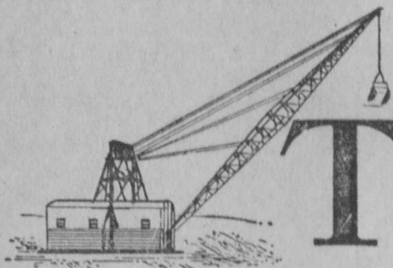

THE INDIAN MISSION METHODIST CHURCH in Isosco County is nearing its 100th anniversary. In the late 1850s, a group of about 50 Chippewa Indian families came north from the Saginaw area and settled on the north end of VanEtan Lake north of Oscoda. The Indians were converted to Christianity and, following the flooding of their homes during log drives, moved to a new location on the county line dividing Isosco and Alcona. A log schoolhouse was built and construction on the present church building, above, moved slowly with dimes and nickels collected from the Indians. A cemetery across from the church dates back to the 1850s and another on Indian Road dates back to 1870. Parishioners plan to paint the interior of their church in preparation for the centennial celebration, the date of which has not yet been set.—Herald Photo.

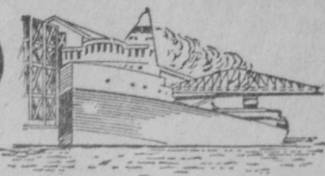

\$150,000 Damage Suit Filed Over Loss of Eye

Claiming he sustained permanent injury through negligence in operation of East Tawas dump, Leo V. Maki commenced suit Monday in Isosco Circuit Court.

Seeking a judgment of \$150,000, Maki, 56, 500 Franklin Street, East Tawas, lost his left eye December 4, 1965, when an explosion occurred in a fire at the dump.

He claims that city employees had started a fire in refuse which discharged a bullet, shell or other explosive missile. A fragment struck him in the head, causing laceration of the eyelid and destruction of the retina of his left eye.

Maki claims that the city was negligent in failure to have its dump adequately and properly supervised, that it failed to erect signs warning and prohibiting patrons from discarding shells, bullets or other similar dangerous missiles.

He also claims that the city was

negligent in allowing patrons to enter the dump area at times when burning was taking place and failure to schedule burning hours at times when patrons would not be present at the dump.

Clause Negotiation Stalled; TA Board Asks Further Talks

Negotiation between the City of East Tawas and Tawas Area Board of Education over removal of a clause in the city's quit claim deed to the Newman Street athletic field hit a snag following approval of a committee report Monday night.

The city had asked that a reverter clause in its deed be removed in order that planned recreational improvements to the athletic field could be made.

In 1957, the school issued a deed to the city for this property but reserved the right to take it back if ever needed for school purposes.

"It is the desire of the committee that the school work constructively with the city council to mutually solve this problem. The committee feels that it can only recommend change of this clause when a suitable solution for future site problems can be met," stated the committee report.

The report said that until a more favorable alternate site can be supplied, the board needs to weigh carefully before it gives up the athletic field.

Several points could alter need for the property, said the report: A fire in the East Tawas annex could make immediate rebuilding necessary; a change in federal requirements to receive aid could make construction of a new elementary school necessary; state fire code could change and make it impractical to meet with the existing elementary unit and with the present site, enrollment could expand to necessitate building added facilities.

The board said it was leaving the "door open" to further discussion with the city. Acting on the committee were Board Chairman Leonard Sarki, Mrs. Helen Payea, Waldo Curry and Clare Herriman.

Blizzard Strikes

The season's second blizzard hit Northern Michigan Monday night and Tuesday causing cancellation of all Isosco County schools on Tuesday. County and city snow removal equipment worked Monday night clearing roads but the snow continued to fall Tuesday morning and afternoon. Other areas of the state were hit much harder than Northeastern Michigan. While the second mail truck had not reached the Tawas Tuesday noon, the area north of Alpena had no mail service as trucks were unable to travel beyond that point.

