

Fewer Hunters; Kill Down on Public Land

Hunting pressure was "back to normal" on public land in Iosco for the 1966 opener on deer. Hunter success on public domain in this area appeared to be even below last year's below average kill.

While cash registers of Iosco taverns and eating spots played a merry tune Saturday and Sunday, downstate hunters who swelled the red-coated army to record size a year ago avoided their usual haunts in the deer areas.

A drive along old US-23 through Wilber Township Saturday was most revealing. It was actually safe to drive a car through the area. Several deer crossed the road and there were no shots fired.

Where hunters had been lined up nearly shoulder-to-shoulder a year ago, Saturday's opener saw only a scattering of nimrods along roads. This was general throughout the county.

Excessive hunting pressure was noted in the Tuttle Marsh area, but it was still below the 1965 season. One of the best natural deer areas in past years, it has been opened to traffic through construction of a new road.

Hunters scouting old US-23, the Tuttle Marsh, Buck Creek and Silver Valley reported seeing a few doe, but bucks were scarce.

A check at a few hunting clubs Saturday afternoon revealed only fair success and a new phenomenon for the deer season opener. Portable television sets were much in evidence as hunters chose to join the estimated 30 million persons who watched the Michigan State-Notre Dame football game.

Edgar Barnes was the first hunter to report success at the Herald office Saturday morning. He shot a nice spikehorn buck on his Tawas Township farm at 7:25 o'clock. Another early caller was Mrs. William McCready of Tawas City, who bagged her buck at 7:45 o'clock.

A check with other hunting areas Monday morning revealed that poor hunting results were general in the Iosco area. Arden Charters of Whittemore reported that three bucks had been killed at Mansfield Rod and Gun Club. On the way home to work in his store Monday morning, Charters missed a nice eight-pointer. By the time he stopped his car and loaded his rifle, a buck which had been standing along the road had "taken off for the tall timber."

"At least we did not have the one continuous roar of gunfire on opening day," said Charters in commenting about the closing of

antlerless deer season below M-55. Area police agencies report a very quiet week-end. There were no injuries from gunfire, there were no lost hunters and no reports of stolen deer.

"Saturday was most unusual," commented Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell. "Normally, the office is a hectic place on opening day with the continuous ringing of telephones."

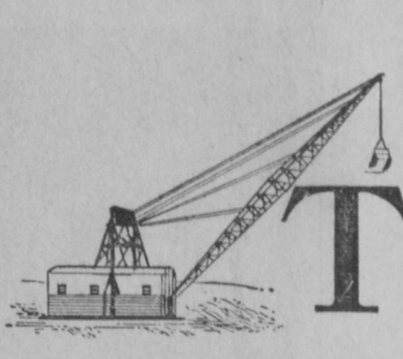
Richard F. Meyer, 29, Saginaw, escaped injury Sunday evening when his car struck and killed a deer on M-65.

The men were arrested by Conservation Officer A. G. Leitz, assisted by other conservation officers.

