Following a three-week program of testing all elementary school pupils in the county, Hollaway will be working with between 75 and 100 youngsters having speech problems, along with mentally handicapped children.

It is estimated that 31/2 to five percent of all school children need special help with their speech because it is so different or uneven that communication is faulty or in-

Hollaway said that speech difficulties include omissions or substitutions of sound, noticeable and repeated speech interruptions, malformations of structure of speech organs, meaningless jargon or no speech at all and impaired hearing.