Rep.-Elect Prescott Attends House Caucus

Rep.-Elect George A. Prescott attended a preliminary organization caucus of House Republicans held November 16 at Lansing. Representatives are to meet December 7 to select candidates for speaker to be presented January 11 when the 1967 session opens.

The house of representatives is evenly divided by the two major political parties with 55 members each. Considerable speculation is now being made as to selection of a speaker.

Health District May Teach Sex Classes

Discussion is now under way between representatives of Tawas Area School and Dr. L. A. Lambert, district health director, regarding the possibility of inaugurating a program of sex education in area schools.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, told members of the board of education Monday night that it had been suggested that the district health unit provide a program similar to one presented by Dr. Irwin C. Sweet in seven counties to the south.

A survey of parents conducted earlier this year by the board of education indicated that classes in sex education were desired. Participation would be on a voluntary basis subject to parental approval.

Miss Bolen said that while the district had no teachers qualified or certified to present such classes, some instruction was being provided by science programs in grades kindergarten through 12.

Such instruction, she said, was to be the topic of discussion at a meeting of the parent-teacher association early next year.

In other matters, a four-member committee was appointed to make a report on a proposition to hire a head custodian for the school district. Acting on the committee will be Leonard Sarki, Clyde Soper, Mrs. Helen Payea and Robert Elliott.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that four applications had been received for high school principal, which is being filled until the end

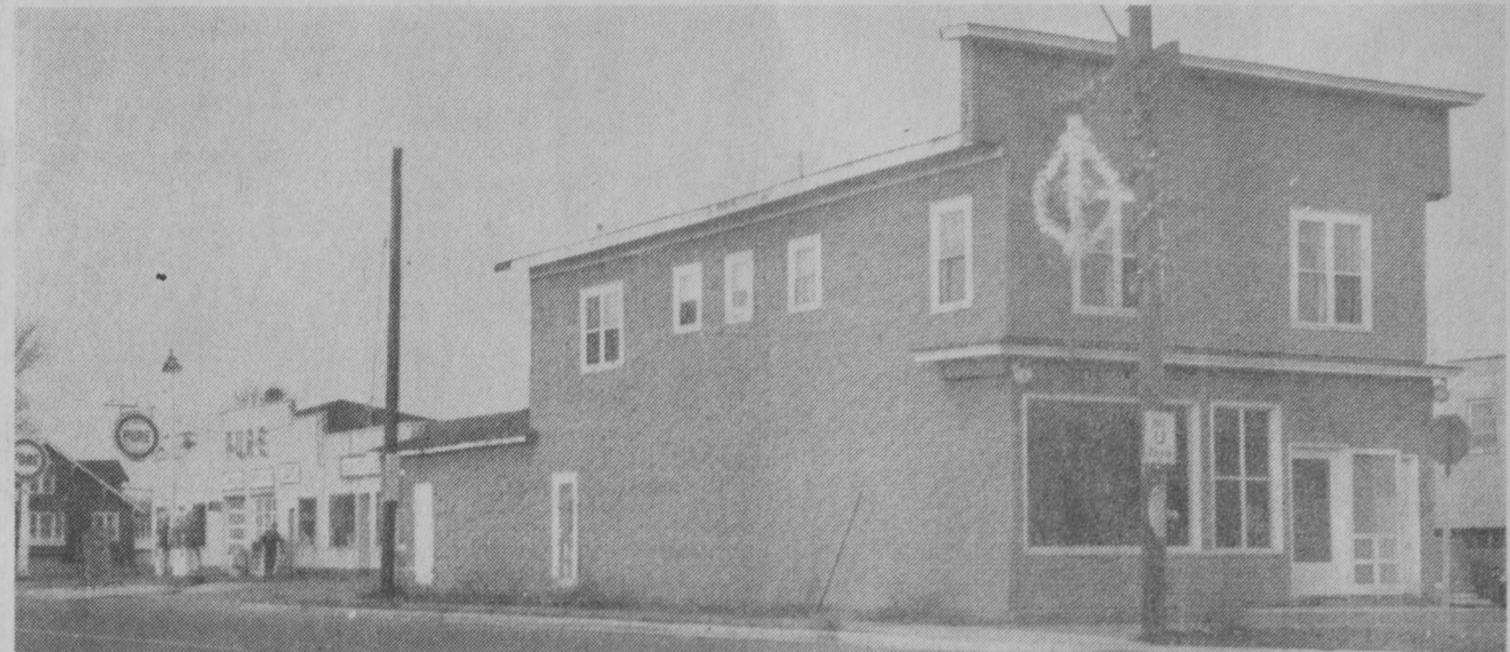
of the semester by John Forsten. Mick said that 15 other schools in the state were also seeking to fill vacancies for secondary school principals.

