Stockmeyer and Dr. Alfred K. Sokolowski, Republicans, while Jean McKee and Leslie R. Schmitter are listed as Democratic candidates.

Only candidate at the county level is Robert W. LaVoy, Republican, who seeks a seat on the county road commission. He had been appointed to fill a vacancy. There is no Democratic candidate listed.

Airman Dies of Injuries; Car Rolled Monday

A 19-year-old airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base died of injuries early Tuesday morning following a one-car crash about 1 1/2 hours earlier on River Road, AuSable Township.

Dead is A3C Richard G. Kolkas, whose home town is listed as Spring Lake.

Kolkas lost control of his car on a curve and struck a utility pole. The car was a total wreck and the victim, riding alone, was pinned in the front seat. He died of his injuries at the base hospital at 1:26 a. m.

Investigating were Osceola Township Police Chief Robert Foster and members of his department.

phone calls, some personal contacts are to be made.

"We had been thinking of ways to make an election more meaningful for our eighth grade students," said Mrs. Dunham. "While

voting today is the privilege of those 21 years of age and older, we felt that a 'get out the vote project' would provide youngsters with an opportunity of responsibility."

Detailed voter reports have been compiled for each precinct and captains have been assigned to workers in each precinct. The precinct showing the greatest increase in ballots cast over the previous election will be treated by other members of the class.

This is the first time such a project has ever been attempted in the local schools. The program has been met with much enthusiasm by the students, who only hope that parents and adults will respond to their telephone calls by voting in the November 8 general election.

Cite County Plan Need for Federal Eligibility

Immediate action on a comprehensive zoning plan for Iosco County will be required in order for various local governmental units to take advantage of federal participation money.

George Blust, mayor of Whittemore and chairman of the board of supervisors' planning committee, told the board Friday that his committee had been notified that no federal money would be available here for improvements if such action was not started.

Blust said that the county's share of the plan would be approximately \$12,000. Total estimated cost of the project would be \$42,000, through federal participation.

At stake, he said, was East Tawas' application for federal funds to assist with construction of new sanitary sewer facilities. Other cooperative projects would also be jeopardized.

The planning chairman stressed need for a county-wide water and sewer plan to guarantee future growth of Iosco. He pointed out that comprehensive plans had already been developed by Tawas City, Osceola and AuSable Townships, while plans are now being completed for East Tawas and

Baldwin Township. Blust and members of the planning committee felt that a water and sewer plan for this county, as well as comprehensive master plan, would prove to be an invaluable aid for future development. He plans to make a complete report at the December meeting.

In other action, the board gave its unanimous approval to spending \$1,955 in its 1966 budget for purchase of new radio communications equipment for the county sheriff's department.

Henry Oates, acting in the absence of Finance Chairman Charles Smith, said that county patrol cars were presently served by communications with the state police at East Tawas.

He said that the network was rapidly becoming overloaded and felt that the sheriff's department should have direct car-to-car communications from its own office.

On request of Supervisor James Campbell, authorization was given to purchase maps showing the 1960 census enumeration of Iosco County. Cost of the maps would be \$20. The maps would be used for apportioning the county board of supervisors on a one-man, one-vote ruling of the state.

