

# Tuttle Quits Mayor Post for Promotion

Mayor George Tuttle of Tawas City announced his resignation to the city council Monday night and his impending transfer to Traverse City as an official of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company. Tuttle has been mayor of

Tawas City for 10 years after five years as a councilman.

A technical assistant for Michigan Consolidated since October 1963, Tuttle has been appointed supervisor, office and sales, for the utility at Traverse City. He takes up his new post May 1. His wife, Helen, and daughter, Helen, will move to Traverse City in mid-June, Tuttle said.

The mayor's resignation caught councilmen completely by surprise and came after Daniel Ulrich, First Ward alderman, was nominated and elected as mayor pro tem.

According to City Atty. Alf C. Watson, the council has until May 1 to appoint a new mayor or to take steps for holding a special election.

Council committees are to remain the same until the new mayor makes his appointments.

Born here in 1919, Tuttle has lived all of his life in Tawas City with the exception of five years in Charleston, South Carolina. He attended the Citadel there and Bliss Electrical Engineering School in Washington, D. C. For 16 years, he owned and operated a hardware store in conjunction with electrical, plumbing and heating contracting. A fire destroyed his business in 1962.

Tuttle has been a member of the Kiwanis Club and active in all measures of civic improvements during his adult life. He was re-elected without opposition earlier this month.

"We are very sorry to leave Tawas City, which has been so good to us and where we have so many wonderful friends," Tuttle said. "I am doubly sorry that I could not give the city advance notice so that they could have chosen another mayor at the regular election, but the appointment to my new post in Traverse City was so sudden that it was impossible for me to do so in advance of the election."

James C. Preston, general manager of Michigan Consolidated's Northern District of Operations, commented: "As much as we hate to deprive Tawas City of Tuttle's talents as a community and civic leader, he has earned this promotion with our company."

"He deserves this opportunity for advancement and we are grateful that he has accepted it. I am sure the citizens of Tawas City appreciate his past services to the community and wish him well in his new position."

## Millage Set— City Budget Gets Approval of TC Council

A budget of \$118,100 for 1967-1968 operation was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council. The action followed a formal hearing, at which time Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz explained receipts and disbursements.

The city had a \$10,624.95 cash balance at the end of the year and the council adopted the same appropriation ordinance as last year. The 10 mills for city operation include 6 1/2 for contingent; 1 1/2 for street, 1 1/4 for public debt and one-half mill for interest.

Last year, the city budgeted \$109,000 for operation and had actual disbursements of \$112,649.50. Receipts last year amounted to \$112,017.21.

Under the new budget adopted Monday night, receipts total \$116,800. This includes \$36,900 in current taxes, sales tax of \$18,100, act 51 money of \$23,600, trunkline maintenance of \$13,500. There are 16 other categories under receipts ranging from \$4,900 for interest and liquor tax to \$100 for trailer rentals.

Principal disbursements under the new budget will be \$22,800 for local streets, \$9,445 for the police department, \$8,900 for city hall, \$7,145 for the fire department, \$7,000 for new streets, \$6,300 for street lights, \$8,150 for refuse disposal, \$5,700 for employee benefits, \$6,700 for state streets, to name the principal expenditures.

The city park board's budget of \$3,100 was approved April 6 by that group. Improvements anticipated this year include installation of the remaining outfield section of the baseball diamond near Tawas City Elementary Unit, a sprinkling arrangement for the city park picnic area, additional park tables and benches, repairs to the slide and new tennis nets, painting of bathhouse, beach guarding, tennis court painting, guard post painting.

Future projects to be discussed next month include replacement (See COUNCIL, page 6.)

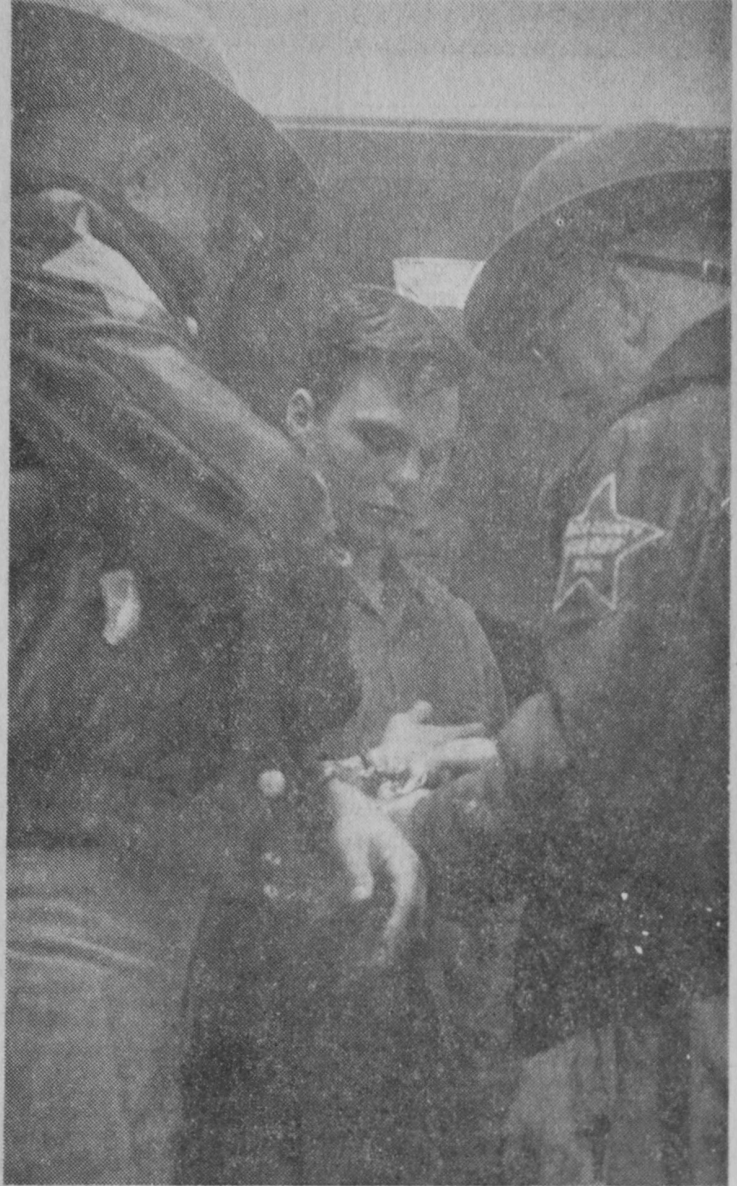
## Fish Feeding Plan to Get Public Airing

