Bicycle Meet to Draw Record List of Entries

Entries from New Hampshire, Canada, New York, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan have been received for this week-end's fourth annual Tour of Lumbermen's Monument Bike Races, according to the sponsoring Tawas Chamber of Commerce. The race is considered to be one of the top cycle events in the Midwest.

This year's races are to be held Saturday and Sunday, September 10-11, with three stages to be held during the two days.

First race is to be held at 10:00 a. m. Saturday when riders take to the course in individual 32-mile time trials. At 4:30 p. m. Saturday, spectators will see riders attaining speeds of over 30 miles per hour in sprint race competition.

The real test of stamina begins at 1:00 p. m. Sunday when riders begin the now famous 62½-mile road race to Lumbermen's Monument, then on to Oscoda over River Road and back to East Tawas via Old US-23 (Wilber Road).

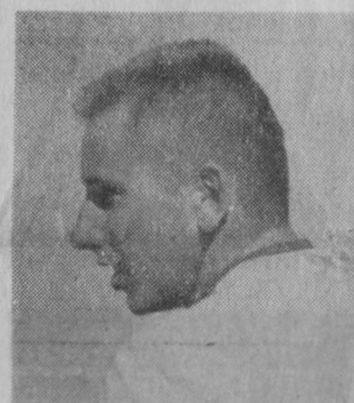
All races are to begin and end at the intersection of State and Newman Streets, East Tawas.

Riders are to be protected by the combined efforts of the Michigan State Police, Isosco County Sheriff's Department, East Tawas

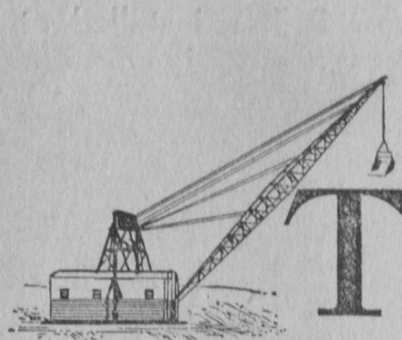
Police Department and Isosco County Civil Defense Unit.

OLAF MOETUS will be on hand to defend his championship title this week-end. He won the Tour of Lumbermen's Monument in 1965.—Herald Photo.

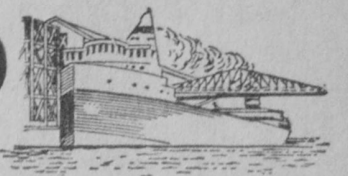

Huge Labor Day Crowd in Area; Few Accidents

While the week-end Labor Day crowd is believed to be the largest in Isosco County history, area law enforcement agencies report only a few minor automobile accidents and few instances of rowdiness.

A 13-year-old Tawas City boy, Thomas J. Fletcher, received minor injuries September 2 when his bicycle collided with an automobile on M-55 west of the Wilber Road intersection. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

Joel R. Sherry, 21, Alpena, received minor injuries early Sunday morning when his car struck a guard rail in Alabaster Township south of Tawas City. Isosco Sheriff's Department officers said he lost control of the car, swerved from one side of the road to the other before the crash.

Four persons received minor injuries Monday afternoon in a three-car crash one-quarter mile south of Hale on M-65. Drivers of the cars were Zenard Newton, 34, Dearborn Heights; Fred Weiker, 51, Saginaw, and Merlin Rolfe, St. Charles, whose age was not listed.

Eight persons received minor injuries in a two-car crash Saturday evening near the Singing Bridge on US-23.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Louise A. Bryan, 39, Flint, and six passengers in her car, Helen Bryan, 13; Mary Lou Hammerberg, 40; Barbara Hammerberg, 15; Mary Montgomery, 16; Nancy Hammerberg, 13; Mary Bessold, 15; Edward L. Wise, 19, Point Lookout, driver of the other car, was also treated.

State police said that Mrs. Bryan pulled onto US-23 from a side road, attempting to travel north. Wise, traveling in the same direction, struck her car in the rear and then rolled over.

A 17-year-old St. Clair Shores vacationer received minor injuries Friday afternoon when his rented motor bike collided with a car at the intersection of Wilkinson Street and US-23, East Tawas.

Police Chief Donald Docking said that Stephen N. Russell was about to stop for the US-23 intersection. Instead of operating the hand

brake, he turned up the accelerator and the bike sped out in front of a passing motorist.

Russell was knocked to the pavement and received bruises. He was wearing a safety helmet.