School is to be dismissed Wednesday (today) at 2:30 p. m. A workshop is to be held for teachers concerning use of specialized equipment in the school's remedial program. An instructor is being made available under a federal program and all teachers are to attend. Mick said that the program should prove very worthwhile to all teachers, even though all will not be using the equipment.

Four representatives of the community are to be named to a committee now studying possible formation of a new Thunder Bay Community College at Alpena. The board authorized Tawas' participation in this study at its last meeting.

Pure Oil Company Plans New Station; to Remove Two Structures on US-23

Reclamation of an important business intersection in Tawas City was announced last week by Pure Oil Company.

Plans for a new 28 by 78-foot masonry building were revealed in a building application read Monday night before the Tawas City Council.

The \$36,000 building will house a new service station and office for Bublitz Oil Company.

R. M. DuShane, construction superintendent for the Midwest Marketing Division of Pure Oil Company, stated in the application that the present building

housing Bublitz Oil Company would be demolished and removed.

In addition, the oil firm purchased the frame building at the corner of Mathews Street and US-23 owned by Elmer Slaven. This structure is to be demolished and utilized for a new location.

According to plans, the new structure is to be set back 41 feet from US-23 on the front and 58 feet from Mathews Street on the east side. Most of the former Slaven property would be blacktopped for service and parking area.

Part of the original structure housing Bublitz Oil Company was once the location of the Tawas Creamery Company. Former owners included Henry McCartney, Carl Fahselt, Charles Moeller and Henry Kobs.

Thirty-five years ago, James H. Leslie remodeled the building in-

to a super-service station. Other additions were made later including a restaurant on the west end. Once the location of the Vic and Zel Restaurant, but unoccupied in recent years.

The late Karl Bublitz purchased the building in 1941. The building had been remodeled at various times and a new front was constructed in recent years.

The Slaven building, built before the turn of the century, had been the location of furniture

stores operated by John Armstrong, E. L. King and W. A. Evans Furniture Company. It had been owned for many years by H. T. Thomas of East Tawas and for about 25 years by the Evans' interest. Slaven purchased the building from the late Harry Goldsmith in November 1945.

The building housed a grocery store until 1958, later served as a religious meeting place, an antique shop and had been unoccupied for the past year.

Four Auto Crashes During Past Week

Four personal injury auto accidents were handled by state police during the past week.

Charles Pohil, 49, Detroit, was treated by a Hale physician last Tuesday after he lost control of his car and it crashed on Long Lake Road in Plainfield Township.

Two persons were treated at Tawas Hospital for minor injuries following a crash Tuesday on M-65, Reno Township. A car driven by Russell J. McKeen, 58, Flint, made a left turn into the path of a car driven by John H. Hollander.

Three persons received minor injuries Saturday morning in a crash at the M-65-M-55 intersection. A car driven by Dempsey D. Woodward, 64, Ferndale, stopped at the intersection and pulled in front of a car driven by Hershel Herriek, 43, Flint, who was headed south on M-65. The cars collided and a third vehicle driven by Albert A. Brown, 51, Warren, was also involved.

