## Supervisors Vote Return of Appointive Commissioners

Isosco Board of Supervisors reversed its action of several years ago by voting 10-7 to return to its former system of appointing county road commissioners.

The action would have no effect on the upcoming November 8 election, which lists one person, Robert LaVoy, Baldwin Township Republican, as a candidate to succeed himself.

Meeting Monday in the first day of its lengthy October session, individual supervisors expressed concern over an apparent "lack of harmony" on the road commission, stating they believed that the matter could best be settled by returning to the appointive system.

The matter was brought to a head on motion by Aubrey Belson, Burleigh Township supervisor. Following discussion, Supervisor Percy Jocks moved for a roll call vote with support of Supervisor Clement Stephan of Tawas City.

Voting in favor of the appointive system were Alton Abbott, Belson, George Blust, Edward Gerard, John Hoshbach, Jocks, Richter Lixey, Earl McElheron, Charles Smith and Stephan. Voting no were James Campbell, Clarence Everett, L. S. Little, Richard Moss, Walter Kasischke, Henry Oates and George Webb.

Friction between townships and the road commission was readily apparent by the above roll call. Blust, mayor of Whittemore, later told the Herald that townships have a problem and thought cities should back them.

Smith of Oscoda and Jocks of AuSable expressed concern that the road commission had not fulfilled promised road construction, despite the fact that cost of the construction was on a 50-50 participation basis.

Smith said that his township had been committed to road improvements and, when work was not started, residents complained to him. He said the supervisor always "gets it in the neck when someone

complaints about a hole in the road," but work had been promised by the road commission and not fulfilled.

Appointive versus elective selection of road commissioners has been a hot issue in past sessions of the board of supervisors. In recent history, commissioners were elected by the people until 1950. In 1948, the state legislature adopted a law whereby a board of supervisors could either appoint road commissioners or allow the people to elect them.

## Supervisors Start Reapportionment; Due Next Spring

Initial work on reapportioning membership of the Isosco Board of Supervisors, according to guidelines established by a 1966 state law under the one-man, one-vote principal, is now under way.

L. S. Little, board chairman, said Tuesday morning that supervisors of the various counties in Michigan would have until next spring to comply with the new law. A six-man committee is now splitting the county into districts. When work is completed, the board will have nine members or possibly 11, instead of the present 19 supervisors.

The local board seeks a ruling from the state on a population count at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The committee was unable to determine if the actual number of base personnel should be used. It is said to be around 12,000, or if registered voters should be the determining factor for a base count.

While 1960 census figures are being used in reapportioning the rest of the county, a special census may be required to redistrict Oscoda Township and East Tawas' Third Ward. The latter may be included in one district with Baldwin Township.

## John R. Watkins Dies at Ann Arbor; Former United States District Attorney

Memorial service for John R. Watkins, 74, who died October 7 at University Hospital, Ann Arbor, were held Sunday at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas.

The Rev. Robert Morrison officiated. The body was cremated.

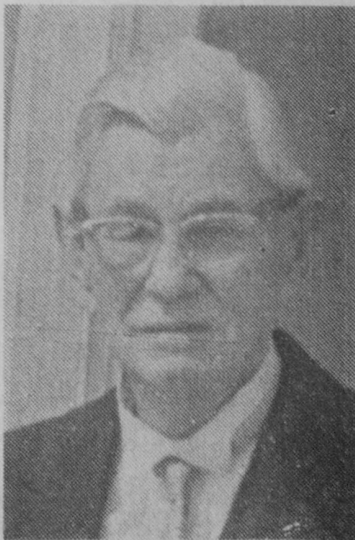
Born in Pueblo, Colorado, and raised in Bay City, Watkins graduated from the University of Michigan in 1915 and received his law degree two years later.

He served as United States district attorney at Detroit from 1928 to 1930, handling several controversial prohibition and bribery cases. He also served twice as assistant corporation counsel for Detroit during the period 1920-1925.

A former resident of Grosse Pointe, Watkins and the late Richard Newman came to East Tawas in 1951 to establish their law practices.

While in semiretirement in recent years, Mr. Watkins had served as counsel for National Gypsum Company during long litigation concerning the firm's lake loading installation south of Tawas City, while conducting his general law practice.