Twenty-one mail boxes were knocked over by vandals along Baldwin Resort Road and Tawas Beach Road Sunday night or early Monday morning. Investigating are Michigan State Police.

East Tawas Police Department is investigating the theft of a parking meter which was removed from a post along Bay Street near the Holland Hotel sometime over the week-end. The meter is gray in color and carries a tag with the number 83.

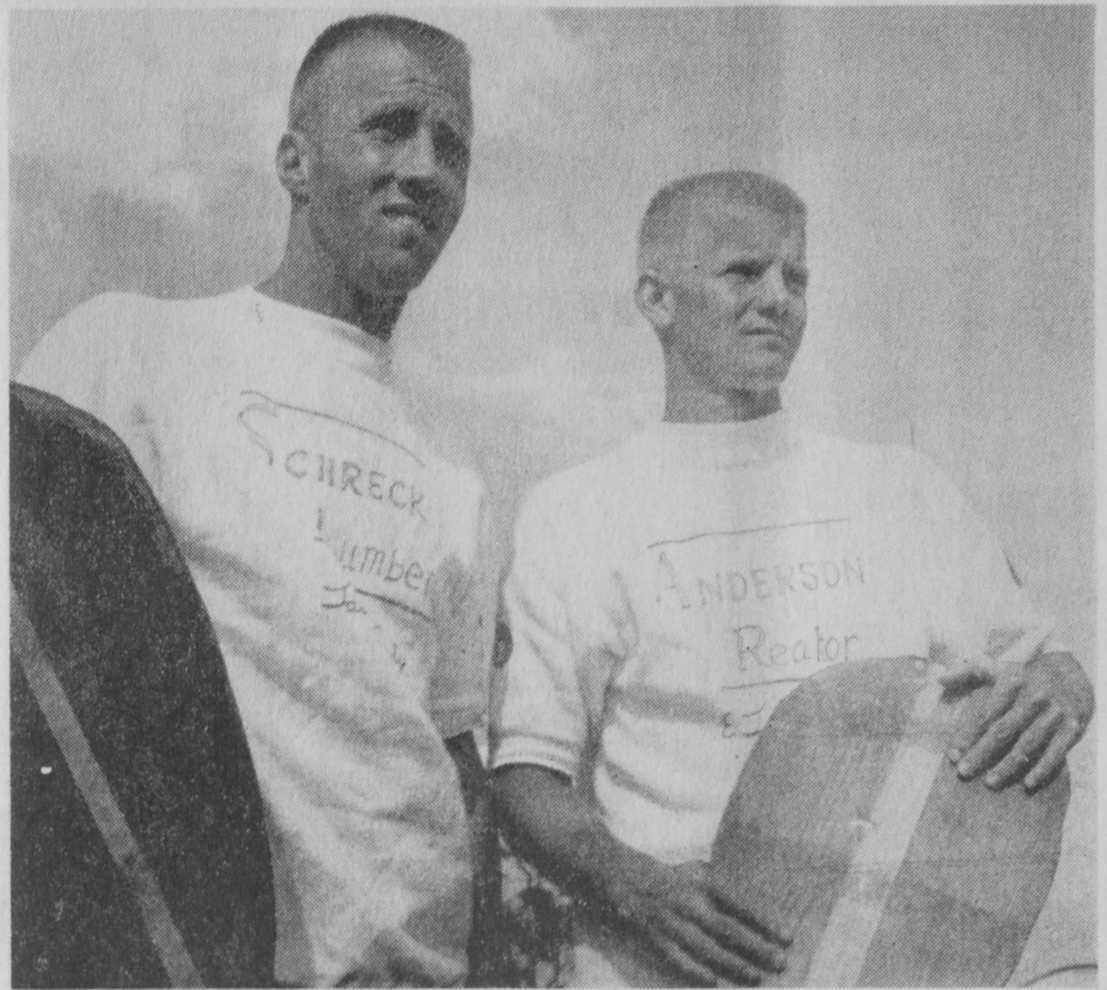
Chorus Rehearsal Starts Thursday

Hohman-Lauwers Set New Marathon Record

Ron Hohman of Oscoda and Jerry Lauwers of Tawas City set a new record Saturday and Sunday in winning the annual 240-mile AuSable River Canoe Derby.

The Isosco duo completed the grueling nonstop marathon in 16 hours, 49 seconds, to beat the record held by Ralph Sawyer and Irvin "Buzz" Peterson by 11 minutes.