A crash Sunday morning on M-65 south of Wicker Road sent two persons to Tawas Hospital for treatment of minor injuries. Officers said a car driven by Thomas V. Kessler, 17, Hale, skidded on a curve. David Jacobs, 22, Saginaw, was a passenger. The driver said he attempted to avoid several deer standing in the road.

Borosch Proposes Area Boys Club

Tawas City Council has taken under advisement a suggestion that boys club facilities be provided in the community.

At last week's meeting, William Borosch, Tawas City realtor, proposed such a club and said he would contribute \$500 toward the purchase of a building.

Only two weeks ago, vandals had destroyed two large plate glass windows in a building owned by Borosch. The youths had told him they did not know why they caused the damage—"perhaps because they had nothing else to do," said the realtor.

Borosch, who said he had talked to other adults in the area, believed that a boys club would be a worthwhile project. He mentioned the former Cowan Garage on US-23 as a possible location. He believed that the two cities and area service clubs could handle the project, which would cost about \$30,000.

The council is to check the suggestion and is to investigate operation of an Alpena club.

Ask Parents for Opinion on TA Spectator Buses

A questionnaire is to be sent home to parents of Tawas Area School District to determine if bus transportation for students to out-of-town athletic events is desired.

This action was taken Monday night by the board of education following discussion on the question. Past policy of the board of education prohibited use of buses for such activities.

Other schools of the Northern B Conference, which utilize buses for student transportation, had requested that Tawas follow suit. The school's student council had also requested buses for transportation.

Any unruly conduct on buses or at the games would suspend all privileges of students involved. Anyone attending basketball games by means of spectator buses must remain in the school. At football games, students are not to leave the designated field area.

Any unsportsmanlike conduct would result in loss of bus privileges for students involved. Only high school students would ride the buses. If a student rides a bus to a game, he must return on the same bus.

A list of teachers who have consented to act as chaperones was presented by the student council. The board is to take action when results of the survey are determined. The board had asked for a ruling on use of buses for such transportation. A change in state policy has been noted in that it now approves use of spectator buses if the entire cost is paid by the school.

Isosco Democrats Name Committee at Convention

Isosco County Democrats named four members to its executive committee last week and will meet again within the next two weeks to name county officers.

Named to the committee were Robert Pember, Melvin McCormick, Alton Hill and Clarence (Pete) Oates.

Other members include Michael Dolak, Roy Bergeron, Sanford Charron and Leo Kenney, who had been Democratic candidates during the past two years.

Isosco GOP in Surprise Leadership Change

Merton Killey, East Tawas, was named chairman of Isosco County Republicans at a meeting of the county executive committee Monday night.

This action followed last week's surprise move which saw veteran county chairman, Elmer Werth, being defeated for re-election to the executive committee.

Other officers named were Mrs. Charles Rosenberg, vice chairman; Mrs. William Olsen, secretary; and Jack Allen, treasurer.

Other members elected to the new executive committee last week by delegates attending the convention were James P. Mielock, Bruce Myles, Mary Coulon, Clarence Everlett, John Weible, Nelson

Johnson and James Hearl. Werth's dismissal by a majority of delegates attending the county convention caused many raised eyebrows last week, coming on the heels of a Republican victory in the recent election and Werth's long service to the Isosco group.

Numerous GOP members of the county have expressed dissatisfaction over the move and have threatened a boycott of local party functions.