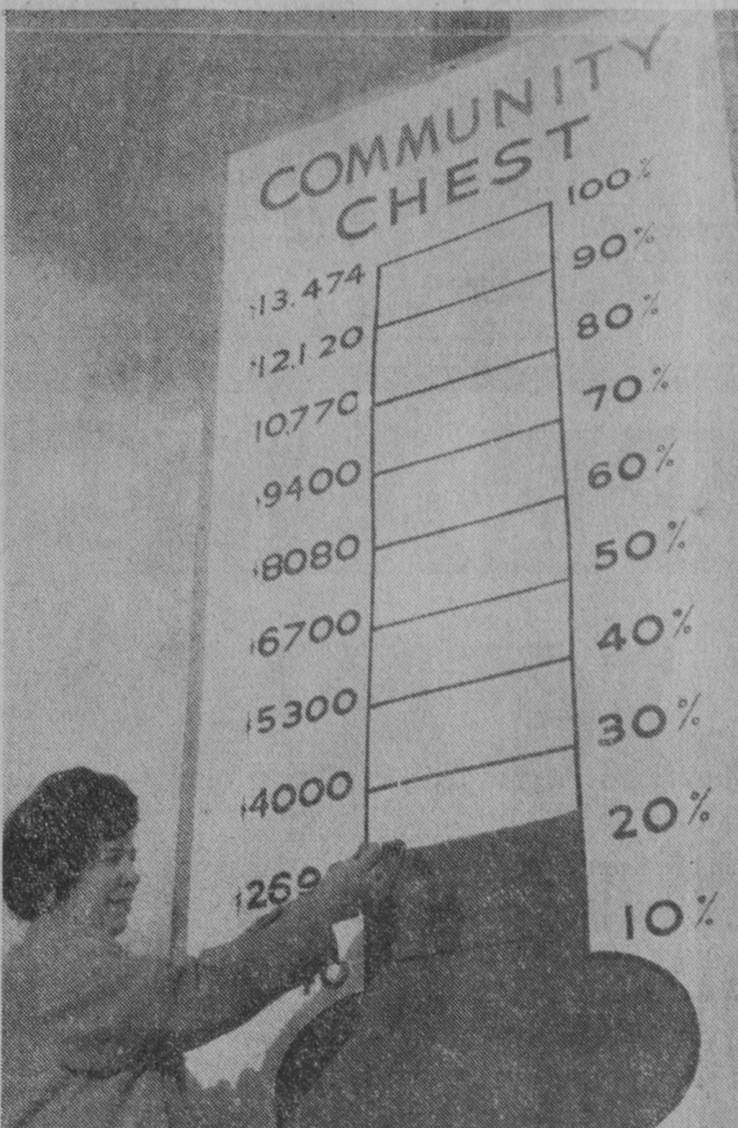

Bank Robber's Term Cut to 10 Years

Donald J. Sundberg, 39, Pontiac, was sentenced to a term of 10 years in the federal penitentiary at Terre Haute, Indiana, for the November 18, 1965, robbery of the Otisville State Bank.

Sundberg had been sentenced to a 20-year term on his conviction, subject to review by the Bay City County Court.

Charges against Sundberg for the October 6, 1965, robbery of the Whittemore Branch of Farmers and Merchants State Bank were dropped by the Federal Bureau of Investigation on his plea of guilty.

Supervisors Hike Pay of Judge-Co. Officers

Taking advantage of an enabling act of the 1966 state legislature, Iosco Board of Supervisors voted Friday to increase the salary of the probate judge by \$1,500.

In a special half-day session called to review officers' salaries, the board also voted a \$500 in-

crease for six county officers. All salary hikes would become effective 90 days after adjournment of the state legislature or sometime next spring.

Percy Jocks, AuSable Township supervisor and chairman of the officers' salary committee, said that Public Act 315 provides \$3,750 in state funds for salary of the probate judge in a county of this size.

His committee recommended that the probate judge's salary be increased to \$7,500, rather than to add the full \$3,750 in state funds to the present \$6,000 salary.

Under terms of the new act, salary of probate judges is set at \$7,500 by the state for counties with a population of 15,000 to 20,000. The state then pays half of the salary.

As part of the new enabling act, the state is to receive 50 percent of the fees collected by the probate judge. At present, all fees remain in the county. Last year, fees collected by this office amounted to about \$1,000. Due to an increase authorized by the legislature, fees are expected to be doubled starting next year.

Supervisors James Campbell of East Tawas and John Hoshbach of Tawas City believed that the county's share of the probate judge's salary should remain at \$6,000 and the entire contribution from the state added to the salary, extending it to \$9,750.

Other supervisors believed differently, stating that the probate judge's salary should not be too far out of line with salaries of other county officers.

The \$1,500 increase passed by a 12-4 roll call vote.

As the second part of the officers' salary report, a \$500 increase was voted for the sheriff, clerk, treasurer, register of deeds, prosecuting attorney and drain commissioner. All officers presently received \$8,000, with the exception of the drain commissioner, who receives \$1,500.

A brush fire Monday morning burned a small area of city property once known as the "Glen" south of the Tawas City Cemetery. The blaze started in some pine needles and endangered large Norway pine trees, but the fire was quickly brought under control by firemen.

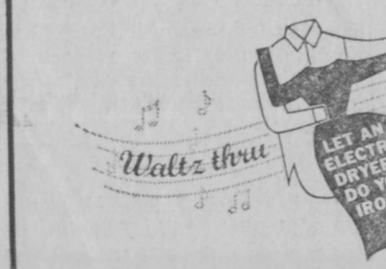



Former Tawas Man Tells of Hunting Moose in Alaska



A former Tawas City man, now serving with the Alaska State Police, this week tells of a recent six-day hunting trip into the bush.

Robert Penman, who once served as an Iosco deputy sheriff, in a letter to his mother, Mrs. Gordon Penman, Tawas City, said that he and two friends used a swamp buggy to make their way into the wilds of Alaska.

Following a small creek up to its source, the Little Nelchina, the front end of the buggy dropped into a hole and they spent 18 hours in the creek with water running in one door and out the other.

"I should say the buggy was in the creek as we got off and set up camp," he said. They hooked up some cable and waited for someone else to come along. Help arrived 18 hours later.

