Mulvena Truck Lines, which moves inbound and outbound shipments for most Northeastern Michigan business and industries utilizing truck service, ceased operations Monday, joining the nationwide shutdown by the trucking employer bargaining unit of which it is a member.

## Form Group to Investigate Coho Planting

Planting of coho salmon in Lake Huron is the object of a new committee formed Monday night.

M. F. Killey, chairman of the Isco Republican Committee, announced Tuesday morning that he had named a five-man group to start action toward achieving the above goal.

"We have had numerous complaints from residents of this area that Western Michigan seems to be getting all of the attention in regard to the planting of salmon," said Killey. "We expect to bring some pressure to bear on this matter and at least get some answers."

Named to the committee were Kenneth Conn, Tawas City insurance agent; Jack Matthews, Oscoda commercial fisherman; Bruce Myles, Oscoda insurance agent; John Weible, Alabaster Township supervisor; Edward Nelkie, Isco County treasurer and chairman of the committee.

Myles told the Herald that planting of salmon in the streams emptying into Lake Michigan is having a serious impact on the tourist and resort business of Eastern Michigan.

He said the group hopes to enlist the voice of the East Michigan Tourist Association, county boards of supervisors and others in a move to meet with the conservation commission in an effort to assure salmon plantings in Lake Huron in the near future.

One of the problems of plantings in Lake Huron cited by the conservation department has been the absence of lamprey control measures in those waters.

"Mulvena Truck Lines, Incorporated, is a member of the Michigan Motor Carriers Employers Association and of Trucking Employers, Incorporated, from whom we have received directions to cease operations in the face of a number of selective work stoppages which constitute a strike against a number of members of the multi-employer bargaining unit."

"We deeply regret any inconvenience this may cause our customers. But we feel it is in the public interest for the trucking industry to form a solid front in our nationwide negotiations with the Teamsters Union."

Mulvena employs 95 to 100 persons on a regular basis in its operations at Alpena, Detroit, Saginaw and Tawas, a number which rises as high as 120 when part-time workers are employed to meet peaks.

About half the employees are Alpena based; there are 20 to 25 at Saginaw; the total at Detroit ranges from 15 to 25, and there are two at Tawas.

Mulvena operates 35 tractor units and trailers over the road plus other units on local runs. At Saginaw, Mulvena is one of 17 operators which have shut down. At Detroit, 69 of the 87 operators were reported down.

It appeared that even if Mulvena were operating it would have little effect because most of the major concerns with which it connects are idle.

Several area industrial firms probably will be hurt by the trucking shutdown if it is prolonged. Normal operation of other business probably would be affected should the stoppage continue for any length of time.

Plans for improvements to the Tawas City Park this spring are to be reported at next Monday night's council meeting, according to park board action last Thursday.

## Advisory Opinion from Supreme Court—

# County Reapportionment Law Ruled Invalid

Reapportionment of Michigan's county government under a new law passed last year by the state legislature has been declared invalid by the state supreme court.

On Monday, the court ruled five to two against the law. This response from the supreme court resulted from a request from Gov. George Romney, who had asked for an advisory opinion under procedures of the 1963 constitution for a preview ruling on new laws.

In question was whether the legislature's apportionment law conflicted with a constitutional guarantee that every township shall have individual representation on the county board of supervisors, regardless of township population.

While capital sources said the court's ruling "lacks authority of a regular decision," it is expected to freeze redistricting in progress across the state.

Here in Isco County, the board of supervisors had completed its

reapportionment last month in order to meet the April 10 deadline.

Had the one-man, one-vote concept been upheld, Isco would have had a nine-member commission at the helm of county government rather than the present 19-member board.

A reapportionment plan was approved here March 15 by an 11-6 roll call of supervisors. The board's six-man apportionment committee had been deadlocked over two different plans—nine-

man vs. 11-man—and left the matter for the entire board to decide.

The ruling was a victory for several of the smaller townships of Isco, which would have lost their present representation on the board of supervisors.

The plan as adopted would have grouped some townships with a combined population as close to 1,817 persons as practical into one district. Two townships were to remain as single districts and one township was to have split into

two districts.

One-man, one-vote in the county was urged by state lawmakers as the remedy for situations where a rural township supervisor with a small number of constituents had a voice in county government equal to that of a city spokesman with a large number of constituents.