## Plank Road Mother Slain; Accused Man Has Hearing Friday

A 20-year-old East Tawas man is being held without bond at Iosco County Jail on a charge of first degree murder.

Demanding examination when arraigned Friday night in justice court was Jonathan L. Putnam, who is charged with the strangulation-stabbing of Mrs. Viola Stern, 32, 993 Plank Road, a mother of five.

At 6:40 a. m. Friday, William Stern, husband of the victim, reported to police that his wife was missing. She had left home about 9:30 Thursday night to do the family washing at a local laundry.

Shortly before Stern's call, Putnam voluntarily appeared at the Pontiac State Police Post, reportedly stating that he had stabbed the woman to death near Tawas. He was accompanied to the Pontiac post by his wife, Ann, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Bernadine Polzin.

Mrs. Stern's nude body was discovered in a ditch about eight miles west of US-23 on Townline Road at 6:25 a. m. by state police. This was 15 minutes prior to the notification by her husband. Stern later identified the body as his wife.

The body was taken to a Saginaw pathologist for an autopsy. Cause of death was determined to be strangulation and stab wounds. The weapon involved has not yet been found.

Putnam was arraigned before Alabaster Township Justice of the Peace Harry Rapson. Putnam was represented by Alf C. Watson, Tawas City attorney, who demanded examination on behalf of Putnam. Preliminary examination was scheduled to be held April 21, 9:30 a. m.

Michigan State Police, Iosco County Sheriff's Department, and Iosco County Pros. Atty. J. Richard Ernst are continuing their investigation.

Putnam, who lived at 512 Tawas Street, East Tawas, had moved here last December from Drayton Plains. He had been employed here as a truck driver for a beverage distributing firm. Putnam had previously resided at East Tawas and had been employed by a tree trimming firm.

The last person to see Mrs. Stern alive was Clarence King, Tawas City grocer and owner of the Blue Dot Automatic Laundry, located just north of the Townline Road on US-23.

King said that Mrs. Stern had come into the laundry about 9:30 p. m. Thursday to do her washing. Several other patrons were in the laundry at the time and King was finishing work on cleaning the floor.

Shortly after 10:00 p. m., King asked Mrs. Stern if she wanted him to wait and help her carry the washing out to her station wagon. She replied that she could manage it and King returned home.

King was unaware that the following morning when state troopers were checking the driveway for tire prints, her station wagon had not been moved from the scene.

King said the ironic part of the tragedy was that he had asked Mrs. Stern if she was not afraid to be there alone. "I volunteered to wait a few minutes before going home, but she said she was not afraid and, if she had trouble, the entire neighborhood would hear her."

Police had investigated at two other automatic laundries in the area before discovering the Stern station wagon parked in front of the Tawas City laundry.

It is believed that Mrs. Stern's assailant forced her out of the laundry at knifepoint, into a car and the slaying took place at some other location, possibly near the site where her body was found.

Arenac County authorities found some women's clothing along the shoulder of US-23 near Omer. The clothing was later identified by Stern as being worn by his wife when she left home Thursday night.

Under orders of his attorney, tight security measures have been taken at the jail to prevent all law enforcement officers from conversing with Putnam. His only authorized visitor has been the Rev. Robert Morrison, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas.

The prosecutor's office and investigating officers have been extremely cautious about disclosing any information in the case, said to be due to recent supreme court rulings concerning pretrial reporting. Two formal statements were issued Friday and Saturday by the prosecuting attorney.

## Council Approves New Service Building at Tawas C. Cemetery

Plans for a new service building at the Tawas City Cemetery, as proposed by the cemetery board, were approved by the city council Monday night.