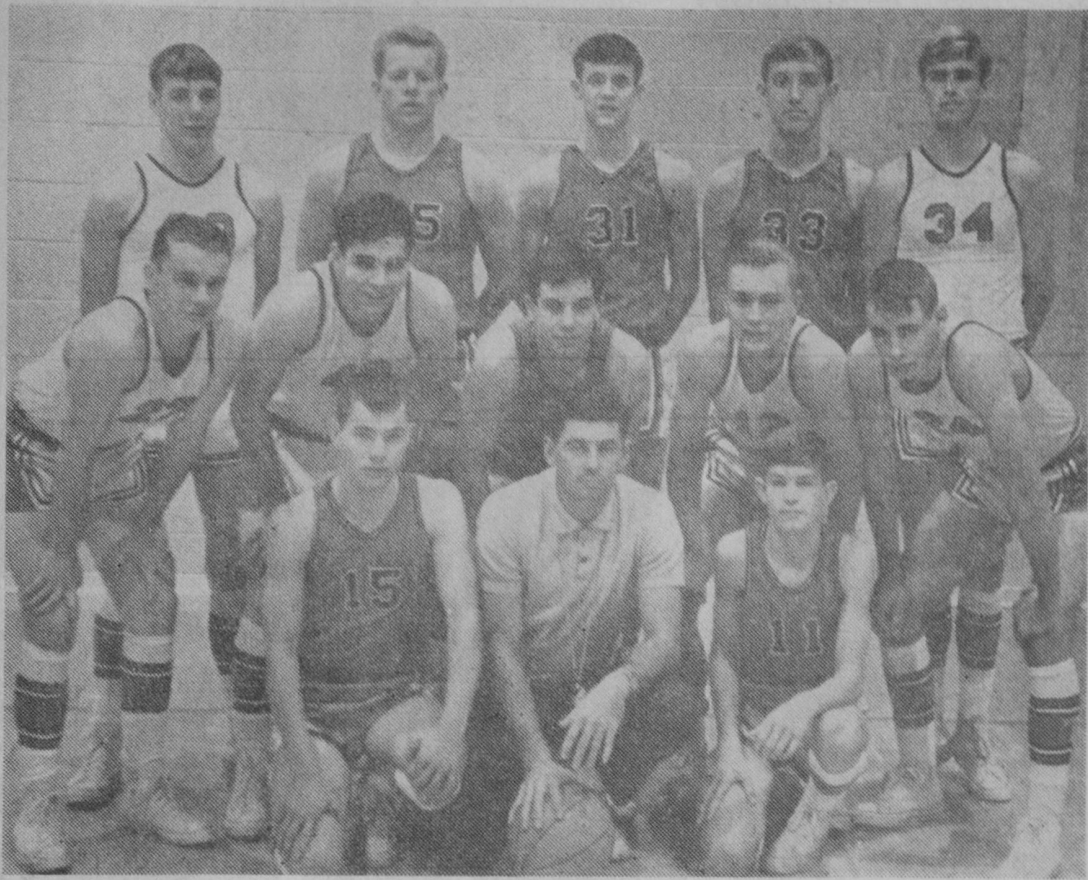

Recent use of educational television at West Branch and expansion of television programming facilities by Central Michigan University next year were outlined Monday night by Chester Surline, superintendent of Rose City-West Branch School District.

Surline told members of Tawas Area Board of Education that his school district had used this educational aid for three years prior to dropping it during reorganization of the school district. "We were quite reluctant to lose it and we plan to equip our new buildings with facilities for education television," said Surline.

In 1959, West Branch was included among 11 schools which benefited from a three-year Ford Foundation grant to Central Michigan University in this new instructional field.

While he believed that Michigan was dragging its feet in this method of instruction, he believed that expansion of educa-

tional television programming was miraculous.

He said that one of the problems in this field was the programming over commercial stations. He said that CMU planned to open its new educational network in early 1967 which would solve many problems. Delta College is also expanding its programming.

Surline said that educational television was most effective in presenting science classes to elementary grades, because teachers in the lower grades were unable to specialize in this particular field. The medium was also effective in the teaching of American government and history.

He presented information on costs and use of the modern instructional aid at West Branch. Members of the Tawas Area Board of Education and administrators are to review the material for possible incorporation here in the future.

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Rollie Gackstetter Died November 23

Rollie Gackstetter, 53, former Tawas City businessman and one-time player-manager of amateur baseball teams in the area, died November 23 at Ann Arbor Veterans Hospital.

