## Finish Extensive Street Program

Extensive street construction work has been completed at East Tawas during the past summer, according to a report from Paul Roper, superintendent of public works.

Roper told the city council Monday night that 1.9 miles of plant mix blacktop had been used on city streets at a cost of \$17,790.

Latest construction was on Bridge Street between East State and the Tawas River bridge. This connects with work by the county road commission on Nunn Road west to M-55.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized purchase of concrete drainage pipe for 550 feet of drain construction along Bridge Street, \$1,038; 120 feet of pipe for a drain at Tawas Lake and 130 feet of pipe for the city stockpile.

Sealed bids are to be accepted September 30 on heating proposals for the municipal equipment garage, located in the old Anderson Coach Company warehouse.

The council's insurance committee was directed to study the estimated cost of a retirement program for city employees. Working with local insurance agencies, along with studying a cooperative program from the Michigan Municipal League, will be Richard Moss, Earl McElhannon and Charles Schreck, committee members.

## Schools Renew Talks on Vocational Training

Progress on a comprehensive study to implement vocational training on an area-wide basis will be discussed at a meeting of school superintendents September 30 at Standish.

A survey of business, industry and students establishing the need for a vocational education center

or centers in the three-county area has been completed and information compiled will be presented to administrators and state officials.

William Tracy, Isosco Intermediate school superintendent, attended a meeting last Wednesday at Delta College. Taking part in the discussion was Leon Alger, assistant state superintendent for vocational education.

Tracy said that the state official believed that some specific recommendation should be made to the area citizens' advisory committee in order that preliminary work may be completed. This committee held two meetings last spring at Standish and was responsible for conducting the original survey establishing a need.

## Intermediate Supt. Calls Reorganization Talk by Area Schools

Further discussion on possible reorganization of Isosco-Arenac school districts will again be taken under consideration at a meeting called for Tuesday, October 4.

Possible consolidation of three Isosco school districts and four Arenac districts has been discussed earlier this year, but further meetings were dropped following reports of intermediate school district study committees.

Both the Isosco Intermediate School District and Bay-Arenac District recommended to the state that no change be made at the present time in the organization of area schools. However, each committee recommended that reorganization should be explored by representatives of the various districts.

A meeting was held at Whittemore-PreScott Area High School in March to determine if the schools wished to hire an independent study of the proposal.

"No action was ever taken on this matter and the schools should now decide if a study should be made or the matter dropped," said William Tracy, intermediate school superintendent.

## Paul Bunyan Scouts to Don Uniforms

With the fall roundup of scouts well under way, the call to "Follow the Rugged Road to Adventure" gets added stimulus Friday, September 23, when cub scouts, boy scouts and explorers all over the Paul Bunyan Council will wear their uniforms to school. Many will show the hard wear of summer camp, others will be spanking new, but all will be worn with the pride of being part of the world's largest boy movement, according to A. T. Maasberg, president of the Paul Bunyan Council.

School superintendents and principals have been alerted to recognition of the day and in many classrooms there will be special recognition by calling on boys to tell of their adventures this past summer or describe some of the activities of the patrol or den.

Scouts in the Counties of Crawford, Rosecommon, Ogemaw and Isosco will be going directly from school Friday to attend the weekend Northland-Jarvis Camporee at Twin Lakes south of St. Helen. The Pines District, which includes Arenac, Gladwin and Northern Midland Counties, will hold its camporee at the Gladwin Conservation Club north of Gladwin.

One of the big problems facing any vocational training program, whether located in a center or on wheels, would be financing. Tracy said that no money for such training was presently available from state or federal sources and financing would have to come entirely from participating schools.

"The intermediate school district is interested in this recent emphasis on vocational training because of the possible duplication of expensive facilities and equipment by individual schools," said Tracy. "We should coordinate our plans with neighboring districts in order to make best use of tax dollars."

## Tawas City's Bid for Urban Renewal Passes Initial Step

First phase in Tawas City's application for an urban renewal grant has been completed, according to a letter read at Monday night's council meeting from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The city has received an exemption from normal requirements that urban renewal be for an area predominantly residential or an area to be redeveloped for residential reuse.

Also, that authority was given to permit a public agency or nonprofit corporation to purchase land from the city for industrial or commercial reuse.