Low bid of Robert Oates in the amount of \$2,779.26 was accepted by the council for constructing the

20 by 22-foot concrete block building. The contractor is to start work immediately with completion before Memorial Day.

Appearing before the council were Charles Eich and William Clark, representing the cemetery board's building committee. Alderman Russell A. Rollin Sr. is cemetery board chairman.

Eich said that the new building would replace the present wooden structure and would be located about 145 feet south of that building.

Windows have been eliminated in construction so as to minimize vandalism. Plastic panels will be included in the aluminum roof to admit light. The building is to be equipped with two toilets.

Funds for construction are to be made available through a transfer in city funds. Construction would allow storage of caskets during extremely cold weather in the winter.

Chairman Rollin said the cemetery board had held 19 official meetings since reorganizing a year ago. Many planning sessions have also been held and considerable work has been accomplished in one year. By law, cemetery board members serve without compensation, as does the park board and city planning commission.

Three other bids received on construction were as follows: Tawas Area Construction Corporation, \$3,545.63; Northville Building Company, Greenbush, \$3,348; Ray Abbott, Tawas City, \$3,326.

# Army Board Recommends Aid for Giant Tawas Harbor Project

A \$934,600 breakwater in Tawas Bay Harbor to help small boats find protection from summer storms on Lake Huron was recommended Friday by the army rivers and harbors board.

This action followed a recommendation of a month ago in which the Army Corps of Engineers' North Central Division, Chicago, Illinois, recommended federal participation in construction at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas.

In announcing the army rivers and harbors board recommendation, United States Sen. Phillip A. Hart said in a telegram to the Herald that "the many parks and summer homes in the Tawas Bay area, plus the fact that the bay is a major gateway to one of our Great Lakes, have attracted a great number of small boat owners to spend the summer boating season there."

Hart said that with leisure time increasing, "with more Michigan people able to afford small boats, the need for adequate harbors of refuge along the Great Lakes coastline has become increasingly evident."

"At present, the principal boating center at Tawas Bay is the state pier, but the nearest harbors are 20 miles away to the north and 30 miles to the southeast. That is just too far if a sudden storm should develop on Lake Huron."

According to the Army Corps of Engineers, a U-shaped breakwater extending 1,750 feet out from the end of the state pier would provide additional piers and a protected anchorage area. Adequate channel and anchorage depths exist naturally, so no construction dredging would be required.

The board also noted that parking facilities are needed to accommodate the many fishermen who come to Tawas Bay.

Once final state and federal approval has been given, the federal government is expected to contribute \$469,100 toward the initial cost of the project. The non-federal share coming from Michigan Waterway funds would be \$465,500.

Last month, Carl Babeock, Tawas Harbor chairman, said that should federal approval be received this year, an appropriation would probably follow the next year. It was expected then that the project might become a reality by 1971.

Funds for the state's share would come from state gasoline tax collections belonging to the boating public. One-half of one percent of the gas tax collected by Michigan goes to the waterways commission.

Next step in the project would be to receive a federal appropriation for engineering.

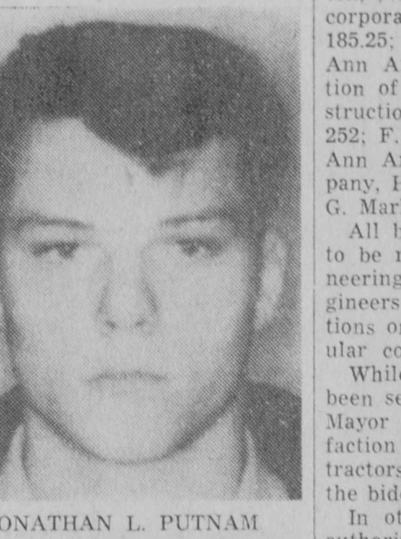
## Funeral Held Monday for Mrs. Stern

## East Tawas Opens Bids on Sewer Project

Bids on constructing East Tawas' new municipal disposal plant and sewer additions ran slightly higher than engineering estimates, according to Mayor James Campbell following Monday night's bid opening.

Totaling the two lowest bids for sanitary sewer and plant construction, the cost would be \$961,502. It had been anticipated that the total cost would be in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

Campbell pointed out, however, that construction costs have been increasing each year. Total estimated cost of the project when East Tawas voters approved a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue in April 1966 was \$750,000.

During the ensuing year, while awaiting final approval of a \$120,000 federal grant, confirmed in February, the total cost was estimated at \$800,000 or more by Julius Hanslovsky, Lansing, the city's financial consultant.

The two low bids, actually not far off from Hanslovsky's and the engineering firm's estimate, were submitted by Fraser Brothers, St. Charles, sanitary sewers, \$541,452, and Hill and Thomas Contractors, Lansing, \$320,050.

Other bids submitted were as follows: Sanitary sewer—Benchley and Yager, Incorporated, Beaver-ton, \$721,796.19; B. H. Sargent, Incorporated, West Branch, \$659,185.25; F. J. Siller and Company, Ann Arbor, \$615,001.05; construction of plant—Lerner-Linden Construction Company, Detroit, \$415,252; F. J. Siller and Company, Ann Arbor, \$357,190; Chase Company, Harper Woods, \$443,680; K. G. Marks, Port Huron, \$494,840.

