

Speech Therapist Joins Intermediate Dist. Staff

Hiring of a full-time speech therapist for Isosco schools as part of a program being financed by a successful millage vote two months ago, was announced this week by William Tracy, intermediate school superintendent.

Jess Hollaway, 27, formerly of the Oscoda Area School District, started September 8 as itinerant speech therapist working out of the intermediate school district office at East Tawas.

Following a three-week program of testing all elementary school pupils in the county, Hollaway will be working with between 75 and 100 youngsters having speech problems, along with mentally handicapped children.

It is estimated that 3 1/2 to five percent of all school children need special help with their speech because it is so different or uneven that communication is faulty or inefficient.

Hollaway said that speech difficulties include omissions or substitutions of sound, noticeable and repeated speech interruptions, malformations of structure of speech organs, meaningless jargon or no speech at all and impaired hearing.

The new therapist said that 90 percent of speech problems encountered were not of an organic nature, but were caused mainly by faulty habits and could be corrected.

Public and parochial school children with speech defects, whose parents desire participation in this program, will attend twice a week sessions with Hollaway. The consultations last one half hour. Parents are to be notified of instructional opportunities through a letter brought home by the child.

It is anticipated that more than 100 children of Isosco County may be involved in the program and there is a possibility that instruction could be made available during the summer months.

Funding of this program is a joint local and state effort. A maximum of \$6,900 is paid by the state with the balance coming from the millage approved by voters.

The intermediate school superintendent said that one-half mill of the three-quarter mill program would be put to use this year and it is hoped that additional staffing may be made next year.

A native of Washington, Indiana,

Hollaway attended high school there, spent three years in military service and then received his bachelor of science degree in 1964 at Indiana State University. He received his master of education degree from the University of Illinois in 1965.

TA School Adopts Motorbike Rules

Concerned about the safety of young motorbike riders, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night adopted two provisions of a bill passed by the state legislature which would not have become effective until next spring.

By unanimous action of board members establishing a new policy, the school will require that crash helmets be worn by motorbike riders and that only one person will be allowed to ride such a vehicle at one time.

While admitting that board of education policy would have effect only on school property, members expressed the hope that parents would realize the need for these safety measures and enforce provisions of the impending state law at home.

It was reported that between 40 and 50 youngsters are now riding motorbikes to school. Before entering school property, the driver will be required to wear a helmet.

While the new act specifically requires that only one person shall ride a motorbike at one time, a law presently on the books has been interpreted in some areas of the state to have the same meaning.

Iosco School Enrollment Shows Slight Decrease

A total of 7,273 students are enrolled in four public school districts and four parochial schools of Isosco County at the end of the first week of the fall term, according to reports Monday from school administrators.

The total shows a slight decrease from last year, although an increase in one district has classrooms bulging.

Tawas Area School's enrollment is approximately the same as it was at the end of the first week of school last year, but it is down from the fourth Friday count.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that total enrollment was 1,705 students. This included 830 in grades kindergarten through six, 306 in junior high and 569 in the high school.

An enrollment increase of 25 students is reported at Hale Area School by Supt. Paul Southerland. Facilities are at full capacity with 284 pupils in grades kindergarten through six, 82 in junior high and 148 students in high school. The district still seeks a home economics teacher and a band instructor.

Enrollment at Whittemore-Prescott School is down slightly from last year's count, according to Supt. Ray Kesler. Total enrollment last Friday was 869, as compared to 892 a year ago. This included

472 children in the elementary grades, 141 in junior high and 256 in the high school. The school lacks one teacher.

Oscoda Area School, which has slightly more than half of the total number of students enrolled in this county, is down 22 pupils from last year. Elementary grades total 2,700 pupils, there are 506 in junior high school and 672 in the high school.

Parochial schools of the Tawas area gave the following enrollment reports:

Immaculate Heart of Mary School has 108 students and according to Sister Christine, administrator, this is 20 more than last year; St. Joseph's School has an enrollment of 90 this year in grades one, three and five, compared to 108 last year in grades three, five and seven. Sister Rita is the administrator.