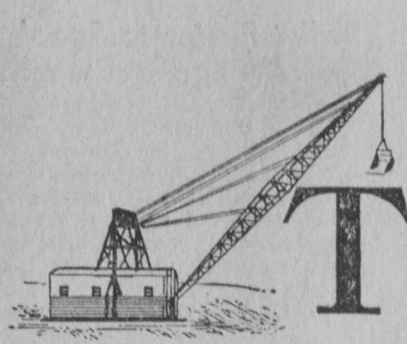
Under consideration by the city planning commission is an urban renewal project for the business district.

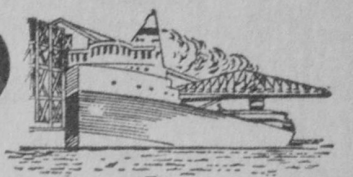

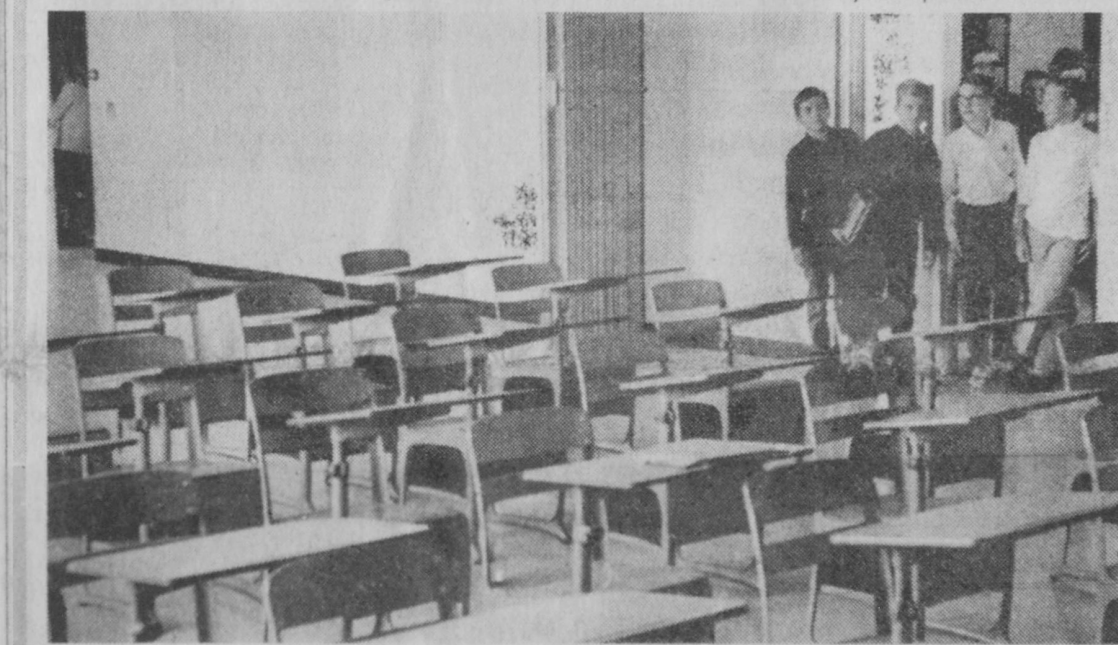

## Council Airs Complaints on US-23 Construction

Several complaints concerning reconstruction of US-23 through Tawas City are to be registered with the state highway department.

City councilmen listed such complaints as lack of sealcoating on shoulders south of the river bridge as originally planned, improper angle of several street drains, a projecting curb near Rainbow Service, poor seeding along Bay Drive.

Fault has been found with engineering of the section of Bay Drive which has been closed to traffic and now served by individual drives.

In other matters to come before the council Monday night, authorization was given to install signs on Whittemore Street prohibiting angle parking. Parallel parking, which would result in the loss of one parking space, is to be en-

forced on both sides of the street. Following a review by the street committee, a letter has been sent to the Detroit and Mackinac Railway asking that crossings be improved at intersections with several streets.

Alderman R. A. Rollin Sr. reported that a third meeting is to be held October 14 for discussion on a proposed area sanitary authority.