The men drove the buggy up a 4,700-foot mountain so they could get a good look at the surrounding country. The next morning, they made camp and "gassed" the area for game.

"I spotted five nice bull moose in a group about a mile away and we decided to try for them, leaving the buggy on the mountain. After the three of us got into the brush, we knew the general area where we had seen the moose but it looked a little different when we moved into the trees.

"It started to rain lightly and we did not see a hair. I knew they were still there but figured that they had headed down when it started to rain. I was in the center and a little ahead of the other two, going up wind to allow the moose to go around me before they would get the scent. This would place the other two fellows in a place to shoot if we jumped them.

"I walked right up on five bulls and two cows in an area about the size of our cement barnyard. There I was right in the middle, so I figured that I might as well do what I came for."

He shot the largest moose, raked another shell into the chamber and dropped a second animal. After shooting a third bull, the other two men walked into view of the remainder of the herd and they took off like a swarm of black flies was after them.

Penman said he could not figure out why the moose had not been concerned about his presence. After field dressing the animals, they pulled the three moose aboard the swamp buggy with a winch and took them to camp.

On the way out of the bush, the party shot seven caribou. "We had a good trip and provided ourselves with a winter's supply of some excellent meat," he said.

Penman is a sergeant in the Alaska State Police and has charge of a post at Palmer. He and his wife, the former Lorraine Hock, have three children.

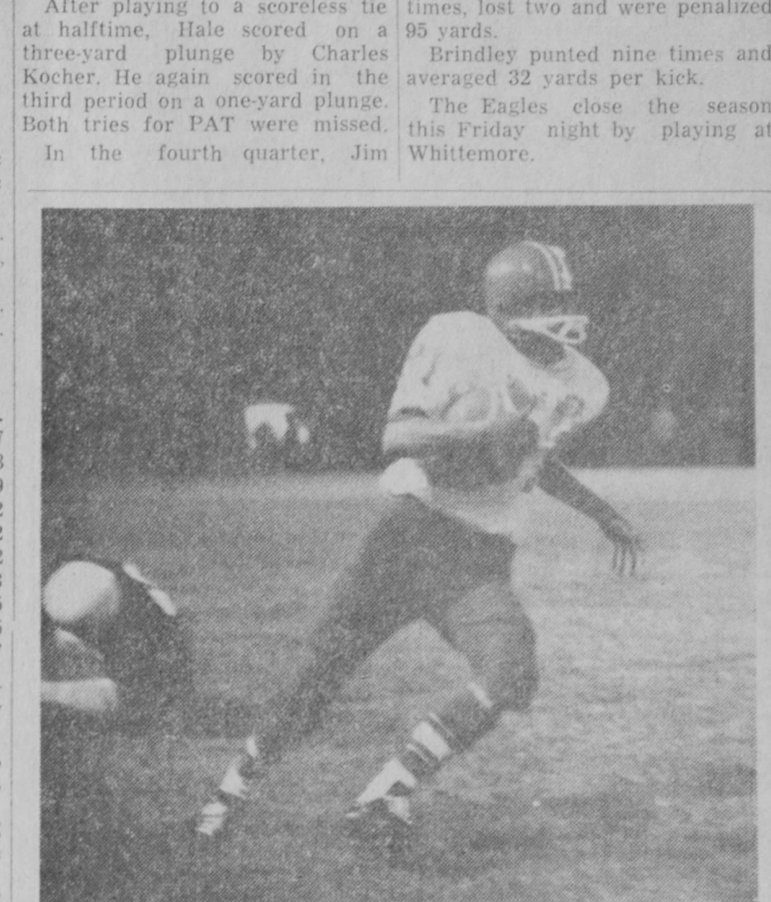
In the fourth quarter, Jim

Your Medicare Handbook is designed as a ready source of information and guidance for each person covered by medicare. Along with the red, white and blue health insurance identification cards, it is the key to medicare protection. Mr. Ellifritz stated that anyone having any questions about his rights under medicare should get in touch with the social security office located at 1009 North Madison, Bay City.

Nunn Tells Need of More State Freeways

Michigan must build an additional 2,000 miles of freeway during the next 15 years to prevent a "huge traffic jam" from occurring in the early 1980s, a member of the state highway commission said last Thursday.

Commissioner W. D. Nunn said many people think the nearly 1,300 miles of freeway that Michigan now has "will solve all of our problems as far as moving traffic is concerned."

"I wish it were true," Nunn told a meeting of the Northeast Michigan Association of Chambers of Commerce. "The fact is that we'll need 3,900 miles of freeway in 1980 if we are to move traffic from one point to another anywhere in Michigan."

And by then, he said, most of the freeways now open to traffic will have to be widened from four to six lanes in rural areas and from six to eight lanes in cities.