He was active in Republican politics, in the Episcopal Church and

## School Board Adopts Budget of \$711,895

A budget of \$711,895, showing deficit spending of \$28,880 over anticipated revenue, was adopted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education for 1966-1967.

Grand total of expenses for the year will be \$77,015 higher than in 1965-1966. Anticipated revenue during the 1966-1967 year is \$683,015, or \$45,213 higher than the previous year.

The deficit between expenses and revenue is to be made up from operating funds on hand, indicating that the school district is still in sound financial condition.

Total instructional expenses of \$505,887 shows an increase of \$77,651 over the previous year. This total reflected an increase of \$10,250 for elementary expense, which will amount to \$228,227, and an increase of \$60,320 for secondary expense, which is budgeted \$270,578 for 1966-1967.

Increases in instructional expense were noted in teachers' salaries, \$73,280, a hike of \$6,403 in elementary and \$66,877 in secondary; salaries of principals, \$10,850 for elementary, up \$1,600, and \$10,850 for secondary, up \$1,100; increases to guidance personnel, \$12,581 as compared to \$9,568.

Administrative expense showed an increase of \$2,988. This included a \$1,600 increase for the superintendent, now at \$13,650 in the new budget; increase in legal services.

Transportation costs showed an

increase of \$5,493 over the previous year, reflecting increased salaries to bus drivers and equipment replacement.

Operating of plant, set at \$71,990 under the new budget, is up \$4,773 over the previous year; maintenance is up \$4,493 over the previous year. Major change in this was in equipment replacement, bringing total maintenance to \$33,560 in 1966-1967.

Fixed charges are down, \$5,250 as compared to \$8,057 the previous year; capital outlay is down, \$4,000 as compared to \$16,486 the previous year.

Revenues include \$333,082 in state aid, up \$21,191 over the previous year; property taxes of \$285,820, up \$34,432 over the previous year.

A hearing was held for public inspection of the budget. There were no visitors present.

## US-23 Businesses Hit by Wave of Burglaries

Police agencies from Oscoda south to AuGres are investigating a series of business place burglaries which took place last Thursday and Friday.

One of the first break-ins reported Friday was at Ace Hardware, Oscoda. Discovered at 5:10 a. m. by an employee, Oscoda Township Police Chief Robert Foster called in Michigan State Police to aid in the investigation.

A few hours later, state police were assisting city police at Tawas City and East Tawas in investigating burglaries and the next day investigated an AuGres burglary with the Arenac County Sheriff's Department.

At Oscoda, the burglars made off with 12 guns from the hardware. The guns were found later under some pipe piled near the store.

LaVoy Jeep Sales, 1890 East US-23, East Tawas, was entered through a rear window. Vending machines were forced open and about \$5 in change was removed. Also stolen was a quantity of cigarettes and tools.

While investigating a break-in at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office, Tawas City Police Chief George Westcott and state police were notified of a burglary at Barber's Sinclair Service, located at

the intersection of M-55 and US-23. An East Tawas resident, whose vehicle had run out of gas, had walked to the station, found the front door open and no attendant on hand. The front door had been forced open, \$41 in cash was missing and vending machines had been entered.

Search for money had apparently been the object of the burglars in breaking into the chamber of commerce office. Record folders taken from file cabinets were strewn about the building, but bank deposits are made regularly and no money is kept in the building.

Burglary of King's Blue Dot Laundry, Tawas City, was discovered early Saturday morning by a customer. About \$35 was taken from vending machines. In their haste to make an exit, the burglars dropped about \$2 in change on the floor. One washing machine was damaged as an unsuccessful attempt was made to pry open a coin box.

Also investigated Saturday morning was a burglary at Dittenbur Sales, AuGres. A rear door was forced open and burglars broke in to several vending machines. Also stolen was a quantity of auto accessories.