While the entry list in the revitalized canoe classic, now under sponsorship of the Michigan Canoe Racing Association, drew only 15 teams at the start in Grayling, finishing times of the first three teams were the best in history and the event is expected to become even more interesting in the future with the marathon being handled by the racing association.

Hohman and Lauwers, drawing seventh position in the starting lineup, set a torrid pace from Grayling to Alcona Dam and then had to ease off in order not to "burn themselves out" before reaching the Oscoda finish line.

Apparently there was no need for concern over the condition of the two husky paddlers as they appeared to be strong enough to continue on for another 100 miles after reaching Oscoda.

They took the largest share of \$1,500 in prize money offered by cosponsors of the event, the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce, along with the East Michigan Tourist Association.

Nailing down second place in a time of 16 hours, 11 minutes, one

second, were the Widig brothers, Albert and LeRoy of Holly.

Following in order were Jerry Kellogg, Muskegon, Jack Kolka, Detroit, third place, 16 hours, 41 minutes, three seconds; Clint Waddell, Lansing, Verlen Krueger, DeWitt, fourth place, 16 hours, 50 minutes, 50 seconds; Charles Versteeg, Inkster, Terry Norris, DeWitt, fifth place, 17 hours, 47 minutes, 20 seconds; Don Burkland, Milford, William Unruh, Champaign, Illinois, sixth place, 18 hours, three minutes, 50 seconds.

Only six of the starting 15 teams finished at Oscoda. Dropping out along the way were Lee Hammel and Eugene Garnsey, both of Clio; Stephen Tripp of Oscoda and Tom Bacon, Flint; Jim Leighty, Linden, and Myles Elowsky, Flint; Roland Batdorf, Lansing, and Wayne Richardson, Dearborn; Jerry Wagner and Stanley Hall, both of Oscoda; Gary Nidermeyer, Long Lake, Minnesota, and Joel Weinhold, Anoka, Minnesota; Jack and Dale Kent, Atlanta; Doug McDougall and Daniel Lilley, Glennie; Rod Kellogg of Muskegon and Bill Kellogg, Detroit.

Sawyer and Peterson, defending champions, missed the marathon as they participated in a Canadian race.

Burglars Fail in Safe-Cracking; Abandon Loot

Burglars were apparently frightened away from the office of Brownell Realty, 7753 North US-23, Oscoda, after successfully moving a safe out of the building sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning.

Oscoda Township Police Chief Robert Foster and state police said that the burglars were looking for money as drawers in a desk had been emptied and shelves were ransacked. The safe was removed from the building but entry was not gained.

Officers found a camera, portable television set, binoculars and a transistor radio near the rear door of the office only a short distance from the safe. They believed that burglars may have been surprised by a car pulling into the driveway. Also under investigation is a burglary at Mystery Ridge. About \$55 in change and \$68.55 in merchandise was stolen Saturday night from the concession stand.

TC Council Discusses Parking Problems

Tawas City Council is to investigate the possible removal of several troublesome parking spots on US-23, following the tabling of immediate action at Tuesday night's meeting.

Of principal concern to officials were intersections at Mathews and Whittemore Streets, where councilmen said that one or two parked cars often disrupted the flow of traffic when other cars attempted to turn off US-23.

The council is to investigate parking on both sides of Whittemore Street, along with a view toward possible removal of parking east from First Street on US-23. In other matters, the council approved the first legal resolution toward establishment of the special assessment district for a sanitary sewer south from Mathews Street along US-23. A hearing is to be held October 17.

During the eight-week course, Private Travis was trained in the repair and upkeep of aircraft engine and transmission assemblies.