Nunn said the completion of I-75 from the Bay City suburb of Kawkawlin to Grayling in three years will have a "tremendous impact" on Northeastern Michigan.

It will relieve traffic congestion for a few years, he said, but the area will soon need a second freeway paralleling US-23 along Lake Huron from Standish to Alpena.

"Our highway needs study shows we'll need this second freeway by 1980," he said. "However, we aren't going to come anywhere close to meeting our needs during the next 15 years unless we have additional funds."

"Right now—and for the last five years, for that matter—we've been meeting only 75 percent of our highway needs. An increase in the state gas tax and license plate fee is necessary if Michigan is to continue its national leadership in highways."

Nunn said he hopes the state legislature will give top priority to proposed increases in the gas tax and license plate fee when it convenes in January.

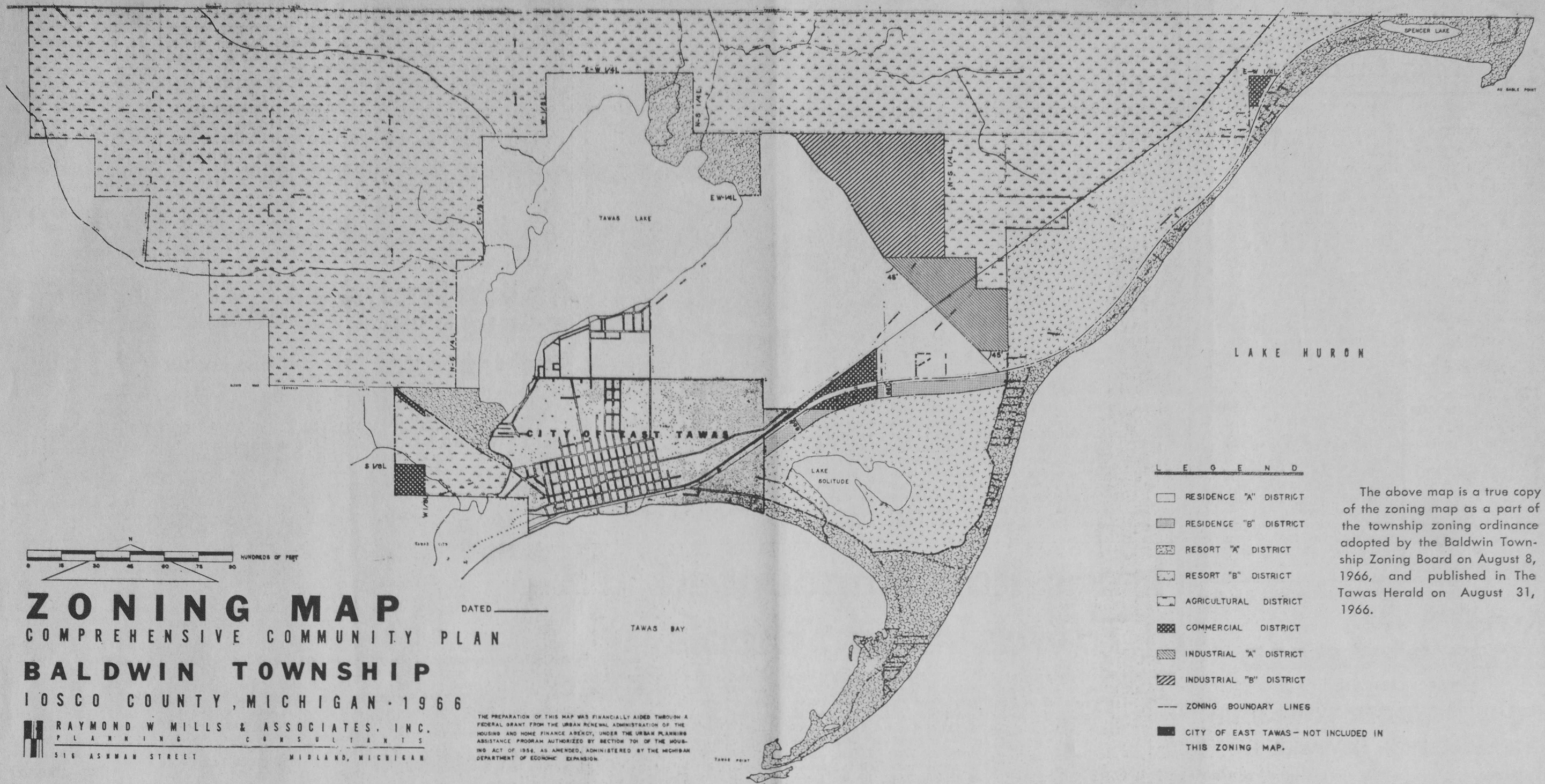