Funeral services were held Sunday, November 27, at First Baptist Church, Tawas City. Burial was in the Tawas City Cemetery.

He was born November 5, 1913, at Genoa, Ohio, and as a child, came to this community with his family. His father, the late Peter Gackstetter, at one time operated a restaurant in Tawas City.

After graduation from East Tawas High School, he worked for commercial fishermen here and then entered employment in the gasoline service station business, working at one time for the late James Robinson.

Gackstetter operated Rainbow Service in Tawas City several years and later leased the Robinson station at the present location of Fletcher's.

He served in the United States Navy during World War II and was a member of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post.

Upon his return from service, he again entered business as an

auto mechanic, later managed the service department of Ottawa Equipment Company and operated a truck repair at the Consumers Power Company service center. He had been a self-employed machinist at Johnson Auto Supply before becoming ill.

Greatly interested in sports, he had been an outfielder on Northeastern Michigan League baseball teams at Alabaster and Tawas City. He managed teams at Tawas City and East Tawas as well as being active in bowling.

He was married to the former Rose Watts, who survives him. They had made their home on West Miller Road in Tawas Township.

HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

MATHEMATICAL FORMULA FOR FASHION

Four lines of equal length, forming four right angles once just made a square—but fashion fabrics have raised it from the flat page of the textbook to be made three dimensional by curves, yours!

Geometric designs are all the rage and the shape once used deplorably for someone "not with it" is now coveted by the most "in" groups. Even the bespectacled geometer would have to marvel at the new relations between circles, solids, surfaces, lines and angles. The academic influence has been extended to the finished fashion too—the hardest to please English teacher would laud the conciseness and simplicity of today's fashion compositions, in fact they are getting more compact all the time as hemlines go up.

With most restrictions lifted in the fabric world, pick a pattern that gives you the same freedom. Simplicity 6496 is that pattern. It's a great common denominator for "mathematical" fabrics. There are two skirt lengths, sleeves with self-ruffles, a lowered round neckline that can be changed with a gently ruffled collar and a becoming empire waistline.

Use one print for the top, another for the skirt, and the same for the sleeves. Just turn your imagination loose. Fashion has certainly disproved any theorem denying compatibility of shapes and sizes.

HEMELINES AREN'T STRADDLING THE FENCE; NEITHER CAN YOU

While the sewing machine is out, take a look at the other dresses in your closet. Just about everything is going up this year from astronauts to hemlines and the extra inches on your skirts and dresses are as way out as space walks. So, if you have something other than make-up covering your knees, spend the next few evenings creating space—that between the floor and your hem.

If your hem is even, all you'll have to do is determine how much shorter you want your dress and mark it in one place. Then using a ruler, mark from the fold all the way around. Use chalk or pins (if they don't leave a hole in your fabric) to mark your new hemline.

If your hem is uneven, it will have to be marked again from the floor. So take the opportunity to turn an unpleasant task into an excellent excuse to have a "skirt raising" party complete with entertainment—invitations only to girls who wear them.

Then put the skirt on the ironing board, wrong side out. Turn up the hem on the indicated hemline and press using heavy brown paper between the hem and the skirt to avoid marking the outside of the garment. The hemline may be basted if you wish. When the depth of a turned-up hem is uneven, mark to an even length all around and trim off the excess.

If the skirt is gored or full, there are several methods of reducing the fullness. One of the easiest is the Stay-Stitch-Plus where the line of stitching is done on the sewing machine. Wherever there is excess fullness, press the index finger of the right hand firmly against the back of the presser foot as you continue sewing—this will make excess fabric pile up in gathers. The harder you press, the tighter the gathers. Be careful in handling the garment as the gathering can come out easily. Now all you have to do is secure the gathers—stitch seam tape along the gathered edges of the hem.