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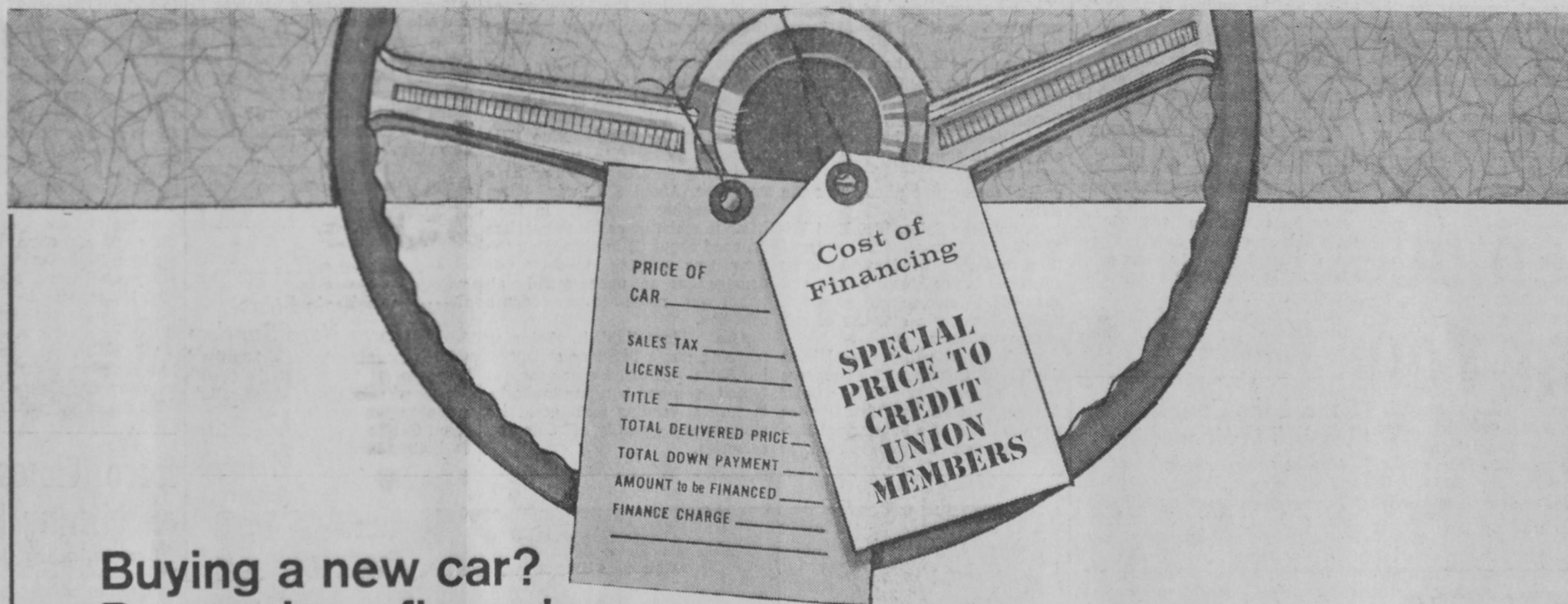