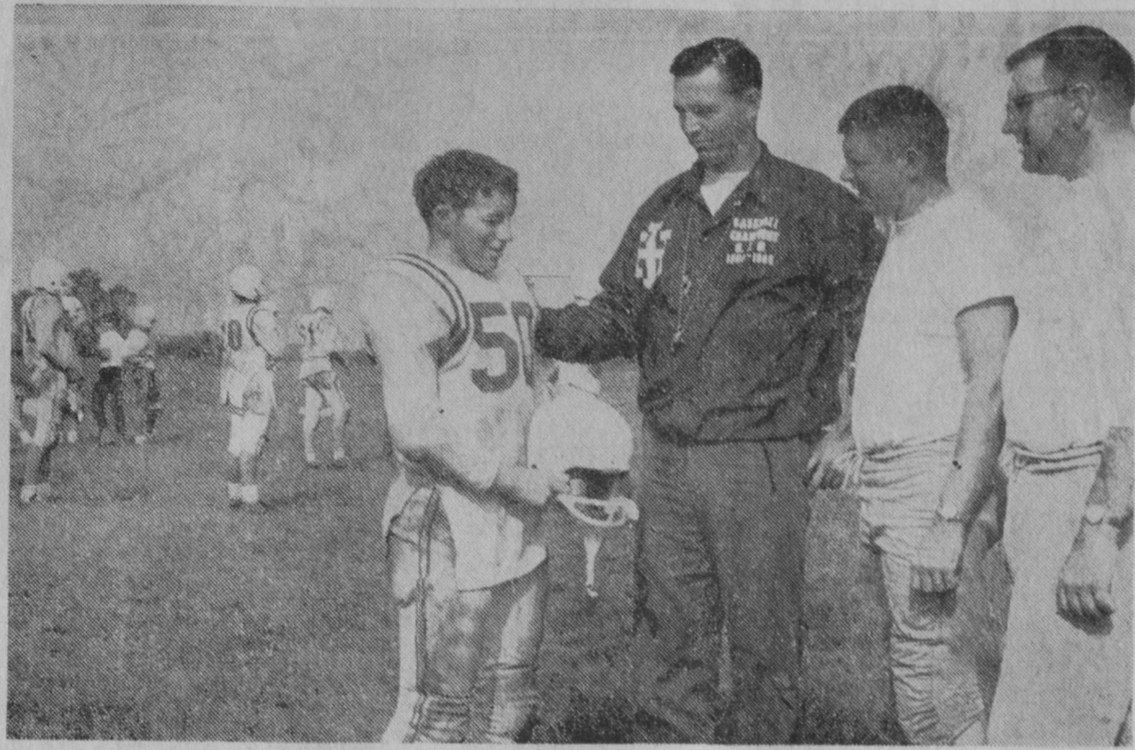

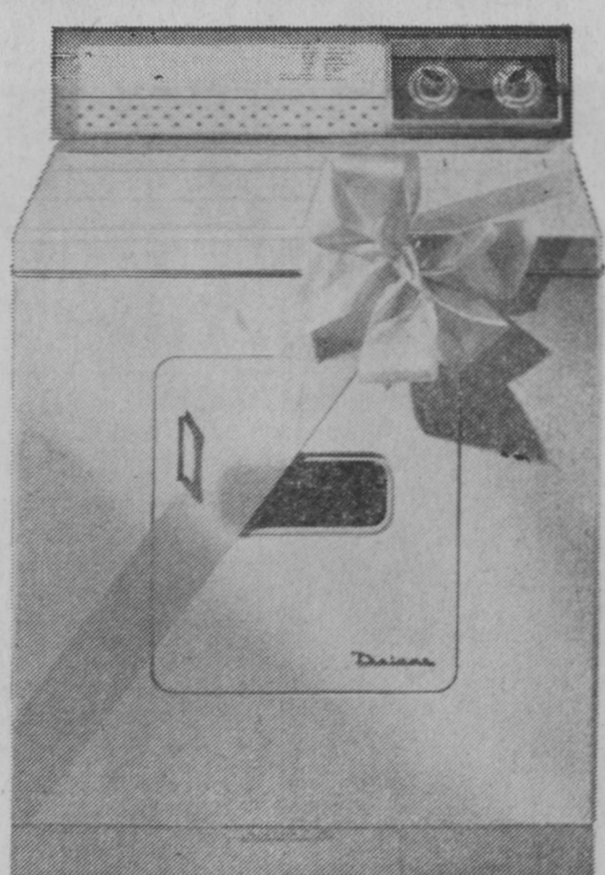

Old-Time Threshing Bee Proves Big Hit

Residents of the Whittemore, Burleigh and Richland area recently turned back the calendar to the days of a half century ago when neighbors would gather for threshing bees.

Steam power, which captured the imagination of Americans (and the hearts of youth) from pre-Civil War Days to the early 1900s, was seen in this area for the first time in several decades. Earl Erickson and his three sons rolled out their Rumley Advance steam traction engine to furnish power to drive the threshing machine.