The characteristics of the material will determine the finish you should use on your hem. The Tailor's hem is an excellent inconspicuous hem for most heavy and medium-weight fabrics. Make a line of machine stitching through one thickness of fabric about 1/4" from the cut hem edge. Pink, scallop or overcast the edge and use inside hemming.

The Turned and Stitched hem is good for light and medium-weight fabrics, particularly on straight or A-line skirts. The raw edge is turned under 1/4" and machine stitched. Turn up the hem and finish with inside or flat hemming.

Use the Rolled hem for sheer garments of circular cut. To prevent such a garment from sagging later, allow it to hang for forty-eight hours before marking the hemline. Attach small weights to the bottom edge at true-bias points.

Don't let kick pleats be a problem. With skirts as short as they are, you don't need them, so just sew them up.

"After these eight weeks, I probably will be happy to retire again," joked Forsten, while he was checking over last-minute details with the outgoing principal.

Jordan said he had the opportunity to familiarize himself with his new position during the past several weeks. He has found that the job entails a considerable amount of detail work in attending to various reports from schools within the district, plus attending numerous meetings.

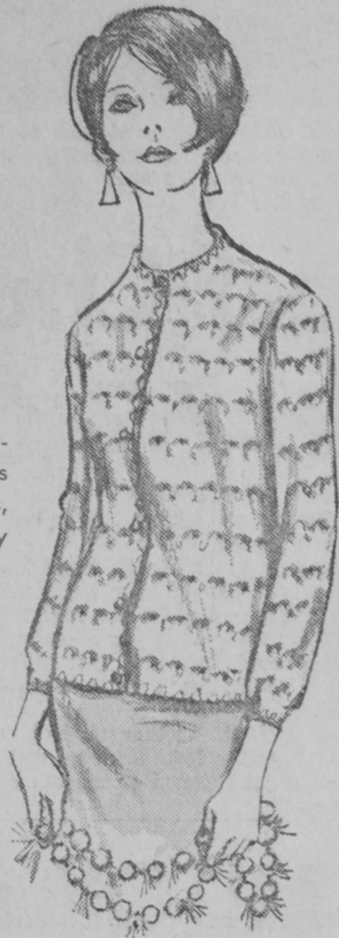

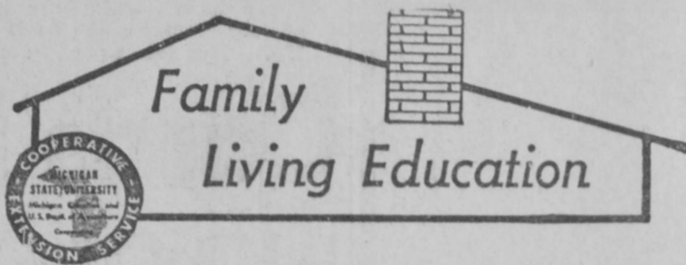

It is Official

Thanksgiving has come and gone and the Christmas season is upon us.

In addition to Christmas Day, Sheila Morley, consumers information agent, reminds us that December has 30 other days... 30 days that demand 30 breakfasts, 30 lunches and 30 dinners. Homemakers will have to employ all their shopping skills, and maybe learn a few tricks, to come safely and solvently through the month.

It is unusual in December for chicken, both fryers and the heavier roasters or stewing hens, to be offered at special prices. This will be the case again this December in some markets but comparison of food ads will be needed to locate the values. Heavy government purchases of poultry for school lunch programs have pushed poultry wholesale prices upward. However, many food stores will be featuring chicken at prices planned to offset consumer reluctance to buy chicken just ahead of another big turkey feast.

Shoppers who plan on a ham for Christmas dinner might start looking now for a favorite price. Hams keep well for up to two weeks in the refrigerator. Though it is not recommended to freeze smoked meats, it can be done if the holding period is no more than six weeks. So while you are doing your routine grocery shopping you run across a particularly attractive ham value, buy it now.