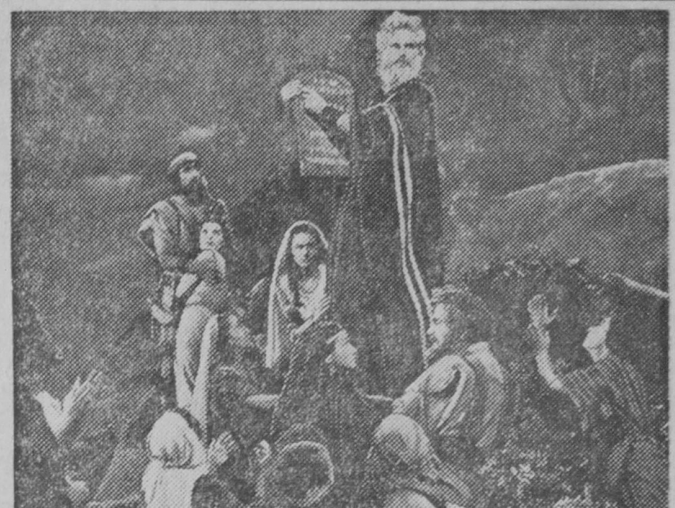

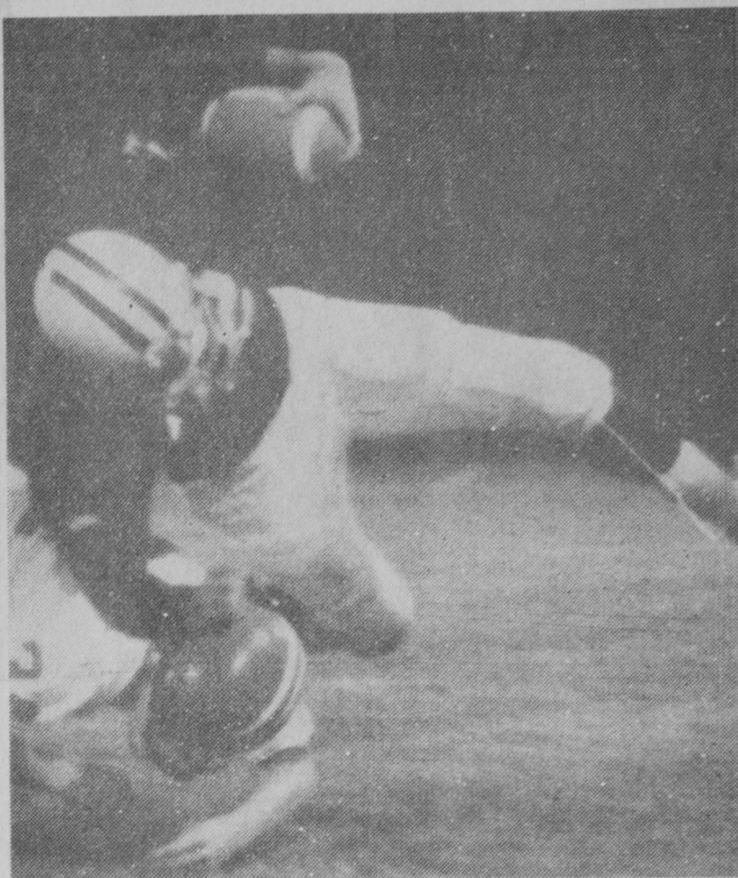
## Hale Eagles Lost, 6-0, to Atlanta Friday

Hale Area Eagles lost to Atlanta, 6-0, in North Star League play Friday on the winners' home field. Atlanta scored on a 20-yard pass play in the third period after the two teams had battled to a scoreless tie in the first half. Hale threatened to score in the second period when the Eagles drove to the nine-yard line and had a first down and goal to go. On the first play from scrimmage, a pass from Jim Smith went wide of the mark. The next two running plays were not successful. Coach Vern Reed called on Mark Brindley to try his toe at a field goal. The boot was wide of the mark. The two teams spent most of the afternoon battling between the 20-yard lines. Atlanta threatened in the second period when it reached the five-yard line but the Hale defense stopped the attack. The Eagles play at home Friday afternoon, hosting Hillman, in second place with a three and one record. Posen leads the league with two wins and one tie.

# Braves Lose Heartbreaker to NBC Leading Pinconning

If there ever was a loser that deserved to win it was the Tawas Area Braves last Friday night. The Braves dropped a heartbreaker to Pinconning's Spartans, 7-6. After losing its first three games on the road, the Braves played before a near-record crowd here and showed a complete reversal of form. Should the Braves retain the hard tackling which they showed against a highly touted Pinny offense, it could prove to be the turning point in their football fortunes and go hard against opponents over the rest of the schedule. Erase about four minutes in the late stages of the game and the Braves would have been a winner. Leading 6-0 and about eight minutes away from victory, a high snap from center on an attempted punt gave the Spartans the only break needed to protect their undefeated record. Tawas' defensive team, headed by hard-hitting Dennis Harten, stopped Pinconning cold. The Spartans, running only 35 plays during the night, had 80 yards rushing. Especially galling for the visitors was that big Ed Foco, being pushed for all-state honors, was stopped with a scant 44 yards. The Braves' offense showed good form in racking up 216 yards. Directed by Dale Frank and Gene Kushion, who alternated at quarterback, the Braves ground out one TD in the third quarter and penetrated into scoring position on two other occasions. They controlled the ball for 67 plays. Ray Powers was again the big gun in Tawas running attack. In 27 carries during the night, he powered his way to 122 yards and was stopped for a loss on only one try. With 10 minutes, 36 seconds left in the fourth quarter, Tawas took over a punt on the Pinconning 47. Powers and Harten each carried the ball five times and Tawas rolled to the three-yard line. From there, Kushion scored on a quarterback sneak to put Tawas into the lead. Powers was stopped just short of the goal on the all-important point after touchdown. This series climaxed three quarters of good defensive play by both teams. Tawas missed a great scoring opportunity in the first quarter when the Braves moved down to the Pinny one-yard line, only to be moved back to the 19 when a major penalty was stepped off. Pinconning had the ball for only six plays in the third quarter as Tawas knocked on the scoring door from 18 yards out and again at the seven, only to have the drive stopped. Two great punts of 55 and 50 yards by Ralph Meehleder kept the Braves out of trouble in the second quarter. A third punt of 25 yards saw Tawas receiving a good break as it retained possession on a roughing penalty. That last punt came shortly after a Pinconning boot rolled dead on the Tawas seven. The Braves