Earl and two of his sons, George and Wayne, who all own farms along the county line between Burleigh and Richland Townships, saved part of a field of wheat so they could cut and bind it using antique farm equipment owned by their son and brother, Neil of Midland. The grain was then stored in Earl's barn.

Neighbors gathered for miles around Saturday, August 27, to drive teams of horses pulling wagons of grain to the threshing site.

There, to the accompanying chug-chug of the big Rumley, which emitted crowd-satisfying belches of live steam from cylinders and black smoke from burning pine stumps in its firebox, the work of threshing was soon completed with a plentiful supply of manpower. Too soon, in fact, for the old-timers—men and equipment—had hardly worked up a good sweat.

And the amazing part of the entire day was that some of the younger farmers learned that Grandpa probably knew what he was talking about when he used to shake his fist at modern combines, exclaiming that an old-time threshing machine could do a better job.

Instead of leaving a good share of the grain in the field, as is often the case with the combine, grain cut by the time-honored

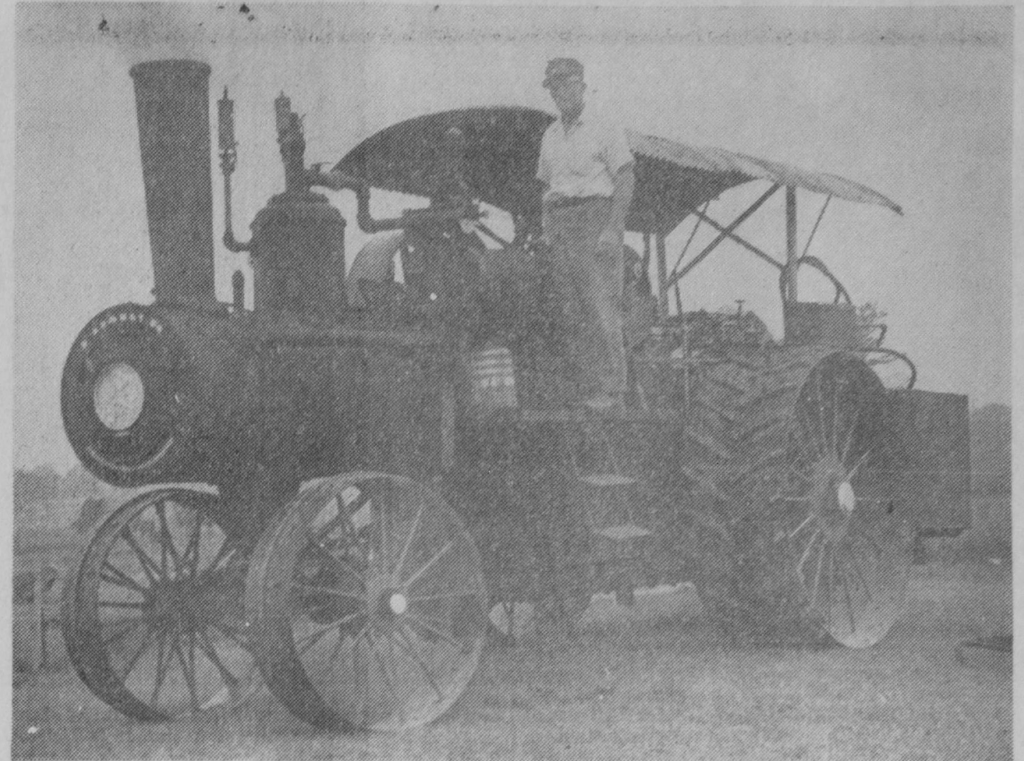
binder method was nice and plump after coming out of the threshing machine. And there was a large pile of straw remaining.

After an afternoon of enjoyable work, a huge dinner table was set up in the orchard by Erickson womenfolk and a hungry crew of threshers and their families sat down to a pot-luck style dinner. More than 40 persons were served and the crowd of spectators during the day passed the 100 mark.

Neil and his 70-year-old father, who threshed grain for 18 years, purchased the engine a year ago near Midland. The Ericksons spent hours of loving care in restoring the old engine to good operating condition.

"Whenever I get the urge to start her up, I do just that—often at the drop of a hat as I really enjoy the steam and smoke," said Earl.