James Campbell, chairman of the board's reapportionment committee, said that Isco had a plan ready if it is ever necessary.

## Finances Main Topic of Long April Session

Isco Board of Supervisors opened its statutory April session Tuesday morning. Finances will again be the major topic of consideration, as it has for the past two or three years.

About two days of work were eliminated from the session by preparation of a report on assessment roll footings by Henry Oates, county tax equalization director. To be official, a committee will check Oates' report thoroughly before final adoption by the board.

This preliminary work will also mean that study by the county equalization committee will be at a minimum. Charles E. Smith, newly-elected board chairman,

said there would be some questions asked pertaining to county valuation figures but believed that Oates' preliminary report would probably stand with very little change.

Last week, Oates figured in his preliminary checking of tax rolls in the various units that the county's state equalized valuation for 1967 would be \$60,033,763. This is an increase of only \$249,949 and there had been hope that increased valuations would help the county, townships and schools out of possible financial difficulties.

Oates' report, presented Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday, revealed that personal property losses in the county amounted to \$2,124,833. This nearly wiped out the \$2,374,782 gain in real property valuation.

The personal property loss came about through depreciation, agricultural exemptions and errors found in utility figures.

Another job of the board is to adopt a new budget for next year. Hearings are to be held with the various county offices during the week, along with a review of allocation requests, before a budget is to be submitted to the Isco Allocation Board.

Two new supervisors, Dennis Chrivia of Plainfield Township and H. Ray Mead of Wilber Township, were welcomed to the board Tuesday morning.

Chrivia has about 20 years experience in local government, having served as township clerk, member of county allocation board, board of education and township board of review.

Mead will be in his "freshman year" in government. He has owned property in Isco County since 1925, when he constructed a cottage at Big Island Lake. He had operated his own sales organization at Detroit until five years ago when he made his permanent home here. He is married to the former Helen Nisbet, daughter of the late James Nisbet, a pioneer Tawas City lumberman.

Tuesday morning's session was adjourned until noon when committee appointments were presented by the new chairman.

## Charles E. Smith Named Board Chairman; First from Oscoda in More Than 50 Years

Charles E. Smith, veteran member of the Isco Board of Supervisors, was named as its chairman Tuesday morning in the annual re-organizational meeting.

Named as vice chairman was James Campbell, mayor of East Tawas.

The new chairman succeeds L. S. Little of Grant Township who stepped down from the chairmanship after serving two terms.

Smith is serving his 13th year on the board of supervisors and had been chairman of the board's finance committee for the past two years. Holding this important post, he had been a member of the Isco Allocation Board.

His prior service saw chairmanship of the board's conservation committee and chairman of District Health No. 2 for four years.

According to a preliminary search of records in the county clerk's office, Smith is the first chairman from Oscoda Township in more than 50 years. Mrs. John Lansky, deputy county clerk, investigated files back to 1914 and could not find an Oscoda chairman.

James Mielock, veteran governmental official and supervisor of Reno Township, said he believed there had been a chairman from Oscoda many years ago but could not recall his name.

Campbell is in his third term 1968. One of the first moves made by the two men was to appoint Little as chairman of the finance committee. He had held that post for a number of years prior to committee appointments for 1967-1968 named board chairman.

## Ed. Parker to Explain Fish Feeding Plan

Edward Parker, who last week renewed his efforts to interest Michigan in his plan for feeding fish, is to appear before the Tawas Chamber of Commerce tonight (Wednesday) and seek the support of that group.

"I am not looking for financial help, but I need the complete understanding and support of local residents in presenting this plan to the state," said Parker.

Through many years of investigation and experimentation, Parker developed a system of feeding fish in streams with pulverized garbage. He claims that growth rate of fish, as well as other benefits to streams, was phenomenal.

"I would like to explain the workings of this system in order that everyone will understand it,"

said Parker. "Some might believe that this plan would introduce pollution into the water, but that is not the true fact as pulverizing and dispersal methods would guarantee against anything like that happening."

Parker proposes to make Tawas Bay an area for his pilot study in fish feeding. He believes his plan would attract fish here and would result in a more rapid growth of perch.

In addition to asking support from the state in his project, he is seeking support from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Parker said Tuesday that a meeting had been arranged with state conservation officials this week. He is in hopes that a public meeting might be arranged here next week.