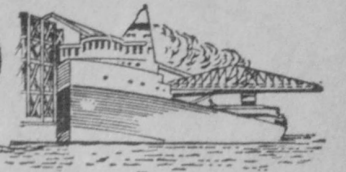

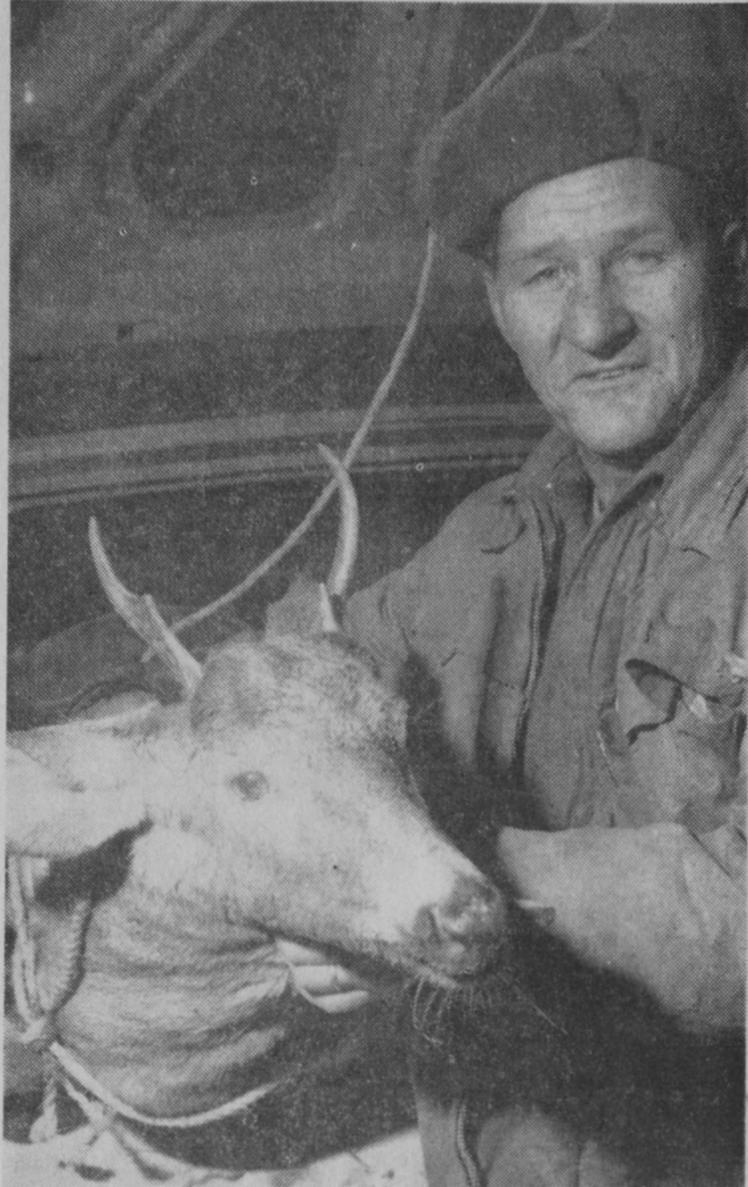

About the most exciting thing that happened on the opening day of deer season was an 80-acre grass and brush fire which swept across Tuttle Marsh in Wilber Township.

Former E&M Employee Died November 16

A retired brakeman for the Erie and Michigan Railway and Navigation Company, Fred Swartz of East Tawas, died Wednesday, November 16 at his home of a heart attack.

Funeral services were conducted November 19 at Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, and burial was in Tawas City Cemetery.

He was born October 21, 1891, at Tawas City and attended school here.

Surviving are his wife, Jennie; one stepson, Otto Brand of Saginaw, and two brothers.

More than 16 men battled the blaze before bringing it under control Saturday afternoon.

Tawas District Ranger Loren Woerpel of East Tawas said that the blaze had been caused by a hunter, who had built a small fire to warm himself early Saturday morning.

The blaze ran unchecked through mixed marsh grass and aspen before being finally stopped at the edge of the forest service's new highway.

Aiding the five-man forest service crew were four hunters and seven members of the Oscoda-AuSable Fire Department.

Woerpel said there were about 150 cars parked along the new road Saturday and 57 on Sunday.

"Very few hunters offered help in fighting the blaze and, at one time, shots were fired at a deer running through the burned area which endangered the fire fighters."

Without the new road, Woerpel said the forest service probably would have had trouble in combating the blaze. Equipment rolled to within 1,000 feet of the spot where the blaze is believed to have started.