Everything turned out so well in this first operation that the Ericksons plan to save a larger share of

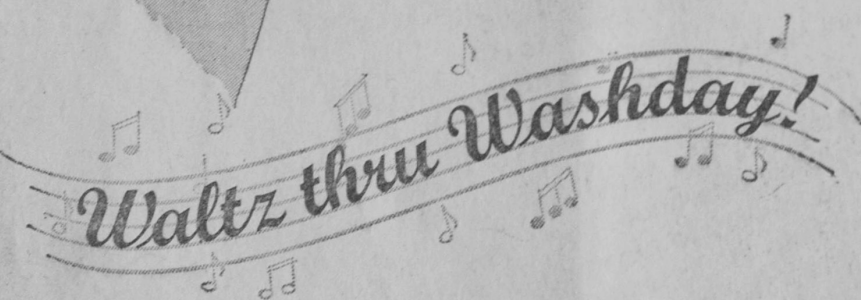

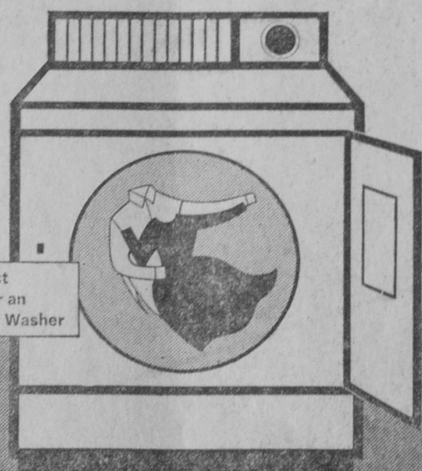

Saginaw Co. Fair Opens Saturday





Farm Outlook Meet September 12 at W-P Area School

The Short and the Long of the Farm Outlook is the topic of 19-66 farm outlook meeting to be held Monday, September 12, at Whittemore-Prescott High School, 8:00 p. m. Farmers from Ogemaw, Arenac, Iosco and Oscoda Counties will attend.

Dr. John Ferris, extension specialist in agricultural economics at Michigan State University, will make brief statements on the farm outlook for the coming year and up to 1980.

What are the implications to Michigan farmers?

Project '80 will be the basis of the presentations on the long-run outlook. In addition, the implications of Project '80 for production and marketing decisions are also being discussed, such as affects of types of feeds on building requirements, trends in direct marketing on price making and development of livestock feeders on marketing practices. A slide-tape presentation on cattle and hogs will be used at the meeting.

A member of the department of animal husbandry will also take part in the program. This is a meeting which should be of vital interest to farmers in making long-range plans for the operation of their farm business.

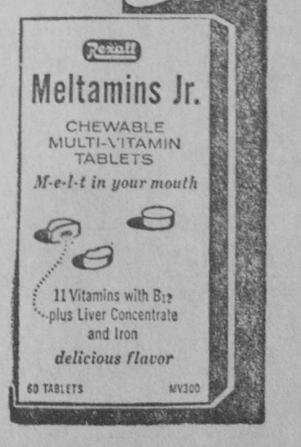

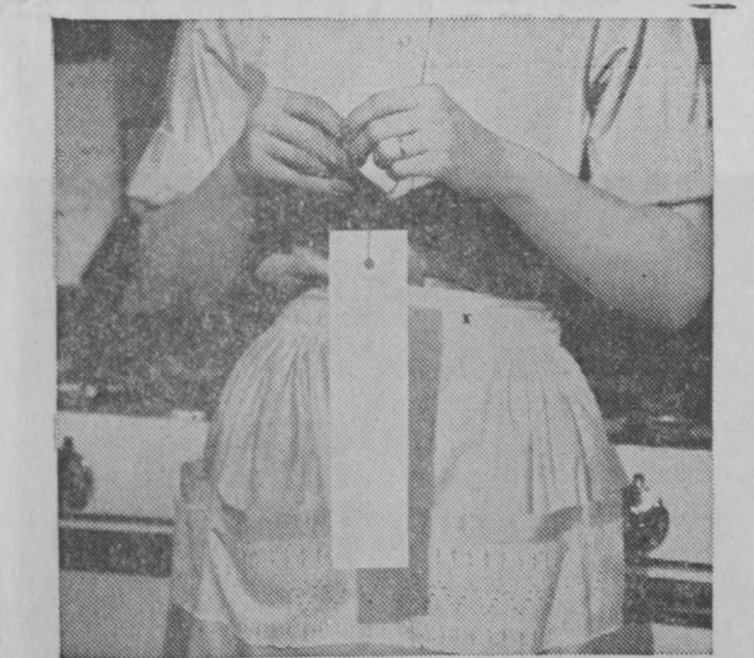