All bids were accepted and are to be reviewed by Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw. Engineers are to make recommendations on contracts at the next regular council meeting.

While bid proposal forms had been sent to about 18 contractors, Mayor Campbell expressed satisfaction with the number of contractors actually participating in the bidding.

In other business, the council authorized Supt. of Public Works Paul Robert to attend the May 18 meeting of the Michigan Municipal League at Mackinac City.

The council approved a cost estimate of \$1,019.75 for work on the east end of the cemetery. This would include grading and filling with top soil.

Peoples State Bank was named as the city's official depository.

## Resume Search Today for Two Missing Men

Search for two missing airmen, whose capsized canoe was found Tuesday morning near the mouth of the AuSable River at Oscoda, was to continue Wednesday morning after rough water hampered operations.

The men, Michael Bodi and Russell Blank, both 24 years old and Oscoda residents, are believed to have left Sunday on a canoe trip down VanEtta Creek.

Mrs. Bodi, who had been out of town attending a funeral, called Oscoda Township Police Monday night, telling them her husband had not reported to work at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. She thought they had borrowed a canoe.

Police Chief Robert Foster said the canoe and paddles were found washed ashore near the mouth of the AuSable. A car used by the men was found at VanEtta Dam, where the men apparently had begun their trip.

More than 25 men from the Oscoda Township Police Department, Michigan State Police, Iosco County Sheriff's Department, Wurtsmith Air Force Base and United States Coast Guard spent the day searching the river and shoreline.