Emanuel Lutheran School has 64 students in grades one through eight, down five from last year. The school added five new families to its register. New teachers are Prin. Gary Rasmussen, Miss Mary Perkins, grades four, five and six; Miss Linda Oelkers, grades one, two and three.

Darwin Dubke, principal at Zion Lutheran School, reports an enrollment of 45 in grades one through six. This is five less than last year.

Board Seeks Best Plan to Fit Tax \$\$

Second discussion with architects on how to get the most value out of each tax dollar spent in constructing a new vocational training building was held Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Irvin Hacker, representing a Bay City architectural firm which designed recent school additions here, reported that cost of the masonry and steel building would be approximately \$11 per square foot.

Voters of the district approved a special levy of two mills for two years. This, plus transfer of up to five percent of state aid money, would provide \$91,000 for the first year.

An additional \$37,000 would be made available in 1968. This money would be used to equip the building and renovate the old shop department into classrooms. Cost of the latter would be between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

Studying the first preliminary plan drawn by architects, board members expressed concern that actual work area provided was too small. Several ideas brought out at the meeting are to be studied by the architects in an effort to expand the structure, which is to provide a shop, art room, storage area and restrooms.

Hacker expressed his personal opinion that less emphasis should be placed on woodworking and more be given to area of mechanical training and electronics.

A special board meeting is to be held in about two weeks to inspect preliminary plans which incorporate latest thinking brought out at the meeting.

In other business, the board approved a 10-cent-an-hour pay increase for cooks and helpers.

West German Cyclist Master of Tawas Meet

Nosing out a field of 25 contestants in the most exciting week-end of bicycle racing here, Siegfried Koch, 31, Augsburg, West Germany, won first place trophy for his over-all performance in racing events sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Koch finished fourth in Sunday's Tour of Lumbermen's Monument Race, but had piled up enough points in sprint races Saturday to take the top over-all award.

Stephen Savageau, Grand Rapids, was the first racer across the finish line in an exciting conclusion to week-end racing. Nearly the entire field of contestants zoomed down to the finish line in one compact group after the 62-mile road event.

Other first place winners were Helen Morrison, 19, Royal Oak, and Don Vanlaeke, 16, Detroit, who were sprint champions in women's and junior divisions.

Following Savageau in two-three order were Neil King, Mt. Morris, and David Blase, Speedway, Indiana. The race from East Tawas to Oscoda and back was completed in two hours, 46 minutes and six seconds.

Finishing behind Koch with his over-all time of four hours, 57 minutes and 18 seconds for all events, were Blase, second place, four hours, 58 minutes, four seconds; Paul Gaek, Dearborn, four hours, 58 minutes, 32 seconds.

Trophies were presented to winners at a banquet held Sunday evening at Tawas Golf and Country Club.

While the event had fewer contestants this year due to the Canadian national races at Montreal, the field included some of the top riders of the United States. A total of 40 riders participated in all divisions.

Mr. Ramsey:

This is to inform you that the Isco County Board of Supervisors wishes to file this letter of intent stating plans to complete a taxiway and runway at the Isco County Airport. We are doing this in hopes that we will be able to get both federal and state participating funds to complete these improvements. The plans for these proposed improvements are on file and we wish to follow as closely as possible those blueprints drawn up by the architect.

Inasmuch that 49,706 observations recorded at Oscoda indicate prevailing winds to be 89.61 percent out of the east and west and 89.53 percent out of the north-south direction. We have found through the experience, particularly of the same 60 local, private and student pilots using this field that the second 2,400 foot runway is needed.

The plans also include a part of the necessary taxiway system to serve the north-south runway.

If you will outline the necessary procedure to initiate our proposed plans, we will appreciate it.

September Means

With the beginning of September, the big yellow school buses roll down the roads and streets with all kinds of faces looking out, happy ones, tired ones, frightened ones, worried ones.

Along with school starting, community clubs start regular meetings, the air gets crisp and patches of color show up on some of the maples.

It becomes a month of order and regularity with summer visitors gone and swimming suits beginning to dry out.