moved out to the nine and then had to rely on Meehleder's toe. 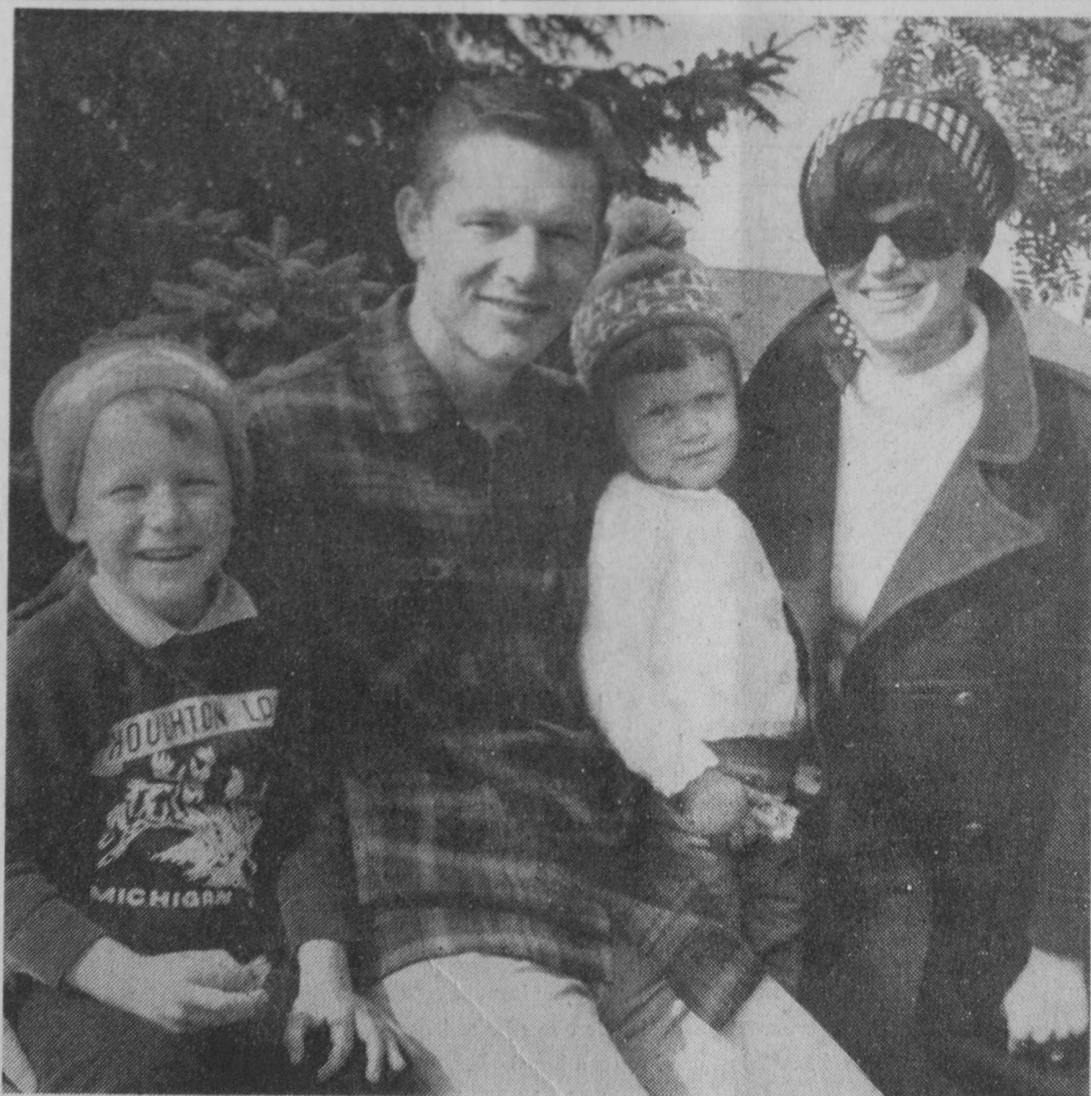

**Area Schools Hire CMU for Survey**

A comprehensive survey aimed at determining possible advantages of reorganizing 12-grade school district boundary lines in Iosco and Arenac and launched last Tuesday night following a meeting of representatives of six school districts.