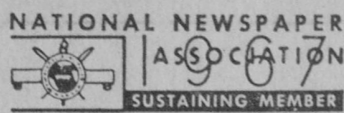

## School Drops Testing Plan for Beginners

Proposed incorporation of a kindergarten readiness test into Tawas Area Schools was dropped Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

It had been suggested that the administration study tests used in several neighboring schools where by pre-kindergartners were tested to determine if they were mature enough to start school in the fall.

Testing would have been aimed principally at children, whose fifth birthday falls between the start of school and last day of December.

John Alexander, acting elementary principal, said he had conferred with several school administrators in the area and found that most of the schools were dropping such testing programs as unworkable.

Alexander said that one of the principal reasons for dropping the testing program was that parents had learned questions to be asked on the test and then briefed their children.

While further discussion on the testing program has been dropped for the present, Miss Clara Bolen, who will return to her position as elementary principal this year after filling in as high school principal, said that very few mothers insist that their children be enrolled in kindergarten if she knows that the child is too immature.

Kindergarten registration for next fall is to be held during the summer months.

## Board OK's History Trip to Dearborn

An educational trip to Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum by eighth grade history students was approved Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

The board gave its approval to a plan submitted by Mrs. Gordon Dunham, history teacher, whereby students would be transported to Dearborn by bus on Saturday, May 6, for a day at the nationally famous museum.

In a letter to the board, Mrs. Dunham said that the trip would provide an invaluable experience for her students to experience democracy in action. She cited the value of studying the contributions of historical significance on display at the museum, particularly those relating to Michigan history.

Approximately 160 students would be involved. Seven teachers and about 20 chaperones would accompany the group.

A code of conduct on the trip has been developed by students. Cost to each student would be about 50 cents and funds would be raised for anyone lacking entrance fees or money for a lunch. The school has set a maximum of \$5 for spending money by children, at parental discretion.

In other business, the board took final action on adoption of school policy relative to dismissal of pupils who leave the school without permission. The following wording was adopted:

"Any student who leaves the school without permission shall be excluded from school for three days and receive zeros for the subjects taken, if so evaluated by the principal."

This policy was passed on a four to two roll call vote. Two members were of the opinion that such a policy was too strict for first offenders.

The board unanimously denied a request of Mrs. William (Shirley) Brown to rehire her as a bus driver. Mrs. Brown, who was a substitute bus driver from September to November 1965, had appeared before the last meeting and requested reinstatement.