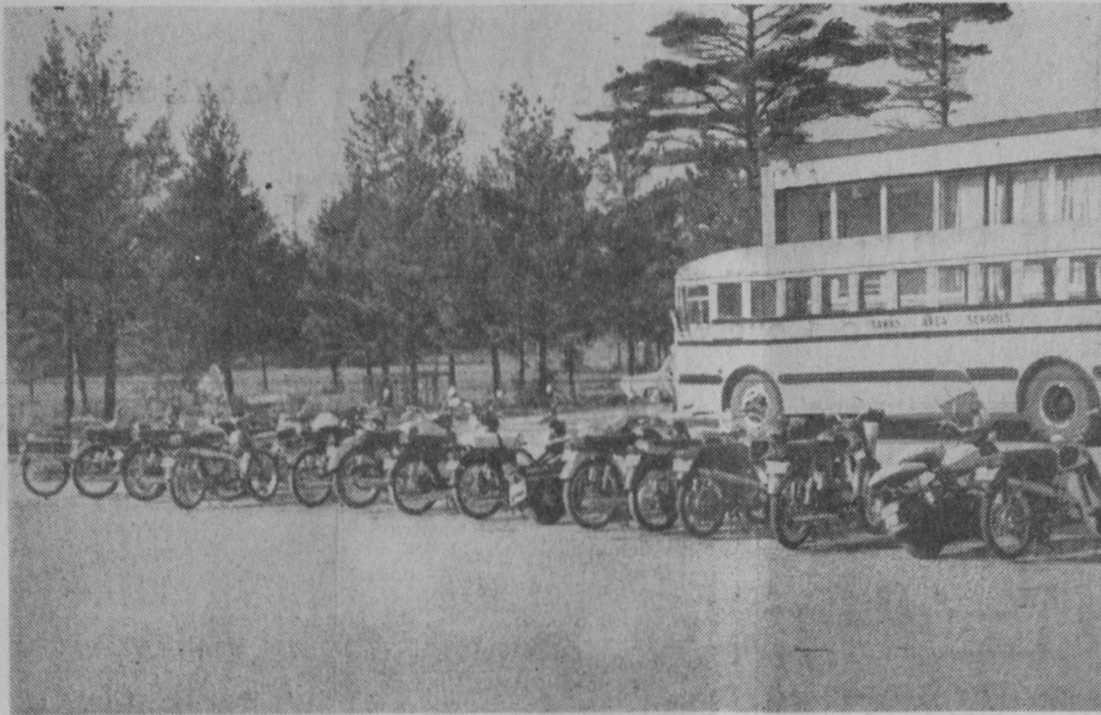

### Food For Thought

"A good year for truck crops"—that is an expression you are likely to hear to describe the harvest of late summer vegetables.

Truck crops has long been an American synonym for vegetables. Yet, and this may surprise you, the phrase has nothing to do with trucks or how vegetables are transported to market. The same is true for truck gardens. The fact is, both were widely used in the days of horse drawn carts and wagons.

History reveals that our word, truck, as used in the vegetable world has derived from the French word, troquer, which long ago had as one of its meanings, to barter or exchange. Early settlers in this land, lacking cash, needed something they could use to barter or exchange for necessities they could not grow, raise or make.

For some, the soil was the best answer. Small gardens were planted and lovingly tended, for the harvest was to provide not only their needs, but oftentimes dreams as well. As soon as the crops were harvested, they were carted into farmers' markets where the bartering and exchanging took place. Perhaps, these vegetables should have been called dream crops but generally the reference was barter and exchange crops or troquer crops. And, in true American style, the French spelling was revamped and the phrase emerged as we know it today, truck crops.