What an excellent month to get into a good habit of serving the family a really nutritious breakfast. Make it one of the most important meals of the day with the family eating together, if at all possible, to help that school child feel more prepared for a good day. A good breakfast gives him actual energy to do a really good job or being an alert student. Research shows that a child who eats breakfast comprehends better and get along with classmates easier.

Make September better breakfast month at your house.

Washing Permanent Press

With all those new school clothes in closets and dressers drawers, some of them are bound to be permanent press.

Read the label carefully for your instructions on washing and drying. Usually this is best done on the wash and wear cycle. After washing, most of these garments should be tumble dried for best results. We must remember, how

ever, to remove the garment and hang on hangers immediately after the dryer shuts off. If not, they settle into a lump and wrinkles form in the pliable fabric. If this happens, one can sometimes run the load through the dryer again. Ironing may be required to remove these wrinkles. If not using a dryer, it would be best to remove the garment from the washer before the final spin.

'Low Calorie' Foods and Costs

Smart shoppers make cost and calorie comparison on those low calorie foods before they buy. The label is a good guide to the contents of the food. For example, a serving of dietetic cranberry juice cocktail has 12 calories compared with 80 in the regular product.

On the other hand, a one-half cup serving of artificially sweetened ice cream has 124 calories and the same size serving of regular ice cream has 149 calories. The calorie difference is so small that a slight variation in the portion size could easily eliminate the difference.

When it comes to cost, some low calorie foods, as dietetic cranberry nice cocktail and canned tuna fish packed in water, offer a saving in calories at no additional cost. The artificially sweetened ice cream, however, costs twice as much as regular form and offers only a small saving in calories.