Cooperating in the study will be Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott Area and Hale Area, all of Iosco County, along with Standish-Sterling, Arenac Eastern and AuGres-Sims of Arenac County.

Supt. Ray Kesler of Whittemore-Prescott was named committee chairman and was directed to request Central Michigan University to establish initial plans for the study.

In the talking stage for nearly a year, although there had been a lapse in discussions for the past several months, a meeting had been held last December to study a combined reorganization.

Two weeks ago, Supt. William Tracy and the Iosco Intermediate Board of Education contacted all schools involved and requested that a meeting be held to determine if the schools were still interested in such a study.

Reorganization plans of both Iosco and Arenac schools, which had recommended that no changes in district boundaries be made at the present, had been approved by the state. Each plan had recommended, however, that a study be made by the various schools toward possible reorganization.

The six districts have hired Central Michigan University to conduct the survey with assistance of a 13-member executive committee from area schools. The committee includes all six superintendents, representatives from each board of education and boards of education

of the two intermediate districts. Total cost of the project will be approximately \$7,500, assessed to the six schools on the basis of \$1.25 per student according to 1966-1967 enrollment.

Named to executive committee were Dr. Rolland Humerickhouse, Arenac Eastern; Norman Morgan, AuGres-Sims; Harvey Rasch, Hale Area; Clyde Soper, Tawas Area; Ronald Allen, Standish-Sterling; Emil Sztanyo, Whittemore-Prescott Area; Walter Niles, Iosco Intermediate, plus the six superintendents.

Following the meeting, Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area said he felt the survey would be well worth the money through gaining an insight as to possible ways to improve the educational program for children through maximum use of existing facilities.

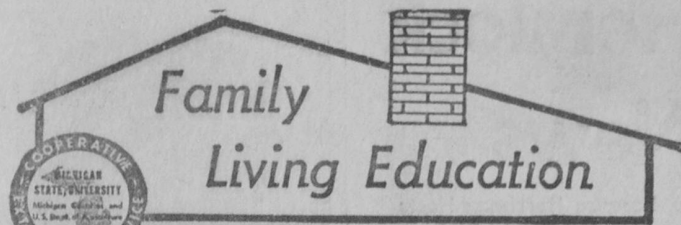

### Food Poison Prevention, Not Method!

### Buying Bed Pillows

A friend called the other day that she had seen a special sale on bed pillows and wondered what she should look for. She especially wondered about differences in Dacron and feather pillows.

Other fillings popular in today's pillows are Kodel, Fortrel, Acrilan, foam rubber and urethane foam.

It is difficult to choose a pillow on one factor alone. Personal preferences and needs differ on many qualities to consider: Resiliency, softness or firmness, weight, compressibility, filling type, the ticking, the size, construction and care required are each important in selection.

The synthetic fillings (Dacron, Kodel, Fortrel, Acrilan) are usually firmer, but still most like feather pillows in weight and resiliency. They do not pose allergy problems as feathers do for many people. A crimped fiber may have greater resiliency or ability to come back to shape. In general, the polyesters have better resilience than the acrylic fibers.

Down is combined with feathers for economic reasons as well as increased firmness. Chicken feathers are the least desirable of feathers.

A complete block of foam rubber is a more comfortable and durable filling than shredded or cemented foam. It is softer than urethane foam, though urethane is easier to clean and not as affected by dry

cleaning solvents. We sometimes find a slab of foam inserted in the center of a feather or synthetic filled pillow. Grasp one corner and shake it. If the filling is inadequate, there will be an inch or more of space at the corner you hold. Balance it over your forearm. Does it retain its shape over your arm or do the ends droop down indicating a poor quality filling? Work and press it with your hands to feel any lumps or bunching in it.