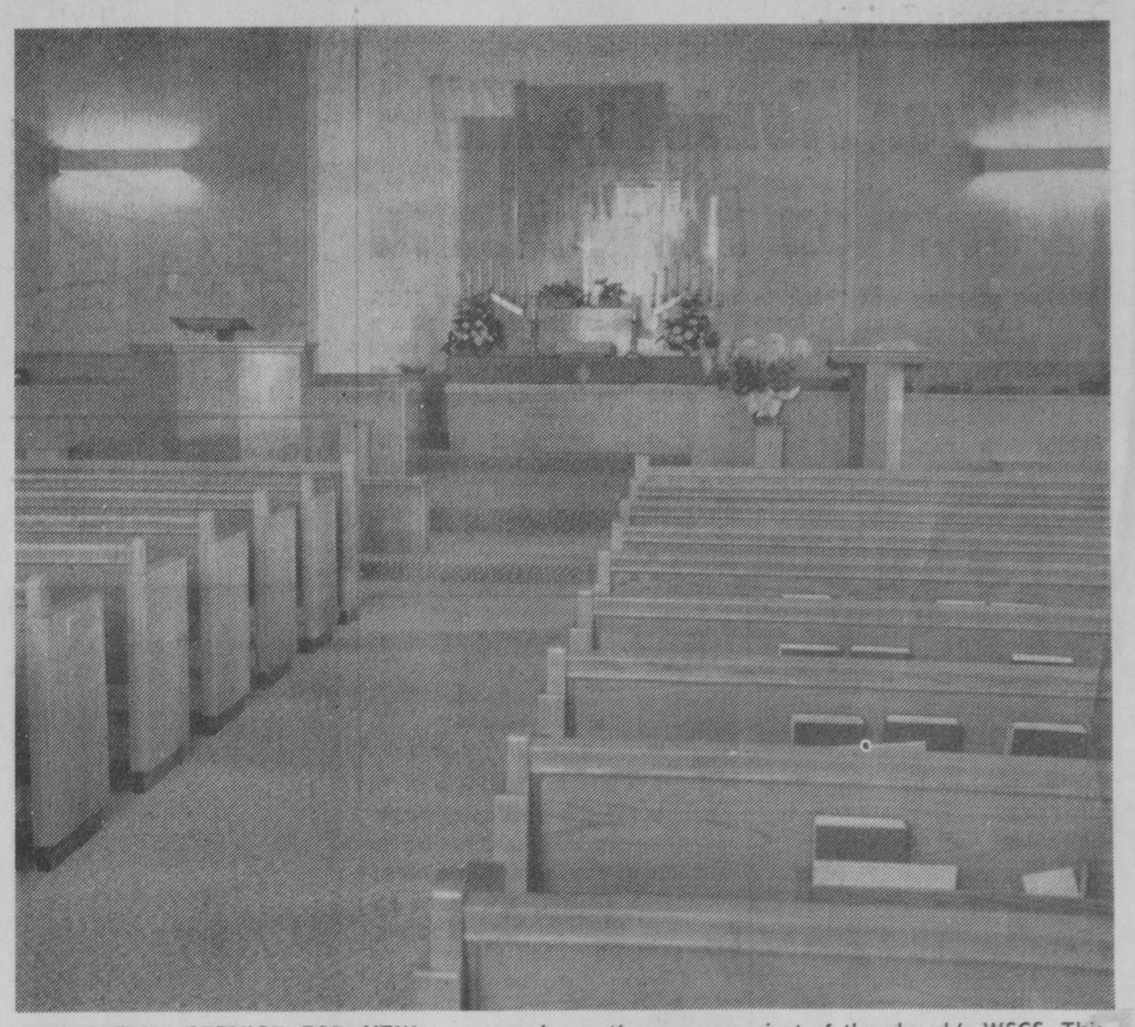

Harten Named All-Conference Back

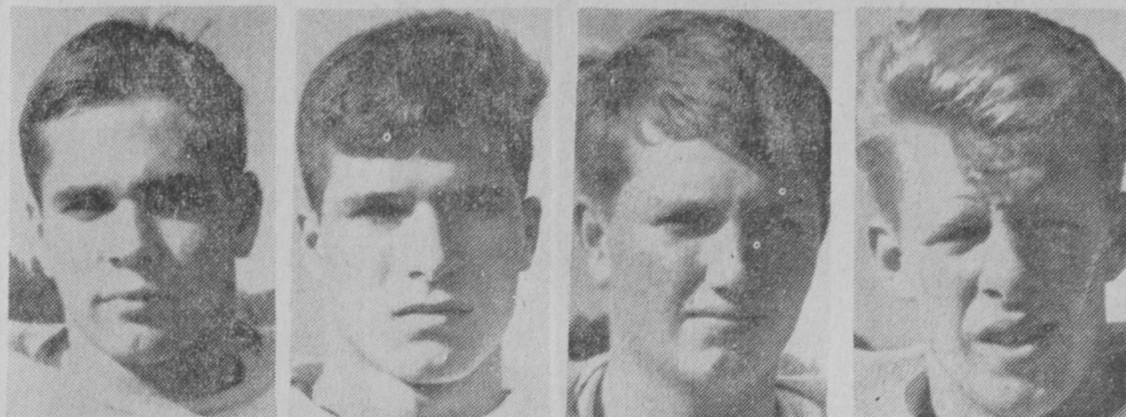
Dennis Harten, Tawas Area senior, was named to the NBC's all conference football team at a meeting of coaches last Wednesday night.

Four other Tawas football players received honorable mention. They were Ray Powers, Dan Phillips, Alan Lickfelt and John Crisenbery.

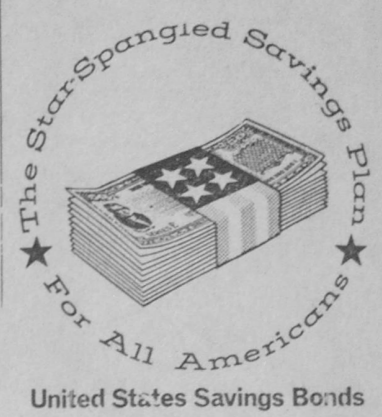
Harten, a 200-pound, five foot, 10-inch halfback, was one of Tawas' two power runners in the past football season. He was also a standout on defense for the Braves.