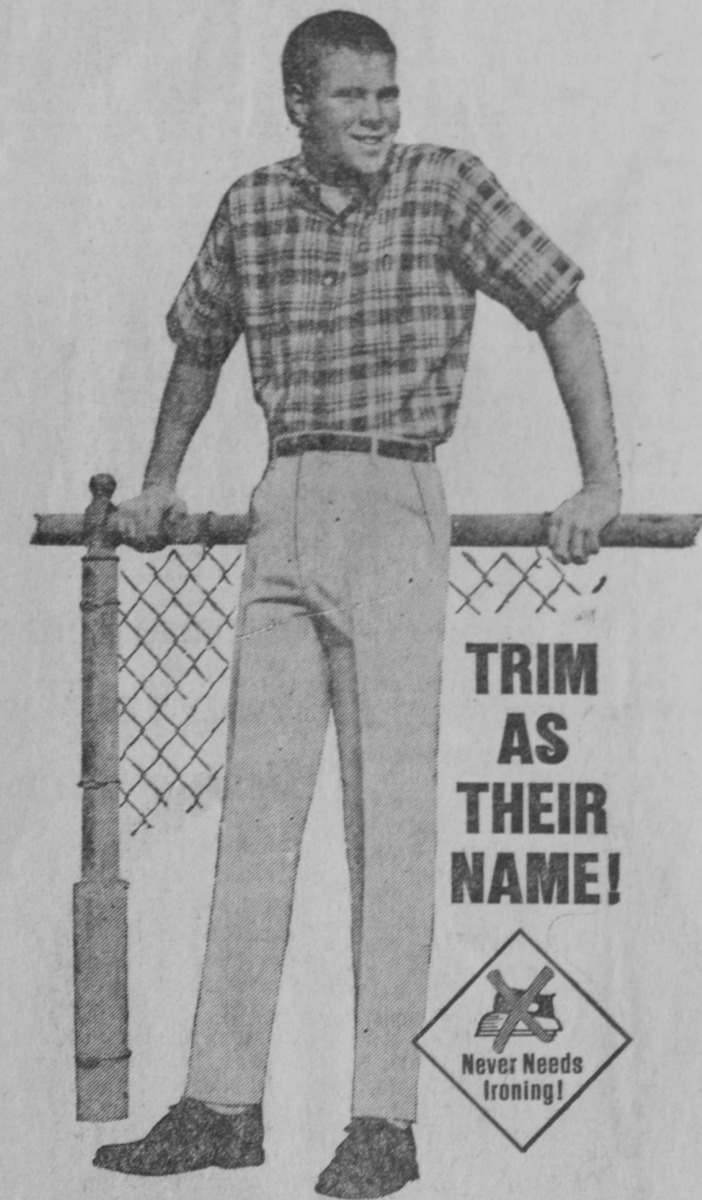

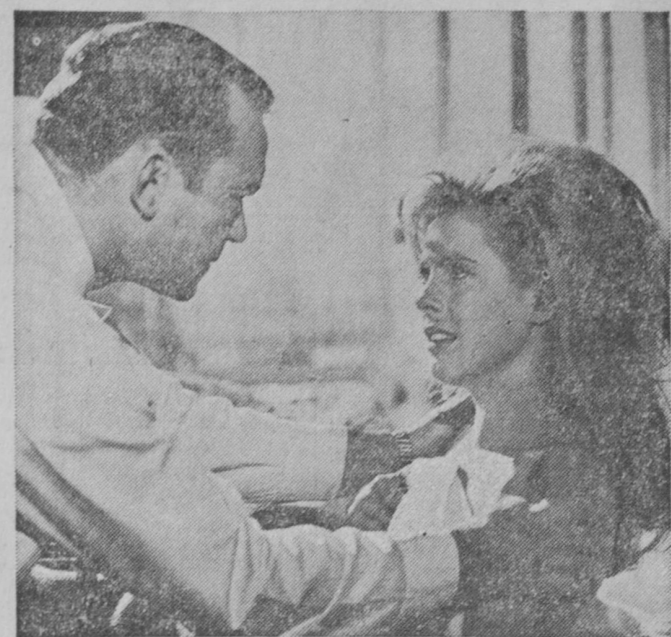

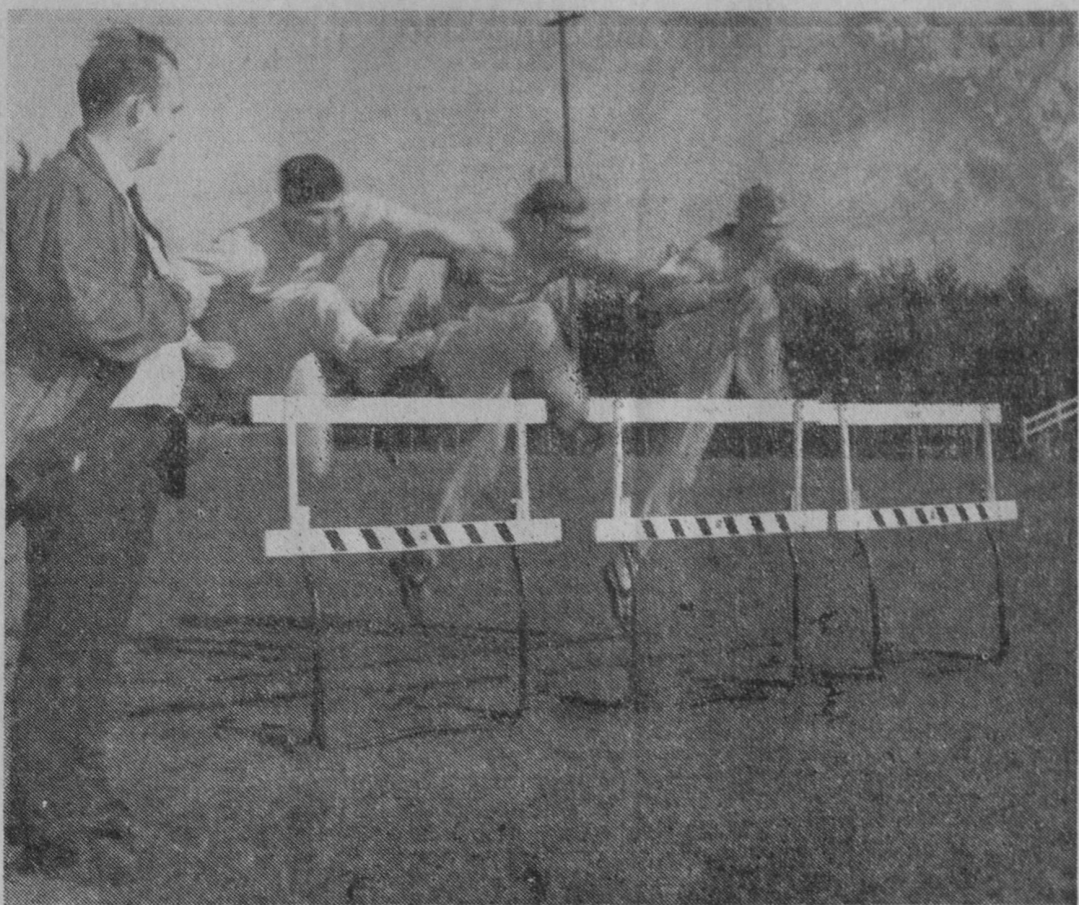

# Supervisors Adopt Final State Valuation Figure

Final corrected report of 1967 state equalized assessments of Isco County show a total valuation of \$60,133,806.

This final figure was reached during the April session of the Isco Board of Supervisors. It shows a total increase of \$349,992 over last year's state equalized valuation.

A preliminary figure last week indicated an increase of \$249,949, but several errors were discovered in Wilber Township's books and corrections were made prior to adoption.

In other business, a solution was reached between townships and the county road commission in the matter of charges for snow removal and road construction.

The proposal adopted would figure snow removal costs on a 10-year average. This charge would be made regardless of the annual snowfall.

A hassle had developed due to the recent plan proposed by the road commission in which road improvements in townships would be borne on a participation basis in which the townships would pay 75 percent and the road commission paying 25 percent. According to the new plan, participation would return to the old 50-50 split.

Glen Mask of Gem Surveys reported that his firm was now in the process of final review on property appraisals for the county. He said that new construction subsequent to initial field work here during the past two years indicated a substantial valuation growth in the county.

Mask, Edward Dusenbery, local supervisor for the appraisal firm, and Henry Oates, county equalization director, are to arrange hearings with supervisors in four districts of the county. To be held later this year, property owners will be given the opportunity to study property appraisals developed in the county. These apprais-

als will later serve as a basis for property taxes.