Perch and smelt from Lake Erie are coming to market now in good supply, offering possibilities for a good low cost main dish. Even though egg wholesale prices have crept up in recent weeks, two eggs still make an economical substitute for a serving of meat.

In addition to the usual squashes, cabbage, carrots and rutabagas, this is the peak season for broccoli and brussels sprouts. The growing season was ideal for broccoli.

Large supplies of Michigan grown hothouse mushrooms are expected for the holiday season.

"If you're a nut nut" There are lots of nuts in the stores this week—and lots more walnuts than any other kind. California walnut growers report a crop 14 percent larger than usual with large size nuts the rule. On the other hand, pecan growers are reporting a very small crop. Almonds, filberts and imported Brazil nuts are expected to be in

normal supply. A good general rule to follow: Two pounds of nuts in the shell will yield one pound of nutmeats. This means that when nutmeats cost twice as much as nuts in the shell, you will come out even.

Something About Fabrics

If you own a textured acetate knit outfit and it needs pressing between trips to the cleaners, Michigan State University clothing specialists offer these suggestions.

Remember to turn your garment inside out and press on the underside of the fabric. Do not tug, pull or manipulate while the fabric is damp with steam and avoid too much pressure. This can cause a shine or leave marks. If there is a wet spot on the garment, let it dry before you press it or you may dull the fabric.

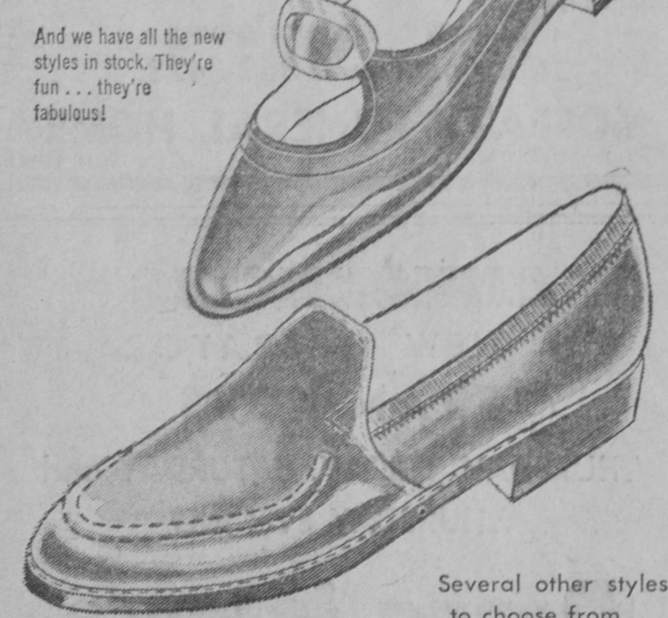

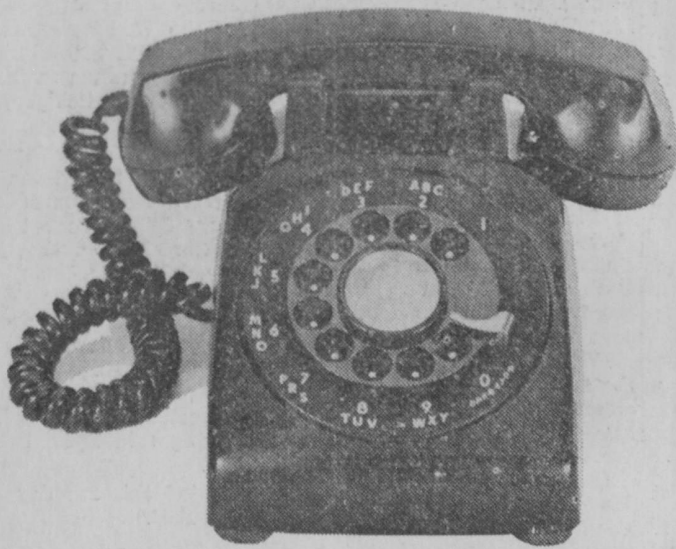