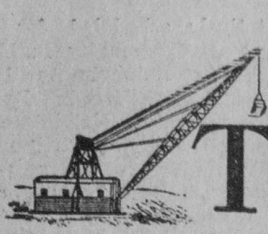

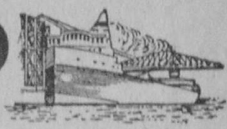

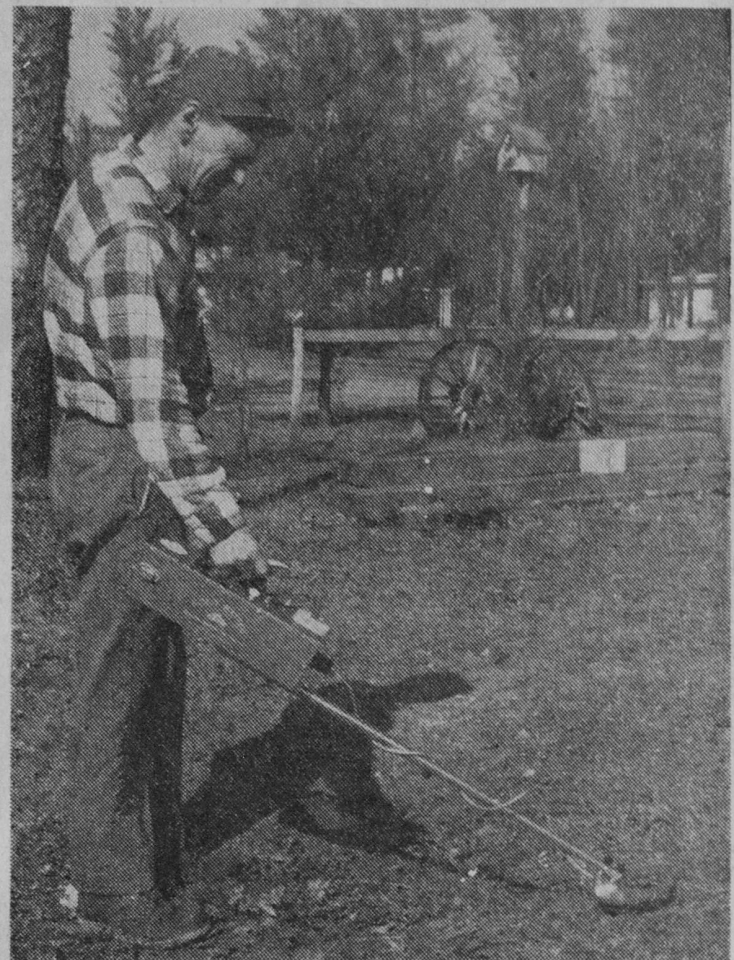

## Exanimo Opens Branch Treasure Hunting Gains Popularity

Treasure has been described by one professional as anything of value which has been misplaced, lost or concealed and which is no longer the known assets or property of a living person.

Others have a preconceived idea that treasure has only one meaning and that is cash or money. Yet, on the other hand, items of "treasure" can also be of little monetary value but be of great historical significance.

Whatever the definition, treasure hunting has fast become one of the most interesting hobbies in this country. Since the 1940s, people have become more aware of the historical importance of certain everyday items used in the past and this has turned into a nation of collectors.

From such specialized fields as guns and books through the gamut of old tools, bottles, farm and lumbering relics, just about

anything that is not now manufactured or used, an unlimited field is open to the collector—men, women and children.

Within recent years, treasure hunting has taken on a new sophistication since development of modern electronic equipment used to detect metal or minerals. While finding quick acceptance in western states, where Thers have long searched for lost mines in mountainous regions or caches of money along the great emigrant trails—or in Florida, where the search for gold and other valuables of the Spanish continues—use of electronic metal detecting equipment is coming into prominence in the Middle West.

While some amateur Thers may have in the back of their heads the dream of finding hidden, lost or misplaced valuables, others are looking for the seemingly unimportant items of historical inter-

est. The two principal benefits are enjoyment and excitement of the search and then the possibility of recovering enough to pay the bills for equipment used.

One such THER in the local area is John Ballinger of Monument Road, whose interest began as a small boy while listening to stories told by his father, a deputy United States marshal serving in the West. As a young man, John, along with friends, trekked the total distance of the old Natchez Trace and has searched the jungles of Panama and the Philippines, in addition to most of the southeastern and southwestern parts of this country.

Not all of his searching has been to no avail, but he says little about discoveries made. This seems to be typical of the professional treasure hunter.

Right here in Iosco, his searching has uncovered some small caches of silver and gold coins, but through the years, he has traveled many trails and researched more tales and facts pertaining to history and antiquity than he cares to talk about.

Some years ago, he met and became a friend of Karl VonMueller, professional THER, better known as the "old man in treasure hunting." KvonM was recently featured in a Time Magazine article and is a noted author in the field.

In 1964, VonMueller formed the treasure-hunting fraternity of Exanimo in an effort to give a common meeting ground for interested parties. The firm distributes a fact-filled newspaper for amateur and professional treasure hunters as well as supplying equipment and books on the subject.

Because of the varied history of Michigan and neighboring states, Ballinger and VonMueller are opening another Exanimo office—this one located in the old Oscoda Bank building at Oscoda and is to be called Exanimo-Great Lakes. The main office remains at Weeping Water, Nebraska.

Ballinger, who will manage the Oscoda office, points to Oscoda-AuSable and the Iosco area as one of the many sections of the state which remain virtually untapped in the field of amateur treasure hunting.

Of great local historical importance, for instance, would be locating the site of Louis Chevalier's log house on the AuSable River. Various affidavits in the land office file show that Chevalier was connected with Joseph Compau in the fur trade and that in the year 1800 was a resident of this territory, had possession of and occupied a parcel of land on the AuSable River, one-quarter

mile from its entrance into Lake Huron.

He was issued a patent for this "ribbon farm," one-half mile wide and three miles long, in 1843, five years before the fishing industry was first established at AuSable. He lived in close proximity to large settlements of Indians on the AuSable and Pine Rivers. While written history had not recorded a trading post in that vicinity under either French or British regimes, the place was fertile for a fur trader.