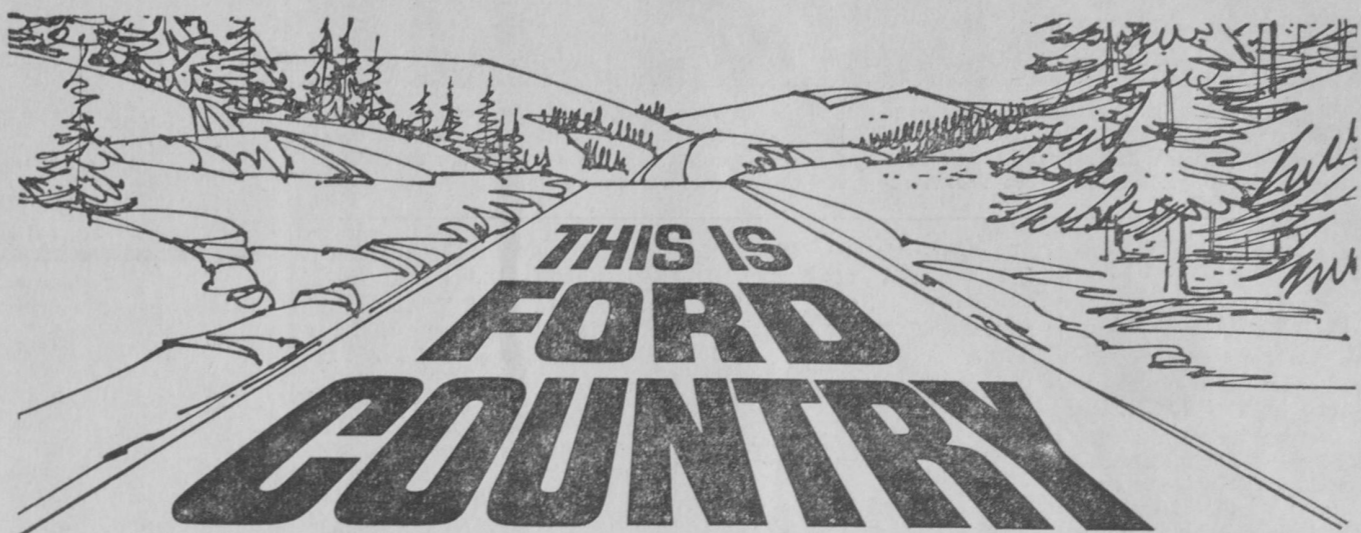

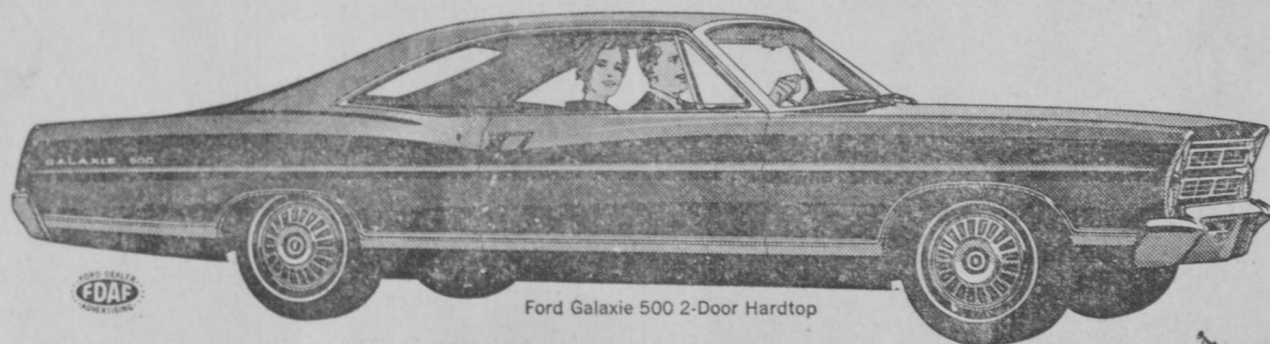

Shooting Power Company's Equipment Can Cause Woe to Michigan Deer Hunters

Hunting season could be a time of woe for thoughtless hunters who shoot at electric insulators. Consumers Power Company this week renewed a \$100 reward offer for information leading to conviction of anyone whose careless gunfire causes a power interruption.