A letter was sent to Old Orchard Park management stating that no trailers would be allowed in the park between December 5 and April 1. In accord with the lease agreement with Consumers Power Company, lots are to be rented on a first come, first serve basis.

### Operational Costs Increase—

## County Adopts Record Budget of \$493,600

Another record budget for county operation was adopted last week by the Losco Board of Supervisors.

Submitted to the allocation board Monday was a 1968-1969 budget of \$493,600, a \$45,204 increase over the previous year. Actual amount to be raised by taxation would be \$433,600, after deducting estimated fees of \$60,000 received from county offices. This compared to \$338,496 to be raised by taxes under the 1967-1968 budget.

Last year, the county received

4.85 mills from the allocation board, which left a deficit of nearly \$100,000 on its budget.

Tacked onto the 1968-1969 budget Friday as a contingency was a figure of \$60,000. Sup. C. S. Everett of Tawas City, who presented the motion, reported that the county treasurer had told him that this was the approximate deficit that Losco would face by September 20 of this year. Everett said the county would be forced to borrow money to finish the 1966-1967 year and \$60,000 would be required to repay the amount borrowed.

Of the 33 categories under the new budget, 21 showed additional requests for money. The budget reflected a \$500 salary increase voted for county officers (now \$8,500 annually), plus salary increases to office help. A major increase was noted in the airport allocation. This was \$41,995, as compared to \$6,000 last year. This would finance the county's share of airport improvements.

Operational expenses of the various offices were as follows:

Prosecuting attorney, \$12,120, an increase of \$1,100; treasurer, \$18,350, an increase of \$1,200; county clerk, \$18,275, an increase of \$1,210; sheriff's department, \$52,950, an increase of \$8,200; probation office, \$324, an increase of \$98; probate court, \$15,775, an increase of \$870.

Circuit court, \$16,600, an increase of \$200; drain commissioner, \$2,200, an increase of \$500; extension service, \$8,175, an increase of \$200; equalization department, \$19,975, down \$2,250; courthouse and grounds, \$16,680, down \$3,160; register of deeds, \$18,700, an increase of \$975; planning commission, \$3,933, an increase of \$133.

A major decrease was noted in the welfare department. The new budget of \$46,000 is \$28,850 lower than last year's request.

Other items under the budget included regional library, \$10,728, down \$1,552; board of supervisors, \$18,000, up \$2,000; civil defense, \$1,000, up \$600; district health, \$18,040, an increase of \$2,862; justice court, \$650, same as last year; county advertising, \$4,000, up \$2,000; elections, \$6,000, up \$3,000; tax allocation board, \$450, same as last year.

State institutions, \$30,000, an increase of \$2,000; apary inspection, \$280, new this year; veterans counselor, \$400, down \$200; Northeastern Child Guidance, \$1,900, same as last year; social security, \$7,200, up \$2,200; soldiers burial, \$4,000, up \$400; coroners, \$1,000, same as last year; county nurse, \$400, same as last year; county appraisal, \$20,000, down \$10,000; child care, \$9,500, up \$900.

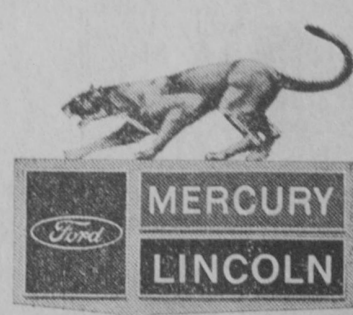

The base station radio comes alive over the clutter of the typewriter at the district office.

"Tawas this is Rollways tower, I have a white smoke coming up at 150 degrees about eight miles out. It is beginning to build up heavy."

"This is Tawas, 10-4 (acknowledge and understand). Air patrol seven this is Tawas, from your location can you see that smoke?"

"This is patrol seven, Tawas, I am over Foote Site now and just picked up the smoke. I will be over the fire in five minutes."

"Tawas this is Rollways tower, Hale tower (state tower) just gave me a cross shot that puts it in section 25 just north of Indian Lake, on the west side of Gordon Creek. It is building up fast now."

"This is Tawas, 10-4 Rollways. Calling six-four from Tawas." "This is six-four go ahead" (Roy Shedenhelm with a stand by crew at Silver Creek Guard Station).

"Roy, we have a fire just west of Gordon Creek on the Bengal Road. The patrol plane will be over it in a few minutes. Move your equipment in that direction. We will get a definite location from him."

"Ten-four Tawas, I have the pumper and tractor here with six men. We are on our way." "Ten-four Roy, I will notify the ranger and will place our fire wardens at Floyd Lake and Sand Lake on alert."

And the 1967 fire season has started. Last year, we had 22 fires on the district. The state had 22 other fires elsewhere in Iosco County. Out of the 44 forest fires, 42 were caused by man. In other words, 42 fires were preventable.

Our biggest job is preventing fires from starting, not putting them out. This is where you come in. You know our friend, Smokey, is not just kid stuff. He is talking about your property, your lives, the lives of my fire fighters and our national heritage, the nation's forests. Pretty important stuff for just kids! Will you help?