This strip of land was later purchased from Theodore J. Compau

by Henry M. Loud of the pioneer lumbering firm of Loud, Priest and Gay. The AuSable was next to the Saginaw River in the volume of saw logs carried and the property was the site of various mills, long since disappeared.

While a few Thers have searched the ruins left after the fire which swept AuSable-Oscoda in 1911, interest has renewed in the past two years. The location of Exanimo-Great Lakes at Oscoda should provide even greater interest.

One local THER has used an electronic device to detect coins,

watches and rings lost by vacationers along the beaches of Lake Huron and Tawas Bay. This same man attracts quite a following when he uses his equipment to find coins lost along sidewalks or playgrounds.

Abandoned farms, former town and mill sites of the lumbering days, Indian camp grounds, road houses, waterfront areas—all will be searched this summer by an ever growing band of Michigan treasure hunters. The public will be the principal benefactor in recovering "lost" items of historical interest.

## Need Management—

### High Fawn Death Cited by Specialist

The need for scientific deer management has been illustrated by recent research showing high fawn death rates and undernourished deer, according to a Michigan State University Extension wildlife specialist.

MSU's Charles Shick says that deer nutrition studies recently completed by Pennsylvania State University showed conditions similar to those found in Michigan.

Physical condition of white-tailed deer reflect the food supply of the area. The most recent findings show that captive females (doe) on well-balanced rations produce more fawn than wild doe of the same age. In nutrition experiments at Penn State, all doe produced fawn. Of 951 wild doe examined by the Pennsylvania Game Commission, 90 percent were carrying fawn.

Moreover, losses of fawn in the wild may amount to 40 percent or more, the research reports, due to nutritional deficiencies in doe and fawn in oversized herds. The study showed the ranges in herds of this type were severely over-browsed.

Average weights of deer on good versus poor quality range show the effect of nutrition. Females two to four years old, fed well-balanced rations, weighed an average of 134 pounds in the fall. In comparison, wild doe of the same age average about 98.

The study of Penn State showed that 100 well-fed doe produced about 190 fawn. Pennsylvania Game Commission figures from 1960 to 1965, scientists say, show that five counties in the extreme northwest averaged 198 fawn per 100 females. In five north-central counties, the comparative figures were 151 fawn for 100 doe. In five northeastern counties the figures were 162 fawn for 100 doe.

They point out that a fact known to many hunters, that antler development among bucks also reflects the quality and quantity of browse on a deer range. Low body weight and poor antler development, especially among yearling bucks, indicate poorly fed deer.

Michigan studies have arrived at the same results. Sound deer management will produce the biggest deer and more of them.

Johnson is known throughout Michigan as conservation evangelist and is in demand as a public speaker for his talks on conservation, clean air and pure water.

## Standish Gets Federal Grant for Hospital

A \$294,000 federal grant to aid construction of a 39-bed extended care unit adjacent to the Standish Community Hospital had been made available under the Hill-Burton Program.

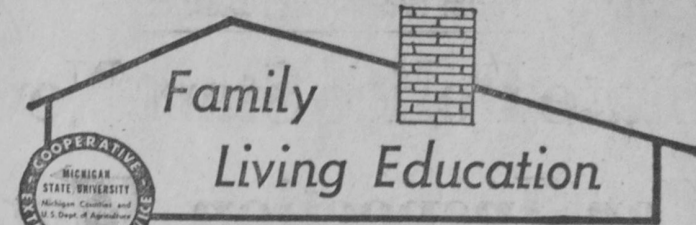
Total cost of the proposed addition is approximately \$570,000 with the remaining portion to be financed by the hospital through arrangements with the State Bank of Standish.

The unit would provide extended care beds for patients aged 65 and over. The unit would be composed of two four-bed wards, three private rooms and 14 two-bed rooms.

Therapy departments would be provided to serve acute and long-term care inpatients and outpatients.

The new unit would be attached to the present building so the dietary area can be redesigned with a minimum of change to serve both units. Some equipment changes would be made in the laundry area to handle the expanded load.

### What "Weaker Sex?"

Women are the "weaker sex," you have heard. Do not believe it. The little lady who shops for a family of four carried home 2½ tons of groceries a year. She lugs it into the house, puts it away, then gets it out to cook and serve. Her 2½ ton total includes a half-ton of meal, three-fourths of dairy foods (those half gallon and gallon cartons of milk are heavy), a one-half ton of fruits and vegetables and nearly four-fifths of a ton of miscellaneous foods. That is a lot of good eating for only 18 percent of the family's after-tax income.