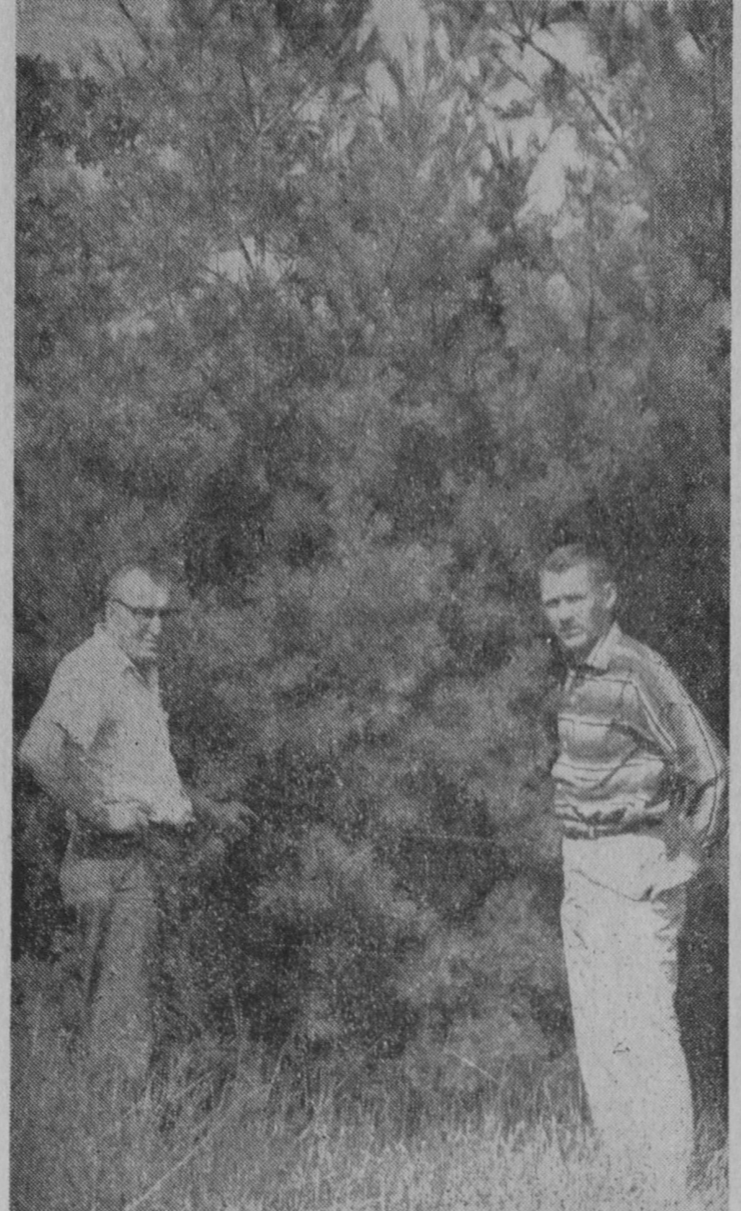
### Home Economist Sets Food Handling Sessions

## Woodlot Management Studied at Daugharty's

How should I manage my farm woodlot? Earl Daugharty, Reno Township farmer, asked County Extension Agent Marvin Davenport and he received his answer

in the person of Dave Olson, registered forester. Olson, who is county extension agent in Oscoda County, toured the farm woodlot with Mr. Daugharty and recommendations were made on Daugharty's Norway red pine plantation.

On the recent tour, Daugharty had pruned some of his trees to show others how it should be done. In addition, he visited the ASCS office and signed up to see if he can get financial assistance to prune his total plantation. Such pruning will eventually lead to high quality saw timber.

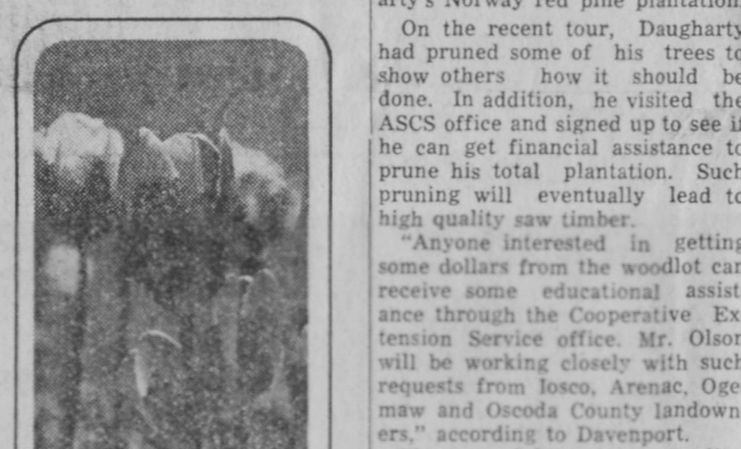
"Anyone interested in getting some dollars from the woodlot can receive some educational assistance through the Cooperative Extension Service office. Mr. Olson will be working closely with such requests from Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw and Osceola County landowners," according to Davenport.

"In turn, I have been trading educational leadership with the other extension agents in the area of farm management, zoning and planning as well as marketing and animal husbandry work." Harold Ferris of Ogemaw is now working with some Iosco County dairymen on the remodeling of their dairy lay-outs. He also is supervising the dairy meetings for the same four-county area according to Davenport.

Jack Post, Arenac County extension agent, is working on the development of cash crops for Iosco County farmers as well as establishing cash crop plots that will serve the four-county area.

Jerry Malosh, area 4-H agent, is in charge of the 4-H youth work while Clemma Lenehan is area home economist.

Another agent who will be specializing in tourist and resort work is scheduled to work out of the Iosco County Cooperative Extension Service Office, East Tawas. Funds have been granted by the federal and state governments, but the vacancy has not been filled as of this date, Davenport stated.