**Family Living Education**

When In Doubt—

Yes, you have heard it—"When in doubt, throw it out"—and, of course, you hesitate a few times before you actually get up nerve to dispose of food that costs you good grocery money.

To convince yourself to part with food that offers a possibility of food poisoning, you compare the cost with wages or time lost for one or two days, the discomfort of illness or the inconvenience of illness in the home.

It is estimated that Salmonella food poisoning alone is as frequent as the common cold and usually shrugged off as something else, such as "the flu."

Understanding the basic principles of the growth of bacteria which cause various kinds of illness helps with decisions on care and storage of food. It helps, too, to prevent the confusion associated with other food spoilage caused by molds and yeasts.

Bacteria needs food, warmth and moisture for growth. Our defense is temperature; either retarding growth of bacteria below 40 degrees Fahrenheit or killing it above 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Those 100 degrees between is the danger zone (room temperature is in that range, remember). Your refrigerator temperature should be about 40 degrees Fahrenheit and temperature for food held for serving is about 140 degrees. Any moist food left at room temperature becomes a good source of rapid growth of bacteria.

Cooling rapidly and thoroughly all the way through food means such things as removing dressing from a stuffed turkey and refrigerating within an hour or two from the oven or refrigerating masses of food in pans not more than three or four inches deep. It is the reason for refrigerating hot foods.

By the same principle, to kill bacteria by heat, we must get the entire mass of food to a temperature of 165 degrees for several minutes. This is why it is recommended a meat thermometer be inserted in the dressing of a stuffed bird. The cool dressing of a stuffed bird refrigerated over night before roasting may never reach a safe temperature to kill the bacterial growth.

For your free copy of a bulletin describing the principles of storage of food ask at any Cooperative Extension Service office for "Prevent Food Poisoning," No. 411. It contains symptoms of the most frequent food poison illnesses, the most common foods involved, reasons why heating is not always a cure for bacterial growth and answers to 27 frequent questions asked about food safety.

A social security representative is available to assist area residents at the Iosco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, April 27, from 10:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