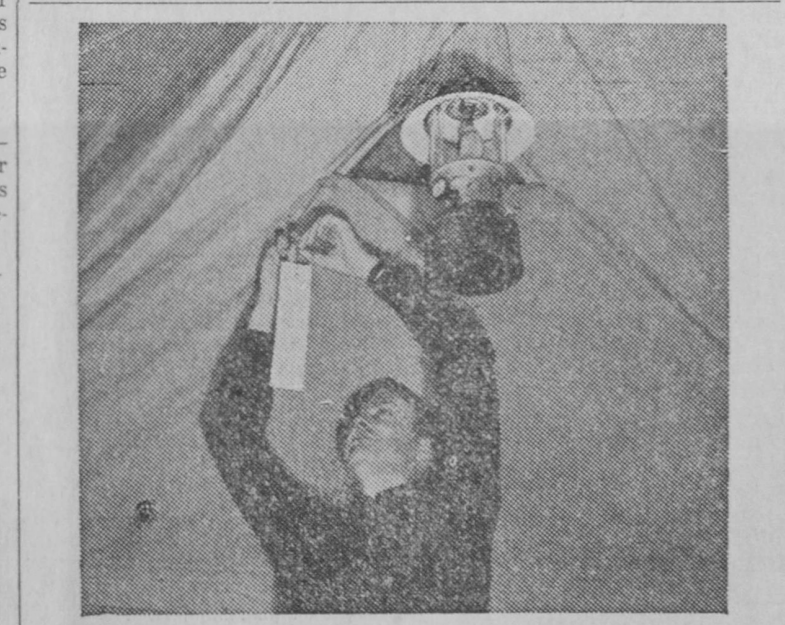

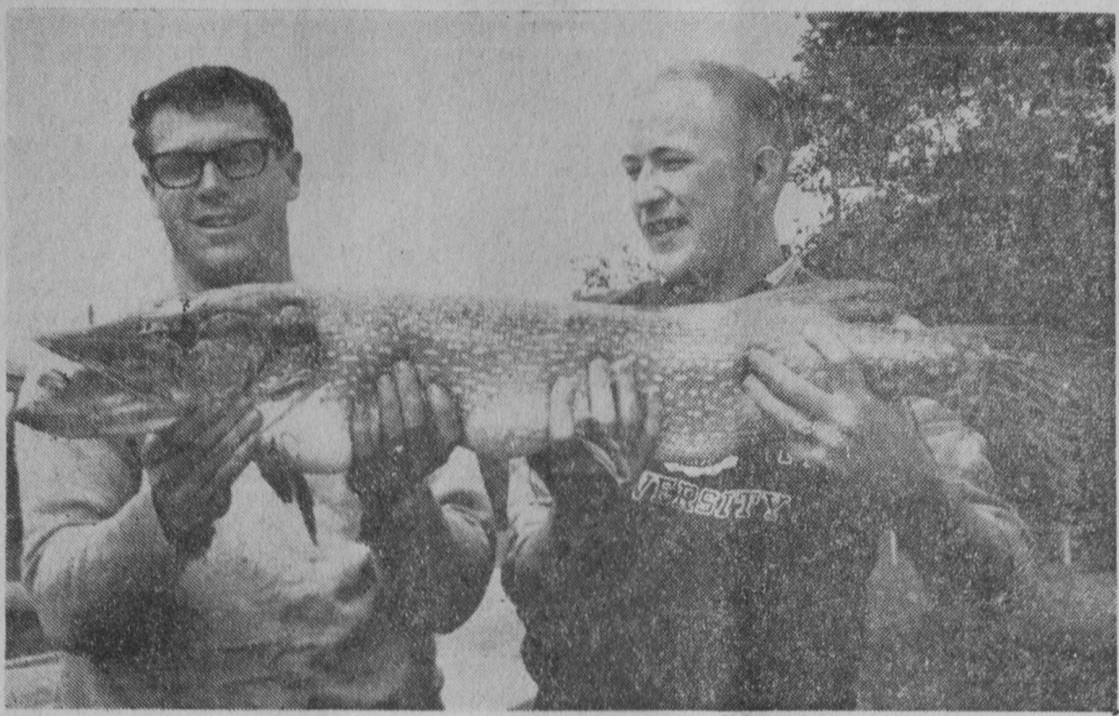

16 Isoco Herds Under DHIA Test

According to the Isoco DHIA report for August, submitted by Duane Reinke, supervisor, there are 16 dairy herds in Isoco County on the dairy testing program. Three of them use the official testing program that provides more detailed information than the owner-sampler program. In the owner-sampler program, the farmer collects his own samples. In the official DHIA program, the dairy tester is paid an additional fee for collecting the samples.

In the official DHIA program, the farmer also receives a feed cost figure that tells him how much it costs to produce 100 pounds of milk.

Results tabulated for the three officially tested herds shows Harvey O'Dell's herd, 91 percent participating with an output of 1,023 pounds milk and 33 pounds butterfat; George and Robert Waters' herd, 90 percent, 1,074 pounds milk, 31 pounds butterfat; Waldo Curry, 85 percent, 1,360 pounds milk, 46 pounds butterfat.

Farmer sampled herds were recorded as follows: Nelson Ostrander, 100 percent, 1,351 pounds milk, 43 pounds butterfat; Hope Creek Ranch, 100 percent, 1,305 pounds milk, 43 pounds butterfat; Eugene Kaiser, 100 percent, 1,348 pounds milk, 51 pounds butterfat; L. and L. Robinson, 97 percent, 1,566 pounds milk, 49 pounds butterfat; Siegrist Brothers, 90 percent, 992 pounds milk, 38 pounds butterfat; Charles Timreck III, 89 percent, 1,112 pounds milk, 37 pounds butterfat; Charles Sullivan, 86 percent, 1,147 pounds milk, 38 pounds butterfat; Herman Drengberg, 84 percent, 1,262 pounds milk, 38 pounds butterfat; James Dobson, 83 percent, 1,225 pounds milk, 39 pounds butterfat; Carl A. Lange, 82 percent, 842 pounds milk, 32 pounds butterfat; Tom Nelkie, 79 percent, 1,039 pounds milk, 35 pounds butterfat; Donance Bellville, 75 percent, 892 pounds milk, 30 pounds butterfat; Elwood Ruckle, 68 percent, 826 pounds milk, 29 pounds butterfat.