Besides interrupting electric service to hundreds of people, the hunter also is taking a big chance, often with his life.

A recent incident near Midland resulted in a power line falling almost to the ground. In its path, it left fire and molten metal as the line passed through other lines. The careless shooter was endangered by the flashing electric arc and, if standing nearby, could have been electrocuted. Other persons passing through the same woods could have touched the

still-live line as it swung at eye level, until Consumers Power employees located the damaged section.

Often, reports Harry R. Wall, vice president-electric operations, the power interruptions are just "outright vandalism."

"Consumers Power is prepared to prosecute vandals who cause electric blackouts. It's not just a matter of homes being without electricity. Often, it involves hospitals, police, fire departments and other essential services," Mr. Wall said.

ASC Committee Now Taking Applications for Land Adjustment

Grant H. Bessey, Ioseco ASC County Committee chairman, announced today that applications are being taken for participation in the cropland adjustment program. The cropland adjustment program for 1967 is a continuation of the program from 1966 with the dual objective of farm and non-farm benefits through shifting cropland presently not needed for agricultural production into long-term conservation, recreation and open space uses.

The program is expected to be of particular benefit to farmers who want to retire to take jobs in industry, or for other reasons want to change their production pattern. The program provides means by which they can shift their land into new uses and at the same time apply needed conservation measures for long-time benefit to the land.

In addition to the annual payment, where appropriate, those who agree to permit free public access for fishing, hunting, hiking or trapping in accordance with state and federal regulations may get additional per-acre payments. Of the 2,000,000 acres of land put under the program in 1966, about 500,000 acres are open without charge to the public for these uses under this public access feature of the program. In Ioseco County, there are six cropland adjustment agreements with two farms having public access agreements. These two farms provide 128 acres of land for public use in hunting. If anyone is interested in taking his land out of production, please contact the ASCS Office, Federal Building, East Tawas.

Wintertime Care For Evergreens
Snow and ice of winter can pick off shrubs in your yard and garden.

Joseph Cox, extension specialist in landscape architecture at Michigan State University, says damage often comes from the weight of the snow and ice. Branches are forced to droop, deforming them or causing them to split or break.

Cox suggests tending to your shrubs immediately after a snow storm if you have not given them advance protection. Gently shake the snow from the branches with a broom.

Low spreading evergreen shrubs can be protected by giving the branches some support— ahead of the storm. Lay boughs under the branches to buoy them up. Snow can be used for this purpose, also. As you shovel the walk, pile some of the snow under spreading branches to prevent them from bending to the ground.

Another method often seen in Northern Michigan is the use of light supporting crates, built from lath or other light-weight boards. These structures can be painted dark green to blend with the shrubs and they can be used year after year.

Upright-type plants can be pro-

ected by tying the spreading branches to the main stem with a soft cloth. It may help to add the support of a stake in the center of such plants before tying the branches.

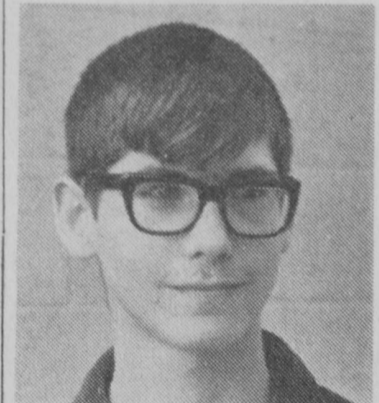
Bumps and bruises from children and dogs romping through the yard are not kind to shrubs, so try to protect the plantings from this rough treatment. When branches are brittle, they break easily.

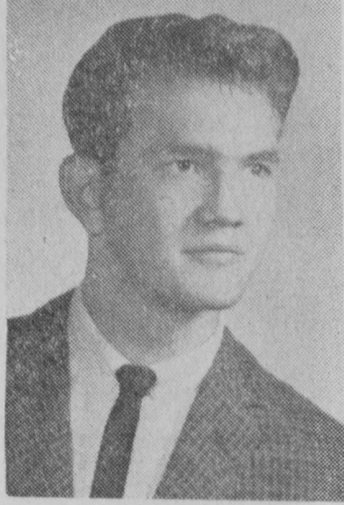

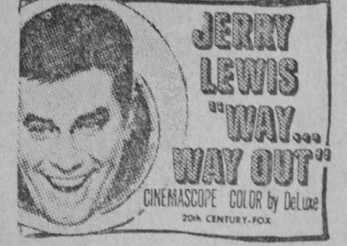