### Housecleaning Tips

If you are using a paste wax and have no buffer, be sure to apply to a small area at a time and buff with a soft clean cloth while it is still moist. Those of you who have buffers or polishers, may let the paste wax dry. Moist wax is easier to rub down by hand, almost impossible to buff by hand if it dries.

If you do not plan to remove the old wax before re-waxing and it is not discolored, you may use buffing-type wax. If using self polishing-type wax, be sure you have not previously used a buffing wax on the floor. Self-polishing waxes do not apply well over buffing-type waxes.

### A Is For April and Asparagus

Slender and green, asparagus from California and soon from New Jersey and other states, is in the produce counters now. Top quality asparagus has firm, brittle, bright green stalks and tightly closed, well-formed heads. If the tips begin to feather out, the asparagus is past its prime.

# State Police Start New Car Inspection Plan

The Michigan State Police motor vehicle inspection program is now in full swing this week in all eight of the department's districts, Col. Fredrick E. Davids, director, reported.

Inspection in the Bay City, Paw Paw, Rockford, Traverse City and Marquette districts had been delayed because of insufficient inspection supplies. The program began March 27 in the East Lansing, Detroit and Jackson districts.

At present, one inspection team of several officers works daily in each district, changing check lane locations from day to day. Thirty-six officers originally were trained for this work.

Additional officers to serve as team substitutes will be trained beginning with a three-day school April 19-21 at Marquette, according to Lt. Matt P. Hrebec, who is in charge of the operation.

Two officers from each of the 13 posts in the Marquette district will attend the in-service school. Subsequently, team substitutes will be trained in other districts. Additional teams may be added in the districts later.

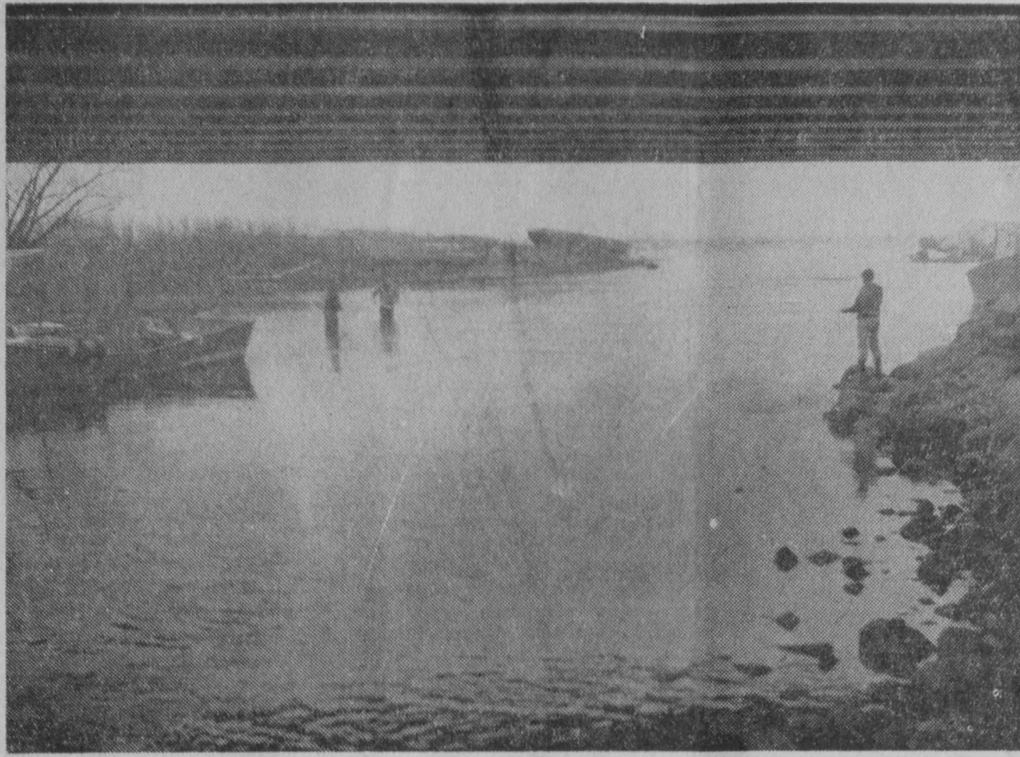