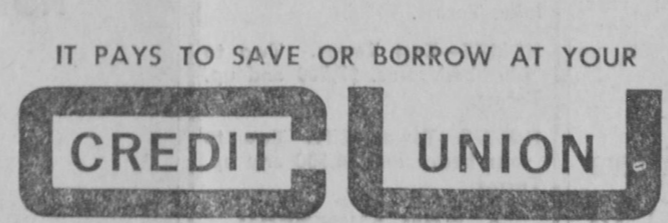

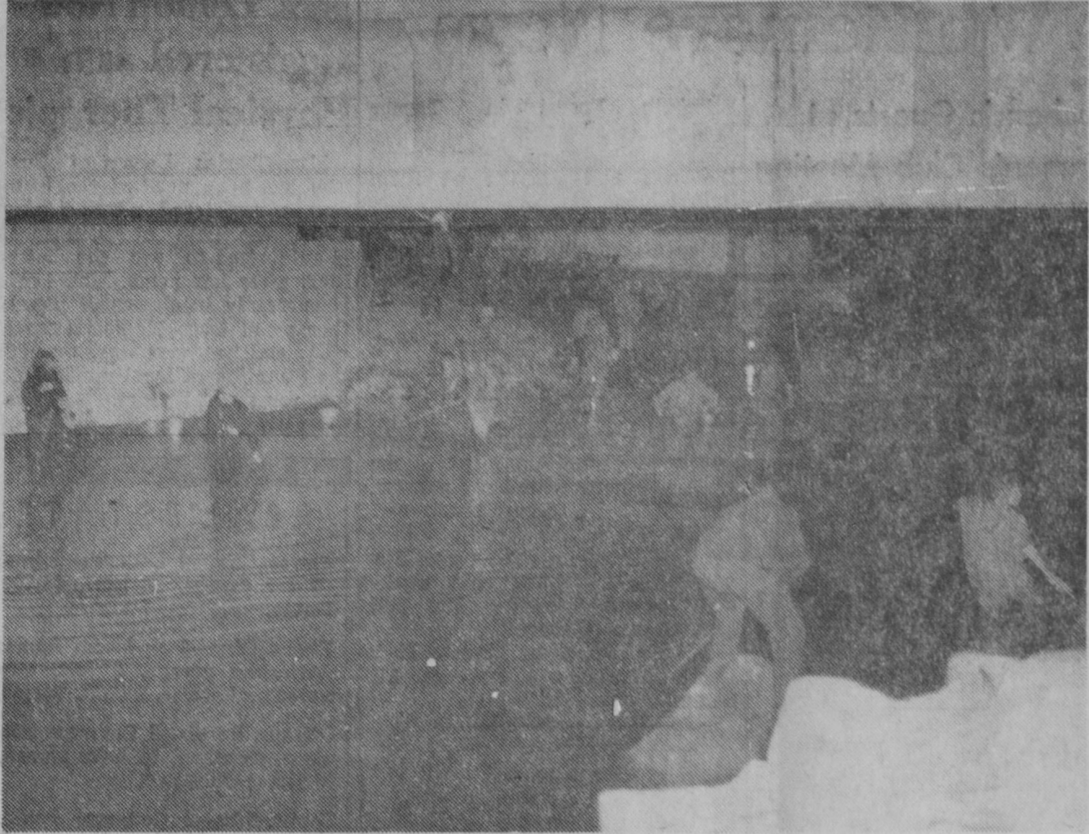

**Teach in African All Girls School**

Ray and Janis Moore, teaching in the Peace Corps, write from Champeria, Malawi, Africa, that they have been teaching in a girls school for the past three months. "Teaching in an all girl school is not really a new experience, as we did teach in a girls school at Katete, but it is quite different here," they said in a recent letter to Mr. Moore's sister, Mrs. Joyce Hughey of West Branch.

School starts at 7:15 a. m. and lasts until 10:30. "If the sun is shining, it really gets hot in the classroom. We have metal roofs and the blistering African sun radiates through the roof," they said.

The girls have been keeping a weather chart for the past three or four weeks and the temperature has been averaging between 85 and 95 degrees in the shade most of the days.

"Needless to say, with this heat teaching is sometimes hindered. Either the students are falling asleep or I am," said Ray. "It has not rained here in four days, so we have had no relief. The nice thing is that the nights cool down considerably, so sleeping is enjoyable.

"Maybe I'm making it sound like we really have a tough time, but it is really not that bad. We do have Lake Malawi for swimming and every week-end we can be found floating on an inner tube or just lying in the water."

The Moores planted a garden last January and it was growing nicely until February when it started to rain every day. The garden was washed out in a few hours.

The Moores plan a trip to the Nyika Plateau where there is a large game reservation with zebra, antelope, deer, leopards and assorted other small game.

"It has trout in streams like you just cannot imagine. One cannot keep anything under 14 inches," said Moore.

Because of the altitude, it gets quite cold there. They visited the reservation last year and it reminded them quite a bit of Northern Michigan or Canada.

The Moore's service in the Peace Corps is to terminate in August. On their return trip home, they plan to travel through Egypt, Israel, Pakistan, India, Burma, Thailand, Singapore, Philippines, Hong Kong, Japan, Hawaii and then to San Francisco, California.

"When we get back to Michigan we hope to relax in Flint and Tawas for a while. Then, we will get an apartment around Ann Arbor

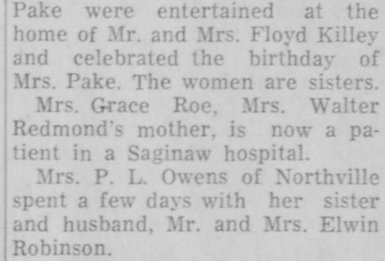

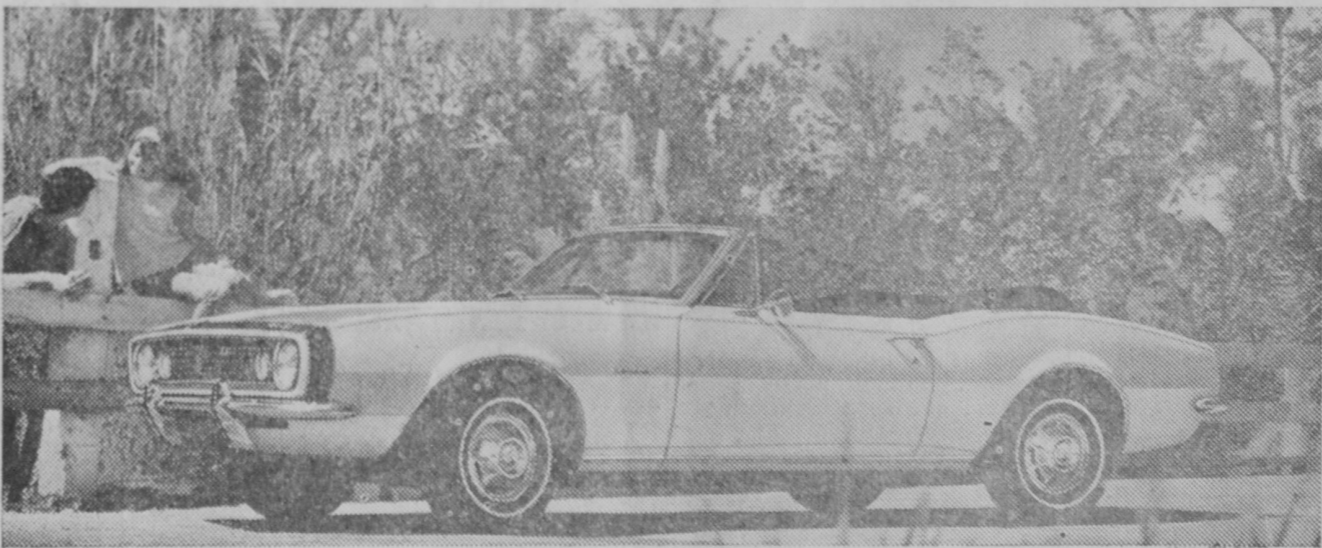
